Visų šių svečių lankymasis, be abejonės dar labiau suartins lietuvių abiejuose kontinentuose.

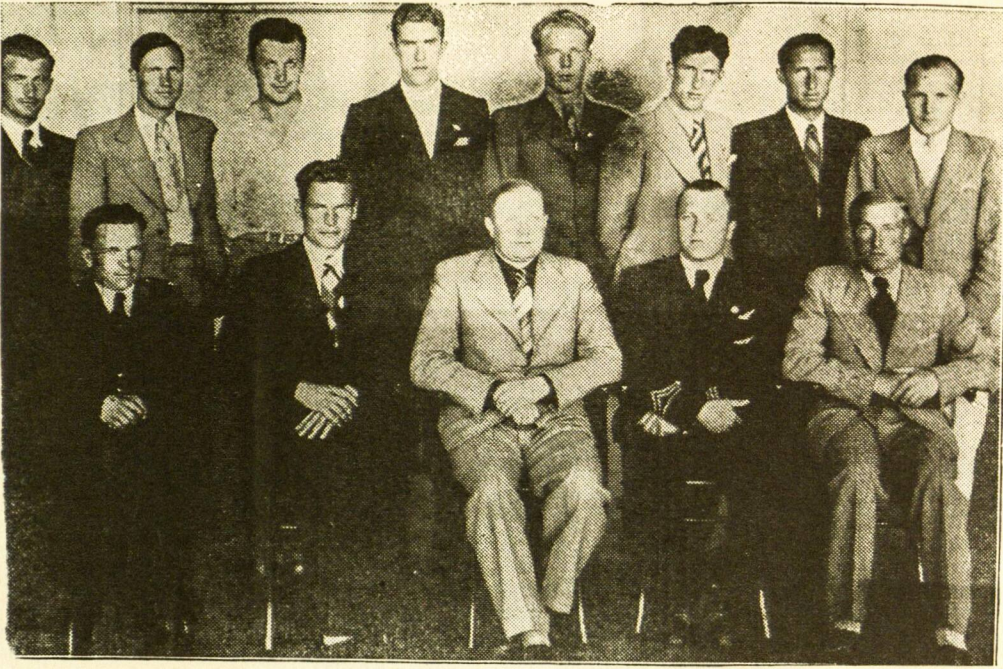
Šis artimas bendradarbiavimas ypač daug padės Amerikos lietuvių jaunimui.

LITHUANIAN YOUTH SHOULD ORGANIZE — DR. PETRAS DAUŽVARDIS

"The American - Lithuanian youth should not only speak the Lithuanian language but also read and write it". This was the substance of our recent interview granted by Dr. Peter Daužvardis, Lithuania's new Consul for Chicago.

During our interview in the study of Lithuanian Consulate Dr. Daužvardis said: "It will no doubt be a surprise to those of my nationality to discover that the Lithuanian language is fast becoming popular here in the United States. American Universities are establishing classes and professors, devote time and money for the study of the Lithuanian language. Professor Bender of Princeton University has studied and prepared two or three books on the Lithuanian language. Prof. Taylor of Columbia University has introduced its study in his classes."

"We should be proud to know the Lithuanian language," said Dr. Daužvardis, "because it is considered to be the oldest living language. My attention has been called several times to the ques-

"My main thought," he declared, stroking his cheek, "is that the Lithuanian youth in America should become more organized, should prepare leaders for our social and motional life. I consider that this generation of America youth is very important in view of the fact that they are the joining link with those who were born in the Old Country. The trouble with most of our Lithuanians," he added, laughingly, "is that many who accomplish anything of more importance have concealed their identity."

Dr. Daužvardis entered the ministry of foreign affairs of Lithuania in 1925 going to Kaunas, Lithuania, then became Lithuania's Consul in New York, and

now he is the new consul of Chicago. He assumed duties officially Wednesday, May 19, 1937, succeeding the late Dr. Mikas Bagdonas.

Born in the township of Obeliai, Lithuania, on Nov. 16, 1895, of Lithuanian parents, he was educated in the public schools of Valparaiso, Indiana. Is a graduate of the law dept. of Georgetown, University and former student at Valparaiso University.

