

Working Class Leaders To Speak In New York

Noted working class leaders will speak on Marxism as "a guide to action" at an open discussion on "Revolutionary Theory and Class Struggle" at the New Star Casino, Park Ave. and 107th Street, Sunday evening at 8 o'clock. The open-membership meeting has been called by the Central Committee and the New York District of the Communist Party.

Clarence Hathaway, editor of the Daily Worker, will give a general introduction to the subject. He will emphasize the necessity of spreading Marxist-Leninist theory into every section of the American working class.

The keynote at the meeting will be sounded by Jack Stachel, acting national secretary of the Trade Union Unity League, who will give a general analysis of the political character of the working class struggles under the new deal.

Charles Krumbein, district organizer for New York, will discuss the meaning of Bolshevization, how the Communist Party functions, and the need for professional revolutionists.

James W. Ford, organizer in Harlem, will give the Marxist-Leninist teachings on the national question, and show how it should be applied to the Negro question in America.

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Walter Habich Killed In Concentration Camp

Zurich, Germany.—We have only now been informed that Walter Habich was killed at Dachau concentration camp.

For many years Walter Habich was a leading functionary of the Young Communist League of Germany, and was for a time the head of its Central Committee. Subsequently he was the editor of various Party newspapers, last of the "Neue Zeitung" in Munich. He retained this last function when the Hitler regime came into power in March 1933. He organized the illegal communist press of the district, and in spite of enormous difficulties he was successful in bringing out the illegal "Neue Zeitung" for a long time before the State Police discovered its organization. At the end of September 1933, a printing office was discovered by the police in a priests' seminary in Munich, and in the course of the extensive police raids which followed, Walter Habich was arrested.

Walter Habich's mother, who lives in Stuttgart-Botnang, received a notice at the end of October, from the camp management at Dachau, that her son Walter had "died" in Dachau on July 2nd 1934. His ashes could be fetched from Dachau. These brutalized concentration camp leaders have left the fami-

Rozada played an important part in the negotiations with the Young Socialists, who were of the utmost importance in the formation of the Workers' Alliance.

The organizer of the Young Communist League in Madrid, Prifan Medrano, has also been arrested. Medrano is a member of the Central Committee of the YCL of Spain, and led the struggle of the proletarian youth of Madrid.

Many other Young Communists are in prison. They look to us—writes the "Humanite"—for our solidarity in the struggle for their release.

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U.S.S.R. WILL HAVE NO MERCY FOR ENEMIES

MOSCOW.—Under the headline "The Anti-Soviet Vipers are Hissing," an article in Pravda, organ of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, dwells in detail on the anti-Soviet lies and slanders lately spread in connection with Kirov's assassination by a large part of the capitalist press, especially the Polish, Finnish, Latvian and German fascist newspapers, as well as a part of the British conservative press.

"The anti-Soviet slandering inventions are mostly making their way in from Latvia and Finland and partly through Poland," Pravda writes. "We know through the verdict of the Military Collegium of the Supreme Court in Moscow and Leningrad that White Guards have been penetrating the USSR through Finland, Latvia and Poland, with instructions to organize terrorist acts. We are faced with the coincidence of the source of the organization of terrorist acts against the USSR and at the same time a slandering anti-Soviet campaign. The same dirty hands are doing one and the same dirty business and it is clear to us why part of the Finnish, Latvian and Polish papers have undertaken the task of supporting the act of Kirov's murderer by their savage barking.

Those Behind the Murderer

"The anti-Soviet lie-factories in Latvia, Finland and Poland have for long served as a haunt and a school for White Guard bandits and terrorists. By the scale of the boldness and cynicism of these lies we can judge of the plans and intentions of their inventors. They wished to reinforce the effect of Smolny (where Kirov was murdered) by thousands and millions of times. The enemies

of the working class, who sent the murderer, exposed themselves and failed in their calculations. The powerful unity of the Soviet toilers, their unanimous outburst of indignation, their firm stand around the Party and the government, immediately nullified the slander. The assassin's bullet struck a man who was dear to the whole country, but it left the steel armor of proletarian unity unscratched. They must not be deceived because the revolutionary proletariat, cool-headed, keeps itself in hand. Behind it is the resolve to finish off the enemies of the working class by every means which the dictatorship of the proletariat makes available to the toilers.

