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### For Parties.

The party season is on! Everyone wants to know what games to play. Here goes:

To take the bareness out of introductions and to put a little nice warm personality and humor in them, each newcomer is given directions by the host or hostess that he is to meet the other guests in a certain manner. For instance, he may be told to be a renchman and when introduced to bow continuously with his hand on his heart, politely and distinctly pronouncing the name of the person to whom he is being introduced. Or he may be a Chinaman, very obligingly shaking his own hand, and rapidly uttering the names.

All the guests present will return their particular from of introduction as they too had been instructed and went through the theatrical performance. This has been work out very successfully, but of course host or hostess have to do some thinking beforehand so as to figure out delightful debutante bows, pretty maiden courtesies, and flattering gallant speeches for some dashing beaux who will have to make heart-fluttering remarks to every girl introduced.

When things are pretty quiet and the hostess does not know how to liven the party, she may suggest that each one think of something to do, and that soon all will know who is the brightest of the group. Each person will perform an act, which should be as clear as possible of what he has in mind; he will announce that it is P. O. (peeling onions), or T. P. Then let the hand shaking go on for a while, about three or five minutes. After that the IT people will tell which persons were the thirteenth or whatever number, it was who shook hands with them, and these "thirteenth" shakers will receive the prizes.

Here's a game that only one person at a party should know. He tells all that there

is a very fine club that all may join if they can say the passwords correctly. He tells them to say "You without Me" in the exact manner that he tells them to. One after another, he will approach and tell them to say "You without Me", using a low, or high, or squeaky tone, which change of voice can be very amusing as the one approached will pipe out in some high pitch "You without Me."

Of course, he will claim that each one does not do exactly what he tells them and cannot be admitted to the club. Finally, some person is bound to realize the joke and when approached will say just "You" and leave off the "without Me."

One game that is actually hilarious, but cannot be very well played at all parties, is the following. It is necessary to find two persons who will be willing to act as the "hungry blind". Seat them on the floor either facing each other or side by the side; they have to be close together. Cover up their clothing with newspaper or something, but that depends on the food. Blind — fold them, and then they are to start feeding each other with the ice cream or whatever food is furnished. Not only the onlookers but they themselves will enjoy the difficulty in finding the other's mouth. Articles like nuts may be used, but when it is something eaten with a spoon, it is more fun.
