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

Bukit pasveikinti, mieli Vyčiai!

Keistai likimas švaisto žmogų. 1915 m. vasarą ariau riebias, juodas Illinojaus ūkininkų dirvas. Tuomet iš artojaus Vyčiai padarē mane savo gimstančio "Vyčio" redaktorium, ogi po kelių mēnesių gavau net universiteto studento titulą. Pirmas "Vyčio" numeris išėjo 1915 m. spalių 21 d. Kartu su stud. Al. Račkum ir p. L. šimučiu pradėjom jį leisti du kartu į mėnesį, 16 pusl. Prie jauno laikraščio dirbau iki 1916 m. Kalėdų. Paskiau įsitraukiau į kitus visuomeninius darbus ir tikrai niekuomet nemaniau, kad kur nors beredaguosiu jaunimo laikraštį, ypač kad metų ant kupros daug prisikrovė.

Bet štai po 30 metų trenkia man į duris ilgiausia telegrama, o paskiau ir laiškas: sako, turiu butinai apsiimti kurį laiką paredaguoti "Vytį." Pasijutau mobilizuojamas. Lietuvių tauta dar tebēra karo stovy. Nemoku išsiteisinti savo amžium ir netinkamumu tokioms jaunoms pareigoms. Man atsako, kad Vyčių esą nuo 16 iki 76 metų, nors Amerikos kariuomenėje mobilizacijos amžius neperšoko per 38 metus, ogi kitose kariuomenėse gal iki 45 m.

Seniau "Vytis" eidavo vien lietuvių kalba, dabar jis jau pusiau angliškas. Pasikeitė ne vien jaunimo kalba, bet ir galvojimas bei gyvenimo papročiai. Kiekviena gadynė turi savo vis kitonišką jaunimą. Kiek galėdamas bandysiu šių dienų jaunimą suprasti, bet nežinau ar dažnai pajegsiu kartu žingsniuoti, ar busių suprastas, ar bus įdomios mano temos.

Jaunatvēs svarbiausiu požymiu aš laikau kovingumą, gražią drąsą. Kol mes kovojome už kilnius laisvojo lietuvio idealus — tol mes dar esame jauni. Kai tik mes padedame poilsiui savo minties kardus ir nebegrįžtame kovos laukan —

tai prasideda musų senatvė, nors dar neseniai mums dantys išdygo. Šitokia prasme aš bandysiu savo plunksną vartoti.

Lietuvių tauta pasibaisētinu žiaurumu ir greitumu dabar yra naikinama, todēl visi lietuviai— jauni ar seni — turi virsti karštais kovotojais ne tik dēl laisvēs, bet ir dēl paprasčiausio biologinio išlikimo. Lietuvių tauta dabar yra mirties ženkle, ogi Lietuvos Vyčiai turime buti budrūs ir ištvermingi, neapleisti kovos lauko iki laimējimo valandos.

KOKS TURĒTŲ BŪTI "VYTIS"?

Spalių mēn. numery musų organizacijos veikėjas p. P. Kupraitis atsiliepė apie tris pamatines paskutinio Vyčių seimo rezoliucijas; viena tų rezoliucijų skatina pagerinti "Vyčio" turinį. Jis sako, kad nariai daugiausia skaito korespondencijų skyrių. Tai bendra tiesa kalbant netgi apie visus Amerikos lietuvių laikraščius. Eiliniai žmonės labai mėgsta apie save ką nors spaudoje pasiskaityti; ir ne vien apie save: taipgi apie savo pažįstamus ir žinomus miestus, kur jų draugai gyvena. Be to, "Vyčio" korespondencijos visos angliškai rašomos, tad lengviau suprantamos. Todėl "Vyty" korespondencijų skyrius buvo ir pasiliks gana platus.

Tačiau tik korespondencijomis proto neišlavinsi. Jos dažniausia be rimto turinio, ogi šviesesnieji žmonēs jų beveik ir neskaito, nes korespondencijos dažniausia šneka apie eilinius subivimus, kuriuose vieni valgo, kiti paduoda valgi; vieni šoka, kiti bubnus muša. Jų vardais mirga musų korespondencijos: visi išeina stambiais veikējais. To žinoma neužtenka protui maitinti. Tad p. Kupraitis siūlo dar padidinti: sporto, juokų ir karikatūrų skyrių. Sportinio gyvenimo raportų gausumas priklausys nuo pačių sporto

grupių: tegu jos prirašo apie savo veiklą. Karikatūros ir dainų gaidos daugiau kainuotų, tai šiuo metu dar neaišku ar "Vyčio" finansai išgalēs tai padaryti. Bet tai butų labai pravartu.

"Vyčio" straipsniai buvo ir pasiliks dviem kalbomis: lietuvių ir anglų. Daugumas jaunųjų dar truputį moka lietuviškai ir reikia neleisti tos kalbos užmiršti, reikia jos net žymiai daugiau pramokti. Jei Vyčiai nebepalaikytų lietuvybės, tai jie nustotų pačio svarbiausio ir pirmutinio savo tikslo. Organizacijai tektų užsidaryti.

šis amžius yra politinių ir kultūrinių kovų amžius. Bet lietuvių spauda tik retesniais atvējais dabar beturi šiais klausimais stiprių ir auklējančių straipsnių. Mes neturime teisės laikyti jaunimą politinėje ir kultūrinėje ignoracijoj. Mes kalbame apie jaunųjų amžių, kurio vairas turi tekti jaunimui. Bet jaunimas turi buti rimtai paruoštas politiniam ir kultūriniam gyvenimui. Sakysite, jaunimui tai persunku? Gal but ir nelengva... Bet argi nėra pas mus noro kuomet nors rimčiau galvoti ir subrendusiais tapti? Daug kas sako, kad ir galvojimas yra labai įdomus sportas.

NAUJAS SKYRIUS.

"Vyty" įvedamas draugiškumo ženklan lietuvių jaunimui, davusiam daugiausia aukų baltojo žmogaus civilizacijai ir laisvei apginti. Tasai lietuvių jaunimas niekuomet nesutiko vilkti vergijos jungą. Jis sukilo ir klanais kraujo mokējo už laisvēs idealus 1894-95, 1812, 1831, 1863, 1905, 1918-20, 1941, ir 1945-46 m. Aštuonis kartus per 150 metų Lietuvos jaunimas pakēlē ginklą prieš vergiją ir barbariją. Su tuo jaunimu Lietuvos Vyčiai Amerikoje per savo delegaciją Lietuvoje prieš šį karą yra pasirašę širdžių vienybės paktą. Bandykime jų skausmus ir vargus suprasti, o gelbėti bent tiems, kurie mums kaip nors pasiekiami, kurie atsidūrē saugesnėse Vakarų šalyse.

