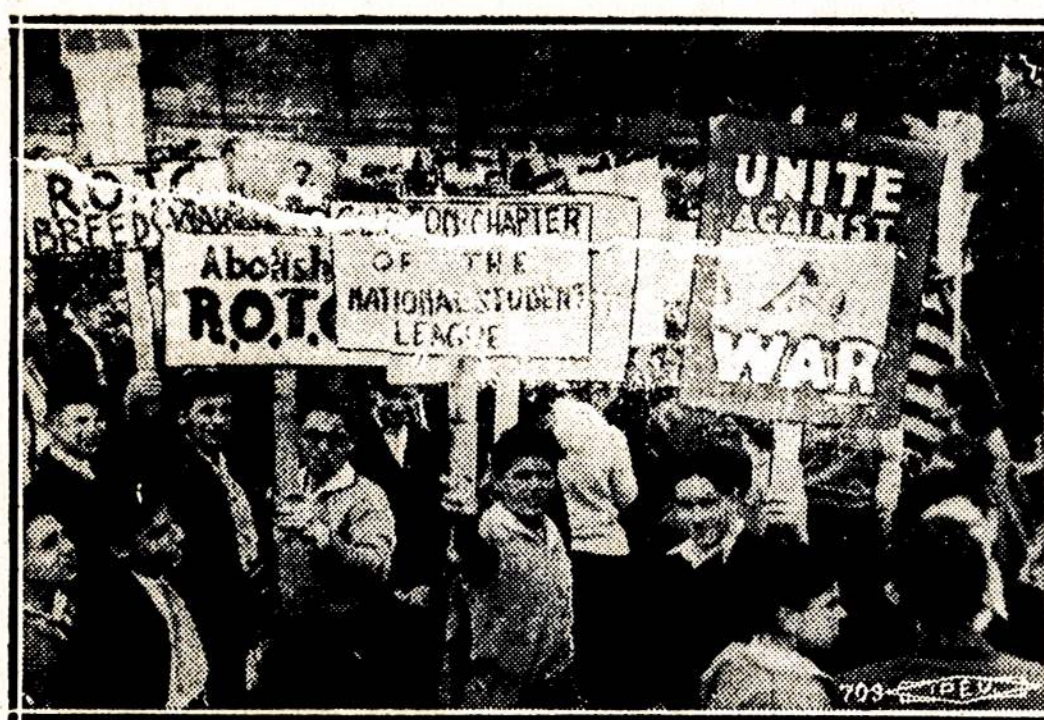

## Young Communist League National Convention in New York, June 22nd

District conventions of the Young Communist League in nineteen districts of the country are being held in preparation for the coming Seventh Convention of the Young Communist League. Immediately following the various district conventions delegates elected by steel workers, coal miners, textile workers, auto-workers, unemployed youth and young farmers and students will begin to leave by car, truck, and bus for New York.

It is expected that a total of approximately 200 delegates representing over 6,000 members of the YCL will be present to discuss the experiences of the YCL and to hammer out a collective policy on all questions of the class struggle affecting the youth. The work among the mass organizations, the leadership and guidance of the YCL has given to striking youth, our struggle against war and fascism, all these will be reviewed at the convention.

During the past three years the membership of the YCL has increased from three thousand to six thousand. The YCL has several marked achievements to record. Our

participation in strike struggles has succeeded in gaining better conditions for thousands of young and adult workers. The YCL led actions of international solidarity with the youth of Cuba, for the Freedom of Dimitroff, Torgler and Thaelmann. Through the splendid work of the YCL, particularly in New York, the huge United National Youth Day Demonstrations were held. All these achievements and many others prove that the YCL is beginning to lead the youth in a struggle against the boss class and for a Soviet America.

The opening of the National Convention will be staged at the huge St. Nicholas Arena, at 66th St. and Amsterdam Ave., Friday, June 22, where a mass meeting will greet the incoming delegates. The main speakers at the opening mass meeting will be Earl Browder, general Secretary of the Communist Party; Gil Green, national Secretary of the YCL, Ben Gold of the Needle Trades Workers Industrial Union.

