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#### Reflection:

### A national Catholic daily in the works?


For the past several months I have been talking up an idea that has lay dormant in the back of my mind for many years—starting a national Catholic daily newspaper. Since it's gotten a good deal of media attention, I thought I might share some of my thinking on the

topic with "my girls."

The first and most obvious question is: Why a national Catholic daily? 1) To present the news of the day, evaluated in the light of Gospel values and Catholic doctrine. 2) To unite Catholics in the United States by offering an intellectual grounding for Catholic positions, especially on matters of public policy. 3) To offer an articulate voice to American society-at-large, capitalizing on "the Catholic moment," to reflect on world and national events from the standpoints of Catholic theology, philosophy and political theory.

This paper would be unabashedly Catholic (but not more Catholic than the Pope!) and thoroughly American. In some sense, it would be modeled on The Christian Science Monitor and the Catholic dailies of other countries (like France and Italy). Such a paper would be a sign that the Catholic community of the United States has come of age and has begun to take seriously the challenges presented by Gaudium et Spes, Apostolicam Actuositatem and Inter Mirifica of Vatican II.

In addition to my own efforts, I have available to the project a prominent and competent lay journalist who is most interested in an active role in the task, should we get off the ground

floor. What's holding up progress? As you might have guessed—finances. Therefore, let me ask you to do two things: First, pray for a wealthy, committed Catholic to step forward as the initial backer of the endeavor. Second, keep your ears open for potential benefactors, and be ready to share with such individuals news of all this.

So often we Catholics complain that we get the short end of the stick from the secular media, ranging from unfair coverage to complete black-out of our concerns. Maybe the time has come for us to provide an alternative. I submit that for your reflection.

#### Lithuanian Celebrations

#### **FUNERALS**

If you lived near a Lithuanian church as a child, you will remember hearing a church bell toll slowly and seeing your mother cross herself and say, "amžina atilsi." Then, all would wait for the answer to "who died?" Where did this custom come from? Read on . . .

"When death visited a Lithuanian village, the tolling of the parish church bell announced the news to neighbors near and far. People used to say that the bell accompanied the soul of the deceased to heaven and, without its tolling, he would wander a long time before finally finding the way to his place of eternal rest. But this belief became popular only in recent times. In the past, the country folk believed that the soul remained near the corpse until it was carried from the home and lowered into the grave at the cemetery. The soul sees the wake the living have prepared, hears their prayers, lamentations and hymns. Sometimes it shares food with the mourners (food was served in the room where the body was laid out), tasting favorite dishes from their plates or sipping a drink from their glasses. Of course, the living do not see the soul. The tolling of bells, singing of hymns and loud laments at the corpse were intended to dispel the evil spirits that sneak about trying to kidnap his soul.

"When a person died, his corpse was washed, dressed, shod and laid out. The clothing had to be clean and neat (not necessarily new), his socks pinned and not bunched up. After death, a person wears the clothes in which he is buried. Wearing these same garments, the soul returns to visit loved ones on All Souls' Day and Christmas Eve. He will wear this same garb on the day of

Final Judgement. How disgraced would the family be if their loved one came rumpled, disheveled or barefooted!

"At a time when no one had even heard of funeral directors or funeral homes, the deceased was laid out at home in the largest room so as to accommodate the assembled neighbors and leave enough room for the refreshment table. Vigil was kept at the corpse for three days (in the past even longer). This period, or wake, was called variously depending on the region: budynė in Samogitia, apsėdai or pagrabas in the Eastern Highlands, šermenys in Užnemunė (the Western Highlands or Sūduva).

"At a wake, the people sing hymns, pray, say or chant the rosary and the Litany of All Saints. It was customary to sing sad (sometimes even terrifying) hymns about death, the fate of sinners and punishment for sin. A specific farewell ceremony for the deceased was not held. The fact itself that neighbors, family, relatives by blood and marriage, had assembled for the wake was considered a tribute and farewell to the deceased. The old lamentations may be said to be most similar to today's farewell speeches at the coffin. The laments enumerated the dead person's good and noble deeds, the most important events of his life, they bemoaned the fact that he had left his family, friends, relatives, etc.

"The custom of lamenting the dead

is very old. The lamentations are sung by the family or even by hired mourners. The mourners' role is known in other Indo-European nations where they filled special containers with their tears. These containers were buried with the deceased so that in the next life he could boast and brag how much his family mourned him. Laments were also sung on the anniversary of the death at the cemetery or at a dinner.

"Many songs of lamentation have been handed down from ancient times for family members: father, mother, children, brothers, sisters. However, there exist laments in which the wife of a bad drunken husband mourns his death, listing the events of his life without forgetting what she found most difficult: his drinking, his harsh words, and all the hardship she endured while living with the man.

"When the body was carried from the home (now from the funeral parlor), it was first accompanied to the church. The entire village assembled for the funeral for it was considered a community matter, a final tribute for one of their neighbors. The very word ,,accompany" tells us that the deceased was driven or carried with a large retinue. An earmark of funeral processions was the singing of hymns.

"Following the funeral Mass, the coffin was taken to the cemetery. After it was lowered into the grave, those attending dropped three pinches or three handfulls of dirt on the casket. According to ancient belief, this was done so the living would not need to fear the soul, and in more recent times (as the Church explained it) to remind the living of death.

"Relatives, neighbors and others attending the funeral were invited to the burial dinner. In some Lithuanian places this was a potluck dinner... usually held in the home of the deceased. Today it is usually prepared in a restaurant, consequently the family needs not worry about preparing the food.

"In the old days at the burial dinner, a chair was placed at the table for the deceased and a place was set (as for the Christmas Eve dinner). This helped the living remember why they were assembled. The soul was believed to participate at the meal and only later leave for its appointed place. This beautiful custom can be adopted outsided Lithuania. When we leave an empty place in memory of a departed one, we can position a small lighted candle or a photograph on the plate. This would help to maintain a thoughtful atmosphere after the funeral because the burial dinner sometimes turns into a joyous affair. If the family is reluctant to leave a place at the table shared by the living, it can prepare a small table holding a candle and the deceased's photograph decorated with flowers.

"It is also recommended that the old custom of singing hymns and reciting prayers at the casket be incorporated into modern funeral rituals. In Lithuania, hymns were sung and prayers said almost without interruption. The hymns and prayers afforded comfort to the family in their hour of sorrow and forestalled any unnecessary conversation which tends to begin in a large assembly of people, especially those who have not seen one another for a long time. Wakes are not places for idle conversation and people do not attend them to share the latest news. If the singing of hymns at the funeral home cannot be arranged, music (even tapes, or an organ which is available at nearly every chapel) should be provided. But it is best to ask an acquaintance to lead the singing (this person may even be

hired. The parish organist would be most suitable). The hymns should be printed, duplicated and distributed to those attending the wake. Lithuanians love to sing songs as well as hymns and will gladly add their voices if someone starts. A person must also be found to lead the prayers at the casket. It is unnecessary to await the arrival of the parish priest to say prayers in unison with those in attendance. Prayers and hymns should resound at the casket of a Christian for that is what constitutes a Christian funeral."

"Lithuanians always remembered their departed ones not only on Church feasts (All Souls' Day), but at certain times set by tradition. It was customary to hold a commemoration ten days after

the death. Only family and relatives assembled in church at this time to pray together and attend Holy Mass. A larger commemoration was held after four weeks, once called keturnedėlis (although the word "nedėlia" is of Slavic origin). On this occasion, Holy Mass was followed by a repast for a larger group of persons. An even larger commemoration took place on the first anniversary with church services and a dinner. On this anniversary, a headstone was often erected and blessed. In Lithuania, a headstone or cross was erected soon after the funeral because an unmarked grave-without a crosswas the sign of disrespect for the deceased."