Svarstant bent kurias lietuvių tautos problemas, reikia pradēti nuo pačio skaudžiausio klausimo: kiek mus gyvų ir laisvų dar liko? Esame skerdžiami greičiau kaip kokie gyvuliai, tai koks gi dabar yra lietuvių kraujo balansas? Ką mums padarē mirties angelas per 6 metus?

"Pajamos":

Lietuvos respublika (be Vilnijos) 1937 m. gruodžio 31 d. turējo 2,549,668 gyventojus, ogi apvaliai — sakysime 2,550,000. Nuo 1934 m. Lietuvos vidutinis metinis preauglis truputį krito ir nusistovėjo apie 1% per metus, arba apie 25,500 gryno pelno. Nuo 1938 m. sausio 1 d. iki 1941 m. birželio vidurio (tuomet prasidėjo masinis Lietuvos gyventojų naikinimas) senesnių ribų Respublikai dar priaugo 88,000 gyv.

Vilnija. 1939 m. spalių mēn. Lietuvai buvo grąžinta trečdalis jai priklausomo Vilniaus krašto su 458,000 gyv. 1940 m. jau pavergtai Lietuvai Sovietai pridējo dar tris sklypelius: šventēnus, Dieveniškes ir Marcinkonis, viso apie 82,000 gyv. Skaitant prieauglį (Vilnijoj jis didesnis—apie 1.5% per metus)—Vilniaus krašto atgautas trečdalis 1941 m. birželio 15 d. turējo 560,000 gyventojų. Taigi Lietuva sovietinēse ribose (64,000 kv. km.) prieš masinio naikinimo pradžią turējo mažiausia 3,198,000 gyv., bet gal tikriau 3,210,000, nes Nepr. Lietuvos prieauglis galējo buti truputį didesnis kaip 1% per metus.

Sugudējusias Lietuvos zonas, kur lietuviškai kalba tik keletas parapijų (Gervēčiai, Lazdūnai ir k.), Sovietai priskyrē Gudijai. Tad Sovietinē

Lietuva neteko apie 800,000 gyventojų rytuose. Pietines Lietuvos dalis su Gardinu, Seinais ir Suvalkais rusai atidavē Sovietinei Lenkijai (arti 300,000 gyv.). Šio karo metu įėjo madon už nuostolius rytuose atlyginti priedais vakaruose, paimant ką nors nuo Vokietijos. Tokių pažadų darē Lietuvai quislingas Pakarklis ir Amerikos sovietinė spauda, lietuviškai leidžiama. Tilpo daug straipsnių, teisingai įrodančių, kad Mažoji Lietuva su Tilže, Įsručiu ir Karaliaučium buvo ir dar dalimi tebēra lietuviška ir tēvas Stalinas priskirsiąs ją prie Sov. Lietuvos. Bet musų raudonieji quislingai labai apsigavo: Stalinas priskyrē Karaliaučių Leningrado rusiškai apygardai ir jau baigia kolonizuoti M. Lietuvą rusais, gudais ir visokiais orientalais.

Lietuvos nuostoliai

Vienas surusējes quislingas neseniai buvo Lietuvoje ir matēsi su visa sovietine Lietuvos diduomene ir sugrįžęs Amerikon skelbia Sovietų apskaičiavimą, pagal kurį Lietuva turinti arti ar apie pustrečio milijono gyventojų. Statistikos ten nebuvo, ogi Sovietų apskaičiavimai iš akies paprastai vis patiekia gerokai išpūstus skaičius. Mat to reikalauja sovietinis optimizmas.

Na, tikėkim, kad dabar Lietuvoje yra net iki pustrečio mil. gyventojų. Bet pasvarstykim, kas tie per gyventojai. Lietuviškoje spaudoje pasirodą pranešimai, kad Lietuvoje esą apie 300,000 raudonosios armijos irgi labai netikslūs. Tiek armijos ten greičiausia nēra, nes sunku butų tiek sutalpinti, nors rusų politika ir strategija yra kuodaugiausia laikyti armijos vakarinēse kolonijose, arčiau galimo pavojaus. Galima but tikēti, kad rusai Lietuvoje dabar laiko apie 100,-000 raudonarmiečių. Eina kruvinos pogrindžio kovos. Lietuvos pogrindžio pranešimai skelbia, kad prieš juos kariauja tik NKVD daliniai ir jų ten esa apie 60,000. Šis skaitmuo labai panašus į tiesą, žinant, kad Lietuvos jaunimas dažnai ir labai daugely vietų susiremia su NKVD.

žinome taipgi, kad Lietuva sparčiai kolonizuojama civiliniais rusų valdininkais ir net ūkininkais. Vokiečiai buvo apnykę kolonizuoti daugiausia centrinės Lietuvos ruožą išilgai geležinkelį Virbalis - Kaunas - Kėdainiai-Šiauliai - Joniškis. Rusai turi kitonišką planą: jie matomai kolonizuoja Vilniaus apylinkes ir Lietuvos pajurį, tuo būdu apsupdami lietuvius iš rytų ir vakarų.

Geriausia jiems sekasi kilonizuotis miestuose. Nauji pabēgēliai pasakoja, kad Vilniuje daugiau girdima rusų kalba, o ne lietuvių. Prieš karą Vilnius turėjo 210,000 gyv. Apie 30% miesto karo išgriauta. Galima butų spēti, kad dabar Vilnius turi gal apie 150,000, o gal ir daugiau, nes pagal sovietines normas žmonės priverčiami tenkintis nuostabiai mažais butais, gyvena ubagiškai susikimšę. Rusų Vilniuje esą apie 80,000. Jei spējamas skaičius butų apytikris, tai Vil-

niaus gyventojai tautybēmis butų pasiskirstę maž daug taip:

Rusų 80,000; lietuvių 37,000; žydų 18,000; lenkų 15,000. Viso 150,000.

Kaune rusų esą apie 40,000 ir po mažiau kituose miestuose. Tuo būdu civilinių kolonistų rusų ir kitų orientalų galėtų buti tarp 140,000 ir 200,000. Tad armija, NKVD ir civiliai kolonistai Lietuvoje sudaro mažiausia apie 300,000 ir daugiausia gal iki 400,000. Šiuo atvėju 1946 m. gale tarp pustrečio milijono Lietuvos gyventojų savų piliečių bus ne daugiau kaip 2,200,000. Dabar lieka tragiškas klausimas: kur, kada ir kaip dingo ar žuvo visas milijonas Lietuvos žmonių?

