Naujoji Centro Valdyba savo antrajame mēnesiniame posēdyje, kuris įvyko 1940 m. rugsējo 3 d. "Vyties" spaustuvėje, Chicagoje, nutarė šiuos naujus dalykus:

1) Patvirtinti šiems metams "Vyties" redaktoriumi Centro Valdybos pirm. A. Mažeikos rekomenduojamą kandidatą Antaną Skirių;

2. Kelti "Vyčio" adm. fonda, kad geriau būtų galima tobulinti "Vyčio" leidimą ir apmokėti visą spausdinimo, redakcijos ir administracijos išlaidas. Tuo tikslu: a) leidžiama "Vyčio" adm. vardu suruošti Chicagoje šokių vakarą, b) raginama visi Vyčių apskričiai suruošti "Vyčio" naudai po vieną parengimą. Valdyba.

KORESPONDENTAMS

Visu kuopų kore pondentų prašyčiau laikytis šios tvarkos: 1) pirmiausia kondensuotai rašyti apie kuopos veikima (council activities) ir tik po to apie įvairius asmeniškumus (personal gettings) ir įvykius; 2) korespondencijas siųsti tuoj po susirinkimo, neprisilaikant 15 d. datos. Pav. šiame numery telpa iš C. 8 — Roseland, Zosēs korespondencija, kurią gavome tik rugsējo 6 d. 

KA DABARTIS KALBA?

Amerikos lietuvių jaunimas dabar pergyvena nepaprastai skaudų laikotarpį. Kruvinas karas siaučia Europoje ir visame senajame pasaulyje. Skaudi tragedija ištiko mūsų tēvelių gimtinę, visų lietuvių mylimą tēvynę Lietuvą. Amerikai kasdien labiau gresia karo pavojus. Degančio Londono, Paryžiaus, Berlyno dūmų kvapas jaučiamas jau ir Amerikoje. Karinė prapaganda plati. Karo reikmenų, ginklų fabrikai jau dunda, rūksta dieną ir naktį. Pravedami kongrese kareiviavimo įstatymai. Greitu laiku gali sužvangėti ginklai ir Amerikoje.

Jaunime, žiauri dabartis mums šaukia: sustokime minutēlę ir rimčiau pamąstykime. Supraskime, ko iš mūsų šio laikotarpio dvasia reikalauja, ką dabartis kalba!

Susikaupkime ir paklausykime dabarties šnibždē-Sio laiko dvasia mums gali prikaišioti, — geru dalyku yra teatrai, futbolas, šokiai, šposai ir jaunatviškas nerūpestingumas. Tai jaunimo požymiai. dabar negana vien spardyti futbolą, kai ant bežaidžiančių gali pasipilti bombos ar kulkosvaidžių švino lietus ir iškapoti nekaltą, nepasiruošusį kovai, jaunimą; nesmagu turėtų būti nei teatruose nei šokių salēse, kai šimtais jaunų kūrybingų lietuvių šaudoma, kišama į kalėjimus, tremiama į Rusiją prie sunkiųjų darbų vien del to, kad jie pripažysta Dievo ir Tevynes principus; negarbinga tenkintis vien šposais, nereikšmingomis ir nesąmoningomis kalbomis, erzinimosi vieni kitu, kai tuo tarpu mūsų priešai, tevynes pardavikai visur ir visuomet varo sąmoningą, planingą ir drausmingą propagandą prieš tikėjimą ir prieš tevynę, griauna valstybių ir religijų pamatus.

Dabarties panikos ir neramumų laikas mus įspēja: jaunime, sustok, pagalvok ir pasuk savo gyvenimo eigą į Dievui ir Tēvynei naudingesnį kelią, būk sąmoningu kataliku lietuviu, suprask tikrąją gyvenimo prasmę.

Po šios vasaros gausingo ir pavykusio seimo Lietuvos Vyčių Sąjunga turėtų tiek skaičiumi, tiek veikimo turiniu dar pakilti. Tas veikimo turinys priklausys nuo naujosios centro valdybos, apskričių ir kuopų valdybų energingumo, planingumo ir entuziazmo. Reikia palinkėti kuopoms, kad be jau puikiai išvystyto socialinio ir sportinio veikimo labiau dėmesio kreiptų į narių religinį, tautinį, organizacinį sąmoninimą, į narių ruošimą aktingon kovon prieš religijos, tautybės ir valstybės priešus. To iš mūsų reikalauja Dievo ir Tėvynės principai ir dabarties laiko dvasia,

Rugpiūčio 15 d., 1940, suējo 20 metų kun. dr. Jono Navicko, M.I.C., kunigystei.



