Brief Pictorial History Of Lithuania XVII Century

In 1600 the mightiest of Gedmin's descendants ruled Lithuania — Zygmant Vaza, to whom the Baltic Sea was but a Lake. 1613, when the Russian Czar Boris died in Moscow, Zygmant resolved to become Russia's Czar. With this intent, he dispatched Liahuanian's army to capture Moscow. The plan succeeded. Moscow was taken. Czar Vosylius was imprisoned and sent to Warsaw as a captve, where he died in prison. The Russians refused to accept Zygmant as Czar. They wanted to acclaim his son, Vladislov, Czar, but Zygmant opposing, they waited and chose Michael Czar, descendant of Lithuanian Romanovs. 1618, Zygmant agreed with Czar Michael, retaining only Smolensk for Lithuania. 1625, Sweden also separated from Zygmant.

Instead of two capitols, Lithuanian Vilnius and Polish Krokva , Zygmant established in Mozuria the new joint Lithuanian Polish capitol, Warsaw.

1612, in Siluva, Zemaitija, appeared Holy Mother Mary, in Vilna, the people's previous religiousness to the Heavenly Gates of the Holy Mother, was intensified.

1631, Pope Urbon VIII's sanctioned church ritual was inaugurated, which is even now used in Lithuania.

Zygmant died 1632. The chosen descendant, son Vladislov, lived to 1648. His place was filled by brother John Kazimer. While he ruled Lithuania the Swedes and Russians revolted. Prussia's Duke rebelled also, proclaiming Prussia an independent kingdom. Foes overran Lithuania. Lithuanian cities: Trakai, Lyda and Vilnius itself fell in ruins, never fully recovering. The Heavenly Gates, proclaimed for miracles, attached Lithuanians closer to Mother Mary's Holy Picture. John Kazimieras believing in God's aid and citizen loyalty, conquered enemies and freed his country; wearied, 1668 abdicated and journeyed to France and entered a monastery. To succeed him a Gedmin, Michael Kaributas, Duke Visniovieckis was chosen, who reigned only from 1669 to 1673. During that period many Lithuanian laymen were conferred noblemen's rights. Upon his death, the distinguished war leader, John Sobeiskis, was chosen ruler. He gained distinction conquering the Turks 1683, near Viena, Germany's emperor's capitol. This step the King undertook at behest of and repayment to Holy Father Innocent XI. In his army were numerous Lithuanian soldiers. Rev. Stanislovas Papzinskas was army chaplain, Marion Mission's founder. -King John died 1696. After him, as Lithuania's and Poland's ruler was selected German Saxon, Frederick August II, Saxony's Duke (1696-1733), Lutheran, who nevertheless effected the representatives requisition, accepting Catholic religion.

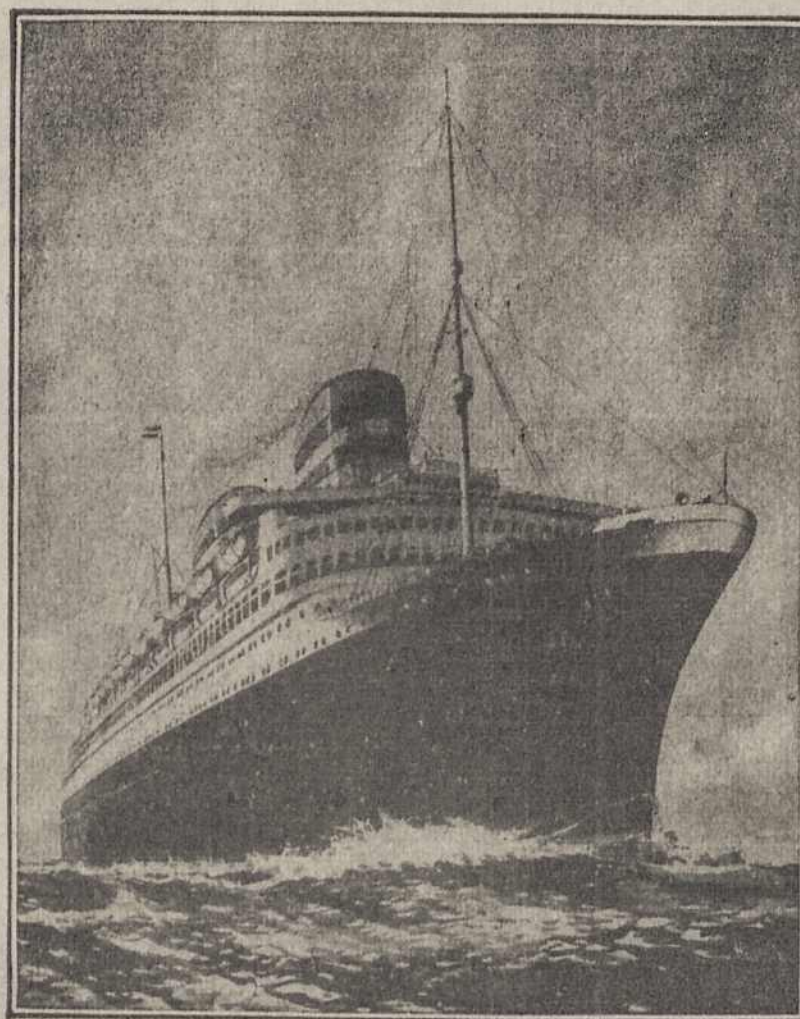

Patogūs ,greiti ir švarūs laivai. Į Lietuvą važiuojant labai paranku yra važiuoti šia linija.