Besides speeches, there will be performances by the IWO Symphony Orchestra, Ukrainian Folk Dances, a United Youth Chorus, and a sport exhibition. Admission will be twenty-five cents.

## Ernst Thaelmann, Fighter for Youth

(A Short Biography of Ernst Thaelmann)

Ernst Thaelmann, heroic imprisoned leader of the German Communist Party was born on April 16, 1886 in Hamburg. At the age of 16, he became a member of the Social Democratic Party organization in Hamburg. In February, 1904, he became a member of the German Transport Workers' Union, from which he was expelled in 1931 for revolutionary activity. As a harbor worker, as a seaman, and later as a transport worker, Ernst Thaelmann devoted all his force and energy to the revolutionary Labor movement in the struggle for Socialism.

After completing his military service, Ernst Thaelmann rose rapidly in the labor movement. He became a member of the local council of the Transport Workers' Union in Hamburg; later, a delegate of the local council of the Free Trade Unions. In addition, he rose from chief branch leader of the laundry drivers to member of the branch committee of all divers, to branch leader of the dockers. During this time, he was active as a delegate of the local committee.

### Founder of Youth Sections

Ernst Thaelmann is one of the founders of the Trade Union Youth Section in Hamburg. Despite the resistance of the reformist bureaucracy in the free trade unions, he was successful in organizing the youth for their special demands in the union. He and his circle of revolutionary youth were at the general meetings of the Transport Workers' Union in Hamburg for youth demands. The reformist bureaucrats resorted to violence to repress the rising revolutionary struggles of the young workers.

Ernst Thaelmann came out boldly for equal rights for young workers in the trade unions. In his speech at the Eighth Congress of the Transport Workers' Union in Breslau, 1912, arguing against a proposed resolution which would have limited the powers of the youth in the union, he said:

"We now have Youth Sections in Berlin and Hamburg. This field also still has to be cultivated. In our trade the younger people are left to themselves even more than in the skilled trades. That is why more has to be done for the youth. I consider it very incorrect that the young workers should have less to say than the adults, despite the increased dues, and ask that this passage should be rejected."

**Led Bolshevik Struggle Against War**  
At the outbreak of the war, he already had a clear understanding of the Bolshevik program of struggle against imperialist war and bourgeois dictatorship.

During the war, Ernst Thaelmann did not for a moment forget his duties and obligations as a revolutionary worker. He carried on untiring illegal propaganda against the imperialist war. At the front he distributed illegal pamphlets and papers against the war, such as, for example, the "Bremer Burgzeitung."

**Won Masses for Communist Party**  
Ernst Thaelmann became a member of the USDP, (Independent Socialist Party of Germany) at its foundation, although from the beginning he was disgusted with the leaders' policy of compromise. He set himself the task, and fulfilled it, of bringing the masses of workers in the USDP, in Hamburg over to the Communist Party.

This was the first great test of his Bolshevik energy and political courage. After the Party Congress in Halle in 1920, more than 90 per cent of the membership of the USDP, in Hamburg-Wasserkante district went over with Thaelmann to the Communist Party.

During the actual revolutionary period of 1918-19, he was at the head of the elements that were pressing forward and took a leading part

in all the activities which aimed at providing the revolutionary working class with arms.

In the years that followed he was always chairman of the Communist Party organization in Hamburg. At the same time, he was a member of the district Committee of Wasserkante and was in the forefront of all the economic and political struggles of the workers in Hamburg. In 1919 the workers of Hamburg elected him to the Lower House, of which he remained a member from then on.

With increasing determination and clarity, he carried on the struggle against all those who were hindering the Party in carrying on a real Bolshevik mass policy. He waged a struggle against the opportunist policy of the then Central Committee of the C. P. of Germany and against the district chairman of the Hamburg-Wasserkante Party organization.



In the summer of 1923, when the resistance of the masses was breaking out into open actions against the government, as leader of the Hamburg Transport Organization, he was fully aware of the great strategic importance of the Hamburg proletariat in the impending German revolution. The heroic struggle of the workers in Hamburg in October, 1923, shows the great inner force and strength of their organization. But the workers of Hamburg, with Thaelmann at their head had to retreat, because the incorrect strategy of the party leadership made victory impossible.

