Britanijos valdžia berods negudriai pasielgė suimdamą Indijos Kongreso viršylas. Teisybė, kad griežtas prieš Britaniją išstojimas pakenktų visom karo pastangom, bet Kongresas to dar nevykdė ir rodos buvo progra derybas užvesti.
Lordas Lintlithgow bene pereit išsiūko, susinervavo.

Nacių armija jau pasiekus Malakop, prie Kaukazo, bet vietoj aliejaus įmonių rodai degančių dangaus grėvišius. Pasiekti daugiau žemesiems reikės kopti į kalnas. Ar jie tai galės? Tik su tuo antur frontu didelis bėda.

Is Berlyno per Ankarą paleista gandai, jog naciai visom eje "konsoliduosis žiemai" ir "silusių laikų."
Tai veikiausia šis hitlerinis proopaganda antro fronto atidėliojimo tikslu.
O gal naciai jaučia besieriantį sau pavojų?

Priešais mūsų akis jaučiamas geryn. Mūsų jėgos stumia japonus iš strateginiai svarbių Solomono salų.
Tos salos yra arti Australijos ir japonams jose esant Australijai būtų peilia prie šono. Kita, is ten arčiausia yra į daugelį kitų svarbių salų.

Kongresmanų nominacijose penkiose valstijose pralaimėjo žymūs izoliacininkai—Sweeney, Ohio, ir Harry Coffee, Nebrasokoj.

New Yorke laimėjo Vito Marcantonio, kuris dažnai komunistu vadinamas.
Blogas reiškinys tik tas, kad laimėjo ir Ham. Fish, izoliacininkas ir reakcininkas. Bet Fishui teks rinkinuosie stoti prieš demokratų kandidatą, jis gali pralaimėti rinkimus.

Kongresmanas Elmer J. Holland, smerkdamas Chicago Tribune ir panasius laikraščius New Yorke ir Washingtono paieškė, jog tokie laikraščiai ir tokie žmonės "eina Hitlerio keliu."
Nebūtina turėti ryši su priešu, kad jam padėti. Užtenka veikti, kas priešui naudinga, sako jis.

Kas nekencia prez. Roosevelt, kas nekencia Anglijos ar Sovietų Sąjungos, tas eina vieny keliu su Hitleriu, kuris irgi neapkenčia Roosevelt, Anglijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos, sako p. Holland.
Taip yra.

Pas lietuvius irgi yra tokių laikraščių. Skirtumas tik tame, kad jie pikčiau atakuoja SSSR, ir dažnai Angliją, o bijo kludytį Roosevelt.

Kitas skirtumas—jie dėjo tiesioginiai gautą naują propagandą "laikui per Lisaboną" ir tebededa nacių propagandą—"istrentųjų sąrašų."

Antro Fronto Dar Nėra,— Naciai Tebežengia Sov. Fronte

SOVIETAI ATAKUOJA PRIE VORONEŽO, TRAUKIASI KAUKAZE

MASKVA, rugp. 12.—Nacių jėgos, kurios tebeina pirmyn Kaukazo fronte, privertė mity karis pasitraukti iki Mikojan Sakar, vien 150 mylių atstume nuo Turkijos rubežiaus.
Verždamiesi tiesiai į pietus pagal Armaviro-Baku geležinkelį, jie yra pasiekę kalnus ir krepia savo atakas į vakarus, kur jie stengiasi pasiekti Juodosios jūros pakraščius su svarbiu Novorosijsko uostu.

Sovietų komunikatas šiandien praneša apie smarkias kovas Čerkes apylinkėse. Pranešama, kad pasitraukdami nuo okupantų, Sovietų gyventojai viską naikina ir degina, kas gali priešui turėti bet kokią vertę.
Visas Kaukazas yra apimtas ugnies jūros, sako pranešimai iš Turkijos.

SOVIETAI ATĖMĖ PENKIAS APGYVENTAS VIETAS PRIE VORONEŽO
Tuo tarpu, kai kritiška padėtis Kaukaze darosi sunkesnė, Sovietų jėgos kontratakavo Voronežo fronte ir privertė nacius atsitraukti anapus Dono, tai yra, į vakarinį upės krantą. Sovietai toje srityje iš nacių atėmė penkias apgyventas vietas.

GRANATOS MESTOS Į BŪRĮ NACIŲ LAKUNŲ PARYŽIUJE; 20 UŽMUŠTI IR SUŽEISTI

VICHY, rugp. 12.—Francūzai patriotai metė granatas į būrį nacių lakūnų prie vieno stadiomo Paryžiaus priemiestyje ir 20 jųjų tapo arba užmušti arba sužeisti. Būryje radosi apie 60 lakūnų, kurie tame stadione, kuris paryziečiams yra žinomas po vardu Jean Bouin, dar gimnastinius pratimus. Jų išeinant laukė būrelis francūzų, kurie iš savo slaptosios vietos sviedė granatas.

Tas žygis yra vienas didesnių teroristinių aktų bet kada vykdytų prieš nacius okupantus Francūzijoje. Čia manoma, kad vokiečiai pradės žiauriai keršto kampaniją ir luikiama suimant ir sušaudant šimtų francūzų. Pranešama, kad gestapo ir policijos pareigūnai tuojau po to akto apsupė visą apylinkę ir areštavo kiekvieną įtariamą asmenį.

Per visą savaitę Francūzijoje buvo pakilūs išstojimų prieš okupantus banga ir dabartinis žygis yra skaitomas "viršūne." Visoje Francūzijoje, okupuotoje ir "neokupuotoje," viešpatuja didžiausias įtampimas.

Bondų tarp lietuvių sulėtėjo, o tai negerai. Reikia kiekvieną atliekamą cenlą tam sunaudoti, nes tai bus prisidėjimas prie karo laimėjimo pastangų, o ir geras būdas taupymui pinigų.

Visuomet turėkime tai minty.

NENORI EVAKUOTŲ JAPONŲ LEISTI Į UNIVERSITETUS

LITTLE ROCKS, Akr., rugp. 12.—Čia kai kurie valstijos pareigūnai pasipriešino planui leisti evakuotų japonų jaunuolių ir jaunuoleiŲ lankytį vietinius valstijos universitetus. Japonų pradžios mokyklų vaikai turi savd mokyklas.

H. Fish Laimėjo Savo Partijos Nominacijas

JO PRALAIMĖJIMAS RUDENS BALSAVIMUOSE YRA BEVEIK TIKRAS

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., rugp. 12.—Hamilton Fish laimėjo respublikonų nominaciją į kongresą 26 kongresiniame distriktė. Jis laimėjo maždaug dviem balsais prieš vieną. Jo oponentas buvo advokatas A. W. Bennet.

fi Fish yra žinomas kaip viešas kiečiausių reakcininkų ir izoliacionistų. Nors buvo abejojimų apie jo laimėjimą nominaciniuose balsavimuose, bet eia visi yra tikri, kad jis neturi jokių šansų laimėti rudens balsavimuose.

