# KĄ RINKTI Į VALDYBAS?

Gana sunkių klausimų ir nemaža neaiškumų iškyla, kai tenka rinkti valdybos, visokie pareigūnai. Ką tokį rinkti? Kuris tinkamiausias? Ar išrinktasis vėliau neapgaus ir neapvils tų, kurie jį išrinko?...

Pirmiausia, kas nemano dirbti bei veikti, tegu niekuomet nesutinka būti išrinktas kurioms nors pareigoms; tegu neina į jokias valdybas ir tegu nekandidatuoja į jokius pareigūnus tas, kas nenori kitiems tarnauti, o tik ieško sau asmeninės garbės: toks dirbs ne organizacijai, bet sau. Garbė su visais laurais nusileidžia ant galvų tiems pareigūnams, kurie yra pareigingi, aukojasi ir atsiduoda savo organizacijai.

Būti kuriuo nors pareigūnu organizacijoje reiškia, kad nariai tave savo tarnu būti pakvietėišrinko (ir tu sutikai), o ne dykaduoniu ponu, kuriam visi kiti turėtu tarnauti...

Ne tas yra geras organizacijos pareigūnas, kuris tik daug kalba, daug šūkauja ir dar daugiau giriasi, bet kuris organizacijai daug dirba ir ja uoliai bei sąžiningai rūpinasi.

Organizacinis pareigūnas betgi turi dirbti tik savo pareigos darbą ir nesiekti apžioti kitų pareigūnų turimus atlikti darbus.

Teisingumas, taktingumas ir nešališkumas organizacijos pareigūnams yra būtinos savybės. Eiliniai nariai tuojau pastebi, ar jų išrinktasis pareigūnas yra jiems visiems teisingas, ar ne, ar jis juos skirsto į sau mėgstamus ir nemėgstamus narius...

Įvairūs organizaciniai pareigūnai, ypač pirmininkai, turi, bent daug kuo, tikti skiriamosioms pareigoms. Jie turi išmanyti, kaip elgtis įvairiose situacijose ir su įvairiais žmonėmis; jie turi būti iniciatyvos žmonės, kurių nereikėtų vis pastumti kuriam nors pajudėjimui; jie turi mokėti valdyti savo jausmus ir nelinguoti pagal kiekvieną papučiantį vėjelį; savo valia jie turi būti tvirti ir pastovūs, savo jausmais — švelnūs ir malonūs.

Ne kiekvienas tinka į vadus, į organizacinius pareigūnus. Todėl prieš išrenkamas tegu jis gerai save išegzaminuoja, ar jis tinka toms pareigoms, kurioms jis yra kviečiamas.

# NARIŲ PAREIGOS IR KENKSMINGI NARIAI

Eiliniais nariais vadiname tuos, kurie priklauso organizacijai, bet nėra valdyboje ir neturi jokių specialių pareigų.

Iš vienos pusės, eiliniai nariai turi drausmingai paklusti savo organizaciniams pareigūnams, bet iš antros — jie turi būti sąmoningi ir savo pareigūnų darbą vertinti kritiška akimi.

Labai klaidingai elgiasi tie nariai, kurie galvoja, kad įvairūs pareigūnai turi už juos visus organizacinius darbus nudirbti. "Juk mes juos išrinkome, tegu jie ir dirba" — yra neretas ir labai kenksmingas kaikurių narių galvojimas. Organizacijoje kiekvienas narys turi atlikti savo pareigą: pareigūnai — savo, eiliniai nariai — irgi savo. Taip pat neretai pasitaiko, kad kuris nors narys, ar kuri nors maža grupelė nori, jog prie jų nuomonės derintusi valdyba ar net ir narių dau-

guma. Šitoks narių elgesys yra niekas kita, kaip organizacijos ardymas. Eilinis narys į savo išrinktus pareigūnus turi žiūrėti kaip į patį save, kaip į savo paties valios vykdytojus: juk pareigūnai yra išrenkami narių dauguma ir jų pasitikėjimu.

