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Mato Medį, Bet Miško Nemato

Airijos premieras Eamon de Valera smarkiai užprotestavo dėl Amerikos Ekspedicinės Armijos atvykimo šiaurinėn Airiją. Jis sako, kad tuomi suaužytas Airijos neutralitetas. Jis užsiritęs ir dėl to, kad siūsdama savo ekspedicinę armiją Amerika nepasirūpino gauti iš jo leidimą.

Savo protestą Airijos valdžia remia tuo, kad šeši apskrčiai, kurie sudaro šiaurinę Airiją, nėra inkorporuoti į Airijos valstybę, bet yra po Anglijos valdžia.

Kad ne visa Airija yra sulietta į vieną politinį organizmą, tai Anglijos kaltė. Tas airių reikalavimas, kad ir tie šeši šiauriniai apskrčiai būtų priskirti Airijai yra teisėtas reikalavimas.

Bet ar iš jo reikia išvada, kad šiame demokratiškų kraie prieš Hitlerizmą Airija turi teisės atsukti nugarą demokratišioms?

De Valeros protestas padarys labai gero įspūdžio Berlyne, bet jis padarys prastą įspūdį visame demokratišame pasauly.

Jeigu Hitleris laimėtų karą, tai Airija būtų jo, o de Valera būtų Quislingas. Sielodamas dėl to mažo krašto, kurį sudaro tie šeši apskrčiai, de Valera patavimas prarasti visą Airiją. Tai trumparegiška politika, politika asmens, kuris mato medį, bet paties miško nemato.

Airijos valdžia daro gėdą sau ir išdaviškiškai pasitarauja visai Airijai.

Dėl Raporto Apie Pearl Harbor

Izoliacionistai, Chicagos "Tribune", Hearsto laikraščiai ir politikariai a la Wheeler nori pasidaryti sau politinį kapitalą iš Roberts'o raporto apie tą baisiąją dieną Pearl Harbor'e. Jų demagogiška linija yra ta: Kalta esanti Roosevelt administracija, o ne admiralas Kimmel ir generolas Short.

Kas kas, bet tie prokurorai iš izoliacionės klijos tikrai turėtų tylėti.

Ar ne jie, ar ne tie komitetininkai iš America First diena iš dienos įrodinėjo, kad Japonija nepus Ameriką, kad Roosevelt valdžia be reikalo priekabauja, be reikalo klišasi į Pacifiką sritis. Japoniją jie piešė ramiu Amerikos kaimynui! "Tribune" įrodinėjo, kad užpuolimas ant Pearl Harbor fiziniai nėra galimas, net jei ir Japonija to norėtų.

Teisėjo Roberts'o raporte yra šis reikšmingas sakiny: "Tarpe atsakomingu Hawaii komandierių ir viršininkų, be jokių išimčių, iki 1 d. gruodžio 1941 m., viešpatavo įsitikinimas, kad Japonija neturi jokios intencijos padaryti tokį užpuolimą."

Kas jų galvosė sudarė tokį įsitikinimą? Ogi, Wheelerių, Lindbergh'ų Wood'ų, "Tribunų" ir Hearstų propaganda.

Politiniai dalykai imant, negalima kitos išvados padaryti.

Kalbant apie tuos Hawaii komandierių, reikia pasakyti, kad politiniai jie tikrai buvo apspanę, jei nei tiek nesu-prato, kad pamatinis agresorių įrankis yra blitzkrygas, surpyzo ataka tuo laiku ir toje vietoje, kur to mažiausia laukia-ma.

Iš teisėjo Roberts'o raporto taip pat matosi, kad karo ir laivyno departmen-tuose kaip kas taip pat neuztenkama gerai įsigilino į situaciją, kuri smarkiu tem-pu vystėsi į karo situaciją. Bet iš tų de-partamentų Hawaii komandieriai gavo už-tenkamai įspėjimą.

Prezidentas Rooseveltas pradėjo gerą

darbą, šalindamas nekompetentiškus karo pareigūnus. Tas darbas dar tik pradėtas ir neabejotinai jis bus tęsiamas toliau.

