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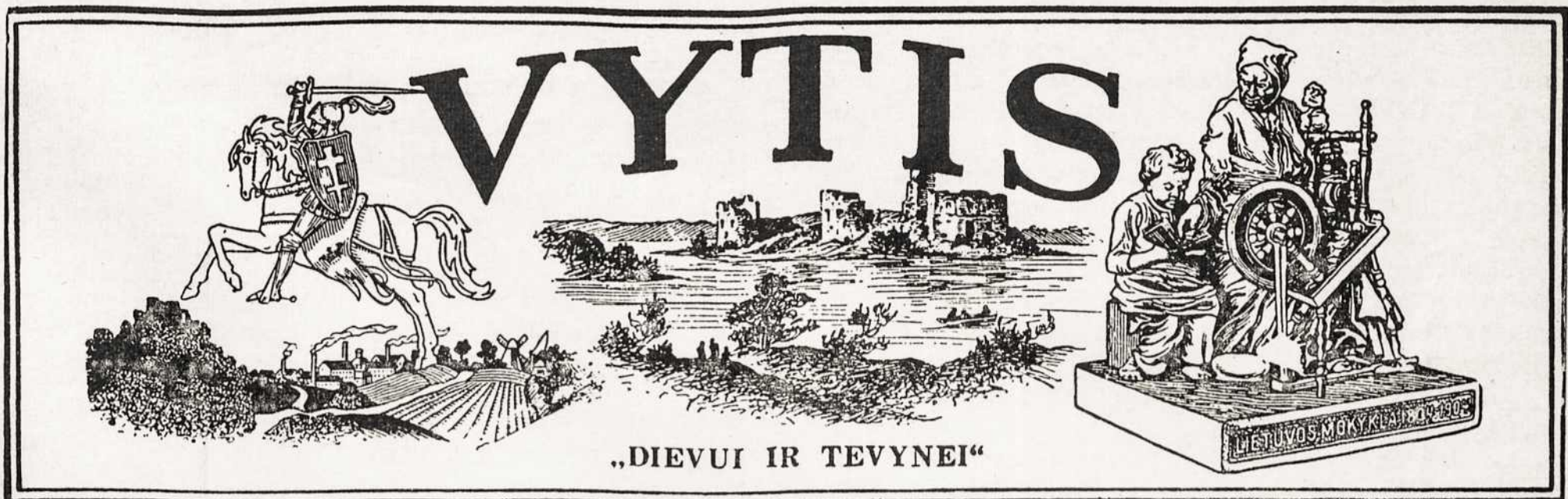
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LIETUVOS KATALIKŲ JAUNIMO TRAGEDIJA IR KAIP VYČIAI GALI JIEMS PAGELBĖTI

1940 m. birželio 15-tą dieną Sovietų Rusijos kariuomenei okupavus Lietuvą, gražioji Lietuvos katalikų jaunimo Federacija "Pavasaris" tuojaus turėjo pertraukti savo veikimą.

Pereitų metų liepos 10-tą dieną buvo suareštuotas Pavasarininkų Vyriausias Vadas Dr. Juozas Leimonas, kuris iki šiol, be jokios kaltės tebesėdi bolševikų kalėjime. Dideliame pavojuje šiandien jau yra ir kiti pavasarininkų vadai.

Katalikų jaunimas neturi dabar Lietuvoje jokios draugijos. Bolševikų valdžia uždraudė jaunimui ruošti net paprastus pasilinksminimus — šokius ir žaidimus. Jeigu nori pasilinksinti, jaunimas turi eiti pas komunistus, kurie tik vieni teturi teisės šaukti susirinkimus ir rengti pasilinksminimus.

Prievarta ir smurtas užviešpatavo mūsų tėvų žemėje brangioje tėvynėje Lietuvoje.

Ką gi dabar turi daryti "Lietuvos Vyčiai," Amerikos lietuvių jaunimo atstovai? Nusiminti, nuleisti rankas ir nieko nedaryti? Ne, tai būtų nusikaltimas Dievui, savo šventai katalikų religijai ir Lietuvai Tėvynei. Mūsų brolių katalikų jaunimo persekiojimas Lietuvoje turi įkvėpti kiekvienam "Vyčiui" naujos jėgos dar daugiau veikti lietuviybės naudai čia Amerikoje.