Sąmoningas narys savo organizacijos atžvilgiu elgiasi ir galvoja tuo būdu, lyg nuo jo vieno pareitų visa organizacijos galybė bei gerovė. Juk kiekvienas atskiras narys yra atsakingas už savo organizacija lygiai tiek pat, kiek ir jos pareigūnai. Narys, savo organizacines pareigas kitam nariui užkraunąs, yra prastas ir net kenksmingas narys: organizacijai būtu naudingiau, jei jo iš viso joje nebūtų. Taip pat kenksmingas yra ir toks narys, kuris viską nori gauti iš organizacijos, jai nieko pats neduodamas.

Organizaciniu gyvenimu nusivilia ir savo organizacija esti nepatenkinti dažniausiai tokie nariai, kurie organizacijai yra pasyvūs ir joje tik savo pavarde tedalyvauja, o ne širdimi ir ne darbu. Juo daugiau darbo ir rūpesčių narys įdeda į savo organizaciją, juo brangesnė ji jam yra: toks narys tada jaučia, jog jo organizacija yra jo paties dalis.

# NARIU SUSIKLAUSYMAS

Visi organizacijos nariai yra saistomi organizacinės drausmės, nes organizacijos pagrindas yra drausmė, be kurios negalėtų egzistuoti ir pati organizacija.

Teisingai suprantamoje organizacijoje eiliniai nariai ir įvairūs pareigūnai sudaro nedalomą, vienalytį organizacinį kūną, kuris tik tada yra pajėgus veikti ir daug reikšti, kada čia yra harmoningas susiklausymas ir sąmoninga vienybė.

"Of course!"


"But I'm not little any more," she laughed," and you — you're not Jack — well, not the same old Jack the girls all thought was so grand—" She blushed then.

Nuo XVIII-to šimtmečio pabaigos (1795 m.) iki Vasario 16-os 1918 metų išaugo penkios lietuvių naujos generacijos, o vienok ir rusų pavergtas lietuvis, ir gyvenęs senose Prūsų sodybose už Nemuno po vokiečiais, niekados nenustojo kovojęs ir tikėjęs, kad kartą jis vėl laisvas bus. Ir šis visos tautos tikėjimas, darbas ir aukojimasis už tautos laisvę mūsų neapvylė: mes patys buvome to laimėjimo liudininkai, mes patys per 22 metus alsavome laisvos Lietuvos oru, kurdami naują, geresnį ir lai-

mingesnį rytojų, kaip laisviems žmonėms dera.

Ir jūs, mano mieli Bičiuliai, gyvendami JAV-ėse, džiaugėtės savo tėvų ir bočių žemės atgautaja laisve, nes nemažiau dirbote už mus ten, Lietuvoje, rinkdami parašus po peticija Amerikos Vyriausybei už Lietuvos pripažinimą, į Tautos Fondą sudėdami arti milijono dolerių aukų pinigais, ir, pagalios, Jums Vyčiai, tenka didžiausia pagarba, kai pirmojo dešimtmečio laisvos Lietuvos proga, pirmosios visos Lietuvos Dainų šventės metu, Kaune, Petro Vileišio aikštėje, pirmajam laisvos Lietuvos kariuomenės vadui, generolui Silvestrui Žukauskui, iškilmingai įteikėte auksinį laisvės kardą... Daugelio tūkstančių minia tuomet nuščiuvo, giliai susikaupė iš pagarbos tiems, kurie už Lietuvos laisvę galvas padėjo; visų akyse sužvilgo neišsakomo dėkingumo ašara tiems Amerikos broliams ir sesėms, kurie tokiu pasiaukojimu lydėjo visus mūsų žygius ir kovas, davė Lietuvai tokius savanorius, kaip Darius ir Girėnas, kurių vardai iš mūsų istorijos niekados neiškris. Nes niekas kitas, bet šitie Lietuvos didvyriai, 1933 metais ryžosi vėl tampriai sumegsti bepradedančius trupėti tarpusavio ryšius šiapus ir anapus okeano gyvenančių lietuvių. Šios svarbios mintys aktualios ir šiandien. Redakcija.

