Gyvenam tam, kad pažintumēm Dievą, Jį mylēdami, Jam tarnaudami šiame pasaulyje, amžiną laimę užsipelnytumēm aname gyvenime, yra antroji gyvenimo supratimo filosofija.

šv. Kazimieras yra parodęs, kaip nereikia gyventi tuščio ir nenaudingo gyvenimo ir paliko tikrojo gyvenimo neišdildomą paveikslą. Štai, keli jo pamokinantieji bruožai.

NEPRITRAUKĒ BLIZGUČIAI, karališki turtai, kunigaikščių palociai, ištaigingi rūmai... Nepaveikē nei valdovo kardas, kariuomenē, nei kokia kita galybē nebuvo jo rankos ramstis. Karališkas sostas, auksuoti drabužiai, tūkstančiai besilankstančių tarnų nesukēlē jo išdidumo, nepatraukē akies, nepaviliojo širdies...

— O, koks jis foolish! — sušuks šių dienų jaunuolis. — Kad taip man, tai aš būčiau mokējes taip gyventi, kad ir poną Prezidentą būčiau pralenkęs savo galybe ir didenybe.

IšLAIKĒ LAISVĄ ŠIRDĮ ir didingą valią, nes nepasidavē tuščios garbēs troškimui. Šventasis gerai suprato, kad aklas garbēs ieškojimas ir jos vaikymasis surakina kilnią širdį, padaro ją belaisve, pripildo ją puikybēs, godumo, neapykantos bei keršto nuodais.

SPINDĒJO SKAISTI SIELA, nes nuodēmingu ir vējavaikiškų linksmybių neieškojo. Jo linksmybių laikas buvo skirtas melstis, gerų darbų daryti ir pasirengti amžinai laimingam gyvenimui.

— Tai ne mums — ne mums, — didžiu balsu kartos 20-ojo amžiaus išpuikęs jaunimas. Taip galējo gyventi tik prieš kelius šimtus metų, bet ne šiandien. Juk šiais laikais nē vieno nerastum bent panašiai gyvenant, tai kam dar ir kalbēti ir siūlyti mums, juk mes negalime būti kito pasau-

Tik apsižiūrēkim savo tarpe, ir čia, šiandien, rasime kilnių berniukų ir mergaičių, kurie nežiūri į kitus, bet stengiasi siekti šventojo kilnumo. Ir jie linksmi, patenkinti, dažniau juos matai prie Komunijos, džentelmeniškai ir kilniai pasikalba su kitos lyties jaunimu, jie visų pavyzdžiu statomi. Pažįstu vieną studentą, kuris kas savaitę eina Komunijos, kurs ir sportą mēgsta, su kitais jaunuoliais smagiai pakrykštauja, bet kai laikas atējo, savo niekada neatsisakys dēl kitu akiu ar dēl to, kad kiti taip nesielgia, ar kad kiti taip elgiasi, jis eina savo keliu.

GILUS PAMALDUMAS buvo šv. Kazimiero ryškiausias ženklas nuo pat kūdikystēs. Jis melsdavosi visa savo butybe. Kai su savo Išganytoju kalbēdavosi, viską pamiršdavo, nei šalta naktis, nei nepatogumai neatitraukdavo dažnai klūpoti prie bažnyčios durų. Jei arti Viešpats, tai viskas kita gerai.

Ar tai nēra pamoka mūsų jaunimui, kuris ir patogiose bažnyčiose "nemoka" *šventai* praleisti. Juk pajuokauti, pasikalbēti, pasižvalgyti ne baž-

Lietuvos Vyčių Chicago Apskričiui šį numerį skiriant

(Trumpa gyvavimo ir veikimo apžvalga)

Lietuvos Vyčių Chicago Apskritis yra metais senesnē už patį mūs laikraštį "Vytį". Kai 1915 metais trečiame seime, Chicagoj, buvo nutarta leisti "Vytį", Chicago Apskritis jau veikē.

Dēl stokos laiko negalima buvo pasirausti po senų laikraščių komplektus ir patirti, kas buvo iniciatorius (pavienis asmuo, ar kuopa) apskričiui steigti ir kuriai kuopai buvo garbē turēti steigiamąjį susirinkimą. Chicago vyčiams tuo metu vadovavo ir gaires veikimui nustatinėjo žymūs visuomenininkai, laikraštininkai, muzikai, kaip J. Kaupas, J. Karosas, komp. A. Aleksis, kun. F. Kemēšis, P. Mulevičius, arkitektas M. Žaldokas, adv. V. Rutkauskas, komp. A. Pocius, kun. Serafinas; studentai: A. Račkus, K. Pakštas, L. Šimutis, dail. I. Ilekis, J. Poška ir kiti. Be to, kolonijose buvo labai gausu veikėjų. Šviesiam katalikui priklausyti prie Lietuvos Vyčių buvo ne tik garbē, bet ir tautinė - religinė pareiga. Dėlto lie-

nyčioj vieta. O kiek vyčių rodo pavyzdį su maldaknyge ir rožančium rankoj melsdamiesi? Gal ir jiems labiau patinka "pasižiūrēti", "pasēdēti" paskutiniame bažnyčios suole...

