Kas seka Europoj?
Lietuva, Lenkija ar Rumunija bus sekanti agresijos aukta? Tai dažniausias klausimas šiandien. Daug nusiminimo, nusivylimu.
Kad tik Anglijos ir Francijos žmonės greičiau pilnai pamatytų savo valdžių politiką—jų gryną veidą.

Ne fašizmo galybė, nėgi demokratijos silpnybė teikia nusiminimo, bet vylytinga, pragaištinga politika Londono ir Paryžiaus valdony.

Ką gi Vokietija turi? Maisto stoka, žaliavos nėra. Aukso rezervas tik \$174,000,000, kuomet Francija turi \$2,435,000,000. Anglija apie du bilijonus.

Už ką Vokietija piktus karų reikmenis? O juk ji neturi kokiems metams pragimams, nes neturi iš ko gamintis.

Agresoriai vengia karo. Jie puola tas vietas, kurias be karo gali gauti.

Jie nori sudaryti tokį supratimą namie ir užsieny, kad jie gali, kad jų jėga bijo.

Ponas Chamberlain ir jo berniukas Georges Bonnet jiems padeda.

Lietuva padarius "besąlyginę sutartį" su Vokietija.

Sąlyginė ar besąlyginė sutartis su nazių totalitarizmu, mircia—jei tik žini, vėtraigi.

Sovietų Sąjunga pasiūlė sudarymą bloko, net militarinį sutarimą, prieš agresorius. Padarius tai, jiems būtų smogta miršta. Manote Londonas sutiks? Nerūks tų baikių.

Jie savą pasiūlė—be dantų propoziciją.

Be demokratijos viltys dar nežūge. Pats faktas, jog Anglija visgi pagalius kreipė prie Sovietų Sąjungos yra svarbus.

Kad ir silpnas Anglijos pasiūlymas, bet jis gali sustiprėti, jei tik Londonas nestrakurs ir nuo jo.

Reikia taipgi žinot, kad Sovietų Sąjunga ir Jungtinės Valstijos nesugriauama siena prieš fašizmą.

Lenkijos valdonai tęsia savo politiką—iš ko daugiau gaus. Varšavos tonai gavę Anglijos pasiūlymą, puojau pareiškė, kad jiems reikia \$75,000,000. Seniau jie taip su Francija darė.

Be Lenkijos laudis vis labiau brūzda, kelia demonstracijas, kyla prieš nazius.

Čekoslovakijos karta lekičia rodos turėjo visus pamokint, bet Lietuvos valdžia kartoją tą pačią klaidą.

Yra žmonių, kurie rodos nori būti apgauti.

Tam, žinoma, yra savos priežastys.

Japonija padarė su Vokietija ir Italija "kultūrinę sutartį."

Bene susitarė vienodai deginti knygas, naikinti kultūrą ir mokslą.

Užvakar Chicagojo buvo didelis ALK mitingas Klaipėdos klausimu. "Naujienos" nė žodžio nesakė apie tą mitingą, tik kada pamatė, kad ir angliška spauda rašo, jos užsiuolė valdybą, kad joms nieko nepranešė.

ANGLIJA ŽADA SPEKĄ VARTOTI UŽPUOLIKAMS

Grasinimas Karu Vienas Budas Hitleri Suvaldyt

VARŠAVA.—Lenkų valdžia vis dar spiriasi nuo susitarimo su Anglija, Francija ir Sovietų Sąjunga, būk delto, kad sutartis siūloma persiūpa. Manoma, tačiau, kad Juozas Bekas nenori su Hitleriu persiskirti.

MASKVĀ.—SSSR sutiko padaryti keturių valstybių deklaraciją prieš nazių agresiją, Anglijai ir Francijai padarius rastišką viena kitai užtikrinimą paramos prieš nazių atakas vakaruose.

Sovietų valdžia, tačiau, sykiu įteikė ir reikalavimą, kad pasitarimai tuojau įvyktų. Manoma, kad Raudonosios Armijos vadai sykiu su francūzų ir angly armijų vadais tuojau tarsis su Lenkijos armijos viršyloimis.

Paryžius.—Čionai manoma, kad suvaldyti Hitlerį butina pagrasinti jį karu, šiap įspėjimų jis nepaiso. O tam reikalinga militarinio susitarimo.

Moskva.—Čionai manoma, kad irgi skaitoma svarbiu kovos karta, irgi skaitoma svarbiu kovos karta. Tas J. V. žygis Francijoje pakėlė upą.

