Soviet Union Mourns Death Of Zhdanov

· Moscow.--Zhdanov is dead. But the great work that he had accomplished for the Soviet Union will never die.

Black-bordered flags fluttered from almost every building in Moscow as Russia mourned the death of Col. Gen. Andrei A. Zhdanov, 52, a leader of the Communist Party.

Zhdanov was buried th's past week near the Kremlin wall, with millions passing his bier to pay their final respect to the leader that personally helped defend Leningrad during the German invasion.

Funeral dirges were played all night following the brief radio announcement of Zhdanov's death. Nightshift workers in many Soviet factories held memorial services shortly after the news was broadcast.

For the past several years, Zladanov had conducted a vig-orous campaign to improve Soviet education, arts, sciences and literature. He entered the revolutionary movement when he was 16 years old.

Illinois Electoral Board's Decision Congressman A "Deal" Between GOP & Demo's Dodges Taxes

Last week, the nation was witness to the audacity of American fascism. The petition to place the growing Progressive party on the ballot in the sovereign state of Illinois was rejected by the combined Democrat and Republican fascist members of the electoral board. Working hand in hand the two parties once more demonstrated that they are one, not two, major parties. Realizing that the ever growing spirit of the Progressive party is gaining more and more dis-satisfied voters, the Republicrats through the electoral board, in violation of the rights of all men to vote as they please, employed another fascist tool by denying the PP a right to appear on the ballot in November in the state of Illinois.

Typical of the irony of growing fascism, a thousand and one defenders of the people's rights have arisen. Madison West who wrote with hatred in regards to Henry Wallace, and his new party, suddenly advocates along with the Chicago Daily News electoral board found legal grounds for keeping the Wallace party off the ballot in this state."

The erstwhile red-baiting Progressive party hater of the Chicago Sun-Times, columnist Milton Akers also has doned freedom right's clothing. Prior to the electoral board's decision he was happy with the thought of banning the PP from the ballot.

The "paper for Americans", the Chicago Tribune, has clothed itself in the American flag and has voiced a feeble outcry against the action taken by the Illinois electoral board.

Why have all of the newspapers which have opposed the Progressive party, so fanatically since its birth, suddenly exercised an about face and rushed to its defense in gaining a place on the ballot? Why have all the red-baiting, two party lovers, fascist columnists, suddenly found the banning of the Progressive party un-American. The explanation is as simple as the question-they, the newspapers and columnists are attempting to draw back the lost Republican and Democrat voters by playing upon the issue of fairness of allowing a third party to appear on the ballot. They have suddenly become defenders of Americanism and voice their dissapproval of the electoral

board's decision only because they think the Progressive Party has no chance of appearing on the Illinois bal'ot, come November. They are crying over spilt milk in their opinion and at the same time acting as true, fair and square deal Republicans and Democrats. If in their opinion there was a chance to still put the PP on the ballot, you can be sure they would not defend the right of that party to appear on the ballot.

What the Republocrats fail to realize is that the Progressive party is not a defunct political organization. Furthermore the new born Illinois defenders of "fair-play" do not realize how much every Progressive will fight to see that a more favorable verdict is rendered in regards to the legality of the Progressive Party. The editorials and columns written in defense of the right of all parties to appear on the Illinois ballot are welcomed—eyen tho they be a little "late,"

The secret message which was received by the two Republican members of the electoral board must have contained point Thirty instructions. minutes prior to the announcement of the board's decision a copy of the "to be announced decision" was seen by several newspaper men. After receipt of the communication from Republican headquarters the board changed its ruling to the banning of the Progressive party. The Chicago Tribune had this to say in regards to the sudden change in the ruling-"It was reported the three-man board originally tended toward certifying the third party to the ballot. The reason for the switch was a closely guarded secret."

The legal tussle which in-volved Secretary of State Edward J. Barrett, a Democrat, was also quashed. It seems that the Republican Judge L. E. White also received instructions. Evidently a political "deal" was worked out by the GOP and Dems.-a deal which promises to rob Illinois once more of a free election. To those Democrats who have gotten sick condemning the Republicans for supporting the PP one must award an oscar for superior acting. There should be no doubt in anyone's mind now, as to who the Republicans support.

To those who are victims of defeatism a word of encouragement. Although up to this date no candidate of the Progressive

party will appear on the ballot in is almost certain to be a certified party. The complacencv which settled over the PP members in Illinois is broken. From this day on the fight to attain a place on the ballot in November will he vigorously pushed forward. In all appearances the coming fight may actually aid the growing spirit and rally a large fo'lowing. The demonstrations which will fullow, peaceful orderly ones, will acquaint more people with the issues of the day. The "fairplay" petition drive wi'l enable more contacts to be made and a broadening of the term Progressive party as far as the number of people who have heard of its program.

