Chicagos vyčiai demonstruoja prieš Lietuvos pavergimą

Štai, jau prabėgo šiltoji vasara, palikusi mums tik gražius prisiminimus iš jos saulėtų dienų. Dabar vėjas jau braukia nuo medžių lapus ir netrukus žemė pasipuoš baltu rūbu.

Ši vasara vyčių šeimai buvo darbinga ir nuotaikinga. Būrys vyčių dalyvavo ekskursijoje į Europą ir buvo užsukę į ten vykstantį Eucharistinį kongresą, jaunuolių grupė stovyklavo prie Detroito, o taip pat nemažas skaičius buvo suplaukęs į 47-tąją organizacijos seimą Worcesteryje, Mass.

Seimo metu buvo išrinktas naujas organizacijos pirmininkas, į valdybą įtraukta naujų pajėgų ir pasirižta aktyviai dirbti. Tuo būdu, į naują darbo sezoną, kuris prasideda šį rudenį buvo išengta su viltimi ir noru toliau darbuotis vytiškiems idealams. Reikia manyti, jog šaltesnės rudens ir žiemos dienos ir per vasarą įgauta fizinė energija kiekvienam iš organizacijos narių leis smarkiau pajudėti ir geresnių pasiekimų atsiekti.

Vasaros pabaigoje būrelis vyčių dalyvavo giminingos — ateitininkų organizacijos sukaktuviniame kongrese. Reikia pažymėti, kad ateitininkai paminėjo savo 50 m. gyvavimo sukaktį, kuriai visu smarkumu ruošiasi ir vyčiai. Šių dviejų panašių organizacijų didesnis abipusis bendradarbiavimas išeitų vieniems ir kitiems į naudą. Todėl būtų gera atgaivinti pasitarimus, kuriuos anksčiau yra vedusios ateitininkų ir vyčių vadovybės.

Be čia minėtųjų dalykų reikia iškelti vyčių vasaros metu atliktų nemaža kitų darbų, nors dalis iš jų buvo daugiau tik pramoginio pobūdžio. Prie tokių paminėtinas didelis Chicagos vyčių suruoštas piknikas kas metai rengiamas tuo pačiu laiku — liepos mėn. 4 d. Chicagos vyčiai,

palyginus skaitlingai, dalyvavo Pavergtųjų Tautų Savaitės minėjime, kuris buvo prarastas liepos mėn. 23 d. didžiajame Grant parke. Čia vyčiai turėjo atsinešę plakatus su "Lithuania" užrašu ir juos kitataučių žmonių minioje greitai buvo galima atpažinti.

Čia reikia paminėti ir veiklaus organizacijos nario Jokūbo Stuko kelionę po pasaulį, kurios metu jis buvo užsukęs ir į okupuotą Lietuvą iš kur sugrįžęs jis mums plačiai nušvietė apie gyvenimą rusų priespaudoje. Jo įdomūs reportažai tilpo dienraščio "Draugo" Vyčių skyriuje ir, manome, jie domino ne tik vyčius, bet ir visus lietuvius. Dabar tas pats J. Stukas važinėja po lietuviškas kolonijas ir rodo filmus, vaizduojančius pavergtąją Lietuvą, kurie dar geriau negu žodžiai nupasakoja sunkią padėtį Lietuvoje. Savo tokiu darbu J. Stukas yra plačiai žinomas lietuviškosios visuomenės tarpe, kas vyčių organizacijai daro garbę.

Šioje vietoje paminėtinas ir kitas darbštus vytis — Leonardas Valiukas, kuris visą vasarą praleido dirbdamas politinėje srityje, aktyviai veikdamas respublikonų partijos eilėse. Jis suorganizavo komitetą Nixonui į JAV prezidentus remti ir į šio komiteto eiles įtraukė ir daugiau vyčių. Šiuo savo užsimojimu L. Valiukas išėjo į plačią politinę akciją, kuri, kaip ir kiekvienas kūrybingas žygis, turi būti sveikintinas. Gera, kad mūsų tarpe atsiranda žmonių, kurie neužsidaro savo siaurame ratelyje, bet eina į amerikietiškąją politiką ir ten nepraranda savo veido ir lietuviškumo.

