Andrej Gromyko, TSRS atstovas, savo 35 minuciu kalboje, padarė tuos primetimus Amerikai. Jungtinių Tautų atominės kontrolės organizacijai.

Tai buvo aštriausia jo kalba prieš Ameriką.

Jis toli kalbėjo atmetė antrą J. T. Atominės Energetikos Komisijos raportą, kuris paduotas galutiniam užtvirtinimui.

NEW YORK, rugs. 11.—Transporto Darbininkų Unijos lokas 100 jau paruošė virtutes 12 garažų ir kitaip pasiruošė streikui, arbitracijos komiteitui nepatenkinus darbininkų reikalavimų. Streikų manoma pradėti rugsėjo 12, bet federalis teisėjas Peccora imasi tarpininkauti.

KATOWICE, rugs. 11.—(ALN)—Dauguma Lenkijos darbininkų netiki, kad Amerika tikrai nori demokratijos atkurti Europos valdžias. Tos kalbos yra paskleidimui nepastikėjimo Europos valdžioms, sako jie.

## TURI BŪTI PADARYTAS GALAS BRITANIJOS IMPERIALIZMUI

### Saukė: Lai Gyvuoja Egiptas; Lai Gyvuoja Tarybų Sąjunga, Lenkija ir Sirija

KAIRAS, rugs. 11.—Mfinios egiptiečių suklė didelės demonstracijos miestuose Port Said ir Alexandrijoj. Port Said, prie Suez kano'o, sumalkinta statula Ferdinandio de Lespes, kuris suplanavo iškasimą Suez kunoalo.

Demonstrantai saukė prieš Britanijos imperializmą, smerkė Jungtinių Tautų Saugumo Tarybų už atidėlojimą įsakymo Britanijai ištraukti savo armiją iš Egipto.

Minia žygiavo prie Britanijos konsulato saukdami, kad Britanijos imperializmui turi būti padarytas galas. Policija betgi nepileido ariti, tuo apsaugotas konsulas tuo padegimo.

Demonstrantai tada leidosi link britų kempės ant Kitchener St., bet ir ten juos patiko policija.

Svojojeita negažųjų "komplimentų" Bevinui, užsienio ministrui, ir Britanijos atstovui J. T. Taryboj, Sir Alexander Cadoganui.

4.000 Filitarij Nacionalė bovelos įmonės darbininkų pakelė streiką irgi protestui prieš laikymą Britanijos armijos Egipte. Ten irgi kilo didelės demonstracijos ir pašautu policija.

Port Said, išskleidžius vieną demonstraciją, kilo kita. Vėlei šaukta prieš Britanijai ir smerkta jos vyriausybės.

Policijai atkartotinais teko šauktis daugiau jėgų.

## Kongresas "Durnai Nubalsavęs", Sako Kongresmanas

Perdaug Mokėta Už Karo Kontraktus, Negalima Atkristi

WASHINGTONAS, rugs. 11.—Kongresmanas Rich ragina Kongresą tyrinėti pats savo "perdurną nubalsavimą" užgriant visus karo kontraktus. Te kontraktai valdžiai per brangiai atsiėjo, bet dabar nieko negalima daryti, nes pats Kongresas juos užgėrė. Dėlto negalima lausti kontraktoriaus.

Kongresmanas George Bender sako, kad yra apie 147 kontraktai, kurie apskriadaud valdžią. Benderio komisija veda tyrinėjimus.

## Sulaiko Britanijai Mėsą Del Finansų Krizio

BUENOS AIRES, rugs. 11.—Stokujant Britanijai dolerių, Argentinos priversta sulaikyti mėsos siuntimą Britanijai. Kita priežastis yra, kad metalas mėsai sudėti blekinėms gamams iš Jungtinių Valstijų, o to metalo pritrūksta.

## Amerikos Armija Evakuos Italiją į 90 Dienų

ROMA.—Gen. Omar Bradley sako, kad Amerikos kariuomenė bus ištraukta iš Italijos į 90 dienų, nes to reikalauja taikos sutartis su Italija, kuri ins gailoti su 16 diena šio mėnesio.

## Vokiečių Spauda Smarkiai Kritikuoja Britanijos Elgesį Su Žydais

BERLYNAS, rugs. 11.—Lai kraštis "Berliner Zeitung" smerkia Britanijos valdžios elgesį su žydais, suimtais kalėjant Palestinoje ir grąžintais Vokietijon.