#### **HOME COOKING**

#### PLAN NOW FOR THE BEST HOLIDAY EVER

Thanksgiving and Christmas are two holidays when we indulge our food fancies and cast discretion regarding calories to the wind. The following is a representative selection of holiday goodies from which to choose:

#### HEARTY HOT APPETIZERS

#### Magic Mushrooms

36 medium size fresh mushrooms
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 lb. margarine, divided
1 cup chicken bouillon
1 large onion, finely chopped
1 tsps. grated Parmesan cheese
1/2 pkg. commercial stuffing mix
Salt and pepper, to taste

Clean mushrooms well. Remove the stems and chop into small pieces. Saute stems with onion, garlic and cheese in ¼ lb. of the butter until stems are tender. Add remaining ingredients and heat through. Stuff mushroom caps with the mixture. Melt remaining ¼ lb. margarine in a shallow pan and place mushrooms in it. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. If mushrooms are not to be eaten immediately, cool and wrap in freezer paper. Freeze. To serve, cover and bake unthawed mushrooms at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Remove foil and broil an additional 3 to 5 minutes.

#### **Ham Pasties**

Refrigerator Crescent Rolls Chopped onion Ground Ham Prepared Mustard

Roll out crescent rolls in squares. Fill with ground ham mixed with a little chopped onion and a little prepared mustard. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes or until golden brown.

## DELUXE COOKIE ASSORTMENT Walnut Clusters

2 cups walnuts, halves or lge. pcs.

1/4 cup soft margarine

1/2 cup sugar

1 egg unbeaten

11/2 tsp. vanilla

11/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted

1/2 cup sifted flour

1/4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Put walnut halves or large pieces in a paper or plastic bag and crush slightly with rolling pin to break them up coarsely. Stir together butter, sugar, egg and vanilla. Beat with spoon just until smooth. Stir in melted chocolate, then flour sifted with baking powder and salt. Stir in walnut pieces. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake for 10 min. not longer. They should be still soft when taken from oven. Cool on rack. Makes about 30 unusual candy-like cookies.

#### **Delectabites**

½ cup butter
2 Tbl. sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup sifted flour
1 cup finely chopped walnuts
Powdered sugar

Mix well butter, sugar and vanilla. Gradually stir in sifted flour and chopped walnuts. Chill. Shape into marble-size balls. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 15 to 17 minutes until firm but not brown. Roll gently in powdered sugar. Cool and roll in sugar again. Makes about 50.

#### Poinsettia Stars

½ cup margarine
½ cup sugar
1 egg
½ cup dark corn syrup
1½ tspns. grated lemon rind
1 tspn. lemon extract
3 cups unsifted flour
1 tspn. baking soda
1 tspn. salt
30 halved unbleached almonds

In large bowl with mixer at medium speed, beat margarine and sugar until well blended. Add egg, corn syrup, lemon rind and extract. Stir together flour, baking soda and salt. Add to margarine mixture, beat just until all ingredients are moistened. Cover and chill in refrigerator 1 hour. Roll out dough on lightly floured surface to 1/8 inch thickness. With a cookie cutter cut 3 inch stars. Place on greased cookie sheets. Position one star on top of another so that points are staggered. Cut a 1/2 inch circle from the center of the cookies. Decorate tops with almond halves. Bake at 350 degrees 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly brown. Makes about 21/2 doz. cookies.

#### **Patchwork Cookies**

1 cup (2 sticks butter)
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 tspn. vanilla extract
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Cream butter, gradually add sugar, beating well until blended. Beat in egg and vanilla. Gradually blend in flour. Spread evenly in well-buttered 15x10½x1 inch jelly roll pan. Bake at 350 degrees 15 to 18 minutes until lightly browned. Remove from oven, quickly sprinkle chocolate pieces over baked cookie base. Mark off into large squares and top each square with one of the following: chopped nuts, crushed peppermint candy, shredded coconut, green gumdrop cutouts, silver dragees, assorted sugar srystals and red cinnamon candies. Chill just until frosting is set. Cut into 1½ inch squares. Ar-

range cookies onto a serving tray in patchwork quilt style. Makes 70 cookies.

#### **DANDY CANDIES**

#### Won't Fail Fudge

Just 5 minutes cooking makes this creamy fudge.

1 small can evaporated milk

1-½ cup sugar

16 marshmallows

¼ tspn. salt

¼ cup butter

1½ cups semi-sweet chocolate pieces

1 tspn. vanilla

1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

Mix first 5 ingredients in saucepan. Stirring constantly, heat to boiling and boil 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add chocolate and stir until melted. Stir in vanilla and walnuts. Spread in buttered 8" pan. Cool until firm. Makes about 2 lbs.

#### Rum Balls

3 cups vanilla wafer crumbs
1 cup powdered sugar
1½ Tbs. cocoa
1½ cups finely chopped walnuts
3 Tbs. corn syrup
½ cup rum (or bourbon)

Mix all ingredients together. Shape into 1 inch balls and roll in powdered sugar. Good to eat right away or later. Store in tight containers. Makes about 40. (Note: It takes two 7 oz. pkgs. of vanilla wafers to make 3 cups of crumbs.)

#### Tiny Tim Apples

1 cup pitted dates
1 cup seedless raisins
8 oz. dried figs
1 cup walnuts
1 tsp. grated orange rind
1 Tbs. orange juice

Put fruits, walnuts and grated orange rind through food chopper, using coarse blade. Add juice and knead until well blended. Shape into "apples" about 1 inch thick. Roll in powdered sugar. Insert whole cloves for stems and citron pieces for leaves.

## REMEMBERING A VERY EFFECTIVE, ENERGETIC HONORARY MEMBER

Marija Marcinkevičiūtė was born in Riga, Latvia and attended grade school there. She later moved to Kupiškis, Lithuania, where she attended what we would term junior high school.

She arrived in Detroit, MI, as a teenager to live with her mother's relatives and attended Cass Commerce High School. In 1932, she returned to Europe for a three months visit with her parents and relatives in Lithuania and Latvia.

In 1933 she was wed to George Kasevičius-Kase, a native of Detroit, and the union produced three sons, Richard, Michael and Roland.

Marie joined Chapter 54 in 1936 and never ceased to be an active interested member. She served as an officer in her chapter over ten different times and as Michigan state director for 4 years. She was a delegate to many conventions, willing to serve on any of its committees, as well as secretary or president. Marie was a member of the Scholarship Fund committee and the 50th anniversary jubilee book committee. She also

served two terms as national president.

Organizational work appealed to Marie and she became actively involved in the work of BALFas, instituted after World War II to aid Lithuanian refugees. She and her husband signed affidavits to assist 40 refugee families. As they arrived in Detroit, she spent countless hours in the railroad station to greet them personally, then assist them in finding lodgings and employment. Through her efforts, at least 100 displaced Lithuanians found employment.

Marie was also on the board of Camp Dainava and active in the Detroit Lithuanian Organizations Center.

She was also involved in the formation of the chapter chorus, which was successfully active for many years.


Marie was accorded honorary membership in our Alliance at the 31st bienniel convention, held in Detroit in 1965.

She had been in failing health for the last year or so, and succombed on July 9th.

Our deepest sympathy to George, her life's companion of 58 years, who chauffered Marie to many of the conventions and enjoyed the company of other delegates. Also to her three sons and their families, relatives and friends and to the members of Ch. 54.

