Young Lithuanian-Amer-
ican, including several Chica-
goans, are among the hund-
red odd Lithuanian passengers
on the S. S. American Legion,
en route to New York from
Petsamo.

Though no verifying news
has been received, it is be-
lieved that among the pas-
sengers are Sally Aleksunas,
Victor Bender, Mike Ruzgus,
and other Chicago students
and athletes who were sent
to Lithuania two and more
years ago.

Casimir V. Baltramaitis of
Elizabeth, New Jersey, who
acted as JAUNIMAS' Kaunas
correspondent in Lithuania, is
also on the American Legion,
accompanied by his wife.
Through him the readers of
the JAUNIMAS will be able
to, learn exactly what has
transpired in Lithuania dur-
ing the last year and what
the reaction of the Lithuan-
ian people is to the absorp-
tion of Lithuania by the So-
viet Union.

Soviet officials made it dif-
ficult for Lithuanians and
other passengers from the
three newly sovietized states,
Lithuania, Latvia and Est-
onia, to reach the port of Pet-
samo to board the American
Legion, for fear that too many
eye-witness accounts
would be related to the peo-
ple of America upon their re-
turn there. As a result, the
sailing date of the American
Legion was postponed several
times.

Great Britain Does Not Like Russian Action In Baltic

Because Great Britain is
busy fighting one mighty en-
emy and cannot be distracted
from that job, it is probable
that dictator Stalin will be
able to get away with his lat-
est booty — the Baltic States,
according to William H. Stone-
man, London correspondent of
the Chicago Daily News.

Stoneman writes:

desire of the Baltic peoples
for incorporation with the So-
viet Union. There is equally
little inclination to believe
that Stalin engaged in such
an act of aggression just in
order to protect the Soviet
Union from the Germans."

out it, at least by Britain, and
London will probably have
to make a brave pretense of
overlooking it for the time
being."

Hillman Chosen To Draft Youth Train- ing Set Up

WASHINGTON, D. C. —
Sidney Hillman, Lithuanian
born president of the Amalgam-
ated Clothing Workers of
America and vice-president of
the C. I. O., was recently na-
med by President Roosevelt
to draft plans for the Presi-
dent's program to give com-
pulsory training for govern-
ment service to 2,000,000
young American men and wo-
men.

Hillman last year undertook
to build a social center for
young Lithuanian Jews in
Taurage, Lithuania. The struc-
ture will be known as "Hill-
mano Namai".

A Great Life, If You're Ready For Undertaker

Lithuanians writing from
Lithuania to their relatives
in the United States are

ved a letter from Kaunas the
other day, which wrote only
of personal matters and sim-
ply stated that "we have a
new government". His son,
who is a stamp collector, un-
vocered the real message the
writer wanted to convey.
Under the stamp which he
removed from the envelope
he found three words which
spoke a volume. They were:
"Hardships and Starvation."

"When you write to me,
send only a post-card instead
of a letter", wrote one mother
to her son, obviously intend-
ing to thus warn him of the
strict censorship of letters.

The red censors were com-
pletely fooled by a grim
Kaunas humorist who wrote:
"Everything is great here
now. We have a new govern-
ment and a new system. It's
just as though we were in
St. Casimir's in Chicago."
Now wait until the censors
discover St. Casimir's is a
cemetery at 111th and Craw-
ford in Chicago!

SU'CIDES, MURDERS BANISHMENTS, ADD TO THEIR HORROR

WASHINGTON, D. C. —
In protest against the deci-
sion of Lithuania to join the
Soviet Union, Col. Pranas Sa-
ladzius, the former chief of
the Lith home guard, has kil-
led himself and his son, and
thousands of other prominent
Lithuanians have been mur-
dered, jailed or sent to Mos-
cow in custody, according to
a diplomatic dispatch seen
here after it was sent past
the pro-Russian censorship
in Lithuania.

This dispatch, and a me-
morandum issued by the de-
fiant Lithuanian Minister, Po-
vilas Zadeikis, tell the story
of the strange steps leading
up to the death of Lithuania
as a sovereign republic, de-
scribing the force brought upon
the Lithuanians by the Rus-
sian secret police, Russian
Army and Russian political
agents to come to the deci-
sion that now has made Li-
thuania a Russian province.
The terror under way is
aimed at the elimination of
the most forceful anti-Russian
elements.

