

"In the name of simple justice, we urge you to show the usual American hospitality to these fighters on the side of freedom," the letter continued. "Franco can only interpret the deportation of his foes as an indication that democratic America is winking its collective eve at fascist terror in Spain. When Adolph's Nazis stomped through Lithuania, greeting them were a number of Quislings. When the armies raced headlong minus pants back in the direction of Berlin with the Red Army on their tail, with them ran a motely assortment of Lithuanian fascists, pro-nazis and puppet office holders.

AVC, Writers, Form National Committee To Oust Senator

A National Committee to Oust Bilbo, sponsored by the Civil Rights Congress, was announced by Quentin Reynolds and Vincent Sheean as cochairmen.