Sov. Tautų Lėktuvai Bombardavo Formozą

CUNGKINGAS, rugp. 12.—Čia pranešama, kad Suvienytų Tautų lakūnai bombardavo Japonų laikomą salą prie Kinijos—Formozą. Ta sala japonams arnuoja kaip svarbi bazė jų kare su Kinija ir taipgi jiems tarnavo jų žygiuose išstumiant amerikiečius iš Filipinų. Tam bombardavimui eia priduodama didelės reikšmės.

Britai Pripažysta "Eagle" Praradimą

LONDONAS, rugp. 12.—Britai pripažysta vokiečių pretendavimą, kad jie vakarinėje Viduržemio jūros dalyje pasiskandino lėktuvnešį "Eagle". Britų komunikatas sako, kad laivui nuskenus, visa įgula tapo išgelbėta.
Vokiečių pranešimai apie tą įvykį sakė, kad į laivą pataikė keturios torpedos.

W. D. PELLEY NUTEISTAS 15 METŲ

INDIANAPOLIS, rugp. 12.—Valstybinis teismas eia 15-kai metų kalėjimo nuteisė žinomą fašistų vadą W. D. Pelley. Pelley buvo kaltinamas išdavyste ir konspiravimu prieš valdžią. Mirtas vadovavo kadaisė plačiai išsiakojusiam sidabrmrskinių judėjimui ir redagavo fašistin laikraštį "The Galilean." Kartu su Pelley buvo teisiamai keli jo bendradarbiai. Šnipas-Pastorius Bando Išsisukinėti

HARTFORD, rugp. 12.—Čia teismas protestantų pastorius Kurt E. B. Molzahn, kuris yra kaltinamas šnipinėjime naciams, ir tuo pačiu laiku priklaupęs prie nacinio Bundo, bando išsisukinėti. Jis sako, esą, jis niekad nepriklausė Bundui ir net esąs nacių priešas.
Zinoma, faktams kabant prieš jį, jis neturi šansų laimėti.

der-on buvo nuteista dviem metams ir Lawrence A. Brown, iš Noblesville, Ind., penkiem metams.
Pelley gynėjas pareiškė, kad jis apuluos dėl savo kliento į aukštesnes teismo įstaigas. Savo paskutinėje kalboje teisėjas Baltzell pareiškė, kad negali žalis dabartinis karo metu negali toleruoti laisvėje moralo ardytojų ir kiršintojus, kaip tai buvo William Dudley Pelley.

RAF Lėktuvai Atakavo Mainz, Vakarinę Vokietiją

ATAKOJE DALYVAVO APIE 400 LĒKTUVŲ; 16 BUVO PRARASTI

LONDONAS, rugp. 12.—Svarbus Vokietijos geležinkelių mazgas ant Reino Mainz buvo atakuotas apie keturių šimtų RAF lėktuvų. Britų šaltiniai pažymi, kad šis bombardavimas buvo ypatingai pasėkninąs. Kaip yra žinoma, Mainz yra ne vien svarbus geležinkelis, bet ir pramonės centras. Ten daugiausia koncentruojasi chemijos fabrikai.
Kitos britų eskadros tuo laiku bombardavo kitus punktus Vokietijoje ir vokiečių okupuotoje teritorijoje. Tarp kitų buvo bombarduota Calais. Vienas vokiečių lėktuvas tą pačią dieną buvo sunaikintas virš Anglijos.

Kraujas Liejasi Visoj Indijoje; Anglų Darbininkai Reikalauja Nusileidimų

BOMBEJUS, rugp. 12.—Nauja banga kruvinių susirėmimų rittasi per visą Indiją ir bijoma, kad britai paskelbs krašte karą stovį. Pranešama, kad britai skubotai iš kitur gabena karius į Indiją, kadangi policija toli negali domiuoti padėties. Manoems indus demonstracijos, kurios pasibaigė kruvinais susirėmimais, įvyko Wardoje, Madrase, Poonoje ir New Delhi. New Delhi mieste demon-

Anglijos Komunistų Partija Pasmerkė Indijos Vadų Suėmimą

PARTIJA REIKALAUJA ATNAUJINTI DERYBAS

LONDONAS, rugp. 12.—Didžiosios Britanijos Komunistų Partija pasisakė už naujų derybų su indusų vadais pradėjimą ir kartu pasmerkė pravestus areštus. Komunistų Partija reikalauja nelaukiant pritraukti kraujo liejimą Indijoje ir bandyti susitarti su indusais leidžiant jiems sudaryti tautinį vyriausybę.
Komunistų Partijos pareiškime sakoma: "Kokios nuomėms nes nebūtume apie Kongreso vadų taktiškas klaidas, mes negalime pateisinti trumparegiškas ir neteisėtas administracijos provokacijas."

Washingtonas. — Tuo tarpu kai pranešimai iš pačios Indijos kalba apie neramumų ir susirėmimų augimą, Londonas praneša, kad situacija gerėja, tai yra, ginkluotos jėgos patina kontrolę.

DESPERATIŠKAS JAPONŲ JĖGŲ PRIEŠINIMASIS NEATSILAIKO

U. S. STABAS AUSTRALIJOJE, rugp. 12.— Jungtinių Valstijų marinai įsiveržė į dar dvi salas Solomono salyne ir sunkiose kovose su desperatiškai besiginančiais japonais bando tose salose įsitvirtinti. Manoma, kad mūsų jėgos tame žygyje vartojo ir parašulistus.
Kovai einant prie septintos dienos operacijos tebevyksta mums palankia kryptimi ir perspektyvos laimėjimui darosi vis ryškesnės. Kaip pranešama, japonai iš visų aplinkinių bazių

DĒL PAKEISTO ADRESO LA GUARDIA NEGALEJO BALSUOTI

NEW YORKAS, rugp. 12.—Pasirodo, kad LaGuardia atšalavimose balsavimuose to negalėjo, kadangi jis pamiršo pranešti apie savo adresu pakeitimą.

CLARK GABLE ISTOJO Į KARIUOMENĖ

HOLLYWOOD. — Į kariuomenę eiliniu kareiviu įstojo žinomas filmų artistas Clark Gable. Paskutinio laiku visai eilė žinomų artistų įstojo į mūsų ginkluotas jėgas.