"Kodėl Britanija taip slopina bėgėlius žydus ir taip švelniai elgiasi su nacių režimo palaikytojais", klausia tas laikraštis.

Jungtinės Socialistų Partija reiskia savo solidarumą su žydais, kurie atgabenti Vokietijon ir plevartai čia išsodinti Britanijos valdžios.

## An Editorial

A resident of the United States since 1909, Lithuanian-born Anton Jay-Jacinskas is up for deportation.

He is a citizen of this country, lives in Mishawaka, Ind.

The case of Jay is similar to that of others up for deportation. Big Business, reactionary forces in conjunction with immigration authorities want to eliminate them because they are leaders in unions, progressive organizations.

The idea is to intimidate all foreign-born element, using them as a excuse for the destruction of any and all groups fighting in the interest of the working man.

Jay-Jacinskas committed no crime in this country.

Through court procedure he had his name changed legally from Jacinskas to Jay.

He never carried out any action that the Constitution of the United States or Bill of Rights forbids.

A peaceful citizen, father of two grown sons, grandfather to four, Jacinskas happens to be a member of the United Automobile Workers of America (UAW-CIO), Association of Lithuanian Workers (LDS).

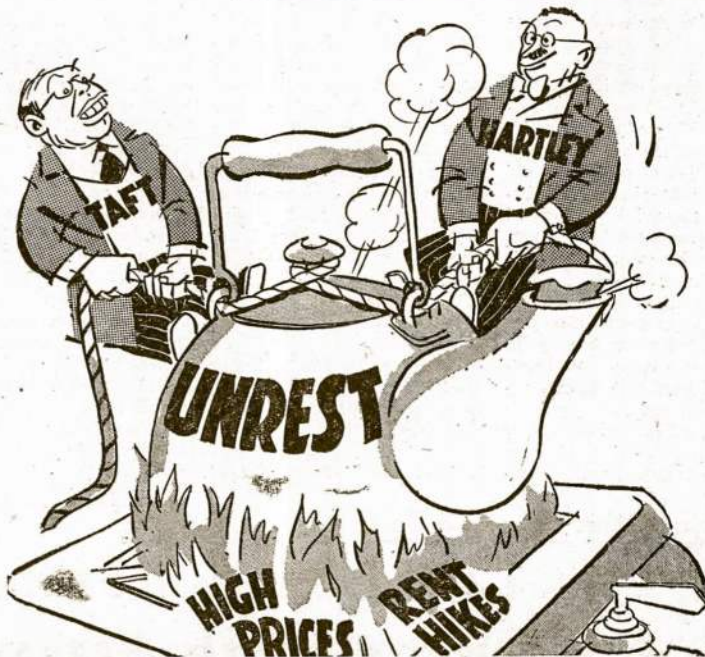
The attempt to rescind citizenship and deport him is foul play that might well affect every Lithuania-born parent who happens to belong to a union.

The American Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born which has the support of Eleanor Roosevelt and hundreds of other notables is going to bat for Jacinskas.

They are out to combat terrorization of innocent peace-loving people whose sole crime is that they were born in another country.

Lith-Americans throughout the nation must respond angrily to those responsible for deportation action being taken against foreign-born element. It smells too much like the Nazi way of life creeping into our democracy.

## Lith-Americans In For Big Headaches

# PRICES ON FOOD GO UP AND UP, RENT RISES AND SLAVE LABOR BILL FOSTERED ON THEM

Thanks to the Association of Manufacturers, the Republican Party, the gradual readjustment of prices is taking place—Up, up, and up.

Lithuanian-American voters who voted the Republican ticket because they "had enough" of Democrat machinations, now have the job of explaining off gigantic rent rises, the Taft-Hartley slave labor bill and other measure fostered upon workers whose wages just can't meet expenses.

On the whole, taking New York as an example, Lith-Americans and other consumers are in for their biggest headaches to date this winter, reports from the Big City indicate. A good example is wholesale meat prices that shot up 5c in one week while other com-

modity indexes reached new postwar highs.

While three congressional subcommittees, packed with the same men who killed off OPA, scheduled tardy cost-of-living hearings in more than a dozen cities, government and Wall Street statisticians were reporting new assaults on the consumer's pocketbook.

