New York, N. Y.—The far reaching cry of "Free Earl Browder!", noted labor leader and secretary of the Communist Party of the United States, gains momentum. Mr. Browder was imprisoned for a term of five years on a flimsy passport technically.

Roosevelt Calls For Speedy Aid To Nazi Battling Red Army

WASHINGTON, D. C.—President Roosevelt urged immediate increase in aid to the Soviet Union, this week. Meeting in conference the President told the convened group that immediate and substantial war supplies are to be rushed to the Soviet government.

Administration quarters are urging modification of the neutrality act to facilitate the much needed assistance to the Soviets. The Nazi armies have most of Europe's industries from which they can replenish their materials, whereas the Soviet Union must rely on industry which though great cannot compete with the Nazis.

From the meeting came reports that the United States merchant fleet will soon be armed and able to deliver goods to ports in war proclaimed zones. The feeling is that Hitlerism must be crushed, regardless of the cost.

Vice President Wallace, Speaker Rayburn, Senate Majority Leader Barkley, House Majority Leader McCormack, Senate Foreign Relations Chairman Connally, Representative Woodrum (D.) of Virginia and Representative Cannon (D.) of Missouri, were among the legislative group called in by the President.

The American and British missions intent on bolstering the Russian defense against the Germans have agreed in London that Soviet forces urgently need war supplies.

Lord Beaverbrook, British minister of Supply, who heads his nation's mission, already is in Moscow. W. Averell Harrison was leading the American group there for first-hand conference with the Russian high command.

Students In Kaunas Defy Nazis; Support Roosevelt-Churchill

BERNE, Switzerland.—Hundreds of students in the city of Kaunas, Lithuania were arrested and imprisoned by the Nazi authorities. Following the declaration of the eight point Churchill-Roosevelt peace program, students demonstrated en masse in support of the declaration. They paraded down the main street attempting to arrive at the War Museum (Karo Muziejus) wherein the remains of Lithuania's Unknown Soldier lies. A mass meeting of sympathy was to open here in defiance of the Nazi authorities, and an expression for a free Lithuania, free from Nazi domination, an ideal for which Lithuania's Unknown Soldier died for, voiced. Bayonet laden storm troopers rushed the massed students, killed many and arrested others.

TERRORISTS UTILIZED

A terrorist Lithuanian political party consisting of those that fled the New Lithuania, aided the Nazis in smashing the demonstration. These elements are being utilized to the greatest degree, because of their capability to understand Lithuanian and having been Nazi agents in the ranks of Lithuanians prior to occupation.

The act of the students is an expression of Lithuanian sentiment as regards the Nazi occupation. It is reported that they flaunted openly the authorities installed. Lithuanian 5th Columnists, come in for more disrespect than the Nazi legions. They are spit and cursed upon. Violence because of this, has flared spasmodically. Several shootings of Lithuanian-Nazis has been acknowledged.

Walls and buildings sides have been painted in Kaunas with luminous V slogans. Several students were imprisoned and since have been unheard from, because of their participation.

Mutterings of deep discontent arises from civilians. Food is scarce and the means of livelihood limited. More and more males are "transferred" to inner Germany to work the industries producing war material. Prostitution abolished under the Soviets, is again returning. Hardships and misery is the principal reason.

Newspapers involved in the dissemination of this anti-democracy, pro-Nazi material are: The Lithuanian Daily News (Naujienos), The Daily Friend (Draugas) and Youth, (Jaunimas). The three publications are issued in Chicago.

The content of material that is published, reveals an attempt to

intimidate, if not to terrorize; Lithuanian-Americans from supporting President Roosevelt's policies of all-out aid to Great Britain and the Soviet Union and subtly threatens reprisals against relatives in the homeland.

HAIL HITLER

Inherent in all the pro-Nazi series that have so far appeared, is the glorification of Adolph Hitler "as the savior of Lithuania." The newspapers involved, have gone to the extent of running these articles on the front page with large streamers in order to "impress Lithuanian-Americans."

The subtle reprisal threat becomes evident in the publishing of names of individuals who were "disloyal" and a notation on their imprisonment.

Lithuanian-Americans throughout the nation have become incensed over the dissemination of this Nazi propaganda. Considerable evidence of the coercive activity of the mentioned newspapers and the men behind them is being collected. "We'll be damned if we allow these individuals to coerce Lithuanian-Americans into becoming traitors to the United States," say noted Lithuanians.

SUPPORT OF GROUPS

Trade unions, youth organizations, Lithuanian organizations, fraternal societies, embracing many language groups in this country, professional and business organizations, are being drawn into the campaign to free Hitler's enemy from prison.

Turning to the organizational steps the committee was taking, Weinstein said that a fund drive was getting under way and branches of the Citizens' Committee to Free Earl Browder were being established in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia and other important cities.

FARMERS TAKE STEPS

The drive is reaching the farmers of the United States, he continued. A preliminary conference of farm organization members had already discussed this phase of the drive.

The Legion Deals a Blow To Appeasers

A proper and needful step in defense of the country was taken when the national convention of the American Legion in Milwaukee went on record in support of President Roosevelt's foreign policy and urged national unity for the defeat of Hitler.

This action will be hailed by the American people as expressing their real sentiments and corresponding to their true national interests.