No Mercy for Enemies

"There is not, and there will not be, any mercy for those who lift an armed hand against the toilers of the Soviet country. The revolutionary proletariat answers the treacherous blow in the back by a shattering blow at all traitors, all bandits and those who screen and inspire them. Those who send these criminals across the frontiers, who arm them for murder, who inspire them through the press and simultaneously spread slanders rumors must not complain of the harshness of proletarian defence. Police Raid Conf. of Youth Committee Against War

ZURICH, Switzerland.—A conference was held in Zurich by the Youth Committee against War and Fascism, and dealt with the continuation of the plebscrite struggle against the new army law prolonging the military training of recruits. Shortly after the opening of the conference a large detachment of the Canton of Zurich police pushed their way into the hall, arrested all those present, and confiscated the material. The young people were taken to the barracks of the Cantonal Police and kept there and examined for hours, on the pretext that the conference had been convened by the prohibited "Fighting Alliance Against Fascism."

Today the police have been obliged to announce that "these young people can scarcely be Fighting Alliance members." This is an admission that their

Book Review

THE MENACE OF FASCISM-By John Strachey.

Covici Friede, N. Y.—Library

Your reviewer, in the past few weeks as contributor to the Youth Section, has received, from his supposedly many, many readers, one solitary correspondence. (That is, correspondence concerning books.) A young lady wanted to know where she may obtain the books that were reviewed, without buying them. It must be admitted, in order to answer the question asked, that financial poverty is very catching among workers, and, of course, to your reporter, who is almost laid horizontal by the malady. This necessitates the dependence on the public libraries for books. From now on, for the convenience of those afflicted with this cursed disease and who wish to read informative literature, all books so obtained will have "Library" in the heading.

Upon the library shelves, however, you will find, as your reviewer has found, that among about seven copies of the Fascist Betti's book on Fascism, rests (and seldom at that) only one copy of Strachey's "Menace of Fascism." Why? Because Strachey agrees with the Communists that "Fascism is a movement to defend, by violent means, the private ownership of the means of production from Socialization." Also, Strachey says, in accordance with Stalin's "Foundations of Leninism," that the main force for tripping Fascism is the working class. And if anyone thinks the government (an organ of suppression used by one class against another, as was learned last week) will allow its libraries to be "polluted" by revolutionary literature, they are mistaken. One copy each of the better known revolutionary books, however, is sufficient to maintain the semblance of democracy.

The Englishman Strachey, in his book, traces the "lesser evil" policy of working class misleaders in general and the Social Democrats of Germany in particular. He finds that this policy leads inevitably to fascism. In 1918 and 1923, during the critical periods of German capitalism, one push by the workers and capitalism would have toppled over, but the Social Democrat leaders preferred the peaceful road to Socialism and allowed the capitalists to reorganize. By 1930, the capitalists had regained sufficient strength to put up a candidate for election. The fascists also appeared strong with the support of workers duped by fascist demagoguery and disgusted with Social Democratic waverings, who still controlled a large section of the working class, withdrew their candidate in favor of the reactionary Hindenburg—the "lesser evil"—thus assuring the latter's election. But Hindenburg, under pressure of capitalists, promptly, in 1932, made Hitler dictator of Germany. Then Hitler, just as promptly, dissolved the Social Democratic Party—the electors of Hindenburg.

What can be concluded from the above? Only this: that Fascism is capitalism's last attempt to maintain itself; that the "lesser evil" policy is a policy for the upholding of capitalism; that the leaders who are advocating this policy consciously wish to maintain capitalism, since they are willing to become politically extinct for democracy (and capitalist democracy at that).

If the rapidly swelling ranks of the German Communist Party mean anything, it means that the German workers are learning fast where to expend their revolutionary energy.

Is Britain and America immune from Fascism? No, they are not. The same economic forces are undermining the structure of capitalism in these last strongholds of "democracy" as elsewhere and the law of

The collective farm peasants, the Soviet intellectuals of all kinds, all these categories of the toilers of the Soviet Union were firmly, strongly fused with the proletariat and mourned Kirov as a common hero, a hero of the country."

