





AMERIKOS LIETUVIAI SKAUTAI KVIEČIAMI Į LIETUVĄ







Lietuvoje, kaip ir Amerikoje, yra skautų (boy scouths) ir skaučių (girl guides) organizacijos. Lietuvos skautų organizacija įsikūrē Vilniuje 1918.XI.1 d., taigi šimet mini savo įkurtuvių 20 metų jubiliejų.

Lietuvos nepriklausomybės atgimimo ir skautų įsikūrimo 20 metų sukaktims paminēti Lietuvos skautai ir skautēs ruošia dideles jubiliejines tautines stovyklas (National Jubilee Camp). Abi stovyklos įvyks prie Kauno, ant Nemuno upēs krantų, labai gražiuose pušynuose. Skautai stovyklaus Aukštosios Panemunės kurorto pušyne nuo liepos 8 iki 18 d.

Stovykloje įvyks daug įdomių skautiškų ir sportiškų varžybų (competitions), sporto šventē, vandens sporto šventė, vaikų karnavalas ir kt. Vakarais įvyks didžiuliai laužai (camp fires). Lietuvos skautai yra išgarsēję užsieniuose kaip dideli stovyklų puošimo mēgējai. Čia bus labai puiki proga pamatyti, kaip stovyklauja Lietuvos skautai savo tėvynėje.

Užsienių skautams bus suruoštos trys ekskursijos: 1) į Kauną, 2) į Pažaislio vienuolyną ir skaučių stovyklą ir 3) į Lietuvos pajūrį — aukščiausias Europoje smēlio kopas (sand dunes), briedžių rezervatus, Lietuvos uostą Klaipēdą ir gražiausius pajūrio kurortus. Paskutinioji ekskursija įvyks stovyklai pasibaigus nuo liepos mēn. 18 d. iki 29 d. Bus plaukiama Nemunu garlaiviu, o grįžtama traukiniu.

Lietuvos skautai nuoširdžiai kviečia atvykti į stovyklą visus amerikiečius lietuvius skautus, visvien ar jie priklauso lietuvių ar amerikiečių draugovēms. Tenesivaržo vykti ir tie, kurie silpnai bemoka lietuviškai arba ir visai nemoka. Lietuviškai nemokantiems padėti bus paskirti "brolėnai" ("cousins") — lietuviai skautai, kurie moka angliškai.

Amerikos lietuviams skautams pragyvenimas stovykloje, o taip pat dalyvavimas minētose ekskursijose, nieko nekaštuos — jie bus Lietu-

vos skautų svečiai. Taip pat nemokamai gaus Lietuvos pasiuntinybės Vašingtone arba konsulatuose New Yorke ir Chicagoje vizą įvažiuoti į Lietuvą. Norint gauti nemokamą vizą reikės patiekti pažymėjimą, jog vyksta į stovyklą. Tokį pažymėjimą, pareiškusiems norą vykti, atsiųs skautų brolijos vyriausioji vadija (Headquarters). Kas nesuspėtų jį gauti iš Lietuvos, tegul kreipiasi tiesiog į pasiuntinybę arba konsulatus — gaus ten.

Vykstą į stovyklą prašomi kaip galima ankščiau pranešti apie savo atvykimą nurodydami, kada atvyks. Tačiau, jei kas nespētų iš anksto pranešti, tegu vyksta ir nepranešęs, o atvykęs į Lietuvą kreipiasi į Lietuvos skautų brolijos vyriausiąją vadiją (Kaunas, Nepriklausomybės aikštė 4, telf. 26534) ir bus nusiųstas į stovyklą. Vykstantieji tepasiima su savimi reikalingiausius stovyklautojui daiktus. Palapines, antklodes, valgyti indus gaus vietoje.

