Kaunas, Lithuania: cold grows more intense daily and the snow deeper. It's the kind of Winter we seldom experience in America, but we love it. The streets of Kaunas are filled with horse-drawn sleighs, making it all very picturesque; but it is out in the country where it is most beautiful. Last night, we returned to Kaunas after spending two days in Dotnuva, guest of the students at the žemės Ūkio Akademija, where once again we had to open wide our eyes in wonder.

Dotnuva is a beautiful place. but it is no more beautiful than it is utilitarian. Here it is that the future farmers of Lithuania learn how best to work the soil so that better and better grows the life of every Lithuanian. In its physical, appurtepances Dotnuva is modern to the nth degree; with classrooms, libraries reading rooms.



laboratories, and living quarters that make it hard to believe that this is the same Lithuania of which most young Lithuanians in America know from only

their parents who left this land when it was but a Russian colony; poor and unproductive and dirty to boot. The girl students learn how to be good housekeepers - how to weave and wash and cook and clean - and can they cook! Yesterday we had dinner with a class of girls who had been learning row to prepare a kūčios pietus.

The students at Dotnuva were so sincerely friendly, we found it hard to leave. But we had to get into Kaunas. The semester is drawing to a close and there is work to be done. ## CHICAGO A LITHUANIAN COLONY 104 YEARS OLD!

INTERESTING DATA UN-COVERED BY LITHUA-NIAN SCRIBE

Three years before Chicago became a city, a Lithuanian settled on the shores of Lake Michigan, thus starting a Lithua nian colony that after 104 years boasts of more than 100,000 members. This interesting data has been recently uncovered by Stanley Pieza, Chicago Evening American scribe, who during the last four years has been gathering material for his book on Lithuanians in Chicago.

This first Chicago-Lithuanian came to the site of Fort Dearborn in 1834, making the trip from New York in a covered wagon. Full details about him will be described by Mr. Pieza in a series of articles entitled "Chicago Lithuanians" that will appear in the Evening American on February 15, 16 and 17 in conjunction with Lithuania's 20th Independence Day.

## **American Could** Have Had Lithuanian Throne

FOR TEN MILLION DOLLARS!

(ED. NOTE: This column is an excerpt from a radio address delivered recently by the well known author Linton Wells over the NBC blue network).

Early in 1926 I started on a trip through Europe and Russia to the Far East. Accompanying me was a young man of twenty by the name of Edward S. Evans, Junior, who today is an able official of the Evans Products Company of Detroit.

Edward was here in New York just a fortnight ago and we had a grand reunion after an eleven year separation. Back in of Michigan student. His twin brother Robert had been taken ill, which necessitated his dropping a class behind Edward Rather than have the twins separated in college classes, Edward Evans, Senior, premitted his first born - by twenty minutes - to wander around the world with me for a few months, so when he came back the boys could be together again at Ann Arbor. We had a grand time - it was a liberal education for both of us - and Edward was offered a kingship.

#### TRIP TO KAUNAS

Because of their centuries of enslavement, I thought the people would prefer to be governed rather than govern.

"Why not restore the mo-narchy," I suggested.

"I believe the line is extinct" an official of very high rank said. "It's not a bad idea, but what we need is new blood. Someone who will subordinate political ambition to the welfare of Lithuania. A strong man of character - someone who sympathizes with our people and has their interest at heart.

Six years ago, a small group of Lithuanian-American students met with the idea of creating an organization of university students. Organizations of this type already existed among other nationalities and were adding to the unity and progress of these groups. The Lithuanian students, not less willing to do their part, felt they too should give mutual aid and propogate and encourage cultural activities among the Lithuanian people. The club's work in its six years of existence has been of value to all to whom it could be of assistance.

