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## AMERIKOS JAUNIMAS ŠIANDIENINIAME PASAULYJE

**Idomūs mūsų dienų reiškiniai.** Kad italai nebalsuotų už komunistus 1949 metų rinkimuose į Italijos parlamentą (Kongresą), Amerikos italai paraše savo giminėms ir pažystamiems į Italiją labai daug laiškų. Tuose laiškuose Amerikos italai grąšino nesiųsti į Italiją maisto, rūbų, pinigų ir kitokios pagalbos, jeigu Italijos italai balsuotų už komunistus. Tačiau balsavimai parodė, kad tie grąsimimai italų nuo komunizmo neatgrąsino. Jeigu komunistų draugų skaičius ir sumažėjo, tai tik dėl to, jog ivariavais būdais italai geriau pažino, ką komunistai padarė ir daro jų valdomuose kraštuose. Gal daugiausia komunistų nenaudai pasitarnavo žinios iš anapus geležinės uždančios, kad komunistai tikrai persekoja Katalikų Bažnyčią.

Jokis kitas kraštas pas save taip neišgarsino vadinamojo Maršalio plano pagalbos, kiek Italija, nors ji gavo žymiai mažiau už Prancūziją, Angliją, Graikiją ir kitus kraštus. Tačiau atrodo, kad ir šita reklama Italijoje komunizmui mažai pakenkė. At-

sakydami į tą reklamą Italijos komunistai išleido idomų propagandos lapelį. Tai buvo Amerikos vieno dolelio banknoto graži imitacija, tik viename apskritime vietoje simbolinės piramidės buvo bomba, kitame vietoje erelio Ku-Klux-Klano rūbe vyras, o vietoje žodžių THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA vienoje pusėje buvo įrašas: "Už šitą pinigą mūsų nenupirkote", kitoje: "Už šitą pinigą mūsų nenupirksite".

Nors iš visų Europos kraštų daugiausia pagalbos iš Amerikos gauna Prancūzija, tačiau tai Prancūzijoje komunizmui nė trupučio nepakenkė.

The Voice of America iš Europos klausytojų yra gavęs jau daug įspėjimų, kad jis nepasiekia gerų rezultatų svarbiausia todėl, jog jis komunizme kritikuoja tik ekonominę - socijalinę pusę, kad jis perdaug giria Amerikos ekonominę - socijalinę santvarką, o beveik nieko nesako apie komunizmo ir Amerikos ideologinius skirtumus, apie moralės skirtumus. Tie kalbėtojai permažai nusimano, kad Ame-

rikos kapitalistiniai - liberalistinė santvarka Europos nei katalikams nei kitiems jau senai neimponuoja. Ten ją yra atmetę ne vien socialistai, bet ir katalikai. Katalikai jau toli yra persiémę PP. Leono XIII ir PP. Pijaus XI skelbta krikščioniška socijaline diktrina ir jos nemano keisti į Amerikos liberalistinę santvarką.

Tiek Italijoje, tiek Prancūzijoje, tiek Vokietijoje ir visur kitur pasaulyje kovojant prieš komunizmą daugiausia reikšmės turi tinkamas išaiškinimas komunizmo ideologinių klaidų. Vien tik jų tvarkos peikimas, vien tik grąsinimai ekonominės pagalbos nutraukimu komunizmo niekur nenugalės.

Kai 1918 metais Lietuva ir kitos tautos kilo kovai prieš komunizmą, tai pasaulis dar mažai nusimanė, ką komunizmas duos ekonominėje-socijalinėje srityje. Tačiau tada jau buvo aiški komunizmo ideologija. Tos ideologijos tinkamas išaiškinimas buvo geriausias paraginimas eiti į kovą prieš komunizmą. Laisvės kare ir Lietuva ir kitos Pabaltijos valstybės ir Lenkija gynësi ne vien nuo rusų: gynësi nuo komunizmo, ir gynësi ypatingai todėl, kad suprato komunizmo ideologiją. Komunizmo ideologijos tinkamas nušvietimas buvo geriausias paraginimas kovoti prieš komunizmą.