Linčias Teismas Missouri

Sikeston, Missouri, gauja patrakusių asmenų žveriški mūlinčiavo negra Cleo Wright. Jis nebuvo nuteistas, jį nuteisė gauja žverišku linčiasu metodu.

Visi padorus Missouri piliečiai tuo pil-tinasi. Missouri gubernatorių Forrest Donnell, reikalauja, kad linčiotojai būtų nubausti, nubausti be pasigailėjimo, kaip to reikalauja įstatymai. Jie yra žmog-žudžiai.

Prokuroras D. Blanton sako, kad bus pravešta stropi investigacija, bet ligi šiol, nors jau praėjo trys dienos, nei vienas iš tos gaujos nesusėstus.

Chicagos "Sun" įtarpino savo skiltyse stiprų protestą dėl to įvykio, kurį to laik-raščio redakcija vadina bestijška.

Mes sakome, kad kovojame prieš bestijas nacius, mes sakome, kad kovojame už laisvę, civilizaciją ir teisėtumą, o mūsų ločny šalyj dar gali įvykti tokie pasiba-sėtinai dalykai, kaip negrų linčiasavimas!

Chicagos "Sun" reikalauja, kad tai barbariški linčiasai praktikai būtų užduo-tas smugis, galutinas smugis ir kad kon-gresas turi pravesti federalj įstatymą prieš linčiotojus.

Jeigu tuos patrakusius niekšus, kurie dalyvauja linčiavime, baustų be pasigail-ėjimo, tai ta barbariška praktika tuoj iš-nyktų.

Apsigynimo Fronte

"Laisvė" rašo:

"Aną dieną naujai paskirtasis Civilinio Apsigynimo (Office of Civilian Defense) veikiantysis sekretorius, James M. Landis, buvo sušaukęs Amerikos Darbo Federacijos, CIO ir Geležinkeliečių Brolių atstovus pasitarimui. Buvo svarstyta klausimas, kaip labiau pasiruošti civili-niam apsigynimui. Landiso nuomone, organizuoti darbininkai turėtų imti dalyvumą tame darbe.

"Landis pasiūlė, kad ADF, CIO ir Ge-ležinkeliečių Brolių nariai įjėtų į šį taip svarbų darbą. Kaip tą padaryti? Civilinio Apsigynimo vadas pasiūlė, kad valstijų ir miestų civilinio apsigynimo tary-bos pakviestų organizuotus darbininkus prisijusti savo atstovus, kad jie dalyvautų, kaip jo tarybų nariai, visuose sumany-muose ir vadovybėje. "Mes kovojame už demokratiškas mes kovojame prieš bent kokį tam tikro luomo ar grupės žmonių izoliavimą nuo civilinio apsigyni-mo," pareiškė ponas Landis.

"Dabar viskas priklauso nuo valstijų gubernatorių ir miestų majorų. Jie, vyk-dinami Landiso pasiūlymą, turėtų tuo-juo pakviesti visas unijas, kad jos prisijustų savo atstovus į civilinio apsigyni-mo tarybas."

Seniausias San Francisco savaitraštis "Argonaut" pasisakė už Schneidermaną ir tikisi, kad Augščiausias Teismas ap-gins jo pilietines teises. Jam negalima atimti pilietybę tik dėl to, kad jis komu-nistas.

"Argonaut" giria Wendell Wilkie, kad jis apsiėmė būti Schneidermano advoka-tu.

Chicagos "Daily News" rašo: "Mes tu-rime ruoštis ilgam karui. Bet bergždžias dalykas būtų spekuliuoti kaip ilgai jis už-sitęs, nes to niekas nežino."

"Daily News", kaip ir visi Amerikos pa-triotai, neabejoja, kad karą laimės Alian-tai.

United Press korespondentas praneša iš Filipinų, kad jei generolas MacArthur turėtų daugiau lėktuvų, tai Filipinus ga-lima būtų apvalyti nuo japonų.