The Republocrats will live to see the day when Wallace and Taylor will appear on the Illinois ballot in '48. Witch-Hunting

Milwaukee-Rep. Charles J. Kersten (R, Wis.) is a "100" American" when leading witch-hunts against unions, but his Americanism doesn't look so good to state income tax col-

Kersten, whose House labor subcommittee is currently smearing the United Electrical Radio and Machine Workers (CIO), was involved in charges of state income tax evasion here a year ago. The Milwaukee Journal, itself anti-labor to the core, said in an editorial on Kersten Jan. 25, 1947:

"Tax evasion is one of the most unAmerican things a man can do. Even worse is the man aspiring to public life, who dodges his just taxes."

Kersten failed to file returns on his state taxes for 1943, 1914, and 1945. After this was brought to public attention, he paid up in January 1947. In a number of earlier years, he had either failed to make returns or under-estimated his taxes, paying up at a later date.

The congressman's brotherin-law and law partner, Ardo A. McKinnon, also displayed... strange lapses of memory when income tax day rolled around. McKinnon, it was revealed, as of January-1947 had failed to file any tax returns for a period of 12 years, since 1935.

One of the most active members of the House labor committee, Kersten has, since his election in 1946, spent the major part of his energies in attacking labor. Not only did he vote for the Taft-Hartley act. He, together with corporation attorneys, helped draft it. He has led investigations of "radicals" in various unions, including Local 284, United Auto Workers (CIO) during the Milwaukee Allis-Chalmers strike, New York department store locals, and now the UE.

Moscow (ALN)- New "palaces of culture" were completed last month to serve workers of the giant Ordjonikidze plant at Cheliabinsk, in the Ural mountains, and shale workers at Slantsi, near Leningrad. Each has an auditorium with a mechanically operated stage, lecture halls, a library, a dance hall, a gymnasium and many rooms and workshops for children's activities, hobbies, etc. Soviet labor unions now maintain over 7,000 such "palaces of culture" throughout the country, as well as great numbers of smaller workers' clubs.

guilty.

"It would be wrong for the American people to look upon this as simply an encroach-ment upon the rights of a few Communist leaders. It is of a piece with the increasing assault upon the political rights of Americans over the past few years."

"The witch-hunts, spy scares, loyalty purges, deportation drives and court indictments against Communists are all part of this gathering storm of fascism in America.

"Americans who are devoted to democracy cannot afford to allow any of these encroachments to pass. Every one of them must be fought and defeated. I urge all Americans to protest to Attorney General Tom Clark and to Federal Attorney John F. X. McGohey against this incursion on freedom to travel and demand that this action be reversed."

SORRY, WRONG NUMBER sets itself no other target than that of providing suspense for its audience and this it does with considerable skill and success. Adapted by Lucille Fletcher from her well known radio play the Paramount version is well oiled and highly polished, and manages to hold its audience.

The story has a drug heiress (Barbara Stanwyck) marrying a small town drug store clerk (Burt Lancaster). The heiress is a pampered thing who suffers heart attacks, or thinks she does, whenever she is crossed. Her husband soon gets tired of being Mr. Drug Heiress and begins to work the crooked angles. Caught in a web of intrigue he arranges his wife's death.

The yarn gets itself told through intricately constructed flashbacks. When the film opens the heiress is an invalid, alone in a well upholstered Sutton Place apartment, and feeling mighty sorry for herself. The film builds its suspense by revealing the plot against the chief character's life to the audience and the character at the same time. Phone calls expose the flashbacks, each one adding bits of information and tension.

Anatole Litvak gets the intricately constructed melodrama down on celluloid very nicely. With each succeeding scene his direction gives the film another tightening twist, almost as if he were increasing the tension on a spring. The lensing and the editing are skillful.

The characters in SORRY, WRONG NUMBER don't demand too much of the performers, Barbara Stanwyck handles the drug heiress without difficulty and Burt Lancaster walks through the part of her husband. A girl by the name of Ann Richards plays a supporting role and sounds very much as if she had just finished an extensive course in voice and speech.

As pure and simple suspense stuff SORRY, WRONG NUM-BER is okay. Its a lot better than most.

SPEAKING of Greece at his last press conference, Sec. of State George C. Marshall refused a reporter's request that he say whether King Paul's U. S.—supported Athens government was or was not "democratic." Marshall did, however, speak of the royalist regime sympathetically as "a coalition that has its difficulties." Marshall revealed that he was persona'ly following the anti-guerilla tactics of King Paul's American-advised troops in the Grammos mountains, and that he wished them success. He complained that "harmful propaganda had been directed at the Greek government in a rather subversive fashion," though he did not say by whom.

When the Truman doctrine of aiding Greek royalists against their own people was first announced, a top U. S. politician said: "Arming the Greek regime will be a tragic mistake." He was a card-carrying Republican. His name was Harold Stassen.

Another American who had been permitted to reach high office spoke even more strong'y. "We shall curse the day we entered Greece," he said. His name was Fiorello LaGuardia.

A third, who sits in the U. S. Scnate, saidafter first-hand survey of the Greek fighting late in 1947: "I was shocked to learn that the Greeks call it our (America's) war." He was Owen G. Brewster, Republican of Maine.

