THE GHOSTS OF MUNICH

It appears that the road of Calvary is not yet ended for those small nations whose only transgressions have been their love of freedom and their misplaced trust in the sanctimonious political leaders of Europe.

Latest trends in international politics, which have shocked decent, freedom-loving people all over the world, would sacrifice the helpless Baltic states and other formerly free nations to the greedy and unreasonable demands of Soviet Russia.

The world has been finally "enlightened" as to the real culprits responsible for the present World War: not the insatiable, greedy dictators, not those who have violated the sanctity of treaties and pacts, not those who have prostituted international honesty to their own political chicanery — all these were really not responsible for embroiling the world in the present bloody, costly, hopeless orgy of destruction and slaughter.

It seems that this war was caused by the people of the Baltic states, among others, who by their insistence upon freedom and independence and their right to self-determination, created the situation which lead to the present upheaval! And the world has been warned that there is no possibility of lasting peace if these small nations were permitted to live as free and independent states after the war is over. The only condition necessary for an immediate realization of the Golden Age, and for a permanent Utopia in the world, is the recognition of Moscow's claims to the Baltic States and other regions included in her demands. It is as simple as all that! And the sooner the Allied democracies realize that they are holding up the show by withholding this necessary recognition, the better. Because they must realize that Soviet Russia cannot concentrate on her job of winning the war until this little matter is taken care of. It bothers her very much, and hinders her war effort. The end of the war, and a world Utopia are just across the threshold, and the recognition of Moscow's claims are the key!

It must be slightly uncomfortable to have the ghosts of Munich interrupting the present delibera-

tions of international politicians. The spirits of the Central European victims of the policy of appeasement are also present, shattering the serene silence of pipe-dreams with the rattling of shackles and chains forced upon them by another famous defender of just-this-bit-of-territory -and-I'll-be-satisfied.

The European leaders who would appease Russian Bear now to further their own aims may squirm a bit at the haunting memory of Munich, but they bolster up their courage by insisting that this is an entirely different case. The tragic aftermath of the appeasement at Munich, which is when the present war got off to a beautiful start, will not be repeated, they insist. They have been assured by Moscow that there will be no more territorial demands in the future, and that the headquarters of the Internationale has no desire or intention to spread Communism to Western Europe. They will tell you the Soviets are not really interested in these territories, they are merely taking this means to guarantee the future peace of Europe — honest! Besides, they have it on good authority, from Ambassador Davies, various American columnists and others who ought to know better, that Soviet Russia can be trusted to keep her word, that she has never yet violated a pact or treaty! (You biased Red-baiter may ask, what about the invasion of the Baltic states by Soviet Russia? Oh, that! That was no violation of the Baltic-Soviet non-aggression pact. It was merely a self-defense move on Moscow's part, because Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia were found to be planning the invasion and occupation of Soviet Russia!)

Granting that the Soviet army has made a marvelous stand against Hitler's forces, and granting still more emphatically that Soviet successes have given the United States and the other Allies a precious respite, we find it difficult to understnad Soviet Russia's peculiar conception of honesty and justice and decency, whereby, evidently using her part as an Ally as a subtle bit of blackmail, she adopts her own hated enemy's ruthless tactics of aggresion. The whitewashing of her demands by herself and her official and unofficial apologists cannot conceal the hypocrisy underneath that sends forth its stench to the high heavens.

"DEAR MOTHERLAND"

On Feb. 1, 1942, Soviet President Kalinin made the following statement in his much-publicized address to the world:

"The gallant Red Army continues in its unrelenting destruction of the Nazi hordes. Our forces are continuing to push the enemy lines back. The day is not far distant when Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia will be freed from Nazi oppression and returned to the bosom of their Soviet motherland."

On Feb. 6, 1942, a local Lithuanian daily carried the following report, forwarded from Lisbon, Portugal:

"Birželio 25 dieną prie Noreikiškių kaimo Šiaulių apskrityje, prigužėjo raudonarmiečių. Jie užklydo ir į Jakavičių ūkį. Namuose rado šeimininkę Jakavičienę, kurios vyras buvo išvažiavęs į Šiaulius tarnybos reikalais.