Šalia visų tų gerai mus nuteikiančių ženklų, reikia paminėti ir vieną liūdną, ypatingai skaudų ir vyčiams. Tai prof. K. Pakšto mirtis, atėjusi staigiai ir netikėtai, jam viešint Chi-

cagoje. Prof. K. Pakštas yra buvęs uolus vyčių organizatorius, Vyčių Garbės Narys ir vienu metu redagavęs "Vyties" žurnalą, o taip pat ir kitus katalikiškus laikraščius. Tai buvo kūrybingas žmogus, visada pilnas naujų minčių, plačių ieškojimų bei sprendimų. Jo netekimas yra nemažas smūgis visai patriotiškai nusistačiusiai lietuvių tautos daliai.

Baigiant šias pastabas apie vasaros darbus ir žvelgiant į rudens bei žiemos veiklos sezoną, norisi tikėti, jog ateinantis laikotarpis praeis darbingoje nuotaikoje, o sekančiais vasarai išaušus, bus galima išskaičiuoti buvusiojo sezono vaisius ir tada jais turėsime progą kartu pasidžiaugti.

Lietuvių parapijos salės patalpose ruošia lietuviškų filmų rodymą ir pasilinksminimą. Susirinkimas įvyko Apolionijos ir Motiejiaus Ambrozių namuose ir jų šeimyninės šventės ir vaišių proga buvo palinkėta jiems ilgiausių ir laimingų metų, o sendraugių kuopos vardu įteikta dovana — Jono Mingirdo tautosakos knyga.

RESOLUTIONS

(adopted at the 47th K. of L. National Convention,
Worcester, Mass.)

The delegates and guests of the 47th National Convention assembled at the Bancroft Hotel, Worcester, Massachusetts, August 18-20, 1960, unanimously passed the following resolutions:

1. Since experience has amply demonstrated that Soviet Communism, based on atheism and the denial of the dignity of the human person, has for its aim the enslavement of the entire world, we go on record as deploring and condemning the principles of Soviet Communism.
2. We express our deepest gratitude to the Government of the United States for its firm stand against Soviet Communism and cherish the hope that it will continue to oppose the principles of Soviet Communism everywhere and exert every effort to protect the rights of all inhabitants in those nations.
3. In view of the fact that World War I and World War II were fought for the freedom of all nations, we go on record as condemning Soviet Russia for enslaving millions of people of freedom-loving nations.
4. We are grateful to the government of the United States for the continued non-recognition of the unjust absorption of Lithuania and the other Baltic States by Soviet Russia. It is our hope that our nation's leaders will continue to maintain this stand.
5. We are grateful to the President of the United States and express our appreciation for proclaiming the third week of July as "Captive Nation's" week. Thus the unjust action of Soviet Russia has been brought to the attention of the free world.
6. We firmly uphold the stand of our present government of the United States of America and trust that it will do everything in its power to continue the same course of action in opposing Soviet Communism.

BE IT RESOLVED that the 47th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania select a permanent Golden Jubilee Year Committee, and that this Committee be empowered to do the following:

- a) Sponsor the Jubilee Year Convention in 1963 in cooperation with the Supreme Council and the local council and district.
- b) Select a Convention site, which would best serve the purposes of the Jubilee Year.
- c) Arrange the Program in accordance with all proper programming procedures, including religious, cultural, sports, social, and other activities.

RESOLVED that the Supreme Cultural Committee be expanded from 4 to 6 members, concentrated if possible in one District.

RESOLVED that a loan to the Supreme Cultural Committee be made from the Supreme Building Fund in order to finance the release of 1000 Lithuanian language instruction records. Total expenditure, including translation fee for the text, vocalization for the records, etc. not to exceed \$700. Cultural Committee would replace this loan as the records are sold \$1.00 each.

RESOLVED that the Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Committee be made up of a Chairman, named by the Convention, a Secretary, Treasurer, Publicity Officer and 6 Trustees (3 Clergy and 3 Laity). All members of this Committee to be college graduates.

WHEREAS, the Lithuanian Program at Fordham University initiated in the Summer of 1957 in recognition of the needs of the Lithuanian community in the United States and to offer opportunities for advancing scholarship in Baltic Studies has been discontinued this Summer (1960) due to apathy and lack of interest on the part of the Lithuanian community itself.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania through the Supreme Culture Committee:

1. Encourage by all possible means at its disposal the enrollment of at least five Knights of Lithuania members annually in the Fordham Summer Lithuanian Program; and
2. Establish a voluntary fund, under the supervision of the Supreme Culture Committee, to give financial assistance to the above-mentioned Knights of Lithuanian enrolling in the Fordham Summer Lithuanian Program.

