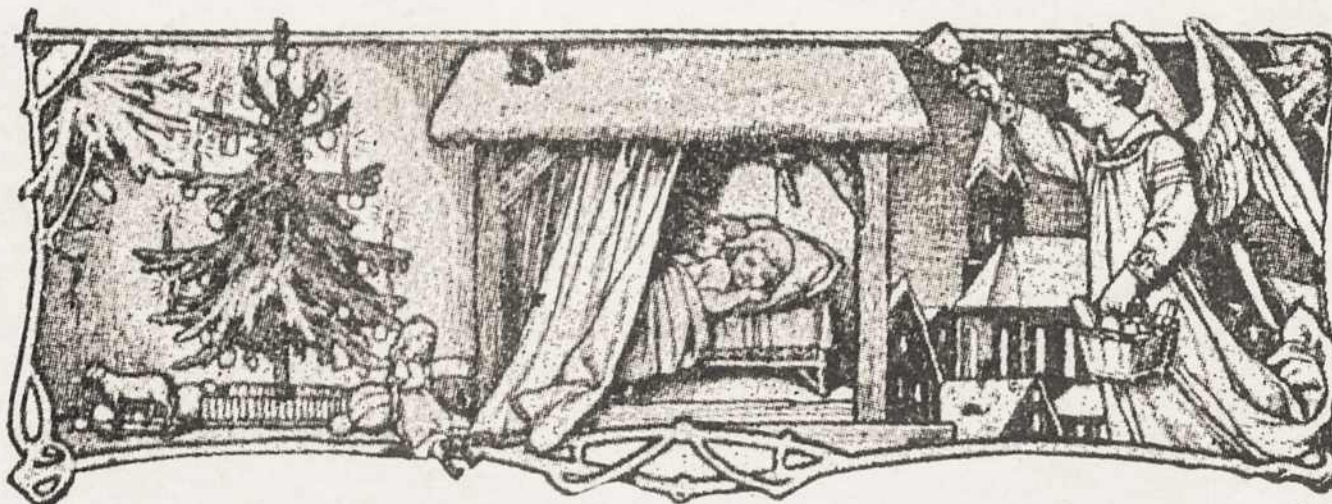

Geroji Naujiena

Jau antras tūkstantis metų baigiasi, kaip pasaulis išgirdo Gerą Naujieną. Gerosios Naujienos vardu yra vadinama Evangelija, kurią Kristus skelbė žmonijai.

Geroji Naujiena anų laikų žmonijai buvo gaivinanti rasa po ilgus sausras. Ilgai laukta tos Geros Naujienos. Daug pranašų kalbėjo apie jos artėjimą. Dėl to ir buvo daug džiaugsmo jos sulaukus.

Gerosios Naujienos atėjimą į šį pasaulį pasitiko dangaus angelų giesmės garsai, kurie ligi šių dienų skamba neišsakomai gražiais ir giliai prasmingais žodžiais: Garbė Dievui aukštybėse, ramybė geros valios žmonėms žemėje.

Kristaus gimimo laikais priespaudos buvo daug. Greta laisvų ir turtingų pasaulio galin-gesniųjų, žymi žmonijos dalis kentė vergiją. Vergas nebuvo laikomas žmogumi. Jis buvo perkamas ir parduodamas. Jis buvo alkinamas ir mušamas. Laisvė ir šeimos džiaugsmas buvo ne jam. Jo dienos — prakaito ir sunkaus darbo dienos.

Kristaus Geroji Naujiena paskelbė, kad nėra vergo, nėra romėno nė žydo. Yra tik žmogus, kuriam Dievas suteikė nemirtingą sielą ir pažadėjo jam tėvainystę prie savo sosto. Jis kvietė ateiti prie Jo visus, kurie kenčia ir velka sunkią priespaudos našta. Jis pažadėjo atpildą savo Tėvo Karalystėje ir už tai tereikalavo labai mažo dalyko: mylėti artimą ir Dievą, pasaulio Kūrėją.

Pranašų skelbiamą Kristaus atėjimą žydų tauta suprato kaip jų karaliaus atėjimą. Karaliaus, kuris išvaduos juos iš romėnų valdžios, kuris atneš jiems gerovę, ir vėl mana snigs iš dangaus.