# Mūsų Klaidos

Nelemtas ir negudrus vienos politinės grupės nedemokratinis valdymas daugeliui amerikiečių nelipo prie širdies, kaip sakoma, gi buvo tokių, kurie pikčiausiu būdu, kur tiko ar netiko, puolė Lietuvos valdžios žmonės, gal nė negalvodami kad tuo pačiu aitrino Amerikos lietuvių nuotaikas, jas nuodijo ir tuo pačiu temdė ir šaldė mūsų tarpusavio nuotaikas ir santykius. Juk Jums, mano Bičiuliai, nepaslaptis, kad II-jo pas. karo metu net 40 tūkstančių lietuvių priėmė Amerikos pilietybę, gal daugumoje dėlto, kad jau į Lietuvos pusę buvo numoję ranka... Ta pačia proga, didelis skaičius žmonių net savo lietuviškos pavardės atsisakė, pasirinkdami naują ar senąją taip sudarkydami, kad lietuviški graboriai randa reikalo, mirties pranešimus skelbdami paminėti mirusiojo buv. tikrąją pavardę.

# Bolševikų Smurtas Ir Mūsų Veikla

Rusiškojo bolševizmo klasta ir smurtas, susitarus su vokiečių naciais, jau 1939 metais pakirto nepriklausomos Lietuvos laisvės medį, kuris 1940 metų birželio 15 dieną buvo nuverstas. Šis tarptautinio masto bolševikų smūgis Lietuvos žmonėms, lygiai kaip ir Jums, kurie laisvos Lietuvos vaizdą savo širdyse nešiojotės, buvo lyg perkūno trenksmas giedrią dieną. Niekas šitos nelaimės nepramatė ir jos pasitikti nebuvo pasiruošęs. Tą pačią dieną iš Lietuvos pasitraukė ir vyriausias krašto atstovas, mūsų didžiausiai nelaimei palikęs savo vietoje pavaduotoją. Viena bėda, kaip sakoma, ne bėda, bet kai prisideda prie jos antra ir trečia, tada jau pamatome kokia klaiki ta bėda. Taip ir čia: jei valstybės prezidentas, pasitraukdamas iš savo krašto, būtų pasiėmęs visą savo vyriausybės sąstatą, dabartinės mūsų kovos už smurtu išplėštos laisvės atstatymą, šimteriopai būtų lengvesnis ir tikresnis. Visi mes gerai žinome ir suprantame, ką reiškia dokumento originalas bei kaip kartais esti sunku išsiversti su jo pakaitalu, kurio dažnai ne-

norima pripažinti. Taip ir čia. Netekę užsieniuose savo krašto vyriausybės galvos, mes šiandie vedame nelygią kovą už savo krašto teises, pasikliaudami pakaitalu, kurio net vienas - kitas buves Lietuvos atstovas nenori pripažinti, tuo pačiu šita mūsų šventajį žygį slopindamas. Jau dešimts metų tęsiasi nelemtas ginčas kas geresnis: ar Vyriausias Lietuvos Išlaisvinimo Komitetas, ar kelių žmoniu, buvusiu Lietuvos atstovu užsieniuose, savotiškas nusistatymas? Atsakyma mes randame jau pas senovės romėnus: — Concordia res parvae crescunt, discordia — dirruntur... Jei nors dešimta dalis laiko ir energijos būtų buvus panaudota tam, kad sudarius visų lietuviškų politinių veiksnių vienalytę kovos programą, mūsų laimėjimo apaušrys jau gal ryškiau būtų pramatomas. Tokio darbo pasiskirstymo plano mes ligi šiolei neturime, o tarptautinio įvykių pletojimosi pasekoje mes galime atsirasti tuščiomis rankomis, lygiai kaip ir birželio 15 d. 1940 metais, pastatyti prieš įvykdytą smurtą. Mūsų spaudoje ne kartą tenka pastebėti nayvus raminimasis: qirdi, ana štai ir lenkai tarpusavy nesutaria, ukrainiečiai nesulipdo vienos savo atstovybės, baltgudžiai svaičioja apie didesnę pusę Rytų Lietuvos, na, klausykite, ar ne pasakos?.. Kai ALTAS iškelia kokį sumanymą, tai iš Washingtono sugrįžęs dažnai telkiasi Lietuvos Vyčius: Ei, Jūs, vyrai, rašykite laiškus kongresmanams, senatoriams, ir visiems šventiems, jei tas būt galima, kad mūsų pabiras mintis visa Amerika paremtų! Žinoma, Jūs paklustat ir parašote pe kelis tūkstančius tokių laiškų, bet ir Jūs patys jaučiate ir suprantate, kad tai ne originalus darbas, bet paliatyvas, kaip nežinomų žmonių palaidos mintys.