Masinės deportacijos Sibiran prasidėjo birželio vidury, 1941 m. Per dvi sąvaites deportuota į rytus 65,000 Lietuvos piliečių; šį skaičių imu iš žydo E. Kulischer knygos, The Displacement of Population in Europe. Knyga labai kruopščiai paruošta ir išleista Tautų Sąjungos International Labor Office, Montreal, 1943 (žiur. pusl. 63). Lietuvių spaudos paduodami skaičiai (50,000 ar net mažiau) klaidina visuomenę, nes jie apima tiktai lietuvius arba tiktai krikščionis. Kulischer gavo davinių iš kitų Lietuvos tautų. Aš pats irgi klausinējau žymius žydų organizacijų autoritetus. Jie man pasakē, kad 1941 m. biržely Sovietai deportavo visą žydų vidurinę demokratinių pažiūrų klase — apie 4500 ar 5000 žmonių.

Pagal dabar skelbiamus davinius, per tris okupacijos metus vokiečiai nužudē arti 200,000 Lietuvos žydų ir apie 50,000 lietuvių. Kiek žuvo lenkų, tiksliai nežinome; Lenkijon jų deportuota apie 60,000. Daug lietuvių žuvo nuo nepakeliamų karo vargų, ogi gyventojų prieauglis labai sumažėjo: mirimai jau pralenkė gimimus. Pateisinama manyti, kad laike vokiečių okupacijos Lietuva nustojo tarp 300,000 ir 350,000 savo piliečių. Tuo budu per pirmas dvi okupacijas Lietuva neteko mažiausia 365,000, o gal iki 415,000 gyventojų.

NEVYKĘS PALYGINIMAS

Tikint pranešimams, kad dabartinē Sovietu Lietuva dar turi apie 2,200,000 gyv. (neskaitant 300,000 svetimšalių okupantų), reikia tikėti ir tai baisiai išvadai, kad Lietuva nustojo bent milijono senųjų savo piliečių. Dabartinė, t. y. trečioji, okupacija prašalino iš Lietuvos apie 600,-000 Lietuvos piliečių. Nustota beveik visų Klaipēdos krašto gyventojų, kurių ten prieš karą buvo apie 160,000. Į tolimas Rusijos vergų stovyklas pasiųsta mažiausia bent 150,000 naujų vergų. Daug dešimtų tukstančių rusai sugaudē Lenkijoj ir rytinėje Vokietijoje ir juos kaž kur išdangino. Dabar kas mēnesį į vergų stovyklas, sakoma, siunčiama apie 3000 ar 4000 lietuvių. Tai daroma pagal Maskvos nustatytą planą, kurs gal but panašus i Krymo totoriams naikin-

Keturi Svarbiausieji Rudens Įvykiai

1. Lietuviai pas Prezidentą Trumaną.

Amerikos Lietuvių Taryba — koalicinė Amerikos piliečių lietuvių atstovybė — sulipdyta iš katalikų, socialistų ir demokratinių tautininkų-sandariečių draugijų atstovų, Chicagos burmistro Kelly tarpininkavimu, gavo pas Prezidentą Trumaną audienciją spalių 29 d. Prezidentas pakartojo senesnį Amerikos nusistatymą nepripažinti Sovietų okupacijos ir aneksijos Baltijos respublikų: naujų ir labiau apčiuopiamų pažadų Prezidentas nedavė.

Turint galvoje, kad nuo tos pačios Tarybos pasimatymo su Prezidentu Rooseveltu 1940 m. jau praslinko šeši metai ir per tą visą laiką jokiai lietuvių delegacijai nepavyko pasimatyti su bet kurios didelės valstybės galva, 20 minučių pasikalbėjimas Prezidento su žymiausiais Amerikos lietuviais sudaro mums pačią didžiausią šešerių metų naujieną, kurią ALT plačios koalicijos laikraščiai visai teisingai atžymėjo didelė-

ti planą. Tai negalime savęs guosti, kad ateina bent kiek ramesni laikai. Juk jaunų vyrų Lietuvos kaimuose beveik nebēra, jei neskaityti didvyriškų partizanų miškuose. Universitetuose tik trečdalis vyrų studentų, ogi budavo daugiau dviejų trečdalių vyrų. Tai reiškia, kad bent pusē jaunų vyrų, kur nors dingo: tik dalis tapo partizanais, o daugumas pateko vergijon, iš kurios retas sveikas begrįžta.

Kai kas ir dabar dar sako ir rašo, kad Lietuva dabar ištiko *tik eilinē nelaimē*, kurių nebe vieną esame turėję savo istorijoj. Taip, 1708-11 m. maras ir karai išnaikino Lietuvoje apie trečdali jos gyventojų. Bet maras naikino be plano: jis nemokējo išrankioti pačių veikliausių ir kultūringiausių gyventojų. O ir Lietuvos nepriklausomybē tuomet dar nebuvo pražudyta. Smarkiausiame Lietuvos sukilime 1863 m. pagal paties Muravjovo Koriko pranešimą nukentėjo tik 9,361 žmogus, jų tarpe užmuštų vos 129. Tad dabartinę nelaimę negalima lyginti prie smarkaus karo, revoliucijos ar net maro. Rusija, kaip seniau arabai, pasišovē pasaulio civilizaciją ir kultūrą radikaliai pakeisti. Ji bandys vison Europon įvesti savo kalbą, savo ateistinę tikybą, savo skurdą ir visuotiną nudriskimą. Lietuva yra avangarde krikščionių civilizacijos. Tad ji ir gretimos tautos sumokējo baisiai daug savo gyvybių ir beveik visą savo turtą, kad apginti Vakarų Europos likučius, Britų Imperiją ir Amerika. Lietuvos laisvē ir jos begalinē auka nēra vien tautinē: ji turi tarptautinēs reikšmēs. Ir šita tragizma labai retai kas supranta.

mis raidēmis ir ant pirmojo puslapio. Esame dēkingi Ponui Prezidentui, kad nors prieš pat rinkimus su lietuviais kalbasi. Prez. Roosevelto ir Prez. Trumano pažadas nepripažinti Baltijos Valstybių okupacijos turi nemažos reikšmēs Lietuvai ir Amerikai: mat Amerika pasisako nenorinti susitepti rankų Stalino tarptautine žmogžudyste. Bet tokio pasyvaus nusistatymo juk neužtenka Baltijos tautų laisvei atgaivinti, okupaciją prašalinti. Tarp įdomesnių Prez. Trumano žodžių skaitome:

"I sincerely hope that the (Lithuanian) situation will right itself without disturbing world peace. If there is no peaceful solution, then there will be a fight, and you and I do not want that."