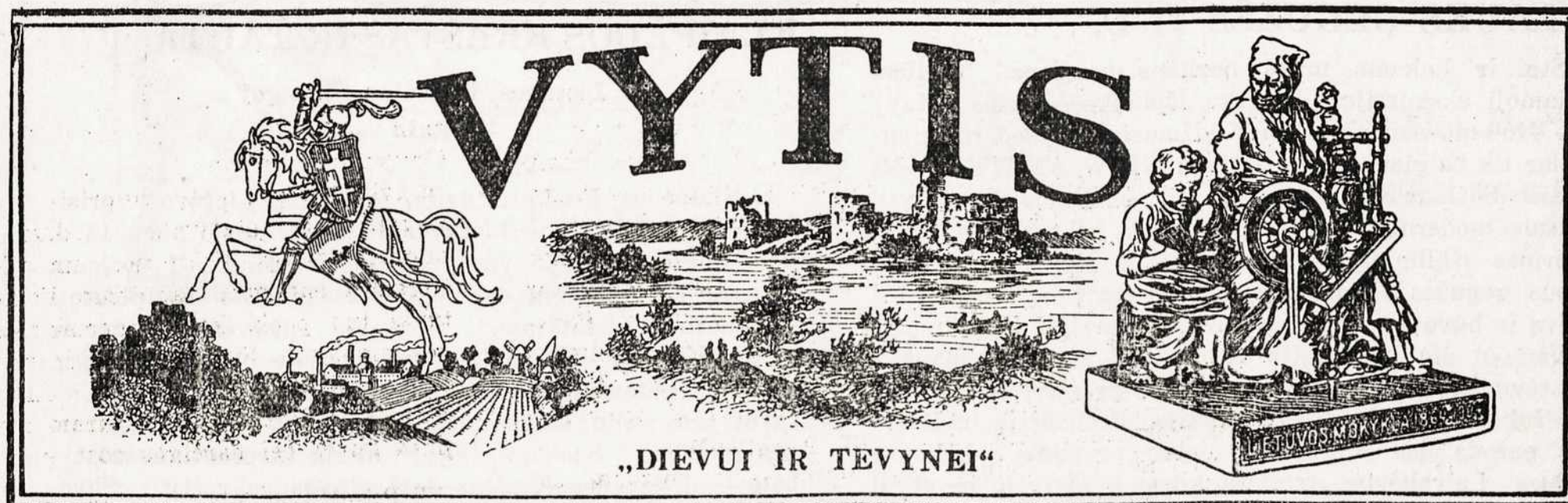

Taip kalbėk, o pats šelpk svetimą

Didžiausia dalis Lietuvių biznierių; ar tai vaistininkai, mėsininkai, kepyklos savininkai, biznis jų nesvarbu — visi tave ragins remti tik Lietuvišką įstaigą. Tie kurie taip kalba uždirba savo duoną nuo Lietuvių. Bet jei nueisi ir geriau pažiūrėsi į jų gyvenimą, surasi kad jie vienaip kalba tautiečiams, o patys lanko svetimtaučių įstaigas perkant reikalingus daiktus gyvenimo, arba nelaimės metu nueina pas svetimą profesionalą gydytoją arba advokatą sulig reikalo.

Taikoma ne vien biznieriams, bet ir mūsų tautos gydytojams, advokatams ir net dvasiškiams — nekreipkitės į žydus su savo reikalais, su pirkinėjimais. Čia tai nereikalingas ištautėjimo budas, nes savaimi aišku jei mes neremsim savo žmones kiti to nedarys, ir visi viens nuo kito prasišalinsim, su dideliu nuostoliu tautai. Kiekvienas iš mūsų galime prirodyti kad yra Lietuvių kurie gyvena iš savo žmonių, bet neremia jos su bizniu, lankydami ir pirkinėdami nuo svetimtaučių.

Pasitaiko gyvenime kad Lietuvis nuskriaudžia Lietuvį — žmogau kur to gyvenime nesurasi? Kaip svetimas nuskriaudžia Lietuvį, nuskriaustas apie tai daug nepasakos nes jam gėda pripažinti kad netikėjo į Lietuvį, o nuėjęs pas kitą buvo nuskriaustas. Jei Lietuvis taip jums padarė, jo daugiau nereikia lankyti ir taip daryti galima patarti draugams, bet tai nereikia kad visi Lietuviai apgavikai. O kai pastebėsit Lietuvį gyvenant iš Lietuvių, o jų neparemiant, jam tuojau tai prikiškite. Tik vienam kitam padedant mes galėsime išlaikyti tvirtesnius tautos ryšius tarp savęs, ir parodyti kitiems kad Lietuviai gali padaryti ta ka kiti gali.

Vyčių Vajus Prasadėjo

Su Sausio 1 d., 1938 metais, prasidėjo naujas Vyčių vajas. Organizacija nori kad visi Lietuviai prisirašytų prie Vyčių, tęsti jų garbingą darbą. Tėvai tegul prisirašo ir pataria jų vaikams taip daryti.

Week after week, the aged, the young, and all others who have strong hearts and weak minds, continue a regular trudge to the movie house to make certain that handsome Dan Darrow kisses Eileen Eyelash with the same gusto and technique that last time made Stella Stenographer swallow her gum.

A movie theater twice a month may do no harm, but to treat it as a house of education and splendid entertainment, to patronize it several times weekly, is wasting one's time, intellect and pesos. It breeds mental stagnation.

What can be done about changing it? Stay home and read a book. In a short while the box office would force producers to produce pictures.

VYČIŲ EKSKURSIJA Į LIETUVĄ IŠPLAUKS GEGUŽĖS 21 D.

Štai ir linksma mūsų nariams naujiena? Mūsų rengiama ekskursija į Lietuvą išplauks gegužės (May) 21 d. Holland-America Line didžiausiu ir moderniškiausiu, dar tik baigiamu statyti, laivu NIEW AMSTERDAM.

Šis didžiausias laivas yra tik baigiamas statyti, su visais moderniškiausiais įrengimais bei patogumais ir jo pirmas iškilmingas išplaukimas iš New Yorko kaip tik bus gegužės 21 d. Ta nepaprasta proga pasirinkti šį laivą ir buvo pasinaudota savo ekskursijai į Lietuvą.

Visi su šia ekskursija keliaujanti ne tik aplankys savo tėvų kraštą Lietuvą, bet turės progos pamatyti ir kitas šalis, kaip Olandiją, Vokietiją, Prancūziją ir Paryžiaus parodą, bei Angliją be jokių priedinių kelionės išlaidų. Laivakortės trečiaja klase į Lietuvą ir atgal per virš minėtas šalis bus tik apie du šimtai dolerių, o grįžti kiekvienas galės kada kam patogiau.

