## MINUTES OF THE 68TH CONVENTION OF THE LITHUANIAN CATHOLIC ALLIANCE

(Continued from last month)

## SECOND SESSION

The second session of the 68th Convention of the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance was called to order by chairman Leonard Pallis at 2:10 P.M.

Roll call of delegates was made by assistant secretary Audrone Elvikis. All delegates present as at the first session with a new delegate Rev. Victor Dabušis, lodge No. 65, Paterson, New Jersey, registered for the Convention.

Chairman Leonard Pallis called for a report from Vice-President Joseph B. Laucka.

Joseph B. Laucka gave a verbal report along with his written report as follows:

Our By-Laws are very favorable regarding the duties of our organization's vice-president. In accordance with Article 7, "The Vice-President, in case of the inability of the President to act, shall temporarily perform his duties." As you are aware, our president is in good health; it was necessary to substitute for him only in those brief moments while he was either presenting his reports or answering telephone calls. In addition to attending the Board and Executive Committee meetings, I had several other assignments which I tried to perform as effectively as possible.

At the request of the board, in April 1979, after the death of our respected and beloved editor, Matas Zujus, I spent a good portion of my time as a liaison between the board and the editorial staff of *Garsas*, assisting Rev. Dr. K. Bučmys and his co-editor, Paulius Jurkus, in finding literary material that would be of greater interest to members and other readers of *Garsas*. Practically every issue of *Garsas* published several columns of my modest contribution.

In carrying out the decision of the board, I represented the Alliance at the conference of the Council of the Lithuanian American Catholic Federation which took place in Dainava, Michigan on June 9-10, 1979. At Dainava, I had an opportunity to report on our Alliance, its present activities and hopes for the future. In a resolution, the Council urged Lithuanian-Americans to show a greater interest in our Alliance by becoming members, thus strengthening one of the oldest Lithuanian organizations in America. I also spoke about our Alliance at last year's convention of the Lithuanian R.C. Priests League.

I am also pleased to have played an active role in projecting our Cultural Fund which is now in existence. Its success will depend upon our willingness to help it to achieve its aim.

I would like to add a few remarks regarding the present status and future of the Alliance. Because of geographic distance and the infrequency of Board meetings, it is very difficult for board members to act collectively in making plans for effective action. The general situation and financial status of our Alliance mainly reflects the efforts of our office personnel. It seems to me that it is extremely unhealthy for our organization not to have a fulltime Executive Director. This situation has been haunting us for the last several years. Our Executive Director has been and still is only a part-time employee, partly because the Board has been unable to find a person who would be both qualified and willing to take charge of our main office as a devoted full-time Executive Director. Part of the blame for such a situation falls upon the Board's fear of risking several thousands of dollars to offer an attractive salary that would encourage some able person to seek an executive position in our organization. May I suggest that this Convention give serious consideration to the need for stronger and more aggressive management of Alliance affairs.

This year marks the 95th anniversary of the establishment of our Alliance. Even though our membership has been decreasing during the last twenty years, we should make renewed efforts during the next five years to attract at least two hundred new members, thus assuring that our Alliance will be able to commemorate its centennial with at least the same strength as it has today.

In the past, our Alliance has contributed greatly to the cause of freedom for Lithuania. The noble efforts of the distinguished pioneers of our organization to whom the causes of a free Lithuania and freedom of religion were a sacred goal should be pursued constantly, vigorously and effectively.

I want to thank all members of the Board and Office staff for their cooperation and understanding of the needs of our Alliance. I wish the future Board even greater success in its undertakings so that our Alliance will prosper, God willing, for the good of its members and the whole Lithuanian community in the United States.

Within the last few months I have worked hard in finding new members and my efforts have paid off in the signing of four new members.

As representative of the New York Lodge my responsibility also includes part of the New Jersey Area. The New York Lodge members are scattered around the country, which makes it difficult to collect the dues. Some of my members are located in New Jersey, Florida, and Arkansas.

Due to the fact that I belong to many Lithuanian organizations during these meetings I never pass up the opportunity to try and recruit new members. Also in my recruiting efforts I try to reach a greater audience by advertising through the Lithuanian radio programs and newspapers.

During my years as Director I have always attended all Board of Directors meetings and expressed my ideas on how to strengthen and build our organization.

Saulius V. Kuprys, Esq. gave a verbal report along with his printed report and extended greetings to the Convention from the Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation of America.

During the last three years I have had the honor to serve on the Board of Directors of the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance. The major undertaking in which I was involved during this period was the formation of the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance Foundation. This Foundation was mandated by the Alliance's 1972 convention and its purposes are within the framework of the Alliance's long standing tradition of fraternal service. The articles of incorporation of the LCA Foundation state that it is organized to honor the memory of four historic Lithuanian-American personages: Rev. Alexander Burba, founder of the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance; Leonard Simutis, President of the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance; Matas Zujus, Editor of our official publication *Garsas*; and Rev. John Baltusevičius-Boll, Spiritual Director. The response to the newly formed LCA Foundation, on the part of our membership, has been most gratifying. We are confident that the Foundation will be the source of a new vitality in the Alliance, which will generate greater interest in our work and ultimately result in a substantial increase in our numbers.

During the course of the last year I have unwillingly been elected President of the Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation of America. This organization, founded 75 years ago, in Wilkes-Barre, Penn., represents and joins under its roof all Catholic Lithuanian-American organizations, religious orders, publications, and institutions. In this capacity I hope to have the opportunity of

### REV. BEN PAUKŠTIS DIES

Rev. Benjamin Paukštis, Pastor Emeritus of Saint Anthony's Church, Forest City, died Saturday, Oct. 17, at St. Mary's Villa, Elmhurst, Pa.

