

30,000 Killed . . .

Nazi Attempt To Still Lithuanian Opposition Becoming Desperate

The following article was written for the Soviet press by Justas Paleckis, Chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the Lithuanian SSR:

About 30,000 people have been killed in Lithuania by the German fascist murderers, and the number is growing daily. German newspapers recently reported public shootings in Shauliai and Mazeikiai, the hanging of three men and the shooting of two groups of 42 and 38 in Kaunas and the shooting of 16 in Vilnius. At least 120,000 people are kept in prisons, concentration camps and labor camps.

The German fascists have established their barbarous "New Order" in Lithuania, destroying every trace of its national independence. They abolished the very name of Lithuania, converting it into part of their province of "Ostmark."

Lithuania has become a land of famine. Within a short time the invaders plundered, devoured or shipper to Germany all reserves of Lithuanian goods. Peasants must deliver their entire grain harvest, 50 kilograms of butter per cow, 50 eggs per chicken, and wool, flax, hay and straw. The Germans also confiscate warm clothing, copper utensils, metals, church bells, bicycles and rubber. They took away the land of 70,000 peasants who had received unions and other workers' organizations.

The development of culture in Lithuania had been carefully nurtured. Now the German invaders close down schools, scientific and artistic establishments and attempt to Germanize the Lithuanian people. One page in each newspaper must be printed in German. German has been proclaimed the primary official language, though few Lithuanians understand it.

LITHUANIA SHALL BE FREE!

When the front line began to waver under the hammer strokes of the Soviet troops, the German invaders tried to dupe the Lithuanian people by all kinds of promises. They spoke at length about the "self-government" which allegedly would be given them, but the aims pursued by the bloody cheats soon became apparent. They then embarked on forcible mobilization of Lithuanian youths for work in the war industry, compelling them to work at the most dangerous, places—at plants constantly subjected to air bombardment and at the front digging trenches.

However, the Lithuanians did not lay down their arms and have not been subjugated. Lithuanians have been fighting in the Red Army ranks from the first days of the war and have shown numerous examples of heroism. National Lithuanian units go into decisive battles with enthusiasm and hatred for the enemy. The flame of guerrilla warfare in Lithuania does not die down for a single minute.

But Lithuanians Fight For Freedom Regardless Of Nazi Terror

By JONAS ŠIMKUS

By Wireless to Inter Continent News MOSCOW, U.S.S.R.—On January 30th, 1942, the German forces of occupation in Lithuania, as in the other Baltic Soviet Republics, set up German Courts Martial. These courts have condemned many of our brother Lithuanians to death.

In spite of the Courts Martial and the savage reign of terror the struggle against the Germans is growing ever more intense. In the latter part of April the Hitlerites found it necessary to issue repeated reminders in the press and over the radio that Courts Martial were functioning. They threatened to shoot or otherwise execute all who disobey German orders.

They are arresting and shooting the finest sons and daughters of our nation. In Vilnius, for example, on Three Crosses Hill they shot sixteen Lithuanians. Among them were two schoolteachers, Albinas Sragys and Antanas Vauca.

The German occupation authorities are raging like madmen in Lithuania, sensing their approaching doom. Renteln has issued orders providing for additional compulsory dispatch of Lithuanians to Germany. In Kaunas a list of ten thousand Lithuanians has been drawn of those who are to be sent forcibly to Germany. Lists are drawn up in every village and rural district.

Lithuania is seething with unrest. Men are taking to the forests. The Hitlerites are hastening to strip Lithuania of everything down to the last thread. Besides food, wool, leather and hides, delivery of metals also has been made compulsory.

Fictitious voluntary collection of metal was a failure. Every villageblacksmith and mechanic and every householder has been ordered to bring to the collection stations the stated amount of ferrous and nonferrous metals.