Jis sako, kad musų byla pati savaime išsispręs (will right itself). Šito tai jau nebeatsitiks. Geras patarnavimas laisvei ir demokratijai savaime iš nieko neišdygsta. Reikia planingų, aiškių ir greitų veiksmų. Juk per Lietuvą tebeskraido mirties angelas, ją reikia skubiai gelbēti. Mes gerai suprantame, kad tik aiškus ultimatumas Rusijai atitraukti savo ginkluotas jēgas iš Lietuvos ir kitų užkariautų kraštų tegalētų mažųjų tautų likučius išgelbēti — ir tuom pačių Europą nuo busimo, gal dar tolimo, karo apsaugoti. Jei tokio ultimatumo nēra, tai reikia skubiai gelbēti nors 80,000 lietuvių demokratijų zonoje nuo bado, šalčio, ogi ypač nuo cenzūros ir kitų vergijos apraiškų.

2. IRO arba International Refugee Organization.

Per geležinę uždangą vis dar bēga tukstančiai laisvēs ieškotojų. Bēga į Vakarus, bēga iš žiauriausios visų laikų, visų kraštų diktaturos. Bėga visos tautos, bet geriausią slaptų kelių tinklą yra sudarę žydai. Jie bēga nuo naujo hitlerio, kurs dabar Stalinu vadinasi. Laisvoje Europos pusēje įvairių tautų bēglių dabar esama gal apie milijoną žmonių. Tai europinės kultūros ir demokratijos žiedas. Jei nenorime 2000 metu kultūrą ir laisvēs bei teisētumo tradicijas Europoje palaidoti, tai turime visomis išgalēmis gelbēti viską praradusius tremtinius. Šiuo uždaviniu nelabai vykusiai ligšiol rūpinosi UNRRA, kuriai apie 70% lēšu skirdavo viena Amerika. Bet tu lēšų dalinima vykdē labai margas elementas: šale padorių humanistų buvo labai daug visokių spekuliantų, svetimo pinigo aikvotojų ir Sovietijos šnipų bei agentų. Buvęs direktorius Lehman ir dabartinis La Guardia neturi nieko bendra su krikščioniška Europos kultūra, tad ir nemanē jos likučių gelbēti. Bet UNRRA savo ofisus metų gale jau uždaro. Jos vieton dabar įsteigta IRO.

blokas bandē skirti 1947 m. biudžetui 258 mil. dolerių. Bet Sovietija naudoja kiekvieną progą sunaikinti kuodidesnį laisvųjų žmonių skaičių. Tad Sovietijos pastangomis IRO biudžetas tapo sumažintas iki 155 mil. dolerių. Tai labai maža. Reiktų bent 400 mil. dol. Juk IRO ruošia platų kolonizacijos planą ir jau vedamos derybos su P. Amerikos respublikomis dėl atatinkamų žemės plotų ir apie pervežimą bei finansavimą.

Butų nemažas pagerinimas, jei IRO vyriausiais direktoriais butų paskirti katalikai ir tikintieji protestantai arba liberališki humanistai, turi rasinio bendrumo su naikinamają Europos zona. Reiktų, kad visi kiti tarnautojai ir ekspertai butu skiriami iš pačių tremtinių: lenkų, latvių, lietuvių, estų, žydų, jugoslavų ir ukrainiečių. Svetimi globējai dažniausia neturi vargšo sielos ir eina darban su ponišku išdidumu, nesigēdi net hitleriškais metodais pasinaudoti, kaip tai matome iš elgesio su tremtiniais Hanau ir kitose tremtinių stovyklose, kurias tiktų geriau kalėjimais vadinti. Jeigu IRO bus valdoma besielių ciniku, kaip buvo UNRRA, tai demokratijos kankiniams teks dar daug ašarų pralieti ar net Sibiro vergu stovyklose atsidurti.

3. Paryžiaus Taikos Konferencija.

Versalio Taikos Konferencijoj 1919 m. mažosios kariavusios valstybės visgi turėjo balsą. Šių metų Taikos Konferencijoj Paryžiuje beveik viską pasisavino keturi didieji. Trys vidutiniai (Lenkija, Čeko-Slovakija ir Jugoslavija) karo metu neteko demokratijų paramos ir liko susovietinti, tiksliau tariant, virto Sovietų Rusijos kolonijomis. Tad Taikos Konferencijoj už tuos tris vidutinius jau kalba Maskvos numatyti ir instruktuoti kolonijų administratoriai. Kai tik jie praveria burnas, tai ir pajunti tikrą rusiškų interesų balsą.

Taikos Konferencijos svarbiausias dirigentas sēdi Kremliuje. Ponas Byrnes mano, kad jis gina ir net apgina teisingos taikos principus, bet jis juokingas optimistas. Taika daroma dabar su penkiomis nugalētomis valstybēmis. Bet pp. Byrnes ir Bidault apsiima ginti tik vieną Tiesto miestą nuo Maskvos užmačių ir nori paversti šį itališką kampelį laisvu miestu ir uostu. Pažiurēkime kaip atrodo kiti teritoriniai klausimai.

1. Suomija neskolinga Rusijai nei mažiausio žemēs sklypelio. Atbulai, Rusija skolinga Suomijai Rytų Kareliją. Du kartu užpulta nekaltai, ši demokratinē tauta dar apiplēšiama: iš jos rusai pasiima antrą pagal didumą jos miestą Viipuri su svarbiu Saimos kanalu ir geresniais Suomijos grudų laukais, rusai atplēšia jai Petsamo uostą ir vieninteles nickelio kasyklas. Visas pasaulis turi teisēs pasmerkti Suomijai daromas skriaudas. Ir už ką? Gal už tai, kad Suomija labai švari, darbšti, teisinga tauta?