Homer Bigart, New York Herald Tribune correspondent, accused the Greek government of cold-bloodedly killing trade unionists and others. He also charged U. S. authorities in Greece with encouraging the massacres and pressing newsmen "to executions." The late George Polk, CBS correspondent for whose murder most impartial observers blame the Greek royalists, called King Paul's regime a "police state" in dispatch after dispach.

The French, Norwegian and Danish governments a'l lodged strong protests in Athens last May, after hundreds of arrested Greeks had been done to death. Only the U. S. government, through Administrator Griswold, expressed conviction that "justice had been done." The CIO, like practically every other trade union body in the world, condemned an Athens regime decree laying down the death penalty for strikers.

Almost the entire press of western Europe (we are not quoting east European sources today) has made plain what it thinks of the Greek government and who it blames for its continuance in power. Commenting on Greek political executions, which have not stopped yet, the Paris paper Combat said: "What is left in a'l this of Greek Premier Sophoulis and his 'liberal' policy? What is left, Mr. Marshall, of your policy?" The international affairs survey of the Dutch government radio said: "Methods such as are now practiced in Greece are unacceptable... But nothing has yet been heard from Washington and, after all, the Americans—have far more influence in Greece nowdays than the British ever had."

For 'ack of space, this concludes our exposure of rather subversive statements concerning the Greek government, and of some of the suspect characters, both American and alien, who have given them voice.

By a vote of 16 to 3 the two old party City Council housing committee last week approved nine relocation housing sites—intended for families that will be moved to make way for the city's slum clearance housing program—violently opposed by representatives of 30 different civic organizations in an open hearing.

Sidney Ordower, chairman Housing and Rent Committee of Cook County's Progressive Party, declared that the nine sites accepted, "promote the present pattern of Negro ghettos—some are stretched out along railroad tracks, surrounded by blighted areas, no grade school or neighborhood facilities available, one is adjacent to an obnoxious rendering plant and drainage canal."

On Sept. 11, the Ukrainian groups of the city will stage a song festival at the Ashland Auditorium. This is the beginning of the series of Ukrainian festivals to be staged in many cities across the nation.

Such well-known artists will appear on the program as Stefan Kożakevich and Maria Dmytryshina.

The meeting was held on the corner of 33rd and Vernon Aves., main speaker was Oscar Brown, Jr., candidate, for state representative from the 1st senatorial district. Brown is the state's youngest candidate at 21.

Just Between Us

FOR PURPOSES of argument, pretend for a few minutes that you are a Russian. Then read the report concerning the conference of U. S. military service chiefs at Newport, R. I., as given by Joseph and Stewart Alsop in the New York Herald Tribune on Aug. 29 and excerpted below.

The Alsops said the conference was called because the army, navy and air force "had been unable to agree upon long-range American war pans... Their main struggle belonged to the strategic air arm. The navy mustered all the arguments against strategic air, and insisted that carrier-borne aviation must share largely in the crucial offensive task."

Offensive against whom? The Alsops answer this question:

"In order to permit the navy to participate in the decisive offensive against the enemy, naval war plans were actually prepared which would have concentrated the bulk of the navy's strength in the narrow, dangerous sea approaches to the Russian land mass. Thence it was proposed to launch carrier-born air attacks against the Soviet centers. For this purpose the 60,000-ton carriar was specially designed to provide a flight deck large enough for aircraft bearing the absolute weapon."

"Has Moscow, perhaps, made plans to attack the U. S.," you ask yourself with a mental effort, unwilling, like most people, to believe this about your own government. You painstakingly think back over all you have read in official Soviet papers. Remembering nothing to indicate military preparations to attack America you think of political articles. These have repeatedly charged that "warmongers" are in power in the U. S. The Alsop quotation in the Herald Tribune seems to confirm the charge, not refute it.

Somehow you get hold of hard-to-get American newspaper, with their ever-vigilant correspondents everywhere. Have they unearthed any Soviet pronuoncement you missed, advocating military aggression against the U. S.? You find these papers making much of Soviet denunciations of various phases of U. S. institutions—the "free enterprise system," th Truman doctrine and Marshall plan.

Then you ask yourself whether informed Americans believe that their country is about to be attacked, despite lack of published evidence. You find that the Herald Tribune's Alsops themselves have assured their readers repeatedly that the USSR neither seeks war nor is ready for it. In fact, only two days before their approving report from Newport, they declared that "Stalin made it possible for the Moscow talks (on Berlin) to continue," and further that "fear of war, once widespread, has now diminished almost to a vanishing point."

A strange, incomprehensible and undoubtedly dangerous country, this 1948 America, you think in Russian, you fold up the U. S. papers. You go to bed—but the fat black headlines worry you and you don't get much sleep. You get up in the morning, not only worried but indignant, and reach for a Soviet newspaper again. It helps to find that its foreign columns, with small headlines as usual, tell you that warmongers plot war but that peoples everywhere in the world want peace and will not follow their plans. Soherly, you walk off to your job of rebuilding on destroyed by the German.