Tačiau Kristus juos apvylė. Jis atsisakė būti jų karalium, nes jo karalystė ne iš šio pasaulio. Ji skirta visiems, ne tik žydams. Jis atėjo ne karaliauti, bet atpirkti žmoniją. Jis atėjo pasakyti, kad Dievo akyse visi žmonės yra lygūs. Neužmiršo priminti, kad Dangaus Karalystė nėra suteikiama už pinigus, nė už šio pasaulio valdžią bei puošnų rūbą. Ji duodama tik už artimo meilę ir gerus darbus. Ji atvira vargšui, lygiai kaip ir turtuoliui.

Geroji Naujiena patraukė minias, bet supykino galingesniuosius.

“Jis kalba apie žmonių lygybę. Jis sakosi esąs Dievo Sūnumi. Jis nenori būti mūsų karalium ir išvyti ir Jeruzales romėnus. Jis piktžodžiauja — šaukė žydų vadai. “Nukryžiuoti jį!”

Ir Gerosios Naujienos nešėjas mirė ant kryžiaus.

Bet Geroji Naujiena plito. Ji sklido po visą

pasaulį. Pasiekė bemaž visus žemės rutulio kampelius. Nesulaikė jos nei vėjai nei vandenys. Nesustabdė kalnai.

Žmonija nuo jos pradėjo skaičiuoti savo metus. Žemė nusišagstė bokštais, po kurių skliautais garbina Gerosios Naujienos nešėją.

Gerosios Naujienos gimimo šventė per amžius minima. Ji tikra šeimos šventė, savo jaukia šiluma apgaubianti visus, didelius ir mažus. Ji džiaugsmo ir palaimos kupina. Ji skelbia ramybę. Ji neša taiką.

Jos išvakarėse mes žiebiame žvakutes, puošiame eglutes. Tai amžinosios šviesos išreiškimas. Tai geros valios ir kilnios širdies spindėjimas. Atlaidus spindėjimas ir į širdis tų, kuriose įsibriovė neapykanta ir užgeso meilės šviesa.

Geroji Naujiena neša džiaugsmą. Ji niekam negrasina. Ji nesikėsina atimti niekeno valdžios.

O vis tik ji persekiojama. Šiandien komunizmo vardu stengiasi ją išnaikinti, nušluoti nuo žemės paviršiaus.

Geroji Naujiena raunama lauk iš kūdikio širdies. Jo nekaltos lūpos yra mokomos vergiją vadinti laisve. Jo širdelėn vieton meilės skiepinama neapykanta visiems tiems, kurie negarbina komunizmo vadų.

Naujas šėtonas atsirado. Jis gundo žmogų: Pagarbink mane, ir viskas bus tavo. Bet naujasis šėtonas daug piktesnis už senąjį. Senasis pasitraukė nuo gundomojo, kai pamatė, kad šis nepasiduoda. Naujasis šėtonas nesitraukia. Jei jam nepasiduoda, jis savo auką sunaikina.

Siaubas žengia per visą žemę. Jis griaua bokštus. Purvinomis kojomis jis mindžioja gražiausius žmonių kūrinus. Jis šaiposi iš mūsų meilės. Jis tyčiojasi iš gerų mūsų darbų. Vieton taikos žvakelės, jis kuria neapykantos gaisrus.

Naujoji vergija, daug baisesnė už senąją, plinta. Jos baisūs naikinantieji sparnai apgaubė didžią žemės rutulio dalį. Jie skečiais vis toliau ir marių gaubia kraštus. Po jais vaitoja ir mūsų tėvų žemė.

Ji kenčia vien dėl to, kad jos vaikai trokšta meilės ir laisvės, kurią paskelbė Geroji Naujiena.

Žiebdami jaukiuose savo namuose šių metų Kalėdų žvakelę, prisiminkim tuos prispaustusius ir kankinamus. Savo džiaugsmingose širdyse kaupkime pasiryžimą atsispirti šėtono viešulams. Stokime į kovą prieš jo siautėjimus.

Ramybė geros valios žmonėms žemėje — šiandien reiškia kovą. Kovą už Dievą, kovą už taiką, kovą už laisvę, kovą už žmogų ir kovą už artimo meilę.