Amerikos butų viršus. Prezidentas Rooseveltas pareiškė, kad karinė pagelba smarkia srove teka į Pa-cifiką frontus. Ji pasiekė ir Filipinus.

Kad tik ji kuo greičiausia pasiektų.

Holandų Rytų Indijos

UPARTĖS KOVOTOJAI

Tarp Malajų, Filipinų ir Australijos yra virtinė didžiųjų salų, kurios sudaro Rytų Indiją, arba Indonezija. Tai Holandijai priklausančios kolonijos.

Didžiausias iš tų salų Java, Sumatra, Celebes ir Borneo, nors ne visa Borneo sala priklauso Holandijai. Tos salos užima labai didelę teritoriją — 735,000 kvadratinį mylių. Jose gyvena 70,000,000 žmonių.

Iš to skaičiaus pačių holandų nėra nei pusės milijono. Indus ir kiniečius bus apie milijonas. Yra kiek tiek ir japonų, jų tarpe visuomet buvo didelis nuosimtis šnipų.

Daug holandų jau nuo labai senų laikų susiję su vietos moterimis. Todėl Rytų Indijoj yra labai daug maišyto kraujo šeimynų. Daug tų šeimynų narių užima atsakomingas vietas valdžioje.

Holandai tvarkė savo kolonijas gerai, liberališkiau negu angliai ir todėl šiandien jie turi geresnį pasekmę.

Holandijos vyriausiu atstovu jos kolonijose yra ge-neralgubernatorių. Be to yra dar visa eilė gubernatorių.

Indonezija valdyti sudarytas "Volksraad", arba Liaudies Taryba, kuri sudėta iš 25 holandų, 30 indonezų, 4 kiniečių ir 1 arabo. Taigi, vietos gyventojai turi balsą šalies tvarkyme.

Nors paprastai kolonijose

ju valdovai nesiskaito su vietos žmonėmis, arba skaitosi labai mažai, bet holandų kolonialėj sistemoj vis tik yra daugiau teisingumo.

Kolonijose įvesta visuotinio apmokymo sistema. Vietos žmonės turi savo teismus. I holandus, kurie veda vietos moteris, nežūrima su papėka. Tas skaitosi visai normaliu reiškiniu.

Rytų Indijoj yra turtinga savo plantacijomis, ypač gumos ir cukraus plantacijomis. Tos plantacijos daug geriau sutvarkytos negu plantacijos kad ir Indijoje.

Holandai ir indonezai jau išanksto rengėsi prieš šio karo. Jau keili metai atgal jie pradėjo stiprinti savo orlaivyną. Jų lėktuvai daugiausia Amerikoj gaminti.

Nėra tikrai žinoma ar holandai turi savų dirbtuvų, kuriose gamintųsi lėktuvus.

Rytų Indijos laivynas ne taip jau didelis, bet stiprus. Keturi holandų kruizeriai pasekmingai išplaukė iš Rotterdamo pačioj karo pradžioj ir pasiekė Indonezija. Nei vienas tų kruize-rių ir po šiai dienai nesumai-kintas.

Holandų laivynas or orlaivynas kovoja gerai. Be to, Rytų Indijoj yra ir nemaža armija, kuri taip pat pasižymėjo kovose su japonais. Prie reguliariės kariuomenės yra ir milicija.

Holandai ir indonezai mušis gerai. Jie yra upartūs kovotojai. Jie turi patva-ros ir užsigrūdinę.

Vilnius.

Pavergtoj Lenkijoj Mirtingumas Padvigubėjo

Jau ir nacių laikraščiai, leidžiami Krakovoj ir Varšuvoj, pabrėžia, kad okupuotoj Lenkijoj žmonių mirtingumas padvigubėjo. Prieš pat nacių užpuolimą, 1939 metų rudenį, tukstančiai gyventojų lenkuose išpuolė biskį daugiau kaip po 11 mirimų. Dabar ant kiekvieno tukstančio miršta po 22 ir pusę.

Nors nacių spauda ir rašo apie padidėjusį lenkų mirtingumą, bet susirūpinimo jokio nerodo. Okupantim naciam lenkai žemos rasės žmonės, verti tik vokiečiams vergauti.