Abelnai visa kelionė bus netik labai linksma, patogi ir iškilminga, bet ir nepaprastai greita. O mūsų šios ekskursijos atvykstant į Lietuvą laukiama jau nuo seniai ir jos visapusiškas pasisekimas pilnai užtikrintas.

Šią progą visi vyčiai turėtų pilnai išnaudoti ir kurie tik gali vykti kartu su šia ekskursija į Lietuvą! Nes kitos tokios progos gal nepasitaikys. Kadangi šiuo puičiuoju nauju laivu keliauti bus nepaprastai didelis pareikalavimas, tad visi kurie norėtų vykti su šia ekskursija be atidėliojimo kreipkitės į ekskursijos vedėją A. J. Mažeiką, 145 Taylor St., Brooklyn, N. Y. ir visos informacijos bus suteikta.

Nenori pripažinti!

Mirus gen. S. Žukauskui dauguma mūsų laikraščių aprašymuose apie jo nuopelnus bei jų mūsų tautos įvertinimą pažymi, jog "Už nuopelnus Lietuvai... Amerikos lietuviai 1926 metais padovanojo jam aukso kardą. Jis, šią brangią dovaną laikydamas ne vien sau, bet ir visai Lietuvos kariuomenei, — padovanojo mūsų Karo Muziejui". Tas tištikrųjų neatatinka tikrenybei. Kadangi Lietuvos Vyčių organizacija savo seime nutarė įsteigti gen. Žukausko fondą ir iš to fondo nupirkti jam aukso kardą. Tas kardas buvo nuliedintas ir 1927 m., pavasarininkų 15 metų sukakties proga per L. Vyčių organizacijos pirmininką K. Viesulą ir centro sekretorę Rubliauskaitę - Gabaliauskienę generolui Žukauskui buvo iškilmingai įteikta. Gaila, kad nenorima pripažinti kreditas tam, kam ištikrųjų priklauso.

Sportininkų parinkimas

Savo 20ties metų nepriklausomybės sukakties proga Lietuvoje rengiama sporto olimpiada. Kviečiama lietuviai sportininkai iš visų šalių. Bet iki šiol visai dar nesigirdi, kas daroma pasiūsti amerikiečių lietuvių sportininkams į Lietuvą. Jau laikas sukrusti! Būtų tikrai gražu, kad su L. Vyčių rengiamąją gegužės 21 d. ekskursija vyktų ir sportininkų komanda. Nes niekas neužginčys, jog vyčiuose randasi geriausių sportininkų!

Stipendininkai

Beveik visi iš išvykusių Lietuvon studijuoti penkių stipendininkų siunčia į nekuriuos laikraščius savo įspūdžius bei kitokius aprašymus. Vienok mūsų ktalikiškieji laikraščiai bei jaunimo žurnalas Vytis jų negauna. Tikrai didelis nuostolis. Čia jau ir pasirodo stipendininkų parinkimo netikslumas.

KLAIPĖDOS KRAŠTAS IR TAUTA

Lietuvos Konsulas Chicagoj

Klaipėdos kraštas, dalis mažosios Lietuvos, prisijungė prie Didžiosios Lietuvos 1923 m. sausio mėn. 15 d. Prisijungimo istorija yra ypatinga ir įdomi. Į ją įeina lietuvių bei vokiečių tautiniai klausimai ir komplikuoti tarptautiniai įstatymai. Lietuvių apgyventas žemės plotas, išbuvęs Vokietijos jurisdikcijoje virš 600 metų, Versalės sutartimi tapo nuo Vokietijos atskirtas ir Lietuvai tuo pačiu kartu nepriskirtas, bet paliktas santarvės globoje. Susidarė lyg ir nauja tarptautinė valstybėlė — Klaipėdos Kraštas — Lietuvos pakraštys. Suverenines to krašto teises turėjo santarvė, o administracinės teisės bei pareigos buvo pavestos Prancūzijai.

Prancūzija Klaipėdos kraštą valdyti pradžioje atsiuntė savo generolą Odry, o vėliau Petisnė. Šitie valdytojai sudarė iš vietinių valdininkų direktorijatą ir mėgino kraštą valdyti. Kraštas nė kiek nesitvarkė, bet ir ne blogėjo. Vokietininkai dėjo pastangų iš jo sudaryti "laisvą valstybę" — Free State, o lenkai stengėsi jį pasigrobtį sau. Padėtis buvo neaiški ir nejauki. Vietos lietuviai nerimavo ir reikalavo kraštą prijungti prie Didžiosios Lietuvos. Lietuva taip pat reikalavo, kad senas lietuvių kraštas būtų prijungtas prie Lietuvos, kuriai jis buvo atskirtas nuo Vokietijos ir kurio reikalu pats Taikos Konferencijos pirmininkas p. Clemanceau teigė, kad "Klaipėdos kraštas visada buvo lietuviškas, jo gyventojų dauguma kalbos ir kilmės atžvilgiu yra lietuviška. Tas faktas, kad Klaipėdos miestas didžia dalimi yra vokiškas, negali pateisinti viso krašto palikimo Vokietijos suverenumu, ypač jau dėl to, kad Klaipėdos uostas yra vienatinis Lietuvos išėjimas į jūrą".