The Party, which was forced underground, turbulently demanded the replacement of the opportunist Party leadership. From this moment, Ernst Thaelmann has stood at the head of the German Communist Party.

In his struggles against anti-Leninist tendencies, he more and more won over the support of the overwhelming majority of the Party membership. Under his leadership, the Party progressed from year to year. He prominently cooperated in the leadership of the Communist International, and since the Fifth World Congress there has not been an international session of the Comintern, at which Ernst Thaelmann did not deal with the question of the class struggle in Germany and the problems of the international workers' movement, either as a reporter, or as one of the discussion speakers.

From his earliest political activity onwards, Ernst Thaelmann has voiced the interests of the majority of the masses. His strength lies in his direct deep connection and understanding of the life of the workers. He is the flesh and blood of the workers.

### Braved Fascists in Their Den

After Hitler came to power in Germany, after the development of the most bestial terror against the workingclass, Ernst Thaelmann remained among the working class and led the struggle of the Communist Party with a direct and clear revolutionary policy. Unfortunately, the fascist bands succeeded in throwing the brave leader of the German workers and of the German Commu-

## Artificial Rain Produced in Soviet Union

Artificial rain has been successfully obtained in Turkmenia where there is no rainfall for 250 days in the year. Details of the solution of this important scientific and economic problem are supplied by the director of the Artificial Rain Institute, Fedoseev, who supervised the experiments.

The experiments were carried out near Ashkhabad in Turkmenia. With the aid of chemical apparatus, the workers of the Artificial Rain Institute produced a cloud on a clear and cloudless morning, the cloud subsequently being precipitated in the form of rain.

### An Important Problem

The problem of obtaining rain is immense importance for the Soviet Union. One of the largest grain areas of the USSR, the Volga District, regularly suffers from drought. Rain is also of the greatest importance for the desert areas in Central Asia, Kazakhstan and other regions.

A special Artificial Rain Institute for the solution of this important problem was organized in Moscow some time ago, with numerous branches in Central Asia, Transcaucasia, the Crimea, Leningrad and other places. In the main, the work of the Institute and its branches are proceeding along two lines: to subject the air to a powerful charge of electrical energy or to influence it by chemical means.

## MR. PETER SKUKAS PRESENTS NO SOLUTION

The "Dirva," a Lithuanian weekly published in Cleveland has been an ardent supporter, not only of the bloody regime of Smetona's fascism, but also of Mussolini, Hitler, et cetera, in the many articles which it has presented for its readers and expected them to swallow—hook, line and sinker.

This paper also has an English section on the last page from time to time containing something or other quite reactionary, although covered by "liberal" phrases of the English section's editor, a student, most likely, who in the May 25 edition tries to solve the "student problem."

After a lengthy discourse on "prophecies" and what is a poor graduate to do, nowadays, ends up with,

"A few of them (graduates) will follow the easy path and even aid and abet the henchmen. (Whose henchmen?—Editor). Our only future hope lies with those that will give way to present ease for a few solid, fundamental principles. There is no telling, only time alone will tell."

Being a learned scholar, Pete, why don't you suggest something. It seems to us that you have had a touch of social fascist theory and probably have read some of their printed material. "There is no hope!" There is no hope! they all yell and scream. Then they hide their faces in a pile of sand like an ostrich, and say, "Come what may, we will have to grin and bear it."

There is an ever increasing group, of both students and graduates who

are beginning to see their way thru'.

Of course, they do not consider themselves "above the common herd." They are uniting with the workers, unemployed, with Unemployment Councils, those working, with the revolutionary movement. The "Dirva" as well as its editor speaks of certain changes which must be made, but offers nothing definite. The next issue will come out with a story of how much good Smetona and Hitler and Mussolini are doing for the people.

There are over a million young people who have come out of high schools and colleges expectantly, and never saw a job yet. Their education is worthless to them. They cannot earn a living. This is the highly civilized USA for you.