Įstatymai išleisti, kad už darbą lenkams būtų mažiau mokama negu vokiečiams, kad nebūt jiems mokama už šventadienių darbą ir ne-teikiamos jokios lengvatos. Už važinėjimą gatvėkariuose lenkai verčiami mokėti brangiau už vokiečius ir griežtai draudžiama jiems viename gatvėkarije su vokiečiais važiuoti.

Prie rankovių lenkai kasdien verčiami nešioti prisū-tą raidę "P", kaip ženklą, kad įsai lenkas.

Lenkas dabar nusikalsta nežūrint ką įsai imasi dar-ryti, Krakovos jaunuolį nu-teisė sušaudyti tik už tai, kad dviračiu važiuojo į dar-bą.

Savaitė prieš tai dvi jau-nos Poznanias lenkaitės nuteistos sušaudyti už nu-ėjimą į operą.

ADVOKATAI IR DIES

Ir Amerikos Advokatų Gildija (unija) pasisakė prieš Dies'o amendmentus

prie biliaus, nukreipto prieš svetimų valstybių agentus. Dies butinai užsispyrė, kad prieš svetimų valstybių agen-tų būtų priskaityti ir komu-nistai.

Advokatų Gildija sako, kad Dies'o amendmentai destruktivio charakterio. Jei priimti, jie labai skau-džiai pažeistų nacionalę vie-nybę.

Advokatų Gildija sako, kad Dies nori pasiknisti po pačiais pamatais demokratinės santvarkos ir sukurs-ti vienus Amerikos žmo-nes prieš kitus.

Nacionalės Gildijos pirmininkas išsiuntinėjo laiškus visiems kongresmanams ir senatoriams, kad jie balsuo-tų prieš Dieso amendmen-tus.

Kaslink darbininkų orga-nizacijų, tai jos taip pat iš-stojo prieš Dies'ą. Pusė mi-liono CIO narių New Yorko, savo susirinkimuose, priėmė atitinkamas rezolucijas ir pasūnė jas kam reikia. Tą patį padarė ir Massachus-sets CIO unijos ir daugelio kitų vietų. Pacifikoj darbi-ninkai, o ypač Seattle unijos, pasmerkė Dies'o pasiuly-mus.

Kuomet Teisingumo De-partmentas pasiūlė savo propozicijas prieš svetimų valstybių agentus, tai jis specifiskai neįvardijo jokią grupę. Registruotis turėjo tik tie, kurie iš tikrųjų yra svetimų valstybių agen-tai. Tuo pasiremdamas senatas ir priėmė atitinkamą bi-lių. Bet atstovų bute, kuomet posėdyje nedalyvavo net ketvirtadalis jo narių, Dies'ui pavyko pravesti savo amendmentus.

Siuo laiku dėl to biliaus tariasi senato ir atstovų bu-to juridinių komitetų atsto-va.

Reikia tikėtis, kad senato-riai nenūsileis Dies'ui, nes jie gana gerai žino ko ver-ta to asmens politinė veikla. J. S.

Kanados Lietuviai Remia Raud. Kryžių

Kanados lietuvių atsakymas į Kanados Raudonojo Kryžiaus atšaukimą del medikales paramos Sovietų Sąjungai labai gražus.

Lietuvių skaičius Kanadoje nedidelis, palyginus su kitų tautybių atievių skaičiumi, tačiau suaukavo jau virš \$1,500. Aukos dar plaukia ir galima manyti, kad pa-sieks iki \$2,000. Jeigu lietu-vių sukelsime \$2,000, tai mūsų duosumas bus lygus ukrainai duosumui. Ukrai-nai, kurių Kanadoj prisukai-tome arti 500,000, nusistatę sukelti \$100,000.

Parama Sovietų Sąjungos kovotojams reikalinga. To-kioj milžiniškoj kovoj būna daug aukų. Sužeisti skaito-mi milijonais. O dar ne ga-las. Dabartinės kovos, ku-rios vedamos už nacių jė-gų sutruškinimą, taipgi neap-sieks be aukų. Reikia neuž-miršti, kad dabar tenai di-delė žiema. Pavojus sužeis-tiems dar didesnis.