**Žvilgsnis ateitin.** Kol užaugs šiandieninis jaujas amerikonukas, tai Amerikai, ar teisingiau pasakius šiandieniniams jauniems amerikonams teks daugiau turėti darbo su komunizmu ir pačioje Amerikoje ir už Amerikos, negu jo turi šiandieniniai Amerikos valdytojai. Atrodo, kad šiandieniniai Amerikos valdytojai su komunizmu vargai susidoro, nes jų tarpe yra per daug tokų, kurie apie komunizmą turi klaudingą nuomonę. Kovoti Amerikoje prieš Amerikos komunistus tik parodant jų nelojumą Amerikai, yra prastas kovos būdas. Amerikoje nelojalių Amerikai yra ne vien komunistų. Viisi gambleriai, mokesčių slėpėjai ir daug kitokių yra nelojalūs savo valstybei, ar jie būtų Amerikoje ar kituose kraštuose. Tokie visur yra vadinami savanaudžiai, o ne lojaliai piliečiai ir tokiai jie yra. Iš kitos pusės, ne kiekvienu komunistą asmeniniais teismas galėtų bausti už nelojumą, nes daugeliui jų teismas nesurastų pakankamos medžiagos. O už ką nors kolektyvinis kaltinimas visų kokio nors kolektyvo narių yra ir nekrikščioniškas ir nedemokratiškas. Komunistų tarpe visame pasaulyje ir Amerikoje yra daug tokų, kurie nesupranta komunizmo esmę, nesupranta jo svarbiausių klaidų, nuo jų yra slepiama tikroji komunizmo sistema ir taktika. Jo pakankamai nepažindami kai kurie komunizmo ir nesibaido, jo siekia. Tokius nuo komunizmo atgrąsinti lengviausias ir tikriausias kelias yra išaiškinti komunizmo klaidas.

Tačiau reikia gerai įsitėmyti, kad prieš komunizmą kovojant nepakanka vien tik palyginimo komunistinės ir savo krašto socijalinės bei politinės santvarkos. Kovai su komunizmu nepakanka lygi-

ti Amerikos materijalinį gerbuvį su Rusijos gerbuviu, nes komunistai teisingai gali atsakyti, jog yra kraštų, kuriuose materialiniu atžvilgiu yra blogiau, negu komunistiniuose kraštuose. Atsiminkime Indiją, kai kurias arabų valstybes ar kolonijas, Haiti ir kai kurias kitas Centrinės ar Pietinės Amerikos valstybes. Nepakanka vien skelbti, kad komunizmas griauna demokratiją, kadangi ir vad. demokratiuose kraštuose atsiranda tokų dalykų, kurie žmonių akyse kompromituoja pačią demokratiją: pav. visokia korupcija, anarchija. Žmonės ne visi pajégia skirti demokratijos esmę nuo visokių negebrovių atsiradusių demokratijos priedangoje ir dėl to kartais pradeda nekesti pačios demokratijos. Šiais laikais tai gerai matome pav. Prancūzijoje, o tai gali pasireikšti ir kiekvienoje kitoje valstybėje.