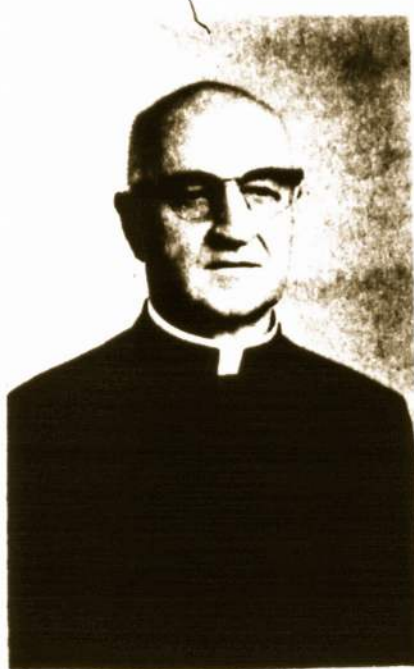
He was the son of the late Silvester and Magdalen Paukštis, Edwardsville, Pa. Born on May 10, 1889, he attended St. Vincent's College in Latrobe, Pa., and Mt. St. Mary's Emmitsburg, Md. He was ordained in his own parish church, The Annunciation in Kingston, Pa., by the Most Rev. Michael J. Hoban, D.D. on May 22, 1915. He was the second American born Lithuanian to be ordained to the Priesthood.

He served as State Chaplain of the American Legion in 1936, and State Chaplain of the V.F.W. in 1937. He also served in France as Chaplain with the 116th Infantry.

His Pastorates were St. Francis Church in Miners Mills, Pa., Holy Trinity Church in Wilkes Barre, Pa., and St. Anthony's Church in Forest City, where he became Pastor Emeritus.

He became pastor of St. Anthony's Church, Forest City, in 1932, and remained there until he retired in 1975. He was the oldest priest in the Diocese of Scranton.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. Celia Mayock, Philadelphia; and several nieces and nephews, in-

cluding Sister Louise Mayock, SND, Philadelphia.

A Pontifical Concelebrated Mass of Christian Burial took place at St. Anthony's Church, Forest City, Wednesday, October 21, at 11 a.m. with Bishop J. Carroll Mc Cormick as principal celebrant.

Viewing was on Monday, October 19 at St. Anthony's Church, Forest City at 4 p.m. Concelebrated High Mass for the Dead was offered there Tuesday at 7 p.m. Msgr. Donald A. Deuel, BF, was principal celebrant. Interment, St. Anthony's Cemetery, Forest City.

### FAREWELL TO FR. B. PAUKŠTIS

One of the more reassuring comments of Our Lord was His statement, "I have come that men may have life, and may have it in all its fullness." Therein, He promised a variety of rewards. Happiness and satisfaction could be considered one. Fulfillment and adventure, another. Wisdom and insight, still a third. Father P. Benjamin Paukštis knew all of those and more in the ninety-two years he spent in the following of Christ.

When Father Paukštis was born, the world was a much simpler place. In 1889, a train ride was a cause for excitement; an ocean voyage, a possibly perilous trip into the unknown. For most people, the horse and carriage was an unattainable luxury. Yet, America was known the world over as the land of promise. Immigrants were arriving on the Eastern Seaboard in unprecedented numbers. And they were at the time restructuring the whole of Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties in the Diocese of Scranton and in northeastern Pennsylvania.

The Paukštis family had

settled across the Susquehanna River from Wilkes-Barre in the town of Edwardsville. Their Church was to be found in Kingston. It was Saint Mary's which had served those of Lithuanian extraction. Distance, however, was no problem. Among the Paukštis children, three would be prompted to pursue vocations. And in time, one of the girls was professed a Nun in the Sisters of Saint Casimir and two of the boys were ordained: one a member of a religious order, the other for the Diocese of Scranton.

Father Ben, as he came to be lovingly known found his way to the priesthood through Saint Vincent's College in Beatty, Pennsylvania, and Mount Saint Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Maryland. At the age of 26 in his own parish church, he was ordained by the late Bishop Michael J. Hoban. From that fateful day, May 22, 1915, six long decades were to elapse before the infirmities of age would at last curtail his activities and force his retirement. Even then when his years numbered eighty-six, his departure was lamented by his

devoted parishioners and legion of friends.

Looking back, the secret of his success was in the man himself. His demeanor was always that of "the Priest, the Servant of God, the Good Shepherd." Never did he forget what his status demanded of him. Stately in bearing, courtly in manner, dignified in appearance, he was a gentleman. A well read man, he was logical in his thinking, articulate in his expression, and convincing in his argument. If, at times, he was outspoken, it was his innate sincerity and honesty that prompted his reaction.

Those who knew Father Ben well believed he could do no wrong. He elicited loyalty because he tendered love. Those who knew him less well were added invariably to his lengthy list of admirers. Devoid of ambition, Father Paukštis created his happiness tending to the vineyard in which God's divine Will had placed him. That was true at Saint Francis in Miner's Mills and subsequently at Holy Trinity, in Wilkes Barre. It was evident when he signed on as a Chaplain in the First World War. And it has been most obvious at Saint Anthony's in Forest City where he spent the better part of a half-century.

In many ways, Father Ben Paukštis was a living legend. When others will have been long forgotten, he will be remembered. A story, an anecdote, a recollection will bring to light again some facet of the priesthood he enjoyed. So he will be missed. God blessed him in life. May God now reward him in death. And may he rest in peace.