# Lietuvos Vyčiai Nepriklausomybės Minėjimuos

Kodėl aš taip išdrįsau prabilti į Jus, mieli Bičiuliai? Labai paprastai galiu i tai atsakyti. Pastaraisiais metais nebuvo ne vieno Vasario 16-tos minėjimo, kad ir man nebūtų buvę pavesta kur nors nuvykti, o nuvykus — susipažinti su Alto skyrių žmonėmis ir pastebėti, be kitų gerų dalykų, ir tuos trūkumus, kurie krinta į akį: — svarbiausia, sąlyčio stoka su Alto centru; jokio plano politinėms gairėms, jokių nurodymų. Kas man krisdavo į akį, tai visas skyriaus veikimas — Vasario 16-tos minėjimas, kaip vienintėlė metuose proga pakolektuoti Alto centrui lešų. O vėliau vėl viskas aprimsta iki... sekančios vasario dienos priminimo. Sunku man įtikinti patį savę, kad čia, Amerikoje, šiuo metu mūsų susirinkimai vien lėšų telkimo prasmę teturėtų. Noriu manyti, kad Lietuvos Vyčių kuopų

yra visose, didesnėse ar mažesnėse lietuvių gyvenamose kolonijose, nors, dėja, kad ir tokios Vasario 16-tos proga, organizuotai jų neteko niekur pastebėti. Neatrodo, kad Vyčių obalsis — Dievui ir Tėvynei — jau būtų visiškai numarintas, bet to pirmykščio entuziazmo, to jaunų širdžių veržlumo, jaunatviško užsidegimo nebegali įžiūrėti. Jaunieji kunigai dažnai nebetalkina Vyčiams, o patys vieni- palikti vyčiai praranda orientacijos gaires. Senieji idealistai pavargo arba visai iš gyvenimo pasitraukė, o jaunuosius kadrus kaž kas dėjosi sutelksiąs, įvesdamas angliškas skiltis į vyčių žurnalą — Vytį.

# Pavardžių Keitimas ir Lietuvių Vieningumas

Ir šitoje vietoje man prisimena didžiojo Lietuvos atgimimo dainiaus, Maironio, žodžiai: "Pameskim, broliai, rūba sena, kurį užvilko svetimi! Tegul jį meilė sukurena tėvynės darbui pakili." Taip mano Bičiuliai, Eisenhoweris savo vokiškos pavardės nekeitė ir nekeis, o mūsų tarpe Kiškūnas sakosi Kish, Vaičiūnas — Walter ir taip iki begalybės! Savaime suprantama, kad tie, kurie savo gražias lietuviškas pavardes sukarikatūrino, niekados neis su lietuviais, taigi ir su Vyčiais. Tai labai liūdna tikrovė, bet tai tikrovė ir jai privalome tiesiai pažvelgti i akis! O man prisimena iš studentavimo Romoje laikų ir toks faktas, kad 12-os žmonių Columbo Vyčių delegacija lankėsi pas anametinį popiežių, Benediktą XV-jį, ir ta proga paliko Bažnyčios bendriems reikalams čekį tik... trijų milijonų dolerių. Aš jau tuomet gerai žinojau, kad Amerikoje yra ir Lietuvos Vyčiai, todėl netiesioginiai didžiavausi tokia šaunia jaunųjų katalikų organizacija, kuri prieš 35 metus labai daug padėjo Lietuvos reikalui. Kai prieš kelis metus ir į Chicagą prigužėjo daug naujų jėgų, mes tikėjomės surasti bendrą kalbą, įsitraukti į organizacinį darbą, žodžiu — talkininkauti vieni kitiems, bet... Iš šio miesto lietuviškųjų šeimininkų nesulaukėm iniciatyvos, todėl ir bendro fronto visuomeniškame darbe nesudarėm.