"Wow, I've never done that before," said Joe more to himself than to Dolly who was to be his secretary for the project. Mary Lelis, who was sitting in front of Joe, received her rather pretty nickname one evening when the K. of L. members discovered that "Lėlytė" was not only Mary's surname, but was also the word for doll in Lithuanian. Dolly had come over not so long ago from a D.P. camp in Austria.

"What will we have to do, Joe?" she whispered, turning sideways. Of course, Dolly's w's sounded like v's and her th's like d's. But no one can blame her for that. Everyone gave her credit for learning English so fast. Why, in less than six months she had learned enough English to find herself right in the middle of all K. of L. activities.

"Oh, we'll have to arrange the next study club meeting. I'll see you after the meeting. We'll talk about it then".

For the rest of the meeting Joe's brain was like a merry-go-round, but no matter how hard he turned the crank that set his ideas awhirling, he could not pick out a single thought that he could put in words. Before he knew it, Joe was listening to the president adjourning the meeting, "until our Study Club Session, two weeks from Friday".

As the young Knights and Ladies of Lithuania were leaving the parish hall, Joe and Dolly took over one of the tables on the platform. Joe took out some old envelopes on which to make notes and Dolly dug out her fountain pen and offered it to Joe.

"Oh, no. You take the notes, you're secretary, you know".

"Oh, yes. That's right".

"Look Dolly, you and I have to find some real interesting topic that we can discuss. Now, last month it was the atom bomb. And the month before it was D.P.'s and our American-Lithuanian youth organizations. Do you have any ideas?"

You could easily guess that Dolly was a poet from her answer.

"How about... Lithuanian poets in Europe today? I can easily prepare a talk on Lithuanian poets.

"Yes, and you could read us some of your own poetry. Some of it is really good".

"Oh, no, no... My poems are not so good... yet".

"But on second thought December is not a good month for that. We should have something about Christmas".

"About Christmas... hmmm. I know. Maybe I can tell about Christmas in Lithuania and you can talk about Christmas in America. Then both the Americans and the Lithuanians will be pleased".

"That's true, but we are not supposed to give talks. We should prepare discussions. What can we discuss?"

At this point the idea merry-go-round became a silent duet, but the results were the same as before. No worth while idea developed. Not a single flying-horse would stop, pose, and let itself be harnessed in words.

Now it may be rather hard to believe the following, but it is true. Dolly and Joe were so hard at thought that they did not hear Father Francis come into the hall jingling his keys beside him. Father Francis was Spiritual Adviser of Council 999, K. of L. After about a hundred and twenty seconds of musical accompaniment to the thought-duet, Father thought it wise to add a few words to his music.

"Ahem... Something seems to be stumping this sub-committee. Right, Joe?"

"Oh, hello Father. We didn't hear you come in. We stayed a few minutes after the meeting to think up a suitable topic for our next Discussion Circle".

"Are you having any success?"

"No, Father, not as yet. But now that you're here, it won't take us ten seconds to spell success. We need some problem to discuss, and it must be about Christmas".

"Oh, that is not so difficult. I could give you a dozen problems, Christmas problems".

"Thanks, Father. But, we don't need a dozen. We'll settle for two or three". Dolly, jot these down, please".

"Jot?... jot?... what means 'jot'?"

"Oh, I'm sorry, Dolly. Jot means to write, to write down quickly".

"Thank you, Joe".

"Well," began Father Francis, "you could discuss the year of Christ's birth. That is a problem".

"What do you mean, Father? Wasn't Christ born in the year 1 A. D.?"

Father Francis smiled and shook his head. "No one knows exactly in what year Christ was born, but it is certain that He was born in the year 1 A. D."

"I never heard of that before. Why everyone knows that the birth of divided B. C. from A. D. And it had to be the year 1."

"If you read the Gospels carefully, Joe, all

you will find is: "there went forth a decree from Caesar Augustus that a census of the whole world should be taken. This first census took place while Cyrenus was governor of Syria". (Luke, 2, 1.) Roman history tells us that this census began in the year 8 B. C. So when Joseph and Mary went to their town of Bethlehem to register, it was about a year later, sometime between 8 and 6 B. C. And Christ was born during their stay in Bethlehem. That division of the ages into B. C. and A. D. did not come until centuries later. As a matter of fact, the way anyone would have written the year of Jesus' birth in those times would have been 744 A. U. C."