MARCANTONIO PASIEKĖ DIDELĮ LAIMĖJIMĄ NOMINACINIUISE BALSAVIMUOSE

Sulyg Nacių Saltinių, Jie Atakuoja Britus Viduržemio Juroje

BERLYNAS, rugp. 12.—Oficialūs Vokietijos radio-agentūra (DNB) praneša, kad jie jau kelintą dieną atakuoja britų konvojų vakarinėje Viduržemio jūros dalyje. Konvojų atakuoja italų ir vokiečių kombinacijos aviacijos ir submarinų jėgos.
(Britai ir praneša apie laivyvų susidūrimą vakar Viduržemio jūroje ir pripažysta "Eagle" įskandinimą. Tuo pačiu laiku tapo paskandintas ir vienas Ašies jėgų submarinas).

stengiasi skubinti sustiprinimus, bet generolo MacArthurų jėgų aviacijos daliniai japonus visų laikų bombarduoja ir trukdo jiems tai vykdyti.

Viena jau aišku, kad mūsų jėgos yra galutinai įsitiprinusios Talugi saloje, kur japonai buvo priversti trauktis. Toje saloje, kaip ir naujai užimtoje, dar tebevyksta betarpiški susikirtimai tarp mūsų marinių ir japonų. Mūsų uoste vartojami durtuvai ir net revolveriai.

Marinai į naujas salas įsiveržė pasiekdami juos mažuosie sustiprinamose "komandų" laiveliuose. Tuo tarpu Australijos aviacijos Lockheed bombieriai atakavo Timor salą, kuri yra svarbi japonų bazė.

Naciai Nūžudė 6 Čekus

LONDONAS, rugp. 12.—Pasirodo, kad ne vien Francūzijos ir Holandijoje, bet ir Čekijoje naciai paskutiniomis dienomis sustiprinto terorą prieš gyventojus. Berlyno radio praneša, kad Čekoslovakijoje buvo nūžudyti šeši "išdavikai." — su-prask,—patriotai-kovotojai.

NEW YORKO miesto kongreso atstovas Vito Marcantonio didelė dauguma balsų laimėjo nominacijas ant Darbo Partijos sąrašo. Jis be to laimėjo nominacijas ir ant respublikonų, ir ant demokratų sąrašo.

Ant Darbo Partijos (ALP) sąrašo jis laimėjo 2049 balsus (prieš dešiniojo partijos sparno (socialdemokratams artimo) kandidato 234 balsus. Ant demokratų sąrašo jis laimėjo 5,247-niais balsais prieš 2,529 ir ant respublikonų 2,784 prieš 291.

Marcantonio yra labai populiarus New Yorke masėse už ištikimą jų reikalų gynimą kongrese. Jo laimėjimas galutiniuose balsavimuose savaime yra užtikrintas.

Priešui Padaryta Daug Nuostolių Kiska Saloje

WASHINGTONAS, rugp. 12.—Laivyvo komunikatas praneša, kad Kiska saloje mūsų jėgos bombardavimu kelios dienos atgal padarė japonams labai daug žalos. Visos japonų pakraučy baterijos buvo nutildytos ir sukelta saloje daug didelių ugnių.
Be to uoste tapo paskandintas vienas japonų prekybinis laivas.

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"Hitlerio Taku"

Kongresmanas Elmer J. Holland teisingai pareiškė atstovų bute: "Nereikia turėti ryšio su priešu, kad padėti jam ... užtenka tik neapkęsti tą patį, pagedauti tų pačių rezultatu, magstyti kaip priešas."

Jis taip kalbėjo pasmerkdamas laikraščius, kurie pastarnauja Hitleriui, jis taipgi sakė, kad tokių laikraščių leidėjai ... "eina Hitlerio taku, bendrai su juo neapkenčia Roosevelt, bendrai su juo neapkenčia Anglijos, arba Sovietų Rusijos ..."

Taip darydami tie laikraščiai "kasdien pildo žmonių morale, silpnina tai, pūdo tai, rusiškai pralaimėjimui". Jisai kalbėjo apie angliškus laikraščius, įvardindamas vieną Chicagos, vieną New Yorko ir Washingtono laikraščius, kontroliuojamus reakcinės giminės.

Tas pats tinka ir lietuvių laikraščiams, tik daug geriau. Visa eilė lietuvių laikraščių, anot p. Holland, eina Hitlerio taku. Štai kaip:

Kuomet Sovietų Sąjunga lieja kraują, aukoja gyvastis demokratijos karui prieš fašizmą, tie laikraščiai bauria pilnėdina tą šalį. Hitlerio armijos ginklais atakuoja SSSR, o tie lietuvių laikraščiai liežuviams.

Suprantama, liežuvis ne durtuvus ir Sovietų kariuomenės nejuduria, bet liežuvio atakos kelia prieš SSSR neapykantą Amerikoj ir tuo būdu kenkia Amerikos karo pastangoms, kenkia ypač paramai Sovietų Sąjungos.

Tie laikraščiai taip darydami padeda Hitleriui, eina vienu taku su Hitleriu.

Kuomet Sovietų Sąjungos žmonės baisiai aukojasi karui prieš Hitlerį, ir tai suprastami Amerikos žmonės stengiasi padėti Sovietams, tai tie laikraščiai bauriodami SSSR, kenkia tai pagelbai. Kai kur lietuvių draugystėse jau kilo ir vaidų dėlei to. Taip darydami jie irgi padeda Hitleriui, eina vienu taku su juo.

Kuomet Amerikos karo pastangoms reikalinga juo didesnė vienybė, tie laikraščiai vietoj raginti lietuvius prie vieningo veikimo, bruka klausimus, kurie kirsto lietuviams, kelia tarp jų vaidus. Taip darydami jie padeda Hitleriui.

Kuomet Hitlerio armija įėjo Lietuvon, ėmė plėsti tos šalies žemes, tie lietuvių laikraščiai vieni šaukė, kad "Lietuva išlaisvinta", kiti šaukė "Tris valio už Hitlerį ir nenugalimus legionus."

Taip darydami jie atvirai stojo talkon Hitleriui.

Tam reikia padaryti galas. Federale valdžia jau ima nagan angliškus laikraščius, kuriuos kongresmanas Holland gerai apibūdino; gal ateis eilė ir lietuviškių, kurie eina "Hitlerio taku."

Bet mums ne tai rūpi. Mums patiems reikia kovoti prieš juos. Ta kova yra naminio fronto kova su priešu, arba prieš pagelbininkais. Ta kova turi būti pareiga kiekvieno, kuris nori nugalėti fašizmą, kuris nori sumušti ašį.

Tą kovą reikia vesti draugystėse — prieš pronacinę propagandą, prieš fašistinę įtaką.