# Pasaulio Lietuvių Bendruomenės Reikalai

Kad sutelkus lietuviškas jėgas, kad ir naujieji ateiviai nepaskęstų svetimybių liūne, Vlikas išleido Pasaulio lietuvių bendruomenės statutą, kuris kad ir vėžlio žingsniu bandoma realizuoti. Ar mano Bičiuliai, Lietuvos Vyčiai, bus pirmieji šios bendruomenės ramsčiai, parodys ateitis. Būtų labai gaila ir liūdna, jei ir šiuo metu nesidomėtų LB

organizavimu, nes, kai mes neisime, ateis kiti ir mus visai išstums iš lietuviško visuomenės gyvenimo, kaip kad šiandie anglicizmas baigia išstumti lietuvybę.

Trisdešimts septintąją Vasario 16-tos sukaktį minime labai skaudžiose mūsų tautai valandose, todėl ir mūsų čia praskleidžiamos mintys nėra nei šventiškos nei perdaug optimistiškos, bet jos nėra ir beviltiškos. Dvieju dalykų mums tereikia, būtent: tikėjimo ir darbo. Šv. Paulius sako, kad ir tikėjimas į Jėzų be gerų darbų yra negyvas. Lietuvos laisvei sugrąžinti reikia dar labai daug, tiesiog milžiniško, sutelktinio darbo ir pasiaukojimo, kaip savo laiku padarė Jūsų Darius ir Girėnas. Ir aš noriu tikėti, kad Lietuvos Vyčiai ne vien jais didžiuosis, bet ir paseks jų pėdomis.

# Pažinti Ir Veikti

Pereitų metų gale, mūsų Vyskupas V. Brizgys, Kristaus Karaliaus šventės proga, "Draugo" puslapiuose pasakė šventą tiesą, kad, girdi, daugelis žmonių šiandie netiki Dievą dėlto, kad Jo nepažįsta. Kad tikėti ir pamilti Dievą galima tik tuomet, kai Jį pažįstama... Taip ir čia, perfrazuojant šituos mūsų Ganytojo žodžius, galime sakyti: tikėti Lietuvos ateitimi, jos atvadavimui pašvęsti visas savo gerąsias jėgas ir tam aukotis iš visos širdies tegalima tiktai tada, kai gerai žinoma, suprantama ir įvertinama viso šito milžiniško pasiaukojimo prasmė. Pirmieji Lietuvos Vyčių organizatoriai daugumoje šitą žinojimą buvo iš Lietuvos atsivežę, gi čiα gimusiems ir augusiems reikalinga daugiau ne tos informacijos, kurią Vyčiai randa savo žurnale, nes kitą lietuviškąją spaudą tik retas kuris teskaito. Begaliniai didelės reikšmės yra tarpusavis bendravimas, gyvųjų žmonių pasakojimai ir liudymai, tad kodėl šis šaltinis nepanaudotinas? Mano giliu įsitikinimu, jis yra šiandien būtinas, kad mes neišsisklaidytume, anot to priežodžio, kaip žydo bitės.