He married Josephine Rautkis of Worcester, Mass., and now resides at 100 E. Bellevue Pl. He has two children, Peter Jr. and Fallin.

For recreation, Dr. Daužvardis plays an occasional game of golf with his friends.

Our Mother Tongue

The most exemplary vowel is O. It is so modest that it scorns to adorn itself with a dot, dash, or hook, as the more ambitious A, E, I and U. Everywhere and always, it is just plain O, sounding like the "o" in "on" (compare Ona), or the "aw" in "sawdust" (compare "sodas", an orchard, a garden).

We leave it with regret, and pass on to U, which, like its cousins, the E and the I, has a short, long, and nasal variety, written as: u, ū, and u. The Lithuanian U is never the "u" of the English "tube", or "mute", or "music" (compare the way we say "muzika"). It is akin to the "oo" sound in "soon" (compare "sūnus", a son), or doom (compare "dūmai, smoke).

Some of the words where the long U is found are: mūsų (ours), jūsų (yours), jūra (sea), sūnus (son), sūrus (salty), sūris (cheese), rūta (the famous flower of our beauties), lūpa (lip, compare "lupa", with short "u", meaning "to skin"), ūsai (moustache), žiūrėti (to look), dūmoti (to think, to ruminate), rūpėti (to be worried about), and so on.

The most frequent uses of the nasal variety are: 1) every noun denoting a direct object in a sentence, ends in a nasal vowel; 2) the ending in some cases of conditional forms of verbs; 3) ending in the plural of Genitive cases of nouns.

Some examples of the first rule (applicable to all vowels, except the simple O) are:

...Jis turi sūnų (he has a son).
Jis nusipirko skanų obuolį (He bought a delicious apple).

Diena dieną moko (Each day is its own teacher).

Some examples of the second are:

Lėktų, kad galėtų (He would fly if he could).

Mylėtų, jei mokėtų (He would love, if he knew how).

And the third: :

Padangėje daug lėktuvų (There are many aeroplanes in the sky).

Kas nenori pinigų? (Who doesn't want money?)

Išoko oželis į rūtų darželį. (From a folk song).

Well, we have glanced over the most important points connected with the Lithuanian vowels. We have found that

A is never the "a" in "mate".

E is never the "e" in "me", or "serve".

I is never the "i" in "kite".

Y is never the "y" of "yes".

U is never the "u" in "mute".

E, I and U have long varieties, written as: ē, y, and ū.

There is also a nasal a, e, i and u, used most frequently as noun endings when this noun expresses a direct object in a sentence. The long ē is practically always found when the combination "ej" occurs in Lithuanian. It also occurs in the infinitive form of verbs like: mylėti (to love), galėti (to be able); in the past tenses, as: matė (he saw), gėrė (he drank), and in the feminine nouns like: karvė (a cow), lapė (a fox), dėdė (poor uncle, they make him feminine!), saulė (sun), and so on.

Jaunimas Privalo Organizuo

Dabartinis lietuvių jaunimas Amerikoje yra jungtukas tarpe senosios iš Lietuvos atvykusios kartos ir jaunųjų čia gimusių lietuvių. Jis yra lietuvių išeivijos ateitis. Nuo dabartinio jaunimo priklausys mūsų rytoj. Jeigu jaunimas bus stiprus ir susipratus tai mūsų rytojus išauš giedrus. Ateitis bus šviesi ir geresnė už dabartį. Jeigu gi jaunimas bus ištisęs ir lietuviškai nesupratus tai rytojus bus niurus ir ateitis apgailėtina — lietuviybės sutirpimą lemianti.

Kad mūsų tėvų padėtą lietuviybės pagrindą stiprinti ir ant jo atieities lietuvišką namą statyti, dabartinis jaunimas turi iš savo tėvų, iš organizacijų vadų, iš dabartinio gyvenimo perimti visą lietuviškumą, sujungti jį su savo išmokslinimu bei gabumais ir įkūnyti jį į tą namą, kurin ateinančios kartos persikels, bei įcimentuoti į tą kelią ir tiltą, kuriuo mūsų tautos sūnūs vaikščios, ir kuris mūsų tautą jungs.