Tą kovą reikia vesti spaudoje — platinti anti-nacinę spaudą, vyti laukan pro-nacinių šlamštus.

Tą kovą reikia vesti neremiant jokio veikimo pro-nacinių elementu, nes rėmimas jų reiškia sykiu su jais ėjimą Hitlerio taku.

Tą kovą reikia vesti neduodant jiems jokios moralės ar mediaginės paramos.

Dėka mūsų pastangom, jau dingo iš tu laikraščių Hitlerio agento Pr. Ancevičiaus propaganda, taigi dingi ir nacių propaganda "laišku per Lisaboną." Ji dingo ne dėlto, kad tie laikraščiai būtų pakitę iš savo noro, bet dėlto, kad jie bijo tai dėti, kad pro-nacinės propagandos ima vis daugiau lietuvių neapkęsti ir atvirai taiti reikšti.

Dar smarkiau ir griežčiau prieš juos kovodami mes priversime juos arba tyti, o gal bent dėl svieto akių dėtis prie karo pastangų.

Neleistina, kad Amerikos lietuvių tarpe rastųsi priešo talkininkų, kurie kasdien vienu ar kitu būdu teiktų Hitleriui paramos ar bent pasitenkinimo.

O kurie nevezint mūsų kovos prieš juos, vistiek eis Hitlerio taku, jie nueis, kur jau nuejo nemažai jų talkininkų Amerikoje.

Geresniam Susipažinimui

Amerikos ambasadorius Maskvoj William Harrison Standley sako deda pastangas geresniam supažindinimui Sovietų Sąjungos su Amerikos gyvenimu, o Amerikos žmones su SSSR gyvenimu. Tam tikslui paruošta tinkamos propagandos.

Britanijos ambasada net laikraštį leidžia rusų kalba "Britansky Sojuznik" tam tikslui.

Laisvųjų Francūzų atstovybė Londone nuolat siunčia Sovietams visokių žinių apie savo veiklą po 20,000 žodžių į mėnesį.

Sovietų Sąjungoj aiškinama žmonėms apie Amerikos ir Anglijos bendras pastangas fašizmą sumušti, apie tų šalių vienybę kare, ir t.t.

Po praeito karo, kai Rusijoj įvyko revoliucija, ta šalis buvo perdaug izoliuota, atskirta, o tas gerai pastarnavo Vokietijos imperializmui, taigi Hitlerio karui ir prieš Angliją su Amerika, ir prieš Sovietų Sąjungą.

Ta padėtis norima panaikinti. Po šio karo turės būti geresnis susipratimas tarp tų šalių žmonių ir SSSR ir, žinoma, geresni santykiai kaip buvo pirmiau.

Svarbus Laimėjimas

Užvakar penkiose valstijose įvyko primary balsavimai (nominacijos) kongresmanų ir kai kurių lokalinių urėdininkų.

New Yorko valstijoj nominuota 43 kongresmanai, o likusieji du, renkami viso valstijoj, "at-large", rodos bus nominuoti partijų konvencijose.

Nominacijų pasekmės ga geros. Visa eilė prezidento Rooseveltui nusistatymo priešų pralaimėjo.

Reikšmingiausias laimėjimas bene bus new-yorkiški kongresmano Vito Marcantonio. Jis laimėjo nominacijas netik American Labor Party tikietis, bet ir demokratų, ir republikonų.

Marcantonio skaitomas komunistu ir jo priešai daug ir garsiai prieš jį rėkė. Pridėjo savo trigrašį ir kai kurie "progesyviai," einanti su Rooseveltu.

Bet niekas negelbėjo. Jaunas Marcantonio laimėjo nevien Darbo Partijos, bet ir demokratų, ir republikonų balsus.

Jų laimėjimas geriausiai parodo, jog žmonės nepaiso raudonojo baubo. Rikemas prieš jį kaip prieš komunistą netik nepakenkė, bet rodos kiek tiek padėjo.

Clevelande laimėjo pažangus kandidatas Feighan prieš buvusį kongresmaną izoliacininką Sweeney.

TAUPLYKIME centus, o geriausias taupymui būdas yra perkant Karo Stampas, kurias paskui galima iškeisti į Karo Bondus. Dabar pirktę \$18.75 bondsą po 10 metų gausime \$25. O kam nebus galima laukti taip ilgai, galima atsiimti pinigų bile kada po 60 dienų nuo pirkimo bondsu.

Tatai yra ne tik geras taupymo būdas, bet ir patriotinė kiekvieno pareiga.

DARBO UNIJŲ VIENYBES KONGRESAS LONDONE, ANGLIJOJ

Sąjudis už Amerikos Darbininkų Vienybę ir už Amerikos, Britanijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos Bendrą Veikimą

Visos pažangios visuomenės akys nukreiptos į darbo unių judėjimą nacionaliu ir pasauliniu mastu. Tas judėjimas turi didžios įtakos į karo fronte einančius grandioziskus mūsų už demokratijos užtikrinimą ir už fašistinės reakcijos palaidojimą. Iš dienos į dieną darbo unių veiklos glaudesnis apvienijimas darosi aktualesnis.

Neseniai įvykusioj automobilų darbininkų unijos 7-toj konvencijoj buvo tvirtai užkaktuota ne tik šios šalies unių vienybės klausimas, tai yra vieningas veikimas tarpe CIO ir ADF unių ir gelžkelių brolių, bet ir darbo unių vienybė tarptautine plotme.

Neseniai Jungtinėse Valstijose lankėsi Britanijos Darbo Unių Kongreso sekretorius Walter Citrine. Jo misija buvo, kad suartinti šios šalies darbininkų judėjimą su Britanijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos darbininkų judėjimu.

Tenka pabrėžti, jog šisai judėjimas yra sveikinamas ne tik darbininkijos, bet ir visų demokratiniai nusistatusių žmonių. Tačiau, dėja, tas judėjimas nesivysto sparčiai ir neina tokia plačia vaga, kaip to sąlygos reikalauja. Risy su tuo tenka mesti šviesos ant šio klausimo ir atžymėti visą eilę svarbių faktorių.

Imant visą tų trijų šalių darbo unių judėjimą, reikia turėti galvoj, kad Amerikoj yra 12,000,000 organizuotų darbininkų, Britanijoj 15,000,000 ir Sovietų Sąjungoj 25,000,000 darbininkų. Bendrai 50,000,000 darbo unių narių. Tai milžiniška jėga. Pati sveikiausia ir stipriausia dalis žmonių tiek mūsų šalyje, tiek kitose šalyse.