Pas Jakavičius buvo užējęs jų kaimynas ir kitas kaimynas-ūkininkas Taralius. Visi troboje rasti žmonēs buvo bolševikų nuvesti į miškelį. Vienas jų, Jakavičių daržininkas, 20 m. amžiaus Aleksas Ričkus, čia pat kieme buvo apkratytas, nuvestas už daržinės ir dviem šūviais į nugarą nušautas. Kratos metu pas Ričkų nieko nerasta ir jis bolševikams nesipriešino.

Likusieji ūkininkai buvo nuvesti į miške į ir suguldyti. Iš jų išskyrė šeimininkę Jakavičienę, ūkininką Petrą Taralių ir šiauliečus Stasį Ciesielskį ir Joną Dalylą. Šiuos keturis bolševikai nusivarė į miško gilumą. Staiga miške nuaidėjo vienas po kito visa eilė šūvių.

Tik kitos dienos rytą, atvykus iš miesto ūkio savininkui Jakavičiui, grupė vyrų išėjo miškan. Per 100 metrų nuo trobėsių, miškelio gilumoje, šakomis apmētyti, per 10-20 metrų vienas nuo kito, gulėjo keturi lavonai, kurie buvo sunkiai sužaloti. Jakavičių ūkį komunistai visiškai išardė ir apiplėšė."

"Heaven save me from my friends; I'll take care of my enemies myself" — how truly the old quip applies to Lithuania's tragic plight today! The Soviets insist upon "saving" Lithuania. The Nazis insist they "saved" Lithuania from the Communists and the inhabitants "had better be grateful to them — or else!" We have an interesting collection of similar reports about the Nazi "saviors" of Lithuania which we will give to you in the near future.

Question Box

Q. One of the chief objections that I heard against the Pope's plan in the Quadragesimo Anno for Trade Unions was that it was a model of the guilds. What were they, and why are they objectionable to so many people?

Within the last ten years, the people of the United States have become union conscious. The people of this country have always had unions, — but they were an evil, a sore, that could not be cured. But then when times became bad, banks closed, factories were shut, and few found work, then various people began offering solutions for labor and economic ills. Among them was Pope Pius XI who in his Quadragesimo Anno insisted on the rights of the working man to organize, to work in closed shops, to have social security and compensation and as his solution he suggested trade unions and social reconstruction. We know that this war will not bring a solution. Times will be worse when the boys will come back to work. Many economists think that the solution offered by the Pope is the only solution. Read his encyclical Q. A. and all the pamphlets in the Social Action Series written by Fathers Haas, Ryan, and Cronin. Non-Catholics read them. Why don't we?

Guilds were various trade unions that were found in many countries in Europe between 1150 and 1800. They were found in England, France, Spain, Germany, Poland, and later in Lithuania. They were all similar in organization and yet perfectly similar in their scope and activity. Lack of space does not permit us to describe them fully; we will limit ourselves to a few questions. From whence they originated we don't know. They might have evolved from various Christian societies, like vg. the shoemaker sodality may have grown from a guild. More likely they may have been imitations of religious and church organizations.

Their purpose was to control economic life. This control did not mean Fascist or state domination, but control meant directing to some proper end. This proper end was to provide for the good of the worker and of the community. Briefly, the guilds sought to insure for the shoemaker or the fisherman a decent living; he was to supply his town with shoes or fish. They did this by providing scales, standards, market-halls, and even benefit payments in sickness and death.

They were able to do this by becoming a monopoly in their locality which forbade "forestalling" i. e. buying up all the goods before they were placed on the market for all; and "engrossing" i. e. buying more than could be used. A person who wished to buy up all the goods to undersell and force out his competitor never had a chance in this setup.


But then when people began to think of business as a warfare, as something free from the laws of justice, then guilds, their obstacles, became zombies of big business and had to go.

May we suggest that it should not only be a communist or a socialist or a union man who can discuss solutions for labor troubles. We Catholics have great leaders who too have a solution. Why not read them and study them and then pass them on to others?

VETE SHILLINGS INDUCTED

Michael Pavilonis New Press Manager

On Tuesday, March 17, Vete Shillings, manager of the K. of L. Press, left for service in the U. S. Army.

While the loss of Vete Shillings is a severe blow to the organization, the appointment of Michael Pavilonis as new Press Manager is as good a bit of news to the Knights of Lithuania as it is to Mike's many friends. As a linotypist of many years experience, and particularly as an under-study of Shillings on the K. of L. Press staff, Pavilonis is especially capable of taking Vete's place.