Dabartinis jaunimas kaip pirma priminiau, yra svarbiausias išeivijos gyvenime — jis jungia žmones dviejų kartų. Jis taip pat jungia jų kultūras: — slavišką — lietuvišką ir amerikonišką — lietuvišką. Senojo kartoj buvo priemaiša rusiškos ir lenkiškos kultūros, o naujoje jau yra amerikoniškos kultūros. Jeigu dabartinis jaunimas nesubudavos gero tilto kuriuo ateinančios kartos galės vaikščioti, tai toms ateities kartoms jį subudavoti bus labai sunku arba ir visai negalima.

Asmeniškai į Amerikos lietuvių jaunimą aš žiūriu labai optimistiškai. Esu tikras, kad mūsų jaunimas perims iš tėvų visą tą kas yra naudinga ir mūsų tautos ateičiai reikalinga, ir kad jis netik sujungs senąją kartą su jaunąją, bet tą junginį dar žymiai sustiprins ir savo aišmams perduos konkrečioje ir tvarkioje formoje. Tačiau kad perėmus iš senųjų, lietuviško laivo vairs, nereikėtų pradžioje tupėti ir darbas trukdyti.

Aš visuomet buvau ir esu tos nuomonės kad jaunimas turi stipriau susiorganizuoti, turi išsi-auklėti savo vadus ir pamažu imti lietuvišką vadovavimą į savo rankas.

Mūsų seniai, iš Lietuvos atvykusieji žmonės, padarė labai didelę klaidą neįtraukdami jaunimo į organizacinį veikimą — palikdami jį nuošaliai. Jaunimas tos klaidos turi vengti — senių į šalį nenustumti. Kaip jaunimas suaugusiems galėjo duoti idėjų sumanymų, taip ir suaugusieji gali duoti jauniesiems įvairių praktiškų patarimų.

Rimto jaunimo organizacija savo pagrindan ir praktikon turi dėti ne vien tik sportą, bet ir kitas gyvenimo sritis. Lietuvių jaunimo kūnas (fiziškai ir dvasiškai) turi sistematingai augti, stiprėti ir darytis galiūnu (formidolišku).

Chicagoje yra net kelios jaunimo organizacijos. Čia yra keletas tūkstančių jaunimo. Didžiuma jo neorganizuoto. Reikėtų tą didžiumą jo suorganizuoti, o tik mažumą palikti neorganizuotą.

Organizavimo tikslu būtų neprošalį panaudoti sportininkų atvykimo progą. Visuose susirinkimuose reikėtų stipriai akcentuoti organizacijos reikšmę ir svarbą. Sportininkams esant Chicagoje, bent vieną vakarą paskirti vien tik jaunimui.

Commentaries

The Lithuanian athletes will be here in several weeks. Their impending arrival is a godsend to us American-Lithuanians. We're beginning to rub our palms with glee in anticipation of a corking good squabble over the various details of their arrival, their schedules, etc. etc. We can always depend on visitors from Lithuania to supply fuel for our disagreements whenever we run short of ideas ourselves. The American-Lithuanian battlefield has been unusually quiet lately. It just isn't natural when the leaders of our various factions start getting to-gether, and even making speeches at one another at banquets and meetings. The spirit of the good old times is imperilled. And so, in approved Lithuanian fashion, a visit that should be a purely fraternal and athletic gesture will undoubtedly be interpreted by our several factions as a subtle attack their principles or lack of principles.

We've been rather flattered by having the Lithuanian government open and censor the last several letters we received from Lithuania. It adds a touch of romance and intrigue to our rather prosaic life to realize that an European government has been suspecting us of receiving secret or forbidden information. It makes us feel a bit spy-ish. Though we hardly believe we are in danger of facing an imaginary firing squad for receiving military secrets and the portentous news that Uncle John's health is a bit better, that the heavy rains have delayed spring sowing, and that the family picture enclosed in the last letter was greatly enjoyed.

Last week, the European debtor-countries expressed their formal, tongue-in-the cheek regrets to the United States over their inability to pay the portion of the war-debts which had become due. Among these was Lithuania.