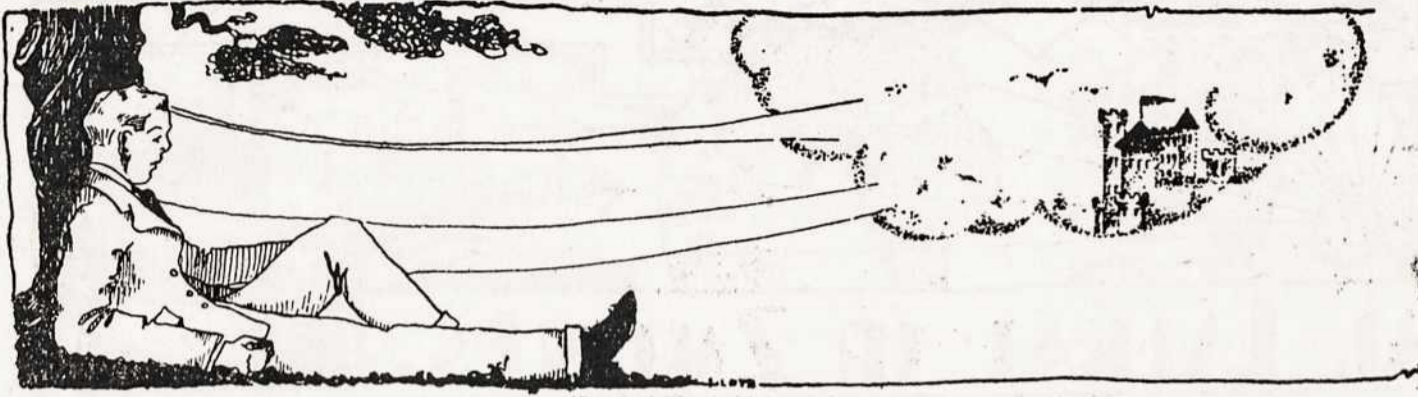
Lietuvos ir lietuvių reikalavimai nebuvo rišami prielankioje poltmėje, tada Klaipėdos lietuviai nustojo kantrybės ir pasiėmė teises į savo rankas; sukilo ir Klaipėdą užėmė.

Klaipėdos Konvencija perleidžia Lietuvai visas suverenines teises ir padaro Lietuvą Klaipėdos krašto savininke. Šita konvencija yra patvirtinta ir Vokietijos, pasirašant su Lietuva Seinų sutartį 1928 m.

Klaipėdos kraštas Lietuvos Respublikoje yra išbuvęs tik 15 metų; per tą trumpą laiką jis yra smarkiai pažengęs pirmyn su visa Lietuva visose gyvenimo srityse. Klaipėdos uostas buvęs visai nežymus, pasidarė pirmaeilium Baltijos jūros uostu. Jis pasikeitė ne vien tik trafiku, bet taip pat ir visu įrengimu. Į jį anksčiau galėdavo įeiti tik maži laiveliai, o dabar jau gali įeiti transatlantiniai laivai. Seniau jis buvo tik žvejų ir miško uostas, o šiandien jau visai moderniškai įrengtas prekybos ir keleivių reikalams. Jo įrengimas ir išstobulinimas Lietuvai kainavo virš 35 milijonus litų.

Visa krūvon suėmus, galima drąsiai teigti, kad Klaipėdos krašto su Lietuva susijungimas, atnešė labai didelės naudos kaip valstybei, taip ir piliečiams. Lietuva per Klaipėdą susijungė su vakarų Europa bei Amerika ir tuo būdu plačiai išvystė savo prekybą. Išvystyta-gi prekyba sustiprino pramonę, padidino žemės ūkio produktų paklausas, pagerino darbininkų šamdą ir to viso rezultate patikrino krašto ir žmonių medžiaginį bei kultūrinį atsparumą.

Toward The Horizon

"It happens only in books." How often these words are spoken — especially after the reading of some beautiful incident that we believe existed only in the imagination of the author.

Today, where the desire for money, power, and possession has led men, yes, and women too, to guns and battlefields, it does seem a bit incredible to find that there are people whose aims in life are not selfish ones; who find pleasure in doing some little thing to make another person happier.

Words—sharp, biting, and cutting—make weapons of deadliness that can well be compared with the weapons of war, in the popular interpretation of the word. There is much evidence of that kind of war here in the United States. Newspapers every day contain stories of one individual "accusing" or "attacking", another — and so again a war is on.

Eventually, "Peace" is declared. But does it mean "Peace" as the dictionary defines it — freedom from fears, agitating passions, moral conflict, etc.? History proves that the word is grossly misused.

Those of you who read James Hilton's "Lost Horizon" can well see what I mean when I say that Man's eternal search for happiness ends not with surface possessions, but with a feeling of real peace and contentment rising from a hatred of the strife and turmoil of war — not only on the battlefield, but in everyday antagonisms.

I have always believed that the Christmas season brought with it a spirit of friendliness that engulfed the world — that at this time of the year animosities were forgotten, and our hearts were open with love and generosity toward all. During that one short month of December I have felt that people threw off their coat of destruction and sailed forth in the robes of humanity. But this last Christmas, brings with it screaming newspaper headlines of war in Europe, labor unrest in our own country, murder everywhere, brought also hypocrisy to the beautiful words: "Peace on Earth; good will toward men."

To come back to the purpose of this outburst, let me tell you a story that was told to me last summer. The names of the characters are fictitious.

"On the morning of June 22, 1937, Mother and I went on a shopping tour. I was going to graduate from High School the next evening, and there were so many little things to be purchased in preparation for the happy occasion. We had a grand time, and started for home in the afternoon laden with packages. As we stopped at a neighborhood store for a final purchase, I noticed my handbag was not among my packages. This caused a search in the store that proved fruitless. I was frantic! Not for the purse itself — but for what it contained — eyeglasses, a pen and pencil, graduation tickets, and other valuables. Just then I did not care about anything but the graduation tickets. Their loss meant that

Mother could not attend the graduation exercises! It was almost more than I could bear. We were warned not to ask for additional tickets saying we had lost the ones that were given to us. This was a ruse practiced by many students to get more tickets. It was true in my case, but could I convince the school authorities?

"Then I thought that perhaps I had left the purse in a bus. I called the Public Service and was informed that no purse had been returned to them.

"As I was walking home after making the call, I noticed an old woman coming up the street. She stopped at each house as she came to it as though looking for a number. As she reached my home, she walked up the steps and looked for a bell. I asked her if I could help her to locate someone. She replied that she was looking for a girl named Helen. I told her that was my name. She then asked if I had lost anything recently, and when I stated that I had lost a purse that afternoon, she said she had found it. My name and address were on a letter which I had received just before starting on the shopping trip and which I had placed in my bag.

"Can you imagine my surprise and joy? Tears filled my eyes as I called to Mother to let us into the house so Mrs. Carey could rest a bit. She had come a long way. When Mother offered her some money as a reward, she said, "Please don't offend me by offering me money. I am only too glad to be able to return the bag." She asked if we were Catholics and then made this request: Her daughter was a nun in a Hawaiian leper colony for twenty-two years, and was coming home for a visit during the summer. As Mrs. Carey had been ill for a good many years, she asked us to say a few prayers so that she may be alive when her daughter arrived.