NAZIS STRIP CHURCHES

Toward the end of April the Germans made a "metal raid" in Jurbarkas and took advantage of the oocasion to strip the church of all its utensils made of nonferous metals. Renteln has issued orders forbidding under pain of death use of any metal even for the shoeing of horses without sanction of the commissar. The result of all this is that metal has suddenly disappeared in Lithuania.

These are but a few examples of what the Germans are doing in Lithuania. But the end of their occupation of our land is drawing close.

The flames of partisan warfare in Lithuania are spreading and the Red Army is nearing the borders of our country.

LITHUANIAN RED ARMY UNITS IN PARADE

On May Day I paid a visit to the Lithuanian units of the Red Army. The parade was reviewed by General Vitkauskas, Paleckis, Gedvilas and Sniečkus. I saw thousands of our brothers who are determined to clear nazi scum out of Lithuania.

All the men of Lithuanian units are well armed and steeled in battle. The commanders are Lithuanians. The songs sung are Lithuanian and in their moments of recreation the men dance the national dances with great ardour.

LITHUANIAN NEWSPAPERS FOR THE RED ARMY

The Esthonian ensembles with 200 artists will perform chiefly in Yaroslavl, Latvianin Ivanova. The Esthonian Drama Ensemble headed by Ants Lauter, prominent theatrical director, is preparing a presentation of the "Werewolf" by the Esthonian classical playwright Kitsberg and "Mstislay Brave" by I. Prut. Latvian and Esthonian artists are now performing for Red Army units.

Nazi Agent Is Indicted, But Lithuanian Fascist Friends Remain Free

(Special To Vilnis English Section)

Count Anastase A. Vonsiatsky was taken to Hartford, Conn., this past Monday by federal authorities to face a charge of espionage conspiracy. He faces spy charges.

Count Vonsiatsky, indicated self-styled Russian fascist leader has been committed to an asylum, this following a federal raid upon his Connecticut home where an arsenal was discovered after which followed an investigation and his committment.

Vonsiatsky, wedded to multi-millionaire Ream's daughter, came to this country from Lithuania. Upon arrival he immediately began organization of a facist group and issued a newspaper which now stands suspended. His association included Lithuanian pro-fascists of which Joseph Tysliava, editor of the Brooklyn, N. Y. published fascist "Vienybe" is one. In all probability papers which were confiscated by the FBI will reveal others.

The case of Vonsiatsky, as a person, may be closed. However his compatriots are still on the loose. Among them being Tysliava.

It is a known fact that upon assuming editorship of "Vienybe", Tysliava put back on its feet a newspaper whose days were alread numbered. It had hit rock bottom financially.

A Fascist Loan?

The question now arises. How did he do it?

Did he invest his own money? Did he receive a loan?

The latter question in all probability is the answer. A good friend of Vonsiatsky who had plenty of money to spare on fascist activity, and who feted Tysliava with a dinner, Nazi Nazi salutes at a conference held at the Russian fascists home, Tysliava no doubt broached Vonsiatsky on finances for the continuance of his fascist sheet. That the request was granted is borne out by the fact that immediately, "Vienybe," the fascist sheet with a death rattle revived following the Lithuanian editor's visit to the Connecticutt castle of the Russian fascist.

Tysliava's "Vienybe" is a menace to Lithuanian-American unity. The publication stands indicted as a disemminator of Nazi propaganda. Perhaps the

Army To Facilitate Naturalization Of Non-Citizens In Service

Washington: — The Army will facilitate naturalization of noncitizens in the Army of the United States who desire to become citizens, under the Second War Powers Act of 1942, the War Department announced today.

To qualify for naturalization, a noncitizen must have been lawfully admitted to United States territory, have served in the Army at least three months since September 1, 1939, and have his application approved by his immediate commanding officer.

Application blanks will be distributed to eligible noncitizens desiring naturalization.

Commanding officers will certify to the applicant's military status, service and good moral character, and signify their approval of application. Application will not be approved unless the immediate commanding officer believes that the noncitizen will make a loyal and useful citizen.

Army Immunizing All Personnel Against Yellow Fever

Immuniation of all Army personnel against yellow fever has been ordered by the War Department.