Tiek prieš komunizmą, tiek prieš bet kurią kitą klaidą sekminga kova gali būti tik tada, kai pakankamai suprantama savo doktrina ir ana kladingoji ir pajegiama pilnai nušvesti savos, t. y., krikščioniškos doktrinos ir anos klaidingosios pagrindinius ideologinės skirtumus, kada pajegiama nušvesti klaudingosios doktrinos principų žalingumą, o savos krikščioniškos doktrinos principų ir teisingumą ir praktišką naudingumą. Šiuo atžvilgiu labai įdomus reiškinys yra pav. Olandija. Olandijoje katalikų procentas yra nedidesnis kaip Amerikoje, tačiau jie turi savo net atskirą politinę partiją, kuri rinkimuose balsų gauna daugiau, negu iš viso yra katalikiškų balsų, t. y. už ją balsuoja ir nekatalikų, ta partija šiandien Olandijoje yra įtakingiausia. To prestyžo ji pasiekė katalikų mokėjimu savus principus tinkamai išaiškinti ir katalikams ir nekatalikams. Taigi, kova ir prieš komunizmą ir prieš kitas klaidas yra būtina jaunimo intelektualinio pasruošimo. Kuriame nors krašte artimoje ateityje katalikai ir jų principai tik tiek turės įtakos ir galios, kiek dabar jaunimas ruošiamas intelektualiniai pažinti savo ir kitų doktrinų principus. Komunizmą nugalės ne masonerija, ne socijalizmas, ne liberalizmas. Masonerijos tariamoji, o gal vieno kito iš jų nuoširdi kova prieš komunizmą yra visai neįdomi, nes ideologiniai ir moraliniai principais bei siekiuojamais juodu vienas nuo antro ne daug kuo skiriasi. Žmonijai visai nedidelis skirtumas ar ją valdytų komunistai ar masonai. Iki šiol tą patį galima pasakyti apie komunizmo ir socijalizmo santykį. Šiandien sunku atspėti, kokis tas santykis bus ateityje, nes socijalistų tarpe reiškiasi tam tikrų evoliucijos tendencijų net principuose ir šiandien dar sunku atspėti, kaip toli ta evoliucija nueis. Daug tačiau tikėtis didelių vilčių nėra, nes beveik visi žymesni socijalizmo vadai yra kartu ir masonai.

Visą kovą tarpe komunizmo ir krikščionybės šiandien pradėta vadinti kova tarpe Rytų ir Vakarų. Tai klaudingas ir kladinantis vardas. Kas pasaulyje turės politinę ir ekonominę persvarą — Rytai ar Vakarai, tai žmonijai visai nesvarbu. O svar-

bu kokios ideologijos bus Rytai ir Vakarai. Taigi, ištikro kova yra ne tarpe Rytų ir Vakarų, bet tarpe bedieviškojo komunizmo ir krikščionybės. Ta kova tik tiek galės būti sekminga ir prasminga, kiek ji bus šitaip suprasta ir tuo obalsiu vedama. Kad krikščionys tą kovą galėtų tinkamai vesti ir laimėti, yra būtinas geras pažinimas ir supratimas ir krikščioniškosios ir komunistinės doktrinos. Vienos ar antros gerai nepažįstas žmogus negali būti tinkamas kovotojas prieš komunizmą. Ginklo kova tarpe komunistinio ir nekomunistinio pasaulio, jeigu ir išsi-vystys į platesnę kovą, negu dabar Korėjoje, tai ta kova vistiek pirmoje eilėje bus politinė - ekonominė. Kaip po jos jausis pasaulis, priklausys nuo to, kokios ideologijos žmonės valdys pasauli. Gi jeigu vietoje komunizmo šiandien būtų laimėjės vokiečių nacizmas, tai pasauliui nuo to nebūtų buvę lengviau. Lygiai pasauliui šiandien ne daug reiškia, kad sunaikintas Vokietijos nacizmas, Italijos fašizmas, o jo vietoje paliktas komunizmas.

Suprantama, kad Amerika, kaip didelė, galin-ga ir turtinga valstybė ilgesnį laiką turės didelęs įtakos pasaulio ir politinei raidai ir dvasinei sevi-

jautai. Ta Amerikos įtaka pasauliui gali būti ir nau-dinga, bet gali būti ir labai žalinga. Tai priklausys nuo to, kas Ameriką valdys ir kokia dvasia joje viešpataus. Šiame klausime Amerikos katalikų vaidmuo bus ne vien jų pamaldume, duosnume, bet ypatingai jų ideologiniam apsišvietime, jų vieningu-me ir aktyvumė dalyvauti Amerikos valdyme. Taigi Amerikos katalikai pasaulio kovų ir reikalų eigai bus tiek įtakingi, kiek jie bus įtakingi pačios Amerikos tvarkyme.

Iš to seka, kokios yra svarbos Amerikos kata-likų jaunimo ideologinis švietimasis ir kokia yra atsakomybė tų, kurie šiandien Amerikos katalikiš-ką jaunimą turi savo rankose: ką jie tam jaunimui duoda. Šis klausimas yra tiek svarbus, kad ji reikia laikyti pačiu svarbiausiu iš visų Amerikos katalikiško jaunimo gyvenimo sričių.