"And what, may I ask is that A. U. C.?"

"A. U. C. means *ab urbe condita*, which means . . .

"from the founding of the city, Father". That was Doolly offering her bit of information. She must have studied Latin in college in Lithuania.

"That is correct, Mary. In those times they used to keep track of the years by referring them to the founding of the City of Rome".

Now it was Dolly's turn to ask a question. "Father, what about the date and the month. Was Christ born on December 25?"

"No, Mary, it seems that Christ was not born on December 25. The earliest Christian writers used to put down different dates for the Nativity of Our Lord. Up until the year 200 or so, there is no fixed record of Christmas. Some writers thought that Christ was born on November 19; others put down April 19 and April 20. The first mention of the Church celebrating the Birthday of the Lord on December 25 is in a document of the year 354 A. D. So you see, the twenty-fifth of December is merely the date set aside to commemorate Christ's Nativity, and should not be taken as being the exact date".

"That's *super*, Father . . . why . . ."

Mary interrupted. "Joe, you say, 'that's super'. What does means 'super'?"

"Oh, I'm sorry, Dolly. 'super' means excellent, very good."

"Thank you, Joe".

"As I was saying, Father, that's *super*. The members will sure have plenty to discuss next session. How about one more problem, Father?"

"Well, let me see . . . Here it is. Do you think that Christ was born at the right time? By that I mean, would it not have been better for Christ to have been born, or at least have come into the world, right after Adam's sin. After all, God could have pardoned Adam and Eve in a minute. Or do you think it would have been better for Christ to await the end of the world before coming. You could imagine that Christ would come into the world just 33 years before the end of the world. Then live, suffer and die, and as His last act . . . the Sacrifice on Calvary . . .

the one and only Mass! Then, after saying, "Father, forgive them" and 'It is finished' give up His spirit in the sight of all the world. Finally, the world would be destroyed, the good would go to Heaven, and the evil to Hell. What do you think, Mary?"

"I don't know, Father. All I can think is that the golden middle is better".

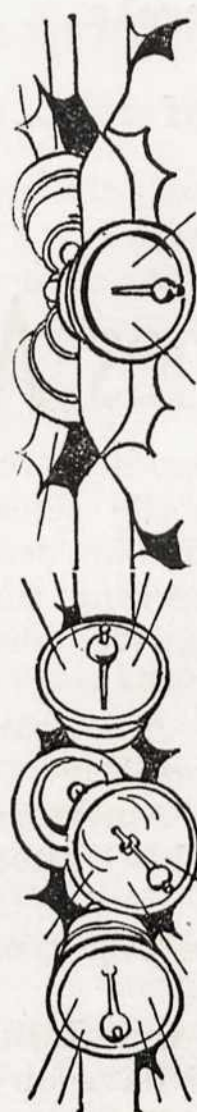
"She means golden mean, Father," explained Joe.


Dear Mr. Jurgela:

Soviet Russia's Crimes Against Humanity

The American Lithuanian Congress, held recently in New York City, expressed the sense of outrage which the people of Lithuanian descent in the United States feel concerning the conquest and enslavement of their native land by Soviet Russia.

And it is something for all the American people to think about on this Armistice Day.

There are more than one million American citizens of Lithuanian ancestry in the United States.

All of them are outraged by the plight of Lithuania under Russian rule.

Since it is hardly to be imagined that Lithuanians still living in their homeland have any better opinion of the Russian occupation than

Lithuanians in the United States, it is most unlikely that the sense of outrage is any less there than it is here.

The most likely difference between Lithuanians in and out of the homeland is that in one case they have no right of dissenting opinion and can only express such an opinion under pain of death, and in the other case they enjoy complete freedom of opinion and expression in common with all other Americans, regardless of racial origin.

The real fact is that the American Lithuanian Congress, in denouncing the Russian occupation of Lithuania, is merely giving voice to what cannot be said in Lithuania itself.

Consequently, what it says is of very great

importance to the rest of the world in judging the validity of Russia's denial of aggressive acts against her neighbors.

It is especially to be noted in this connection that the situation of Lithuania is a very small part of the whole pattern of Russian expansion.

