### Išieivių Jaunimo Problema

Jau kelis kartus mes šioje vietoje rašėme apie didelį susidomėjimą Amerikos lietuviais dabar rodomą Lietuvoje. Ta šalis praleidus pirmuosius nepriklausomo gyvenimo 18-19 m. savo reikalų tvarkymui, pagaliau apsižiūrėjo, kad reikia kas nors daryti ir tais savo vaikais kurie likimo buvo svetimuosna kraštuosna išstremti.

Turime dabar jau ir Draugiją Užsienio Lietuviams Remti. Turime užsienio lietuvių studijas prie Vytauto Didžiojo universiteto Kaune, kur reguliariai dabar paskaitos apie lietuvių svetur duodamos. Štai pereitos savaitės paštas iš Lietuvos atvežė mums knygėlę kurioje atspausdinta Prof. Fabijono Kemėsio paskaitos, skaitytos virš minėtoji studijoje. Savo paskaitose Prof. F. K. nagrinėja išieivių jaunimo problemas iš visų galimų pusių ir stengiasi surasti išeitį kaip tą jaunimą nuo galutinio išstautėjimo sulaukyti.

### Svarbu Abiem Pusėms

"Savaime suprantama", rašo prof. Kemėsis, "kodel taip svarbu mūsų išieivių jaunimo lietuviškumą išlaikyti ir Lietuvai ir pačiai mūsų išieivijai. Net jeigu šių dienų Lietuva būtų viena iš didžiųjų pasaulio valstybių su dešimtinis milijonų gyventojų, tai ir tada ji negalėtų pamoti ranka į milijoną savo kraujo žmonių gyvenančių svetur. Dabar gi, tik nedidelį gyvą branduolį savo žemėje išlaikę, mes jokių būdu negalime sutikti, kad tokia žymi mūsų brolių dalis nuo žemės paviršiaus išnyktų, svetimosiose jurose paskęstų."

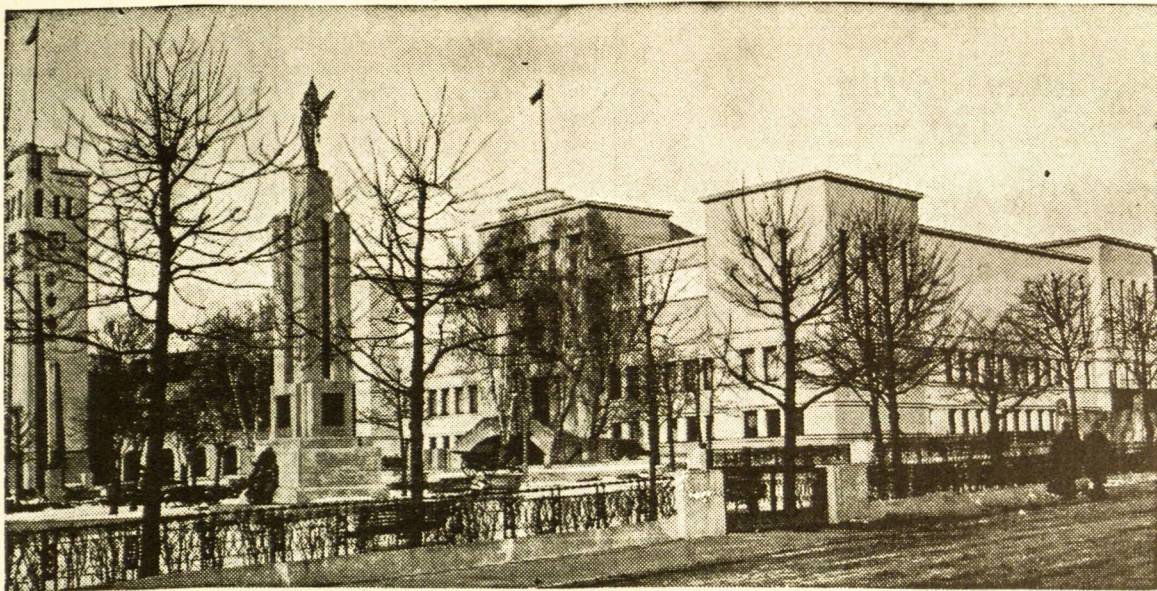
### Ryšių Palaikyme — Nauda.

"Lietuviško kraujo žmonės, po platųjį pasaulį paplitę ir ypač dideliais skaičiais su anglių saksų gyvenimu sutapę, jei tik jie palaikys dvasios ir kultūros ryšius su tėvų žeme ir jos žmonėmis, bus labai naudingi tarpininkai tarp lietuvių ir anglių saksų kultūros. Per juos mūsų sena kultūra ir dar jaunutė, bet gražiai auganti civilizacija gaus svarbių ir naudingų įnašų iš kitų didžiųjų kraštų kultūros bei civilizacijos."