TIK MILITARINE SPEKA TESULAIKYS NAZIUS.

LONDONAS, kovo 24.—Premieras Chamberlain sakė parlamentui, jog Anglijos vyriausybė sutiksianti ir militarinę spēkų vartoti sulaukymui tolimosio nazių grobimo mažesnių šalių.

Anglijos ir Francijos valdžios tuojau šauks nefasistinių šalių konferenciją bendrai akcijai prieš Vokietijos agresiją. Tam prieš juodvi turi susitariti su Sovietų Sąjunga; be pastarosios pritarimo konferencija nebutų efektyvė, nes abi šios valdžios jau neturi pasitikėjimo, po Čekoslovakijos išdavystės.

Varšavos dariniai sako, jog Lenkijos vyriausybė vis dar spiriasi nuo keturių valstybių susitarimo, buk delto, kad nieko konkretaus nesilomsa.

AMERIKOS KLIPERIS PRADEŠ KELIONE PER ATLANTIKĄ SIANDIEN.

Washington, D. C.—Pan-American Airways leis pirmą syk per Atlantiką savo didelį orlaivį, "Yankee Clipper", kuris gali gabenti 47 pasažierius. Jis lėks pietini keliu—per Horta ir Azores salas, per Portugaliją į Franciją.



Moskva.—Sovietų valdžios raieliuose nepasireiškė nusistebėjimo dėl Klaipėdos naziams atidavimo, nes tas buvo galima tikėtis. Sovietai tačiau suinteresuoti sekanti Hitlerio žygiu.

Jeį jis eis į rytus, atsiminti į tvirtų Sovietų Sąjungos sieną.

Lenkai Socialistai Išstojo Prieš Nazius

Varšava, kovo 24.—Pulka socialistų ir kitų anti-nazių demokratų Varšavos svarbiose gatvėse kuomet valdžia vis tesipiria nuo dėjimosi į bloką prieš Hitlerio agresiją.

Demonstrantai protestavo prieš Klaipėdos naziams atidavimą.

Valdžia bijo ir nazių veikimo, tai matosi iš areštavimo S. Larkievičiaus, kuris stoja už Lenkijos susitarimą su Vokietija.

JAPONŲ ORLAIVIS DINGO.

Tokio.—Pasazierinis japonų orlaivis, su 12 žmonių, jau 10 valandų kaip dingęs. Jis turėjo lėkti per Chihli jūros įlanką.

Klaipėdos Pagrobimas Bus Nuostolis Amerikos Prekybai

Washingtonas, kovo 24.—Komercijos departamentas mano, kad Klaipėdos atėmimas nuo Lietuvos gali padaryti nuostolius bent \$300,000 Jungtinių Valstijų prekybai su Lietuva.

Tiek Lietuvai budavo išvežama produktų iš Amerikos.

Tarp Skaldytojų Busiūs Naujas Skilimas

Detroit, Mich.—Homer Martino neskaitytam buri, kuris skaldo UAW uniją, čion dideli kivičiai. Konservatyvus elementas nori išmesti lauk Lovestono pasėkėjus, kurie savo politika vien demoralizuoja darbininkus.

Pats Martinas yra lovestonietis.

ANGLŲ MISIJA MASKVOJ.

Maskva.—Anglijos Prekybinė Misija, kurios galva yra Robert S. Hudson, atvyko vakar. Ji pradės derybas padinimui tarp Anglijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos prekybos.

Delegacija buvo sustojus ir Varšavoje. Originaliai žūdėta ir Berlyne sustoti, bet nesustojė.

Sovietų spauda prielankiai pasiūlo misiją, bet reikiškia abejonių, kad Anglijos pasiūlymai prieš agresiją, daug verti. Abejojama, kad Anglija keis savo užsienio politiką.

Sovietai ruošiasi apsigynimo karui. Leningrade 25,000 darbininkų demonstravo gatvėse su guso maskomis.

Mes, Chicagojos lietuviai, susirinkę į masinį mitingą, sušauktą ALK Chicagojos skyriaus kovo 22 d., skaičiuje 2,000 žmonių, griežtai protestuojame prieš sutikimą atiduoti Vokietijai Klaipeidos kraštą, nes tas pastatė į rimtą pavojų visos Lietuvos nepriklausomybę.

Mes reikalaujame, kad dabartinė Lietuvos vyriausybė ir Antanas Smetona, kaip prezidentas, tuojau pasitrauktų ir užleistų viltą koalicinei vyriausybei, sudarytai iš visų demokratinų partijų.