The order is a preventive measure designed to make all soldiers available for service in areas where the disease is known to exist.

Vaccination against yellow fever is a comparatively recent development in medical science. Immunization of the W. S. Army will be the first large-scale vaccination against the tropical disease ever attempted by a military force.

Immunization is accomplished by the subcutaneous injection of 0.5 cc of diluted yellow-fever vaccine. Only one injection is required.

"Everybody's A Commie" — Tribune Sets Pace For Lith Pro-Nazis

"I wish," said Supreme Court Justice Byrnes in his Chicago address, "that our military intelligence service would recite over the radio the statements of American individuals and newspapers that are being used daily by German and Japanese propagandists to give aidand comfort to the enemy."

Justice Byrnes picked his words from the United States Constitution's definition of treason, which consists in adhering to the country's enemies, "giving them aid and comfort..."

The Chicago Tribune favorite smear word is "Communist." A revolt of Americans against congressional and newspaper traitors was described as "the campaign of the Communists and other totalitarians to liquidate members of Congress and intimidate newspapers that are fighting-to preserve the American way of life." (Fighting to preserve it against Hitler? Not on your life!)

Whenever the Tribune wants to smear a man, it calls him a Communist. The Communist appelation is hurled indiscriminately against New Dealers, labor leaders, writers, movie actors, newspaper publishers, college professors—against anybody, in fact, who exercises his constitutional right of saying or doing things the Tribune doesn't like. Anybody who puts his heart and soul into the winning of this war gets a swipe from the same tarpot. Anybody who tells what he thinks of Col. McCormick (or 5 per cent of that he thinks of him) is a Communist or "international schemer."

Time was when that sort of thing was effective. Col. McCormick doesn't seem to realize it, but his favorite smear word is out of date. Russian Communists are dying by the thousand upon the field of battle, partners with us in a grim struggle against a common foe. Russian Communists are dying that American boys may live...

Justice Byrnes dealt in particular with the attempt to drive a wedge into the Russian-American alliance. Nazi propaganda, he said, tells the Russians that the United States is failing to deliver war materials to them. Nazi propaganda tells Americans that Communists have sinister designs on the United States...

If the Tribune pursues its course for political gain, the lives of American soldiers are being made the pawn of politics.

Of course, if one is trying to weaken the Russian-American alliance, if one would rather have American boys face Hitler's legions without the titanic aid that Russia offers, if one is furnishing material for rebroadcast by the Nazi radio, then it is fine business to shout "Communist..."

German soldiers and officers sell products, clothes and weapons taken from the German warehouses despite the threat of the death sentence.

The fascist authorities are highly disturbed at the fact that four big trucks loaded with arms disappeared last week while moving along one of the roads near Riga. It is assumed that guerrillas attacked the transport killing the soldiers.

The Germans fear an armed uprising of the people when matters at the Eastern front will become still worse for them. It knows that the population of the Soviet Baltic Republics is hiding large supplies of arms and ammunition.

Six German soldiers and several Latvians were recently shot in Riga prison for selling arms. No less than one thousand rifles and several cases with cartridges have disappeared from German arsenals.

MOSCOW (ICN).—They present a cheerful group strolling down the street of the Russian town, stalwart lads dressed in leather coats saturated with the salt of the sea or trick corduroy sailor jackets with bright mufflers carelessly tied around their bronzed necks.

Everybody here is already accustomed to seeing them around just as they are accustomedy to their merry inquisitive eyes and their fondness for buying endless souvenirs. They are bent on carrying away some amusing souvenir from distant Russia, from this hazardous voyage, a souvenir which will stand on the table in a small room in Seattle or San Diego. They are all intrepid sailors and fine boys, but I particularly remember two of them whom I met at different times and on different ships

I first met Clarence MacCoy on board his ship. A Scotchman by birth and American by education, he made friends with the sea when still a lad, 19 years ago. He climbed all the steps of the long ladder—from ships boy to captain. His hair is bleached by the sun of the South Seas, his face weatherbeaten by North winds. He is an old mariner but a young captain. This voyage to the Soviet Union is his first as ship's captain.

