RIGA, Latvia.—The All Soviet Union record for the 20 kilometer walk was broken here by Latvian Lieupaskalnis who made the distance in 1 hr., 50.2 seconds. RESOLUTION ON LITHUANIAN COUNCIL (Taryba)


- WHEREAS: An organization under the name of Lithuanian Council (Taryba) purports to represent Lithuanian-American sentiment, and
- WHEREAS: Said organization has set itself a financial goal of 250,000 dollars for aid to "displaced persons" in Europe, and
- WHEREAS: Lithuanian Council carries on agitation and propaganda to the affect that present Lithuania is under an "anarchy"
- BE IT RESOLVED: That the assembled delegates to the Chicago United Lithuanian Committee conference representing 35 organizations in the Chicago area, meeting Sunday, October 6, 1946, expose the Lithuanian Council of fraudulence and misrepresentation when they claim to speak for ALL Lithuanian Americans.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Lithuanian Council speaks solely for that element who have definite pro-nazi ties, and whose wish is the return of Lithuania to a Smetona dictatorship.

That Lithuania as a nation decided their way of life and government in the 1940 elections when they by popular vote ousted Smetona and hirelings, attached themselves as a nation to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

That the course of the nation and wish of the people to remain as one of the soviet republics, was exemplified by their action against the Nazi invaders whom they fought against in conjunction with the Red Army.

Lithuanians Condemn U.S. War Provoking Foreign Policy

VILNIUS, Lithuania.—With the upsurge of sports activity in Lithuania, boxing is becoming one of the most popular sports. In some of the boxing matches which were held in the early part of last August in the Vilnius Stadium here, there were over 2,000 people to see Lithuanians vie for honors.

Boxers were here from three local sports clubs: Žalgiris, Dynamo and the Spartakas clubs.

In the first match which was in the flyweight division, Żygas of żalgiris Club took on Bartasiūnas of the Spartakas group. It was a three round give and take tussle which was won by Żygas on points.

In the second match, m the banfamweight division, Lithnanian bantam champion Matukevičius successfully defended his crown against challenger Kaplanas, winning by a technical knockout in the third. The first two rounds gave the champ a slight edge, but in the third Matukevičius developed a good offense and after a few good punches, the referee declared a technical knockout.

In the third bout which was in the lightweight division, Mickevičius of the žalgiris Club took on Čekanovas of Spartakas. The match was very close and was won after three rounds by Mickevičius on points. In the final bout of the evening, Geskesas of Spartakas took on Serovas of the Dynamo club and the former won on points.

Local papers are crying for more boxing and it is seen that more Liths are becoming interested in this spect.

Wallace Claims U. S. Responsible For A-Bomb Dispute

WASHINGTON — Henry A. Wallace, on his 58th birthday, said "Russian intransigence" on a system of international inspection of atom bomb manufacture "may not be unrelated to our inflexibility on the issue of our continuing to produce and stockpile atom bombs."

In a letter to the editor of the Washington Post, Herbert Elliston, Wallace answered a recent Post editorial criticizing his stand in Wallace's dispute on the atom question with Bernard M. Baruch, United States representative on the United States Atomic Energy Commission.

• Myrna Loy, screen star, last week filled a \$1,000,000 libel suit against the Hollywood Reporter, filmland trade publication which charged her with being a Communist.

• Several years ago during the existance of Congressman Dies as head of the "Un-American Committee," Shirley Temple fell into the same category. Most leading stars at one time or another have had "RED" hurled at them.

• The business of accusing persons who tread a progressive path with a scarlet tinge is old stuff. Reactionaries have been at it for years in order to maintain their grabbing interests.

• Now it's not illegal to belong to the Communist Party. The organization is a recognized factor in American life and on the ballot in most states. It's membership has grown tremendously and embraces noted personalities. What is more, the background of some of its members can be traced to the Plymouth Rock landing and the days of Daniel Boone. Yet propaganda still classifies Communists as somthing that sneaked in from Moscow and typically "un-American."

• To be sure the organization in the eyes of interests like the Meat Institute, or monopolists generally, is un-American in that it has rallied millions of persons behind trade-union organization, fight for peace, housing and better living conditions. To the big boys who are out to source the last nickel from the "gullible" public informed of the score by Comunists who are a ref parcel of the public, their existance is a in the neck.

That is why the other week the Meat Institute, for instance, bellowed their loudest when meat hoards were exposed by the Daily Worker. The public receiving these facts naturally raised hell and demanded action against meat trusts. Then it was that Meat Institute came out with material charging "communist conspiracy."

• The fact that Communists fought for meat for the people, for price ceilings, and against the meat monopoly automatically places them in a "foreign" and "un-American" category.

• Now the common people of America fall into exactly the same position on the basis of their wanting the meat and in demanding the packers be subject to government control, to the extent of plants being seized and operated by U. S. authorities.

• Such being the case, any person or organization that fights for right becomes Communist. Those that applaud big business, condemn OPA, hail war with Russia, hate unions, automatically are "Americans".

• If so, then most people are "Communist". The only thing they lack is a membership card. Have you received yours?