Visi amerikiečiai lietuviai, kurie turi pažįstamų lietuvių skautų, prašomi paskatinti juos vykti į Lietuvos skautų stovyklą. Taip pat paraamerikiečius ginkite ir pažįstamus skautus Smulkesnių informacijų apie vykti į Lietuvą. Lietuvos skautų stovyklą galima gauti Amerikos skautų sajungoje (Boy Scouts of America, 2 Park Avenue, New York, N. Y.), Lietuvos pasiuntinybēje Vašingtone (iLthuanian Legation, 2622 16th Str., Washington, D. C.), generaliniam konsulate New Yorke (Consulate Generale of Lithuania, 46 Fifth Avenue, New York) arba konsulate Chicagoje (Lithuanian Consulate, 100 North East Belleve Place, Chicago) ir Lietuvos skautu brolijos vyriausioje vadijoje tokiu adresu:

DALYVAUKIME OLIMPIADOJ

Lietuvių Pirmoji Tautinė Olimpiada tikrai įvyksta Lietuvoje šią vasarą nuo liejos (July) 17 iki galo mēnesio. Lietuvos sportininkai-atletai ir jaunimas išsijuosęs ten rengiasi kaip save geriausiai parodyti, taip ir broliškus svečius iš artimų ir tolimų pasaulio kraštų pasitikti. Olimpiados laukia visa Lietuva, ypač kad tai bus pirmoji olimpiada Lietuvos padangēje. piadų idēja yra sena; jau graikai keleta šimtmečių prieš Kristaus laikus rengė sporto lenktynes, kuriose dalyvaudavo atletai iš visų grai-Tokios olimpiados buvo tais kišku koloniju. laikais ir dabar yra pagrystos tautinės vienybės Senovēs romenai, pasaulio valdytojai, irgi aukštai įvertindavo sporto reikšmę ir sporto olimpiadas, — jie sakydavo: "in corpore sano, mens sana" — sveikame kūne, sveikas protas!

Amerikos lietuvių jaunimas šioje Dēdės Samo šalyje yra aukštai iškēlęs sporto vēliavą ir keliais atvējais yra apsivainikavęs garbės vainikais. Visus juos Lietuva kviečia apsilankyti Pirmosios Tautinės Olimpiados proga: Lietuvos konsulai iš New Yorko ir Chicagos jiems išsiuntinėjo pakvietimus ir Lietuvos sportininkai tikisi turėti savo tarpe tokius garbingus svečius, kurių čia neišvardysiu, bet kurių vardai Amerikos sporte užrašyti aukso raidėmis.

Amerikos lietuvių susidomėjimas Lietuvos Olimpiada pradeda išsisiubuoti, ypatingai ačiū energingoms pastangoms čikagiečių: konsulo p. Daužvardžio, teisėjo p. Zūrio ir daugelio kitų jaunimo rėmėjų ir sporto mėgėjų, kaip iš Cikagos, taip ir iš kitų miestų. Pono J. T. Zūrio, gerbiamo Cikagos miesto teisėjo, vadovaujama neseniai pradējo veikti Amerikos Lietuvių Atletikos Sajunga: American Lithuanian Athletic Association, 105 W. Madison Street, Room 1905, Chicago, Illinois. Šios organizacijos tikslas yra išaiškinti Amerikos lietuvių visuomenei, kiekviename mieste sudarytų Atletikos Draugijas, kurios pasirūpintų pasiųsti į Lietuvos Olim-Šiam tikslui, piadą savo geriausius atletus. kiek mums yra žinoma, talkininkauja p. J. B. Bordeno vadovaujamas Sporto Komitetas Cikagoje, p. G. C. Venclovo vadovaujamas Clevelando Lietuvių Sporto Klubas, p. Simonas Paukštis, Pennsylvanijos Universiteto futbolio instruktorius iš Philadelphijos; taipgi Pittsburgho, Wilkes Barre, Scrantono, rodos Detroito, Baltimorēs ir Brooklyno visuomenēs Tik iš Naujosios Anglijos jokių žikomitetai. nių nesigirdi. Kai kur komitetas rūpinasi savo geriausiems atletams surinkti reikalinga finansinę paramą kelionei (tik kelionei ten ir atgal, nes buvimas pačioje Lietuvoje Olimpiados jiems nieko nekainuos), kai kur gi patys sportininkai žada vykti savo lēšomis. Tarpe Čikagos biznierių yra atsirade tokių mecenatų, kurie pasižadėjo aprūpinti keleta atletų - delegatų. Lietuvos Vyčių organizacijos irgi kai kas tikisi Olimpiadoj dalyvauti.