Icy northern waters lapped the ship's sides, overhead stretched the leaden sky streaked with huge white puffs of smoke still fresh from a re-cent air battle. The black muzzles of AA guns and cannons on the ship's deek are pointed skywards. Their commanders, the first and second mate, both ships mechanics, just through with their "warm" work, were strolling on deck, hands in pockets whistling and exchanging remarks about the air combat,
BOMBS LAND CLOSE

"The nearest bomb dropped here just 60 feet away" and the captain pointed to the water stretching on the left broadside. "And you can take it from me that it sent up a much bigger fountain than a whale."

Already last year his ship was at-tacked from the air in the Red Sea and Suez Canal. It was a novel ex-perience, however, for his men. But they calmly stood at their posts and fired simultaneously with Soviet AA artillery. "What a pity you were not here an hour ago when a Russian fighter plane downed a German over the harbor. You should have seen the boys then. . They yelled and whistled and Simone, the cook, a Filipino, danced with joy." By the way he has been working as a cook these past 25 years and now he insists on becoming a machinegunner. He has been pestering the captain on this score as if the latter had as many machineguns as men!

"You see that man with the rifle walking on the lower deck. That's old Devine, chief mechanic. He is in his sixties. As a Naval reserve officer, he fought the Germans already in the first war. He is never without his rifle nowadays and aims to bring down a plane himself."

MacCoy smiled. "We are all gra-

dually becoming army men, everyone in his own away. I am very glad that my first captain's voyage was a war voyage to Russia. The Germans thought they could bar our passage to Russia with their submarines. They are stupid to say the least and they certainly do not know the Yankees. Our ships are sailing to Russia and will continue to sail. The Germans thought that their air raids would hinder us here in port, but we know how bullets fired by your fliers set their planes ablaze! And both we and your longshoremen unload the ship paying no attention to alerts. This is how it should be and that's all there is to it" . .

The tide was beginning to ebb, the boat lightly rocked. The sailors smoking were standing at the copper rails gazing into the sky or at the distant snow-capped mountains. Just think how many thousands of miles they

The following day I met another American in a small room of one of the northern log cabins. He was not a captain but an ordinary sailor, a mechanic on the freighter. He was a well built, fair lad of 29. A Yankee if there ever was one, he was born in St. Paul, Minnesota. According to his caluculations his wife, Mary, had given birth to a son in America a few days ago while he was sailing across the Arctic Ocean,or maybe now while he was sitting here in Russia. For that matter it may have been a girl. They had no time finally to settle the question before his departure. Thus it was left open.

covered coming here and how many

thousands it will be going back and

afterwards coming here again and returning! They are fine boys, long

accustomed to the sea and gradually getting accustomed to war.

His name is Norman Edward Dorland. Both his father and grandfather were mechanics like him. Sailing a merchantman under the Stars and Stripes in seas scoured by the Germans is more or less close to service in the Army. However, he first became a soldier as far back as 1936 when he left the States to fight with the Lincoln Brigade. He saw action in Spain for more than a year. When he was wounded at Brunette, he only had a rifle in his hands. After his recovery he asked to be made a machinegunner. Yes, he meant to settle accounts for his wound and those of his friends. And he did. His machinegun did its work!

Also his first encounters with the Germans were not here in the Arctic Ocean en route to Russia but way back in 1936. All the better: It is doubly gratifying to spite and old enemy by bringing certain things to Russia which in the meantime do not have to be proclaimed under the enemy's very nose. These "certain things" will before long speak for themselves on the battle fields.

All Out, Chicago!

ONE MILLION MARCH IN UNITED NATION'S DAY PARADE SUNDAY; LITHS TURNING OUT ENMASSE

Chicago:—A parade that will be 13 hours long, contain hundreds of floats and a million marchers, rapidly took shape today as the committee in charge pushed plans for the gigantic United Nations Parade for Victory this Sunday, June 14, national Flag Day.