Let us take the other side of the picture. There is the Soviet Union, where the workers and students and soldiers and peasants and all other oppressed people took things into their own hands. They fixed things to suit themselves. They cannot teach the students there fast enough. New schools, new factories, new system, everything for the benefit of the people.

There is no unemployment. Industry is rapidly rising, wages are being continuously increased. At the same time, in every single capitalist country in the world, there is misery, starvation, murder, fascism and terror unleashed against the working class which is beginning to see that things are not working out so that everyone would have a square meal at eating time and be safe from being searched and lynched by a mob of misled blood thirsty people.

The terror against Negro people, with lynchings and discrimination galore is a one form of fascist terror in USA. Terror, guns, poison gases and bayonets, not to speak of clubs and tear gas are being unleashed against the workers here who demand bread. Our solution is a new system of society which can only come about in the same manner as it did in the Soviet Union. The establishment of a workers and farmers government here. A Soviet America. Yes, that is our solution. What do you think of it, Pete?



## BOOK REVIEW

## LENIN

Lenin, by Ralph Fox is a biography of a successful revolutionary leader of the masses. Before Lenin's time, there were many men who agitated for a new society, that is, socialism. That was as far as they got. Either they lacked faith in the masses, fortitude in their convictions, or else were too ambitious to spend a life time in what they considered a hopeless cause, and instead, joined the ranks of the party which they believed would prove more profitable to them in the end. Then there was a second group of men which although neither fickle nor yet faithless got no farther in the end than the first. These were those who believed or expected to attain their cause against the capitalistic state by struggling alone. The former were Lenin's bitter enemies, with the later Lenin heartily disagreed. For him a revolution in order to be victorious must be carried on by the masses. With this objective in mind, he took stock of the significant changes going on in the capitalistic world which marked its decline and made preparations for a new state form, the Soviet Power. So in reading the political revolutionary life of Lenin, we do not see him against a background in which many other intellectuals are holding similar views, but as one who stands alone, struggling for a society which some have dared to dream about but none had the vision, courage, and determination to fight for its realization.

The beginning of Lenin's stormy revolutionary life was almost precipitous. He had scarcely put away his skates and his chessboard when he received news that his beloved brother Sasha was implicated in the conspiracy to kill the Tsar of Russia. Such a charge if found guilty meant certain death. Sasha, with the rest of the intellectuals of his group was hanged. The unhappy end of Sasha was a lesson in revolutionary tactics to Lenin. It was a lesson which separated him from the intellectual revolutionists. From now on there was not going to be a struggle of a few individuals for the emancipation of mankind, but a struggle of one class against another. This emancipation was not limited to Russia alone but took in the workers of the entire world. Lenin aimed to make the working class conscious and to lead them to a classless society. To inculcate such ideas, Lenin devoted his entire life.

In St. Petersburg, he began his career as a professional revolutionist. In the working class he placed at once his confidence, realizing that through its success the problems of the peasants would be solved. In St. Petersburg, travelling like a "Volga boatman" he started organization. He questioned factory workers, questioned one factory worker until he wiped the sweat from his forehead and said smilingly, "I would rather work overtime than answer your questions." Lenin worked diligently and secretly, but the reputation of his brother made him a conspicuous figure in the eyes of the police and before long he was seized, imprisoned and then sent into exile to Siberia. A little too late, for already he had sown the seeds of the revolution in his pamphlet "What are the Friends of the Working Class, the first Marxist work written inside of Russia."

After Lenin had served his period in exile, a period given up to keeping in touch with the outside world, in detailed study in economics, philosophy, and science he entered immediately into active revolutionary work with the organization of a new paper the "Spark." Now we see Lenin emerge as a dynamic force, the plan of the revolution forged in

## Enthusiastic NYD in Worcester

WORCESTER, Mass. — Enthusiasm ran high among marchers and sympathizers at the turnout of several thousand people for the first National Youth Day ever held in Worcester. In spite of the city's refusals to grant permits for parading or speaking, on the dubious grounds that such a militant move against war might "raise the dead," and in spite of open threats to break up any demonstration, the youth of Worcester and neighboring towns met at the Workers' Center and marched into Kelly Square, singing. There the brutal fist of fascism which lurks behind the mask of democracy was revealed to these young workers, when they were greeted by four car-loads of police and machine guns. The youth were determined not to give these so-called "protectors of liberty" a chance to attack, so they marched on through the square and drew the entire crowd with them, back to the Workers' Center. After the marchers and some of the followers had entered the Center to hold a mass meeting, the police proceeded to show the rest of the following masses just how much "liberty" they had, by breaking up the crowd and not allowing anyone to approach within even 100 yards of the Center.