Šiandien Lietuvos Vyčiai Amerikoje turi užsidegti tikru darbo karščiu ir parodyti Lietuvos pavergėjams, kad kita dalis lietuvių jaunimo gyvendama laisvoje Amerikoje dar aukščiau kelia Lietuvos vėliavą ir niekuomet nesutiks su Lietuvos pavergimu.

Šiandien Amerikos lietuvių jaunimas turi reprezentuoti pasauliui lietuvių tautos gyvybę ir nesulaužomą pasiryžimą atstatyti Lietuvos Nepriklausomybę.

Į vietą vieno nužudyto Lietuvos jaunimo vado Lietuvoje čia Amerikoje stos penki, kurie su amerikonišku užsispyrimu ir ambicija vykdys kilniausius Lietuvos katalikų jaunimo uždavinius. Nesulauksi tu gude, kad lietuvių tauta tau vergautų.

Lietuvos Vyčiai, jūs per savo atstovus pasirašėte su Lietuvos pavasarininkais vienybės aktą, kuris įteikta Jūsų Seimui 1933 m. Tas vienybės aktas įpareigoja visus Lietuvos Vyčius Amerikoje gelbėti Lietuvos katalikų jaunimui jos didžiojoje tragedijoje. Kokią pagalbą mes Lietuvos Vyčiai galime suteikti Lietuvos jaunimui?

Jūsų vardu atsakau: labai didelę. Katalikai žino kokia didelė galybė yra malda. Pirmiausia pasistenkime Lietuvos katalikų jaunimo intenci-

ja priimti Šventą Komunią ir karštai pasimelsti, kad Dievas laikytų Lietuvos katalikų jaunimą doroje ir tikėjime ir stiprintų persekiojimuose. Antra, jeigu dar neįsirašėme, tai kiekvienas Vytis būtinai užsirašykime Lietuvai Gelbėti Fondo nariais ir imokėkime vieną (1) dolerį nario mokesčio. Lietuvai gelbėti Fondo lėšomis šelpiami Lietuvos pabėgėliai ir visame pasaulyje varoma propaganda dėl Lietuvos Nepriklausomybės atgavimo. Be asmeniškų aukų, nusitarkime savo kuopų susirinkimuose suruošti kuopos vardu bent vieną parengimą į metus Lietuvai Gelbėti Fondo naudai, kad duoti progos lietuvių jaunimui nors ir netiesiogine auka prisidėti prie Lietuvos vadavimo darbo.

Malda ir pasiaukojimas telydi mūsų jaunimo žingsnius kovoje išvadavimo dėl pavergtos tėvynės Lietuvos.

Pereitais metais gegužės 1 dieną laisvame Vilniuje buvo susirinkęs Lietuvos katalikų jaunimo pavasarininkų seimas, kuris suklaupęs prie Šv. Kazimiero karsito Vilniaus katedroje padarė ištikimybės priesaiką savo idealams.

Aš esu įsitikinusi, kad Lietuvos katalikų jaunimas tą priesaiką išlaikys ir jokie persekiojimai Lietuvos katalikų jaunimo neatitrauks nuo Dievo ir Tėvynės.

Šia proga linkiu Lietuvos katalikų jaunimui išverti tuose baisiuose bandymuose, o mes Amerikos lietuvių jaunimas kuo galėdami Jums gelbėsime. Mūsų širdys su Jumis — Lietuvos laisvės sakalai ir mūsų tėvynės viltis!

TA PATI AMŽINA KOVA

Prieš 25 m. visų lietuvių tarpe buvo tik vienas politinis troškimas: pasiliuosuoti nuo Rusų Caro vergijos.