That this parade will be a genuine

That this parade will be a genuine sall-out effort on the part of Chicago was attested to by reports coming in from communities all over the Chicago Metropolitan Area of the Civilian Defense organization, which is sponsoring the parade in conjunction with the American Legion.

Starts At 10 A.M.

From 10 o'clock in the morning until late at night Michigan Avenue, from Chicago Avenue on the north to Roosevelt Road on the south, will resound with the tramp of hundreds of feet, the rolling of wheels under war machinery, the rumble of float after float, the blare of martial bands and the shrill whistle of fife and the roll of drums. Color from the flags and uniforms of 26 United nations will turn the avenue along the lake into a mighty ribbon of color—the rumble of wheels, the tramp of feet and the whir of planes overhead will send up an all day paean of victory.

Any individual, any group, society or club, any organization large or small representative of American ideals of freedom, liberty and justice, may enter this pageant of victory. The bars are down and all communities may enter as many floats or groups as they desire. The only restriction is that all participation be by communities in the Civilian Defense organizational set-up.

Lithuanians March

Scores of Lithuanian organizations have already made their arrangements for participation. The Lithuanian daily Vilnis, Cicero Women's Chorus, Lithuanian Culture and Art Club, Sophie Bartkus of radio and 300 hundred Lithuanian Red Cross workers have announced their entering. Besides this, all branches of the national fraternal organization, Association of Lithuanian Workers, Inc. (LDS) are expected to turn out.

The American Legion, Cook County Council, which has the tremendous job of assembling, coordinating and timing the parade is hard at work, as reports roll in of the groups, bands, floats and so forth, getting ready to give everything in this effort to stage a parade that will win the laurels as the greatest military and civilian procession in the history of the city, if not nation.

Wins National Attention

Attesting to the fact that it is already winning national attention are the telegrams which have been received from a number of states asking for information and inquiring about the possibility of representation. The committee, was taken by surprise by this unlooked for applause, and is considering how best to work this added support into the

great picture. It may turn out that this parade will be the parade of the nation and as Arthur Canty, vice chairman of the arrangements committee said, "will give the Axis powers something to think about when they prate that this country of ours is divided, complacent and can't get together. This parade ought to make 'tyranny tremble' as the words of our grand anthem put it."

Army, Navy Marches

The war and navy departments have wired Chicago headquarters that they are contacting nearby Chicago training centers to arrange for the maximum turnout of soldiers and sailors and other branches of the armed forces in full combat equipment. From the outlook now, Michigan avenue should bristle with guns and bayonets.

Sharing the spotlight of the boys under arms will be their fathers and mothers, who are to march in groups in their respective communities.

Another eye-opener to the thousands along the line of march will be the comprehensive display of war material being tuurned out by industry in the Chicago Metropolitan Area. The Diamond T Truck Company, which manufactures tanks and tank trallers, has signified its intention of being represented in the parade with a full day's output of its tanks and trailers. Other industries all over the area are making similar plans to bring out their show of war material.

To accentuate the pomp and panoply of war will be countless moments of comic relief, dominated by clowns in various costumes and comic tableaux. The only restrictin put on this by the committe in charge is that it be kept in the realm of good taste. Vulgarity or coarse humor will not be tolerated.

Hollywood Parades

The color of the all-day procession will rival that of a kaleidoscope, and will come from the myriads of bands, drum and bugle corps in their great array of vari-colored uniforms. There will be the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the army and navy, ROTC boys and hundreds of high school, public, private and parochial schools and hundreds of gaily costumed and glamorous drum majorettes. In addition there'll be the color and glamour of the native costumes of the 26 United Nations to be represented with their respective flags.

The amusement field started its ball rolling with announcement that MGM, the big Hollywood studio, will be represented with a float adorned by beautiful girls.