Minister Zadeikis has an-
nounced that he considers
himself the diplomatic repre-
sentative here of a free and
independent Lithuania. The
United States Government
supports him in that view.

Moscow Sent Ultimatum

Lithuania first felt the fa-
tal Russian pressure May 25,
the memorandum states, when
Russian Army officials ad-
vanced charges that Red sol-
diers stationed in Lithuania
in accordance with the Mutu-
al Assistance Pact of Octo-
ber 10, 1939, were being kid-
naped, killed and in other
ways mistreated by Lithuanians.
On June 14 Foreign Mi-
nister Urbsys of Lithuania re-
ceived a three-point ultima-
tum from Moscow, with nine
hours granted in which he
should make a satisfactory
reply. The ultimatum deman-
ded:

1. The prosecution of offi-
cials responsible for the al-
leged provocative acts against
the Red Army garrisons.
 2. The formation of a pro-
Soviet government.
 3. The admission into Lithu-
ania of an unlimited number
of Soviet troops.
- The government was inno-
cent of any provocative acts

against the Russian garrisons, the memorandum insists. Nevertheless, a pro-Soviet government headed by Justas Paleckis as Prime Minister was formed and on June 15 numerous Russian Army divisions crossed Lithuania's border at several points. The Paleckis government took command June 17. Two days earlier President H. E. Antanas Smetona departed from Lithuania without tendering his resignation and a special commissar from Moscow arrived by plane in Kaunas to supervise the formation of the new government.

Pro-Soviet Parliament Elected

The next step was the election of a pro-Soviet Seimas (parliament). The memorandum says on this point:

"The parliamentary elections of July 14 and 15 were guarded by devastating numbers of foreign troops, supervised by a special emissary from a foreign capital and managed exclusively by one party (the Communist party) with a single list of candidates, while other political parties that stand for the country's independence were barred from the polls.

"Elections were compulsory; those not voting were considered saboteurs and enemies of the people. Such elections, regardless of the officially announced high voting rate, were illegal in all respects as, under the above described circumstances, they not only cannot and do not represent the true will of the free people, but at the same time they aimed at the very heart of national existence by usurping the sovereignty rights of the free Lithuanian nation as defined in article 1 of the constitution of the republic of Lithuania.

This illegally elected body, the Seimas, on July 21, 1940, according to telegraphic dispatches from Kaunas, declared that from now on Lithuania

is a Soviet republic and requested membership in the union.

Overthrown By Veiled Aggression

"Thus with the creation of the Paleckis government with the Red Army present in all parts of Lithuania and new elections carried out to suit its purposes, the government of the Soviet Union, using the most modern methods of veiled aggression, accomplished its task—the destruction of the independence of the Lithuanian Republic at such a time when peaceful conditions prevailed and the development of friendly relations had a fair chance of success.

"This evil act was committed by Soviet strategem while the Lithuanian-Soviet Union non-aggression treaty was still in effect and the clause of non-intervention in internal affairs only eight months old."

Behind this official step toward Lithuania's death lay a force of terror which made easy the Russian elimination of this nation, as well as its neighbors of Latvia and Estonia, and gave Russia a long Baltic shore line. Some of this terrorism is disclosed in the secret diplomatic dispatch from Kaunas dated July 30, nine days after the Seimas vote to join the U. S. S. R.

Two thousand prominent persons have been seized in Kaunas alone, the dispatch states, among them 11 former ministers of state, many army officers, including generals, and a number of schoolteachers. Mr. Tomkus of the state controller's office committed suicide. The dispatch states: "People are being deported to the interior of Russia by the trainload."

It goes on: "Complete freedom is given to the Communist party units to rid their districts of any elements undesirable to them." The dispatch contains a long list of names of victims of

various indignities, saying:

"No one, especially the intellectuals, know what the morrow will bring. They hide in villages and in the forests. Tragic scenes are witnessed outside prisons, where families are not allowed to see or converse with those arrested. They are rudely dispersed by force."