"Tačiau ir pačioms išieivių jaunosioms kartoms lygiai yra svarbu lietuviškumą išlaikyti. Išlaikę savo tėvų kalbą, papročius ir tradicijas, mūsų kraujo broliai įeis į kitų tautų gyvenimą ne su tuščiomis rankomis, o su svarbiu kultūros indėliu, tuo žymiai praturtindami savo naujos tėvynės gyvenimą. Be to ir patys jie, mokėdami gerai bent dvi kalbas ir pasekdami bent dviejų tautų kūrą ir kultūrinius laimėjimus, tuo pat bus dvigubai turtin gesni savo dvasia ir intelektu, negu tie, kurie mokės tik vieną savo naujojo krašto kalbą."

Recent reports give light to the fact that Russia, strongest power east of the North Sea, is interested in Lithuania as a whole and frowns on Poland's question able acquisition. A mutual treaty signed recently discloses Russia's aim to re-arm Lithuania in return for much-needed agricultural stock.

## THE NIGHTINGALE AND THE ROSE

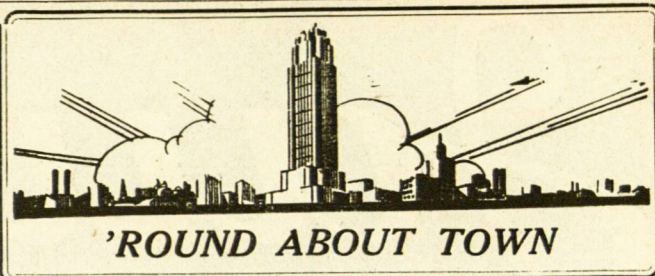
(A Lithuanian folk-story about the origin of the nightingale and the rose)

Upon the emerald leas of olden time Lithuania, there came daily a flaxen-haired shepherd-lad with his flock. During the long days of herding, while the cattle grazed on the tender green grass and quenched their thirst in the clear waters of the nearby rippling brook, to lighten the monotony of the long days the shepherd-boy practised his voice at singing. He sang of the gallant steeds and of his sheep, of the verdant fields and the dark green forests, he sang of his azure heavens and of the sky-blue waters in the laughing streams — for all of nature he had a song. His voice became sweet, aye, sweet as that of the lark, nay, even sweeter — sweeter than that of the birds. It was a bewitching voice that issued from his lips; the very winds ceased in their blowing to come near and take the loveliness of his singing upon their wings, carrying it throughout the countryside that all might enjoy its beauty. All the birds that flew beneath the sky and all the creatures that roamed the fields gathered about to be entranced by the sincere beauty of his song. ## Commentaries

Every once in a while some well-known journalist, educator, or clergyman comes over from Lithuania to take a look at our American-Lithuanian way of doing things. Invariably, upon his return, he gives vent to pessimistic outpourings on the sad state of Lithuanianism among our young people. Invariably, our youth is found to blame. Invariably, the peculiar difficulties besetting our young people in their efforts to become or remain Lithuanian-minded are overlooked or ignored.

One such visitor recently summed up the situation in the following trite words: "... jaunimas ištartėja del kelių priežasčių. Viena jų yra, kad per daug lietuvaičių ištaka už kitataučių, o lietuviai veda kitatautes. Tokios šeimos greit žūsta lietuviųbei. Kita priežastis: jaunimas neseka lietuvių veikimo ir mažai skaito lietuvišką spaudą. Taip pat nesidomi Lietuvos reikalais." He concludes with the usual exhortations to parents to imbue their children with Lithuanianism, young people must talk Lithuanian among themselves, read Lithuanian newspapers, belong to Lithuanian organizations, be interested in and love their Fatherland, etc.

Just like that — the whole situation in a nutshell. Very simple, isn't it? Not a word about the essential differences between Lithuanianism in America now, and that of twenty years ago, between the facilities for practising Lithuanianism in America and practising it in Lithuania. Not a word, or the least attempt to discover the underlying reason why intermarriages with other nationalities are so common, why the majority of our young people do not read or speak the Lithuanian language, why they do not follow the affairs of and are not interested in their nationality and Fatherland. It is so much easier to follow the sanctimonious method of pointing the finger of scorn and condemnation at American-Lithuanian youth because it speaks, reads and thinks so little in Lithuanian.