If the events in Lithuania constitute a crime in the view of the people of that country, the similar events in many other countries establish the full extent of the crime.

This is what the Lithuanians in America say about it, and undoubtedly it is what all Lithuanians and all the people of Soviet-occupied countries think about the matter:

The march of lawlessness and aggression initiated by Hitlerite Germany in partnership with Soviet Russia", reports the Congress, "has submerged in bondage Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Czechoslovakia, the Ukraine, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Albania, Yugoslavia, and parts of Austria and Germany."

All of them cherished their sovereignty and had enjoyed the respect of other sovereign nations.

But under Russian rule, as the Congress goes on to say:

"Human rights are totally extinct.

"Millions of innocent people are being starved to death in slave labor camps of Arctic Russia under a program of genocide operations.

"The people are being molded into a mass of robots."

It is from such testimony as this concerning the authentic facts of the Russian crimes against humanity that the civilized people of the world are enabled to have real comprehension of the enormity of these crimes.

It is to the credit of the United States that such testimony can be given here, and the truth thus disclosed.

It is not to the credit of the United States that our country participated in the political decisions at Teheran and Yalta and Potsdam which abandoned so much of Europe to Russian aggression and subjugation.

The continuing "wave of terror unheard of in history" is a blight upon all nations which ever thought to pacify Russia by appeasing her. And America is regrettably among them.

Apžvalga

SUĖJO 25 METAI NUO K. BŪGOS MIRTIES

Šiomet gruodžio 2 dieną suėjo 25 metai, kai netikėtai mirė didysis lietuvių kalbininkas Kazimieras Būga (1879 - 1924), pasaulinio garso vyras. Jisai ligi šiolei pasilieka svarbiausias autoritetas lietuvių kalbos dalykuose.

K. Būga buvo kilęs iš Zarasų krašto. Pirmas kalbos mokslo žinias jis įsigijo pas kan. K. Jauinių, kuris tuomet buvo žymiausias lietuvių kalbininkas. Vėliau gilinosi Petrapilio universitete ir buvo pakviestas profesoriumi.

Anksti K. Būga pradėjo rinkti medžiagą didžiajam lietuvių kalbos žodynui. Buvo tai milžiniškas, daugelio metų darbas, kurį paprastai atlieka eilė asmenų. K. Būga pats vienas daugiausia nešė šį atsakingą triūsą ir mirdamas paliko per 600,000 kortelių su žodžiais pagrindiniam lietuvių kalbos žodynui. Jisai pats jau buvo pradėjęs leisti aną žodyną, bet mirtis nutraukė jo darbą. Tačiau pasiliko visa jo surinkta medžiaga, kuria vėliau kiti pasinaudojo, ruošdami žodyną.

Lietuvių kalbos žodyno parengimas yra pats didžiausias K. Būgos nuopelnas.

Jisai buvo ne tik kalbininkas, bet ir lietuvių senovės tyrėjas. Pasiremdamas kalbos duomenimis, jisai išvedė, kuriose vietose lietuvių gyventa priešistoriniais laikais. Jisai teisingai galvojo, kad tenai, kur nėra istorinių dokumentų, tik kalba "tegalai šiandien savo šviesa pratikti

tautos arba tautų senovę uždengiančią miglą". K. Būga parodė, kad senovėj, dar priešistoriniais laikais lietuvių ir jų giminių sodybos yra beveik siekusios Maskvą ir kad jų pirmykštės tėvynės būta toliau į rytus.

AMERIKOS LIETUVIŲ KONGRESAS

Lapkričio 4—6 dienomis New Yorke įvykęs Amerikos Lietuvių Kongresas buvo vienas iš išpūdingiausių mūsų visuomenės pasirodymų. Tą kongresą rengė Amerikos Lietuvių Taryba, kurios pirmininkas yra L. Šimutis.

Kongresas buvo stipri lietuvių manifestacija, praėjusi šūkiu: gražinti Lietuvai laisvę! Į jį iš visų Amerikos vietų suvažiavo daug atstovų ir svečių. Jų tarpe buvo daug įžymių lietuvių, kaip Nepriklausomybės aktą pasirašiusis Mykolas Biržiška, ministrai P. Žadeikis, St. Lozoraitis ir kiti. Labai uoliai dalyvavo tremtiniai. Kongresą aplankė įžymūs Amerikos valstybės vyrai, kaip gubernatorius Thomas Dewey ir Teisingumo sekretorius McGrath. Gal tai pirmas sykis paskesniais laikais, kad į lietuvių tarpą atvyko Amerikos vyriausybės narys. Buvo susilaukta sveikinimų iš prezidento Trumano, kuris gyrė lietuvius už pastangas Lietuviai gražinti laisvę, teisingumo ir žmoniškumo principus.