Sartinimas tos milžiniškos jėgos, kad ji solidarai veiktų ir sutartinai smogtų kirčius ašiai, yra užtikrinimas, kad fašizmas bus sutriuškintas.

Tačiau su apgalvestavimu tenka konstatuoti faktas, kad Walter Citrine misija nevisai pavyko. Čia jo atsilankymas nedavė tiek pasekmių, kiek galėjo duoti, jeigu ne tie apriboti įgalavimai, kuriuos jis čia atsiėmė iš savo darbo unių centro.

Walter Citrine buvo įduotas įgaliojimas nuo Britanijos Darbo Unių Kongreso, kad jis oficialiai pasimatytų tik su ADF viršininkais ir kad tik Amerikos Darbo Federacijos Taryba turi teisę siųsti delegatus į Britanijos, Sovietų Sąjungos ir Amerikos Darbo Unių Kongresą. Dėl šios skerspains Citrine oficialiai nesimatė net su Murray ir kitais CIO unių nacionaliais vadais. Bet visgi neoficialiai jis kalbėjosi su CIO unių prezidentu, kalbėjosi ir su kitais Industrinių Organizacijų Kongreso viršininkais.

Amerikos darbininkai kelia ryškų ir reikalauja darbo unių tarptautinės vienybės. Tik savaitė atgal įvykusian ADF Tarybos susirinkimam Chicagoj 150 unių viršininkų prisistūpė reikalavimą, kad Federacija nedelsiant imtų veikti taja kryptim. Reikalavimus atsiuntė iš Amalgamietų suivųjų unijos, iš maliavotųjų unijos, iš statybos darbininkų lokaly, iš maisto darbininkų unijos lokaly ir tt.

Philip Murray, CIO unių galva, kalbėdamas Automobilų Darbininkų Unijos 7-toj konvencijoj stipriai pasisakė už Amerikos, Britanijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos vieningą veikimą. Stipresniam savo pozicijos pavaizdavimui, jis net telegramą paskaitė konvencijai, kurią vėliau pasiuntė Walter Citrine. Toj telegramoj pasakė ryškų teisybės žodį ne tik Walter Citrine, bet visam Britanijos Darbo Unių Kongresui, kad jis ir jo atstovaujamos CIO unijos už vieningą tarptautinį darbininkų solidarumą ir bendrą veikimą. Ten nurodė, kad tuo keliu, kokį čia būdamas Citrine bandė praveisti, CIO unijos neis. Bet jos eis savo pasirinktą keliu.

Siame punkte reikia išskelti dar vienas faktas, kurį Murray užkavė, tai ta, kad Citrine sakė, jog Amerikos darbo unių delegaciją į Amerikos, Britanijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos Kongresą, kuris nepoilsį įvyks Londone, kontroliuos ADF.

Industrinių Unių Kongresas aiškiai ir pilnai pasakė, kad šis delegaciją į Kongresą, bet visai ne per ADF ir ne per Federacijos viršininkų kontrolę.

Taip ir reikėjo ir taip turėti būti. CIO unijos apima gaviausias šios šalies industrijas: plieno, motorizujų imonių darbininkus, petro-

CIVILIŲ TEISIŲ FEDERACIJA ŠAUKIA MICHIGAN VALSTIJOS KONFERENCIJĄ

Detroit, Mich. — Subatoj, rugpjūčio 15 d., Book Cadillac viešbuty įvyks visos Michigan Valstijos Konferencija. Sulyg profesoriaus F. Shepard, Civilijų Teisių Federacijos pranešimo, tai konferencija šaukiama: "Sutriuškiniui Michigan'o pentakolumnistų ir sutvirtinimui Michigan'o vienybės dėl pergales." Iš to pareiškimo kiekvienam turėtų būti aišku kaip svarbi bus ši konferencija.

Konferencijoj kalbės Dr. Malcolm S. Maclean, prezidentas Hampton Instituto ir pirmininkas vieno prezidento Roosevelto komiteto, būtent: Committee on Fair Employment Practice. Šis komitetas buvo sudarytas, kad prižiūrėtų, kad negrai nebūtų diskriminuojami industrijoj bei kitose darba-

vietėse. lumo, gumo, jūrininkystės, maisto ir net kasyklų. Aišku, virš 5,000,000 veikliausių ir svarbiausių industrijų darbininkų negalėjo priimti, kad jie būtų tik pridėckas prie to didelio ir tiek daug reikiacioj tarptautinio darbo unių judėjime.

Dar reikia atžymėti, kad nuo Amerikos, Britanijos ir Sovietų Sąjungos darbo unių solidarumas turi suvaidinti ir suvaidins gigantiską vaidmenį antro fronto atidaryme — užtakavime fašistinės ašies iš vakarų.

Karo laimėjimas ir po karo taikos ir pažangos užtikrinimas prašyte prašo susitarimo ir vieningumo tarpe demokratinųjų šalių darbininkijos. Neabejotina, kad lietuvių darbininkai, kurie priklauso prie Amerikos Darbo Federacijos unių ir prie Industrinių Organizacijų Kongreso unių, kaip ir lietuvių darbininkai, kurie gyvena Sovietų Sąjungoj ir ten priklauso prie darbo unių, nuosirdžiai stoja už tą taip reikalingą, taip trokštamą vienybę įsiktinijama tarpe aukščiaui išvardintų šalių.

Konferencijoj bus atstovauta keletas šimtų bažnytinių grupių, ūkininkų organizacijų, darbo unių ir fraternalių organizacijų.

Mūsų lietuvių organizacijos taipgi turi delegatus, kurie lanko tos Civilijų Teisių Federacijos mitingus. Veikiausiai jie ir šioje konferencijoje atstovaus savo organizacijas. Bet to neužtenka. Kiekviena organizacija, kuri mata kaip plačiai veikia šioje valstijoj pentakolumnistai, turėtų pasirūpinti, kad bent vienas narys, nors valdybos paskirtas, turėtų dalyvauti.

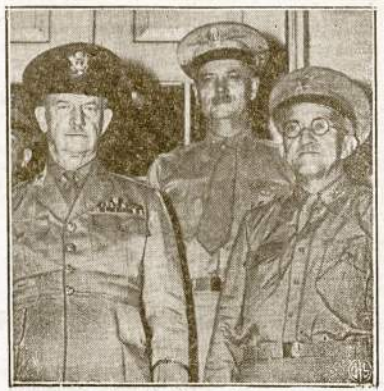

"ZERO HOUR FOR SECOND FRONT IS HERE"

United Nations Must Act Or Face Defeat—War Correspondent

"The United States and Britain are in immediate danger of losing this war—and can lose it in the next 40 days . . . by Sept. 15, unless American and British armed forces do something about it."