Taipjau reikalaujame ginti Lietuvos žemę visa turima jėga ir numaoma pagelba, jei Vokietijos armija kėsinsis į ją grobti.

LIETUVOS VALDŽIA PADARIUS 'BESĄLYGINĖ' NEUTRALUMO SUTARTI SU HITLERIO VALDŽIA

Washingtonas Pasmerkė Klaipėdos Pagrobimą; Lietuva Negali Tikėtis Saugumo Nepriklausomybei iš Nazių

BERLYNAS, kovo 24.—Čion paskelbta, jog Lietuvos vyriausybė pasicėsis su Hitlerio vyriausybe "besąlyginę" neutralumo sutarti, kuri yra dalis sutarties stiduoti Vokietijai Klaipėdos kraštą.

Ta sutartis buk užtikrina Lietuvai Klaipėdos uosto laisvą naudojimą.

Pats svarbiausias punktas tos sutarties, tai kad Lietuva patenka Vokietijos politikos įtakon.

Sulyg tos sutarties, nė vienas šalis nekariaus prieš kitą, nėgi parems kitus kariaujančius bilykurijų.

(Suprantama, tas neužims Vokietijai pasigrobtį Lietuvą, kaip ji pasigrobė Čekoslovakiją, davus anai dar geresnius užtikrinimus).

Lietuvai užtikrina liuosas gelžkeliais vežimas savo produktų Vokietijai, bet tai tik paviršutiniai viliojantis dalykas. Juk kada Lietuva parduos savo produktus kam, tai ne jos rupestis kaip lie produktai bus išvešti.

Taipgi ir iš Čekoslovakijos vežami produktai bus aptaknuoti kaip ir Vokietijos—specialiu 27% mokesniu, kaipo ekonomini sankcija, ar lausmė Vokietijai.

Washingtonas, kovo 24.—Jungtinių Valstijų valdžia vakar pasmerkė Hitlerio valdžią už pasigrobimą Klaipėdos, bet tas pasigrobimas jau imama kaipo faktas.

Sumner Welles, valstybės sekretoriaus padėjėjas, kuris dabar eina paties sekretoriaus Hull pareigas, sako spēka pagrobimas Klaipėdos yra smerktinas, ir nors tai jau skaitoma įvykiusiu faktu, formalio pripažinimo Klaipėdos Vokietijai nelėsius daryta.

Jis taipgi pareiškė, kad iš Klaipėdos įvežami produktai į Ameriką neturės pirmenybės, kaip pirmiau. Jie taipjau bus aptaknuoti.

Taipgi ir iš Čekoslovakijos vežami produktai bus aptaknuoti kaip ir Vokietijos—specialiu 27% mokesniu, kaipo ekonomini sankcija, ar lausmė Vokietijai.

Protesto Paradas Prieš Čekoslovakijos Pagrobimą

New Yorkas, kovo 24.—Šėštadienį įvyks didelis paradas, demonstracija prieš Vokietijos grobimą Čekoslovakijos.

Sudaryta Taryla Kovai Prieš Nazius. Ji sako, kad dalyvaus demonstracijoj apie 50,000 žmonių.

Dalyvaus kongresmanas Vito Marcantonio, operos dainininkas Lawrence Tibbett ir judėjį aktorius Frederick March.

Rooseveltas Ignoravo Etiopiją Kaip Italijos Dalį

Washington, D. C., kovo 24.—Primdamas Italijos naują ambasadorių, prezidentas Rooseveltas, atlikdamas formalumus, pasakė: "Man amagu priimti jusų dokumentus jo didenybės karaliaus."

Italai prie to prikerioga—"ir Etiopijos imperatoriaus."

Neminėjimas Etiopijos formaliam priėmimė valstybės atstovo rodo nenorą pripažinti Italiją Etiopijai.

CHEMIKĖ NUMIRĖ.

Menton.—Garsi Francijos chemikė Arvil De Sainte Croix, mirė sulaukus 83 metų. Jinai yra buvus Amerikoje ir laikius lekičjas Chicago ir New Yorko universitetuose.

There seems to be a veiled warning that the next step would be the occupation of Lithuania or perhaps enforcing upon her a "protectorate."

Upon the capitulation of the Lithuanian government officials, the Lithuanian Military forces rapidly evacuated Memelland, leaving it to the uniformed

President Antanas Smetona presided over the Cabinet meeting.

