Adv. J. Borden'as, Chicagos lietuvių sporto komiteto pirmininkas grįždamas iš Kauno parsivežė daugiau gerų žinių jaunimo klausimu, negu bet koks kitas veikėjas lankėsis mūsų tėvų krašte per ilgą laiką.

Pirmoji žinia, dabar jau gerai išgarsinta, Lietuvos sportininkų revizitas Amerikos lietuviams. Tai bus pirmą kartą lietuvių gyvenime, kad iš anapus marių atplauks suvirš dvidešimt jaunų vyrų, kurie stengsis čia atsiųgti už tuos pralaimėjimus patirtus iš Amerikos Lietuvių Olimpikos komandos rankų 1935 metais Kaune.

Sportininkų kelionės planai jau sudaryti ir dabar komitetai čia ir anapus jūrų dirba sekinamam jų įvykdymui.

Kauną atleisti aplėis sekančių metų liepos mėn. pabaigoj; New Yorke jie bus rugpjūčio pradžioj. Pirm pasileidimo Chicagą, jie pirmą aplankys lietuvių kolonijas Bostone, Washington, D. C., Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit ir dar keliuos kituos miestuos kur didesnio lietuvių skaičiaus gyvenama.

Washington sportininkai bus Lietuvos ministerio svečiai ir jo lydimi bus priimti audienicijon su Amerikos Jungtinių Valstijų prezidentu Roosevelt'u. Šalies sostinėj jie taip pat uždės vainiką JAUNOSIOS LIETUVOS VARDU ant nežinomojo kareivio kapo.

Vizitavimui projektuojamose mažesnėse kolonijose, lietuvių nepajėgs sudaryti jokios sporto kontestams opozicijos. Tą šios atletų kelionės iniciatoriai žino ir dėl to dabar Kaune sportininkai apart visko dar ir dainių bei kitų scenai tinkamų dalykų mokomi.

Chicagą žinoma jie ras opoziciją (IR GANA GERĄ) visame k. t. basketbole, bokse, įvairiose lenktynėse, plaukime, tenise ir kifose šakose. Jiems bus suteikta ne viena proga susitikti su Chicagos lietuvių arčiau, nes jų garbei jau dabar pradėta rengti skaičius banketų ir kitokių priėmimų.

Sportininkų kelionės reikalams Lietuvos valdžia paskyrė apie šešis tūkstančius dolerių. Žinoma jų pilnai neužteks ir padengimui visų išlaidų, daug dar pinigų turės sukelti Amerikos lietuvių.

Lithuanian Lawyer Leads Fight On Ambulance Chasers

A month ago, the Chicago Council of Local Bar Associations elected a new president, the well-known young Rudy Vasalle. This association with fifteen hundred members is composed of the following groups: Decalogue Society of Lawyers (Jewish), Justinian Society of Advocates (Italian), Polish Layers Association, Lithuanian-American Lawyers Association, and the Nordic Law Club.

The Chicago Council has as one of its aims, the maintaining of the high standards of the legal profession. One of the first activities of the Council was directed against ambulance chasing. Att. Vasalle invited the Chicago Bar Association to join forces with his organization in the drive. But the C. B. A. replied that there was no need for a drive of this sort because no ambulance chasers existed in Chicago. Undaunted by this rebuke from the C. B. A., Vasalle and the Council took things into their own hands, and with the assistance of the Daily Times, a huge and well-organized syndicate of ambulance chasers was uncovered. Arrests followed. Chicago was shocked when it was found that not only lawyers, but doctors and even hospitals, were cooperating with the chasers. Dr. Malcolm, T. Mac Eachlam, president of the American College of Surgeons, announced that any hospitals found to be involved in the chasing syndicate would be removed from the groups' approved list.

At the same time, Att. R. A. Vasalle after conferring with First Assistant States Attorney, Wilbur F. Crowley, urged passage of a statute which makes it a misdemeanor to solicit law business or to attempt to settle a claim with a victim within 15 days after an accident.

"If this legislation is passed", announced Att. Vasalle, "Illinois will be the second state in the union to take this step, New York being the first."