Dun and Bradstreet's commodity index, which measures price increases of foods, grains, metals, rubber, leather hides and textiles, hit a new high of 277 recently, a 7 point gain over July 1946 when most price controls were knocked out of the picture.

The U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics price index of 28 basic commodities hit 306.3 Aug. 29 contrasted with 241.1 a year ago.

In New York all cuts of meat

went up 1 to 3c a pound in wholesale markets and some retailers boosted prices by as much as 5c over the previous week. The U. S. Agriculture Dept. reported price increases in one week ranging from \$1 to \$3 a hundredweight on various kinds of wholesale meat in New York. Chicago's livestock market reported beef was bringing \$34 a hundredweight, 50c above previous records.

Even steeper meat prices were predicted for this fall and winter as Sec. of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson admitted in Los Angeles that a beef shortage was on the way. A similar admission came from the American Meat Institute.

Grain prices also pushed ahead to new levels, with the Chicago board of trade reporting record highs for wheat, oats and corn.

## Fights To Increase Interest Rate On Terminal Leave

WASHINGTON (FP) — Appealing to war veterans with terminal leave pay bonds to hold them as long as possible, Sen. Francis J. Myers (D, Pa.) pledged his "utmost effort" toward increasing their value by boosting the interest rate from 2½ percent to 6 percent.

His bill S. 1705 to increase the interest rate, he said, "would make these bonds the very best investments in America. But I recognize that the murder of price control last year has upset all of our calculations of that period and has resulted in such indecent increase in the price level as to be a real hardship on many of our citizens, and particularly on our veterans."

## THESE ARE THE TIMES

● "While tremendous amounts of money and effort are being devoted to atomic bombs", states a special Federated Press release to Vilnis English Section, "much less attention is being paid to the possible beneficial uses of atomic energy. A few such uses which will improve our health are being worked out, and scientists predict many others in the future.

● "There are hundreds of kinds of atoms. All atoms are probably changing. But some change very slowly, and the slowest may last millions of years. Other atoms break up quickly, and the fastest may last less than a second.

● "Atoms that break up quickly are called radioactive. They give off rays or particles which can be detected on a photographic film or by other means. Radium is a well-known example which is found in nature and which has been used for years in the treatment of cancer.

● "It is now possible to make artificial radioactive substances in a machine called a cyclotron which was invented by Dr. E. O. Lawrence of California. In this machine the motion of the atoms of heavy hydrogen is greatly speeded up, and then the fast-moving hydrogen atoms bombard the atoms of another element, for example, phosphorus or iron. A small amount of the phosphorus or iron then become radioactive.

● "These artificial radioactive substances have the same chemical properties as the original substance from which they were made. Radioactive phosphorus, sodium, iodine and others disappear from the body in a short time after they are taken in so that they are safe to use for many purposes. For some of these purposes radioactive substances like radium would be very harmful because radium remains in the body for a very long time.

● "Radioactive phosphorus has been tried in the treatment of cancer. It has also been used to treat other diseases similar to cancer. One of these is leukemia, in which the body makes too many white blood cells. Another is a disease known as polycythemia in which the body makes too many red blood cells. Some promising results have been obtained but many more studies are necessary.

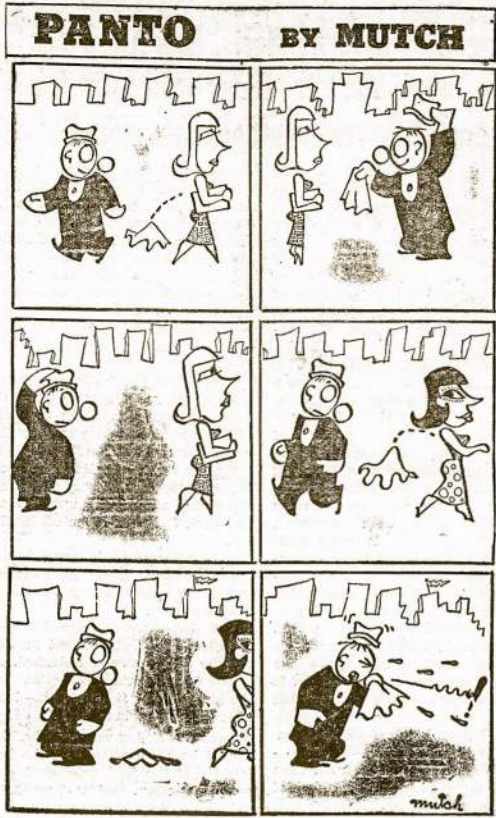
● "Since iron is one of the important elements of the blood, radioactive iron has been used to study just how the body uses iron in making blood. Radioactive iron is valuable for such studies because it can be more easily traced in the body than ordinary stable iron. Such studies will certainly develop our understanding anemia and improve our treatment of that disease.