KUN. DR. JONAS NAVICKAS, M.I.C.

Kun. dr. J. Navickas yra daug pasidarbavęs Amerikos lietuvių katalikų visuomenės gerovei. Jo darbštumu ir iniciatyva 1926 m. buvo įsteigta Marian Hills high school, o nuo 1931 m. Marianapolio Kolegija. Jis nuo pat įsisteigimo šios mokyklos yra jos rektoriumi ir jaunimo auklėtoju.

Kun. dr. J. Navickas visą laiką aktingai dalyvavo lietuvių katalikų organizacijose — Liet. Vyčių,, Pilnųjų Blaivininkų, Kunigų Vienybės, Moksleivių; daug rašė katalikiškiems laikraščiams, vertė ir leido knygas.

1932 m. Gerbiamas Jubiliatas suorganizavo ALRK. Studentų ir Profesionalų Sąjungą, pradėjo leisti "Studentų Žodį," kuriems ir dabar dar tebevadovauja. Jau metai kai kun. dr. J. Navickas yra išrinktas Amerikos Tėvų Marijonų Kongregacijos Provincijolu.

Kun. J. Navicko praeitis yra ne rožēmis klota. Nors gimē, augo pasiturinčioje inteligentiškoje šeimoje, tēvelis buvo Virbalio burmistru (mayor), tačiau dar jaunas Jonukas pasirinko sunkųjį idealisto ir mokslo siekiančiųjų kelią, nusistatė būti kunigu. Pirma įstojo į Seinų kunigų seminariją, iš čia dėl lietuviško veikimo priverstas apleisti seminariją, atvyksta mokslo siekti į Jungtines Amerikos Valstybes.

Baigęs Lasaliečių vienuolių kolegiją ir gavęs M. A. laipsnį buvo pasiųstas studijuoti Šveicarijon, Fribourg'o universitete, kur įsigijo Teologijos Daktaro laipsnį. Grįžęs Amerikon ir misijomis atidirbęs Lasaliečiams

mokslo leidimo išlaidas, įstojo į T. T. Marijonų vienuoliją. Čia jubiliatą traukė lietuviškos kolegijos įsteigimo idėja ir noras pasidarbuoti lietuvių katalikiškajai visuomenei. Per pastaruosius penkiolika rektoriavimo metų kun. dr. J. Navickas savo užsibrėžtų planų dalį jau įvykdė.

Lietuvos Vyčiai Tamstos garbingos sukakties proga sveikina ir linki sekmingai toliau testi pastoracijos, jaunimo auklėjimo, švietimo, spaudos ir lietuvybės darbą.

Kun. K. Urbonavičius — Garbės Daktaras

Dar prieš Rusijai užgrobsiant Lietuvą Vytauto Didžiojo Universitetas Kaune gerb. kun. Kazimierui Urbanavičiui, vyriausiam "Darbininko" red. ir Marianapolio Kolegijos profesoriui suteikė Garbės Daktaro laipsnį.

Kun. dr. K. Urbonavičius beveik jau per 50 metų Amerikoje dirba literatinį ir visuomeninį darbą. Jau yra išleidęs savo poezijos ir beletristikos kūrinių, išvertęs į lietuvių kalbą pasaulinio masto rašytojų veikalų.

K. Urbonavičius yra rimčiausiu ir gabiausiu Amerikos lietuvių publicistu. Jis rašo "Darbininke" vedamąją kolumną, pasirašydamas vien "K" raide. Dar daug parašo "Studentų Žody," Šv. Kazimiero Akademijos Aiduose," "Amerikoje," "Drauge" ir k., beveik visur pasirašydamas Jono Kmito slapyvarde.

Dr. K. Urbonavičius yra žymus lietuvių visuomeninkas. Jis daug dirbo Federacijoj, Tautos Fonde, Amerikos Lietuvių Taryboje, dar ir dabar tebedirba ALRK. Darbininkų Sąjungoj, ALRK. Stud. ir Profesionalų S-goj ir su Lietuvos Vyčiais. Jis yra duosnus ir nuoširdus rēmējas švietimo ir kultūrinių Amerikos lietuvių institucijų: Marianapolio Kolegijos, Šv. Kazimiero Akademijos ir Šv. Pranciškaus Akademijos.