When the local newspaper became aware of the project, the local float-makers went to work. Bands, businesses, community leaders and 30 floats streamed down the nearly milelong route. As was only fitting, the largest contingent was the Girl Scouts with approximately 50 troops, all dressed in Christmas array.

The ELKS parade chairman said of Colleen: "She and her Brownies made it all happen, and we'll go bigger next year."



#### **Convention Highlights**

### WHAT A WEEK IT WAS!!

Not one of us could have imagined what world-shaking developments would be taking place during the week of our 44th bienniel convention. Yet, there it was, on radio and TV the morning of August 19th—Gorbachev held captive in the Crimea where he was vacationing, being pressured to resign. In Moscow, Yeltsin stood atop a tank and rallied the masses gathered around the Parliament building to resist the coup. We wondered as we watched events unfold: after 74 years, could this really be the beginning of the end for Soviet communism? Would this poorly planned coup spring loose the Baltics once and for all?

With these questions unanswered, delegates began gathering at the Oak Lawn Holiday Inn, traveling from Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Illinois and

Wisconsin.

On Thursday, August 22, the convention opened with a Mass at Nativity BVM church in the heart of Chicago's largest Lithuanian community, Marquette Park. Co-celebrants were Father John Kuzinskas, pastor, and Father Anthony Miciunas, MIC, who served as national spiritual director from 1975 to 1987. After Mass, the convention photo was taken and all present proceeded to the parish hall for the a continental breakfast and the opening session. National president, Emilie Prose, greeted all, extending a warm welcome from the Board. Vida Sakevičius, chairlady of the convention committee, welcomed all to her own parish, thanked the pastor for all his courtesies, the committee, and all who helped in any way.

Father Miciunas, now serving as assistant pastor at St. Mary's church in Plano, IL, recalled many happy memories working with Sajunga, particularly during his years as pastor in Worcester, MA. He brought greetings from past president Julia Mack, who is seriously ill and has been for several months. A card of get-

well wishes was signed and sent to Julia. Another card was signed and sent to George Kase, whose wife, hon. member Marie Kase, died in July.

Mary Rudis, president of BALF, chosen by the membership as Outstanding Lithuanian Woman in 1981, noted in her greeting that Sajunga has endured because "of you, the dedicated members, up-holding your Catholicity and love of Lithuania." She concluded, "Let us not forget the Lithuanian language, but speak it whenever and wherever we can."

Father Kuzinkas noted that our convention was beginning on a very special day, the Queenship of Mary, and what an important role she played for mankind. The role of woman has changed dramatically over the years. He mentioned his own mother and how much she wanted to go to school, but that was only afforded the males. She arrived in the U.S. at age 20, married, and became a homemaker, whose example and piety fostered his own vocation. A mother has always been the heart of her family, teaching her children during times of repression and danger. The Women's Alliance also played an important role by bringing women together and helping them financially.

Father remarked on his recent visit to Lithuania with Cardinal Bernardin and found it spiritually uplifting.

He congratulated the Alliance for all it has done through education, spiritually and culturally, and wished Mary's blessings on all its future endeavors.

After an honest-to-goodness Lithuanian lunch, which included bacon buns, sausage, sauerkraut, kugelis and a variety of desserts, reports from our representatives to various other organizations and chapters continued. The session adjourned so that delegates and guests could visit the Lithuanian Museum at the Sisters of St. Casimir motherhouse just a few blocks away.

#### Friday's Special Events

As delegates gathered for the first session, each was pinned with a black ribbon as this day, Lithuanians would be gathering in Daley Plaza downtown, to hold a vigil and pray for the safety of those enduring, once again, the uncertainties brought on by the attempted coup in Moscow and how it would affect their fight for independence. At the time of the vigil, delegates joined in a circle, lights were dimmed, and all softly sang, "Marija, Marija". It was a touching moment.

It was announced that national secretary, Roma Kuprys, would be elevated to honorary membership. Also, the following chapters would be rewarded for their efforts in recruiting new members: 1) Ch. 76 St. Petersburg, FL—\$25; 2) Ch. 68 Kearny, NJ—\$15;3) a tie between Ch. 3 Chicago and Ch. 20 Chicago—\$10 each.

#### Tour of Chicago

With the sessions completed for the day, delegates were joined by many local members for the bus tour of Chicago, Sabina Henson and her merry helpers provided everyone with a sack lunch, a refreshing drink and a souvenir copy of CHICAGO, with pictures and descriptions of all the places they would be seeing. It was a great deal of fun as we wove our way through the heart of the Windy City: State Street; Rush Street; Wacker Drive; Lake Shore Drive; the Merchandise Mart; the Wrigley Bldg., and then—all out at the Hancock Building, for a view of the city at night—95 stories up! What a magnificent sight it was in every direction! And, as we headed for home, a drive past the Water Tower, only survivor of the great Chicago fire and, last of all, the beautiful Buckingham Fountain, enhanced by colored lights. It was a lovely evening thanks to Sabina, our effervescent tour guide, who had, obviously, spent a great deal of time in preparing this special event.

#### Closing Session

(We were saddened to learn that Tamošaitienė, who had been in ill health of late, passed away on August 29. She had been informed by wire of the award and that plans for presentation would follow.)

The slate of officers for 1991–1993 was presented and accepted. Our Connecticut delegates will be looking into the possibility of having the next convention

in their area.

#### Banquet

The successful convention was culminated in a banquet and program at Nativity parish hall. Janina Mikutaitienė of Chapter 20 was a most proficient mistress of ceremonies. A selection of Lithuanian songs was presented by a very lovely Linda Burba and her guitar. Dale Murray acquainted all with the more important accomplishments of our Alliance in recent years. Award winners were announced and 50 year and over members present this evening were honored, namely: Ann Paurazas, Josephine Kilkus, Peggy Zakaras, Anastasia Snarskis, all of Chicago, and Bertha Janus of Chapter 54, Southfield, MI.

On Sunday morning the delegates attended the Lithuanian Mass at Nativity church and were inspired by the lovely singing. Many of the choir members are members of the Chicago Lithuanian Opera Company, who left for the airport and Lithuania after the Mass. Reporters and TV cameramen hovered around the church for opinions on the current happenings in Lithuania, now that it was obvious that the attempted coup had failed. It certainly was a most exciting week—wish you had been there!

Minutes of the Lithuanian-American Catholic Women's Alliance board meeting June 22, 1991.

The Board meeting of the Lithuanian American Catholic Women's Alliance took place on Saturday, June 22, 1991, at the home of Grasilia Meiluvienė in Chicago, IL. In attendance were Emilie Prose (President), Grasilia Meiluvienė (1st Vice-President), Roma Kuprys (Secretary), Vida Sakevičius (Treasurer), Juliana Rotsko (Trustee), Dale Murray (Editor), and Pam Breidenbach (Circulation Manager). The meeting was begun at 10:45 a.m. with a prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous Board meeting of October 27, 1990. There were no additions or corrections, and the minutes of the meeting

were accepted as read.

For her report, the President presented the correspondence which had been sent to her. She had tried to keep in touch with each one of the Board members during the time since the last Board meeting.

The 1st Vice-President reported that she had participated in the welcome for President Vytautas Landsbergis upon his arrival to Chicago. She also had participated in the welcome for Cardinal Joseph Bernardin upon his return from Lithuania. She also helped plan the welcome and coffee for Bishop Juozas Žemaitis from Lithuania.