- 2. Vengrija pagal teisybės dėsnius turėtų gauti pusę Transilvanijos iš Rumunijos ir mažą sklypą su Suboticos miestu iš Jugoslavijos. Ji tų žemių negauna, nors abiejose zonose gyvena apie 2 mil. vengrų. Tai vis mat Atlanto Čarteris...
- 3. Rumunai praranda derlingą Bessarabiją su 4 mil. gyv., kur rusų yra tik 10% sektantų, pabēgusių iš Rusijos nuo religinio persekiojimo dar carienes Katres laikais. Rumunijoj jie turejo religinę laisvę ir nuosavius ūkius. Dabar jie to visko nustos. Bet ir tai gal Atlanto Carterio didesnei garbei? Gavusi Bessarabiją, Rusija uždarys tarptautinį, visiems laisvą laivų judējimą Dunojaus upe. Rusija dabar galēs kontroliuoti priejimą prie Juodųjų marių net septynių valstybių zonoje kur gyvena apie 80 mil. žmonių. Šitas anglo-amerikiečių žlibumas ateity jiems kainuos marias kraujo ir daug bilijonų dolerių. Jaunuosius prašau tai atsiminti. Gal but jiems dar teks dēl šitų pasibaisētinai kvailų klaidų kariauti ir vietoje kojų ir rankų, gauti medalius už narsuma.

Lietuvos klausimas gal but bus paliestas taikos sutarty su Vokietija. Bet jis gali buti ir tylomis apeitas, prisimenant kitą rekordinę kvailybę: Karaliaučiaus ir Mažosios Lietuvos pavedimą Rusijai. Tokios dovanos ir carai nesitikėjo. Iš šio karo Rusija išeina su turtingiausiomis naujomis kolonijomis Europoje ir Azijoj. Rusijos gyventojų skaičius nuo Triesto-Luebecko linijos iki Pekino priemiesčių Kinijoj dabar siekia apie 440 mil.

4. Demokratų Prakišimas U.S.A. rinkimuose

Irgi turi kiek ryšio su pataikavimu Rusijai. Iš Sovietų pavergtos Centro Europos zonos Amerikoje yra kilusių apie 15 mil. žmonių. Juos pasiekia vergų šauksmai, nežiurint visos cenzuros tinklo, kuriuomi dabar apipinta visa Centralinė Europa nuo Potsdamo iki Adrijos, nuo Dniepro iki Reino. Wallace kalbos ir Prez. Trumano neryžtingumas gelbėti žustančią Europos civilizaciją pakreipė balsus Respublikonų partijos naudai, nors dabar dar labai peranksti pasakyti, ar šita truputį labiau buržuazinė partija tikrai ką darys laisvei pasauly gelbėti.

Respublikonai irgi neturi aiškios programos ir dinamiškos valios. Norais, kad ir labai gerais, Europos neišgelbēsi. Seniau tarp Demokratų dar budavo žmonių, kurie pakalbēdavo už Centrinės Europos Federacija, kuri apimtų kraštus nuo Estijos iki Graikijos ir turētų 120 mil. gyv. Tai butų visai konstruktyvus planas. Kol šale Rusijos ir nepertoli nuo Maskvos nebus suorganizuota stipri ir laisva valstybē, tol tarp Amerikos-Anglijos ir Rusijos bus tęsiamas nervų karas visu smarkumu. Tai neužmirština goopolitinė taisyklē kaip Demokratams, taip ir Republikonams. Ir išmintingi žmonės turi pasidaryti iš jos sau išvadas: su kuo eiti — su demokratine C. Europa, ar su totalitarine ir militaristine Rusija. O Centro Europos ašis eina pagal liniją Vilnius-Varšuva-Viena. Tai gyvybinē jos arterija.

HENRY WALLACE AGAINST ROOSEVELT

To Henry Wallace, Senator Pepper and others who are disposed to criticize the American foreign policy as interpreted by Secretary Byrnes, it is pertinent to quote the report of President Roosevelt on his return from the Yalta Conference with Tovarishch Stalin and Premier Churchill.

Obviously, Mr. Wallace, Senator Pepper and their fellow travelers have forgotten what President Roosevelt said, because they are running counter to his express declaration. The report to Congress was an official declaration by President Roosevelt. He said:

"The three most powerful nations (Russia, USA, Britain) have agreed that the political and economic problems of any area liberated from Nazi conquest, or any former Axis satellite, are a joint responsibility of all three governments... They will endeavor to see—to see to it

that interim government between pation by Germany and true independence that such an interim government will be as representative as possible of all democratic elements in the population, and that free elections are held as soon as possible thereafter... Responsibility for political conditions thousands of miles away can no longer be avoided, I think, this great nation... The world is smaller-smaller every year. The United States now exerts a tremendous influence in the cause of peace... We will continue to exert that influence only if we are willing to continue to share in the responsibility for keeping the peace. It would be our own tragic loss if we were to shirk that responsibility."

This makes it clear that the agreement for free elections in such countries as the Baltic States, Poland, Romania and Bulgaria was un-

"Dear students, I repeat, men of the stamp of Kravchenko, Barmine, and Valtin are enemies of civilization. They are escaped criminals, who, because of their heinous crimes, are contriving to render themselves less culpable and their homelands more so by printing vindictive personal accounts of 'maltreatment' and 'injustice' allegedly therein seen and experienced; moreover, they attack the political system of Soviet Russia, charging that it is totalitarian and that it is bent upon excluding and finally absorbing the political systems of the world.

"Kravchenko's book I Chose Freedon is a rare example of fiction. Not content with simple fabrication, it goes so far as to list in approximation the number of 'slaves' in Soviet 'concentration camps.' (Twenty million is the number given! this would lead us to believe that today there are seven times as many helots in Soviet Russia as there were in colonial times in the United States.) Notwithstanding this fabulous invention, Kravchenko writes detailed descriptions of life in the 'concentration camps,' life, he points out, so restricted and wretched that the average prisoner's life expectancy is five years. (In the hundreds of years of world history we find little or no evidence of such slave conditions; not even in the day of the notorious Roman, Caligula, the least merciful of tyrants, is there any mal treatment of captives, even criminals, to compare with Kravchenko's grand slave plan of contemporary Soviet Russia.)