Amerikos lietuviai nuoširdžiai džiaugiasi šiuo vertingu ir pelnytu V. D. Universiteto įvertinimu mūsų žymaus veterano veikėjo ir rašytojo.

Nepaprasta garbē tenka kun. dr. K. Urbonavičiui, nes jis yra pirmasis garbēs daktaras iš Amerikos lietuvių rašytojų ir veikējų.

Lietuvos Vyčiai nuoširdžiai sveikina Vytauto Didžiojo Universiteto Garbės Daktarą ir linki jam ilgų, sveikų ir kūrybingų metų. A. Skirius.

LIETUVOS VYČIŲ XXVIII-to SEIMO PROTOKOLAS

Lietuvos Vyčių XXVIII-tas seimas prasidėjo 1940 m. rugpiūčio 6 d. 9 val. ryto Šv. Trejybės Bažnyčioje, Hartford, Conn. su iškilmingomis mišiomis, kurias atnašavo Jo Malonybė Prelatas Jonas Ambotas, asistuojant kun. J. Vaitekūnui ir kun. J. Kripui. Pamokslą pasakė ir vyčius pasveikino pats klebonas J. M. prelatas J. Ambotas.

Darbo sesijos vyko Šv. Trejybės parapijinės mokyklos salėje 339 Capital Ave., Hartford, Conn. Sesijas atidarė lygiai dešimtą valandą ryto vietinės Vyčių kuopos pirm. Edvardas Mončiūnas ir pakvietė J. M. Prelatą atkalbėti maldą. Po to seimo dalyviai jausmingai sugiedojo Amerikos, Lietuvos ir Vyčių himnus. Seimą pasveikino J. M. Prel. Ambotas ir Hartford miesto majoro atstovas Mr. T. Buckley.

Seimo prezidiumas renkamas slaptu balsavimu. Balsų skaitytojais paskirta J. Juozaitis ir J. Norkūnaitē. Į prezidiumą išrinko: pirm. Juozą Bulevičių, N. Y., vice-pirm. adv. Antaną Jankauską, S. Boston, Mass. ir Norbertą Aleksį Waterbury, Conn.; sekretoriais — Joaną Norkūnaitę, Lowell, Mass. ir Valeriją Kaunietytę, Hartford, Conn.

Antrą sesiją atidarė pirm. Juozas Bulevičius 3:30 val. po piet. Maldą atkalbėjo kun. J. Kripas. Vardošaukis. Sveikino seimą telegramomis Kun. Kemėžis, centro dvasios vadas ir vyčių 7-ta kuopa iš Waterbury, Conn.

Taip pat seimą pasveikino laišku Tēvų LaSaliečių Kongregacija. Pasveikinimo kalbas pasakē:

ir veteranas, Mykolas A. Norkūnas, kuris džiaugēsi galįs organizaciją pasveikinti dvidešimt aštuntu kartu. Perskaitytas Kun. P. Virmauskio pasveikinimo laiškas ir malonumu priimta jo penkių dolerių dovana.

Įnešta skaityti 1939 seimo metų protokolą. Skaityta pirmiausiai tiktai rezoliucijos, o paskui visas protokolas. Pastebėta padaryti šias pataisas: Harrison-Kearny kuopa 90, vietoje 9.

Pranas Razvadauskas įnešė klausimą, kodėl centro finansinis raportas nebuvo paskelbtas Vytyje. Duotas atsakymas, kad valdžia to neleidžia, nes mes neesame "profit-making organization."

Pasiųstas sveikinimas Hartford vyskupui Most Reverand Maurice F. McAuliffe ir užuojautos žodis J. M. Prel. Ambotui.

Mandatų komisija išdavė raportą: atstovauta 26 kuopos ir trys apskričiai su 90 delegatų. Taip-pat yra trys centro nariai ir trys garbės nariai. Įnešta, kad visi svečiai būtų užregistruoti.