# Vyčiai Ir Ateitininkai

Tad jau šiandie, šito Lietuvos Nepriklausomybės paskelbimo išvakarėse ryžkimės sudaryti planą, kaip sekmingiau tą padaryti, kad iki sekančių metų būtų pasiekta konkrečių rezultatų. Suburkime į vieną sutelktinį barą visą lietuvišką katalikų inteligentinį jaunimą — senuosius ir jaunius Lietuvos Vyčius su Ateitininkų Federacija ir jos padaliniais ne rezoliuciojmis, bet gyvuoju bendravimu visur ir visuomet, parodykime vieni kitiems daugiau lietuviškos širdies ir supratimo, ir joks darbas bei pasiaukavimas nebus primestine sunkenybe!

# 60-ji KUOPA

60-ji kuopa, Kewaee, Ill., įsteigta 1916 metais. Steigiamajam susirinkime įsirašė 19 narių. Per sekančius susirinkimus narių skaičius tiek išaugo, kad pajėgta suorganizuoti chorą, kuris ne tik bažnyčioje sekmadieniais per pamaldas lietuviškas giesmes giedodavo, bet suruošė ir keletą vakarų, koncertų. Pirmaisiais metais buvo suvaidinta karo vaizdelis "Karo metu" ir "Knarkia paliepus".

Dar žymesnis kuopos veikimas buvo 1918 metais. Rengta ne tik vakarai, koncertai, bet atkreiptas dėmesys ir į kitas kultūrines sritis: vakariniai savęs lavinimosi kursai su paskaitomis iš Lietuvos praeities. Kiekvienas narys buvo įsipareigojęs priklausyti Tautos Fondo skyriui ir mokėti metinį nario mokestį.

JAV įstojus į pirmąjį Pasaulinį karą, į pirmąsias gretas buvo pašaukti sekantieji veikėjai: K. Songaila, J. Miškinis, B. Kučinskas, J. Sakalauskas, J. Nedvaras, B. Maršalka, M. Mikėnas. Išleidus juos kuopa nenusiminė ir veikime nesustojo. Tai liudija 1919 metais suruošti keli vakarai. Vienas didesnių vakarų buvo birželio 14 d. Suvaidinta komedija "Piršlybos", o choras savo dalį taip pat gerai atliko, padainuodamas net sunkesnių dainų, kaip Sasnausko "Karvelėli" ir k. Kuopa taip pat turėjo gerų deklamatorių.

Lietuvai pasiskelbus nepriklausoma, kuopa nepasiliko neatidavusi savo duoklės ant tėvynės laisvės aukuro. Per Tautos Fondą, neskaitant narių metinių mokesčių, suaukojo keletą šimtų dolerių. Savoji parapija ir organizacijos reikalai taip pat nebuvo pamiršti. Vienų vakarų visą pelną, o kitų dalį skirdavo parapijai palaikyti, "Vyčiui" paremti. Yra prisidėjus ir prie nuosavos spaustuvės įsigijimo ir tt.

Laikui bėgant ir daugeliui narių išvažinėjus į kitus miestus kuopos veikimas pradėjo silpnėti, o ilgainiui ir visai sustojo.

1928 metais klebonaujant kun. B. Verbiui buvo prisiminta anksčiau gyvavusi ir gražiu veikimu pasižymėjusi vyčių kuopa ir sumanyta ją atgaivinti. Pats klebonas tuo reikalu kreipėsi į vyčių Centrą ir tuometinis Centro sekretorius K. Gervilis nuvyko su visomis informacijomis. Spalio 21 d. buvo sušauktas jaunimo susirinkimas ir jame kuopa buvo atgaivinta. Susirašė 47 nariai. Valdybon išrinkta: dvasios vadas kun. B. Verbis, pirm. J. Kavolas, vi-

cepirm. E. Lakaitė, sekr. B. Vaičiūtė, ižd. O. Drummond. Centre kuopa įregistruota nauju numeriu, būtent 121-ju.

Kun. Verbiui išvykus kitur pastoracijos darbo dirbti, nesant vadų, kurie būtų sugebėję vadovauti veikimui, atgaivintoji kuopa neilgai gyvavo.