"At the same time Kravchenko strives to cause unrest and misunderstanding between Soviet Russia and the United States by bluntly stating

reservedly made by the Big Three. The action of Russia in occupying these Baltic and Balkan states by her armed forces and secret political police at the time of their elections is an unmistakable violation of the Yalta agreement. The United States would be on firm ground and on the side of justice in demanding the complete evacuation of the Baltic States, of Poland and of other occupied small nations. The elections should not be influenced by intimidation or force as they were in Lithuania last winter and in Bulgaria in October. Mr. Wallace, Senator Pepper and their followers are opposing that policy and undertaking to persuade the American people to permit Russia to violate its agreement at Yalta without a protest from America. These are the plain facts which it is well for all Americans to remember.

that it has no desire of cooperating with the United States because it considers capitalism its greatest enemy; because Soviet Russia wants to expand in Asia and Europe; because Soviet Russia will retain its recent 'conquests.' (It must be remembered, dear students, that Soviet Russia has nowhere conquered any peoples. It has incorporated several small border nations, true, but only because their populations wanted it so. Again, how can Soviet Russia hate capitalism, when capitalism has contributed so much to its victory over the Nazis, when Soviet diplomats travel wide distances to confer with United States' officials over matters of peace treaties? As for Russian-American cooperation, Molotov, Gromyko, and their representatives have honestly tried to come to an understanding with the United States. They have failed only because certain powerful political factions in the United States make it their business to breed suspicion and distrust of Soviet aims, peaceful and fair as they are.) Kravchenko looks upon the Stalin-Hitler agreement of 1939 as Stalin's guarantee against Nazi intervention in his 'grab' of the Baltic States and Poland. Kravchenko also states that Soviet Russia was unprepared for Hitler's subsequent invasion because it trusted Hitler's word. (Students! this sort of deception is for blind fools, not for intelligent civilization. A child is able to understand the Stalin-Hitler pact of 1939. Stalin, realizing that Hitler was determined to risk winning the world, cleverly arranged a non-aggression treaty with him, thereby giving himself enough time in which to prepare against Hitler's inevitable attack. Such was Stalin's forsight that he caused thousands of his troops to occupy those nations which were in direct line with Hitler's probable campaign routes. Stalin tried to save those nations from Nazi inroads and Nazi yoke.)

"Barmine, another exile and propagandist, is second only to Kravchenko in his personal account of Soviet 'inhumanity' and Soviet 'reprisal schemes', maintaining that that nation is guilty of the murder of countless of its own politicians, public servants, and peasants. (Barmine's book *One Who Survived* is a livid lie. Soviet Russia did convict and punish many subversive, traitorous persons in its population, yes. Is this murder? Since when, my students, is public law administered by public officers criminal?)

"Valtin, the third runaway and propagandist, in his book Out of the Night is critical of a certain 'Comintern' organization supposedly thriving in every nation in the world and dedicated

LITHUANIA (LIETUVA)

Capital, Vilnius. Area, 33,977 square miles.
Population (1941) 4,180,000.

Lithuania is a nation whose history dates from the tenth century. A great power from the fourteenth to the fifteenth centuries, it confederated with Poland in 1569 and was conquered by Russia in 1795. Lithuania revolted against Russian rule in 1812, 1831, 1863, 1905, and waged a two year war of Independence (1918-1920).

Overrun by the German armies in the World War (1915), Lithuania declared her independence at Vilnius on February 16, 1918, and was recognized de jure by Germany on November 11, 1918 (Armistice Day); by Russia on July 12, 1920; by the U. S. A. on July 28, 1922; and by

to Soviet-dictated revolutionary movements. Valtin writes that the 'Comintern' is a vicious spy ring, a Soviet device for disrupting foreign governments! (Students, Valtin's fastastic assertions are delusions of the mind. The Soviet government is represented in many nations, as is the United States government, but certainly it has no spy rings in those nations; nor does it conduct anti-patriotic riots or any other similar revolutionary maneuvers in them.)

"In conclusion, dear students, remember that world peace is gained through cooperation and understanding. Russia wants peace as much as the United States does. The first thing to do, then, is to give Russia confidence and security. We must circumvent the evil teachings of such propagandists as Kravchenko. We must let Russia know that the intentions of the United States are honorable. The United States must disarm, and it must recall its troops from foreign soils. Russia is disarming and its troops are quartered where they belong, on Russian property. Stalin, sometimes called the Beloved Leader by his people, is only too anxious to negotiate with the United States; his motives are peace, prosperity, and the pursuit of happiness.

Mankind must forget the horrors of the recent war and progress toward a new life, a life of constructive undertakings guided by the principles of Christianity. Without Stalin to help the world all is lost!"

France, Great Britain, Italy, and Japan on December 20, 1922.

By the Treaty of Paris (1924) the northern part of Lithuania Minor was detached from Germany and returned to Lithuania; it aggregated 1,100 squares miles with a population of 140,000 — for the most part Lithuanian. It included the city of Klaipēda (Memel), the only port of Lithuania. The territory ceded by Russia, under the Treaty of Moscow (July 12, 1920), amounted to 32,877 square miles. One third of this area including the old Lithuanian capital of Vilnius was seized by Poland in October, 1920, when the Polish army violated the agreement of Suvalkai — signed on October 7, 1920. But Lithuania never recognized this seizure of its capital, and, in protest, kept its demarcation line with Poland closed for 18 years.

Germany seized the district of Klaipeda on March 22, 1939, and the Russian army invaded the rest of Lithuania on June 15, 1940. Russo-German arrangements of 1940 divided ethnographic Lithuania in the following manner: Germany received the Klaipēda and Suvalkai districts (2,000 square miles and 300,000 inhabitants); the eastern zone with the cities of Gardinas, Lyda, Ašmena and Brēslauja, total area 8,000 square miles (pop. 800,000), was annexed by Soviet Byelorussia; and the rest of the territory with the capital of Vilnius (area 23,216 square miles, population 2,980,000) was annexed by the Soviets as an "autonomous" Lithuanian Republic, under the dictatorship of the Communist Party, which, on the first of January, 1941, had 2,504 members in Lithuania, the majority of whom were non-Lithuanians.

The present Soviet Lithuania, a temporary colony of Russia, has an area of 24,300 square miles. Its population before Russia's recent extermination policy of June 14, 1941, was about 3,210,000. In the summer of 1946 its population was only about 2,200,000, not counting 300,000 recent Oriental colonists, soldiers and the NK-VD police.

Lithuania as compared to the U.S.A.

Lithuania is nearly as large as the state of Indiana in area 36,000 square miles.

The population of Lithuania is equal to that of New Jersey, which has 4,160,000 inhabitants. The density of population is almost equal to that Indiana, with has an area of 36,000 square miles.

The beauty of landscape and the quality of Lithuanian soil resemble greatly those of Wisconsin.

Climatically Lithuania reminds us of the northern half of Maine.