The mass meeting at the Workers' Center was followed by a banquet, program, swimming and dancing on Lake Quinsigamond. The youth committee and out-of-town delegates got together to make plans for a permanent organization. Much deserved praise was given to all the young workers who, by taking part

in the parade, showed their courage, and their clear analysis of this fascist "democracy" of ours. Most of the organizations represented on the youth committee had full delegations in the parade. Credit was especially to be given to the American Workers' Chorus, which led in both the marching and the singing. The Clark University chapter of the National Student League was also recognized for the great deal of work it accomplished. However, the committee was forced to call attention to the inexcusable laxity of the Worcester Aids' Chorus, and the utter blindness of its members to the dangers of war and fascism which each one of them will have to face in the near future. A few members, who were elected to work at the banquet, carried through their parts very well; but one of the delegates attended no meetings.

The youth committee has decided to hold an organizational meeting in the middle of July, and it calls upon the youth everywhere to unite against war, and to put up an invincible fight against the ever tightening bonds of fascist repression.

The subject of the lecture was "The Life of Ernst Thaelmann." The speaker stated that the German Communist Party is very active and although it has to work underground and amid great dangers, it has a dues paying membership of 100,000 members. Besides, it has thousands of members yet in prisons awaiting trials. He pointed out the urgency of organizing "Save Ernst Thaelmann" campaigns, for it is most vital for the moral spirit of the German comrades that their leader be freed. Ernst Thaelmann was the organizer of the famous "Rot Front" (strong-arm defense of the workers). Write or telephone your protest to the German Consulate of New York City. Procure Ernst Thaelmann cards and mail them to Germany. Help to save this courageous fighter and leader of the German working-class.

Do you know that the Workers' Music League has dedicated its "Workers Songbook, 1934" to you? Here it is, straight from the Foreword of the songbook itself:

"Workers! Comrades! To you who sing and to you who hear these songs we dedicate this our first volume. We, and others who will join us in this great enterprise, will do ever better and better work. But we shall not do it without your criticism."

We hear in mind and we ask you always to remember this: the composer is the hand that writes; the audience sings and decides what shall be sung. A great audience calls forth great song. You are a great audience—the greatest that has ever been. As your call becomes clearer, stronger and more persistent his united mass action, great songs will come forth—the greatest that have ever been. Individual men write them down, but YOU will make them!"

The Workers Songbook contains a collection of original revolutionary mass, choral and solo songs, composed by members of the Composers' Collective of the Pierre Degeyter Club of New York City, and affiliate of the Workers' Music League. There are fourteen songs in all, and the price of the songbook is twenty-five cents.

## Educational Department Report to Second National Lithuanian Youth Convention

The problem of education and training for leadership is one of the most important tasks of our Lithuanian youth mass organizations, particularly, for the inexperienced youth of a new organization, is such training and development vitally needed. The significance and increasing necessity of sharp struggles and the rapid organization of adult and youth groups to maintain and better the present standards of living must be brought before the mass of our Lithuanian youth.

The present deep crisis with its millions of unemployed, dependent, homeless, and starving, should prove to the youth the utter disregard of capital for human lives, should prove to the youth the unfitness of this system of labor exploitation for profit. The sharp lowering of the living standards of all workers has forced the American working class into bitter clashes with the lords of industry. The worsening of labor conditions through merciless speedup, the terrific indirect wage slashes through the stretch out and stagger systems on top of large direct cuts has led the workers to defend their right to live by means of bloody strikes.