Our youth is expected to overcome the gigantic handicaps of American birth, education and environment, of lack of opportunity to learn and speak and read the Lithuanian language, of lack of news about their nationality and their Fatherland in a language they understand, of being scorned and ridiculed and ostracized from Lithuanian circles if they do not know the Lithuanian language fairly well, of constant mingling with other nationalities — our youth is expected to overcome all these handicaps and be as Lithuanian-minded and know their language as well as young people in Lithuania, who are free of every one of these delithuanianizing influences, or as well as American-Lithuanians of twenty years ago, who spoke and read Lithuanian because it was the only language they knew well, who married one another and who stuck together because they were still fresh from a foreign country and did not know enough English to mingle with other nationalities.

Most of the rough spots and the tiny blemishes which you find are easily corrected, and no expensive beauty treatments are necessary. Make up your mind to follow a beauty routine for a whole month. It may seem a hard task at first, but the results truly will be worth it."

"First of all, balance your diet," Miss Kaskas advises. Deprive of rich desserts, candy, and eating between meals. Also try to avoid too highly seasoned food and dishes to which you are not accustomed. Try to eat as much fresh fruit and vegetables as possible, and drink milk. Make a habit of drinking a glass of hot water the first thing in the morning and the last thing at night. You can flavor it with a little lemon juice if you prefer. As for the actual care of the skin, Miss Kaskas advises thorough cleansing with a good cream, followed by a soap and water scrubbing or cleansing lotion. A good foundation cream will protect the pores and hold makeup and, if you use rouge, the dry or cake variety is advisable.

If you follow such a routine for a month, says Miss Kaskas, your complexion is certain to show improvement. By that time you will have developed several beauty habits which should remain with you for the rest of your life.

Are You "Pleasingly Plump"? Worth bearing in mind while Easter shopping, if you are "fat and chubby", "short and stocky" or just "pleasingly plump" are these rules suggested by style experts.

"Wear plain, straight lined clothes... V-necks... skirts a trifle long... plain, long sleeves that come well over the wrists. Stay away from "gadgets" or very much jewelry. Select brimless hats with high crowns.

"Never wear brightly colored, crinkly or shiny materials that attract attention. Go in for soft crepe. Black is your best bet for color. Keep shoes dull and not short-vamped. Wear hose of dark neutral shades, because light shades accentuate heavy ankles."

Now a new team is soon to make a bid for this honor being the winner of the Lithuanian C. Y. O. Tournament which is now in progress at St. Phillips gym. There's no question that the C. Y. O. general competition can never be considered Lithuanian competition and naturally no C. Y. O. team would have any right in Lithuanian recognition, but a tournament between all Lithuanian C. Y. O. teams is something else again.

The Lithuanian Sports Journal "LIETUVOS SPORTAS" suggests that Lithuania should invite some of the U. S. Lithuanians to represent her at the European basketball championship tournament. This action would not be without precedent as England's Ice-Hockey team is composed mainly of Canadian — Englishmen.

vided into the three chief branches of (1) Lithuanians proper, (2) Letts or Latvians, (3) Prussians. The Prussians have always apparently been confined to the Baltic Coast near the Lower Vistula, chiefly to the E. of that river; they have been wholly absorbed by Germanic influences. The Letts, pushed towards the N. have been largely mingled with Livonians and Estonians. The Lithuanians proper, after founding an independent power of vast extent, joined more and more closely with the Poles, and fell under the Russian sway at the dissolution of the Polish state. The Lithuanian tongue has great affinities with Slavonic, but cannot be considered a Slav language; it is by far the most archaic of all living Aryan tongues. Before the union with Poland, begun in 1386 and consummated in 1569, the Lithuanians were either Pagan, the vast majority were heathen up to 1386, or Gr. Orthodox. The Polish connection established the R. C. ascendancy. Kosciuszko was a Lithuanian, and the province of Vilna was a main center of the Polish insurrection of 1863, crushed in Lithuania by General Muraviev. The republic was established in 1918. 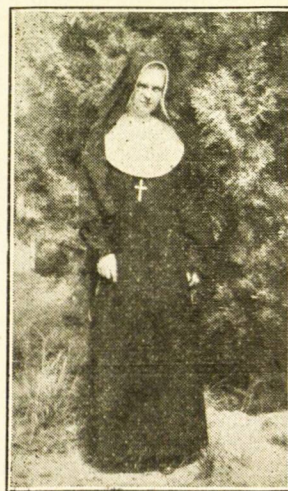

## IN MEMORIAM



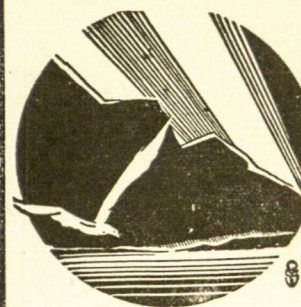
**SISTER M. LORETTA**