The economic facts.

About 70% of the population of Lithuania (1941) was engaged in agriculture. The arable

land occupies about 45% of the territory, forests 20%, meadows 13%, and pastures 9%. The chief crops are rye, oats, barley, wheat, potatoes, flax, and sugar beets. The forests contain pine (35%), spruce (34%), birch (12%), oak, elm, and other trees. Woodworking industries

elm, and other trees. Woodworking industries are of considerable importance and are located mostly near the Lower Nemunas river, between Kaunas and Klaipēda.

The greater cities are: Vilnius, 210,000; Kaunas, 150,000; Klaipēda, 50,000; Gardinas, 50,000; Šiauliai, 35,000.

During the last three years of independence; Lithuania imported mainly from Great Britain, Germany, Russia, Belgium, Holland, and U.S.A., in that order; its exports were directed mostly to Great Britain, Germany, Russia, France, Holland, Belgium, and U.S.A.

Most of the Lithuanian foreign commerce was effected by 1,300 cooperative societies, centralised in several unions exercising powerful influence upon the economic progress of the country. The main items of export were: meat, butter, and eggs (40%); living animals (12%); lumber and cellulose (20%); flax (12%); seeds (5%); and industrial products (4%).

Religion and culture.

About 80% of the Lithuanian population is Roman Catholic, 9% Protestant, 7% Jewish, and 2% Orthodox. (These percentages were compiled without the inclusion of the Vilnius region).

There are two religious groups which are very exotic for such a northern country as Lithuania, which is in the latitude of southern Alaska; these 3000 Moslems and 1000 Caraites are of Tartar origin, taken as prisoners of war by the Lithuanian armies in the 14th and 15th centuries, near the Black Sea.

All the religions of Lithuania were not only free to teach their doctrines, but they were equally supported by the State with very modest subsidies, amounting to about 15 cents (U.S.A. currency) per person a year.

Various religions were taught in private and government schools.

There were universities at Vilnius and Kaunas, together with six other institutes of high learning, and over 60 colleges, nearly all of them coeducational.

By its history, democracy, religion, philosophy, art, and traditional sympathies, Lithuania belongs to the Western and Christian culture and, therefore, should be considered a part of Western Europe.

In 1939 there were about 80 independent nations in the world. About twenty of these could be include in the zone of the highest modern

culture. Lithuania was in the list of the twenty most progressive nations. This great achievement was symbolized by its high standard of learning, by its opera, dramatic theatre and ballet, by its literary and artistic creative work, by its famous cooperatives, and by good sanitary conditions and progressive social laws for workers.

There were 7,000 societies in Lithuania (now closed by the Soviet conqueror) representing all human ideas, ideals, and interests.

Political information.

Lithuanians, their political parties, and the democratic governments of the world do not recognize the Soviet occupation of Lithuania; therefore, Lithuania still maintains fully recognized legations in Washington, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, London, and the Vatican. Lithuanian consular service is working effectively in the United States, Canada, South America, South Africa, and Great Britain.

650,000 Lithuanians in the United States and 80,000 in South America, with their 30 newspapers and relief funds, are strongly supporting the Lithuanian movement for the restoration of the independence of Lithuania.

The restoration of Lithuanian independence was promised by President Roosevelt (Oct. 15, 1940) and by President Harry Truman (Oct. 29, 1946).

United Nations. The Lithuanian patriotic underground detracted about 250,000 German soldiers from other fronts and prevented the mobilization of Lithuanian manpower for the German war machine. Lithuanian losses in that historical struggle against the two greatest totalitarian dictatorships are tremendous — exceeding one million killed, deported for extermination to Russian and German slave camps, and missing.

Over 60,000 young Lithuanians born in the U. S. A. and a considerable number of Lithuanian citizens served in the armed forces of the United States, the British Empire, and France during the Second World War.

LEFT END

Marshall Shurnas (Missouri U.) A great defensive wingman, Sharnas rarely is blocked out of a play. On offensive, he is an exceptionally fine blocker. Big and smart, this 205 pound end has been called one of the finest defensive wingmen in the Big Six Conference and also in the Midwest. Started his football career at Central High School, in St. Louis, where he earned three varsity letters in the sport. Matriculating at the University of Missouri he won his letters in 1941 and '42. At the University, he is enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences, majoring in geology. He is a member of the Junior Class and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. Poor eyesight makes it necessary for Shurnas to wear contact lenses during practices and games. His mates call him "Iggie". He spent 36 months in the Army, 22 of them overseas. His European Theater ribbon shows six campaigns.

LEFT TACKLE

George Savitsky (Pennsylvania). A prodigious six foot three inch 264 pounder, wearing a size 14½ shoe, Savitsky has been described to me as the greatest tackle ever to wear the Red and Blue of Pennsylvania. Good natured and easy going off the field, he plays such a smashing game that on one occasion his opponents complained he was "simply too rough." Amazingly light on his feet, Savitsky is so quick and so resourceful that his tremendous bulk is almost invariably in the right place in any play. In 1944 the ex-marine hero became the first freshman to captain a Penn varsity football team. The following year he became Penn's first All-American tackle since 1927 when Ed Hake and John Smith were selected. For two successive seasons he was selected to play on the East team in the annual East-West game. Won a track later at shot-put last year. Hopes to be a coach when he graduates.

LEFT GUARD

George Pavalko (Villanova). A stocky, exmarine, packing 180 pounds on a five foot eight inch frame, George is a devastating down-field blocker in addition to being a rock on defense. New England fans had a chance to see him operate in games against Holy Cross and Boston College. Probably no man in the East gets down under punts so fast and so consistently. In the Holy Cross game he was superb, and was selected by the Associated Press Weekly Lineman as the player of the week for his performance against the Crusaders. Served 32 months with the Marines. Twenty-seven of them were spent overseas. He holds the Good Conduct Medal, a Presidential Citation, and his Pacific Theater ribbon shows that he participated in six campaigns. Holds two Purple Hearts.