Kiek Amerika prisidės sunaikinti komunizmą ir kokia jos įtaka bus pasauliui, priklausys nuo to, kiek dabartinis Amerikos jaunimas supras ir įver-tins reikalą gerai pažinti tas ideologijas, kurios sa-vo tarpe dabar kovoja.

# F R E E D O M

There are many words which seem so clear and familiar to us that we never think to question what the real meaning may be. The meaning of those words are very different; to some they can mean anything and to others they mean happiness and more, true existence in the world.

Let's take a word, FREEDOM, and look at what it means. We hear that word from everyone's lips. We read articles about it; the poets express it in their verses. But not every heart gets the same feeling when it hears the sound of that word. Often I look at the people who live in freedom, and I feel sorry for them because they do not fully appreciate what they have. Freedom for them doesn't mean anything more than a general explanation given in the dictionary. None of them can understand that freedom could be taken away from them one day.

Ten years ago, I lived just like many of the people today. The word FREEDOM means as little as any other word. I lived in my native country Lithuania, an independent state, and I enjoyed freedom, but did not understand that my freedom could be taken away.

One day in June, when the Communists occupied my dearest land, I understood the real meaning of FREEDOM then. Immediately they laid down rules on everything, rules which were against truth and humanity. They were cruel and horrible. Things that were holy to me, were meaningless in the Communists' eyes. My property—was their property. They watched and persecuted every step I took, and for even thinking contrary to them, they killed in the cruelest way, imprisoned or sent the victims to Siberia.

I had no right to my opinions, to work where I wanted, or even to read or have certain books or pictures. If I wanted to be safe, national meetings, plays, newspapers and even certain songs were strictly forbidden. When I left the house, I was not sure that I should return, or that the house would still be mine. I could not trust anybody—my friends, my relatives or even my family because I did not know if they would betray me to save their own lives. I could not visit my parents or write to them for fear that the Communists would know where I was. I had no rest even in my own bed; at any time they could come examining and questioning, and then someone would disappear.

Outwardly, I could not believe in God — they changed His name to Stalin.

What was left for me, to die? What for? Just

because I could not be a Communist, could not betray and persecute with them. Was terrible to be killed by tyrants so meaninglessly and cruelly.

I decided to run away, away from my dearest things, but also away from death. I left my childhood home, in former times so full of happiness; my native country in oppression and persecution. I left the school that was full of my dreams and memories. I left everything that my grandparents had saved for me.

In haste, I came into an unknown country, to strange people, who many times were not much better than the Communists. I was cold and hungry; worked hard and ate little, but I knew that in the room that held 15 or 20 people, there would always be room for me.

Few years later, fate was favorable to me, and I came here, where FREEDOM is so great. The very sound of the word FREEDOM reminds me of the real and happy life. FREEDOM is the greatest word I know besides God. When I think about freedom—I pray.

## THANK GOD

Thank God that we live in democracy where:

We are free to associate with each other in Catholic organizations.

We are free to join a Catholic youth organization, the K. of L.

We are free to work for God and Country.

Because if we lived in a Communist state:

Catholic organizations would be forbidden and persecuted.

The Comsomol, Communist Youth Organization, would be the only youth organization.

We would be free to work only for the Soviet, and its god, Stalin.

## BIRŽELIO TRAGIŠKOS DIENOS

Jau daugiau kaip dešimtmetis skiria mus nuo skaudžiosios mūsų tėvynės tragedijos, o rodos—tai buvo tik vakar.

Rodos, tik vakar buvo anas birželio mėnuo, taip pat pilnas kvepiančio žalumo, auksinės saulės ir jaunos gyvybės. Pavasario žiedais žydi žemė, o Lietuvos žalieji sodžiai ir dailūs miestai kaip apmirę: juodi nelaimės ir grėsmės debesys kyla iš rytų ir vakarų. Karo audra čia pat žemę drebina, aplinkui prazūties liepsnos . . .

—Ar išliks Lietuva, ta žavingoji laisvės, ramaus darbo ir kūrybos šalis? Ji tarsi maža žaliuojuanti sala liepsnos ir kraujo jūroj. Ar ji išliks? Kaip ją išgelbėt?!