Keli metai praėjo, kilo visokios revoliucijos, rusų caras, vokiečių nugalėtas, pačių savųjų tapo nuverstas ir štai Lietuvių mintys suskilo, pasidalino: atsirado tokių, kurie visą tautą ragino visomis jėgomis kurti naują visiškai nuo bent ko nepriklausomą valstybę, ir tai ne rubežiuose buvusios Lietuvos Didkunigaikštystės, apimančios daugiau svetimų žemių, bet grynai lietuvišką valstybę, neištautėjusių lietuvių apgyventų plotų ribose; atsirado ir kitokių, kurie nepanorėjo skirtis su Rusija, kuriems raudonoji, caro nusikratusi Rusija, pasidarė kaip antra miela tėvynė. Jiems atrodė, kad tik rusų caras buvo Lietuvos nelaime, be ne rusų tauta, jų būdas, vergiški papročiai, tikėjimas ir tt. Gal

nežinojo, kad kaip tik ne su rusų carais, o su rusų nedidvyriška, orientališka, muzikiška, paščiokiška supuvusia dvasia garbinga praeitis vytiška Lietuva vedė amžiną kovą. Tą pačią kovą vedė ir joje žuvo karalius Mindaugis, Gediminas, Algirdas ir Kęstutis kurio vaikų nė vienas nesurusėjo. bet visi priėmė vakarų katalikų tikėjimą. Su maskolizmu kovojo ir Vytautas ir Jogaila ir Šv. Kazimieras ir Zigmontas lygiai taip Lietuvos valdovai vyspukai ir liaudis. Toji amžina lietuvių kova buvo gynimosi kova, nes nutautėjimo žvilgsniu šitoj kovoj Lietuva daugiausiai nukentėjo, daugiausiai prarado ir miestų ir žemių ir žmonių.

Dievo Apveizdos surėdymu ir tautos mylėtojų pastangomis susikūrė Nepriklausoma Lietuva ir išsyk kaip jos didžiausia priešininkė pasirodė toji pati ir rytų pusės bestija — Maskolija ir per amžius einanti kova naujomis liepsnomis užsidegė. Bet įvyko kita nelaimė: ištautėję Vilniaus krašto, lenkų armijos karininkai gen. Želigoskiui vadovaujant, ne tik pareikalavo, bet net ir smurtu užėmė senąją Lietuvos sostinę Vilnių, ir tai nepaisant sutarties, padarytos Tautų Sąjungai tarpininkaujant, Suvalkuose. Lietuvai padaryta skaudi žaizda, pasidarė tuom baisesnė, kad davė progos amžinai Lietuvos priešininkei — Maskolijai — viliugingiau ir apgaulingais žingsniais, kaip su kokia kauke and veido — nuduoti neva draugiškus link Lietuvos sentimentus. Per dvidešimt metų Bolševikija apgaudinėjo Lietuvą ir taip viliugingai elgėsi, kad tik išmintingiausiai ir toliausiai matantieji iš lietuvių tarpo perspėdavo tautą, kad bolševikais nepasitikėtų. Ir kas pasidarė? Amžinas priešas pasinaudojo pirma pasitaikiusia proga ir užgulė pasibaisėtinu savo svoriu vargšę Lietuvą. Ta pati amžina kova vėl užsidegė tik sunkesnėse negu kada nors sąlygose. Bet kova eina ir turi eiti ir eis iki pergalės. Tik dėl laimingesnio ir pesekmingesnio kovojimo reikia, kad nors dabar, visi lietuviai įsisamonintų sau, kad ne tik dabartinis Stalino ir Molotovo garbinimas, bet ir kitą kart pasitikėjimas Joffe, Čičerinu ir Litvinovu buvo nieko kito, kaip "išdavyste" Mindaugio, Gedimino, Vytauto ir Šv. Kazimiero idejos. kurie vedė, kaip mes dabar, tą pačią amžiną kovą su Maskoliais.

Nors mūsų svajonės neišsipildė ir spaustuvė savotiškai neišaugo į didelę biznišką įstaigą, visvien nenustojome vilties, kad kurią nors dieną tas įvyks. Kad tas greičiau įvyktų, dėl pasisisekimo tą \$15.00 paskola paliekame kaip dovaną. Valio Vyčiai! Nenusiminkite, bet iškelkite "Vyčio" vardą iki pat viršūnės. ANSWERS: All members of organization prior to Aug. 19, 1933 and all those rejoining the organization, who have previously been members of the organization at least nine months and those who have been in the First Degree for nine months can make application for the Second Degree. Each candidate must answer five out of ten questions prepared by the Center Ritual Committee. The Council renders the Second Degree and all candidates must render their answers to the Examining Board in the Lithuanian language. Otherwise be rejected.