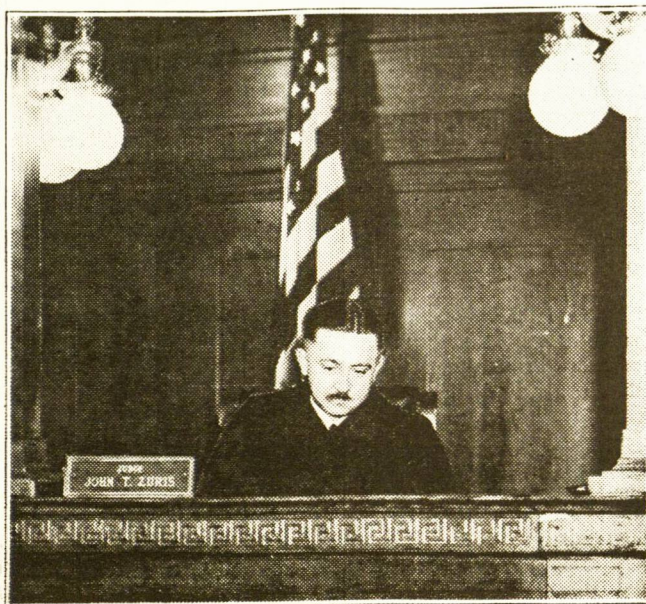
13th WARD LITH.-DEMOCRATS HOLD ANNUAL ELECTION

In the greatest hour of its need, Lithuania turned to the half million Lithians living in the United States of America, who very graciously responded to the call of their fatherland. Millions of dollars were raised, for supplying the defenders of Lithuania with ammunition, food and clothing.

Thanks to this assistance rendered at the most critical time, today Lithuania is free and is well on its way to economical independence.

In appreciation of the rendered assistance, Lithuania is forever thinking up new ways of showing gratitude to their American brothers.

The most commendable idea to date is the awarding of five scholarships to young American Lithuanians.

Five persons will be given an opportunity of a college education at the Vytautas Didysis university at Kaunas.

Later the number of scholarships may be increased and some day we may see dozens of young Lithians going across to Lithuania for free education in the land of their fathers.

Awarding of these scholarships is the most praiseworthy action of Lithuanian government.

Keistutis and Birutė

Until recent years the Catholic church had prohibited the christening of children with names such as Birutė, Vytautas, etc., branding them as pagan. With the rise of National consciousness among the people of our nation, the clergy had to lift the ban. Now very many of the present generation bear pagan names.

There are probably no other names in Lithuanian history, that are more beloved among the people than those of Birutė and her son Vytautas. Countless legends are told, and many are the songs praising her virtues. Praise of her has reached a stage as to be termed as adulation. What she did to deserve such worship is unknown, but it may be that she was the wife of a renowned ruler, and the mother of one of Lithuania's greatest sons, Vytautas. The fact remains that Birutė is held in high esteem among the Lithuanians. A proof of this is a chapel built in her honor on the mountain that bears her name.

Birutė, the daughter of Vidimontas, a scion of a noble house pledged herself to be a vestal virgin (vaidilutė) and guard the sacred fire on a hill near Palanga.

There are numerous accounts of why she became a vestal virgin and why she later broke the vows by eloping and marrying Keistutis.

Keistutis was then the Grand Duke of Lithuania, son of Gediminas, the founder of Vilnius and the brother to Algirdas, another favored ruler. Unlike Algirdas who became Russianized, Keistutis was a true patriot, and devoted his life to glorifying his country, fighting the German intruders who continuously invaded the Lithuanian territories killing and plundering the people and their homes. Keistutis should deserve greater honor than any other Lithuanian, even Vytautas whose selfishness predominated and who was instrumental in the death of many innocent Lithuanians. He died a martyr for the Lithuanian cause, being beheaded in the Krevė prison, undoubtedly through the efforts of his nephew Jogaila, son of Algirdas. This Jogaila had quite a hand in Lithuania's downfall, due to his selfishness and want to power.

During the joint rule of Keistutis and Algirdas, two attempts were made to christianize Lithuania. One by Pope Clement VI in 1349 and the other by Pope Innocent VI in 1355. The efforts were of no consequence, due to the steady warring with the blood-thirsty German hordes who called themselves the Knights of the Cross.

The play "Birutė" by Petrauskas and an ode to "Birutė" by Sil. Valunas have interesting descriptions concerning the names mentioned above.