Tokiais rūpesčiais dejavo tada kiekvieno tauraus lietuvio širdis.

O jau tada didieji Lietuvos kaimynai — Vokietijos ir Sovietų diktatoriai — buvo susitarę ir parašę Lietuvos laisvei mirties sprendimą. Sprendimas pradėtas vykdyti 1940 m. birželio mén. 15 dieną. Tą dieną Sovietų kariuomenė įžygiavo į šventą Lietuvos žemelę. Visais didžiaisiais Lietuvos keliais riedėjo tankai, patrankos, éjo ir jojo kariuomenė. Ore ūžė raudonųjų lėktuvai. Tik maža saujelė Lietuvos gyventojų, daugumoj ne lietuvių tautybés,

mégino džiugauti ar sveikinti "išvaduotojus". Visi kiti neapsakomo skausmo ir baimės suspausta širdimi jautė ir suprato įvykusią nelaimę. Tą dieną tapo palaužta Nepriklausoma Lietuva, paglemžta jos laisvę, atimta teisę savarankiškai kurti ir tvarkyti savos valstybės gyvenimą. Svetimųjų bangos užplūdo mūsų žemę ir atnešė niekada žmonijos istorijoje neregėtą priespaudą.

Žmonių persekiojimas prasidėjo jau liepos mėnesį, tuoj po bolševikų kariuomenės įžengimo. Prasidėjo areštai. Kalėjimuose atsidūrė visi vadovaujanti kultūrinių bei patriotinių organizacijų vejkėjai, įvairių profesijų bei luomų asmenys. Prasidėjo prievara visame viešame gyvenime, smurtiška propaganda spaudoj, katastrofiška suirutė valstybės ūkyje. Ramesnio galvojimo žmonės dar tildė savo ir kitų baimę: gal toliau taip nebus, gal vieni kitus suprasim, prisitaikinsim?

Ir taip, tarp baimės ir vilties besvyruojant, atėjo 1941 metų birželis — birželis siaubo, ašarų ir dejavimų. Baisi ta pirmoji baisioji naktis iš birželio 13 d. į 14 d. Visoj Lietuvoj tą naktį prasidėjo planingai paruoštas žmonių areštavimas ir vežimas į Sibirą. Rytui iššaušus vežimo žinia, kaip ugnis apėmė visus: "Veža! Veža žmones!"

Ką trėmė tada į Sibirą ir kodėl? Trėmė tuos, kurie daugiau žinojo ir daugiau suprato — tuos, kurie matė savo krašto nelaimę, kurie netikėjo sovietų peršamu "rojum". Vežė senus ir jaunus, mažus ir suaugusius. Vežė net ligonius. Vežė ūkininkus ir fabrikų bei ūkių darbininkus, kurie suprato savo skriaudą. Vežė karius ir šaulius, vežė mokytojus — jų gal daugiausia, nes jie juk buvo tautos akys ir širdis—auklėjo jaunimą, mokė atrasti tiesą, būti doru, mylėti tėvynę.

Siaubas apėmė visą kraštą, siaubas ir neviltis. Nebebuvo ramaus miego ir džiaugsmingo darbo, nebeliko jokios vilties po to, kai akys pamatė prastus, gyvuliams vežti vagonus, pilnus prigrūstus vargšų, nekaltų žmonių, šaukiančių pagalbos, prašančių vandens ar duonos kąsnio, tiesiančių pro užkaltų langų plyšius maldaujančias, bejėges rankas... Iš vagonų girdėjos vaikų verksmas ir dejavimai. Kartu su raudomis veržesi ir graudžios, širdži veriančios giesmės, lyg nekaltųjų aukų šauksmas i dangų.

Karšta birželio saulė degina kelias dienas stovinčius, aklai uždarytus vagonus. Troškulio ir neapsakyto nuovargio iškankinti vaikai klykia gerti. Kai gailestingos giminių ar kaimynų rankos neša pieno ar vandens, sargyboj stovis enkavedistas pagriebia indą ir išpila viską ant žemės. — Silpniesieji ir ligoniai, baimės ir nuovargio pakirsti mirė vagonuose ir taip liko gimtojoj žemelėj palaidoti.