This is the verdict of Leland Stowe, U. S. correspondent, in a copyrighted story from Moscow to the New York Post and the Chicago Daily News.

"These things must be apparent to Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt, to the British and American commanders of the Allied armed forces. If they are not so apparent as to dictate a second front immediately then the United States and Britain run about 97 chances out of 100 of losing the war—both the war against Germany and the war against Japan—in the next 40 days."

If the German offensive smashes ahead during the next 40 days at the pace it maintained through July, says Stowe, the Nazis will have conquered the Caucasus and its rich stores of oil. But "Russia's vast petroleum store is only one of the many tremendous prizes at stake in the Caucasus," he writes.

Vast Peril

The "inevitable results" of the fall of the Caucasus in the next 40 days are, says Stowe, will include the following:

TURKEY "will almost certainly throw in its lot with the Nazis."

IRAN will not be able to hold out.

"The whole Allied position in SYRIA, PALESTINE, and IRAQ will be seriously undermined."

"The British and American positions in EGYPT, along the SUEZ, and even in ERITREA will be most gravely exposed."

"The isolation of INDIA will be virtually assured."

No Battlefields Left

The British and Americans will be left without a battlefield by next spring.

"These, in solemn truth, are the things for which Hitler has staked everything and is expending everything in his drive for Grozny and Baku," Caucasus oil centers.

"Let Nazi Germany win the Caucasus oil and Hitler's next main effort is bound to be to divide the Russians from their Anglo-American allies—and vice versa," says Stowe.

A pro-fascist Munich would then mark the Nazis' victory.

"A super-Munich would be the Nazis' next supreme objective."

"It would only be another armed truce more gigantic than Munich's."

"This time it would win the war"

Y.:—Lithuanian Citizens Fund, a pro-Nazi organization operating under the guise of aiding Lithuanian "refugees" and element who beat a swift retreat into the arms of Hitler following the attachment of Lithuania to the Soviet Union, was ordered closed by the U. S. State Department last week. The move marks the beginning of swift measures against all pro-Nazi Lithuanian groups in the country.

Second Front Must Be Opened To Defeat Enemy, Says President

Two years ago, on July 21st, 1940, the Lithuanian People's Seimas (Parliament), elected by the whole people, proclaimed Lithuania a Soviet Socialist Republic and adopted a declaration on Lithuania's incorporation into the USSR as a full fledged-Union republic. This did away with the danger of Lithuania being drawn into the sphere of German fascist policy. Hitlerism had long coveted Lithuania and the entire Baltic as a base for an attack against the Soviet Union.

Just as Latvia and Estonia, Lithuania was in danger of becoming a vassal of fascist Germany, which like Hungary, Rumania and Finland would have been forcibly drawn into the criminal war against the Soviet

Union and all cultured mankind. The unanimity of the will of the People's Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia saved these peoples from a shameful lot of vassals of fascism being prepared for them by the fascist cliques then in power.

In my speech in connection with the ratification of the Anglo-Soviet treaty in the Supreme Soviet of the USSR I stressed that history of the Lithuanian people knows not a single year which brought such benefits to the working people as in less than a year of Soviet power in Lithuania. In the friendly family of the peoples of the USSR, in its free Soviet Socialist Republic, the

Lithuanian people acquired real independence and broadest possibilities for national culture and economic progress. It was guaranteed against any attempts on part of the fascist and reactionary forces from within.

It must be emphasized that this greatest political and social change was accomplished in the most humane fashion, without slightest dissidents; without bloodshed. The vile and treacherous attack of German fascism upon the Soviet Union and the temporary occupation of Soviet Lithuania interrupted our creative fruitful work.

A year of fascist occupation is the blackest year in the history of the Lithuanian people. The German fascists exterminated tens of thousands of Lithuanian people. Hundreds of thousands are languishing in prisons and concentration camps, on forced labor jobs or are shipped to Germany.

The Germans are rapidly colonizing Lithuania. Most undisguised Germanization of the Lithuanian people is resorted to. Only a handful of traitors and German agents become the flunkies for the occupationists and the hangmen of their people, thereby earning contempt and universal hatred.

Together with all peoples of the great Soviet Union, the Lithuanian people are bearing the brunt of the blows of the fascist hordes. The Lithuanians are fighting for liberation of their soviet land from the German invaders and thereby, also, for the liberation of all enslaved peoples of Europe.

Active resistance to the German invaders and partisan (guerrilla) warfare against them is incessantly carried on in Lithuania, involving the broadest sections of the population. News is constantly arriving from Lithuania about the heroic exploits of the partisans who attack German garrisons, transports, occupation officials, blow-up bridges and railways.

No amount of repressions or executions are able to break the resistance of the Lithuanian popular masses; no tricks can deceive the people who are fully awake to the depravity of fascist designs. Not only in Lithuania, but also on free territory of the Soviet Union, in Lithuanian units of the Red Army and on the labor front, Lithuanians are fighting the German occupation forces. As all peoples of the Soviet Union, the Lithuanian people are firmly confident of the inevitable rout of Hitlerism.

Lithuanians fervently greeted the conclusion of the treaty alliance between the Soviet Union and Great Britain and the agreement with the United States as a new guarantee of speedy victory and their liberation.

No doubt that with a certain strain of effort and change to decisive offensive operations on part of all the allies on the existing and the new fronts the Hitler bandits, with their plans of destruction of freedom of the peoples and for world domination will be wiped out in 1942.

In interests of all cultural humanity, in the interest of future and well being of all peoples, gory Hitlerism must be put to an end as soon as possible to enable the people the world over to return to creative work interrupted by the war and to establish collaboration of the peoples based on principles of freedom, equality and justice.

"If there is ever a pause in the fighting, Hitler feels certain that fifth columns will do the rest."

"The Caucasus seems terribly remote from American schools, American elections, American free speech," Stowe reminds his American audience, "but for all that, all these cherished institutions can receive their mortal blow if ever, on the very day, that Nazi troops enter Baku."

"Britain and America cannot defeat Germany and Japan unless, at the very least, they have Russia as an ally in Europe," Stowe writes.

"Britain and America cannot claim any future right to the support of the huge Russian army unless Anglo-American forces speed to the aid of the Russians in their greatest hour of peril."

"It is not yet too late. But it is five minutes to midnight. If mid-night strikes and the Caucasus falls without Anglo-American intervention in Europe, there will be no excuse for an American war correspondent to remain in Russia," Stowe concludes grimly. "He will be needed at home to fight in America on the third front—the front against all those who would welcome or tolerate a super-Munich."