● "Radioactive iodine has been used in the treatment of thyroid disease. Previously patients with certain types of thyroid disease had to undergo a serious operation. In the past few years a number of substances have been discovered that cure thyroid disease in many patients without an operation, and radioactive iodine may eventually prove to be among the most valuable of these substances.

● "In some diseases and for certain studies it is necessary to know how much blood there is in a person's body. After injecting a small amount of radioactive phosphorus or sodium it is possible to figure this out pretty accurately with certain instruments. Previous methods were not so good.

● "These uses and studies are only the beginning. Scientists predict that atomic energy could create many new valuable drugs and new vaccines, and make living conditions much more healthful. If only a fraction of the cost and effort and scientific skill were devoted toward such purposes as are now being spent on atomic bombs, the results would probably be more wonderful than anyone can yet imagine."





# CALLING EM' STRAIGHT

• Two months ago Jimmy Doyle died the day following a ring beating he received from Sugar Ray Robinson, welter champion. Since then, padded fists have killed youngsters in New England and Cuban rings. Boxing is the golden-horned black sheep of sports. Still, football has caused many more deaths than the old black sheep. In one season, 1931, 50 youths died in football warfare.

• Legally and morally there is a hypocritical attitude toward boxing. Immediately a slugger dies under blows the killer is held on "technical manslaughter" charges. It doesn't make sense.

• I don't believe any fighter ever deliberately tried to kill another fighter. Nevertheless, boxing is the physical damage on the other guy.

• The law recognizes this and sanctions it as a sport. Okay. Why, then, do they arrest a boxer for killing an opponent, since it is legally an accident? Arrests never follow football fatalities, although broken necks can usually be traced to the fateful play.

• The last fighter I saw killed in the ring was Ernie Schaaf. His opponent, the light-hitting man-mountain, was not to blame. Six months previous, Schaaf was slammed unconscious for two hours in the closing seconds of a fight with Maxie Baer. He nearly died then.

• The autopsy showed that Ernie had suffered from pin-point hemorrhages since the Baer brawl. He had also weathered a pneumonia attack. He wasn't fit to fight, but who could tell? Nobody, not even himself, probably.

• Fighters never know when they are to kill or be killed. Max Baer's blows killed Frankie Campbell, brother of Dolph Camilli, the ball player. Max, without knowing it, was actually battering a corpse propped up by the ropes in the fourth round. At least so a spectator told me.

• Once I saw a future heavyweight champion, Jess Willard, then unheard of but who had killed a min in a ring, fight Luther McCarty, regarded as a coming champion. Luther was todie in the ring before becoming champion, however.

• McCarty, superbly muscled, had the earmarks of a champion. In the ring at Calgary he fought a supposed setup, Arthur Pelkey. McCarty collapsed during tame boxing in the first round. He died on the canvas eight minutes later. A corners' jury reported "no blow caused it". Yet death was due to a hemorrhage of the brain. Certainly a blow caused it, but what are you going to do about it?

• Boxing commissions. Aren't they helpful? Too much politics, son. Jimmy Doyle narrowly escaped death a year before the Robinson disaster. A severe brain concussion from a blow. Officials knew all about that when he prepared to battle Robinson. Yet they let him fight—and get killed.

• In New York commission officials examined John Henry Lewis. Okay, they pronounced. Joe Louis slammed him senseless in a punch or two. Months before that John Henry had lost his sight in one eye. Picture throwing a one-eyed fighter against Joe Louis—and charging top prices to see it! It is a fair picture of commissions regulating boxing.

• Considering the number of battlers engaged, comparatively few boxers die in the ring. Shuddering heaven must watch over them kindly. Not with the cynical optimism of Stanley Ketchel's manager when he heard Stanley had been shot and lay dying.

• Ketchel, a wonderful middleweight champion, was fanatically courageous. When he went down he always got up. Usually the other fellow wound up senseless. Except the time the farmhand plugged Stanley with a bullet. The great fighter didn't get up that time.