The Secretary's report followed. In addition to corresponding monthly with the President, Treasurer, Circulation Manager, and Editor, she was involved in several other activities. The Annual Statement of Ownership for MOTERŲ DIRVA was prepared and filed with the U. S. Post Office. Material was also prepared for a postal audit of the MOTERŲ DIRVA which took place at the offices of DRAUGAS. The book

and finances were found to be in acceptable order by the auditor. The Home Office financial records were also audited on Tuesday, April 23rd, by the Trustees, who found them to be in order. As part of our PR program, two full-page ads were prepared by the Home Office—one for the annual Montessori Children's Fashion Show which took place February 24th, and one for the Lithuanian Song Festival which took place May 26th. Preparation for the Convention has also been done; writing the ad book flyer, sending out Convention packets to each one of the Chapters, and preparing ads for the Convention ad book. The Secretary represented the Alliance at the annual meeting of the Pastoral Council of Bishop Baltakis on Saturday, May 25th. A report was prepared for publication in the MOTERŲ DIRVA. The Secretary also represented the President at the Serra Club luncheon in downtown Chicago on Friday, June, 7th. The luncheon speaker was our Spiritual Director Rev. Peter M. J. Stravinskas, who announced his plans to start a daily Catholic newspaper here in the United States.

The Treasurer's report was next. She reported that the District sponsored an Open House at Nativity B. V. M. parish on November 4, 1990. Holy Mass was offered for the intention of Alliance members. Because of the timing being so close to All Souls Day and people going to the cemetery that morning, attendance was very low. The Treasurer was the chairman of this event. In all, three new dues paying members joined. The anticipated Book Drive never materialized. According to the Treasurer, they had hoped to send any overflow to the Lithuanian Institute, but they were asked to suspend the book-giving until spring. Also, post office hours would have meant keeping the books somewhere for a longer period, rather than just collecting them and shipping right away. A date of January 20th had been set, but the turn of events in Lithuania at that time would have made it absurd to collect books. The Treasurer represented the Alliance President at the Luncheon for visiting President Landsbergis. An audit of the books was done on April 23, 1991. The Treasurer also mentioned that work was being done on the Convention and that details would be announced as time went on.

The Editor reported on the research she had done on how best to preserve old MOTERU DIRVA issues. Photocopying seemed to be the most practical. The Editor had also researched the cost of binding all the photocopied issues.

The Circulation Manager reported on the number of MOTERU DIRVA issues distributed: paid members—717, exchanges—11, free copies to religious—14, Canada—4, Lithuania (Caritas)—1, England—1, and extras—16. There were a total of 764 issues distributed. There were 33 new members in 1991. There were 9 deaths.

Following the reports, there was a discussion about "Caritas" and what projects the Alliance should undertake to help the organization. The Secretary volunteered to prepare some information about possible Alliance activities for presentation to the Convention.

The Editor asked that checks be prepared on a monthly basis (not on a quarterly basis, as they have been up until now). For some members, the delayed payment has caused problems in the timely return of cancelled checks.

The Secretary presented some of the correspondence that she had received.

The Treasurer relayed the latest information on the Convention and various activities for the delegates.

There then followed a general discussion of By-laws. The status of the Alliance's name was discussed. A proposal to increase dues to \$10.00 was also considered. It was felt that State Directors should be reinstated. One meeting per year was to be mandatory for each Chapter. The Outstanding Woman of the Year Award should have a listing of requirements, and the work with nominations should be started early. The possibility of reinstating a Junior's section was also brought up. "Salaries" were reviewed, and it was recommended that the compensation for Vice-Presidents and Trustees be eliminated. There was also discussion of restructuring some of the Board members' duties.

The Treasurer, also a member of the "New By-laws" Committee, will be unable to attend the Committee's forthcoming meeting. The President asked Pam, the Circulation Manager, to attend this meeting.

It was also decided that the three Chapters with the most new members enrolled since the last Convention be awarded some sort of recognition at the Convention.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

## **44th Bienniel Convention**

The 44th Convention of the Lithuanian-American Roman Catholic Women's Alliance began on Thursday, August 22, at Nativity B.V.M. Church in Chicago, IL. Holy Mass was concelebrated by Rev. John Kuzinskas and Rev. Anthony Miciunas, MIC.

#### **First Session**

The opening session of the Convention was called to order at 11:00 A.M. The presidium was comprised of the Alliance Board Emilie Prose, presiding.

Rev. Miciunas cordially greeted everyone present. He also extended greetings from Honorary President, Julia Mack, who is seriously ill and in need of everyone's prayers. Next, Mary Rudis, president of BALF and voted Outstanding Lithuanian Woman in 1981 by the membership, extended her greetings and well-wishes for the future. Grasilia Meilus, chairman of the Credentials committee, presented the names of the delegates and alternates. Accredited delegates present during the convention were:

Chapter 1, Home Office: Sabina Henson.

Chapter 2, Cicero, IL: Palmera Breidenbach (Board member), Roma Kuprys (Board member), Albina Nodus and Juliana Rotsko.

Chapter 3, Chicago, IL: Joana Danilevičius, Angelė Katelis and Vida Sakevičius (Board member).

Chapter 5, Worcester, MA: Ona Kildišas and Jadvyga Spirauskas.

Chapter 17, Hartford, CT: Alyce Gegesky and Kathryn Urban. Chapter 20, Chicago, IL: Grasilia, Meilus (Board member), Janina Mikutaitis, Elena Šniokas ir Jadvyga Tamasevičius.

Chapter 33, New Haven, CT: Magdalin Cronin and Mary Geipel.

Chapter 42, Grand Rapids, MI: Sofia Lastas and Alice Rock.

Chapter 46, Chicago, IL: Angela Balchunas, SSC, Mary Anna Gercius, Dale Murray (Board member), Emilie Prose (Board member), Anna Sliteris (Board member) and Helen Vilkelis.

Chapter 54, Southfield, MI: Bertha Janus and Anna Uzdavinis.

Chapter 75, Chicago, IL: Margaret Elaine Valentine.

Total: 29 delegates.

The president appointed Alyce Gegesky, Ch. 17, and Mary Geipel, Ch. 33, as the Resolutions committee. Sofia Lastas and Alice Rock of Ch. 42 were appointed as the Nominating committee.

Greetings were received and read from the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception Auxiliary and from Sr. Margaret Carney, OFM, General Superior of the Sisters of St. Francis of the Providence of God.

Rev. John Kuzinskas gave the keynote address. He discussed how motherhood and the role of women have changed throughout the last fifty years.

A condensed version of the 43rd Convention minutes was read by Roma Kuprys. Officers reports followed:

#### President, Emilie Prose:

This will encompass two phases of my report. Since reelection as First Vice-presi-

dent at the last Convention in August of 1989, as Vice-president I served for approximately one year. The Alliance at that time was heavily engaged in concluding the separation of the fraternal faction of the organization, while at the same time implementing the various ideas, resolution, and actions pertaining to the growth of the organization-particularly taking into consideration the need for Lithuanian and American-Lithuanian seminarians and Caritas in Lithuania. In this connection I was unable to fully participate because of my health, but did all I could by telephone with the Board and other members.

At an annual Board meeting of the Alliance on June 23, 1990 the president, Aldona Shumway, resigned, necessitating the First Vice-president's occupancy of the chair as president. Very reluctantly, because of my congestive heart failure condition, I accepted provided the other members would help. They did, and I am very grateful.

The very first move made by me was to call a regular Board meeting when it was necessary to officially fill in the gaps in the Board roster-First Vice-president and Secretary-and to continue the work started with the resolutions from the past convention. One of the important areas of my position as president was to let all in the Alliance know of the status quo of the organization. This was done by individual letter to all members of all Chapters on September 20, 1990, with a promise to them of future such letters. Unfortunately, this did not materialize timewise because of my personal move from one city to another which took up most of my being. In the meantime, however, I was constantly in touch with the Board members, especially with the chairman of the 44th convention, and other events taking place in and around the world, most of all in Lithuania. In the interim between my vice-presidency and presidency, three Board of Directors meetings were called by me. The important events and affairs taking place at this time will be duly reported by other members of the Board at this Convention.