Ir taip buvo visuose miestuose, miesteliuose ir kaimuose, kur tik buvo geležinkelio stotis. Iš naktinės medžioklės važiavo į tas stotis žmonių prikrauti sunkvežimiai. Visose stotyse stovėjo eilių eilės tų baisių vagonų, prie kurių tik vogčia galėjai prieiti. Tik pats save į pavojų statydamas galėjai išdrįsti paduoti nelaimingiemis ryšulėli maisto ar koki drabužį, galėjai paimiti pro vagono langų plyšius išmestą rašteli, pasakyti paskutinį skaudaus atsisveikinimo žodį...

Tose baisiose birželio dienose žmonės nerimo apimti nerado sau vietas, naktinis nenakvojo namie. Baisu buvo jausti tą žiaurią prievertą, tą kruviną plėšimą lietuvio nuo jo gimtosios žemės. Kas mylėjo tėvynę ir brangino laisvę, tie suprato, kad visa šalis smenga į pražūtį. Lietuvos laisvę, ta skaisčiai pražydusi lelija prie plataus kelio, tapo palaužta ir sutrypta.

Ir dabar dar žiauriau siaučia persekiojimas ir trėmimai, kaip tada, pačioj pradžioj komunistinio "rojaus" Lietuvoj. Tų pirmųjų birželio trėmimų bangą kartojama nesuskaitomai. Doras lietuvis žudomas, persekiojamas, plėšiamas nuo gimtosios žemės, siunčiamas į vergų darbus begaliniai kančiai ir mirčiai.

## EINANT PAS KĄ SU REIKALU

Kartais turime aplankytį pažistamą ar ir visai nepažistamą asmenį su reikalui, pavyzdžiu prasydami patarimo, pagelbos, rekomendacijos, darbo ir t.t. Tokiu atveju kalba gali būti daugiau ar mažiau formaliai. Interesantas, tai yra žmogus, atėjės su kuriuo reikalui, pirmiausia pasisako savo vardą ir pavardę. Toliau kalba gali būti labai įvairi, pvz. kad ir šitokia:

**Atsiprašau, kad Jus trukdau, pcnas X** (I am sorry to trouble you, Mr. X). **Aš noriu paprašyti Jūsų patarimo.** Arba: **Ar negalėčiau paprašyti Jūsų pagelbos?** (Would you do me a favour?).

Atsakoma paprastai šitaip:

**Labai prašau! Kuo galėčiau Jums padėti.** Arba: **Kuo galėčiau Jums patarnauti?** (Surely, what do you want me to do?). Arba: **Aišku. Visada mielai Jums padésiu.**

Kai prašomasis padėti negali, jis paprastai sako:

**Gaila, nieko negaliu Tamstai padėti.** Arba jei iš viso jokia pagelba neįmanoma (impossible): **Čia nieko negalima padėti** (That cannot be helped).

Jei kalbama apie aiškų dalyką, dėl kurio nėra jokių abejonių, vartojami tokie posakiai:

**Savaime aišku** (of course); **dėl to nėra jokios abejonių** (there is no doubt about it). **Dėl to nekyla joks klausimas** (That is out of question).

O jei klausiamasis visai nieko apie kalbamąjį dalyką nežino arba visai jo nesupranta, jis sako:

**Aš nieko apie tai nežinau.** Arba: **neturiu apie tai nė mažiausio supratimo** (I have not the faintest ideas).

Norint gauti darbą kurioj nors įstaigoj (office), reikia **paduoti prašymą** (to enter an application). Amerikoj paprastai vartojami specialūs tam reikalių lapai su įvairiais klausimais, į kuriuos reikia atsakyti, t. y. **užpildyti anketą** (to fill out the questionnaire).

Anketoj suteikiamas visos asmens **žinios** (personal data): **gimimo laikas** arba **amžius** (age), **gimimo vieta** (birthplace), **išeitas mokslas** (education), **profesija**, **profesinis patyrimas** (professional experience) ir kt. Yra ir klausimas, kiek **prašytojas** (applicant) norėtų **algos** (salary).

Tokį prašymą galima siūsti paštu, bet galima ir **asmeniškai kreiptis** (apply in person).