"I was deeply touched when she said she made the journey from her house to mine by herself, because she did not want to keep anything belonging to somebody else even until later in the day, when her son would have driven her over.

"Meeting that sweet little lady was one of the most beautiful things that has ever happened to me."

I only wish you could have heard the story — not as I have coldly written it here, but as Helen told it to me — with the emotions of her disappointment in losing the bag still in her voice — and then the beautiful ending that will remain a lasting memory in the heart of a girl whose high school education was climaxed by a lesson that originated from the greatest book of all—Life

About a month later, the local newspaper carried an article about the return of a nun from a Hawaiian leper colony who was visiting her mother. May God bless them both for their unselfish lives.



Niagara — Falls

Kai kurie gamtos padariniai gražiau atrodo atviruose ar šiaip paveiksluose, kaip tikrovėje. Gi Niagaros krioklio grožio ir didybės joks ir joks dailininko tepukas negali atvaizduoti: tą gamtos stebuklą reikia pamatyti.

Artindamas prie Niagaros — Falls, iš tolo pamatai baltą debesėlį: tai rūkas, kuris pasidaro nuo smarkaus vandens kritimo. Kai prieini arti ir liftu nusileidi prie krioklio apačios, tai patenki į tikrą smulkučių lašelių vandens debesį, kuris sukuriuodamas kyla į viršų. Saulės spinduliuose tas baltas ūkas žiba įvairiausiomis spalvomis.

Amerikiečiai juokauja, kad visi Amerikos jaunavedžiai medaus mėnesio praleisti vyksta prie Niagaros. Ar taip iš tikrųjų yra, nežinau, bet kad Niagaroje — Falls netrūksta turistų, tai mes turėjome progos įsitikinti. Nors miestas gerokai supramonėjęs, — kaip, pagaliau, ir visi Amerikos miestai — tačiau Niagara — Fallsas kartu yra ir kurortinis, turistų mėgiamas miestas. Čia viskas pritaikyta turistų patogumams.

Suprantama, kad tą taip plačiai reklamuojamą krioklį stengiamasi turistui parodyti kaip galint iš arčiau. Kiek atokiau nuo krioklio kur upė vėl ramiai teka, yra įrengtas mažas uostelis, iš kurio už kelis centus nedideliu specialiai pastatytu laivuku gali priplaukti prie pat krintančio vandens.

Įlipęs į laivą, gauni neperšlampamą guminių apsiaustą, užsimauni ant galvos kapišoną ir atrodai kaip kokios slaptos sektos pasekėjas... Privažiavęs arti, patenki į dar tirštesnį vandens debesį ir, žinoma, jei neturėtum apsiausto, permirtum kiaurai. Triukšmas toks didelis, kad vos gali susikalbėti.

Niagaros krioklys nėra tiesus, kaip mes jį matome ant paveiksluokų, bet kreivas, tartum būsų perpus perskeltas katilas. Todėl vanduo, krisdamas nuo didelės aukštybės iš visų pusių, tarp stačių krantų sudaro baisiai kunkuliuojančią versmę, juo labiau, kad iš priešingos pusės, kuri jau yra Kanadoje ir kur pastatyta, milžiniška elektros stotis, prie pat vandens paviršiaus išsi-veržia didelės vandens srovės, sukančios turbinas. Viena momentu mūsų laivukas, patekęs į sukurių centrą, turėjo įtempti visas savo pajėgas, kol krypuodamas iš jo išsikrapštė. Atrodė, kad visos povandeninės piktosios dvasios būtų norėję jį sudraskyti į šipulius...

Vakare krioklys iš Kanados pusės apšviečiamas įvairiomis spalvomis. Kai paleidžia rausvą šviesą, baltas debesis pavirsta raudonu. Krioklio apačios nebe-matai: matai tik raudonomis skiauterėmis banguojančią galingą srovę, kuri su trenksmu puola į bedugnę ir dingsta raudonuose rūkuose.

Kitoks efektas pasirodo, kai vietoje raudono projektoriaus paleidžia žalią...

Prieš daug metų šis dailininkas buvo įpuolęs į Themzės upę. Kai jį iš upės ištraukė, jis visai buvo pamiršęs savo praeitį. Tik vieną jis dar atsiminė "Didžiojo karo scenas. Ir pavardė jo pasiliko iš ligoninės gydymosi laikų, nes jis tenai tokia pavarde pasivadino. Tačiau kokio to dailininko pavardė yra tikroji, jokių būdu nepavyko nustatyti. Ištrauktas iš Themzės upės, jis savo kišenėje turėjo ispanišką laikraštį. Buvo kreiptasi jo pavardei išaiškinti į Ispanijos vyriausybę, tačiau nė tai nieko nepadėjo. Viena tik yra aišku, kad Chauchferta tikrai yra Didžiojo karo dalyvis, bet kurioje pusėje jis yra tarnavęs, taip ir nėra galima nustatyti. Jo kiaušas yra užlopytas su metaline plokšte, kas rodo, kad Didžiojo karo metu dailininkas buvo labai sunkiai sužeistas ir jam turėjo būti padaryta sunki operacija, bet kas ir operaciją padarė, taip nepavyko nustatyti. Manoma, kad dėl šuvio į galvą dailininkas yra netekęs ir savo atminties. Šiaip Cauchferta yra labai inteligentiškas žmogus ir valstybė buvo jam pasiūliusi net pensiją, bet jis nuo jos atsisakė. Jis pradėjo piešti ir tai jam nepaprastai gerai sekėsi. Per pusę metų jis pasidarė garsus dailininkas. Jis kalba devyniomis kalbomis. Matyti prieš Didįjį karą jis yra lankęs kurią garsią meno akademiją ar šiaip kurią aukštąją mokyklą. Jis daug pinigų išleido, norėdamas bent ką sužinoti apie savo praeitį ir kilmę. Viskas veltui. Ir vis dėlto Cauchferta šiuo metu yra vienas iš garsiausiai apmokamų Londono dailininkų. L. A.

