tion...... And out of the vastness of eternity comes the reassuring Answer, full of Pity and Love.... "I have not forsaken you, My Children. As long as you have faith in Me, yours will be the final victory and yours the conquest...... not of armies and territories, but of the forces of evil and hate...... yours will be the fruit of Peace!"...... And in a sudden surge of seraphic melody the rapturous song of myriads of angels and cherubim, singing again greed of dictators and to ensure a victory for our country.

On this eve of Christmas we go to war with no rancor in our hearts towards our enemies. We fight evil, hate and injustice, not men. We do not need any artificial patriotism to **know** that ours is a just cause. That is why we go to war resolved and determined that there will again be peace and a free, secure America.

"Complete Unquestioning Support"

Within two hours after a joint session of Congress declared war against treacherous Japan, VYTIS sent the following telegram to the President:

"Franklin D. Roosevelt,

White House,

Washington, D. C.

Lithuanian National Monthly Vytis, speaking for its readers, American youth of Lithuanian descent, pledges itself to complete and unquestioning support of our government in the defense of our beloved country.

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We believe that no further comment is necessary, except to remark that we never were more positive of the spirit and attitude of American-Lithuanian youth, and particularly of the K. of L's, than when we sent the above wire to President Roosevelt on December 8th.

A DISTURBINGLY PRACTICAL SUGGESTION

"We have available thousands of dollars to spend yearly and invest in Catholic youth. We have funds to advance for their educational, recreational, social and athletic activities. But the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance cannot be expected to spend money freely without an eye to the future and without any benefit to itself.

You, the Knights of Lithuania, are a cohesive group of several thousand Lithuanian Catholic young people. Your motives are worthy, your principles of the highest, and your zealousness for united Lithuanian Catholic activity merits the most sincere commendation.

But you have your difficulties. You want to increase your membership, but can do it only in sporadic, short-lived, flurries. Your finances are limited. Members drop out of the organization far too easily. The root of your trouble is that, in the final analysis, your appeal to new members and your hold upon present members is, in most cases, mainly social. As bitter as the truth may be, you must face the fact that you cannot expect to exist very long on a mainly social basis.

Let the Knights of Lithuania come into the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance as a group. You will keep your officers, your magazine, your individuality as the Knights of Lithuania. You will then be members of the Alliance, share in its rich financial benefits, and have access to our funds for your organizational activities and enterprises. Some day your members may guide the destinies and finances of our million dollar organization. Do not make the same mistake that hundreds of Catholic societies made in refusing to consolidate with us, and passed out of existence. We need new, young blood in the Alliance. You have a great future with us. Think it over — now!"

Question Box

Q. A non-Catholic told me that our faith is an hypocrisy because all that a Catholic has to do is to go to confession, be absolved, and then he is free to sin again. Before death he can confess again and all will be forgiven him.

A. Catholics are not hypocrites because they admit they are sinners and try to correct themselves. Hypocrisy consists in putting on false pretenses, a false face. There is nothing false in admitting one's faults and being sorry for them.

Your friend is troubled by the thought that people having lived sinful lives should change and repent on the death bed. He is of the class that found fault with Jesus for forgiving Dysmas, while that once good-for-nothing hung on the cross. But these last minute changes rarely take place. It calls for a big push from God to change a sinner's heart to repentance. Even then a person who stayed away from confession for a long time will find it very hard to admit his faults. It is hard for a proud man to admit that he was a failure.

Q. I find confession so hard; it is just a repitition of the same thing. How can I correct it?

Good Catholics, who frequently confess their sins, often are troubled by this continuous repetition of their faults. They should first put their good resolutions into practice and really try to correct themselves by avoiding the occasions of sin and trying to cut down, by a daily or weekly check-up, the number of times that they offend God.

Another good point would be to ask for guidance. Often, a penitent is troubled by this or that doubt and yet is afraid to ask for an explanation or guidance. Your spiritual advisor takes pleasure in guiding you and in helping you to love God better.

Q. Helen Morgan, three times a divorcee, received a Catholic burial. How come?

A. The ways of God in calling people back to Himself are inscrutable. He called Dysmas while that thief hung on the cross. Dutch Schultz asked for a priest while he lay in a pool of blood. When and how He first beckoned Helen Morgan, we don't

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"The Status of Lithuanian in America"

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Presented at K of L NY & NJ District Forum Nov. 9, by

Dr. J. J. Raymond *

The status of Lithuanian in America is a matter of personal opinion. Viewed from one angle the status is relatively low, viewed from another angle, it is quite high. The first point of view: About a million people in America (out of a possible 5 million) speak it — a small number, if one considers America's population or the size of other linguistic groups. Most Lithuanians in America are working people; therefore they exert little cultural influence. The number of educated and professional people is relatively small. The press is weak and divided. Cultural organizations are almost non-existent; those that exist are tottering, as the second generation takes little interest in their work. In fact, the second generation has swung away from the first, disregards the language and culture of its parents, and defends its action by the emotional rationalization: "Why speak or learn Lithuanian? No one speaks it!" Immigration is at a standstill. Contact with Lithuania is almost nil because of the war.

Viewed from another angle: The value of a language lies in other features besides a large number of speakers or great literature. Other groups are smaller than the Lithuanians, take pride in their origin, and exert a great influence in American life. Though Lithuanian now seems a worthless language, it has its value in many ways. The Lithuanian language and people have come a long way

* Dr. J. J. Raymond, a Lithuanian — his true name being Rimavicius — was born in New Ha-

— the hard way. For centuries foreign masters held sway over the Lithuanians, made them mere tillers of the soil, tried to impose their language on them. Their influence can be seen in the great number of White Russians, Polish, Russian and German words in the language. It is doubtful if more than a handful of those who governed Lithuania spoke Lithuanian well. Only from the nineteenth century on did Lithuania come to be known in the outside world, and then only to philologists and anthropologists. Lithuanian speaking leaders appeared then in greater numbers.

Leaders developed among those who migrated here. But all of them came penniless, with hardly any education, to an entirely strange civilization and language. They have built institutions of varying size and kind — churches, schools, etc. Their newspapers in many cases have been issued for more than a generation. When printing was forbidden in Lithuania, and even later, many books were printed here.

The immigrants have become wealthy,, more or less. Aid has been and is continually being sent to Lithuanians abroad.

Many educated here, have returned to Lithuania. Others are working here. Thru the efforts of the first generation the second generation has, in many instances, acquired a higher education.

Lithuania and the Lithuanian language, unknown before the First World War, is now known by almost the entire American public.

Lithuanian, once taught merely on a purely scientific basis at such universities as Yale, Chicago, Johns Hopkins, Princeton, etc., is still being taught there, but it is winning academic recognition on its own merits at the University of Pennsylvania and at Columbia.

Taken all in all, the negative with the positive, the positive outweighs the negative. One can say that the beginnings of Lithuanian have been very humble, that the language and culture has had its ups and downs, that such will be the case in the future. If one remains cheerful and works to propagate Lithuanian culture the results will be worthwhile. Not only will a rich and worthy language and culture be preserved for posterity, but the person who works in it will enrich himself culturally and appreciate American life more completely.

NB. With reference to the first paragraph: Although Dr. Raymond states that the second generation takes little interest in the language and culture of its parents, at the outset of the lecture, he praised the K of L for taking this step to find ways and means of perpetuating Lithuanian, at least arous ing deeper interest among the second generation.



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