Kai prašytojui nėra labai svarbu, ar jo prašymas bus patenkintas, ar ne, tai jis pamojės ranka sako: **kaip bus, tebūnie!** (Be it as it may).

## 12 ĮSIDĖMĖTINŲ PUNKTU

Kiekviena tauta turi savitų pasaką apie slibinės: apie pabaisas žmones riančius. Pasakų slibinai būna įvairūs šlykštūs, baisūs žvėry, o kartais ir suvéręjė žmonės . . .

Betgi pasakų vaizduojamoji idėja, nors ir pasakų drabužiu apvilkta, būna reali gyvenime.

Dvidešimtojo amžiaus balsus slibinas, jau nebe iš pasakų pasaulyje, yra komunizmas - bolševizmas, kuris kur kas prašoka pasakų slibino balsumą bei žiaurumą.

Kiekvieno tikro lietuvių pareiga visur ir visada skelbti komunizmo balsiuosius darbus ir dar apie jį neišmanantiems parodyti jo tikrąjį veidą.

Lietuvos Vyčiai, būdami lietuvių visuomenės dalis, taip pat turi visu uolumu stoti į kovą su komunizmu, kuris kesinasi sugriauti ir Amerikos gyvenimą, ir jos žmones pavergti, sunaikinti Amerikos laisvę, jos gerovę, sunaikinti visa, kas čia yra gera ir žmoniška.

Kiekvienas Lietuvos vytis turi aiškiai suprasti, kas yra komunizmas ir kuo jis skiriasi nuo katalikų pasauležiūros.

Taigi:

2. Katalikas laikosi Bažnyčios mokslo ir klausojos autoriteto. Komunistas laikosi tik Maskvos, Lenino ir Stalino mokslo ir akrai vykdo kompartijos įsakymus iš Maskvos.

3. Katalikas pripažista, kad kiekvienas žmogus yra atskiras asmuo, individas, su šventomis, įgimtomis teisėmis.

Komunistas laiko kiekvieną žmogų esant tik masės įrankiu, masės dalelė, daiktui, lyg kokiuo mašinos ratų danteliu.

4. Katalikas yra taikos skleidėjas ir palaikytėjas; katalikas siekia, kad visos tautos bei valstybės gyventų laisvos savo nepriklausomą gyvenimą.

Gi komunistas kursto valstybinius neramumus ir sąmyšius, siekdamas visuotinės revoliucijos ir visų nekomunistinių valdžių nuvertimo bei visų tautų ir valstybių pavergimo komunistų diktatūrai.

5. Katalikas demokratijos žodžiu supranta laisvą pačių žmonių valdymą per jų laisvai išrinktą valdžią; demokratijos žodžiu jis supranta spaudos, sąžinės, darbo ir visas kitas įgimtas laisves bei teises.

Komunistas demokratijos žodžiu supranta tik Maskvos diktatūrą, Maskvos įsakymų vykdymą ir

žmogui atima bet kokią asmeninę laisvę.

6. Katalikas labai vertina kiekvieno žmogaus asmenybę, nes žmogus yra Dievo kūrinys, Jo paveikslas.

Komunistas gi su žmogumi nesiskaito, siekia žmogų komunizmu pavergti ir jo asmenybę sunaikinti.

7. Katalikas yra privačios nuosavybės šalininkas su salyga, kad ji kartu tarnautų ir visuotinai žmonijos gerovei. Šitaip suprasta ir naudojama privati nuosavybė yra gerbūvio šaltiniu ir pavieniam žmogui ir visai visuomenei.

Komunistas atima iš žmonių nuosavybę ir ją atiduoda mažos komunistų grupės sauvaliavimui. Žmonės, netekę privačios nuosavybės, pasidaro valstybės vergai.

8. Katalikas smerkia kapitalizmo sauvaliavimą, darbininkų išnaudojimą.

Komunizmas gi yra mažos komunistų sauvelės valstybinis kapitalizmas, iki vergijos laipsnio išnaujodas kiekvieną dirbantįjį, kiekvieną žmogų.