RESOLVED, after hearing the Supreme Ritual Committee report, (joint recommendations of the Supreme Ritual Committee and the Ritual Panel) that the new point system be coordinated.

RESOLVED, that the 47th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania extend heartiest congratulations to Councils 79 and 102 of Detroit, Michigan in their fine work in sponsoring the K. of L. Youth Camp at Dainava in Manchester, Michigan, during the week of August 15-21, 1960.

RESOLVED, that the 47th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania express deep appreciation and gratitude to Joseph A. Sakevich, National President of the Knights of Lithuania for the past two years and for his untiring efforts in behalf of the organization and a job well done.

Delegates and guests assembled at the 47th National K. of L. Convention express their deep appreciation and gratitude for the hospitality and kindness extended to them by the Host Council 26 of Worcester, Mass.

Our Knights of Lithuania "Vyčiu Veikla" column appeared regularly in the Saturday feature edition of the Catholic Daily "Draugas" appearing 50 times between national conventions. Much publicity was written for the Supreme Council and its Committees, the five regional districts and individual councils. The receipt of the Worcester Knightimes, Detroit Knight Life, Dayton and Illinois-Indiana district bulletins aided us much in keeping the column going. In return these Knights received nation wide publicity.

Energetic Juozas Sadauskas of Cleveland, Ohio reported the activities of the Mid-Central district and wrote articles of national interest. He made regular contributions to "Draugas", "Vytis" and "Garsas".

Frank Vaskas from Newark, N. J. reported the news from the New York - New Jersey district. He made contributions to "Draugas", "Darbininkas", "Garsas" and "Vytis". His English items were published often in the Newark newspapers causing him to average one published item per week altogether. Tony Yuknis acted as a roving reporter for the Illinois - Indiana district contributing articles of local, national and regional interest to "Garsas", "Draugas", "Darbininkas", "Sandara" and "Vytis". Also he sent in copies to the Chicago Tribune, Chicago Daily News, Southtown Economist and Southwest News-Herald. The English language Catholic publications which received K. of L. items were the Register, national weekly, and the New World, Chicago Archdiocese weekly.

Regretably the Illinois-Indiana district was too persistent in twisting the arms of this writer, thoughtlessly trying to burden him with additional duties and responsibilities, that he was forced to stop attending council and district meetings. A writer without arms is useless indeed.

To date all of the districts and councils have not taken advantage of the free publicity available. ŽALGIRO MŪŠIO 550 METŲ SUKAKTIES PROGA

Š. m. liepos 15 d. lenkai minėjo Žalgirio mūšio 550 metų sukaktį Griunvalde su iškilminga paminklo atidengimo ceremonija. Taip pat lenkų spaudoje, tiek krašte tiek užsieny, pasirodė platūs aprašymai apie "lenkų pergalę" ties Griunvaldu, kur, girdi, lenkų karalius Jogaila nugalėjęs kryžuočius. Lenkai net pagamino filmą "Krzyżacy", kuris pagal Sienkevičiaus romaną, vaizduoja mūšį. Deja, Sovietų okupuotoje Lietuvoje lietuviai negalėjo tinkamai paminėti šitą įvykį. Tačiau laisvame pasaulyje gyvenantieji lietuviai stengėsi paminėti Žalgirio mūšio sukaktį spaudoje ir kitais būdais — tik, žinoma, tie minėjimai negalėjo būti tokio masto, kaip Lenkijos minėjimas. Mes Lietuvos vyčiai, kaip Vytauto ir anų metų vyčių ainiai, privalome susipažinti su Žalgirio mūšio eiga.

Tad grįžkime prieš 560 metų, kada galingas Kryžuočių ordinas buvo prislėgęs Prūsus, kada Jogaila viešpatavo Lenkijoje ir kada Vytautas didysis valdė Lietuvą...

Karo su kryžuočiais priežastis

Žemaičiai nebegalėjo panešti kryžuočių jungo, kuris jiems buvo 1404 m. primestas. Ieškodami išvadavimo, 1407 metais jie kreipėsi į Vakarų Europos valdovus ir tiems nusiskundė, kad kryžuočiai nepaprastai daug įkaitų nugabeno Prūsijon ir kad jų naujieji ponai neapsiėmė skleisti krikščionybę jų tarpe.