My sincere thanks to the Alliance for accepting me as President. My sincere wish to all of you is to keep up the good work of the Alliance for God and Country.

#### II Vice-pres. report, Albina Lipčius: Not submitted due to her illness and hospitalization.

#### Secretary, Roma Kuprys:

During the past years, I was involved with the day to day activities of running the Home Office; receiving dues payments and correspondence from Chapter secretaries; monthly correspondence with the President, Treasurer, Editor, and Circulation manager; balancing the books; and preparing for audits by the Trustees.

In addition to the above, I prepared the records for an audit of MOTERŲ DIRVA by the Post Office. I also represented the Alliance at several gatherings: Bishop Baltakis' Pastoral Council annual meetings;

a meeting with Albina Pajarskaitė, President of Caritas; and a Serra Club luncheon which featured our Spiritual Director, Rev. Peter Stravinskas, as main speaker. I also helped organize the reception here in Chicago for Bishop Juozas Žemaitis from Lithuania.

Other activities included serving on the By-laws Committee, helping prepare for the Convention, putting together the Convention Ad Book, and contributing various articles to MOTERY DIRVA.

The Alliance participated in a variety of projects to aid Lithuania. I had a direct hand in some of them. The efforts of the Alliance's own PROJECT: SOAP netted 800 lbs. of soap for Lithuania. Through a joint effort with the American Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation and Lithuanian Catholic Charities, the Alliance Fund donated \$500 towards the purchase of 600 pairs of new children's leather shoes. The actual retail value of these shoes was about \$20,000, but they were purchased for \$2,400. The American Girl Scouts of Riverside, IL also helped out by collecting 100 pairs of new socks to go with the shoe purchase. In a joint effort with Lithuanian Catholic Charities, a sweater drive was undertaken throughout several Lithuanian parishes and a vitamin drive throughout the Lithuanian Saturday Schools. In all, 700 sweaters and 100 bottles of vitamins were collected and delivered to Lithuania. In addition, St. Christina's Rosary Makers, through the efforts of Donna Zilis, have donated 100 rosaries to Lithuania. The Home Office has not been informed of any other projects or joint efforts on behalf of Lithuania that the Alliance undertook outside the Chicago-land area.

Presently in the Alliance there are 24 active Chapters, plus the Home Office Chapter, and a membership of about 800.

#### Treasurer, Vida Sakevičius:

Aside from my duties as treasurer during the past two years, I have had the opportunity to actively participate in various events. I had the honor of being chairman of the 75th anniversary jubilee celebration, which was held at Nativity B. V. M. parish two years ago.

The Chicago District sponsored a soap drive in February, 1990. I headed that project at this parish. We were able to collect 351 pounds at our church.

In May, 1990, Mrs. Grasilia Meilus and I organized a procession in prayer for Lithuania. We had benediction in the church, followed by a procession to the Sisters of St. Casimir grotto, about two blocks away, where the litany was sung.

In September, 1990, our Cardinal Bernardin came back from a visit to Lithuania. Mrs. Meilus and I organized a bus to O'Hare airport to greet him. We presented him with a Lithuanian sash and flowers.

For my latest project, I have the honor and the big job of being your convention chairlady.

We made an audit August 21, 1991 of the Secretary's and Treasurer's books and found them in good order with all accounts balancing.

#### Editor, Dale Murray:

As you already know, this year we are marking the 75th anniversary of our official publication, "Motery Dirva." The very first issue of "Motery Dirva" was published in October, 1916. I regret that I don't have a copy of that first issue, but I brought the next two along to show you. I have had them photocopied to preserve them for the future.

Those of you who heard my report at the last convention will remember that I brought along some of the old copies in my possession, yellowed with age and in some cases, quite brittle. When I became editor in 1955, I was shocked to learn that there are no "Motery Dirva" archives. Since I knew very little about the history of our Alliance before I became a member, I issued a plea to the membership to donate their old copies back to the organization. The response was excellent, but not their condition. Most had been resurrected from damp basements or dry attics and the quality is very poor. The delegates were very supportive and voted that monies from the Special Fund be allocated to preserving past issues of "Motery Dirva."

Photocopying about 50 years worth of magazines will be expensive, but I can't think of anything more worthwhile to spend our money on—the preservation of our history! Hopefully, some good-hearted poeple who have access to copiers could donate their use for some of this work. I would suggest

that rather than use money from the Special Fund, which was especially inaugurated for charitable and cultural projects, that this expense be covered by our regular income and, perhaps, voluntary donations. This will be a time-consuming project and it will take time, but I will undertake the task of seeing that it is done.

As of now, the most complete set is in ALKA American Lithuanian Cultural Archives) in Putnam, CT which was founded by our long-time spiritual director and supporter, the late Msgr. F. Juras. Balzekas Museum in Chicago has been on our mailing list since it was established 25 years ago. I'm not sure whether or not they have any of the older copies. The Research Institute in the Jesuit Center is very willing to accept our materials but, before anything is given away, one complete set must be photocopied and kept by the organization itself. This is history-OUR history! And, as long as we are a viable organization, our history must be part of us. Some day (in the far, far distant future, we hope!) these records will be available for researchers, who will glean much from their pages—not just about our organization, but about the life and times of the immigrant Lithuanian woman and her descendents.

I know there are many members who are concerned about the future without the "Motery Dirva". I never dreamed when I first took on the job that it would last 36 years! I do think a newsletter will serve our organization quite well. I've seen quite a few published by other organizations that are attractive and informative with plenty of space for directives, chapter news and photos.

Since the last convention, I have also been checking into ways in which to bind the copies in the most inexpensive way. I have come upon a perfect solution, this simple plastic holder. You slip the magazine through the holder and place it in a 3-ring binder. There is no need to punch any holes as they are part of the holder and the ma-

gazine can be easily removed and replaced.

There will be two more issues of the "Motery Dirva" before it is officially retired. The September issue may be a bit late as I would like to include the convention minutes. The last one will be the December issue.

Many, many thanks to all who have contributed through the years, especially the chapter correspondents who also became friends. My thanks also to each and every member who took the time to read the "Motery Dirva" from cover to cover, for they are the ones who never need to ask: what is the purpose of Mot. Sąjunga and what are you all about?

Circulation manager's report was postponed until the next session.

The first session recessed for lunch at 12:30 P.M.

#### Second Session

The business of the Convention was resumed at 2:15 P.M.

American-Lithuanian Council report was given by Daina Dumbrys. She is the Alliance representative, as well as treasurer of the Council. Meetings are held once a month. She has had many requests for radio and television interviews about the situation in Lithuania. At the conclusion of her report, Daina answered a variety of questions concerning the status of the Baltic States in light of the most recent events in the USSR.

#### Camp Dainava report:

Sofia Lastas is the Alliance's representative on the Camp Dainava Board of Directors. Camp Dainava celebrates its 35 anniversary this year. She attended several Board meetings. The facilities will be rented out to non-Lithuanians, as well. The new president of the Board is Marius Gražulis. Total donations from the Alliance to Camp

Dainava amounts to \$955.00. Dale Murray moved to send another donation. Roma Kuprys seconded. Motion was carried. Alyce Gegesky moved that the amount be \$100; seconded by Anna Uzdavinis. Motion carried. The sum will come from Convention income.

Dale Murray discussed the format of the Alliance's publication, which will make its debut in March, 1992.