In fact, never has such an interest in politics been evidenced as in our time. Otherwise, how could one account for the following:

As far back as ten years ago, the people were protesting the shipment of scrap metal to Japan. They warned of Japan's intentions to rule the world, and reminded that some day the American boys would be on the receiving end of these little missiles. We don't have to say, "We told you so." We all read the papers.

● When the Loyalists in Spain fought against such terrific odds, the peoples of all the world sounded grave warnings to their respective governments. That Franco MUST NOT be allowed to win. The peoples' wishes were again disregarded. Seems that then, too, the people were "hazy." Franco was able to get all the ammunition he needed from Germany and Italy, plus soldiers to man them. Loyalist Spain was blockaded—isolated, like a Leper from the rest of the world.

● When Czechoslovakia was being "sold down the river," the whole world stood up as one man against this unspeakable crime. But again they were disregarded. They were still "hazy" about military matters. Where in heaven's name does "military" enter the picture? It was politics—not military. If it had not been political, would not Czechoslovakia, with its best equipped army in the world, have made a stand against these beasts who disgrace the uniform of man! It seems to me that this talk of "leaving military matters to the army" should receive such a smack—that it will be like "the shot that was heard 'round the world." **When Are We Going to Be Prepared?**

● There are about four million soldiers in England and Ireland who are just waiting . . . waiting for further orders.

In the meantime, small bands of Yugoslav guerillas, with about a thousand men, penetrate thirty-five miles into Italy to engage the enemy. Their arms consist of whatever they are able to wrest from the enemy in the forests. When the first guerillas were formed, they went to face the enemy practically bare handed. Jumping out at the Nazis from unexpected places, they were able to surprise them and capture their arms. Yet—we—who have millions of soldiers armed and trained—are still waiting . . .

What, pray, are we waiting for? For Germany to fortify the zones where the invasion forces would land? Hitler is forcing his slaves in occupied countries to build fortifications—where formerly there were none. Is that what we want?

Are we waiting until India, Turkey, Switzerland and other countries ally

themselves with Germany? If we do not act quickly and back up our promise to Russia to open up a second front, how can we expect to have the support of these countries? If Russia is crushed, how can these weaker nations hope to hold out? One need not be a military strategist (according to Mr. Leach) to realize the fallacy of this argument.

● Hitler is flooding this country with all kinds of propaganda, through his agents, of the dangers of opening a second front. He is very sure of the effectiveness of this propaganda, or he would not withdraw his troops from nearly all the occupied countries to fight at the Russian front. He has stated in no uncertain terms that he doesn't believe that England and the U. S. are going to open a second front, or they certainly would not have been fools enough to tell that the invasion would be through France, etc. The hesitation on our part certainly justifies his theory.

Leland Stowe has warned America that the next 40 days would tell the story for Britain and U. S. If Hitler is allowed to reach the Caucasus, unhampered by a second front, then these countries needn't expect help in the future from Russia. Because Russia will be unable to give it.

● If the Caucasus falls, then the British and American positions in Egypt along the Suez will be exposed. Hitler can then release overwhelming forces upon Egypt any time from October on. (That is, if a second front is not opened this month by the Allies). The British forces haven't fared any too well in Egypt with about 30 divisions against them. What will happen if they are faced with about a hundred divisions?

● If the Caucasus falls, then the Germans will take Iran, Syria, Palestine, Iran and Egypt and British and American forces will be forced to invade Europe next Spring practically alone. Is THAT what we are waiting for?

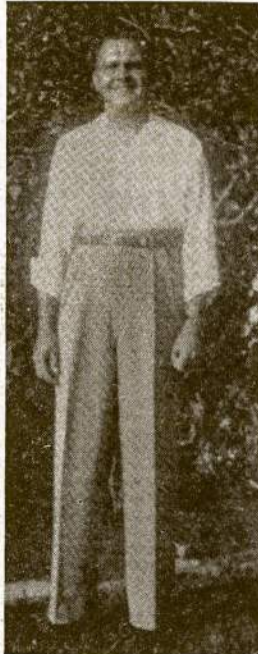

THEY SAW THE MENACE

● Julius and Tony have been dead now for four years. They were the first of Lithuanian-Americans to see the menace we faced and went off to meet it.

● Both were killed on the Ebro front in Spain, in the last days of fighting of the Republican forces.

● It was a dark, sullen, moonless night that Julius Baublis "got his". He was holding down one of the scattered outposts of the International Brigade. Somewhere out in the dangerous darkness in front of him was a fascist machine-gun nest. Julius whispered to his three companions that he was going out to get it, and climbed over the shallow parapet and disappeared.

● Minutes dragged. Then suddenly oaths in Spanish were heard. There was a flash, and then an explosion. It was quiet after that, damned quiet!

● An attack was launched against the fascists the coming morning. Julius was found in a crumpled heap, eyes glassily turned skyward. The back of his head was blown off.

● Tony Mazurka "got his" soon after. He had been wounded once already, a bullet had gone through his shoulder. After a month in the hospital he had gone back to the front, disregarding medico orders.

● He was a brave fellow, Tony was. He had "bummed" and ridden the rods from coast to coast back home. Times were poor, he searched for work. He became toughened. Upon return home he managed to find a job in a steel rolling mill. A pretty girl attracted his attention, they became engaged. She was startled at the announcement that he was leaving for Spain.

● Tony's leaving was sudden. As sudden as was Julius' and mine. The three of us left together, bunked together, faced the hardships of the journey unitedly.

● Folks back home never really knew Tony, never realized the materialistic conceptions that lay behind his devil-may-care swagger and attitude. It was only after he was dead, and now that we as a nation are fighting the self-same enemy that he and hundreds of other Americans and anti-fascists fought then, have they realized the truth of his words which reached them by letter.

● Wrote he:

"We are going to be next on their list if we don't realize that they have to be defeated in Spain. They are not going to stop, and I like my freedom enough to go off and fight for it."

● I was in a hospital with a shrapnel blasted arm when news of his death came through. I had been corresponding with him. Friends later gave me the whole story. He had been hit in the leg. Being carried by stretcher-bearers to a place of haven, a trench mortar missile exploded nearby killing the bearers and Tony.

● Today he and Baublis lie buried in the olive groves of Spain, because they wanted to smash the unholy trio of Franco, Hitler and Mussolini then—and they could have been smashed had it not been for the Hitler-lovers and appeasers of that day.

● They were good Americans—martyrs in the cause of liberty for which we all fight now. I wonder what those people, those that disbelieved that the Spanish Republic's fight was ours, think today. Do they still believe it was a war in which only a lot of "crazy Reds" were involved?

The Nazis think the American people are a bunch of suckers.