After a conference between the Polish ambassador and the Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax was insisting that Great Britain should include safeguarding Lithuania against aggression.

EDITORIALS

A short time has elapsed since the Munich agreement was signed by the Four Powers, which was to have guaranteed the frontiers of Czechoslovakia.

The present march of Hitler into Czechoslovakia was the natural outcome of the Munich agreement and was expected by diplomats with common sense in all countries. Mr. Chamberlain claims that he was not aware of such action by Germany.

Cornered by world events Mr. Chamberlain excuses himself for the sell-out of Czechoslovakia at Munich by informing the people of Great Britain that the gentlemen's agreement in Munich was not in writing; although Mr. Chamberlain expected Mr. Hitler to carry it out.

Furthermore, Chamberlain in defending his position states, "In our opinion this situation was altered radically as soon as the Slovak diet declared the independence of Slovakia. The effect of this declaration was to put an end by internal disruption to the state whose frontiers we proposed to guarantee."

Adding insult to injury Mr. Chamberlain blames Chamberlain did not hear the complaints of these people that for the last four months Nazi police agents have been honeycombing their country. That these Nazi agents sent to Czechoslovakia by Hitler were the instigators of all the internal strife and disruption.

The basis of Chamberlain's speech and in which he went to the greatest lengths to justify his part in the Munich betrayal. Imagine the nerve of the man who tries to convince his listeners that he had faith in Hitler's lying promises. He would was fooled.

Because of the popular opposition and resentment of the British people, Chamberlain announces the withholding of the balance of the loan to the Czech government. Where is the Czech government, to whom the loan can be given? Maybe, Mr. Chamberlain has in mind to turn over that money to "The dictator," which has been installed by Hitler, over the Czechs. No doubt Hitler could use that money for his campaign to get Germany's pre-war colonies from Great Britain and France.

Mr. Chamberlain claims to have objected to Hitler's seizure of Czechoslovakia, but only on the grounds that as a signer of the Munich agreement, he was not informed of these intentions. We have yet to learn what part was actually played by Chamberlain in Hitler's armed invasion of Czechoslovakia. The Premier's supposed ignorance of what was going to happen does not give us that understanding when we regard his behavior in parliament two days before he changed his tune, if not his line.

The Chicago Daily News London correspondent, William E. Stoneman, on March 16th cabled to his paper the following: "By their complacency during the last few days the members of the British government have indicated their belief that the extinction of Czechoslovakia was a normal and inevitable event that was bound to be expected."

Chamberlain desired this end, and he expected it. But he did not foresee the indignation and resentment that would break when the world learned about it.

No doubt Mr. Chamberlain does not hear the new threats already being made by Hitler. It is only a question of time when these threats will become a reality if Hitler is not stopped now!

The Foreign Minister Juozas Urbys of Lithuania and Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop are having a series of negotiations concerning the city of Memel, which Hitler wants to take next.

The Soviet Union has proposed a nine power conference, which may include the Balkan states, to draft a common policy against Hitler's moves.

The Soviet Union is an outstandly ally for peace and is always ready to work hand in hand with all those desires of peace.

"By having all groups represented and, in addition, having the young people affected voicing their own ideas, we will actually come to grips with the problem and get down to brass tacks," Artman declares.

Outstanding authorities scheduled to speak are Dean Ernest O. Melby of Northwestern University's School of Education; Dr. Ralph Wakefield, president of the Chicago Church Federation; Professors E. W. Burgess and Paul Douglas of the University of Chicago and Dr. William H. Johnson, superintendent of Chicago schools.

More than 500 delegates are expected which will represent 31 Chicago agencies.

Russians Honor Darwin

The famous expounder of the evolutionary theory has earned great praise in Russia. His book on the origin of the species is especially noted.

The Soviet Union has published 1,700,000 copies of books by Darwin and by others propagating his teachings.

The Soviet government has established a museum in his honor and bearing his name for the purpose of popularizing Darwinism. This museum specializes in exhibits illustrating the evolution of living organisms.

In the Biological Museum, Soviet scientists have made special exhibits which are devoted to "the role of labor in the process of transforming the ape into man."

The Institute of Physiology of the All-Union Academy of Sciences, has devoted much time in research on problems growing out of the Darwin theory.

The Soviet Government has appropriated 2,400,000 rubles for the maintenance of the Pavlov Laboratories of Evolutionary Physiology.

Darwin's teachings are not only propagated but also protected in the Soviet Union.