Iškelta klausimas, kas daryti su Bayonne kuopos atstovais, kadangi jie, pametę mandatą, išsirašė kopiją ne ant paskirtos mandatų formos. Seimui patarta priimti jų mandatą. Taip pat iš Linden atvykę delegatai pristatė mandatą be dvasios vado parašo. Jiems pasiaiškinus, kad jų kuopa esanti be dvasios vado ir kad ant rytojaus atvyksiąs centro dvasios vadas esąs pasižadėjęs pasirašyti, jų mandatas priimtas. Iš Chicagos, 36-ta kuopa irgi neturėjo dvasios vado parašo. Jiems išaikinus priežastį, seimui pasiūlyta mandatas priimti.

Seimas įspējo visus delegatus, kad tokių neapsižiūrējimų ateityje nebūtų ir kad visi delegatai stropiai išpildytų, kas mandatuose reikalaujama. Įnešta ir nutarta užprotestuoti, kad ateinančiuose seimuose būtų nepriimti tie delegatai, kurie atvyksta be dvasios vado paliudijimo.

Seimą pasveikino Kun. Valantiejus iš Waterbury ir paukavo \$5.00 spaudos naudai.

TREČIOJI SESIJA.

Trečiąją sesiją atidarė kun. J. Vaitekūnas su malda rugpiūčio 7 d. 9:30 val. A. M. Vardošaukis.

Dar atvyko delegatē Mary Grinkievicz iš naujai isteigtos kuopos Philadelphijoj. Nors ji buvo be mandato, nutarta duoti balsą.

Visi Centro Valdybos nariai padarē plačius išsamius metų veikimo pranešimus ir apyskaitas. Pirma buvo perskaitytas raštu prisiųstas Prano Gudelio raportas, kuris priimtas su pagyrimu. Toliau perskaitė seime dalyvavusios finansų sekretorė Bronė Rimkiutė ir protokolų raštininkė Marijona Brazauskaitė savo paruoštus raportus, abu buvo priimti su pagyrimu. Labai išsamius raportus prisiuntė seime negalėję dalyvauti "Vyties" redaktorius Mr. Juozas C. Petraitis-Peters ir Centro Valdybos iždininkė Mrs. Monika Z. Peters. Raportai priimti su pagyrimu.

Po to sekē Apskričių pirmininkų raportai. Pranas Razvadauskas, Naujosios Anglijos Apskr. pirmininkas darē pranešimą žodžiu. Jis trumpai ir aiškiai pareiškē, kad visi Naujosios Anglijos Vyčiai smarkiai dirbo naujų narių prirašyme ir kuopų veikimo plētime. Raportas priimtas. Chicagos Apskričio pirm. Dominikas Varnas ir New Yorko Apskričio pirm. L. J. Ketvirtis savo raportus prisiuntė laiškais. Abu perskaityti ir priimti su pagyrimais. Apie Chicagos Apskričio veikimą darė pranešimą ir Chicagos Apskričio sekretorė Cecilia Kvietkutė.

Spaustuvės dirėktorių raportus patiekė J. Klebauskas ir Anastasia Varanis. Abu raportai priimti, kaip buvo perskaityti. Trečiasis direktorius — kun. M. Urbonavičius neprisiuntė raporto, nes tuo momentu jis buvo Lietuvoje ir nieko negalėjo sužinoti apie įvykstantį seimą.

Taip pat prisiuntē raštišką raportą Lietuvos Vyčių teisių patarėjas Juozas J. Grish. Raportas priimtas. Ritualo Komisijos raportą patiekė J. L. Juozaitis ir James K. Cherry. Raportas priimtas su pagyrimu. Pagaliau Stan Norkūnas paskaitė revizijos komisijos raporta, kuris irgi buvo priimtas su pagyrimu.

Dar padarē pranešimą Atletikos komisijos vardu J. R. Cherry. Jis apibudino savo darbą Chicagos apskrityje. Daugiausia dirbta kegliavime.

J. Juozaitis padarē pastabą, kad atletikos komisija neatlikusi savo užduoties, neparuošusi sporto olimpiados, todėl nesą reikalo turėti centro atletikos komisijos. Pastaba seimo buvo priimta ir ši komisija likviduota.

Mykolas A. Norkūnas, Vyčių Tēvas, skaitē referata apie jaunimą. Įnešta, kad referatas būtų at spausdintas "Vytyje."

Seimą dar sveikino kun. Paulēkas, dvasios vadas kun. Kemēžis, kuris kartu patiekē ir savo raportą. Raportas priimtas su dideliu entuziazmu.

Vardošaukis. Sesija baigta 11:45 A. M. kun. Kemēžiui atkalbējus maldą.

KETVIRTOJI SESIJA.