Sovietų žmonės, kurių tarpe yra ir lietuvių, kovo-ja ir kraują lieja nevien už savo reikalus, už savo na-mus. Toj kovoj yra dar aukštesnis tikslas. Jeigu So-vietų Sąjunga būtų norėjus, ji būtų susidėjus su vokie-čiais ir tuomet nebūtė reik-ėjė kovoti savo žemėj. Bet Sovietų Sąjunga to nepa-darė, kadangi jina nenorė-jo matyti laisvės priešus lai-mėtojais.

Ant kiek Sovietų žmonės nusilpnins Hitlerizmą, ant tiek bus lengviau ir mums, kanadiečiams, o kartu ir vi-sam demokratiniam pasauly. Apie tai nekarta kalbė-jo daug žymių Kanados žmonių. Tą paneigia tik tie, kurie trokšta nazių pergal-ės. Tokių žmonių yra ir Ka-nadoj. Jie šaukia prieš pa-ramą Sovietų Sąjungai ir dabar, nors jeigu jiems reikėtų pakelti tuos smū-gius, kokius pakėlė Sovietų Sąjunga, nežinotų kur bėgt. Tokių žmonių netrūksta ir tarp lietuvių.

Lai priešai staugia. Mes teskime darbą tolyn. Padė-dami Raudonajam Kryžiui sukelti \$500,000, mes atlie-kame kilnų darbą. Tuomi mes pagelbėsime ir Sovietų kovotojams ir Kanados in-teresams. Kuomet pergalė bus laimėta, mes nesijausi-mes nieko neveikę. O tie, kurie bus išgelbėti Kanados lietuvių aukomis, prisimins ir bus dėkingi už pagelbą. Gal ne vienas ir lietuvis bus išgelbėtas nuo mirties.

Raudonasis Kryžius prašo-mus perduoti visiems au-kotojams širdingą padėką už paramą sukelimui \$500,000. ("L. B.")



U.S. MARINE POSTER HAS LITHUANIAN

BINGHAMTON, N. Y.—Upon Julius Blinkovitch, formerly of Johnson City, New York (a neighbor village of the city of Binghamton), has been conferred an unusual honor. A recruiting poster has been made of his pictures, which was painted by the celebrated artist, James Montgomery Flagg. The figure of Julius will be seen by thousands, as the poster is to be placed in front of every post office in the United States. It is a letter to read: "The Marines have landed."

Julius was born in Johnson City and attended Johnson City schools.

After graduating from Johnson City High School, he received employment with the Endicott-Johnson Shoe Corporation. Last May the 26 year-old service man enlisted in the Marines and at present is a clerk in the payroll office of the Marine Barracks of the United States Navy Yard in New York City. Always an avid reader and a constant searcher, he has declared that he is going to learn everything he can while he is in the service of Uncle Sam.

20,000 LITH JEWS HERDED INTO GHETTO

Via Radio:—20,000 Lithuanian Jews have been herded into a Kaunas ghetto by Nazi authorities. Each and every one of them are forced to wear the star of Judea on his clothing and thus distinguish himself as a "Jew" to citizens. Large numbers of Jews are being shifted to other areas besides Kaunas. A new ghetto is being established in Viliampole.

It was reported that starvation was rampant among the Jewish Lithuanian citizens. They have been deprived of all rights and many have been shot and tortured by Nazi authorities.



IN THEIR OWN FORESTS

From out of a Luzon Forest, an armed Filipino band stole cautiously. They advanced upon a Japanese air field, catching the airmen and ground force by surprise. The Tokio troops ran for cover, leaving 110 dead behind them. The air field was wiped out. One more base for carrying death to the gallant American troops on Bataan Peninsula and to the Filipino people had been erased.