The dispatch amplifies the Lithuanian Legation's memorandum on how the parliamentary elections were conducted.

"During the election campaigns," it said, "Soviet Russian instructors were sent to all the voting districts. Detachments of Soviet Russian troops were stationed at the polls. Votes were counted, but the desired voting percentage was announced in advance. Many did not vote or else turned in plain white cards."

Stunned by Union Demand

"The idea to join the Soviet Union was not known before or during the so-called elections, but it became known after the elections took place and in the form of a demand or ukase from Moscow. Members even of the Communist-picked Seimas were stunned by this idea. Several members of the Seimas who were frightened into voting returned to their homes weeping.

"After the adoption of the resolution to join the Soviet Union the singing of the Lithuanian hymn was forbidden. All merchandise is rapidly disappearing, and the little that remains in the stores is being sold with notations being made in passports. There is already a shortage of food supplies in the cities. Under the pretext of bringing food supplies from hiding places back into the markets mass searches are conducted throughout the homes.

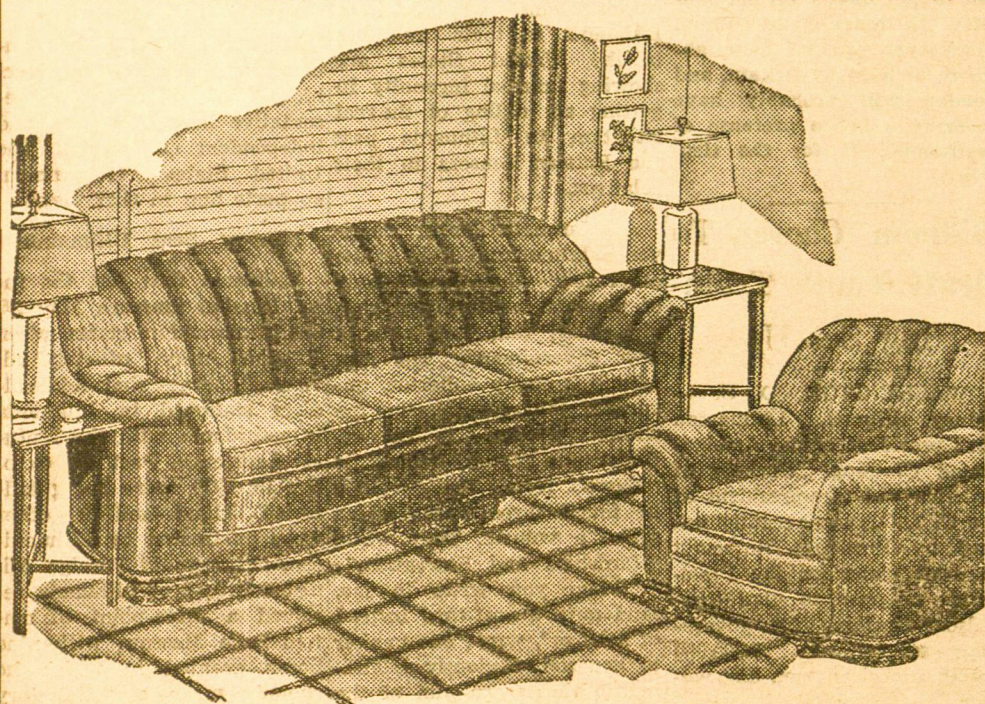

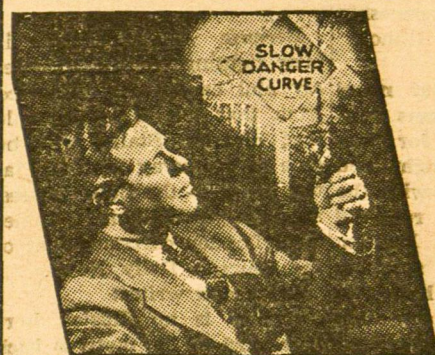

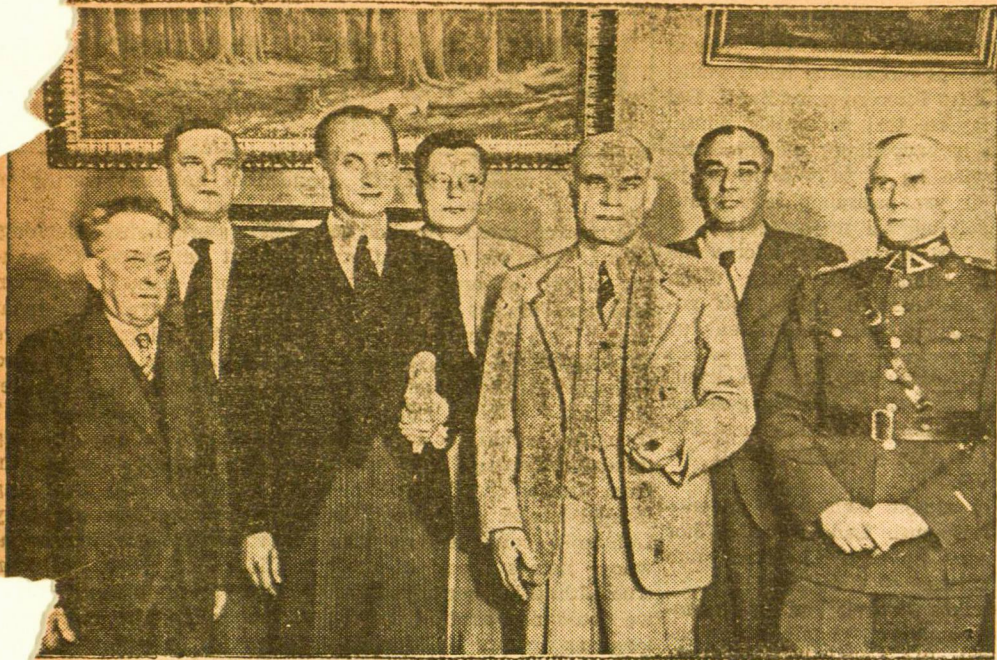

Galvanauskas, Lithuania's foremost financial expert, and Vitkauskas, popular military leader, were also members of the Merkys cabinet. They were