Iš lietuvių svarbias kalbas pasakė prof. K. Pakštas, prof. P. Padalskis, K. Bielinis ir kiti.

Kongrese buvo padaryta svarbių nutarimų ryšium su Lietuvos laisvės kova ir tai kovai va-

ryti gauta aukų. Būta ir kitos programos: pamaldos šv. Patriko bazilikoje; dainos ir literatūros vakaras ir t.t.

Šį kongresą reikia laikyti geriausiai nusisekusių iš visų panašių žygių, kuriuos yra darę lietuviai paskesniais metais. Jis parodė, kad Amerikos lietuviams labai rūpi laisva Lietuvos ateitis, dėl kurios jie dirba, kovoja ir aukojasi.

Malonu pažymėti, kad tiek kongreso rengime, tiek jo posėdžiuose uoliai dalyvavo vyčiai.

LIETUVIŲ MENO PARODA NEW YORKE

Spalių 20 d. New Yorke, pačiame miesto centre, buvo atidaryta lietuvių meno paroda. Neskaitant liaudies meno, parodoje dalyvavo 32 dailininkai.

Reikia pripažinti, kad lietuviai dailininkai pasirodė stipriai. Kai lygini jų darbus su kita-taučių menininkų kūriniais, tai gali pastebėti, kad lietuviai kartais yra neprastesni už ne vieną jau gerai žinomą svetimtautį.

Iš vyresnės kartos dalyvių parodoje dalyvavo dvi stipriausios pajėgos — Adomas Varnas ir Adomas Galdikas. Abu jie yra plataus masto kūrėjai.

Iš naujesnės kartos stipriausiai reiškesi grafikas V. K. Jonynas, kuris savo menu išgarsėjo Europoje. Savo technika ir naujais siužetais įvairus yra tapytojas V. Kasiulis. Skulptūrą įdomiai atstovavo V. Košuba. Vertingų darbų išstatė P. Augius, P. Kiaulėnas, V. Petravičius, A. Valeška, T. Valius, V. Vizgirda ir kiti.

Tarp liaudies meno kūrinių būta ir labai senų: vienas rūpintojėlis parodoje buvo iš 1715 metų.

Parodoje buvo progos pasigrožėti ir gražiais lietuvių audiniais.

Šią parodą reikia laikyti vykusių ir tikrai vertingu reiškiniu, kuris plačiajam pasauliui skelbia, kad lietuviai yra aukštos meninės kultūros tauta.

“AIDAI” AMERIKOJE

Nepriklausoma Lietuva turėjo eilę puikių žurnalų. Toki leidiniai kaip “Židinys” ar “Naujoji Romuva” būtų darę garbės bet kuriai tautai.

Atsidūrę tremtyje, lietuviai Vokietijoje ir kituose kraštuose leido keletą žurnalų. Iš jų savo rimtumu aukščiausiai iškilo “Aidai”, pavirtę rimtu ir aktuali žurnalu.

Tremtiniam iš Vokietijos skirstantis, daugelis lietuviškų laikraščių tenai užsidarė. Sunkiau buvo ir “Aidams” beišėiti. Bet jie vis tiek neužsidarė, tik nuo Naujų Metų persikelia į Jungtines Valstybes.

Amerikos lietuviai susilaukia rimto žurnalo. Jį pasiėmė leisti lietuviai pranciškonai. Tačiau visiems reikės stoti talkon, kad šis žurnalas galėtų eiti be vargo. Geriausia talka — šį rimtą lietuvių kultūros leidinį remti prenumerata ir raštais.

GARBĖS NARYS ANTANAS F. KNEIŽYS



Gimė Lietuvoje 1893 metais, birželio 12 d. Pradžios mokslus išėjęs Lietuvoje. Į Amerikos Jungtines Valstybes atvyko rugpiūčio 1 d., 1911 m. Apsigyvenęs Hartford'e, Conn. gilino savo mokslo studijas ir sekė Amerikos lietuvių veikimą.