VARGŠŲ MEILĒ buvo jo viešojo gyvenimo veikimas. Gera darymas buvo jo maloniausias užsiēmimas, saldžiausias pasilinksminimas. Jo būdo švelnumas, malonumas, geraširdiškumas yra ryškiausi ir pamokinantys šventojo karakterio bruožai.

Mūsų laikais ir savo apylinkėse gal mes nematome vargšų, nelaimingų, apleistų. Tačiau juos mato šventasis danguje. Jis stebi tuos tūkstančių tūkstančius kenčiančių, sužeistųjų, mirštančiųjų kare. Jo akyse ypač stovi kiekvienas lietuvis karys ir kiekvienas kenčiantis lietuvis Lietuvoj, Sibire, kalėjime, ligoninėj, ar čia pat—tarpe mūsų.

Šventasis Kazimieras paliko savo artimo meilēs pavyzdį ir mums labiau atsiminti kenčiančius, ypač savo brolius karius vyčius. Naudingausiai Jo šventę paminēsime, jei tą dieną už kenčiantį lietuvį ypatingu būdu melsimēs, kad lietuvis būtų laisvas ir kad Lietuva būtų Nepriklausoma maldausime.

tuviams bedieviams Amerikoje nebuvo didesnio priešo, kaip Lietuvos Vyčių organizacija.

Choras

"Vyties" 5-6 numeryje (1915) įdēta pirma žinutē iš apskrities veikimo. Žinutēj aprašyta, kaip vyčiai moka naudingai laiką praleisti Advento metu. Štai, 4-ji kuopa (Dievo Apvaizdos parapijoj) Gruodžio 2 d. buvo suruošus vakarą, kuriame dalyvavo su paskaitomis dr. Rutkauskas, "Draugo" red. J. Kaupas ir "Vyties" adm. L. Šimutis. Paskaitų tarpuose buvo rodoma judamieji paveikslai.

Kaip pavasarį upē, pralaužus ledus išsilieja iš vagos ir, šniokšdama, putodama, dideliu smarkumu bēga ir jokios kliūtys negali sulaikyti, taip lygiai tais metais ējo Chicago Apskrities veikimas. "Vyties" 3 numeryje, 1916 m., jau randame tokį pranešimą:

"Lietuvos Vyčių Chicago Apskritis, sutraukus 11 kuopų, kurios turi arti tūkstančio narių, sumanē suorganizuoti apskrities chorą". Tas ir įkūnyta Vasario 24, 1916 metais, šv. Jurgio parapijos salēj. Apskrities chorui tuomet priklausē žymiausios Chicago lietuvių dainos meno jēgos, kurių priekyje buvo žinomos artistės Ona Pocienē (mirusi), Marijona Janušauskienē ir kitos. Choro dirigentu buvo komp. A. Aleksis. Jam išvykus kitur vargonininkauti, ilgus metus chora vedē komp. A. Pocius, kurio pastangomis buvo suruošta didelių vakarų - koncertų, pastatyta visa eilē operečių; kai kurios, kaip "Kornevilio Varpai" buvo kartotos keleta sykių ir keliose vietose. Vidurmiesčio koncertinēse salēse Apskrities choro buvo išpildyta religinio turino veikalai, kaip "Stabat Mater", "Septyni paskutiniai Kristaus žodžiai nuo kryžiaus", kurie vēliau buvo pakartoti kai kuriose bažnyčiose. Vēliau eilę metu Apskrities chorui vadovavo komp. J. Sauris, kurio pastangomis irgi suruošta daug koncertų, pastatyta operečių; be to, choras koncertavo Kewanee, Ill., Detroit, Mich., ir buvo dalis masinio lietuvių choro New York Pasaulinėje Parodoje. Choro dirigentais dar trumpai yra buvę S. Rakauskas ir L. šimutis, Jr. (sūnus vieno apskrities ir choro organizatoriaus). Pastarieji abu dabar tarnauja kariuomenēj.

Drama

Lietuvių scenos meną apskritis taip pat yra aukštai iškėlęs. Dramos Sekcijai vadu-rezisorium ilgiausiai yra buvęs Justas Balsis, dabartinis lietuvių parapijos, Hartford, Conn., vargonininkas. Vėliau apskrityje buvo įsteigtas Talentų Iždas, kuris talentingiems scenos mėgėjams (J. Balsis, J. Vilimas, P. Sriubas, O. Janušauskaitė

žiūrint iš kairēs į dešinę pirmoj eilēj sēdi: Violet Spirauskaitē, 2-ji vice pirmininkē; Marijona Daunytē, pirmininkē; kun. Julius Grinius, dvasios vadas; Antanina Valaitē, sekretorē; Aldona Sleinytē, sekretorēs padējēja.

