## CHICAGOAN WINS LITHUANIAN LITERARY PRIZE

Kaunas — The Lithuanian government, co-operating with leading publishers of Lithuania, has announced the winners of the literary prizes for 1936.

For his novel "Broliai Domeikos", the government awarded the first prize — 5,000 lits — to Liudas Dovydenas.

Three awards by the Sakalas Bendrovė went to Bernardas Brazdžionis for his book of poems, "Ženkla ir Stebuklai"; Antanas Vaičiulaitis for his novel "Valentina", and to Brone Buivydaitė for her children's book "Auksinis Batelis". Spindulys Company's prizes went to Petras Cvirka for "Meisteris ir sunus," to Aleksandras Puida for "Magnus Dux" and to Vincas Mykolaitis Putinas for his book of poetry "Keliai ir Kryžkeliai".

Spaudos Fondas' premiums were voted to K. Placenis for his novel "Pulkim and Kelių"; to A. Tulys (Chicago, Ill.) for short stories "Aš Bučiau Tave Žmoną", and to Jurgis Talmantas for his translation of Shakespeares "King Lear".

A. Tulys has been writing short stories and novels for quite some time, most of his work appearing in the daily "Naujienos". At one time this writer was editor of the weekly "Sandara". He is married and lives in Brighton Park.

## England's Lithuanian Youth Magazine Goes English

For two years the monthly magazine "Review" published for the English Lithuanians of the London area, was printed in both English and Lithuanian — usually on a 50-50 basis. Finding the Lithuanian printed articles very unpopular and quite often un-read, the publishers, beginning with the current March issue, will print "Review" in 100% English. The editor explains his actions thus:

"With this issue, the "Review" commences its third year of life, and the two years of its existence having given us ample time to note the reactions of its readings to the magazine and the effect of the magazine on its readers.

"Many points are quite clear, primary amongst being the fact that our Lithuanian section is not sufficiently attractive to prove interesting to Lithuanian reading people and that it occupies space that could be well used by the English section.

"In organizational work, as in everything else, facts have to be faced and whilst we would all like our Lithuanian youth in Great Britain to read and write Lithuanian, the plain unvarnished fact is — they can't.

"It has been made obvious to us that a dual language journal is not a practical proposition. Those people who read Lithuanian, wish to read a journal that is wholly Lithuanian, and wholly attractive to them. The same may be said for the English reading people. In our attempt to provide for both, we admit that we have become in great danger of falling between two stools.

"Our one object is to serve the Lithuanian YOUTH of G. Britain and we have been forced to the conclusion that the English language is the most practicable for conducting our business.

"We resent any suggestion that we are any less Lithuanian because of the fact that we converse and write in the English language and we point to the example of our Sports Club, which right from its very inception in 1925 has conducted its business in English to show that we are not ashamed to admit ourselves as being Lithuanians and to advertise ourselves as Lithuanians at every opportunity.

"We consider it the duty of all Lithuanian youth to learn to speak, read and write in Lithuanian if they possibly can, but consider that a Lithuanian who does not know his language but brings credit to his people is as good a Lithuanian as any other."

### OUT OF LITHUANIA'S PAST "BARBARA"

Another beloved and tragic figure in the history of the well-known feminine personalities of Lithuania's past is the beautiful Barbara Radzivil, wife of Zygmunt August, Grand Duke of Lithuania and King of Poland.

Zygmunt August chosen by the Lithuanians, was the last to have ruled, a Lithuania autonomous from Poland. Beginning with his successor, the elected kings of Poland automatically became Lithuania's Grand Dukes.

Zygmunt August had been married to Elizabeth, daughter of the Czech-Hungarian king, but she did not live long. Her death was attributed to poisoning at the hands of the evil Bona Sforza, the Italian mother of Zygmunt August.

While residing in Vilnius, Zygmunt August became acquainted with the beautiful Barbara, daughter of Jurgis Radzivil and widow of the very rich Goztaut. The marriage between the two took place in the summer of 1547. It was a secret marriage in the presence of only the members of the Radzivil family.

As Zygmunt August, ready to take over the Polish throne, felt that the secret could no longer be hidden so he revealed it to the Polish Bishop Maciejowski and to John Tarnowski of Cracaw, who pledged their intercession on his behalf if he would deed to the Poles the wooded Bielski facts. Zygmunt August acceded to this demand.