"The determination ruthlessly to repulse and crush counter-revolution is in present historic conditions the other side of the determination for peace, because the shot at Kirov means an attempt to disrupt the cause of peace."

"I didn't come here to raise Cain. I came here to get a job. They've stalled me off till I'm sick and tired of it." He paused, his eyes daring the cop to start something. But the cop as I say was pretty old, and he didn't want any trouble. "An ex-serviceman's supposed to get first preference to relief work in this country, isn't he?" the man went on. "Yeah! They gave me first preference all right, out in the street. Now they keep chasing me from one God damn agency to another like—"

Question: Is there religious freedom in Russia? Why are churches closed? Why are priests denied the right to vote?

Only following the Russian revolution did the masses of people win religious freedom in Russia. The revolution separated the church from the state, and the people were left free to attend religious services or not, as they saw fit. Only where counter-revolutionary elements used the cloak of religion to mask their anti-Soviet propaganda and activities, has the Soviet Government naturally had to interfere. Otherwise, it relies on education and the new interests of a developing socialist society to win the masses away from their earlier backward beliefs.

There are many churches still open in the Soviet Union. I personally visited several, both Greek Orthodox and Mohammedan, where services were in progress. Moscow, formerly known as "the city of churches," with something like 1,600, has nearly four hundred still operating. When you go inside, especially in the industrial areas, you find that old women and men make up the congregations, and most of those, peasants. The young people simply aren't interested.

Where churches have been closed, that is, transformed into public clubs, auditoriums and museums, this has been done with the consent and usually at the urgent demand of the population. The people look on it very practically. Why should a public building remain unused, while the community is in such bad need of an auditorium where public lectures, concerts and movies can be enjoyed by many

hundreds? Let the few score old folks who want to worship continue, there is another church nearby, large enough to house them all.

To have citizenship rights in the Workers' Republic, you have to work—be carrying on some useful occupation. Priests are considered non-productive. Those former priests who have become librarians, working farmers, or have taken up some other productive work, have won their citizenship rights.

ly in ignorance of the death of Walter Habich for four months. For four months the management of the camp has pocketed the sums of money saved by the mother from her own food, and sent to the camp for her son, already dead. It is not even necessary to inform the relations that they need send no more money for a dead man.

After receiving the news, Walter Habich's sister sent an announcement of the death to a Stuttgart newspaper. A few hours later she was cited to appear before the State Secret Police, and was told that the printing of this announcement would not be allowed, not even if the heading "Dachau, July 2nd" was omitted. The sister was told: "Yes, we take those who fall in to our hands."

This unheard of example of bestial terrorism must arouse the whole world, and must convince everyone that the brutality of the Hitler fascists against the struggling working class is as unbridled as ever. The voices raised in protest must be multiplied a thousandfold, that the lives of thousands of imprisoned anti-fascists may still be saved.

Tad, kvorta čielo pieno papildys arti 7 "dalių" kalorijų energijai, arti 13 "dalių" baltinių kūno audinams būdavo ir kalbėti, 51 "dalis" kaulų dantini ir kaulams, 20 "dalių" koforo ir azlio 5 "dalių" geležies. Ji taipgi suteikia daugiau kaip du trisdešimtadalio reikalingo Vitamino A. Kitų valgių taip pat reikia. Tėvykite, jog jautiena yra turtinga baltiniais, žaliosios pupos Vitaminu A, dumso kalorijai ir apskaita sunku Vitaminu C.

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NEW YORKO IR APIELINKĖS ŽINIOS

Williamsburgo Mūsų Organizacijos Valdybom ir Komisijom

Draugai ir draugės! Norint ar ne, bet tenka pasakyti, kad Williamsburgo mūsų draugai ir draugės labai mažai rūpinatės organizacijų susirinkimų ir parengimų garsinimu. Tulos valdybos neparasė nei pranešimo, kada jų susirinkimai įvyksta, tenka redakcijai sekti tuos susirinkimus ir garsinti. Redakcija jų nežino, kas yra svarbaus tos organizacijos veikime, kas bus svarstoma.