Sesija prasidējo 3:05 P. M. Maldą atkalbējo kun. Paulekas. Vardošaukis.

Seimą sveikino varg. Balsis ir dovanojo Vyčiams skolą, dvidešimties dolerių boną.

LITHUANIA IS AGAIN ENSLAVED

The Russian Bear, the nightmare of the peaceful Baltic neighborhood, armed with the hammer and sickle, is on the march again. The old imperialism of Russia has awaken-In her march Red Russia has engulfed Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania, the land of our fathers. The treacheous move by which Red Lithuania Russia enslaved

pictured below.

On October 10th, 1939 Lithuania entered into a Mutual Assistance Pact with Russia, which was based on non-intervention into internal affairs of either party. Lithuania agreed to allow the Soviet Union to place limited garrisons of Soviet troops within her boundaries in return for which a small part of Lithuania's ancient capitol Vilnius was restored to her. A short period of tranquility followed.

On May 25th, 1940, officials of the Soviet Union charged Lithkidnapping of uania with the Russian soldiers and even the killing of one of their number; were also accusations directed against Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania charging a secret agression pact against Russia. — These charges and accusations have yet to be substantiated. All efforts of Lithuania to clear up these charges were in vain. June 14th, the Soviet Union Commissar for Foreign Affairs presented an ultimatum to Mr. the Lithuanian Minister Urbšys, for Foreign Affairs. Only a few hours were given to company with the terms of the ultimatum which were as follows: 1) the prosecution of officials responsible for the alleged provocative acts against the Red Army garrisons; 2) the formation of a pro-Soviet government; and 3) the admission into Lithuania of an unlimited number of Soviet troops.

The Lithuanian Government in view of the imminent invasion by the Red army, complied with the terms and resigned. Antanas Smethe President of the Lithuanian Republic, designated General Raštikis to form a new government, but this move failed because of the Soviet stand taken. Justas Paleckis was named Prime Minister instead.

On June 15, 1940 numerous Red Army divisions crossed Lithuania's Antanas Smetona, the of the Lithuanian Re-President public was forced to flee to A few hours later a Germany.

special Commissar from Moscow arrived by plane to Kaunas to supervise the formation of a new government. On June 17, 1940 the communistic government under Paleckis came into being.

Election to the "Peoples Parliament" were held on July 14 and 15. All candidates for election were members of the Communist Party, and all the people had to vote under compulsion.

On July 21, 1940 the illegally elected "Peoples Parliament" membership requested in the Soviet Union, as did the Parliaments of Estonia ant Latvia.

On August 3, 1940 Red Russia formally accepted Lithuania into the Soviet Union.

On August 6, 1940 Russia by an act forbade the use of the Lithuanian National Anthem, national dances and songs and many other things dear to the Lithuanian people.

The Russian Bear has already confiscated church property, stopped the publication of Lithuanian closed newspapers, all private schools and introduced Russian schools, where the youth of Lithuania will be taught to hate democracy and love communism.

The Knights of Lithuania condemn Soviet's cunning methods of aggression as they condemn all the Lithuanian members of the Communist Party who aided in the Sovietization of Lithuania.

We know that Lithuania will never give up her freedom. She will never forsake or renounce her independence and will certainly rise again when the world returns to rationalism and fairness.

A RESOLUTION SENT TO PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

The Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation is an organization formed by various national organizations and local societies that are active in the numerous Lithuanian colonies throughout the United States. Its membership is limited to native Lithuanians and their descendants and only to those who are unalterably loyal to the United States Government. The purpose of the Federation is to co-ordinate any activities of the various societies in the promotion of their civic cultural life in the United States and to keep alive the American Way of life in Lithuania.

On the Ninth day of August, 1940, the aforesaid Federation held a conference in Pittsburgh, Pa. At which time and place the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Whereas:

The Government of the United States was the first of the Great Powers to recognize the Government of Lithuania, and

Whereas:

In that act of Recognition the Government of the United States made the definite statement that Lithuanian nation has a the separate entity and different than its neighbor — Russia, and because of that difference, there was no dismembering of the later, and Whereas:

The Russian Government recognized the Government of Lithuania and by that act guaranteed to the Lithuanian nation its right to and independent existence; and

Whereas:

The Lithuanian Government proved to the world that it could govern itself successfully and it served its people satisfactorily. The people progressed culturally, religiuosly, nationally and economically, and