Prelato Jono Amboto sumanymu ir pastangomis suorganizuota Šv. Kazimiero Apšvietos Jaunimo Draugija 1913 m. sausio 19 d., kurios pirmuoju pirmininku buvo Antanas F. Kneizys. 1914 m. Mykolas A. Norkūnas, Lietuvos Vyčių organizacijos įsteigėjas, atvyko į Hartford, Conn. ir, apsistojęs pas minėtos draugijos pirmininką, įkalbėjo Šv. Kazimiero Apšvietos Jaunimo narius įrašyti į Lietuvos Vyčius. Po to, draugijos susirinkime buvo iškeltas įrašymo klausimas. Nutarta įrašyti. Tai buvo 1914 m., gegužės 18 d. Tais pačiais metais Antanas F. Kneizys buvo deleguotas ir į L. Vyčių Seimą Brockton'an, Mass. Kneizio vadovybėje Lietuvių Vyčių 6 kuopa greit išaugo ir turėjo per 200 narių.

Kviečiamas L.D.S. įsteigėjo Kan. F. Kemėšio 1915 metais lapkričio 8 d. atvyko į Bostoną dirbti “Darbininko” įstaigoje.

Apsigyvenęs So. Bostone, persikėlė į Liet. Vyčių 17-tą Algirdo kuopą. Nekurį laiką buvo tos kuopos pirmininku ir ėjo įvairias pareigas komisijose.

Kurį laiką padirbęs “Darbininke” užėmė sunkias ir atsakomingas redaktoriaus pareigas. Liet. Vyčių organizacija visuomet rado vietos Kneizio redaguojamame laikraštyje. Jis, kaip ilgametis organizacijos narys, sekė organizacijos veiklą ir reikale ją užtarė.

L. Vyčių organizacija įvertindama Antano F. Kneizio gausius nuopelnus organizacijai — pakėlė Jį į garbės narius. Sveikiname!

GARBĖS NARYS JONAS BRAZAUSKAS



Lietuvos Vyčių 36-ta kuopa 1947 m. vasario mėnesį nutarė statyti vytį Joną Brazauską į garbės narius Lietuvos Vyčių organizacijoje. Lietuvos Vyčių Chicagos apskritis tai užgyrė.

Jonas Brazauskas atvažiavo iš Lietuvos 1908 m. rugsėjo 15 d. Gyvendamas šioje šalyje, pajuto liūdną lietuvių gyvenimą. Todėl 1914 metais rudenį jisai su kitais veikėjais suorganizavo L. Vyčių 14-tą kuopą, Cicero, Ill. ir daug dirbo valdybose, įvairiose komisijose, dramos rateliuose ir vaidinimuose.

Jonas Brazauskas, persikėlęs gyventi į Brighton Park 1922 m., įstojo į bendrą L. Vyčių 36-tos kuopos veikimą įvairiose komisijose. Dvejus metus išbuvo dramos ratelio režisierium.

Chicagos apskrityje jis dalyvavo dramos ratelio vaidinimuose — "Živilėj", "Kęstutis", "Gedimine". Jono Brazausko darbuotė buvo įvertinta. 1939 m. jam buvo suteiktas ketvirto laipsnio ordenas.

Jonas Brazauskas nepailstamai darbavosi ir darbuojasi L. Vyčių 36-tai kuopai. Išbuvo ketverius metus valdyboje. Darbavosi įvairių parengimų komisijose, dalyvavo dramos ratelyje, vaidindamas 10 veikalų.

Dabartiniu laiku jis yra Vyčių draugovės išdininkas, taipgi Vyčių namo vedėjas.

Jonas Brazauskas ne tik vien darbuojasi vyčiuose, bet yra išbuvęs parapijos komitete 8 metus, Labdarių Sąjungos Centro vice-pirm. 5 metus. Jis yra Tėvų Marijonų bendradarbis; L. R. K. Fed. veikėjas; Šv. Kazimiero Akademijos rėmėjas.

Jo obalsis per 35 metus buvo: už Dievo ir Tėvynės garbę ir žmonijos gerovę.