Vis tai yra labai džiaugsmingi faktai. Yra pagrindo tikėti, kad Amerikos lietuvių sporto representatų skaitlius Pirmoje Tautinėje Olimpiadoj pasieks bent 25. Olimpiados dalyvių išlydėjimas turės įvykti jau birželio (June) mėnesio gale. Tat gi laiko visai mažai beliko. Padarykite paskutines pastangas, kad gražus darbas būtų gražiai užbaigtas.

Lietuvių Kalbos Vasariniai Kursai Marianapolyj

Nedaug Amerikos lietuvių turi galimybės tinkamai išmokti savo gimtosios kalbos. Pakenčiamo jos mokėjimo yra labai reikalingi mūsų inteligentai, kuriems nuolatos įvairiomis progomis tenka prabilti į minias. Kaip yra nejauku tokiam inteligentui kalbėti į klausančius laužyta kalba; jo vertė tuojau nukrinta žmonių akyse. Dar nejaukiau jaučiasi patys žmonės, kurie savo širdyje gailisi to vargšo kalbėtojo ir tik laukia, kada jis tas kančias pabaigs. Kas čia sakoma apie viešą asmens pasirodymą, tą pat galima pasakyti ir apie kasdieninius mūsų profesijonolų santykius su savo klijentais, pacijentais ir rėmėjais.

Marianapolio kolegija yra vienintēlė aukštoji mokykla Amerikoje, kur galima tinkamai išmokti lietuvių kalbos. Tik, žinoma, ne visi ta kolegija galējo ir gali naudotis. Jaunuoliai, einantieji specialius mokslus ar juos jau baigusieji, negalējo mokytis Marianapolyj. Taigi, Marianapolio kolegijos vadovybė, gerai suprasdama šią mokselivijos būklę, kiekvieną vasara ruošia Vasarinius Kursus, kuriuose destoma lietuvių kalba. Čia juos moko lietuvių kalbos žinovai — pedagogai. Kursai tesiasi šešias savaites. Be lietuvių kalbos, yra destoma ir klasikinēs — lotynų bei graikų — kalbos; katalikiškoji akcija; prigimties mokslai. dieną be pamokų yra ir paskaitos įvairiais mūsų tikybiniais, tautiniais ir visuomeniniais simais.

Šią vasarą kursai prasideda liepos 6 d. Lietuvių kalbą dėstys šie mokytojai: kun. dr. Jonas Navickas, Lietuvos ir Amerikos lietuvių istoriją; kun. Kazimieras Urbonavičius lietuvių literatūrą; kun. dr. Alfonsas Jagminas — lietuvių kalbos gramatiką ir p. Jonas Pilipauskas — lietuvių kalbos sintakse.

Gretimai su pamokomis eina ir paties studento asmeninis darbas: jam tenka perskaityti visa eilė lietuvių kalboje nurodytų veikalų; kiekvieną savaitę jisai turi patiekti raštinį darbą — kaip skaitytų knygų įvertinimą, taip ir kompoziciją. Studentai artimai supažindinami su perijodine Lietuvos ir Amerikos lietuvių spauda.

Pamokos vyksta prieš pietus. Po pietų studentai laisvi — gali naudotis kolegijos parke visomis sporto aikštēmis arba vykti maudytis.

Smulkesnių žinių apie šiuos vasarinius kursus galima sužinoti iš Marianapolio kolegijos vadovybės. Reikia kreiptis šiuo adresu: Kunigas Rektorius, Marianapolis, Thompson, Conn.