pressed into service to Moscow cabinet thru force in order to show the people of Lithuania that the new 'government' had the support of all 'true Lithuanians'. When the Reds succeeded in fortifying themselves to the extent that they felt the population can no longer do anything about the Russ aggression, Galvanauskas and Vitkauskas were unceremoniously dismissed.

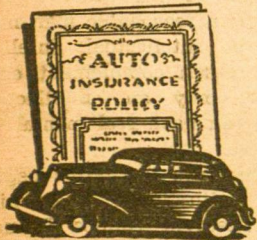

Bill Klimas, Chicago, was elected press director for a three year term, while Albin Manstavich was named to serve out a one year term left vacant by Rev. M. Urbonavicius, M. I. C., who left for Lithuania six month ago.

A total of 103 delegates attended the convention. Jo-

seph Bulevicius-Boley, well known commentator for the Paramount News Reels, was the permanent chairman. Pittsburgh, Pa. was awarded the next years conclave.

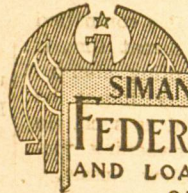

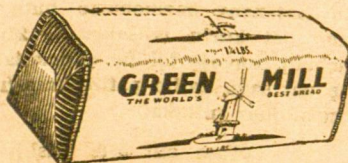

Burglary in the Baltic
(From the New York Times)

Under-Secretary of State Welles did not overstate the case when he spoke of the "predatory" manner in which Soviet Russia had absorbed the three small Baltic States of Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia. The spokesmen of the workers' paradise whose capital is Moscow are tireless in announcing their discovery of new and higher standards of international morality. Their methods remain the methods of the gunman.