Vete Shillings (who is married to the former Anastasia Varanis, former Center Officer and Press Director) has earned for himself an excellent record as one of the most capable and conscientious administrators the Press has ever had. His reputation as a skilled printer and an expert at composition cannot be equaled in the American-Lithuanian field.

It is no exaggeration to say that if it were not for Shillings, the K. of L's would not have a Press of their own today. He took over his duties at a time when the situation was desperate at the Press. The finances were in a deplorable condition. The equipment was completely run down, and the most necessary machines were

completely lacking. To sum things up, the prospect was very dark, indeed.

Vete Shillings patient and capable administration, things began to improve. The indebtedness was reduced, the old equipment was improved, new units were bought, jobs started to come in — more than could be handled at times. At the time Shillings left his post, the K. of L. Press was putting out about 7,000 copies of various magazines monthly, was the official press for at least a half dozen large firms and organizations, and was putting out an enormous amount of small job orders.

Mike Pavilonis has years of experience behind him, being particularly well-versed in the intricacies of linotyping. He was with the "Draugas" staff for about eight years, until last summer when he came to the K. of L. Press.

Pavilonis is a resident of Roseland, where he resides with his wife. Active in parish and organization affairs, he is President of the Holy Name Society and the Lithuanian Democratic Club.

Thus, while we reluctantly have had to say good-bye and good luck to Vete Shillings in his new life, we are happy to greet Mike Pavilonis and also wish him good luck in his new duties.

CHICAGO DISTRICT PROTESTS SOVIET CLAIMS

The observance of the annual St. Casimir Day on March 8 by the Chicago District was of particular significance this year. St. Anthony's Church in Cicero was the scene of the gathering, in which about 300 members received Holy Communion in corpore, and attended a breakfast in the Parish Hall.

Perhaps the most important feature of this year's observance was the adoption of a strongly-worded resolution in which, along with a re-affirmation of faith in our government and its war against all aggression, a strong protest was entered against the recent tendency on the part of certain international politicians to appease Soviet Russia in its unreasonable and unjust claims to Lithuania and the other Baltic states.

The resolution, which is remarkable for its force and clarity, follows:

A RESOLUTION

Adopted by the Chicago District of the Knights of Lithuania.

WHEREAS the United States of America was wantonly and treacherously attacked by Japan, and is now at war with Japan, Germany and Italy, and is fighting for the principles of democracy, freedom and justice; and

WHEREAS many members of the Chicago District of the Knights of Lithuania are now serving and will be serving in the armed forces of the United States of America and fighting against the aggressor nations; and

WHEREAS the aggressor nations have occupied and subjugated many nations, among them the Republic of Lithuania, land of our forefathers, and are now bent upon enslaving the rest of the human race; and

WHEREAS disquieting dispatches have appeared in the American press stating that Soviet Russia is demanding that the United States of America and Great Britain recognize Lithuania and the other Baltic countries as part of her territority, contrary to the principles of the Atlantic Charter to which Soviet Russia subscribed, and against the principles of the Joint Declaration of the United Nations, now therefore, be it

RESOLVED that we loyal American citizens, of Lithuanian ancestry, members of the Chicago District of the Knights of Lithuania, gathered here in the St. Anthony Parish Hall, in Cicero, Iilinois, on Sunday, March 8, A. D. 1942, do hereby reaffirm our faith in the democratic principles of the Atlantic Charter and the Joint Declaration of the United Nations, and our complete confidence in the leadership of President Roosevelt; be it further

RESOLVED that we will aid, with all the means at our command, the United States of America and their Allies in their fight to defeat the aggressor nations, and hereby express our firm belief and conviction that the victory of the United States over the militarism of the Axis Powers will mean the liberation and self-determination of the now enslaved nations, including the land of our ancestors, the Republic of Lithuania; be it further

RESOLVED that we maintain that the Soviet Russian claims to Lithuania are unlawful, unjust, and of an aggressive nature, and we hope that Russia will renounce her claims to Lithuania and thus banish the mark of an aggressor nation from being placed upon her, and that the Governments of the United States of America and of Great Britain stand by their policies and principles and do not recognize any occupation of the Republic of Lithuania; be it further

RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be sent to the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America; the Honorable Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of Great Britain; Members of Congress from Illinois; and to the American press.