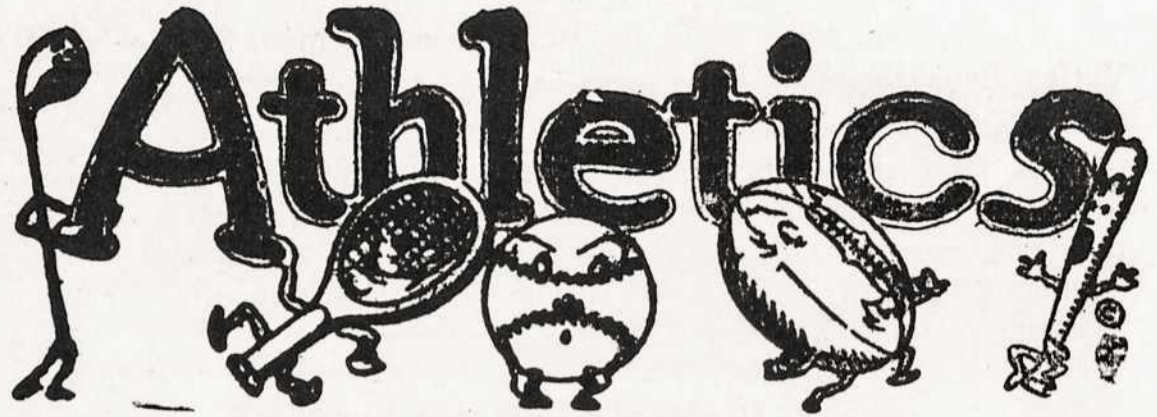

BASKETBALL PROGRESS

"Put Me In, Coach, I'll Stop'em!"

Basketball continues to draw more interest as the years go by. In every section of the United States, there exists a high degree of enthusiasm for this sport, and with the exception of football, and perhaps baseball, no other sport can boast such widespread public approval.

Though the game originated in the Eastern part of the country, from which we would expect the changes to originate, also, these new modifications of the game are born in the far West. Every change of style of play calls for more stamina and more speed to stimulate greater interest. With each change of a rule, the entire game takes on new form. The change in speed means a change in shooting, floor play, deception offense and defense.

Speed remains as one of the main factors necessary to a basketball team if it intends to be among the leaders. The team that can boast of height together with speed, needs only proper coaching to win a championship. Ordinarily both these qualifications are not found in the general run of players, so every coach either sacrifices speed for height, height for speed, or keeps a mixture of both on his team. That speed won't of itself win games is evidenced by pitting any fast high school team, where youth runs unchecked all over the playing floor, against a slower but more experienced team of the same class. It is essential that there be team play together with speed. The idea is to have the players show speed at opportune moments, when doing so means an open shot near the basket.

Previously, floor plays were a big factor in the offense of any team, and if coupled with speed, these combinations afforded the offensive team a chance for a close shot. Such style of offense had a technique of its own and was very interesting to behold as it unraveled itself concluding with the try for points. Practice has done away with this method of play. Floor plays take up too much time to learn and are easily checked by an experienced team. In addition, the coach usually knows of the opponent's floor plays before a game starts, this knowledge being given him by scouts. The time spent on teaching floor plays is devoted to teaching team play, with emphasis on a fast five man offense with a quick break down the floor whenever possession of the ball is obtained. There is no defense when a present day team controls the ball. The argument that an opponent cannot do anything without possession of the ball, so a defense is an unnecessary precaution which handicaps offense, is logical and sound.

With the added speed of the game and the change in the style of offense, a newer and more advanced type of deception has also been developed. The athlete with natural born ability is given many opportunities to show his individual style of play in faking an opponent out of position. In the former method of offense he was merely a cog in the team machine, whereas now he can step out occasionally and perform as the whole team.

As to the method of shooting at the basket, that has taken a great spurt forward. In the days of the past a shooter took one or two seconds to hoist up the ball between his legs for a long throw, whereas the present system of play demands a quick throw and one which is not directly in front of the basket. Shooting from the corners and at difficult positions while in mid-air is becoming a necessary part of the game, and has developed into a fine art. The right or the left hand is employed to make a shot, and among the newer players there are many who have acquired this requisite ambidextrousness. Players are beginning to feel where the basket is and do not hesitate to try for points without seeing the hoop. Coaches too, are encouraging the idea of more shooting, explaining to the players to go in after the ball if it fails to go into the hoop, adding that one team has just as much likelihood of recovering as the other. The natural "dead-eye" is an asset to any team, and is the type of player coaches pray for. Confidence and constant practice are supposed to make good shooters, but this does not hold true in game time for something else is necessary, something which the dead-eye shooter just has, and which is not acquired by hard work. This is the reason some players are good floor men and not good shooters.

All of the recent rule changes emphasize but one phase of the game — speed. Stalling in the back court has become a thing of the past, since a team is permitted but ten, seconds in which to advance the ball into an opponents territory. Another rule change which has aided to hurry up the game is the giving of the ball to the team scored on after a free throw, in the end of the court. This possession of the ball equalizes, in many instances, the successful making of the free throw, for once a team controls the ball it has a good chance of converting such control into two points. Thus far most critics agree that the changes have been beneficial to this sport. What the future holds is difficult to foresee.

The latest change, originating in the West, is eliminating the center jump. Scores as high as sixty points have not been infrequent. It seems this great number of goals will probably become tiresome to the onlooker, especially so where the teams are not evenly matched. Something will have to be done to cut down this ease of making points, and the most logical solution evidently lies in raising the height of the baskets. At present, the team with tall men has too great an advantage. Basketball will continue to be popular, regardless of whether these changes are introduced or not. It is primarily an indoor game, one in which the fan can sit and watch in comfort; and the beaten team usually puts up an exciting fight though the score may be sadly against it. There are many opportunities for thrills, little chance for injury; it is a fast, clean game.