• And what did his cynical manager say when the far away news came that Ketchel lay dying?

• "Start counting—he'll get up!"

## News From Illinois Employment Service

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON SERVICE TO VETERANS

This is another in a series of questions and answers regarding the rights of ex-servicemen and their families, as answered by R. E. Bremmer, Veterans' Employment Representative, Illinois State Employment Service, 817 W. Exchange Ave. For further information contact Mr. Bremmer. In this series, the ISES attempts to answer questions most frequently asked by ex-servicemen and women.

Question: Is it possible for a previous servicemen to enlist in the Regular Army for direct assignment to Europe?

Answer: Effective 1 August 1947, reenlistments in the Regular Army for initial assignment to the European Command (including the Mediterranean Theater) are authorized for men from civil life who have had prior service in any of the Armed Forces. Complete information may be obtained from the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, 2551 S. Pulaski Road, 4711 South Pkwy., 1617 E. 67th St. or 158 W. Harrison St.

Question: Can an Illinois veteran who has enlisted for another term in the Army apply for the Illinois Bonus?

Answer: Yes. He should mail his application, Form No. 1, to 218 West Monroe Street, Chicago 6, Illinois, or to 301 West Adams St., Springfield, Illinois.

Question: Why do I have to pay two monthly premiums when I reinstate my lapsed G. I. insurance policy?

Answer: One premium is for the 31-day grace period following the date of lapse, during which the insurance was continued in force without payment of premium; the other premium is for the current month of reinstatement.

Question: Can I choose anyone I wish to be my beneficiary for my National Service Life Insurance?

Answer: Yes. There is no restriction in your choice of a beneficiary.

Question: What happens if the employer dismissed a veteran from his on-the-job training position?

Answer: The veteran's training status is terminated and his subsistence allowance ceases. It is then up to the veteran to seek another place of employment with approved job-training programs.

Question: What should a veteran do if he is not satisfied with the on-the-job training he is receiving?

Answer: That is a matter for the veteran himself to decide, but it might be advisable for him to seek the counseling of a Veterans Administration training officer. He always can discontinue his training, or, with the VA's permission, he can switch to another training establishment.

## Wallace Mobilizing Progressives While Touring East

NEW YORK (FP) — Henry A. Wallace will pursue his campaign to mobilize progressive political action for world peace and domestic stability in a series of 10 east coast meetings from Sept. 11 to Oct. 15, the New Republic, which the former vice president now edits, announced here.

First stop in Wallace's new speaking tour was Madison Square Garden here, on Sept. 11 under the sponsorship of the Progressive Citizens of America. Next stops are Philadelphia, Camden, N. J., Boston, Cambridge, Springfield, Pittsfield, all Mass., New Haven, Conn., Providence, R. I. and Baltimore.

Other organizations sponsoring Wallace meetings in the various cities are the Harvard University chapter of the American Veterans Committee, the New Jersey section of the Natl. Farmers Union and numerous independent citizens' committees.

With the approach of October, Chicago lodges of the Association of Lithuanian Workers (LDS), all lodges within the sphere of LDS District 2 are talking up a coming conference that will be of interest to all.

Set for the 5th day of the aforementioned month, and to be held at Chicago Vilnis Hall, 3116 South Halsted Street, representatives will assemble to lay down a concrete plan of action.

Included in this plan will be a point that calls for intensification of the current drive for new members to the organization, plus of course, aroused individual lodge activity.

During the summer months a general laxness had developed throughout District 2, especially in those lodges that contain large numbers of young people.

Chicago which originally was the center of activity, especially from the viewpoint of people in other localities, now trails heavily.

One example is the failure to come through with this year was a midwest golf tournament, usually a regular feature.

On the whole, however, members of the LDS have been active as individuals cooperating with other organizations in support of affairs held during the summer months. And it can be divulged that plans for an extra-large Chicago bowling league are under way.

At present the local Lambda Delta Sigma is initiating new activities on a large scale.

However, to actually bring to a head, to synchronize, concretize, centralize all phases of activity so that lodges will blossom with freshness and eagerness that brings with that new members, giant social affairs, educational endeavor, a conference such as that being called for October 5th is necessary.

All lodges are being asked to elect a maximum amount of delegates, and then some, so that through a mass participation as many new ideas, suggestions may be included with a proposed program that will raise the level of the organization among Lithuanian-American element.