The workers who hailed the NRA as a "new deal" for the "forgotten man" are now deeply disillusioned. They see it as a regimentation of the workers, a strike breaking weapon, a means of bringing down the wage level of the skilled worker close to the level of the poorest paid section. On every hand, the struggles of the workers are met with force, police terror, gas attacks, and machine guns. Our Lithuanian youth, too, must learn the lesson that the only way we can gain anything is through organization and struggle. We, together with the rest of the American youth, have been and shall be even more involved in these struggles. The increasing militarization of the workers doubly affects us, the youth. The youth are herded into the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) Camps where, for \$1 a day (of which they only get 40 cents), they drill, work like horses, and get rotten food. The students receive their military training through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC). The unemployed, destitute, and hungry, abandon hope, or urged by false promises and rosy pictures are forced into the army, navy, and marines, or else wander aimlessly through the country until they starve, are killed or jailed. The youth, being unskilled, work for the lowest wages under the poorest conditions. Their militancy leads them to face the facts, that nothing but struggle can win for them their bread, their right to live. They organize into clubs, sports, social, anti-war, shop groups, youth branches, art groups, and into the political organizations of the young worker, the Young Communist League.

The growing demand of the young workers for organization has led many of them to join our LDS. We have the obligation of welcoming hundreds of young workers and students to our membership. Many of them are new to organization. The task of training new forces for leadership and developing political consciousness in our members is of tremendous importance.

### Our Educational Work

We have made many attempts. We have also made mistakes. The leadership offered by the educational committee of the NLYC to our youth branches and choruses was well directed but not persistent and systematic. When the youth branches and choruses fell down on the job, we gave up too easily. The youth branches and choruses did not criticize nor prod us along when we were

slow. Much more could have been accomplished. Let us learn from our mistakes. Too few outlines for discussions were sent out. Too little insistence on literature sale was made. Our youth branches and districts did not concentrate on educational activities. They elected committees and then forgot about them. This, too, must be remedied.

In our campaign against war and fascism, our youth branches have taken an active part. They have sent delegates to the anti-war congress, and anti-war meetings. They participated in the National Youth Day demonstrations and meetings. They were part of local anti-war meetings and parades. They arranged meetings for Comrade Strauss, our delegate from the Paris Youth Congress Against War and Fascism. His message was brought to the Lithuanian Youth. But even in this, not all youth branches and choruses took an active part. Some relied too much on the help of the adults.

Our youth sections have carried on the struggle against war and fascism. But that is not enough! The fight against war and fascism is one in which every young worker in our mass organizations should not only actively involve himself, but organize his school, shop or neighborhood to fight the war preparations and fascist tendencies and developments.

The first big and successful attempt of the NLYC to train and develop leadership and develop politically was the establishment of the five youth training schools held after the convention last summer. Most of these were successful as measured by the organizational results and subsequent activity of the students. Five such schools were held; one in Brooklyn, Detroit, Conn., Chicago, and Massachusetts. All five schools were well attended. The curriculum of the Conn. school was not adapted to members of our organization. This must be remedied this summer. A tentative program for our youth training schools has been published in our youth section. This shows us how these training schools ought to be organized. In sending students to the school, only the best elements are to be sent, those who have shown by their activity that they will make good leaders.

A serious attempt to begin a literature sale and distribution system was made soon after the convention. Various pamphlets have been sent to the youth branches and choruses with instructions on how to use them for sale and distribution and for the having of discussions on their content. The pamphlets were on war and fascism, NRA, the homeless boys, the CCC camps, May Day, and the Soviet Union. The results were not encouraging. Few choruses and youth branches utilized these pamphlets fully. Unless the branches and choruses wake up and elect alert, wide awake literature agents or committees to distribute and sell pamphlets, and make serious attempts to hold discussions on the topics covered among members and the outside youth, our membership will not develop, our influence among the outside youth will not grow, and we will not develop politically.

We sent out several outlines, one on the LDS, program of activity, sports outlines and sent suggestions for discussions. The delegates of this conference should report to what extent these educational activities were carried out, what literature sold, what discussions held. Certainly our youth section and mail from branches and districts carried little reflection of such educational progress if they were held.