9. Katalikas kovoja prieš bet kokį žmogaus pavergimą: prieš kapitalistinį, prieš nacinių, prieš fašistinį, aišku, ir prieš komunistinį ir tt.

Komunistas gi laiko, kad visų žmonių besalyginis pavergimas komunizmui yra būtinės ir tai visu griežtumu vykdomas. Dėlto Rusija ir kiti komunistų valdomi krašta įrodė tartum ištisomis koncentracijos stovyklomis, ištisais kalėjimais.

10. Katalikas yra patriotiškas pilietis, kuris drąsiai atiduoda savo gyvybę už krašto laisvę.

Komunistas patriotizmą (tėvynės meilę) laikonusi kultimu ir visomis priemonėmis siekia jėga pavergti komunistams kiekvieną laisvą kraštą, prijungiant jį prie bolševikinės Rusijos.

Todėl kiekvienas komunistas yra savo krašto išdavikas jau tuo pačiu, kad priklauso komunistų partijai.

11. Katalikas ugdo krikščioniškąjį kultūrą ir rūpinasi dvasiniu žmogaus tobulumu.

Komunistas iš pamatų naikina visą krikščioniškąjį kultūrą ir kuria bedvasį žmogų: žmogų be Dievo, be moralės, žmogų gyvulį, žmogų žvėri, siekiantj sunaikinti kitaip galvojantį žmogų.

12. Katalikas kovoja prieš nepadoriast priemones, naudojamas bet kokiam tikslui siekti.

Komunistas nepaiso jokių priemonių, kad savo tikslą pasiektų: melas, šlykščiausios apgavystės, smurtas, teroras, žudymas — tai nuolatinės komunisto priemonės, kuriomis jis siekia pavergti atskirą

## BOOK NOTES

A bit of Robert Lawson's nonsense is grand for silent reading or for reading aloud. His latest tale is *McWhinney's Jaunt* (Little, Brown, \$2.50) and it is humor to be enjoyed by young and old alike.

Professor Ambrose Augustus McWhinney was a most unusual gentleman, an inventive genius who was able to meet any emergency, great or small, in the most unperturbed manner. He wore a most fascinating hat — a tall ancient stovepipe model and the band was used for holding many useful things — three fishhooks and half a dozen matches, a can opener, a bottle opener, some toothpicks, a New York, New Haven and Hartford timetable, extra pair of spectacles, three pipe cleaners, several calling cards, an eagle feather, a nail file, a rolled-up violin string, needles and thread, a packet of zinnia seeds and the minute hand of a grandfather's clock! He was very fond of bicycling but he disliked pumping his bicycle tires and thought it would be easier to inflate them by means of a pressure tank equipped with a suitable tube. So he experimented and when his bicycle with the new substance in his tires rose straight in the air he called the new substance Z Gas. He found that with a little practice he could ride on the earth or through the air with equal facility and that discovery marked the beginning of all his wonderful and fantastic adventures. On his trip whenever he saw a Police car he merely leaned back and soared over it, much to the surprise of the officers. He avoided all toll booths in the same manner for with only fifty dollars on which to cross the continent it was necessary to conserve every dime. He crossed New York and New Jersey without any mishap but over Pennsylvania he experienced a near tragedy when he bicycled over a blast furnace which he guessed to be an idle one! Passing over a wealthy suburb of Dayton, Ohio, he was overtaken by a violent rain squall and was forced to appropriate a handsome lawn umbrella decorated with orange mermaids — the mermaids were not necessary but the umbrella was. He found Ohio, Indiana and Illinois rather tiresome being mostly corn. He had many other exciting adventures along the way until he reached his goal, Holly-

wood, where he hoped to see his idol Gloria Glamora!

It is written for the nine to eleven year old reading level but will be enjoyed by anyone who likes an imaginative tale. The coordination of Robert Lawson's illustrations to his writing helps make his stories a most successful result. Other books written and illustrated by him which are equally enjoyable are Rabbit Hill, Mr. Twigg's mistake, and The fabulous fight.

Two favorite nonsense stories written by other authors but illustrated by Robert Lawson have become favorites with boys and girls because of illustration as well as writing are Mr. Popper's penguins by Richard and Florence Atwater and Prince Prigio by Andrew Lang.