We can be sure that there is no little enjoyment awaiting us, if we but go out and seek it. And why not? Don't we deserve it? Each year the Lithuanian government offers prizes to the year's most distinguished novelist, dramatist, poet. Would it not be rather a credit to us if we were acquainted with at least these prize-winning works?

Why not form, then, a Lithuanian Book of the Month Club, which would import some of these fine books? From the numerous suggestions offered we could select every month or every two months some interesting little volume; there would, of course, be no compulsion to order books more frequently than we care to. Perhaps we could have a Readers' advisory committee to offer brief reviews of the more important books. Perhaps you yourself would wish to write to the committee stating your reactions to the books you will have read.

No doubt "Vytis" would let this book crowd have a page or two of its journal. There is any number of interesting possibilities. What

diversion, what fun it would be if only a handful of us decided to do something about it. A mere ten of us could start the ball rolling.

Would you like to be one of the first ten? Are you one of those who would enjoy this extra luxury occasionally, during your odd moments, or just you start counting sheep at night?

Herein is a limitless field of endeavor for people who have begun to read Lithuanian and read it to work out some splendid translations, if not gifted to write originals. Once you begin there is no telling where you will find your interest leading you in Lithuanianism.

During the past month Dr. F. J. Hill, Waterbury, Conn., received from Lithuania, in exchange for books in English, a very interesting assortment of titles in Lithuanian. Our Lithuanian born people have found it memory provoking to glance through "Austiniai Kilimai" and "Staltieses" with page after page of colored illiustrations of woven articles, designs and tablecloths to be used for various purposes.

"Namai ir Moteris" is filled with all sorts of helpful information to the housewife who would prefer running her household efficiently rather tham haphazardly.

To the teacher of today, or the parents of kinder-garten-age children, "Lietuvos Vaikas" will provide much enjoyment and is a spendid means of comparing the schoolroom of America and Lithuania. Profusely illustrated with photographs of teachers, supervisors, schools in Vilna, Klaipėda, and smaller ciies with their varied illustrated instructions to these tiny children, it is a source of delight to merely page through, if not to actually read.

Learned volumes in Medicine, Zoology and Archeology too, were sent on. If any K. of L. members find their way to Yale University this coming fall, a bevy of Lithuanian books will be found in the University Library for reading.

Free Summer Course On Board Training Ship

To acquaint the youth of America with the opportunities of a career as officers in the United States Merchant Marine, the American Nautical Academy, National Training School for Merchant Marine officers, Washington, D. C., announces that boys and young men between the ages of 10 and 25 years will be allowed to secure practical ship experience on board a training ship of the Academy within the period from July 1st to October 1st.

The young men may remain on board ship for the entire period or for any shorter time they may wish, but not for less than four weeks.

There is no tuition charge for any of the courses offered by the Academy, and no obligation for future merchant marine, military or naval service of any kind is incurred by the young men.

There is no charge for instruction nor for living quarters on board ship. The only required expense is for meals which are 49 cents. Three meals are served daily.

While on board ship cadets will receive minor medical treatment when necessary without charge. On Sundays the young men will be allowed to attend divine services at the churches of their respective denominations ashore.

Students will join the training ship in Long Island Sound for the summer training period.

Those completing the summer course with a passing grade will be eligible to apply for a

scholarship in the Regular Course.

The Regular Course is designed to cover a period of three years of sea service. The first two of these years the cadet spends cruising, and studying on the training ship. For the third year the cadet is assigned to a steamship of one of the merchant marine lines. Following the completion of these three years of sea service the cadet is eligible to take the officer's examination of the United States Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation, Department of Commerce, for a certificate as a Third Officer in the Deck Division of steamships in the Merchant Service of the United States.

Due to the fact that the number of accommodations available is limited, those wishing to take advantage of his opportunity should write at once to the