How these methods worked in the case of Latvia was described in our columns by the Latvian Minister in Washington. On July 16 the U. S. S. R. (population 168,000,000) accused Latvia and Estonia (combined population 3,000,000) of forming a secret military alliance against it. The accusation was denied, but a Russian ultimatum followed. The terms it demanded were never ratified because Soviet troops marched at once into Latvia. A puppet Government was created. It proclaimed a new election. Only one list of candidates (pro-Soviet) was permitted to run. But all voters were compelled to go to the polls under the threat that if they failed to have the balloting stamp marked on their passports they might be considered saboteurs and treated as such. So the pro-Soviet ticket won a sweeping victory, in the best tradition of New Russia.

Atlikime Pareigą

Lietuviai seniai kentė žiurėdami į tuos savo kraujo žmones kurie vadinasi komunistais ir kurie pardavę savo tautybę ir garbę už sidabro šmotą pašvenčia savo energiją Rusijos labui.

Seniai jau mūsų žmonių judėta, kad tuos pardsidavėlius reikia kaip kokią aklą žarną išpiauti iš lietuviškojo kuno. Tik tiek komunistai ir reiškė — akloji žarna kuri yra supuvusi ir kuri jei apleista gali užnuodinti visą kuną.

Po Birželio penkioliktos įvykių Lietuvoje kurie aiškiai parodė jog komunistai yra ne kas kita kaip Maskvos šnipai—Kremliui pardsidavę penktieji kolumnistai, mūsų visuomenė paėmė aiškesnį ir ryškesnį nusistatymą jų atžvilgiu. Ką komunistai padarė Lietuvoje, jie gali labai lengvai padaryti ir Amerikoje. Praeitieji įvykiai parodė, kad komunistai nėra ištikimi tai šaliai kurioje jie gyvena ir minta. Jų ištikimybė priklauso diktatoriui kurs sėdi Rusijoje. Del to tai mūsų žmonės dabar imdamiesi šluotos komunistams kartu pasitarauja ir šiai šaliai. Plačios Maskvos samdytiniai kaip žiurkės prisiveisė visuose šalies kampuose ir tik laukia progos atlikti savo destruktivų darbą.

Jei mes turime kovoti su komunistais kurie yra Amerikoj gimę ir augę, tai mes turi-

me dvigubą pareigą saugoti šios šalies interesus nuo tų komunacių kurie yra ateiviai ir kurie neturi jokios moralinės teisės veikti šios garbingos šalies interesų pažeidimui. Del kelių tokių išdavikų turi nukentėti šimtai tukstančių gerų ir pavyzdinių ateivių kurie pilnai įvertina visa ką ši šalis jiems ir jų šeimoms teikia ir yra pasirengę save paaukauti, kad šią šalį apginti ir išsaugoti.

Gana žodžių! Mes komunistus toleravome užtektinai ilgai. Jiems buvo duota viena proga po kitos susiprasti ir arba tapti gerais šios šalies piliečiais arba traukti ten kur Stalinas ir kompanija gyvena, kad galėtų raudonajam rojui džiaugtis. Bet ten kraustytis jie nenori. Bijo. Žino, kad čia geresnis gyvenimas. Vienok nenori tapti gerais šios šalies piliečiais ir visą energiją aukoti tik šio krašto gerovei.

Laikas pradėti akcija! Laikas tą pagedusią aklą žarną išpiauti. Laikas padėti šios šalies autoritetams apvalyti kraštą nuo penktųjų kolumnistų.

Jaunieji Amerikos lietuviai su mielu noru stoja savo vyresniems į pagalbą. Mes padėsime jiems kiek tik išgalėsime, tuo pačiu uoliai darbuodamiesi paties jaunimo tarpe. Nėra jokia paslaptis, kad komunistai įvairiais obalsiais ir nekaltais vardais prisidengę ejo į jaunųjų lietuvių eiles ir nevieną jų nesužiniau į savo narių sąrašus įtraukė. Musų visų pareiga tokius jaunuolius informuoti, su pažindinti juos su koku savo kraštui išdavikišku darbu jie yra surišti ir gražinti juos į padorių žmonių eiles.