The convention, on the foreign policy issue, dealt a major defeat to the appeasers and Hitler's friends in general. In view of the fact that Hitlerites took the floor during the proceedings to argue for their disloyal appeasement policies, the action of the convention is all the more significant. These pro-Hitler spokesmen were routed by a unanimous vote, the delegates registering the developing sentiment among the American people for all-out unity and vigorous action against Hitlerism.

The convention did not adopt a passive attitude toward the role of this country in crushing Hitlerism. It took the position that the country must be prepared to stamp out the rattlesnakes in their lair. "Our present national objective," the convention stated, "is the defeat of Hitler and all he stands for and all diverting controversies should be subordinated to the main objective. We appeal for national unity on this national objective." Further, it called for the repeal of the Neutrality Act, and urged lifting of all geographical limitations on the use of American troops in the nation's defense.

"If fighting is necessary to defend the United States, we insist upon being prepared to do the fighting outside of the United States . . . to meet any attack before it arrives and turn the enemy back."

The appeasers count heavily upon their anti-Soviet standers to promote Hitler's game of splitting national unity. But the Legion dealt this a setback when the convention defeated a resolution denying aid to the Soviet Union under the lend-lease law.

The stand of the Legion convention will strengthen the hand of the Administration in carrying out its foreign policy and in battling the sabotage of the appeasers. The convention recognized the peril to our country and met the situation in a constructive manner. It is to be hoped that all the trade unions, which have the greatest stake in the annihilation of Hitlerism and the defense of the country, will, in the near future, meet the question of foreign policy as clearly as did the Legionnaires.

Lithuanian-Americans applaud the vigorous stand taken by the American Legion. Once and for all the rotten Lithuanian Hitler agents, a counter-part of the general appeasement forces in America, will together with their allies withdraw into their stench ridden sewer of Hitlerism, like the rattlesnakes they are. All-out aid against Nazism moves ahead!

As We See It In Lith Circles

SERGEANT YORK

In speaking of the appeasers in this country and their activity, Sergeant Alvin C. York, American hero of World War I said "they ought to be shut up by throwing them square in jail—today, not tomorrow.

"We can't risk our freedom, our country, listening to them," York said. "When we all know full well that they're either looking through rose-colored glasses or they're downright nazi inclined—and one is about as dangerous as another."

York struck a truetime when he spoke these words. For us Lithuanian-Americans it's important to know about those that threaten our safety.

York spoke about appeasers generally. He named Colonel Lindbergh and Senator Gerald Nye as their leaders. Probably if he had the opportunity he could have named off other names.

Included in that category would be some of our Lithuanians. Lithuanians who are agitating for no good reason but to lead the masses of Lithuanian-Americans down the camp of appeasement and Hitlerism.

Spouting typical pro-nazi phrases, these Lithuanians with connections on the America First Committee are forwarding their plot to stifle Lithuanian-American thought—to drug them mentally, to obsess them with a false sense of security.

How rapid were these same individuals just prior to the nazi invasion of the Soviet Union, to elaborate to great lengths about "the terror and oppression of Lithuania by Reds." Now however, now that the Hitler terror has seized Lithuania, murdered and shot thousands, imprisoned hundreds—now, how quiet they remain. One might think that Lithuania was not even scarred, not even involved in the bestial conquest of the Hitler hordes.

As a matter of fact, these individuals are proud that Hitler has invaded Lithuania. "Jaunimas", the supposed "Lithuanian" english tabloid brought out this fact in an obvious sense when it stated in one issue words to the effect of "... three cheers for Adolph Hitler". It was a bad mistake on the part of "Jaunimas" editors to have done so. Had they been as cagey as "Naujienos" or "Draugas", the reputation of the paper would not have blighted as soon as it was.

It is a known fact that the three newspapers, "Naujienos", "Draugas" and "Jaunimas" have a working agreement. The three of them utilize "news" from Lithuania. That news is relayed by Pranas Ancevicus, the nazi Lithuanian spy and stoopigee.

Any person with common sense, anybody who has read and knows of Nazi atrocities knows that only trusted friends of Hitler are allowed to dispatch news from any conquered area. Ancevicus is such person. In his dispatches about Lithuania, the rosiest hue is painted. Lithuania is now a paradise under Hitler. War? What war? Hitler was welcomed with open arms by the Lithuanians. As for the Bolshevicks, they killed, tortured, raped, maimed, burned, slew, castrated, etc., etc.

The editors of the involved newspapers know that Ancevicus is a Hitler agent. They know that all his dispatches are propaganda and authorized by the nazis. Yet, knowing all this, they utilize every one of them. And in doing this, proclaim themselves for nazism, for Hitlerism, for the type of government you, I, and every Lithuanian-American despise. They are proclaiming and supporting a government which our nation, our administration, our President has said "Must be defeated at all costs if democracy is to survive."

We agree wholeheartedly with Sergeant Alvin York when he stated that enemies of America "ought to be shut up by throwing them in jail—today, not tomorrow." "Naujienos", "Draugas", and "Jaunimas" are such enemies. Not are they only enemies of Lithuanian-Americans, but enemies of the state. The longer they exist and disseminate their pro-nazi propaganda, the more danger they present to our national defense. Certainly if they have gone to the extent of using actual nazi propaganda, what is to prevent them from issuing a call for acts of sabotage and espionage in order to aid nazism in more concrete form?

EVERY Lithuanian-American must be forewarned in advance on nazi tactics. These catchy phrases are the same that were used across the sea and which aided Adolph Hitler to



conquer a good part of Europe. These same phrases were launched by the 5th column of the conquered nations. The same effort is being launched here.