TAUTA IR JAUNUOMENĖ

Tauta labai daug kuo primena mums didžiulį, išsišakojusį medį, kuris savo šaknimis tvirtai laikosi žemėje, viršūne stiebias į dangų. Kaip medis, nukapojus jo šaknis, netenka gyvybės, taip pat tauta, praradusi savo gimtąją kalbą, tėvų papročius bei savo kultūrą, virsta miruočiu. Kaip medžiui atramą sudaro kamieno pečiai, taip tautos atrama yra tėvynės gimtoji žemė ir senuolių kaulai, su jos srauniai tekančiomis upėmis, šlamančiomis giriomis ir linksmi čiuulbančiais paukščiais! Kas medžiui yra stiebas — jo brendimo bei amžiaus rodiklis — tas tautai yra jos praeitis, arba kitaip, tasai nelengvas ir ilgas, dažnai erškėčiais ir vargais nuklotas kelias, kuriuo ji žengia tolyn ir kopina aukštyn, kurdamą savo ateitį. Kas medžiui yra šakos, kuriomis jisai veržias į erdvę, tas tautai yra gentys ir giminės bei šiaip išėivių buriai, neša savo tautos vardą į tolimiausius kraštus. Kaip medžio lapai yra jo gyvybės gaivintojai ir naujų jėgų žadintojai bei ugdytojai, taip lapų pavyzdžiu kintančios žmonių kartos yra tautų gyvybės ir patvarumo ženklas. Lapai keičiasi kas metai; taip paskui skubančią į amžinybės prieglobstį žmonių kartą seka kita, kad paaugintų tautos jėgas ir padėtų jai pakilti aukštyn. Pagaliau, kaip viršūnė medžiui sudaro vainiką, taip idealai tautai yra ta nepasiekiamą viršūnę, dėl kurios kovoja tautos, atskirai žmonės ir ištisos kartos, kad priartintų tautą prie pažadėtosios žemės. Vadinasi, kaip šaknis, kamienas, stiebas, šakos bei viršūnė sudaro medį, taip gimtoji kalba, religija, kultūra, taip tėvynė su praeitimi, su kartų eilėmis, gentimis ir idealais sudaro tai, ką mes vadinam tauta. Kitaip sakant, gyvą kuną, kuriame praeities, dabarties ir ateities gyvenimas sudaro darnų vienetą. Kildamas iš tautos sielos gelmių, tas gyvenimas yra ne tik medžiaginis, bet tautos dvasinių savumų bei vertybių apreiškimas išorės pasauliui, taigi yra dvasios gyvenimas. Viso to, kas anksčiau pasakyta, akivaizdoje, savaimė išskyla klausimas, kuri vieta tame tautos medyje tenka jaunimui.

Lygindami tautą su medžio gyvenimu, mes minėjome šaknis, kamieną, stiebą, šakas, lapus, pagaliau viršūnę, sąmoningai nutylėdami vieną labai svarbų dalyką. Būtent, nepasakėme, iš ko išaugo medyje lapai — tos kintančios žmonių kartos, kurių dėka yra pasiekiamas jėgų atnaujinimo bei sustiprinimo uždavinys. O nepasakėme štai kodėl. Kaip medžio rudens metu rūpestingai sukrauti pumpurai, pumpurėliai yra ruošiami pavasariui ženklas, taip jaunimas tautai yra lygiai tokie pat pumpurai, kurie turi atnešti jai naują pavasarį, kupiną džiaugsmo, vilties ir valingo veržimosi aukštyn — į šviesą ir tiesą. Kaip medžio mažių mažiausias pumpurėlis už savo pečių turi ilgą stiebą, plačiai nusidriekusias šakas, ir jam dėl to yra mažiau vargo steibtis aukštyn, negu jo pirmtakunams, taip tautos priaugančio jaunimo karta turi už savo pečių darbų bei žygių turtingą tėvų praeitį, iškovotą žemę, atkovotus nuo gamtos laukus ir sodybas. Tėvų pastangomis jis yra aukščiau pastatytas; jis gavo daugiau, negu jo gimdytojai iš savo tėvų yra paveldėjęs, o dėliai to yra daugiau atsakingas prieš tautos ateitį, kuriai turi paaugoti savo jėgas. Ir čia plaukia jo prievolės tautos šaknų, tautos kamieno, tautos praeities, savo tėvų, savo genčių ir tautos idealų atžvilgiu. Tikrai.

Ar tam iš pumpurėlio išsiskleidžia žiedas ir lapas išauga, kad vien gerėtus gražiuoju pasauliu ir smagiai

sau plevėsuotų? Ar tam medis krauna pumpurus, kad šie vien savo naudai bei smagumui gyventų? Ar tam tauta augina vaikus, kad jie būtų sūnūs palaidūnai? Ne.

Pareiga — štai vyriausias žmonių pasaulio įstatymas ir tautų varomoji jėga, kurią medis atlieka gaivališkai, nes neturi nei proto nei sąmonės, o žmogus turi pareigą tai sąmoningai atlikti.

Tautos šaknis, pasakėm, sudaro gimtoji kalba, senolių papročiai, gimtoji kultūra. Tuos dalykus radome tėvų rūpesčiais ir vargu išsaugotus, giliai jų širdyje išnešiotus. Būtume neverti tautos pumpurų vardo, būtume patamsių apuokai, jeigu atstovaudami pavasario kartai, vadinasi, jaunajai kartai, nepramoktume savo gimtosios kalbos daugiau, negu mūsų senuoliai mokėjo, nepamiltume jos karščiau, negu ją mylėjo mūsų tėvai, neprisiristume kiekiau ir tvirčiau prie lietuviškos knygos bei laikraščio, negu buvo prie jos prisirišę "Aušros" ir knygnešių gadynės mūsų broliai. Atminkime tvirtai, kad tas, kam gimtoji kalba yra nebrangi, kam tėvų papročiai yra niekis, kam lietuviškas spausdiatas žodis nerūpi, tas yra panašus į būtybę, kuri sočiai ažuolo gilių paėdusi ir už tai, užuot geru jam atsidėkojusi, ima knaisioti jo šaknis.

Būtume tikrai vėjavaikiai ir neištikimi tėvynės vaikai, jeigu senolių krauju ir prakaitu įgytąją žemelę nepapuoštume gilaus prisirišimo ir tyros meilės darbais, neįmokėtume į tėvų paliktą žemės idėlių savo dalies, nelaikytume tvirtai išikabinę į turimos žemės kąsnelį, saugodami ją, nelyginant akį kaktoje.