Kovojant su tais pardsidavėliais mums nereikia vartoti kokių tai nešvarių priemonių kuriomis ardytume jų organizacijas, silpnintume jų spaudą, atimtume biznierių ir pramoninkų paramą komunistų organizacijoms ir spaudai. Mums nešvarių priemonių nereikia. Užtenka, kad mes su pažindinsime žmones su kuo jie iki šiol reikalą turėję, koki išdavikišką darbą jie rėmė, ir tie kurie yra ištikimi sau ir nori būti ištikimi šiai šaliai su dėkingumu pasišalins iš penktosios kolumnos.

Mes kviečiame ir musų skaitytojus bei visus Amerikos lietuvius stoti talkon. Stokite darban. Atlikime savo pareigą!

Petras Cvirka, jaunesnės kartos rašytojas, i Sovietų pusę palinkęs nuo to laiko kaip tie išvertė vieną jo knygų rusų kalbon ir už tai davė gerą sumą červoncu (kurie kitur pasauly beverčiai ir del to autorius turėjo vykti Rusijon praleisti), dabar patapęs artimu "Lietuvos Aido" bendradarbiu, rašo apie raudonosios armijos galybę ir 'su kokia pagarpa ir meile lietuvių tauta sutinka' ją.

Apie tą pagarbą ir meilę sutikimą "šiandien galima būtų užregistruoti šimtus ir tukstančius faktų", Cvirka rašo. Bet visam straipsny išdrįsta paduoti vieną 'faktą'. Jis yra ve kokis:

"Teko matyti, kaip vienas senelis ilgai stebėjęs Raudonosios Armijos dalinių žygiavimą, puikų karių apginklavimą, aprangą, jų dėjimo tvarką, pakraipęs galvą, atsidesęs, tarė:—'Neišlaikytų niekas prieš šitokią svieto galybę.'"

Tai kur jau čia ta pagarpa ir meilė? Senukas pamatęs, kad jo šalį apniko militariška jėga mažiausiai dvidešimt penkis kartus didesnė už Lietuvos žnoj, kad prieš tą galybę lietuvis turi rezignuoti ir pasiduoti be tikrosios savo valios pareiškimo—pasipriešinimo. Jis taip ir pasakė..

TRIMITAS, Lietuvos Šaulių Laikraštis, (dabar jau irgi uždarytas), numery kuris išėjo po Maskvos įvykdyto perversmo, įžanginiu straipsniu ragina "Į darbą su vyriausybe". Kito to žurnalo vietoj telpa Šaulių Sąjungos vado toks parėdymas: "ISAKAU:—Imti visų galimų priemonių, kad Sovietų Sąjungos kariuomenė būtų apsaugota nuo bet kurių išsišokimų". Žinoma, kad nebutų saugoję tai tie okupantai būtų gavę ant savo kailio patirt kaip 'mielai' lietuviai juos sutinka.

Our Mother Tongue

By VYTAUTAS SIRVYDAS

PHILOSOPHICAL TERMS

Philosophical terms always stump the common man. They are always a stumbling block to languages which never had them before because the people using these languages were kept culturally backward by alien political forces. One of these languages is the Lithuanian. The Lithuanians for centuries fought bitterly for their free national existence. They did not have the leisure to develop their talents for science, philosophy, and the arts. On attaining their freedom in 1918 which, alas, has been choked off again, they had to develop quite an array of technical, scientific and philosophical terms to use in books, schools, and periodicals.

The Terminology Section of the Lietuvių Kalbos Society worked hard for several years to develop a Lithuanian set of philosophical terms. They were published in Gimtoji Kalba and Logos. We give a sample here to show some of the results of the Section's work.

akivaizdus—evident; akivaizdžios tiesos žmonės dažnai nemėgsta—people often do not like evident truth.

antgamtinis — supernatural; antgamtinė priežastis negali būti įrodyta gamtinėmis priemonėmis—a supernatural cause cannot be proven by natural means.

antsąmonė — the superconsciousness; genijas iš sąsąmonės per sąsąmonę pakyla į ant-sąsąmonę — a genius rises from subconsciousness through consciousness into superconsciousness.

antžmogis — a superman; Nietzsche's supratimu antžmogis yra aukštesnė žmonių rūšis—according to Nietzsche a superman is a higher species of mankind.