QUESTION: Who is entitled to the Third Degree and who renders the Third Degree?

ANSWER: All members of the organization who have been in the Second Degree two years or those rejoining having a total membership of two years nine months and having accomplished two out of the 13 requirements as specified in the Ritual Book. The District renders the Third Degree (where there are no Districts, special permission must be obtained for councils to render this degree) and the applicant must answer ten out of twenty questions prepared by the Center Ritual Committee in the Lithuanian language to the District Examining Board. Failure to do this, all such candidates are rejected, till they are able to fulfill all requirements.

QUESTION: Who is entitled to the Fourth Degree and who renders the Fourth Degree?

ANSWER: All members of the organization who have been in the Third Degree three years or those rejoining having a total membership of five years nine months and having accomplished one out of the ten requirements as specified in the Ritual Book. Having any such candidates the council forwards an application to the Center Ritual Committee with a full history of applicant for the Fourth Degree with Five Dollars to cover for expenses of the St. Casimir Medal, engraving, etc. Then when candidate is excepted and council is notified; the council must inform the Center Ritual Committee the date of Banquet; then the Center Ritual Committee informs the Center President, who is present himself or appoints another to honor such member and present the St.

Casimir Order medalion. This application is signed by the officiating officer and returned by the council to the Center Ritual Committee Secretary.

QUESTION: Who is entitled to the HONORARY MEMBERSHIP and who renders the Honorary Membership?

ANSWER: Applications with full histories and the cut of the individual are submitted to the Center Ritual Committee who checks accomplishments of applicant and if said member is a Fourth Degree member and found worthy of the honor his or her history will appear in "VYTIS" and name will be submitted to the Convention. The Convention will either approve or reject candidate. If a candidate is approved then candidate must wait till next Convention before the honor of the HONORARY MEMBERSHIP will be rendered.

CENTRAL RITUAL COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Knights of Lithuania Center Ritual Committee reports that 371 members have attained the First Degree; 200 the Second degree; 108 the Third degree; 18 the Fourth degree and two the Honorary Membership. That there are at the present 699 members properly recorded with them and each and everyone have been sent cards specifying the degree that they are in.

However, let it be know that each council upon exemplification of any degree please fill out applications properly signed and return same to the Center Ritual Committee c/o JAMES R. CHERRY — Sec. 2632 West 40th St., Chicago, Ill., so that each member can be recorded and receive their card. Many councils are not doing this. A total

of 26 councils have extended degrees making up the above total, of degrees rendered.

Then too, before rendering any degree, make sure that the candidate is a paid-up member at the Center, otherwise all such applicants will be rejected. Each and every application is checked for actual membership in the organization with the Center Financial Secretary.

Also remember that when forwarding dues to the Center specify the names of each member and the time that each and everyone is paid to. Some council just send in a specified amount each month and no member is credited. When these members will desire their degrees there will be no record of them in the organization for the time that they will specify and they will be rejected. The same applies to councils who retain dues of members and do not forward them to the Center.

Furthermore, the Knights of Lithuania Center Ritual Committee will not recommend to the next Convention to extend the time beyond August 10, 1941. All councils and Districts are urged to exemplify all degrees two weeks prior to this date and rush all applications, so that a full report might be rendered to the Convention fully, and not carried for the following Convention.

The Knights of Lithuania Center Ritual Committee is now prepared to receive applications for the Honorary Membership of Fourth Degree members worthy of this honor. Please enclose full history of each candidate and a cut of the individual that you and your council or district believe, should receive the Honorary Membership. No member will be considered for the Honorary Membership if he or she has not received their Fourth Degree.

Many candidates have written the Committee wanting to know, "Who pays the Five Dollars for the Fourth Degree with the application?" The candidates pay this fee themselves, still if a district or council have money and feel that they want to extend the honor to these members, they may do so. No application will be considered for the Fourth Degree if the \$5.00 does not accompany each application.

Due to numerous requests, beginning with this issue all degree members will be reprinted by councils. Thereafter as the applications reach the Center Ritual Committee Secretary..