Dar blogiau su parengimais, tūli draugai ir draugės, gerai vartoja plunksnų, gali parašyti, yra parengimų komisijose, bet nesuranda reikalo parašyti nei vieną eilutę apie jų besirūpinantį parengimą, lošimą ir jo pasekmes. Redakcija turi nuo savęs parašyti. Žinoma, kad tokis raštas išeina "kazionas", mes nedalyvaujame jūsų praktikoje, tam neturime laiko, tai ir negalime ką gero parašyti. Parašai kaip geriausiai supranti, tada draugams nepatinka, pyksta, raukosi. O kas kaltas? Jūs patys, kad nerandate reikalo savo parengimą garsinti! Įvyko jis ir vėl nėra aprašymo, vėl pati redakcija turi aprašyti arba įieškoti, kad kas aprašytų.

Tokis apsilaidimas stačiai nepakenčiamas. Visų kitų miestų patys draugai garsina savo parengimus, patys aprašo jų pasekmes, patys darbuojasi. Net ir Brooklynio pietų dalies arba East New Yorko draugai tą patys atlieka valdybų narių ir komisijų, bet Williamsburgo draugai ir draugės tuom reikalu nesirūpina. Mano: "Laisvės" redakcija tegul rūpinasi. Tai nedraugiškas ir negeras atsiėmimas į redakciją.

Nuo dabar turėtumėt patys daugiau rūpintis savo parengimais, kurie nesirūpinatė, neatliekate savo pareigas, tad vėliau nerugokite ant kitų, nes jūsų pačių kaltė. Kas gi gali geriau žinoti jūsų organizacijų reikalus, kas bus svarstoma, kas diskutuojama, jeigu ne jūs patys? Kas gali geriau žinoti apie jūsų parengimus arba prie jų prisirengimus, jeigu ne rengėjai ir komisijos? Jų ir yra pareiga parašyti apie tai į dienraštį.

Jau Turi 40,000 Balotų

"Daily Workeris" dabar veda kampaniją už surinkimą 1,000,000 balsų už H. R. 7598 bilių. Kalbinė spauda padeda. Visi balotukai reikia siųsti "Daily Workeriui", arba priduoti bedarbių organizacijoms. Dar tik kelios dienos, kaip pradėta ta kampanija, o jau surinkta virš 40,000 balotų už H. R. 7598 bilių.

Moteris Nušovė Savo Vyra

Mary Collucci teisiama už nušovimą savo vyro. Moteris dar 14 metų būdama apsisėdė ir pagimdė net 17 vaikų. Ji baistai vargo, kentėjo, vyras tankiai gėrė. Abu buvo tamais žmonės, nežinojo, kaip reikia kovoti prieš esamą tvarką. Netekus lygybės ji nušovė savo vyrą ir dabar yra teisiamama.

Atrado Negyvą Žmogų

Policija paskelbė, kad netoli Manhattan tiltu atrado negyvą žmogų apie 40 metų amžiaus, virš 5 pėdų augščio. Kol kas nežino, kas jis yra. Bus nupuolęs nuo tilto apie 110 pėdų. Veikiausiai koks bedarbis nusižudė.

Kodel ir Kur Skiriasi Keliai Kom. Partijos ir "Opocijos"

Komunistų Partijos Brooklynio lietuvių frakcija rengia šia tema diskusijas pirmadienį, gruodžio 17 d., "Laisvės" svetainėje. Kviečiami dalyvauti visi Brooklynio lietuviai. O ypatinai raginami "Opocijos" nariai ateiti į diskusijas ir išsireikšti. Kiekvienam bus suteikta laisvė ir proga išsireikšti.

Ši tema svarbi. Nemažai "Opocijos" draugų darbininkų kalba apie reikala vienybės. Komunistai visuomet stoja už apvienijimą visų revoliucinių darbininkų. Bet kaip atsiekti tą tikslą? Tūkstančiais jie eina į policijos stotis, Salvation Army užeiga ir subves, kad susišilus, bet iš subvį juos vaiko kompanijų agentai, o policija taipgi veja laukan. Darbininkų pareiga organizuoti ir reikalauoti šalpos ir buto.

Nuo garų buvo apalpę dvi šeimos iš 9 asmenų, 432-434 Metropolitan Ave. Pribuvęs pirmosios pagalbos vežimas su daktarais atgavo visus žmones.