General MacArthur's report on this exploit by Filipino partisans is one of the best current pieces of news out of the Pacific. The armed Filipino people—armed in part, least—are beginning to wear down the invaders of their home land with the same dash and daring as marked Francis Marion in our own Revolutionary War. They are beginning to write the same chapters of courage and intrepidity in defense of their country as have been engraved on world history by the Soviet partisans and by the people of China. Hitler's hordes have not only found themselves smashed and battered from the front. They have been harassed, with their resources eaten away, by the partisans attacking from the rear. Tokio has been unable to stabilize her gains in North China, through the surprise raids of the guerrillas of that country.

General MacArthur is to be commended for having cooperated with the Filipinos in initiating this guerrilla warfare, as seems to have been the case. The island, which are home to these friends of the Allies and their cause, are covered with dense vegetation which makes guerrilla warfare easier to conduct than in areas where almost treeless stretches of flat land are prevalent. Every bit of firearms that the United States can put into the hands of the Filipino people will serve to break down the Tokio invaders, will sting them continuously and will aid immeasurably in the final victory. Britain, too, in the Pacific could do no better in this war than to equip the Native populations on every island and outpost with those weapons by which they can surprise and weaken the Tokio invaders.

These people of the Pacific, fighting for their independence, will battle with the fire and ingenuity of men to whom freedom is dear. They will fight in their own forests, their own marshes and will torment to the death the invaders who bear with them the slavery of the Berlin-Rome-Tokio Axis.

LITH YANKS FIGHT JAPS IN PHILIPPINES

Serving with General MacArthur's forces in the Philippines, are a number of Lithuanian-Americans who have distinguished themselves in action against the Japanese - Axis invading forces.

Although a thorough check as to the exact amount of Lithuanian-American boys engaged in the bitter life and death battle is impossible, a recent release discloses two heroes who have withstood the Japanese onslaughts. They are Private John Galdikas and Private Edward J. Guokas, both of Chicago, Illinois.

Pvt. John Galdikas, 22, of 12200 Emerald av., Chicago, is a member of an anti-aircraft unit at Corregidor, island fortress at the entrance to Manila Bay. His parents, Walter Galdikas, employees of the Peoples Gas, Light & Coke Co., and Barbara, have not heard from him since the new year began.

Another Chicagoan, Pvt. Edward J. Guokas, 23, was on duty with a medical detachment at Sternberg General Hospital, Manila, before the evacuation of the Filipino capital. DAUNTLESS SPIRIT OF AMERICANS IN HAWAII REVEALED IN LETTER

By JOSEPH SACAL

The attack on Pearl Harbor, murderous bombardment from planes, the stolid courage of American forces and their reaction to Japanese-Axis aggression is vividly described by an Illinoisan.

Felix Lukosus, Lithuanian-American of Spring Valley, cousin of Frank Ku, the hospital at the time of the attack. He had a minor ailment but is okay now. Dwyre received a shrapnel wound in the right shoulder, but he's in the pink of condition now. The shrapnel was removed from his shoulder a few days ago and he has it in his possession. A souvenir of days before.

Yes I just left Thurm and he's feeling fine, ready to go back to duty as soon as the doctors give him the go sign.

"COUPLE OF SLUGS"

I had a couple of slugs in bedded in my carcass, too, nothing very serious of course. One piece is in my leg, another in the arm and a bullet in the right side. The shrapnel has been removed from my leg and arm, but I still carry the slug in me. The doctors say I'll have the bullet removed in a few days. Then I'll have another souvenir. So you can see we are really on the mend.

I was kept in bed for fourteen days and just yesterday was allowed to get up. It surely felt grand to be on the go again, I'm just waiting to get back to the field once more.

Sam Kerulis, Sgt. Kerulis now, came through without a scratch. Bob Blum was also among the fortunate. Not a nick on his hide, either. Leonard Gailis was in

Disease, Starvation Rampant In Nazi Occupied Lithuania

KUBYSHEV, USSR.—Lithuania has since the German occupation become prey to the typhus, cholera, plague and leprosy. Contagious disease in some places has become so menacing that the authorities deemed it necessary to close all the public office, schools and churches. Unemployment has reached gigantic proportions.