Antroj eilēj taip pat žiūrint iš kairēs i dešine:

Ignas K. Sakalas, korespondentas, kurs šiuo metu eina "Vyties" redaktoriaus pareigas; Edvardas Misius, iždo globējas; Jonas Brazauskas, iždo globējas; ir Stasys Šimulis, iždininkas. Atvaizde nēra Jono Vilkišiaus, 1-mo vice pirmininko. Plačiau apie apskriti rašoma kitoje vietoj.

ir k.) davē progos lankyti dramos mokyklą ir kultivuoti savo talentą. Dideliuose miesto teatruose atvaidinta visa eilē istorinių veikalų ("Keistutis", "Mirga", "Rutvilē", "Mindaugas", "Išgriovimas Kauno pilies" ir k.). Daug taip pat buvo atvaidinta mažesnių veikalų parapijų ir kitose didesnėse salėse.

Sportas

Sportas apskrity irgi buvo aukštai pastatytas, ypatingai baseball, basketball ir track meet. Kiekviena sporto šaka turējo savo sąryšį (League). Žaista ne tik tarpusavy, bet ir su svetimtaučiu geresnēmis rinktinēmis. Į Lietuvos Vy-

čių Sporto Lygas buvo sutraukti geriausi lietuviai sportininkai. Amerikos lietuvių sportininkų rinktinė Pirmojon Lietuvos Olimpiadon (1938 m.) nariai iš Chicago buvo visi veik vyčiai — sportininkai. Apskrities tradicinės dienos (K. of L. Day) niekuomet neapseidavo be sporto rungtinių. Iš visų apskrities sekcijų, Sporto Sekcijos rekordai geriausiai yra sutvarkyti ir saugiai apskrities laikomi, kaipo istorinė medžiaga.

Tradicinē diena

Chicago Apskritis yra plačiai pagarsējus savo tradicine diena, kuri prasidējo 1915 metais, ruošiama Amerikos Nepriklausomybēs Dieną,

Liepos 4. Iš kart kuopos bendrą iškilą (išvažiavimą) ruošdavo kuriam nors miesto, ar apskrities (county) miškuose. Išvažiavimai sutraukdavo tūkstančius jaunimo. Apylinkē skambēdavo nuo lietuviškų dainų, lankos mirgedavo nuo tautinių žaidimų, šimtai svetimtaučių susirinkdavo pasižiūrēti. Išvažiavimai dvelkē patriotizmu Amerikai ir savo senajai tēvynei Lietuvai. Vēliau išvažiavimai pradēta ruošti uždarytuose parkuose, kad jie duotų ir medžiaginės naudos. Lietuvių parapijoms įsteigus moderniškiausia Chicagoj parką — Vytauto Parką — tradicinė diena perkelta i ta parką ir kasmet vienas didžiųjų piknikų tam parke esti Lietuvos Vyčių Chicago Apskrities tradicinė diena, trumpai vadinama K. of L. Day.

Dvasinis ryšys

Apskritis jau nuo 1929 metų organizacijos globėjo šv. Kazimiero dieną, kasmet ruošia bendrą dvasinę puotą. Didesnių dvasinio pobūdžio demonstracijų Chicagoj nieks nėra surengęs. Esant palankiam orui, po Mišių ir pusryčių daroma ekskursija į šv. Kazimiero kapus uždėti vainiką ant vieno kurio organizacijos nario kapo, kad prisiminti šimtus narių, jau ilsinčių tuose kapuose. Beje, šv. Kazimiero kapuose apskritis savo lėšomis yra pastatęs S. Laurynaitei paminklą. Ji buvo ideali vyčių veikėja (Cicero), 1915 metais žuvus ekskursinio laivo Eastland katastrofoj.

Fondas savai pastogei

Apskričiai įsisteigus, kilo mintis įsigyti ir nuosavą namą susirinkimams, vakarams, pramogoms. Tam buvo įsteigtas ir fondas. Sumanymas tačiau nebuvo judinamas, o įnešti į fondą pinigai buvo išleisti kitiems reikalams. Prieš trejetą metų tačiau pradēta labiau rūpintis įsigijimu namo ir atgaivintas fondas, kuriame šiandie yra \$500 grynais pinigais. Fondas yra atskirai nuo apskrities iždo ir jo direktoriais yra kun. I. Albavičius, kun. J. Dambrauskas, MIC., adv. J. Petraitis (Peters) ir Stasys Šimulis.