Visam kuopos gyvavime savo veikime pirmose gretose stovėjo sekantieji veikėjai-jos: Ig. Dambrauskas, M. Kvietinskaitė, O. Galeckiūtė, M. Mikėnas, L. Laukeniūtė, M. Maršalkiūtė, E. Brazaičiūtė, Al. Jočis, P. Zujus, V. Višniauskaitė, J. Nedvaras, K. Songaila, J. Miškinis, B. Maršalka, J. Piliponis ir k.

# 61-ji KUOPA

61-ji kuopa Patersone, N. J., įsteigta 1916 metais birželio mėnesį. Kuopos steigėjais buvo K. Pakštas ir K. Vaškas iš Newarko. Jiedu susitarę su klebonu kun. J. Švagždžiu suruošė prakalbas parapijos salėj ir įsteigė kuopą, kurion iš pradžių susirašė nedaug narių. Valdybon išrinkta: kun. J. Švagždys, dvasios vadas, Pranė Venskūtė, Pirmininkė, ir J. Spranaitis, sekretorius.

Nors kuopa buvo įsteigta ir apie tai pranešta Centrui, tačiau iki spalio mėnesio negauta jokios žinios. Tų metų seime Centro sekretorium išrinkus Joną Šaliūną, jis pranešė, kad kuopa įresgistruota, duotas numeris ir prisiuntė čarterį. Nuo to laiko kuopa drąsiau pradėjo veikti ir verbuoti naujus narius.

Sekančiais metais kuopa pradėjo rengti vakarus, vaidinimus, kas dar labiau pagyvino veiklą, gi a. a. kun. J. Petraičiui užėmus parapijoj klebono vietą, kuopos veikimas taip pakilo, kad narių skaičius siekė iki septyniasdešimt. Buvo įsteigtas kuopos orkestras, kuris gyvavo apie tris metus. Tais metais daugiausiai gyvumo kuopon įnešė a. a. Marcijonas Staniūlis, Ignas Kulikaitis ir Pranas Baltuška.

Sekančiais metais buvo perorganizuotas parapijos choras į vyčių chorą ir suruošta keletas didesnių koncertų. Taip pat suruošta visa eilė vakarų ir suvaidinta nemažai veikalų: komedijų, dramų, tragedijų. Nuo kuopos įsisteigimo iki 1937 metų kuopos veikloje, taipgi vakarų suruošime ir vaidinimuose daugiausiai reiškėsi iš merginų: M. Gribaitė, M. Petraitė, O. Volkaitė, V. Serapinaitė, M. Sasnauskaitė, P. Usaitė, M. Ubelevičiūtė, Irena ir Eleonora Staniūlaitės, F. Žyliūtė, o iš vaikinų: J.

Spranaitis, Ig. Kulikaitis, a. a. M. Staniūlis, J. Žylius, T. Rimas, J. Obelevičius ir daugelis kitų.

1919 metais parapijos salėj kuopa įsteigė nuosavą klubą, kuris gyvavo apie tris metus. Tuo pačiu laiku buvo suorganizuota ir kuopos basebolo rinktinė, kuri žaidė ne tik New Yorko ir New Jersey val. apskrityje, bet ir su Patersono geriausiomis rinktinėmis. Pirmaisiais rinktinės vadais buvo: J. Spranaitis, J. Venskus, o geriausiais žaidėjais buvo E. Ulčinskas, T. Rimas, J. Jasulaitis, J. Dutkus, D. Osipauskas, J. Spranaitis II-sis, Stasys ir Povilas Dutkai. Rinktinė laikėsi iki 1932 m. Po to perėjo į Šv. Vardo draugijos globą.

Bendrai, nuo pat įsisteigimo iki 1938 metų kuopa Patersono lietuvių kolonijoj lošė pirmąją rolę. Kuopai pirmininkavo ir daug veikė: Jonas Spranaitis, Tamas Rimas, J. Jasulaitis, J. Jenušaitis, Jr., J. Spranaitis II-sis, A. Lekavičius, Ed. Staniulis; sekretoriavo: P. Venskaitė, V. Serapiniūtė, O. Volkaitė, P. Usaitė, M. Sasnauskaitė, M. Obelevičiūtė ir k.