apykanta — tolerance; kulturingas žmogus kitiems visados turi apykantos—a cultured man always has tolerance toward others.

antgamus — reproductive; (from "gaminti"—to produce), atsietas — abstract; atsietas —to abstract; atsaja—an abstraction; žmogaus protas minties objektą atsieja nuo jauslėmis patiriamą dalyko—the mind of man abstracts the object of its thought from the thing experienced by feelings; atsaja yra kiekviena mintis, atsietas nuo savo patirtinio pagrindo—an abstraction is any thought which is abstracted from its basis in experience.

atžanga — regression (the opposite of pažanga—progress). atžvalgus — retrospective; atžvalga — retrospection; atžvalgumas yra būdinga išminčių valstybės vyrų savybė—retrospection is a characteristic trait of wise statesmen.

aumuo — intellect; aumuo ir protas yra du tos pačios žmogaus galios atvaizdai (aspects); protingas žmogus ne visados yra ir aumeningas; aumeningumas vienas antrą papilddo; tik aumeningas žmogus turi tikros protinės iniciatyvos—intellect and reason are two aspects of the same human power; a reasonable man may not be intellectual; intellect and reason complement each other; only an intellectual man can have real mental initiative.

These are the terms beginning with letter "a" which the Lietuvių Kalbos Draugijos Section of Terminology has evolved to deal with philosophical concepts. How do you like them?

"Abiejų valstybių santykių istorijoje geros valios niekuomet netruko ir dar svarbiau, kad buvo ir yra laikomasi sutarčių. Kitą dieną, mūsų kariuomenei į Vilnių įžengus, esu rašęs, kad Europos istorijoje bus žinomi du priešingų sąvokų miestai: Suvalkai ir Maskva. Pirmasis, kaipp smurto simbolis, antrasis—teisėtumo. Šitaip rašydamas neprasilenkiau su tiesa. Giliai tikime, kad ir toliau apibudintų miestų simboliai nepasikeis."