Pirmojo Pasaulinio karo metu ir paskui Lietuvai pasiskelbus laisva, nepriklausoma, apskritis visą laiką be paliovos teikė medžiaginės ir moralinės paramos. Savas mokslo ir kultūrines įstaigas Amerikoje taip pat yra nemažai sušelpęs. Savais reikalais, pavyzdžiui, steigiant nuosavą spaustuvę, yra daug pasidarbavęs, nuveikęs. Gera būtų, kad kas nors vyčių veteranų, pašventęs gerokai laiko, pasistengtų padaryti plačią apskrities gyvavimo ir veikimo apžvalgą. Išeitų įdomus dalykas, kuris būtų ne tik medžiaga Amerikos lietuvių istorijai. bet ir paakstinimas dabartiniam jaunimui daugiau pasišvęsti tiems idealams, kuriais buvo steigiama Lietuvos Vyčių organizacija.

Silent thoughts sweet and tender enkindle new dreams,


Recall mem'ries that long since have flown down life's streams.

Tiesa, tos jų svajonės išsipildė. Laisva nepriklausoma Lietuva gyvavo ir sumaniai valdėsi per dvidešimt tris metus. saint a few minutes after his death. Or that a big, blustering, hard swearing, hard drinking trooper would become a saint simply by being a nurses-aide. These saints were unusual, because their thoughts and actions were so dissimilar to the spirit of their times. It is as if God has chosen these men and women and set them apart as a contrast to the wrongs committed by other people. They are God's own criticism upon the doings of men, not so much what they regard as wrong but what they are embracing, mistakenly, as right. Such a saint, so unlike to others in his age and ours, was St. Casimir.

Who would have ever thought in the riotous

Fifteenth century that the prince of the most powerful and proudest kingdom in Europe would become a saint known for his humility. In a country where absolute feudalism reigned, he went against the spirit of his times by giving his ermine coat to a street beggar. While other men stayed away from God and only came to church for official ceremonies, he found it expedient for himself to come to daily mass even if it meant kneeling on the cold pavement before the closed church door on dark wintry mornings. While other princes were willing to renounce their God, and sever their allegiance to the Pope in order to gain wealth or enjoy coveted lust, St. Casimir would have rather died than have committed sin. To confound this age proud of power and lineage, reluctant to serve God and disinclined to the acquisition of virtue, in an age given up to forbidden pleasures, God chose St. Casimir. He was to be the guiding light who would remind the people that to follow Christ was something greater and more desirable than a throne, an ermine coat, or even life itself.

We can justly boast of our patron St. Casimir. But oul love for him should not end there. Why can't we try to follow the example that he set before us? We are living in a day when people are becoming more conscious of their need of God. Many of them are praying for the first time in their life in a most fervent manner for something that they really want. And yet — to go all the way — to pray, not just once in a while, but all the time, to love Him and serve Him, not just on Sunday morning, but everyday — that they are not anxious to do. If he is our Patron and our model, then let us follow his example so that our service of God might be one of perfect love and complete self-offering. Such was his life; why can't we make it ours? R. 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KUN. DR. KAZIMIERAS URBONAVIČIUS (Jonas Kmitas)

Sausio 1 d. 70 metų amžiaus sukaktį šventė žymiausias Amerikos lietuvių rašytojas-poetas ir "Darbininko" redakcijinių straipsnių rašytojas kun. dr. Kazimieras Urbonavičius (Jonas Kmitas).

Jubiliatas yra gimęs Kidoliškių kaime, Marijampolēs apskr. Jau klieriku būdamas Seinų dvasinėj seminarijoj su kitais klierikais leido ranka rašytą laikraštuką vardu "Knapt", kurį vēliau pakeitē į "Viltis". Buvo veiklus lietuvių slaptos organizacijos narys, nes tuomet rusų valdžia draudē kiekvieną lietuvių tautinį veikimą. Rusai jautē kun. K. Urbonavičių esant labai pavojingu maskoliams žmogumi, delto neleido net iškilmingu primicijų laikyti. Jo primicijose kitas kunigas prie didžiojo altoriaus atlaikē giedotines Mišias šv., o pats primicijantas prie šoninio altoriaus skaitytines. Įšvęstą į kunigus K. Urbonavičių rusų valdžia tuojau nukėlė net mozūrijos gilumon, kur jubiliatas taipgi darbavos lietuviams šviesti, juos iš tautinio miego žadinti.