The requisitioned foodstuffs are shipped to Germany. To prevent the population from acquiring foodstuffs their sale and purchase has been prohibited, under pain of severe punishment. Sale and purchase of means of transport including peasants' carts and sleighs has likewise been forbidden. But even this seems inadequate to the Nazis and they are confiscating the few wretched crumbs which they themselves at first allowed the peasants to retain.

The heavy German losses on the Eastern front and the growing unrest in the Nazi's rear compels them to concentrate on increasing the reserves in the Baltic countries. Quartered on the

LITHUANIANS CONDUCTING STRUGGLE, WAR AGAINST GERMAN OCCUPATIONISTS

MOSCOW.—In the towns and villages of the Soviet Baltic Republics, Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia, the German occupationists have failed to create even a semblance of normal life. They themselves admit that the population continues an active and passive struggle against the Germans.

3 Women Pilots Are Accepted For O. C. D Air Patrol Service

CHICAGO.—Three Illinois women have been enrolled in the civil air patrol of the Office of Civilian Defense.

According to the announcement made by Lieut. Col. Floyd E. Evans, regional patrol director, fifty applications of private fliers in Illinois have been accepted, among them those of the three women.

"Women," he said, "will perform the same duties as the men. These activities will include ferrying of army ships, training aircraft watchers, antisabotage patrols and towing of aerial gunnery targets."

The civilian air patrol has already flown over Chicago with observers to study the best means of blacking out the city.

Noted Aviatrix To Recruit Women For Plane Ferrying

Jacqueline Cochran, America's leading aviatrix, and first woman to pilot a bombing plane across the Atlantic, announced yesterday she will recruit 25 American women flyers to do ferry service in England with the Royal Air Force.

Miss Cochran, who took up flying nine years ago in her spare time from a beauty business, said her project has the blessing of the British Government, the American Government and the personal benediction of President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

The women will serve in the British air transport auxiliary of the Royal Air Force and will ferry military planes from factories to bases, and do other transport work in England and Scotland.

The constantly repeated threats which accompany orders to take up work in employment by the Occupation authorities, quite clearly show that only under compulsion can the working people be made to do this work.

One November 6th th Deutsche Zeitung in Osten, appearing in Riga again called attention to the fact that: "All are obliged to work." In Lithuania, in Kaunas, the city commissar warned that all those who were not working were to immediately request work in the labor department, otherwise the most stringent measure would be applied against them.

The German occupationists are encountering similar obstacles in agriculture, where according to the Deutsche Zeitung in Osten, the Nazis issued an order permitting former landlords or their relatives to "take over the management of the estates and the possession of land which formerly belonged to them." The landlords were promised "the armed protection of German troops."

The situations in transport can best be seen from the data on destruction caused during military hostilities. Again to quote the newspaper Deutsche Zeitung in Osten: Out of a former 111 locomotives but 33 are left. Of 33,478 freight cars 159 remain and of 352 passenger cars only 36 remain. The news paper deplors the existing state of affairs on the broad gauge lines in Estonia. The losses are just as great on the narrow gauge lines; one third of the freight and one-sixth of the passenger cars are left.

The situation is no better in auto transport. Estonia is left with only 300 to 500 trucks as compared with 2,476 at the beginning of the war. Formerly auto transport was used to a wide scale in delivering supplies to different cities, whereas today there is not only a shortage of cars but also of fuel.

Except for the substitution of film for bullets, practice battles are war "to the death."

The Fairchild Gun Camera, slung and operated precisely like a machine gun, is of the motion picture type and contains a second-recording Hamilton Watch. Another device marks each individual section of film with thin lines—both concentric circles as on a rifle target, and cross lines similar to those in a surveyor's instrument. Thus, pictures taken of an "enemy" plane show the exact point at which it would be hit with bullets.