1926 metais atvykus į Ameriką prof. J. Eretui, Lietuvos Pavasarininkų atstovui, kuopa suruošė dideles prakalbas. Svečias išsivežė ko gražiausių įspūdžių.

1936 metais atvykus į Ameriką dr. J. Leimonui, kitam Lietuvos Pavasarininkų atstovui, kuopa taip pat suruošė dideles prakalbas. Ed. Staniulio pasidarbavimu, svečias aplankė miesto mėrą John Hinchcliff, kuris savo nuoširdumui parodyti svečiui įteikė miesto raktą. Be to, apžiūrėta spaustuvė didžiausio Patersono laikraščio "Evening News".

1937 metais kuopai buvo didelis džiaugsmas, kuomet tų metų seimas už didelius nuopelnus organizacijai į Garbės narius pakėlė J. Spranaitį, Sr.

Iki 1941 m. kuopos veikimas daugiausiai buvo nukreiptas į sportą, ypatingai į kegliavimą N. Y. ir N. J. valst. apskrityje. Be to, suruošta nemažai išvažiavimų ir kitokių pramogų.

Nuo 1941 iki 1944 m. kuopoj veikimas buvo silpnas, nes daugelis veikliųjų narių buvo pašaukti į karinę tarnybą II Pasauliniame kare.

Kad ir silpną veikimą palaikė valdybos nariai: A. Lekavičius, J. Baublis, J. Lapinskas, M. Jackevičiūtė, A. Skubus ir ypatingai Garbės narys J. Spranaitis, Anne Baltuska ir Dorothy Dutkus.

1945 m. kuopa persiorganizavo, išrinkta nauja valdyba ir pasukta didesnio veikimo kryptimi. Įsteigti lituanistikos kursai, suruošta eilė vakarų, nariai pradėjo daugiau domėtis sportu ir dainos menu ir bendrai kultūriniais pasireiškimais.

Nuo pat įsisteigimo kuopa rėmė parapiją įvairiais parengimais, darbu ir aukomis. Tautos, lab-

- 4. To vote on the proposed amendment to ARTICLE VI, Membership Dues, Sections 3, 4 and 5 of the Constitution and By-Laws; Sections 6 and 7 to be eliminated; present Sections 8, 9 and 10 to become Sections 6, 7 and 8 respectively. (Published in July, 1955.)

Note: Recommended for consideration by vote of the Supreme Board in April, 1955.

5. To transact such other business as may properly come before the Convention.

# OFFICIAL NOTICE TO ALL MEMBERS

The following resolutions have been adopted by the Supreme Council for presentation at the 42nd National Convention at Newark, N. J. They are herewith being published in accordance with Article IX, Section 13, of the Constitution:

RESOLVED: That Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution be changed to read: "All regular members pay \$3.00 yearly to the Supreme Council, which includes a subscription to the Vytis."

(Note (a) and (b) would remain unchanged.)

RESOLVED: That Article VI, Section 4, of the Constitution be changed to read: "In families having several members belonging to the organization, including married couples, one member may pay \$3.00 yearly dues while each of the others may pay \$2.00 yearly dues. The option of paying \$2.00 and not receiving the Vytis is available to a member only if another member of his or her family living at the same address has paid \$3.00 annual dues and is in good standing. Only the member paying \$3.00 receive the Vytis."

RESOLVED: That Article VI, Section 5, of the Constitution be changed to read: "All dues are payable annually on August 1, the beginning of the fiscal year of the Supreme Council. Members joining less than six months ofter the beginning of the fiscal year pay the balance of the yearly dues, on a prorated basis. Members joining more than six months after the beginning of the fiscal year pay the balance of the yearly dues, on a prorated basis, plus the full yearly dues for the succeeding fiscal year."

RESOLVED: That Article VI, Sections 6 and 7 of the Constitution be eliminated. The present Sections 8, 9, and 10 would then become Sections 6, 7, and 8 respectively.