1905 metas jubiliatas atvyko į Ameriką ir tuojau buvo paskirtas klebono pareigoms lietuvių parapijose. Sunkios anais laikais klebono pareigos tačiau nesulaikė jo ir nuo tautinio veikimo. Per eilę metų buvo pirmininku ir žymiu vadu Tautos Fondo, Katalikų Federacijos, Kunigų Vienybės, šv. Juozapo Darbininkų Sąjungos. Bu-

vo ir tebēra didelis rēmējas ir bičiulis ir mūs organizacijos — Lietuvos Vyčių, o mūs organą "Vytį" dažnai puošē savo patriotiniais raštais. Kaip jubiliatas žiūrējo į L. Vyčių organizaciją kiekvienas narys supras perskaitęs kitoje vietoje dedamas jo eiles "Lietuvos Vytis", paimtas iš "Jono Kmito Eilēs" rinkinio. Kitos mūs organizacijos: Moterų Sąjunga, Studentų ir Profesionalų Sąjunga; gyvavusios Moksleivių Susivienymas, Blaivininkų Susivienymas, taip pat buvo jam brangios ir jų organus nuolatos puošē savo raštais.

Lietuvių Prekybos Bendrovė yra išleidus jubiliato didoką eilių rinkinį, o keleriopai daugiau yra parašęs vėliau. Surinkus visus raštus — eilėmis ir proza — susidarytų keli dideli tomai, kurie būtų didelis įnašas į mūs literatūros lobyną.

Gerbiamam jubiliatui, dideliam L. Vyčių bičiuliui, bendradarbiui prašome Dievo sveikatos, kad dar ilgai galētų darbuotis mūs išeivijoj Dievo garbei ir lietuvių tautos labui.

In Defense of Lithuania

The Constitution and Political Parties

Having burst the bonds of Tsarist slavery, Lithuania strove to establish a most liberal form of life within its boundaries. Free elections were proclaimed with a general, secret ballot for the constituent assembly, as a result of which 59 Christian - Democrats, 29 Populist, 14 Social Democrats, 6 Jews, 3 Poles, 1 Russian were elected. (E. J. Harrison, "Lithuania 1928", London, 1928, p. 225).

Lithuania had four wholly free elections to its Seimas (Diet) from 1920-1927. During these four democratic elections, 347 members were elected. The party affiliations of the members of the parliament were as follows:

Simialarly the ministerial cabinets were formed on democratic principles, by coalition, with an element of all parties. For example, after the election of the Constituent Assembly in June 19, 1920 a cabinet of ministers was

On the first of September, 1922, the Constitution of Lithuania, which has approved by the Seimas (Diet), guaranteed the rights and privileges of all citizes:

"All citizens, men and women, are equal before the law. No citizen is to receive special privilege or diminution of rights by reason of birth, belief, or nationality (10th pargph). The inviolability of person (11th prgph), home (12th) is guaranteed, as, is freedom of religion and conscience (13th), correspondence, mail, telephone and telegraph (14th); freedom of speech and the press (15th); freedom to convene and form societies (16 and 17); the assurance of workers against illness, old age, accidents, loss of work. (97th prgph).

sy centralinio šildymo boileriui sprogus, kilusio gaisro dūmuose užtroško Antanas Smetona, buvęs pirmas ir paskutinis Lietuvos prezidentas. Kiti šeimos nariai iš gaisro išsigelbējo.

Velionis buvo 69 metų amžiaus. Kaipo vienas Lietuvos Tarybos narių, Vasario 16, 1918 metais jis pasirašē Lietuvos Nepriklausomybēs Deklaraciją ir 1920 metais buvo išrinktas pirmuoju respublikos prezidentu, kurio pareigas ējo iki 1924 m. Tapęs Lietuvos prezidentu antrą kartą 1926 metais išbuvo iki Rusijos bolševikų invazijos Birželio 15, 1940 m. Kad nepatekti į okupantų rankas, jis su šeima pabēgo į Vokietiją. Rusijai sulaužius visas sutartis, okupavus Lietuvą, ir šiam karui siaučiant jis ir ištremime būdamas nepaliovė tikėjęs į vėl būsimą laisvą ir nepriklausomą Lietuvą. Gaila, kad šiurpi tragedija nedavė jam išvysti tos valandos.

Velionis buvo vienas tų, kurio vardas kiekvienam lietuviui buvo žinomas visuose pasaulio kraštuose. Lietuvos istorijoj jo vardas užims keliolika didelių puslapių. Jo vardas buvo ir paliks istorinis.

Palaidotas iškilmingai iš Šv. Jono katedros, Kalvarijos kapuose, Cleveland, Ohio. Gedulo mišias šv. laikē pats Cleveland vyskupas.

Kas nori savo šalies gyventojus apdovanoti, turi pats save atiduoti. Tavo ramumas, teisingumas ir gera širdis bus geriausia ir brangiausia tavo kraštui dovana.

And truly it is. Milton Stark's letter is authoritatively sound and based on historical data. Every American-Lithuanian interested in the independence of Lithuania should take notice of this letter.

Milton Stark is an American of Lithuanian descent. His home is in Los Angeles, California. Presently he is preparing to line

up with Uncle Sam's Army.

We have obtained permission to reprint the letter of Milton Stark, entitled "Lithuania's Fight For Freedom" in its entirety. It appeared in the Chicago - Herald America, January 24th, 1944.