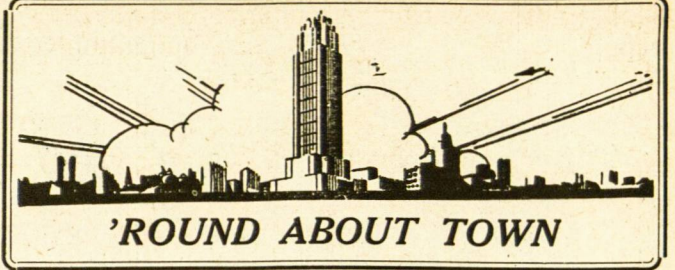
The life of Barbara was a miserable one. Zygmunt August loved her greatly, but he, too, had to contend with a lot of misery from all sides. The Polish aristocracy and the Szlachta together with the witch mother, Bona, were driving him to despair through their various intrigues to secure an annulment of the marriage, but loving her sincerely, he protected and stood by her.

To write a biography of Barbara would be like relating a long series of miseries, of wasted life, all due to her mother-in-law, Bona, who once being out of all types of means for causing trouble to poor Barbara, also hired a sorceress to bring about separation between Zygmunt and Barbara. This was discovered in time to catch the sorceress. She was placed in a cage where many sacred pictures of saints were hung, that the devils should be unable to free her, and was burned alive. Zygmunt August saw Barbara crowned as queen on December 6, 1550.

It is only natural in having had to live a hellish life of this sort, that one's resistance should finally weaken. Only a month later, in January of 1551, Barbara was taken ill. She died on May 9, at the age of 29. It is said, that the court doctor's being an Italian, hastened her death. Such was the belief of the king, too, that his mother was the cause of the death of his wives.

Barbara was buried in Vilnius. The king mourned her greatly, and his love for her was so intense that he employed even astrologers to keep him informed of what his beloved Barbara was doing in heaven.

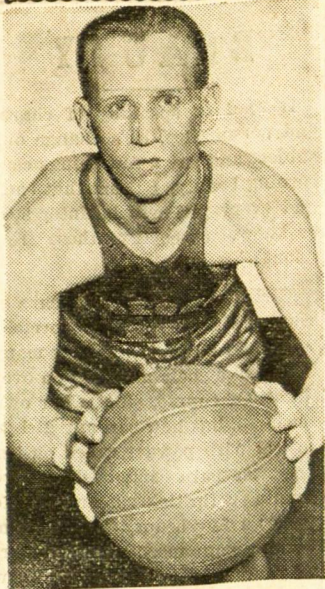

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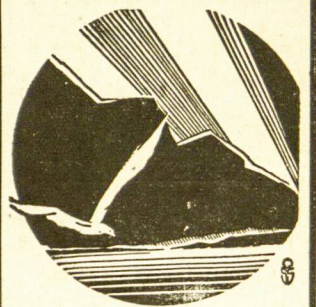
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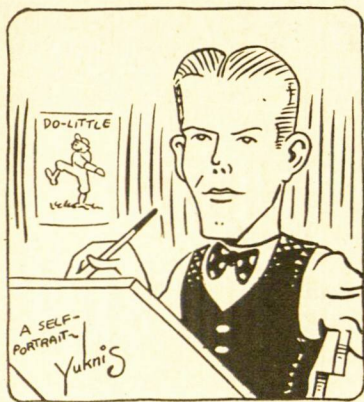
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## LITHUANIAN YOUTH CARTOONS HIS WAY TO SUCCESS (Autobiography in Miniature)

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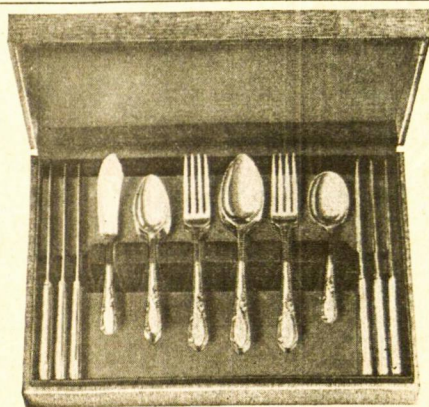
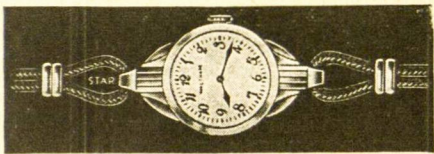
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## RADIO AMATEURS! WANT TO TALK TO LITHUANIA?
