RADIO

Lithuania is an agricultural country with most of its inhabitants living on farms, where they don't get much in the way of recreation. Very seldom do farmers see movies because as yet, the smaller towns haven't any theatres. Young folks get together Saturday nights for an evening of dancing, or as they call it "vakaruskos". Other entertainment or recreation are books and the radio. Books are expensive, and they can't afford to buy too many of them. Radios, too, are expensive, but once you have a radio you don't have to spend any more money with the exception of the subscription fee.

Lithuanian broadcasting is controlled by the federal government. Employees and entertainers are paid by the federal government and there are no commercial advertisements. To help cover the big expense of maintaining radio stations and giving programs, every radio set owner has to pay an annual fee.

With an average radio set, a Lithuanian radio listener gets a larger number of stations thru his receiver's loudspeaker than we do here in America. Twenty stations from fifteen different countries, in as many languages, are just about what a Lithuanian listener gets. Among the favorite broadcast programs are those of Russia, especially to lovers of opera.

Opera in Russia

Opera is still popular in Red Russia. But the operas they present aren't a bit red. In fact they are very "burzhuisky" Studying an European radio schedule for the week of October 18 to 24, here are the operas that Leningrad and Moscow were playing:

Monday - Oct. 19 - Mozart's 'The Magic Flute"

Tuesday - Rossini's "Barber of Seville"

Wednesday - Mozart again - "The Marriage of Figaro"

Friday - Moscow presented 'Othello' by Verdi, while Leningrad had Tchaikow sky's "Eugene Onegin" the same night.

Lithuania has two broadcasting stations: one in Kaunas and the other in Klaipeda. Both are small and weak in power, but the government is planning to build a new, powerful station in the spring. Programs from this new station will also be heard in America via short wave.

The Role Of Aesthetics In Education

Kant speaks of the aesthetic quality in these terms "That which is purely subjective in the representation of an Object i. e. what constitutes its reference to the subject, not to the object is its aesthetic quality." 6)

Davies has interpreted Plato with a greater familiarity, and although I do not agree with him completely, certainly argues the point favorably. He says "Plato's philosophy is a "system" only as it somewhat loosely organized itself about his conception of the beautiful. He developed with unrivalled force the ultimate tenets of idealism, resolving all mental aims into three ideals of truth, beauty, and goodness and from the second, as from an immovable center, sought to harmonize man's relations with the world and God.

The organizing idea of his thought was the essential oneness of the beautiful and the good. In this conception, which logically led to an optimistic construction of the meaning of life, we have an obvious fusion of the aesthetic and moral ideas. This fusion became complete, in his thought as he advanced to the supreme Idea, in which the beautiful and the good are one. This Idea he called the Good, the foundation and source of all being and knowledge it is as he expressed it in the idea "which gives to the existant its reality and to him who knows, his capacity for reason and knowledge." 7) Although I feel that Davies has misinterpreted Plato to carry his point, his assumptions point to the thing my paper is to prove; the importance of aesthetics.

Philosophers have in their discussions of the subject linked religion with aesthetics. I do not know whether religion arose from the aesthetic appreciation of nature and a desire to explain natural phenomena or that aesthetics were an outgrowth of religion.

Sculpture grew out of the practise of decorating pillars that marked graves. As artistry in decoration improved, the top of the pillar was carved in the form of a head; later the whole figure was ortrayed. With increasing skill the sculptor understanding his medium began to carve likeness' of the Gods. Architecture also had a similar beginning. The first architecture was the tombs and monumentals for the dead. Churches began as shrines to the dead and as places to worship them. Drama and literature either began or manifested itself again with religious ritual and festal processions. All this shows that the religious and aesthetic are closely related whether one believes that the aesthetic grew out of religion or that religion is an aesthetic experience. I am inclined to believe the latter. 8)

The aesthetic has value in education, both as an end in itself and a means to an end. "The educative value of art derives partly from this heightening power of differentiation and partly also from the sympathetic understanding of other personalities not otherwise accessible. The gulf which separates us from ancient peoples, savages enemies, allies, peoples of another sex, children, or the aged is thus bridged. The exertions of the majority of anthropologists might have been more valuable had they not shown themselves unable or unwilling to use this obvious method of understanding. 9) Oscar Wilde has said something rather pertinent to our attitude toward art and education. "It is a sad thing to think of, but there is no doubt that Genius lasts longer than beauty. That accounts for the fact that we all take educate ourselves. In the wild struggle for existence, we want to have something that endures, and so we fill our minds with rubbish and facts, in the silly hope of keeping our place. The thoroughly well-informed man — that is the modern ideal." 10) (To be continued)

Election is over and we can get right back to our little battles again.

The resolutions voted by the Lithuanian Democratic League, denouncing A. J. Sabath's Foreign Group Headquarters, and especially his appointed stooges, Jurgelionis, Chesnul and Kal, were recalled by request of our candidate for Judge, John T. Zuris. All of the local Lithuanian Democratic Clubs accepted John T. Zuris plea for harmony, and tolerated the self-styled Dictators for the sake of the good old Democratic Party. The big mistake was made when Lithuanian literature put out by these Dictators was passed out by the Precinct Captains and other local organizations. The 11th Ward, Bridgeport, can boast of only one Lithuanian Precinct Captain, Anthony Gudaitis, The 12th Ward, Brighton Park, also has only one Lithuanian Captain, and the 21st Ward, which includes 18th Street and West Side, has one captain in each vicinity, Kasky at 18th Street, and Sakavich at West Side, although Sakavich can hardly be considered a Lithuanian, as he not only is not one of the old guard, but his ethics and lack of patriotism make him more of a menace to Lithuanian political progress than anything else. Naturally, he's just the man for His Majesty, A. J. Sabath, who insists on carrying the Lithuanians in his vest pocket.

Several persons have wondered why the campaign just past, in spite of being one of the greatest in history, did not excite the Lithuanian Democrats in Chicago as much as such elections usually do. The total lack of those good old Democratic rallies and mass meeting throughout various halls in the city, was a result brought about by the rising wave of resentment against A. J. Sabath and his Clique. The only fact that prevented the Lithuanians from stampeding back to the Republican Party, was the fact that our Lithuanian, John T. Zuris, was a candi-

When we began this column we were able to count the Lithuanian radio programs on our fingers, while now - there are so many of them on the air it's a job just keeping track of them.

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
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