'Lithuania's Fight for Freedom'

MILTON STARK

"THE RUSSIANS will not succeed in subjugating the Lithuanian people .They tried once before and failed. They will fail again." — OWEN NOREM, U. S. Minister to Lithuania.

As a result of the demand for autonomy from the Czar, voiced by the great Congress of Lithuania, which twice convened in Vilnius (1905-1917) for that very purpose, the Council of Lithuania — elected by the 1917 conference — proclaimed Lithuania's independence on Feb. 16, 1918. Lithuania had been held in bondage since 1795.

Lithuania is, therefore, one of the youngest and at the same time one of the oldest states in Europe, for be it remembered that she has been existent since 1236; it was in this year that Mindaugas—the founder of Lithuania, Christianized and coronated King by the Pope in 1253—organized the hitherto scattered Lithuanian tribes into one compact nation and thus repulsed the threatening Livonian, Teutonic and Tartar invaders.

"Whilst the realm of Russia lay like a chained victim of the wild Mongolians and nowhere could offer resistance, the land of the Prince of Lithuania became the stanch barrier beyond which

the Tartars could not pass. Their Princes, with greater right than those of Russia, may claim the credit of having been the saviors of Europe from Tartars' inroads and Tartar yoke." — Lithuania, The Awakening Of A Nation. (See Yunkis' "The Lithuanians.")

Lithuania consistently continued opposing German expansion eastward; and in 1410 two Lithuanian warriors — Vytautas the Great of Lithuanian warriors — Vytautas the Great Lithuania and Jogaila of Poland — united their respective forces and dealt a crushing blow to the might of the Teutonic knights of Tannenberg, from which they never really fully recovered.

However, despite many successes, centuries of imposed wars and persistent German attacks so weakened and impoverished Lithuania and her confederate since 1569, Poland, that in 1795 the twain were overcome by the joint maneuvers of Germany, Austria and Russia. In the partitioning that followed, the major part of Lithuania fell to Russia, a small section to Germany.

During the Czarist occupation, Lithuania suffered much. The Lithuanian press, language, and even the printing of Lithuanian prayer books were suppressed for 40 years (1865-1904); youths were compelled to serve 25-year terms in the Czar's army; churches were burned and many priests either transported to Siberia or mercifully murdered.

Notwithstanding all the injustices and cruelties put upon them while under the Czarist regime, the Lithuanians' spirit did not die; in the constant face of death, they secretly printed Lithuanian books and held religious services in the forest and caves. Furthermore, to emphasize their determination to be free, they revolted repeatedly in 1812, 1831, 1863 and 1904.

In 1863, and for some time afterward, thousands of Lithuanians emigrated to America in search of peace. Today, approximately 1,000,000 Lithuanians live in this country.

Lithuania, having regained her freedom in 1918, spent the succeeding 22 years of independence in happy tranquillity, governing herself capably and maintaining peaceful relations with her neighbors. But regardless of her cultural efforts, Germany, on March 22, 1939 — after

having taken Austria and Czechoslovakia — forced Lithuania to cede the port of Memel (Klaipeda) and the adjoining territory.

One year later — June 15, 1940 — this time the Russians, in violation of their solemn treaty of 1920 —

"...RUSSIA WITHOUT ANY PREJUDICE RECOGNIZES THE SELF-RULE AND INDE-PENDENCE OF THE STATE OF LITHUANIA WITH ALL THE JURIDICAL CONSEQUEN-CES... AND FOR ALL TIME RENOUNCES WITH GOOD WILL ALL THE SOVEREIGNTY RIGHTS OF RUSSIA WHICH IT HAS HAD IN REGARD TO THE LITHUANIAN NATION OR TERRITORY." - Peace treaty with Russia, Moscow, July 12, 1920. — marched into Lithuania and seized the whole of her, including, also, the countries of Latvia and Estonia; thereby annihilating the territorial integrity and political independence of sovereign peoples. The Russian occupational army lost no time in staging fraudulent elections. In Lithuania, a parliament, the "elected" members of which all were confirmed Communists, voted, naturally, for "incorporation into the Soviet Union." The Russians are now using that "election" and "vote" as a pretext for advancing their claims on Lithuania.

The Russian-German war, which began on June 22, 1941, provided the Lithuanian people with an opportunity to reaffirm their original declaration of independence by an armed insurrection directed against both the German and Russian occupants. The patriots successfully expelled the Russians from Lithuania, declared Lithuania free, and set up a provisional coalition government; but at a terrible cost, for a great number of the patriots were killed (some 7,500; 3,000 of whom were executed in Russian concentration camps and prisons.) The Russians, not content with the butchery of the laity, "eliminated" the following 15 priests: The Rev. Valentinas Balcius, the Rev. Vaclovas Balsys, the Rev. Jonas Daugela, the Rev. Dr. Justinas Dabrila, the Rev. Vaclovas Dambrauskas, the Rev. Matas Lajauskas, the Rev Jonas Navickas, the Rev. Jonas Petrika, the Rev. Povilas Racevicius, the

Rev. Stankevicius, the Rev. Benediktas Sveikauskas, the Rev. Jonas Tutinas, the Rev. Balys Vegele, the Rev. Pranas Vitkevičius and the Rev. Andrius Juknevičius.