#### CHAPTER REPORTS

#3—Joana Danilevičius reported that the Chapter has two meetings per year and that many of its members work with the American-Lithuanian Council.

#5—Jadvyga Spirauskas reported that the Chapter organized a very successful fashion show. The designer and her clothes, were from Lithuania. There are 96 members in the Chapter.

#17—The report was prepared by sec. Birutė Šimanskis and pres. Helen Stumbers and read by Roma Kuprys. The chapter has two special fundraisers each year, a rummage sale, and homemade sausage sale before Easter. This enables them to donate to various charities, such as the Sisters of St. Francis; the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception; Medical Mercy Lift to Lithuania; ,,Caritas,' BALF, Soap Drive, etc.

#20—Grasilia Meilus reported she has been president for 27 years; their Spiritual Director has been with them for 20 years. Nine meetings are held each year after the Sunday Lithuanian Mass. Their well-received Christmas Eve (Kū-čios) celebration before Christmas is an annual celebration. A collection for the poor children is taken up. Christmas ornaments made from white straws also netted a nice profit. Other fundraisers during the year enabled them to send money to help the Siamese twins from Lithuania, separated here in the U.S.

They also donated to the religious books drive and conducted a successful soap drive. Members also participated in welcoming Chicago's Cardinal Bernardin back from his trip to Lithuania, as well as the reception for Bishop Juozas Žemaitis, visiting from Lithuania.

#33-Mary Geipel reported that the Chapter organizes a Mother's Day cake and coffee, spaghetti dinner, "Kūčios", a raffle, as well as an annual Mass for the deceased members of the Chapter.

#75-Elaine Valentine reported that the chapter is active, has fundraisers for charity and participates in the Chicago district. They will be hosting the fall meeting of the chapter.

The session ended at 3:20 P.M.

#### Third Session

The session was called to order at 9:50 A.M. at the Oak Lawn Holiday Inn. After the opening prayer, roll call, and introduction of a special guest, Irena Skuodis, reports were continued.

#42—Alice Rock gave a very detailed report on membership, activities, charitable donations, etc. Meetings are held monthly. The chapter hosts the coffees after Masses the first weekends in July and August, featuring homemade baked goods. Their most popular events are the annual Christmas party and a very special Mother's Day celebration. All Souls Day is marked with Mass and a gathering at the cemetery for special services. Their biggest moneymaking venture is during the Christmas Festival, where they sell hundreds of "ausukės" (bow-knot cookies), baked goods, etc. There are many prizes and a raffle. This is the biggest moneymaking project. In February they take part in the Lithuanian Independence Day celebration, at Easter they have an egg decorating demonstration; and on St. George's feastday, they honor Bishop Matulaitis with a special memorial Mass. Many members attended the Lithuanian Opera in Chicago and also the festival in Brighton Park. Approximately \$1,000 was donated over the past two years; \$500 was presented to the delegates for convention expenses and a \$75 ad was taken in the convention program book. There were 5 deaths and 4 new memers this year. Total 42 members.

#54—Bertha Janus reported that the Chapter has 65 members. The chapter sponsors an annual Mother's Day Mass, a picnic in August, a catered lunch and card party with the Knights of Lithuania in September. The first Sunday in October is for the intention of the deceased members. Members provide an occasional parish coffee and visit the sick members. Donations were made for the program book, Lith. Reigious Aid, to the parish, BALF, etc. Meetings are held every other month

after Mass on Sunday.

#46—Angela Balchunas, SSC, reported that the Chapter has 24 members. Its meetings are held every two months at the Marian Fathers Monastery with refreshments and prizes afterwards.

#### Connecticut District

The District director's report had been mailed and just received. Em. Šaulienė reported there are five chapters in the district. Ch. 17 Hartford is very active with a membership of 50. There are only 6 members left in Ch. 28, Manchester. They participate in the activities of other chapters. New Haven Chapter 33 has 35 members, some younger, which help keep it active. Ch. 38, New Britain, has 14 members, mostly elderly, and is unable to be active. The same applies to Ch. 57, Waterbury, which has 23 dues paying members. Total District membership 128.

#### **By-Laws Committee**

The By-Laws committee elected at the last convention (1989) includes Emilie Prose, Roma Kuprys, Vida Sakevičius and Aldona Shumway, the latter replaced by Dale Murray. Emilie Prose, chairman, reported that the aim of the committee was to have the By-Laws ready for this convention, but because of the pressure of time and non-availability of the full committee at all times, its presentation to the Board and to the Alliance will be presented at the next bienniel meeting. Mrs. Roberta Giblin (daughter of Sophie Dirzius, Ch. 2) consented to review and help prepare the By-Laws.

Dale Murray indicated that the new name will be Lithuanian-American Roman Catholic Women's Alliance, enacting motion made and carried at the last convention. Roma Kuprys moved that after the By-Laws are reviewed by the Parliamentarian and Board, copies be sent to each chapter for comments and suggestions before the next Convention. Seconded by Elena Šniokas. Motion carried.

There followed discussions on 1) separating the present secretary's job into two parts, i.e., recording secretary and financial secretary; 2) dues, and 3) ideas for attracting new members. In answer to a question raised, it was agreed non-Lithuanians are also welcome to join the Alliance, as long as they understand its purpose and are willing to participate in its function.

The third session was recessed for lunch at 12 noon. The luncheon speaker was Irena Skuodienė, who spoke about the status of women in Lithuania.

#### **Fourth Session**

The session was called to order at 2:30 P.M. Views about the Alliance were exchanged. To the question, "How are the meetings?" the following answers were offered: one per month needed to maintain interest; every second month after the Saturday evening Mass; one per month on Sundays at 2:00 P.M.; sometimes chapters have meetings in each other's homes. It was determined that each chapter should do whatever is practical and convenient for them. Chapter 46 (Chicago) was formed primarily for non-Lithuanian speaking members. Meetings were held at homes, but because members are scattered throughout the city and suburbs, meetings are held at the Marian Fathers Monastery, which is centrally located.

Dale Murray had suggested to the Board that chapters which had enrolled the most new members during the past two years be acknowledged and rewarded. She announced the winners: Chapter 76, St. Petersburg, FL, 15 members; Chapter 68, Kearney, NJ, 10 members; Chapter 3 and Chapter 20, Chicago, IL tied for third with 7 new members each. The chapters will be receiving \$25, \$15, \$10 and \$10, respectively.

The president announced that after reviewing the biographies submitted, the Board unanimously voted to bestow Honorary Membership to Roma Kuprys, Chapter 2, Chicago, IL as she fulfilled all requirements. It was once again stressed that it is very important that a member being recommended for Honorary Membership fulfill ALL requirements. It is particularly important that she be active on the national level and be recognized by her activities by the membership. Activity on the local level is one step; these same members should be encouraged to become active in their districts and on national committees, where good leadership ir so very important and needed.

Dale Murray moved to phase out the Seminarian Fund. Seconded by Margaret Elaine Valentine. Motion carried. Anna Uzdavinis moved to send the money to Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid. Seconded by Anna Šliteris. Motion carried. The check will be earmarked for seminarians in Lithuania.

Roma Kuprys presented some possible projects for Lithuania that Alliance members might wish to contribute to:

- 1) In Chicago at Seklyčia Restaurant and at the Lithuanian World Center, school items and clothes for children up until 16 years of age are being collected for a container which will be delivered to Lithuania's orphans.
- 2) Funds are being solicited to help cure Lithuanian children with orthopedic problems, i.e., scoliosis. The children are brought together with their

mothers to the Shriners Children's Hospitals in the U.S. for free medical care. Funds collected are used for plane fare and living expenses, which amount to \$3,000 per patient. This project, established in Chicago in 1991 by a group of lay people, is called Lithuanian Children's Hope (Vaikų viltis). Fifteen children are awaiting the opportunity to benefit from this project. A 13-year old girl has already been completely cured; a 3-year old boy awaits his turn. This project is an investment in human dignity. More information about this project can be obtained by calling Julija Saulius (1-312-842-8291).