Unfortunately, there have been too many in the United States, and in our own Lithuanian circles, who have justified their contempt for us.

2. Hush-hush policy in reference to all mention of immediate offensive warfare against the enemy.
3. Excusing, justifying and apologizing for the brutal Nazi terror in the occupied countries.

Chicago's Lithuanian Daily "Naujienos" has been consistently and unhesitatingly using these weapons of suicide. **"Red Cross" Cloak Used for
German Propaganda**

The notorious "list of 12,000" makes its appearance, in the innocent guise of "news" in the pages of Naujienos and other newspapers which have been, knowingly or unknowingly, taken in. The fish bite pretty heavily now, the Ministry of Propaganda in Berlin is saying.

Naujienos published the names of 12,000 who have been purportedly deported to Siberia and the Russian interior where dire things have happened to them. They have either been shot by the Red Army or put in concentration camps and labor gangs. The Russians, it seems, had an aversion to Lithuanians and went about deporting them right and left.

The list is prepared by the "Lithuanian Red Cross." The American Red Cross, part of the international Red Cross set-up, has no idea as to the source and preparation of this list. The only ones who may know are the German Ministry of Propaganda and Naujienos, and Naujienos isn't talking.

The list is carefully designed for one purpose: to blame the Russians and the Red Army for all the misery and horror which the Germans have forced upon the citizens of Lithuania.

Has someone been shot because he refused to hang the swastika from a Kaunas window? Put the name on the list and say the Russians killed him. As for those who escaped the Nazi terror, put their names on the list and say they are dying in Russian concentration camps.

Thirty thousand Lithuanian men, women and children have been murdered by the Nazi military juggernaut and occupation. But let Naujienos be silent on that point and publish a "list" of those who were "deported or shot" by the Russians. The Nazis wouldn't do such a thing.

"Via Lisbon"

If the editors of Naujienos have seen the newspapers in the memorable days of December, 1941, there is little indication of that fact in their handling of stories dealing with Lithuania and the Nazi occupation of that country.

In December, 1941, Congress and the President declared war on Germany. Confusion reigns in the editorial office for someone is under the erroneous impression that Russia is the enemy and Germany the ally.

The name of Pranas Ancevicus, Gestapo agent in charge of Lithua-

nian fifth column work, is no longer proudly furled over lengthy "news items". Naujienos has found it advisable to discontinue that policy.

The question sooner or later arises: Do those who have attacked Naujienos believe the editors to be in the pay of the Germans? Do they believe the editors to be sabotaging the war effort by attempting to demoralize the will to aid our allies and the will to fight by confusing the issues and sowing indecision?
"We must look for the answer in the efficiency of Nazi propaganda that has made American citizens parrot the effusions of Berlin.

Every possible personal sacrifice for the war may be made by the Naujienos writers, but their constant repetition of Nazi propaganda is tying the noose around our collective necks. They may buy bonds, but they are helping the bunds when they try to rob us of the will to fight.

Which is the greatest treason—the blowing up of bridges or the separation of us from our allies?

Whether Naujienos knows it or not, they are playing Hitler's game. Our entire civilization is at stake in this war of survival and caustic references to the singularity of our allies and their leadership are not to be taken lightly.

Some say that if the statements published in Naujienos are treasonous, government authorities would have taken the proper steps. If no steps have been taken or warnings given, it then follows, the editorial policy has not yet touched the point where it becomes treason or else the Lithuanian translators in Washington are not translating properly.

But be that as it may, it is not the function of newspapers to take action on such points, but to tell the truth as we see it. Only the bright sunlight of open publication and discussion will bring out into the open the various nests where Nazi propaganda is sucking the blood of the American people.

Purdue football coach thinks much of Lithuanian-American boys, Cycenas and Leugo, both scheduled for big games this season . . . Great Lakes expected to be toughest Purdue opponent . . . Minnesota, Michigan, Ohio State, Indiana, Northwestern and Wisconsin rated very strong. Illinois, Iowa and Purdue of unknown quality . . . Football stars to be in service of Uncle Sam soon . . . Meakim, Vecs, Ehrlich, Johnson, Schumacker, Anderson in service now...

● Today's column will entirely deal with the Purdue University 1942 football season by way of an interview with Elmer Burnham newly appointed head football coach who has been head freshman football coach at Purdue for a number of years.

● **Question:** Do you think that your team will do much better than it has done for the past several years under coach Mal Elward?

● **Answer:** Football is always uncertain; this year it is more than ever. Nobody knows what is going to happen. We might have a better team, or it might be worse. I couldn't answer this one.

● **Question:** Ed Cycenas and Alex Leugo are both Lithuanian-American boys on your squad. What are their chances of making good this fall?

● **Answer:** I think both boys will give a good account of themselves, and we are definitely counting on them for a lot of playing. Leugo, of course, has already played some varsity ball, but it will be the first year for Ed. Both are good strong boys, and they love to play.

● **Question:** What opponent, in your opinion, will be the toughest team Purdue will play against this fall?

● **Answer:** I might answer that by asking you which tree in the forest has the greenest leaves. I can't see much difference among the college teams, but we do know that Great Lakes will probably be especially outstanding.

● **Question:** Will there be any major change in formations, shifts, etc., this fall?

● **Answer:** The "T" formation will no doubt be experimented with by many teams, but we will not change radically from last year's formations.

● **Question:** What are Purdue's chances for the Big Ten title this year (or rather the Big Nine)?

● **Answer:** Well, it's either 9 or 10 to one depending on how you look at it.

● **Question:** Who, in your opinion, is the strongest team in the Big Nine this fall? Why?

● **Answer:** I have not met any of the conference teams in actual competition as yet, so I am not in a position to catalogue them from experience. ● The home front is as important as the war front. We've got to keep things rolling here so our boys can keep rolling back the Axis.

● Our friends in the service expect this action on our part. And as soldiers without uniform, on whom depends a great portion of victory war effort, none of us can continue "mooning."

● A good example of how we can help our boys can be demonstrated at coming elections. All of us know or feel that somehow the war effort is being held back, that some sabotage is in progress. We feel very badly over the situation and have been eyeing politico's who got jobs due to our vote, as responsible to a great extent for the sabotage.

● This is quite true. We know for a fact that certain appeaser politicians and office holders locally or in Washington, are gumming up the works, deliberately. They constantly criticize the President, find all sort of items and reasons for not supporting necessary war measures, create dissension and strife. This clement must be bounced. They must not receive our support at the polls, for supportance of them is detrimental to the boys in service. That we know, and if we don't, it's about time! Our vote should go to that person whose past record has been one of victory, and whose program today is one of full support to the President, our allies, and stands for the immediate opening of a 2nd front.