The Lithuanian provisional coalition government lasted seven weeks. It was forcibly dissolved upon the advent of the Germans — August 10, 1941.

Today the free, loyal American citizens of Lithuanian descent are working assiduously on the domestic front and thousands of members of their families are fighting in the armed forces, on every battlefield — all for the liberation of mankind and the organization of life in accordance with the principles of the Atlantic Charter, which also motivates and sustains the Lithuanian underground movement against all tyranny.

They, with unshakable faith, believe that the Atlantic Charter, embodying the war and peace aims of this government and people, will be adhered to.

As to the Russians, the Lithuanians admire the courage and endurance of this people, which is manifested in the defense of their own homeland, BUT they wish to remind them that the Lithuanian people are also fighting for freedom and that they are very much shocked at the announced intention of Soviet Russia to deprive Lithuania of her freedom and independence. They, therefore, appeal to America to use her good offices with the government of Russia to liberate Lithuania.

Soviet Russia's claims to Lithuania, because of strategic reasons or an outlet to the sea, are inconsistent. The United States, though she is interested in Panama for strategic reasons, does not take away that country's independence, but respects it.

As for an outlet to the sea, Lithuania never once denied that favor to Russia and will not in the future.

Finally, in the new world to come, there will be no need of strategic frontiers.

"If we believe — as all the peace and freedom loving world firmly does — in the eventual destruction of totalitarianism, then we must necessarily believe in the resurrection of the Baltic states. Simple logic leaves us no other alternative." — K. Pakstas, Ph. D. (The Lithuanian Situation).

Writer Pleads Case for Talented Unknown Singer

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CITES SUCCESS OF ONE HERE IN RECENT RECITAL By Albert Goldberg.

The article printed below entitled "An Unknown Singer" by Goldberg refers to Mr. Ralph Jusko who appeared in a recital of songs in Chicago on October 3, 1943. A graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, Pa., Mr. Jusko continued his study of music at Yale University. The technical production of voice qualities, interpretation and richness of tone that characterize Mr. Jusko's singing are due in large measure to De Gogorza of continental fame with whom Mr. Jusko studied while in Paris.

Upon his return to the United States Mr. Jusko was well prepared to launch upon his musical career. He was accepted as a member of the Philadelphia Opera Co. having thoroughly mastered seventeen opera roles. His Mephistopheles, Beckmesser in "Die Meistersinger" and Alfio in "Cavalleria Rusticana" were outstanding examples of dramatic art and musical achievement.

Mr. Jusko resides in Boston, Mass. His versatility, engaging personality and keen interest in civic affairs have won for him many friends both in social and musical circles.

"A few weeks ago an unknown singer appeared in Chicago as assisting artist on a recital given by a Metropolitan Opera star. It is doubtful if, up to that time, more than a handful of personal friends in this city had ever heard this man's name. There had not been a line of explanatory publicity. He walked on to sing before an audience that was disposed to be friendly to the featured singer but quite cold and indifferent to the newcomer, who obviously had been placed upon the program only as relief for the star.

"It was not immediately in his favor that he proved to be a mature man, of dignified and poised stage deportment. Had he been a stripling, engagingly unsure of himself, he would have more quickly aroused audience sympathy. He obviously was not a beginner and yet no one had ever heard of him before. The chances were not good that he would amount to much.

"He sang a Handel aria first, about a severe a test as he could impose on himself under the conditions. The noble recitative was scarcely finished before it was apparent that we were in the presence of a distinguished artist. There were some minor faults, to be sure, but they were quite overbalanced by the re-

velation of a bass voice of wide range, flexible, sympathetic in quality, and expertly managed. He had diction of a type that all but vanished from the world with the retirement of John McCormack, singing that makes living drama out of each word. He had breadth of style and warmth of feeling.

"It was hard to believe our ears. It had been a long, long time since Chicago had heard the songs of Brahms and Wolf interpreted with this authority and finesse.

"Slightly bewitched over this unexpected phenomenon, this reviewer found his way back to his typewriter and wrote a notice that perhaps went slightly off the deep end. But the next morning we discovered that we were not alone. Our fellow critics were equally enthusiastic. And for days afterward musical circles rang with the praise of all who had heard the unknown singer. "Who is he?" people asked. "Where did he come from, and what has he done before this?" We could not answer.

"Quite by accident we met the gentleman a week later and heard his story. He told it modestly and with absolutely no air of self-pity.