3) Plans for a retirement home are underway in Utena, Lithuania. A request has been made for new sheets (twin size), pillows, sweaters, flannel shirts (large size), slippers, and pajamas for the elderly residents. This home is taken care of by Panevėžys "Caritas," which has about 80 members. Items are being collected at Seklyčia in Chicago.

4) Funds are needed for surgery for the Lithuanian Siamese twins who were joined at the head. Donations can be sent to LITHUANIAN CATHOLIC CHARITIES, 2636 W. 71st St., Chicago, IL 60629.

5) Mercy Lift was organized in Lemont, IL to help send medicines and medical supplies to Lithuania. Funds are needed for transporting these supplies to Lithuania. Donations can be sent to MERCY LIFT, Lithuanian World Center, 511 E. 127th St., Lemont, IL 60439. Delegates were encouraged to promote these good works in their respective parishes and communities.

Irena Skuodienė added the need for warm children's clothing in Lithuania. She noted it would be advisable to ask for a receipt signed by the person accepting the delivery. This session was concluded at 4:15 P.M.

#### **Fifth Session**

The meeting was begun at 10:00 A.M. with a prayer, followed by roll call. 23 members were present.

Convention president, Emilie Prose, expressed thanks to Sabina Henson for the fun-filled tour of Chicago by bus, for the souvenir brochures, and all the extras that went into it.

She announced further that by majority vote, the Outstanding Lithuanian Woman 1991 is Anastazija Tamošaitienė of Canada. Kay Urban moved that \$100 be given to the honoree with the plaque. Margaret Valentine seconded. Motion carried.

A list of donations to be sent from the Convention was compiled: "Draugas" (Lithuanian Catholic Press Society), Chicago; American Lithuanian Cultural Archives, Putnam, CT; and Rev. John Savukynas, M.I.C., Plano, IL for rosary materials and mailing expense. Dale Murray moved that \$50 be donated to each of the above-mentioned. Seconded by Alyce Gegesky. Motion carried.

The following Resolutions were presented to the Convention by The Resolutions Committee, read by Alyce Gegesky, and adopted unanimously:

#### RESOLUTIONS

- Whereas, the delegates of this 44th convention were informed of the serious illness of Julia Mack, Honorary President, and Albina Lipčienė, 2nd Vice-president, Be it resolved that an official letter of concern be sent to Julia Mack and to Albina Lipčienė, wishing them well with our prayers for a speedy recovery;
  - 2. Whereas, the Lithuanian-American

Roman Catholic Women's Alliance applauds and admires the work of CARITAS in Lithuania,

Be it resolved that each Alliance Chapter further intensify its association with CARITAS groups in Lithuania and support them morally, spiritually, and monetarily;

- Whereas, Lithuania is struggling in its pursuit of freedom,
  - Be it resolved that an official letter of concern be sent to President George Bush from the LARCWA, urging him to support the democratically elected government of Lithuania, and the restoration of Lithuania's independence, and not allow Lithuania's fight for democracy and human rights die as these are the same principles that America fought for. We urge you to act NOW to recognize the Landsbergis government;

Further, that a letter be sent to President Landsbergis of Lithuania in appreciation of this courage and determination in all his dealings with the USSR;

- 4. Whereas, the Alliance delegates have convened in Oak Lawn, IL, Be it resolved that this 44th Convention is bestowing Honorary Membership to Roma Kuprys (Chapter 2, Cicero, IL); Furthermore, the LARCWA has chosen Anastazija Tamošaitienė of Canada as 1991 Outstanding Lithuanian Woman of the Year.
- 5. Be it resolved that this 44th Convention express its thanks to the Alliance Board for all its concern and effort shown during their past two-year term, and to Editor Dale Murray, whose editorship for the past 36 years has provided the Alliance membership an informa-

tive MOTERU DIRVA; and to Rev. John Kuzinskas for sharing his views on the life role of mother-hood; and to Rev. Anthony Miciūnas, past Spiritual Advisor, for his greetings and wishes of continued success to the LARCWA.

The Convention extends its deepest gratitude to Vida Sakevičius, chairman of the Convention Committee, to all its members, and the Chicago district for all their efforts and for making the delegates' stay in Chicago a memorable one.


The Secretary and Circulation Manager were asked to exchange members lists to make sure there were no MO-TERU DIRVA copies being sent out un-

It helps me in my struggle, It reproves me when in sin, Its look of gentle patience Rebukes the strife within.


In days of pain and anguish,

## Vyskupo Metinis Suvažiavimas

Vysk. Pauliaus Baltakio Sielovados Tarybos metinis suvažiavimas įvyko 1991 m. gegužės mėn. 25 d. Jaunimo centre, Chicagoje. Po to sekė malda ir vysk. Pauliaus Baltakio žodis.

Rytmečio programa susidarė iš simpoziumo "Išeivija ir Lietuva — jų sielovados ryšiai". Simpoziume dalyvavo J. E. vysk. Juozas Žemaitis iš Lietuvos; kun. Antanas Saulaitis, S.J., iš Chicagos, ir Irena Lukoševičienė iš Kanados. Simpoziumą moderavo Aldona Zailskaitė.

Vysk. Žemaitis kalbėjo apie kai kuriuos sunkumus Lietuvoje. Yra trūkumas techninės ir vaizdinės medžiagos tikybos mokymui. Nėra popieriaus. Vilkaviškio vyskupijoje 25 parapijos yra be kunigų, o Telšių vyskupijoje 70 parapijų yra be kunigų. Taip pat reikalinga naujų pastatų. Vilkaviškio vyskupija net neturi savo katedros - ji buvo sugriauta. Tūkstančiai laukia evangelizacijos, o nėra kur suburti tokias dideles žmonių mases po vienu stogu. Vyskupas davė pavyzdį - Alytaus bažnyčios padėtį. Jos apylinkėje gyvendavo apie 5,000 žmonių, o dabar gyventojų skaičius jau siekia 80,000. Nėra kur patalpinti tiek daug žmonių. Yra daug sunkumų, tačiau žmonės Lietuvoje yra pasiryžę jas nugalėti.

Kun. Saulaitis kalbėjo, kad problemos Lietuvoje yra panašios į problemas visuose atsigaunančiuose kraštuose. Taip pat juose atsiranda daug skirtingų nuomonių. Kun. Saulaitis išvardino ir apibendrino įvairias sritis, per kurias būtų galima padėti Lietuvai — pasaulinė kultūra, Vatikano II suvažiavimo vykdymas, ekumeninė sritis, švietimas ir auklėjimas, tikėjimo patirtis, parapijos ir pastoracinė sritys.

Irena Lukoševičienė kalbėjo apie tai,

ką ji patyrė būdama 10 savaičių Lietuvoje. Žmonėse yra daug baimės ir įtampos. Jie kombinuoja gauti ir jiems nedaug laiko belieka kitiems padėti. Jie taip pat gėdinasi psichinių ir fizinių nesugalavimų. Net nėra įmanoma gauti statistinių duomenų apie psichinius negalavimus Lietuvoje. Lietuvoje yra daug alkoholikių moterų, ypač kaimuose. Tačiau organizacijos kaip "Alcoholics Anonymous" sunkiai kuriasi, nes žmonės nepratę viešai kalbėtis ir išsikalbėti.