Wheareas:

The Government and the people of Lithuania were compelled to submit to the loss of their national existence, through duress, force exercised by Russia, and

Whereas:

The Russian Government has Lithuania now annexed and although this act was done by force and subterfuge, the Russian Government would have the world believe a lie — that is, that all of this was done by the request of, and at the behest of the Lithuanian Government and the People of Lithuania, so

Therefore Be It Resolved:

To request the Government of the United States, to protest against th aforesaid acts of the Russian Government — to the end that the Government of Lithuania may again be re-established as an independent Republic with all the rights and privilges contained in such a status and it should sever all diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union and

Be it further resolved:

To thank the President of the United States Franklin Delano Roosevelt for the interest he has shown in this problem which is so dear to the hearts of all loyal Lithuanians in the United States

Kitas Chicagos apskrities Vyčių susirinkimas šaukiamas rugsējo 11 d. Marquette Parke lietuvių parapijos patalpose. A. Sk.

PITTSBURGH, PA. Vyčiai Plečia Veikimą

REZOLIUCIJA LIETUVAI GELBĒ-TI TARYBOS REIKALU.

Atsižvelgdama i momento svarba ir traginga Lietuvos būklę, A.L.R.K. Federacijos Taryba savo suvažiavime, 1940 m. rugpiūčio mēn. 9 d. Pittsburgh, Pa., nutare kviesti į vieningą darbą ir ryžtingą kovą už Lietuvos nepriklausomybę ir tautos gyvybę visas tas lietuvių grupes, organizacijas, kurios šiame mūsu tautos sukrētime pasiliko lietuviu tautai ištikimos. Taip pat kviečia į šį šventą tautos darbą kiekviena atskirą savo tautietį, kuris nēra parpriešams ir jos sidavęs Lietuvos žudikams.

Kad sudaryti galimumų visoms lietuvių tautai ištikimoms grupė̃ms dirbti ir tiksliai ir vieningai, A.L.R.K. Federacijos Taryba steigia Lietuvai Gelbēti Tarybą arba visų mūsų lietuvių amerikiečių bendrą centrą gelbējimui Lietuvai atsistatyti laisva ir nepriklausoma valstybe ir kviečia dētis į tą centrą tas grupes, kurios astovauja bent keletą nacionalinės reikšmės turinčias organizacijas, t. y., tokias organizacijas, kurių skyriai veikia bent keliose lietuvių kolonijose.

"Kad išvengti galimų kilti nesusipratimų ir bereikalingų ginčų, Federacijos Taryba, steigdama centrą ir kviesdama į jį dėtis kitas grupes, pastato sąlygą, kad bendrojoj, taryboj ar centre bus dirbami tiktai tie darbai, kurie turės aiškų ryšį su darbais ir kovomis už laisvą ir nepriklausomą Lietuvą ir visi sumanymai, centro vykdomi, turės turėti visų grupių vienbalsų pritarimą."

"1. Lietuvai Gelbēti Taryba jungia visas geriausias ir ryžtingiausias Amerikos lietuvių jēgas ir visas grupes, kurios aiškiai stovi už laisvą ir nepriklausomą Lietuvą ir pasižada šiam tikslui sutartinai dirbti.

"2. Lietuvai Gelbēti Taryba palaikys artimą kontaktą su užsienyje veikiančia teisēta Lietuvos vyriausybe.

"3. Lietuvai Gelbēti Taryba, reikalui esant, Jungtinēse Valstybēse steigs savo centralinį biurą, kuris:

 a) palaikys kontaktą su Amerikos oficialėmis ir visuomenės įstaigomis.

b) santykiaus su Lietuvos žmonēmis ir Lietuvos reprezentantais.

 c) ruoš medžiagą istorijos ir ekonomijos studijoms apie Lietuvą.

 d) plačiai informuos Amerikos, kitų kraštų ir lietuvių spaudą apie Lietuvą ir mūsų darbus dėl jos nepriklausomybės.

e) Biuro vedēja skiria Lietuvai Gelbēti Taryba.

"4. Tarybos veiklą ir jos įsteigtą centralinį biurą finansuoja ją sudarančios grupės lygia dalimi iš savo iždų.

"5. Tik tie Tarybos nutarimai vykdomi gyveniman, kurie priimami visų ją sudarančių grupių pritarimu.

So long, and I do hope we shall see you all on October 25.