In sham combat, planes dive, circle, and manoeuvre each other into position just as they would in a real "dog-fight." When the "enemy" comes within range, the pilot or gunner then presses the trigger of the machine gun camera, which takes a motion picture of the opposing airplane. After a burst of shots has been made, and when the

gunner thinks he has made a perfect "hit", he releases the trigger and the camera automatically changes focus to take a picture of the watch. When the airplanes return to the ground the films are developed and projected on a screen, revealing the progress of the battle and showing the precise time of the first successful shot. The pilot whose first hit is registered a few seconds later than that of his opponent may then imagine himself actually losing the battle, falling to his death in a smoking, flame-ridden airplane.

"WEEK" under the name of "Jaunimas" was accused of pro-Nazism by the fifth column routing bulletin "THE HOUR." The stigma still remains. Under a new name it is putting into effect words that it uttered at one time and which were "Three Cheers for Adolph Hitler."



FACTS ABOUT ILLINOIS

ILLINOIS PLOWS IN CALIFORNIA

Farm implements, made in Illinois, especially plows, were transported across the Isthmus of Panama en route to California before the Civil War, according to the Illinois Writers' Project, W.P.A. Wagons, harrows, planters and cultivators were other items that made the long journey, and brought fame and prestige to their makers. Besides supplying Iowa, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas, heavy shipments were made for California. Newspapers of 1857 recited the fact that they went by way of the Illinois and Mississippi rivers; the Gulf of Mexico, Isthmus of Panama, and the Pacific ocean.

FORTS MARKED PASSING OF WILDERNESS

Construction of forts by the young American nation after the War of 1812 marked the end of the struggle of nations for Illinois dominion, and also marked the transition from wilderness and unbroken prairie to civilized communities, reports the Illinois WPA Writer's Project. Among the principal strongholds were Fort Armstrong, on Rock Island; Fort Clark, at Peoria, and the re-built Fort Dearborn, at Chicago. These established and maintained lines of communication and protection for settlers and town builders, and were challenged for the last time in the Black Hawk War. Thereafter the garrisons were gradually reduced. Fort Clark and Fort Dearborn are today only historic memorials. Fort Armstrong is on the military reservation which is also the site of the Rock Island Arsenal.

CHOCOLATE CORN DEVELOPED BY FARMER

An Illinois history published in 1857 describe a type of corn known as "chocolate corn" that was developed by a St. Clair county farmer, reports the Illinois WPA Writers' Project. According to the history, the corn had a black seed, and "when carefully prepared tasted and looked almost exactly like light chocolate." One and one-half ears were said to be enough to make the equivalent of four pints of chocolate, and the ears, when used as a vegetable, were said to be "very palatable." Recipes and directions for preparing it, as a beverage and a vegetable, were contained in the history, which urged its use as a substitute for coffee, then a scarce and expensive item.

COURT APPROVED PLOWING CORN ON SUNDAY

Plowing corn on Sunday does not disturb the peace and good order of society, and is not a violation of law. Such was the ruling of the Appellate Court of the Fourth District of Illinois in a case originating about a half century ago in Mount Vernon. The defendant farmer had been arrested for plowing corn on Sunday in sight of church-goes. The action was brought under a "Blue Law" section relating to disturbance of the peace by labor on Sunday. Convicted in the local court, he appealed the decision, and the Appellate Court reversed the lower court, on the ground that the section does not prohibit legitimate, necessary work or amusement on Sunday, which does not conflict with peace and good order.

BLACK HAWK COUNTRY RICH IN DRAMA

Romance, drama and tragedy are all included in the history of the Black Hawk country, according to the Illinois WPA Writers' Project. Near the confluence of the Rock and Mississippi rivers, Black Hawk was born in 1767, and there he lived for 65 years until banished after the Black Hawk war. The site of this historic Watch Tower fronting on the Rock river is now a state park. The Sauk village is now residential Rock Island. Here French soldiers, en route to Fort de Chartres on their retreat from Quebec, wintered during 1760-61. Here a contingent of George Rogers Clark's little army fought in 1780. Here Zebulon M. Pike hoisted the Stars and Stripes in 1805. Here Jefferson Davis met and courted his bride, and here he and Abraham Lincoln received their baptism of fire in the Black Hawk war.


All sorority sisters took a solemn pledge to support the ideals, aims and purpose of the sorority and to work in unity with the LDS.