#### STUDENT AID

Today this club is known as University Lithuanian Club, and as several years ago, its aims are those embodied in its constitution. It is composed of young men and women who have fifteen or more semester hours of college credit. They are all Lithuanian or of Lithuanian descent, and only such are allowed to join the club - with the exception of any individuals who "have rendered a distinguished service to the Lithuanian Nationality". In brief, the Lithuanian University Club exists to "- unite American University students of Lithuanian descent -" and to "- render possible aid to American Lithuanian students -", "- to propogate and encourage cultural activities-" and to "- sponsor, promulgate and take part in any movement intended to benefit the Lithuanian people and treir descendants -" and to be "nonpartisan to questions of religious and political origin-".

#### FIRST SCHOLARSHIP

The club awarded its first scholarship in December 1936 to Mr. Anthony Stelmok, who is now finishing his work at Medill school of Journalism of Northwestern University. Two more scholarships will be offered this year, a half scholarship in February and a full scholarship in September. If you are one of the unfortunate, who has not been able to finish your education because of the lack of funds, truly you should not let this opportunity pass you up.

a tribe which seems to have been of mixed Slavic and Lithuanian blood..."

The Lithuanians, however, opposed these invasions successfully for thirty years, finding time to engage in wars with the Slavs. In the meantime the German Order supported by the entire Western Europe, incited by popes against pagan Lithuania, carried on their war of extermination in the Parusnian countries. The time had come for the supreme test of Teutonic-Lithuanian supremacy.

To prevent a union between the two Teutonic Orders, the German and Livonian Knights of the Cross, Rimgaudas, then Grand Duke of Lithuania decided to engage the enemies separately. With this purpose in view he mobilized a powerful army and advanced against the Livonian Knights, led by Grand Master Volkin. On St. Maurice Day, 1236, the two armies met. In this decisive battle 20,000 Teutons fell, among them Volkin and other great German war-

The news of this Teutonic disaster resulted in an appeal to the Pope and a Holy War was declared against Lithuania.

Mindaugas, the son of Rimgaudas and the successor to the throne did not fare as well as his father. Internal strife encouraged the Slavonic Dukes to take advantage of the situation and they repeatedly attacked Lithuania, taking several provinces. This situation eventually forced Mindaugas to seek peace with the German Orders. In 1252 he embraced Christianity and was crowned King of Lithuania.

This did not please the Lithuanian Samagothian (žemaičiai) who refused to recognize Mindaugas' authority and they continued to wage a spectacularly successful war against the Livonian Knights. Mindaugas, impressed by their success and realizing that to exist, Lithuania must unite, renounced Christianity, declared void his treaty

#### whom was Gediminas (1316-1341) who succeded not only in crossing the Parusnian States, but invaded Saxony as well. The Letts and Poles joined him and the Pope, once more sensing danger to Christianity, aroused the powerful forces of Western Europe and sent them to the rescue. The climax of these hostilities came in 1410, after Lithuania had again accep ted Christianity, having formed a union with Poland.

At Marienburg, which had become the center of the German Orders' activities, the fifteenth century found a change in the character of the Knights. Grand Master Conrad complained of their too great luxuriousness, their inability to prac tice self-denial. The Knights mocked his preachings-and their religion. The invasions into Lithuania continued merely for sport, loot and morbid slaughter.

Jagello (Jogaila) who married the Polish princess, Hedwig, and formed the Lithuanian-Polish Union, was crowned King of Poland, but not of Lithuania. He was forced to recognize his cousin, Vytautas (The Great) as the Grand Duke of Lithuania, leaving only an agreement of mutual assistance in case of war. Vytautas succeeded in diplomatically managing the Tartars while he turned all attention to the enemies in the West, the German Orders. He had difficulty inducing the Poles to join him, but they did after the Teutons attacked Poland.

On July 15, the famous Battle of Tannenberg was waged. Each army had massed more than 100,000 men. The German Order. after losing 40,000 men, retreated from the field. It was compelled to pay a heavy tribute, giving up a portion of its territory to the united Lithuanian-Polish kingdom. From that day its power was broken. After three hundred years of hostilities, the "pagans" had conque-