Our districts made elaborate plans for lectures, discussions, and literature sales. Their success or failure has not been discussed in letters to the educational committee. Some letters for advice were answered

with recommendations, but no answer as to the results of these suggestions sent were received. Comrades, there's only one way in which to overcome our inexperience, one way to train for leadership, that is by systematic study, and discussions and activity.

In the field of art, the educational committee has succeeded in establishing an art column conducted by Comrade Shelley in our column, its popularity, possibilities for improvement, etc. It is a valuable weapon. The educational committee has on file a score of proletarian English and Lithuanian plays, for the use of the youth branches and choruses. Attempts made by the educational committee to get plays from groups using them, as the NIRA of the Chicago branch, failed. This is a mistake. If we have anything good in the way of plays or music, etc., it should be shared. Send it to the Educational Committee in the center and make it available for all branches.

The most successful part of our educational work was the result of our "Young Worker Drive." The importance of getting our members and the outside youth to read the "Young Worker," the only paper of the working class youth can't be

stressed too much. The continual following of the struggles of the young workers, studying their problems, and support of the "Young Worker" is good education for our youth. In this campaign we showed what we can do, if we try. The LDS and chorus members were enthused, and under friendly competition easily reached and surpassed the set quota of 200 subs hitting the high mark of 500. Such energy and work must be carried down along the line in our literature sale, the information of discussions and study circles. Our schools this year should be larger and better organized with even better results.

At the recent conference of the AIDLD, District in the territory, comrades from the floor demanded that the youth question be placed on the agenda and it was discussed. Pas vilniečius yra geras įprotis pardavinėti literatūrą, užrašinėti laikraščius. Mūsų darbuotojai, pardavinėdami literatūrą, padaro milžiniškos naudos darbininkų judėjimui, nemažai įtraukia darbininkų į mūsų organizacijas ir sykiu juos pažįdina su klasiniu supratimu.

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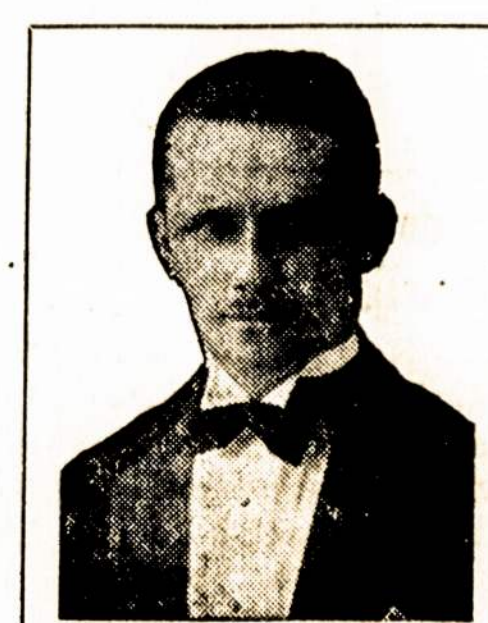

Kalbėjo dd. Margaret Underdzenė (Cowl) ir Bertha Fulton (Paltanavičiūtė). Pirmoji kalbėjo lietuviškai, antroji—angliškai. Abi gerai nušvietė karo ir fašizmo pavojų. Jos nurodė, kad į kovą prieš karą ir fašizmą būtina turime įtraukti moteris ir jaunimą, kad be moterų ir jaunimo organizuotumo ir supratimo keino naudai rengiamas imperalistinis karas ir mokėjimo organizuotai prieš jį kovoti—mes negalėsime sėkmingai pasipriešinti karui. Jei moteris ir jaunimas nebus įtraukti į prieškarinę-priešfašistinę kovą—karas ir fašizmas gali įvykti. Dėlto mes turime įtraukti moteris ir jaunimą į tą kovą ir ją laimėti, nedaleisti kruvinam fašizmui užsirioginti ant mūsų sprando, nedaleisti karui kilti, kuriame liktų išžudyti milijonai jaunų vyrų už kapitalistų reikalus.

Daugiau Atydos! Moteris ir Jaunimą