There has been a tendency in the past on the part of many American-Lithuanian individuals and organizations to excuse Lithuania's repudiation of her debts on the grounds that she is a poor country, that her debt is insignificant compared to the other countries, that she never received money, anyway, but only goods, etc. etc. But all these so-called mitigating circumstances do not alter the simple fact that Lithuania owes money to the United States government, and that she is to be blamed for welching on her just debts as much as any other country. We love and honor the country of our ancestors, but we have no reason to be proud of her government's apparent lack of good intentions in the matter of her war debts to the United States. We believe it is carrying Lithuanian patriotism a bit too far to attempt to excuse or whitewash such a deliberate breach of international honesty.

We have often wondered why our American-Lithuanian newspapers have been making very little or no effort to urge unnaturalized American-Lithuanians to become citizens. On the contrary, proposed legislation in regard to non-citizens that would indirectly encourage naturalization always meets with great opposition from these papers. It is no wonder, then, that our foreign-language newspapers are

FLYER JONAS PYRAGIUS

Jonas Pyragius, born in the township of Daujenai, Biržai state, on January 1, 1902, of Lithuanian ancestry and received his education at the Panevėžys high school.

He graduated from the military academy with acclaimed honors and received his wings as a pilot. He spent ten years with the Lithuanian aviation Corp.

When Lithuania was fighting for its independence, Pyragius, only 19 years old, joined the army as a volunteer and saw action in three fronts with Bolsheviks, Poles and Bermantininkais.

Mr. Pyragius took up gliding in 1934 and in 1936 established a Lithuanian record, by staying up in the air 22 hours and 36 minutes.

He is the chairman of the Lithuanian Aero Club of the Gliders Branch.



FLYER BRONIUS OŠKINIS

Bronius Oškinis was born in the township of Barzdai (state of Šakiai), on April 15, 1913.

He graduated from the institute of technology and the Lithuanian military in 1931.

At present he is a technical officer in the army aviation shops.

Since 1932 he has spent most of his time as a glider.

The gliding sport has occupied the last ten years of M. Oškinis life and to date he has 3 different gliders of his own construction.

As a point of correct usage, avoid using expressions like: "vakar atsibuvo mitingas, piknikas, balius". Use either: "Vakar turėjome susirinkimą, pikniką, balį," or "Vakar įvyko susirinkimas, piknikas, balius."

"Atsi-" generally means a surfeit of something: atsilosė (he bent until he bent over), atsibodo (it was obnoxious until it became a nuisance), atsigavo (he was catching up until he became well again). "Atsibuvo" would mean he stayed there until he was fed up (which sometimes happens, you know).

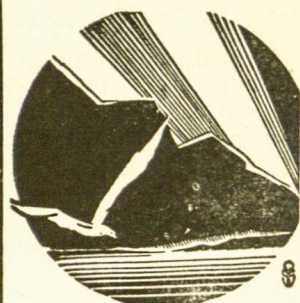

Likewise, in "Radio Tantrums" the "gutterly" criticism you make of a certain singer and crowd would have been tempered with constructive comment instead of getting into the gutter yourself.

These two comments leave the impression that the editors are motivated by personal enmities and "clique-ish" attitudes.

The grammatical and spelling errors that stick out in such large numbers in your publication should immediately be corrected if you wish to have "JAUNIMAS" operate on a higher plane. On a separate sheet, I take liberty of pointing some of them out to you.

The first thing you should do is not to use the word Lith as often as you do and do not abbreviate it. It is alright to do so in speaking but in print it lowers the quality of the paper. 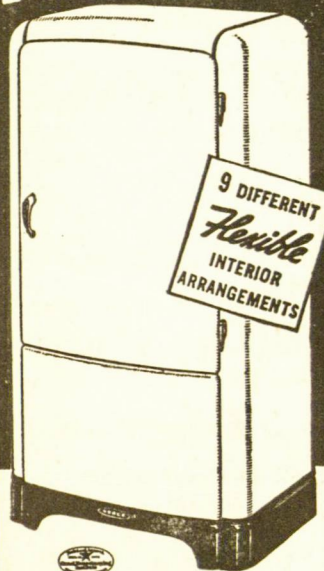
