THE RELATION OF CATHOLIC ACTION TO A CAREER

A PHYSICIAN SPEAKS HIS MIND ON BIRTH CONTROL

From the "Ave Maria" magazine we take the following important comment:

The editor of the London Catholic Times received a severe shock recently when in perusing a Sunday newspaper, which had always been a vehicle of paganism and falsehood, he happened upon an article dealing with the cause of unhappiness among married women, and the reasons why so many wives seek the divorce courts. It seems that this paper had sent its representative to a rather prominent physician in London to obtain his views on the declining birth rate, and the doctor's statements were so startling and sensational, to the mind of the editor, that space was given to them in spite of the fact that they were not in line with the general policy of the paper.

This doctor is of the opinion that more marriages are being broken up today because of nerve-wrecked wives than for any other single reason. The nerve-wracking is not due to the stupidity and ignorance of the ministers of religion, he assures us, but to the empty cradles so dramatically evidenced by the Register-General's figures. Childlessness, thwarted maternal instincts, and the shelving of maternal duties by mothers, he says, are producing a host of wrecks, neurasthenics, and mentally unbalanced women who are not suitable companions for any kind of normal man."

It might be well for married couples to ponder over this physician's words; and those who believe they are making married life easy and even pleasant by practicing birth control may find to their sorrow that they are wrecking their matrimonial careers by their failure to bear the ordinary natural burdens of the married state that are connected with the procreation and the rearing of children.

It is well for humanity that the radicals are discovering for themselves what Catholic physicians have been trying all along to tell them—that nature takes a toll for the violation of her laws. Physicians in this country have been troubled over the fact that the proportion of nervous diseases among women had increased almost threefold in a generation. If they will investigate further they will find what this English physician has found among married women, and they will make the further discovery that unmarried women are suffering as well as a result of the outraged modesty which modern so-called courtship sanctions. Unmarried men should remember that their own indiscretions in courtship lay the foundations for the shipwreck of their later marriage. The Church calls marriage "Holy Matrimony".

Festival of Freedom to Feature Sham Battle

400 Soldiers to Participate in Realistic Half Hour Show

Spectators at the "Festival of Freedom and Fireworks", Cleveland's huge civic celebration of Independence Day to be held in the Stadium on the night of July 4th, will be treated to a realistic half-hour sham battle in which more than 400 infantry, artillery, engineer and naval militiamen will participate.

The Festival, sponsored by the Come to - Cleveland Committee of the Cleveland Advertising Club, has been proclaimed as the city's official Fourth of July celebration—one that will provide everyone with an opportunity to spend a "safe and sane" Fourth and yet enjoy a spectacular \$4000 fireworks display.

Military participation in the show was decided upon following a series of meetings with commanding officers of the Ohio National Guard. More than 10,000 rounds of rifle and machine gun ammunition, in addition to shells for one-pounders and trench mortars, will be fired during the demonstration designed to give a graphic picture of how troops maneuver under fire and defend lines in actual military combat.

More than 300 soldiers, made up of members of the First Battalion, 145th Infantry and a battalion of 112th Engineers, will be brought from Camp Perry by special train for the show.

Immediately following the military show, demonstrations of trick motorcycle riding will be given by the Cleveland Police Department. The Fire Department will follow with a showing of the city's new 100 foot aerial ladder, exhibitions of ladder climbing and net jumping. The first half of the evenings' program, scheduled to begin at 7:30 with a band concert, will conclude with a mass flag demonstration participated in by color guards representing all civic, fraternal, veteran and nationality organizations. A feature of the first half of the program will be a dramatic reading of Lincoln's immortal Gettysburg Address with the Stadium in complete darkness.

The last half of the program will be given over entirely to a spectacular fireworks display, during which time more than \$4000 worth of glittering, roaring fireworks will go soaring skyward. The display will be largest ever presented in Cleveland.

Tickets for the Festival are now on sale at the office of the Lithuanian News. Advance admissions are selling at four for \$1.00, while a limited number of reserved seats are on sale at the Music Hall box office at \$1 each. Admission at the gate on the night of the event will be 40c per person.

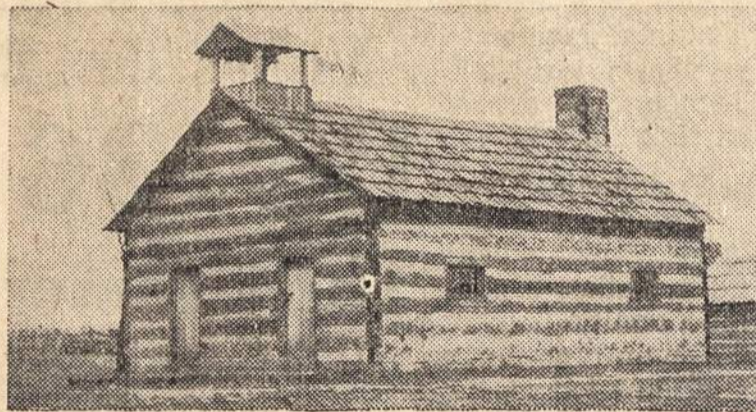

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Netoli New Philadelphia yra miestelis Schoenbrum.
Turbut yra tikrai vienas tokiš miestelis visose Šuvenyotos Valsijoje. Schoenbrum yra tikra reprodukcija miškinių bakažuų pastatytų 167 metai atgal. Šio miestelio bakažūs su ranku darbo raiškiais ryškiai parodo, kaip pionieriai gyveno, kuomet Ohio buvo miškais apaugus ir indijonai buvo naujakurių pavojumi.

Schoenbrum buvo įkurtas per apie 300 Delaware indijonų, kurie perkėlė iš jų paravijonų sektos misjonierius, kuris buvo atvartytas į Ohio per laukinius Fokietius. Jie atėjo Pensilvanijos Susuehanna klonio, su gyvūniate ir ukiu padarais įsteigti pirmą baltųjų Ohio sodą. Vadais šiu pirm-takunų buvo John Heckwalder ir David Zeisberger, moravijonų misjonieriai.

Išm šis mažas miestelis išsistatė vykių prie Sandusky, kuomet moravijonai slinko prie Detroito, kur jiems pasisekė pertikrinti anglus, kad jie nei vienos nei kitos pusės negelbsti. Tuo laiku sugrįžo į Gnadenuhten apie 100 indijonų surinkti prisipėjusius kukuruzus. Bedirbant ši darba jie buvo išžudyti. Ir šioje vietoje stovi šiandien atminčiai paminklas.

Atstatytas šiandien Schoenbrum esti po priežiūra Ohio Valstijos Archeologijos ir Istoriijos Mužėjaus. Moravijonai iki šios dienos apsilaiko Tuscarawas ir Muskingum klonėse iš kur prasipletti plačiau po visa krašta vary-ti pradėt darba jų protėvių.