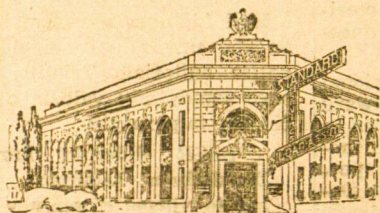
RADIO TANTRUMS

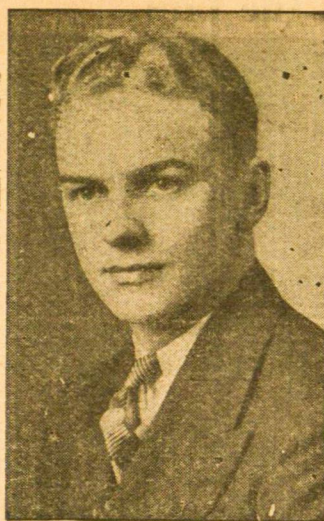

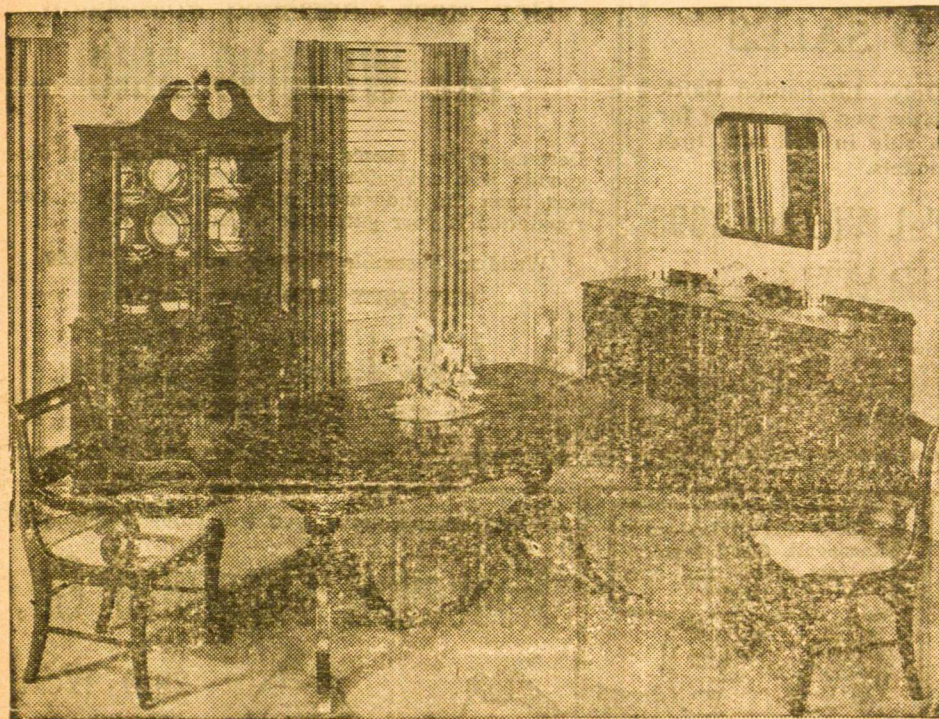

France's Collapse Given As Reason For Red Seizures

(This uncensored dispatch dealing with events in the Soviet Union, transmitted from Tokio, clearly shows the reason why the Reds seized Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. In spite of the much heralded alibi by the communist press that Joseph Stalin intervened only to bring about a better order for the working man, this dispatch reveals that the Red dictator was not concerned with the welfare of the Baltic nations. The move was purely selfish.)

TOKIO, July 12 — Soviet Russia is on the move. She is mustering every ounce of her vast resources from Siberia to the Baltic to bring her military power to maximum strength in the next few months.

The move into the Baltic states was a reflex of Russia's surprise and shock at the quick collapse of France and fears that the war might suddenly end. The French defeat was not expected by the average Russian or—from the few hints that have filtered out—by the Soviet rulers.

The Baltic move also may have been intended to forestall Germany. For a month before the Soviets acted German sources in Stockholm had circulated anti-Russian propaganda. Reports were current that Germany might offer a military alliance to Sweden, Finland and the Baltic states in case of a Soviet ultimatum.

The Russians with whom I spoke indicated plainly that they regarded the moves into the Baltic and Romania as insurance against German attack and designed to strengthen the Soviets sufficiently so that Germany will not be tempted to move against her.

Nazis Have to Order Lith Envoy Out of Berlin

BERLIN — Col. Kazys Škirpa surrendered the Lithuanian embassy in Berlin to Russia only after receiving orders from nazi officials to do so. The Estonian and Latvian ambassadors to Berlin surrendered their embassies and official records to soviet representatives as soon as they were requested to do so by the latter, but Škirpa refused. Soviet officials appealed to the nazi government and, af-

ter the nazis compiled with the request and ordered Škirpa to leave, he tearfully surrendered.

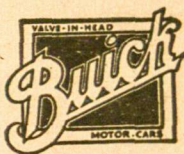
His resistance of several weeks have put him in a bad light and, it is expected, the penalty of death awaits him should he return to his native country.

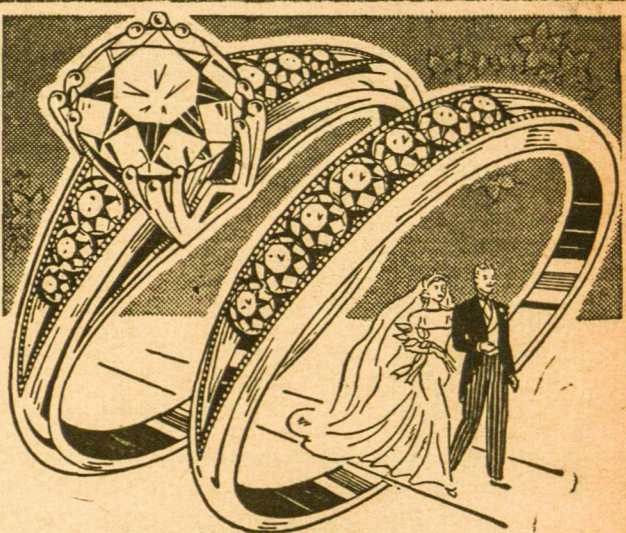