• That fair-haired boy is back in the news again. Senator C. Wayland Brooks (R., Ill.) who turns aerialist, acrobat, and mimic each time the boss, Col. McCormack of the Chicago Tribune steps on his corn, discovered another Communist plot.

in service, want to warp if at all possible GI's mentality in regards to what makes truth. Thus upon Brooks' request, the joint Army-Navy committee will review "Economics-Principles and Problems" which the Republican reactionary brands as "pure Communism," and decide whether the material is fit for army-navy student consumption.

• What amazes most Americans when it comes down to so-called "Communist literature," is why people like Brooks are frightened at the thought of students reading such material. If Communists and Communism are vile, why not let the student find out for himself? Let him read, study, analyze and compare. Let him then formulate an opinion.

• But that is what pro-fascists are deathly afraid of. It might well turn out that students would see a superiority in the Communist system of society as compared to our capitalism. Yes, even understand that the Communist Party is not somthing foreign, but an integral part of the people. Then where would Brooks-Hearst-McCormack be at?

• Therefore it's much better that honest material on economics, systems of society be eliminated. 



DOES THE ARMY NEED 5,000,000 MEN?

The War Department has given the nation a tip on how the Vandenberg-Byrnes "get tough" policy pays off. The Army now wants to get tough with the youth of America.

One million young men will be drafted annually under the latest proposal for universal compulsory military training. Of these, 726,000 will be taken by the Army, the balance by the Navy. They will be drafted for a minimum of a year, but here's how it works:

Six months of military training will be compulsory for all young males 18-20 years of age. After that period they have to choose one of the following-another six months of Army training; enlistment in the regular Army; Army controlled college education; entrance into a service academy; or enlistment in the organized reserves.

The draftees would receive no pay; merely an allowance to purchase such necessities and incidentals as are not provided by the Army.

In the war against the fascist Axis America's youth have shown they are ready and willing to fight for their country. But nationwide resentment has already arisen against this proposal. The people do not see what danger faces our country, which would compel it to adopt such a vast program of militarization. They wonder about our loyalty to the United Nations.

War Secretary Robert P. Patterson proved that this plan is NOT for defense of the nation when he told the American Legion he wanted an Army of 5,000,000 "in state of combat readiness at all times." To combat whom? The Army and National Guard would have 1,650,000. The organized reserves would have 3,000,000. And this doesn't take into account the 600,000 in the Navy, now bigger than the navies of the rest of the world combined.

This plan for militarizing America shows why certain gentlemen talk about "inevitable war."

They use their own war cries as blackmail to force Americans to continue paying 80 cents out of every tax dollar for war.

They are trying to disrupt the lives of the young generation and put America in uniform. Is this the price we must pay for Wall Street's ambition to dominate the world?

merica needs peace and security today. It can get that peace and security through returning to the policies of FDR and to Big Power unity. That's how we won the war. That's how we can win the peace.

Charges MacArthur Is Restoring Japanese Fascists To Power

The old ruling class of Japan has been revived under Gen. Douglas MacArthur's command the newly-established North American Committee for Democratic Japan, charged in its first statement of policy.

"A bunch of fascists and war criminals are herded together and made into a tool of the American imperialist," while labor and democratic activity is suppressed, the statement asserted.

American imperialists, the statement suggested, want to make Japan "a gigantic military camp hostile to the Soviet Union, Korea and democratic revolution of the Chinese people," while extracting raw material exclusively for themselves.

American Veterans Committee Calls For Rent Lid

The American Veterans Committee this week asked Price Administrator Paul Porter to place all college dormitories under rent control at prewar levels.

"Dormitory rents in many Eastern colleges have risen more than 20 percent, and in a few cases colleges are profiteering in an outrageous manner at the expense of the GI students," AVC Research Director Louis Harris said.

Harris warned if it is impossible to get such control, AVC would ask the Veterans Administration to revoke the accreditation of guilty colleges.

AVC is also pressing for an increase in allotments to student veterans from \$65 and \$90 for single and married veterans, respectively, to \$100 and \$125, Harris said.

Newspapers are a good source of advertising and developing public interest for all organization endeavors. But advertising in itself without supplementation in the form of person to person contact, sale of tickets in advance, cannot make an affair a success.

The unknown person in most organizations is he or she who upon receipt of tickets, goes out and does a bang-up of selling. One sale is worth several customers, in that the buyer popularizes the affair among thends.....

For the Fine Arts Festival we cannot expect or rely on a preponderant out-of-town audience. Actually the brunt of those attending will be from Chicago and immediate vicinity.

10,000 Tickets

As far as we know over ten thousand tickets will be in circulation. Choral, drama groups in Chicago, the arrangements, art, program committee, the variety of organizations and membership of them will become salesmen for this great demonstration of art and culture.

It's a terrific task and a short time remains for the job to be done. And the ones who do the job, as we stated previously, are the unknown, unpopularized persons whose names are seldom mentioned and whose photographs do not grace the pages of our newspapers.

They are the real artists, whose ability falls into a niche similar to those who paint, sing, dance and act. Their sole reimbursement is satisfaction in knowing that their efforts made that which was staged successful.