Kaip viršūnė medžiui sudaro vainiką, pasakėm pradžioje, taip idealai tautai yra jos kelrodys į aukštybes. Teisybė ir šviesa jaunajai sielai turi būti tas niekad neužgėstas švyturys, kurio kasdien siekdami ir kūnydami savo darbuose, tikrai galėsime palipti aukščiau, kurdami geresnę ateitį ir siekdami tautos gerovės ir laimės. Vadinasi, tarp tautos ir jaunimo esame labai glaudaus ryšio ir galima drąsiai sakyti, kad kiekvieną tautą laukia tokia ateitis, kokį ji turi jaunimą.

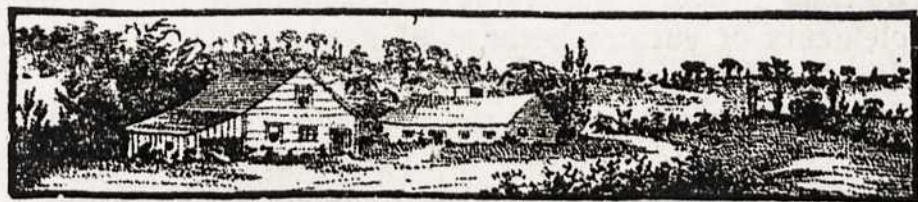
MAMYTEI

First Motorized Glider In Lithuania

On September 21 at the Kaunas aerodrome was tested the first motorized glider constructed by Engineer Rimša, the cost of which has been defrayed out of contributions from officials of the roads Administration. The actual construction work was carried out by the glider pilot Miliunas, and the tests were made by the well-known aeroplane and glider pilot, Captain Pyragius. Since this glider is a prototype, the preparation of the blueprints for which has gone hand in hand with construction, latter took longer than would the construction of a glider of serial type. The work has been well done. Captain Pyragius flew the glider to a height of 100 metres, and after describing a couple of circles landed on the aerodrome. The glider will be further adjusted, and then attached to the service of Lithuanian civil aviation. The gliding school established by the Lithuanian Aero Club at Nida is now well known not only in Europe but in other parts of the world. Not long ago the South American press wrote about it, and quite recently French aviation papers devoted considerable attention to it. In every instance the references to the school were favorable.

Ancestral Tongues

For almost a generation Americanization has been an avowed objective of State Departments of Education. Long before that the sons and daughters of the foreign born were very eager to learn the ways of the country to which their parents had come. Usually the old folks clung to portions of their racial tradition often causing the younger element to become contemptuous of their linguistic past.

There was a period when it was important for newcomers to shake off European tradition, but now comes a time when the value is recognized of preserving elements of culture because of the undeniable importance of such influences on American life.

There are abundant reasons for which the people of this country should be proud of their ancestral backgrounds. The more they understand the better.

Chicago Beckons —

Looking back over the past year of 1937, let us pause in retrospect at one of the milestones of the Knights of Lithuania organization — the Silver Jubilee Convention which was held at Dayton. Do you recall the wonderful spirit prevailing over the convention — a spirit of joviality, good fellowship, and determination to bring the Knights of Lithuania into their own?

The resolutions we adopted were in keeping with our purpose, "For God and Country". Perhaps we have allowed them to wander from our perspective or have pocketed them in some unfrequented recesses of the mind, there to remain until some future event will resurrect them. If we have been guilty of any negligence in this respect, let us as Knights resolve that for 1938 the objectives of our organization will constantly be in our forefront and that we will maintain an active interest in the well-being and the future of our organization.

Looking into 1938 we see that the 26th Annual Convention will be held in Chicago, with Council 24 acting as host. We are going to plan some betterment of the organization at that time and in order that we may have new ideas and some constructive criticism to offer, instead of the usual derogatory matter let us pause in our mental meanderings and do some deep-rooted common-sense thinking. The question before all of us from now to the time of the convention is, "what could I do to better the Knights of Lithuania so that it would be an organization which the Catholic Lithuanian Youth will be proud of?"

These are just a few introductory ideas as to what you may expect to see on your visit to Chicago when you come to the 26th Annual Convention. Chicago and Council 24 beckons — Come.

It is ultra-modern, 751 feet long, 88 feet wide... approximately 33,000 tons register... 10 decks... superior modern accommodations for 1,250 passengers in Cabin, Tourist and Third Class... completely fireproof... staterooms built of fireproof bulkheads; fire resistant paints, etc... 8 passenger elevators... 2 Delft-tiled indoor swimming pools, and one outdoor swimming pool.. air conditioning... dining rooms, theatre, beauty-parlor, barbershops, etc., etc.

Now if you are traveling third class, and leave Europe by July 10th, your round trip steamship fee will be \$201.50 (exc. tax.) If you are going tourist class, your fee will be \$263.50 (exc. tax.) Since this is the return maiden voyage there will be a great demand for tickets from other people not of the excursion, and you might be left without reservations on the Nieuw Amsterdam. So with your prompt cooperation, or a deposit on your stateroom you will have little to worry about.

Remember everybody! May 21st is not far off, and just time enough to start preparing. Do your planning now!

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE RULES:

1. Each member, enrolling a new member and forwarding one year's dues with the application of the new member receives 10 points.

PRACTICAL HINTS

Attic Insulation. If you are thinking of insulating the following will be helpful: If your attic is in use and heated, insulate against the roof... if not, insulation should be placed under the attic floor. This is the general rule.

Peeling Onions. When mixing the dressing for the stuffed veal chops (see recipe page), put half a slice of bread on the end of the knife; bread will act as a sponge and absorb odor from the onions used in dressing. And here's another use onions: To get ride of paints and turpentine odors, cut a raw onion into small pieces and place them around the room. They'll absorb the odor.

The roar of a lion is famous among sounds in nature for its carrying quality. The lion always roars with his head near the ground, knowing that the sound will thus travel along the ground a great distance and terrify his prey. Atmospheric conditions affect the carrying power of sound.

Cleaning Silver. Place a large aluminum pan on stove, pour a quart of water into pan and add two heaping teaspoonfuls of baking soda. Let it come to a boil and then put in your silver. After three or four minutes, remove the silver and dry. You'll be surprised at its shiny newness.