A member of the Academy of Sciences, Prof. Berg, an "exponent of anti-Darwinist theory of monogenesis," was withdrawn from the Academy.

Surveys on Child Psychology

ENVIRONMENT AND HEREDITY

The Iowa University authorities have started discussion of child mentally through environment. George D. Stoddard, director of child's welfare research at the university gives reference to two groups of psychologists; the first maintaining that intelligence is a heredity, which you are born with and that no matter what you do as to changing your environment, your entire growth will depend upon the hereditary factors.

There are other psychologists, which are growing in numbers, although admitting that heredity has a powerful influence upon the child's ability; what happens to the child after he is born is also very important.

CHILD OF THE ORPHANAGE

Taking for instance when a child grows up in an orphanage, where there is little chance of learning, where discipline is severe, with no cultivation of love and respect. These children with very little exception are not as bright as the children who have homes, with the love of their parents, leading a good social and educational life; having the friendship of the children of the neighborhood and participating in the children's social life of the community.

Evidence in this respect through research has found that children adopted from the orphanage by good foster parents tend to become as bright as other children.

EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS

Early schooling has its effects upon the child, it is to the child's advantage to have him placed in a good nursery school as early as 2 to 3 years of age.

Strong and healthy children are not always the brightest, although they do have the advantage.

Dr. Stoddard gives a few suggestions as to how to rear brighter children.

SUGGESTIONS FOR REARING CHILDREN

For the rearing of brighter children you should start with the infant, and that it is essential that the child gets good nourishment and medical attention. It is very natural if a child has an ear defect, that his ability to speak will be greatly hampered.

A child should be encouraged to lead a healthy social life, participating in games, especially those involving other children. In the pre-school age, he should experience with "toy" and "taking him on small trips, etc.

One of the most essential points in rearing children is to give them a home atmosphere of affection and security.

This of course will not absolutely guarantee a bright child but it will increase his chances. Parents and teachers have a good chance to improve the child's mentality, if of course, he is not a medical case.

WPA APPROPRIATIONS

It is interesting to read an article on what can be done for the children who are born today, that is if you have the money to provide the environment, medical care and nourishment.

But too often, this is where the shortcoming is. With the present conditions of unemployment; with the Tory Congressmen demanding the slash of the \$150,000,000 WPA appropriations. The working people of America are more and more faced with insecurity and inability to provide for their children.

One million WPA workers will have to be discharged from Government projects. This will mean that a million workers and their families will be thrown out of jobs to shift for themselves. They cannot find work in private industries. The relief rolls are already being cut because of cuts in appropriations. How will it be possible for them to give their children the security, nourishment and medical attention.

WAGNER'S HEALTH PROGRAM

At this session of congress a bill has been introduced by Senator Wagner for the appropriation of \$800,000,000 for the Nations Health bill for the country. The Congress up to date has not seen the necessity of appropriating this amount to be used for medical clinics all over the country. But instead, the Tories have leashed a vicious campaign against this enormously important Wagner National Health bill. This campaign is for the purpose of swindling the American people out of a measure which makes a substantial step toward meeting the health needs of the common people.

Our daily task is to let our congressmen know what we want of them; we must keep them informed as to the bills we want enacted, and that we wish their cooperation in seeing that these bills are not pigeonholed for later consideration, but that they are brought before the house and immediately acted upon.

Czech Minister Refuses to Surrender Legation

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Czechoslovakian Minister Vladimir Hurban refuses to surrender his legation to the Nazi government. The reason for his action on the part of Hurban is that Hitler's annexation of the Czech nation to Germany is "unconstitutional."

Mr. Urbon refused to put up the swastika over the legation and said that the Czech constitution specifically stated that it was not possible to make any territorial changes without approval of the national assembly. President Hacha did not have the power to hand over the Czech republic to Hitler.

"The president or the government is not empowered by the constitution to cede any part of Czechoslovakia," he said grimly. "The agreement signed in Berlin on March 15, therefore, is not valid."

Hurban stated that, no one will force him to act against the law and he feels it his duty to keep the legation open as such.

Dr. Chvalkovsky had informed him by radiogram that he should surrender the legation and consulate to Germany's diplomatic representatives.

"This morning," he said, "I informed the Minister of Foreign Affairs in Prague by cable that I do not recognize President Hacha's capitulation to Hitler as valid inasmuch as it is unconstitutional."

Minister Hurban may be able to remain indefinitely at the legation in the case that the United States does not recognize the Czech republic as part of Ger-