Captain Mac Wenskunas (Illinois U.). This defensive play-wrecker is acclaimed by his coach as a one-man hurricane and a good reason why Illinois' 1946 eleven was rated as the top team in the Big Nine. A teeth-rattling tackler, he is so fast that he is often able to join the interference in front of his own ball carrier, and there isn't a better blocker in the nation. Started his football career as a blocking back at Georgetown High School, in Chicago. Coach Ray Elliot shifted him to center for the 1942 campaign, and he has been starring there ever since. When war broke out, Wenskunas enlisted in the Marines and was sent to Notre Dame; however he didn't compete in football at the So. Bend institution. Mac won his commission as a 2nd Lieutenant at Quantico, Va., but was discharged a short time later and returned to the Illinois campus in 1945. Named the Illinois most valuable player last year and captain of the 1946 eleven. "Old 23", as his mates call him, is one of the squad's married men. He has a daughter two and a half months old. He is named honorary captain of the K. of L. 1946 All-Lithuanian American Football Team.

RIGHT GUARD

Fritz Brazilauskas (Yale). The quickest and keenest pullout man in New England football circles and quite possibly the fastest as well. When he leads the swinging interference on those Yale sweeps, the defensive wingback is invariably blasted out of the play. Fritz was so fast that he often was able to stay ahead of Levi Jackson on break-away runs in the open field, and Jackson was as fast as lightning. Fritz was also a power on defense. He played freshman football at Holy Cross in 1940 and on the varsity there in '41. Then followed 32 months of military service as a 2nd Lieutenant with the Army Air Forces in the European Theater. Saw combat duty as a gunner for eight months. Was shot down over Germany and spent eight months as a prisoner of war. He is another of the squad's married men.

RIGHT TACKLE

John Kissell (Boston College). Although this 247 pound giant was hampered by injuries most of the season, he was still largely responsible for the Eagles' successful running attack, when in action. Against the powerful Wake Forest team and three other major opponents, Kissell played terrific football. After playing freshman and

varsity football at the Heights in 1941 and '42, he saw 38 months of service with the Fourth Army. Served in England and France. While there, he played three games with the Fourth Army eleven. Is the third member of the family to wear the Maroon and Gold. Two older brothers, Jim and Adolph, preceded him to B. C. A youngest brother, Veto, is starring for Holy Cross.

RIGHT END

Al Jancauskas (Marquette). This right flanker of Marquette's "Golden Avalanche" is the youngest player representing this year's K. of L. All-Lithuanian eleven. A varsity veteran at 17, he earned a letter at guard as a freshman, last year, when he was only 16. Jancauskas was an instinctive player with uncanny ability to capitalize on opponents' mistakes. Blessed with large hands, this 194 pounder was an adept pass receiver. On defense he was rugged and durable. Began his football career at St. Ignatius High, in Chicago, where he won letters for three years and earned All-State honors for two. Was named co-captain in the Marquette-Arizona game this past season.

BALANCED BACKFIELD.

QUARTERBACK

Bennie Rieges (UCLA). The field general is big Bennie Rieges, UCLA's great all-round athlete. His coach labels him the the finest punter he has seen in some time. The fact that he is understudy to Ernie Case, one of the best quarterbacks in the country, does not reduce his effectiveness. He is a heady ball player who is improving all the time. Many teams could use him as a first-stringer. He does all the punting for UCLA. Attempted 20 passes, had two intercepted and completed 11 for a total yardage of 103. Carried the ball 12 times for a net total of 32 yards. Played freshman football at Georgetown in 1940 and on the varsity there the following year. Served 38 months with the Army Air Forces as a 1st lieutenant. While at Georgetown, he earned letters in football, baseball, and basketball. Married, he is a sophomore and is majoring in mechanical engineering.

LEFT HALFBACK

Ventan Yablonski (Columbia). Against both Navy and Yale when the chips were down and Columbia was behind, he came through with field goals from his educated toe, bringing victory to the Lions. He sparked Columbia's fourth period attack against Army with a brilliant 38 yard jaunt, setting up his team's first scope. Chunky, powerful and fast, he is a clever, tricky broken field runner. Played as a freshman at Fordham in 1942 and spent 32 months as a corporal with the Third Air Force. Played football for the Third Air Force team and also played

Spent 36 months in the Army and saw plenty of action in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany. Has seven sisters and two brothers. Will graduate this Spring.

FULLBACK

Veto Kissell (Holy Cross). Another gridiron giant, Veto, many experts insist, will blossom into one of the greatest fullbacks in New England history before he sheds his grid togs. He weighs 210 ponds and generates terrific drive and surprising speed for such a big fellow. Was a regular fullback on last year's team until he entered the Navy, where he served as a seaman first class. Was abroad the "Monterey", an aircraft carrier, and the "Pocomoke". Spent eight months in the service, returning to the Cross in September. Is a member of the famous Nashua, New Hampshire, athletic family and the first of the boys to matriculate at Holy Cross.

Po pusryčių, parapijos salėje, prasidėjo trečioji sesija 10:10 val. rytą. Sesiją atidarė pirm. JUOZAS BULEVIČIUS. Maldą atkalbējo kun. Stasys Raila.

Inž. ANTANAS MAŽEIKA, Ritualo Komisijos pirmininkas, pateikē sekantį raportą:

L. Vyčiu 32-ro seimo, Cicero, Ill., nutarimu, patekau į Ritualo Komisiją, kaipo jauniausias jos narys. J. L. JUOZAIČIO ir adv. A. J. YOUNG pasiūlimu, man teko tai komisijai vadovauti, kaipo pirmininkui, gi A. J. Young buvo iždininkas ir J. L. Juozaitis sekretorius.

Kadangi man tenka gyventi Pittsburghe, kur randasi tik viena vyčių kuopa, asmeniai neturējau tiek progos daryti žygius įgyvendinti laipsnius kuopose, kaip kad buvo galima kitiems šios komisijos nariams. Mano veikla daugiausia susidējo susirašinējime su ritualo komisijos ir abelnai organizacijos nariais. Sios komisijos veikla laiškais, reikia pasakyti, buvo nepaprastai sunki ir buvo nuveikta tik dalelė viso to, ko komisijos nariai troško ir būtų buvę galima atlikti, jei būtų buvus galimybė turėti bendrus posėdžius ir tas pastangas ten panaudoti.

Smulkiai, visa kas komisijos atlikta, bus galima išgirsti iš mūsų darbštaus sekretoriaus raporto. Cia tik noriu nekuriuos įžymesnius atliktus reikalus pastebēti, butent:

a) Didelē pažanga padaryta 4-to laipsnio įteikime. Vyčio JUOZAIČIO pastangomis, komisija užgyrė Chicagos apskrityje 29-nius ir įteikė 25-ius šv. Kazimiero ordenus. Naujosios Anglijos apskrityje jau užgirta ir šio seimo metu bus įteikta 4-tas laipsnis 13-ai narių.