Kai kurie vienetai labai gražiai veikia — senelių namai Vilniuje, invalidų vaikų namai Kaune, Patrijos organizacija (medicinos studentai ieško pavienių, neturtingų žmonių ir jiems padeda). Tačiau yra kitų institucijų, kurių stovis yra apgailėtinas. Prelegentės nuomone, išeiviai ir Lietuvoje lietuviai yra tokie patys. Juose yra dvasinis badas — sprendžiama daug ką dolerio verte, specialistai dirba dėl spektaklių.

Po pietų įvyko prel. Juozo Prunskio Krikščioniškos kultūros fondo 1990 metų spaudos premijos įteikimas. Prel. Prunskis įteikė \$2,000 premiją *Aidų* žurnalui. Ją priėmė Kazys Bradūnas.

Po premijos įteikimo buvo tęsiama simpoziumo diskusijų dalis.

Po diskusijų šio rašinio autorei reikėjo išvykti. Pateiktoje dienotvarkėje dar buvo pramatyti vysk. Baltakio pranešimas apie išeivijos sielovadą, praėjusių metų sielovados tarybos rajoninių suvažiavimų protokolai, sielovados tarybos komisijų pranešimai ir diskusijos, gairės ateičiai ir organizaciniai klausimai.

#### **NEW HAVEN**

L. K. Moterų S-gos Connecticut apygardos suvažiavimas įvyko š.m. gegužės mėn. 25 d., New Havene, Šv. Kazimiero parapijos salėje. Jį globojo vietinė 33-čia kuopa. Apygardai priklauso 5 kuopos su apie 140 narių. Suvažiavime dalyvavo 19 atstovių ir viešnių tik iš dviejų kuopų—Hartfordo 17-tos ir New Haveno 33-čios.

New Haveno kuopos pirmininkė Izabelė Peterson pasveikino atvykusias delegates ir palinkėjo darbingo ir sėkmingo suvažiavimo.

Suvažiavimą pradėjo apygardos pirmininkė Albina Lipčienė pasiūlydama darbotvarkę, kuriai visos pritarė.

Šalia kitų einamų reikalų buvo ilgiau apsistota svarstant besiartinančio Sąjungos Seimo klausimą. Paaiškėjo, kad jau ne visos šios Apygardos kuopos yra pajėgios siųsti delegates ne tik į Seimą, bet ir į šį suvažiavimą ir visa darbo našta tenka porai pajėgesnių kuopų. Galutinam rezultate nutarta, kad Connecticut apygardą Seime atstovaus 5 delegatės — iš Hartfordo 17-tos kuopos—Mrs. Alyce Gegesky ir Mrs. Kathryn Urban, o iš New Haveno 33-čios kuopos — Mrs. Albina Lipčienė, Mrs. Mary Geipel ir Mrs. Magdalena Cronin.

Daug kalbėta, svarstyta ir ieškota būdų kaip padėti toms kuopoms, kurių ir narių skaičius ir veikla sumažėjo, kaip Manchester, New Britain ir Waterburio kuopos. Jos dar turi po kelias ar keliolika narių, dar sumoka nario mokesčius, bet dėl stokos sugebančių bei norinčių vadovauti, didesnės veiklos jau neparodo.

Suvažiavimo dalyvių prašoma, apygardos valdyba pasiliko dar vieniems metams. Dabartinę valdybą sudaro: pirmininkė — Albina Lipčienė, vicepirm. — Mary Geipel, sekretorė — Magdalena Cronin, iždininkė — Katherine Philips, ryšininkė—Kathryn Urban ir apygardos direktorė Emilija Šaulienė.

Suvažiavimui pasibaigus, 33 kuopos narės Mary Geipel ir Magdalena Cronin visas pavaišino skaniais pietumis.

Lietuvoje ji yra baigusi drabužių projektavimo mokslus. Jau daug kur dalyvavo su savo kūryba, parodomis, net ir premijų laimėjusi.

Laimos madų parodos nėra tokios,

kokias esame pripratę matyti. Ji naudoja naują metodą, stilių ir puošia sukneles įvairiais ornamentais. Labai tinka vakariniam puošniam priėmimui. Suknelės daugiausia ilgos, bet yra ir trumpesnių. Ilgą stalą nutiesė lininiais kostiumėliais, bliuskutėmis, su kuriais parodos pabaigoje modeliuotojos supažindino publiką, kurios buvo prisirinkusi pilna salė.

Modeliavo R. Ambrozaitienė iš New Jersey, prieš kelis metus atvykusi iš Lietuvos. Kitos modeliuotojos - T. Adomavičienė, B. Miliauskaitė-Harris, Markevičienė — visos iš Worcesterio. Jos modeliavo 26 sukneles. Daugumoje jos ilgos. Jų ir spalva beveik panaši dominuoja violetiniai tamsesni ir šviesesni tonai. Per krūtine ir pečius eina tamsesnis drabužis, o ant jo uždėti šviesūs ornamentai. Suknelių apatinės dalys taip pat dažnai tamsios ir ten uždėti šviesūs ornamentai. Tai pačios Laimos surasta technika. Uždėtosios linijos plonos, su besikartojančia simetrija, ornamentų turtingumu. Dominuoja lapų, gėlių ornamentai. Kai kur buvo įvesti ir lietuviškų kryžių viršūnių ornamentai. Tie drabužiai nieko bendra neturi su lietuvišku stiliumi. Jie tinka visoms, kas pasisavins šią ornamentiką ir jų stilių. Tai nauja ir graži drabužių kūryba, į kurią Laima įdėjo daug širdies ir darbo visa tai projektuodama, tobulindama ir jai pavyko puikiai visa tai atsiekti, pagal jos gyvenimo sąlygas ir įvairius trūkumus Lietuvoje. Tikime, kad Laima su savo drabužių kūryba, stiliumi, ornamentais nueis modeliuoti ir i didžiuosius salonus.

Sekančiais metais Laima žada ir vėl mus iš Lietuvos aplankyti, jeigu sąlygos leis, su madų parodomis, bet jau su nauju stiliumi, naujomis tekstilės medžiagomis, su kuriomis ji šiuo laiku čia viešėdama susipažįsta, o taip pat ir įvairiais dažais, kuriuos įves į savo projektavimo kūrybą. Laimos žodžiais ta-

riant, visokiais būdais reikia garsinti pasaului mūsų Tėvynės Lietuvos vardą. Sėkmės, Laima!

Lietuvių ir anglų kalbomis komentatorė Gema Šermukšnytė labai sklandžiai paaiškino apie kiekvieną modeliuojamą drabužį. Šv. Kazimiero parapijos vargonininkė, kuri taip pat yra sąjungietė A. Walinsky, ne tik laike parodos, bet ir prieš ją, vikriai spaudė pianino klavišus, suteikdama visiems malonią nuotaiką ir sudarydama linksmą atmosferą, o per parodą kiekvieną modeliuotoją įlydėjo į salę ir iš jos išlydėjo aidint švelnios muzikos garsams.

O. Kildišienė, A. Jakniūnaitė ir J. Miliauskienė suorganizavo gražų viešnių ir svečių priėmimą. Vaišino vyneliu, sūriu, pyragaičiais ir kitais skanumynais, o ant baltomis staltiesėmis apdengtų

stalų kvepėjo išdėstytos vazutėse rūtelės ir chrizentemos. Šios taip gražiai pavykusios madų parodos iniciatorė yra kuopos pirmininkė J. Spirauskienė. Tai trečioji madų paroda, suruošta jai esant pirmininke ir į tai ji įdeda daug darbo, triūso ir rūpesčių.