"It is a story that must be typical of many a fine artist in this heedless age. He is 38 years old and makes his living publishing educational music in an eastern city. He had as fine and well rounded a musical education as this country offers, at one of the famous endowed eastern institutions. He studied singing there for four years with a man who had been a famous concert artist in his day. "It took me eight years to unlearn what he taught me in four," he said, but that is an accident that might have happened to any one. It is rare for a singer to find the right teacher without costly experimentation.

"He became an excellent pianist, too, and, unlike most singers, can play his own accompaniments. He has a repertoire of some 20 operatic roles, in most of which he has had practical experience in student and professional productions. His repertoire of songs includes the finest from the literatures of many nations. In short, he has all the equipment for a distinguished career.

"And what is the net result? Our friend publishes music for a livelihood and sings for an avocation — not through choice but because he never has been able to find a manager who is willing to risk embarking him on a career on the basis of merit alone. The managers are not short on excuses, of course. One maintains that the artist is too old, tho few basses reach vocal maturity before 35 and few musicians of any sort arrive a artistic maturity before 40, if then. He has been told that there is no field for basses, though there is a bass role in almost every opera ever written and there are only two recognized first class basses in the concert field today and they are booked to the hilt each season.

"He has sung for Edward Johnson of the Metropolitan Opera and been dismissed with a smile. He never has been able to penetrate the inner sanctum of the man who is the most powerful figure in the managerial world today. Apparently every outlet for a full fledged professional career is closed to him. When we saw him he was leaving for New York armed with his Chicago notices, for a last try. "I'll let you know if anything happens," he said. We have not heard from him.

"Here is a typical example of the prodigal waste of talent that exists in this country today, especially among young American artists. But, you may demur, Americans are heard with increasing frequently in

opera and concert. The Metropolitan Opera could now scarcely exist without its American artists. True, but the Metropolitan is the only large permanent operatic organization in this country and can accommodate only a fraction of the multitude which clamors at its doors. And consider a typical instance: Of 14 soloists engaged by the Chicago Symphony orchestra this season, exclusive of orchestra members, only two are native American or are to be classed as young artists.

"How have those who have arrived attained their positions in the concert world? A few — a very few on merit alone. Leonard Pennario, whose second appearance with the Chicago Symphony recently again proved him one of the ranking pianists of the younger generation, is one of these. Pannario had no more backing than the railroad fare it took to travel about the country and meet and play for various conductors. In almost every instance he was engaged immediately. But his case is an exception. Most of the others have had influence or financial backing, often both, and usually of sizable proportions.

"To launch a concert career today is a costly and complicated process. First the aspirant must give a New York recital, at a cost of from \$800, depending upon the hall and the amount of advertising. Since he is unknown, he can expect nothing in the way of box office returns and must rely upon the distribution of passes to obtain an audience. If his reviews are good he must repeat the operation in Boston, Chicago, and other large cities — also at his own expense. If his success continues, one of the large concert managements may be induced to place his name on its list of artists. But this does not guarantee engagements or a salary. Instead, he must give the manager a commission, usually 15 per cent on each engagement booked. A young artist gains prestige by being on the list of one of the first rank managers, but too often he is

sadly overlooked in the easier and for more profitable business of booking established favorites. If the aspirant has enjoyed only moderate success in his debut the chances are that none of the "big" managers will be interested even to the extent of listing him among their artists. And without that slender recognition, the road of the young artist will be doubly rocky, for two large concert managements now enjoy what is practically a monopoly of the concert business.

"In the days when the Illinois Symphony orchestra was offering a measure of opportunity to young artists Edward Barry, reviewing one of the concerts in THE TRIBUNE, wrote of "not only repeating their usual feat of turning up good soloists from nowhere" but "of giving the process a special virtuoso twist by presenting two instead of the customary one. Where do these people come from?" Well, the woods were and are full of them, and now that government subsidy has been withdrawn these fine young talents have no chance at all of gaining orchestral experience. The Chicago Sympony, like most other major American orchestras, is inhospitable to young or home talent, even on its "Pop" concerts.


"Our orchestra has, in fact, what amounts to closed door policy concerning resident artists of any age. For this the musicians themselves are in part to blame, for they, like other human beings, are not angels, and one cannot altogether blame the management for not caring to become embroiled in the studio feuds and professional jealousies which flare up when one aspirant is chosen over another one.

"Contests are no solution, for the country is contest ridden and the same conditions still obtain. Occasionally a Carroll Glenn or a Dalies Frantz will win one of the national contests and follow thru to a successful career, but they are the exceptions. As a rule the fortunate ones who won contests — and the best man does not always win - have only their brief moment of glory and then rejoin their fellows in anonymity and wishful waiting. Can America afford to continue to waste its artistic talent in this manner? And when are we going to begin to conserve talent as we now conserve our other and no less valuable natural resources?"