JAUNIMAS FILLS A CRYING NEED

Dear Editor:-

Though I was always perfectly at home with the most out and out red hot nationalistic Lithuanians, and since 1917 connected in one way or another with the nationalistic paper "Vienybė" which celebrated its 50th anniversary this year, I always felt a keen need of new means to reach, organize and attract those thousands of American born Lithuanians who naturally, through no fault of their own, grew up to be more familiar with the English language than with their ancient mother tongue. "Jaunimas", therefore, fills a crying need — no doubt of that — and that is the sound basis for your future success. Aim high — to a national circulation capable of accumulating the necessary funds to support a picked staff of contributors. We have tens of gifted artists (even comic strip cartoonists), poets, essayists, reporters, photographers, sport writers, newshounds, philologists, historians, and just human philosophers or columnists a la Winchell. They will soon begin to flock to you, because "Jaunimas" is a medium to blow their chest off.

This great country was built both by its enormously rich human and natural resources and by the high principles which the Founding Fathers embodied in the Constitution. There are rich human resources for "Jaunimas" also. They are the tens of thousands of American Lithuanians who take pride in their race and whose only country is this big land of Uncle Sam. As to principles, it is up to you and us, your readers and wellwishers, to produce out of the travail of our souls, as the saying goes. Our elders have battled fiercely and sometimes very savagely for things which they claimed as principles. Some were delusions, some look foolish to us, but two things were worth while — faith and freedom of our people. Faith in its historical right to be alive and kicking, and freedom from all that is foreign and oppressive.

The appearance of "Jaunimas" is proof that some of us do not relish to imitate the donkey which donned a lion's skin to pass off as a lion. We do not want to hide behind the name of another nationality, or melt into a common stew, or just flounder around, simply because our elders do not appreciate the sad but true fact that English is more easy and natural to us than that Lithuanian tongue for which they have valiantly fought against the beastly Russian, the brutal German, and the wily Pole. Here nobody oppresses us and all conditions are different. The Lithuania for which our elders fought with so much courage, devotion and daring is now a fact among the free nations of the world. It was the land of their aspiration, where they intended to live, build homes, bring up families, and establish political, economic and cultural institutions. But out of the 439,195 people who told the US census enumerators in 1930 that they, or their parents, came from Lithuania, only 193,606 were born in Lithuania. Of course, the above statistics include Jews, Poles.

LITHUANIAN COACH MAKES A RECORD AT ST. BEDE

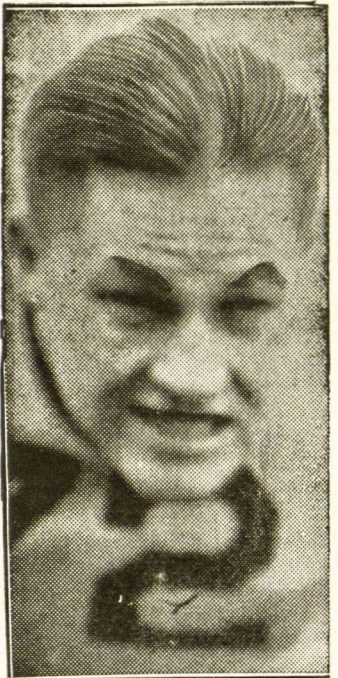

Since that year the Bedans have won twenty-nine, lost four, and tied three games for a percentage of .879.

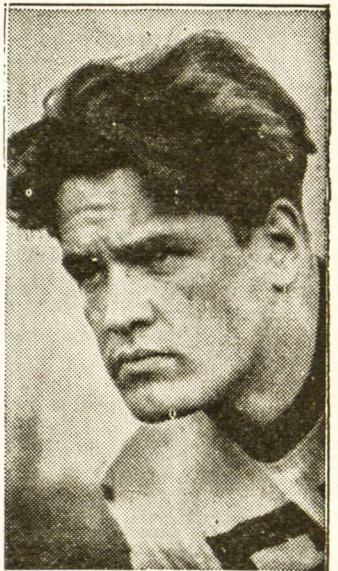

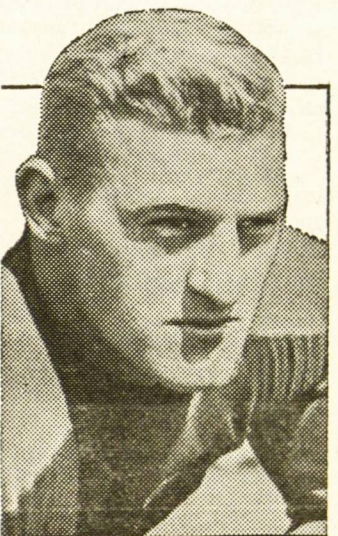