1409 m. Lietuvoje buvo nederlius. Jogaila, norėdamas padėti Lietuvai, siuntė jai javų. Tačiau Kryžuočių ordinas Ragainėje juos sulaukė. Už tokį pasielgimą, Vytautas užstojo už laisvės beieškančius žemaičius ir pagelbėjo jiems išvyti vokiečius, nusiųsdamas į Žemaitiją savo bajorų ir paimdamas ją į savo valdžią.

Šitie veiksmai visiškai suardė Vytauto santykius su ordinu. Priėjo prie to, kad naujas karas buvo neišvengiamas. Ordinas iš pradžių manė, kad jam teks kariauti su vienu Vytautu. Bet Jogaila pareiškė, kad jis eis išvien su Vytautu. Lenkai užstojo už lietuvius, nes jie norėjo atgauti prarastą Pamarėnų pakrantį, galutinai baigti valstybių sienų vaidą su kryžuočiais, apsaugoti Dobžinę (Dobrzyn), kurią atgavo tik po didelio mokesčio vokiečiams 1404 m., ir palaikyti Jogailos interesus Lietuvos kunigaikštijoje, kurios sostą jisai gėidė turėti.

Kryžuočių ordinas nesiskubino į Žemaitiją, bet pirmiausia puolė Lenkiją, 1409 m. Iš Lenkijos kariuomenė buvo išvyta ir netrukus buvo padarytos vienerių metų karo paliaubos. Paliaubų metu susitarta pavesti ginčą išspręsti vokiečių - romėnų imperatoriui Vaclovui. Kitais metais, Vaclovas, turtingo ordino papirktas, pripažino jam Žemaitiją ir visą kairiąją Panemunę iki Gardino. Jogaila su Vytautu apkaltino Vaclovą šališkumu ir, pratęsę paliaubas su ordinu iki 1410 m. birželio 24 d., ėmė ruošti dideliame žygiui.

Norėdami sulaukyti ordinui pagalbą iš Vakarų, jie abudu, būdami gudrūs politikai, išsiuntinėjo po visą Europą skundus, kaltindami ordiną, kad jis puolęs Lietuvą, norėdamas ją užgrobti, o krikščionybę visai nesirūpinęs, kad penkerius metus valdydamas žemaičius, ordinas visai nesirūpinęs jų krikštu, nestatęs bažnyčių. Ordinas irgi išsiuntinėjo raštus, kaltindamas Vytautą su Jogaila, kad šie apgavikiškai remia pagonis žemaičius.

Vytautas su Jogaila bandė pritraukti Vaclovo brolių, vengrų karalių Zigmantą, bet tas, norėdamas išardyti abiejų pusbrolių vienybę, pasiulė atvykusiam pas jį Vytautui vainikuotis Lietuvos karalium. Tada ne metas buvo pyktis su Lenkija dėl tuščio karaliaus titulo, tad Vytautas atmetė Zigmanto pasiūlymą, Vytautui vėliau pasisekė padaryti paliaubų sutartį su Livonijos ordinu, ir jis nedalyvavo Žalgirio mūšyje.

Pasiruošimas į kovą

Vytautui reikėjo Lenkijos dalyvavimo šiame kare. Visų pirma, jam reikėjo lenkų karių. Antra, jo neperseniausia pakrikštyta šalis kryžuočiai išvardino "pagoniška" — žodžiu, be Lenkijos talkininkavimo jo žygis galėjo ordinui pritraukti Vakarų Europos pagalbą. Taip pat Vytauto kariuomenėje buvo totorių ir "schismatikų" rusų. Lenkai, kaip sąjungininkai, davė šiam žygiui "katalikišką" atspalvį.

1410 m. gegužės mėn. Vytautas su Jogaila slapta suėjo Brastoje aptarti karo žygi. Jie sutarė savo kariuomenes sujungti Lenkijoje ties Červinsku (prie Vyslos). Červinskas buvo tinkama susirinkimui vieta, nes pakeičiui į kryžuočių sostinę, Marienburgą. Tuomet Lenkija neturėjo pastovios kariuomenės, ir jos bajorija jau ilgą

laiką nedalyvavo rimtame kare. Vinco Krévės posakis: "Lenkas ne taip narsus, kaip save giria" pritiko Jogailos bajorijai. Lenkų istorikas Dlužošas, nebūdamas Vytauto draugu, rašo, kad išdykę lenkų ponai "drebėjo, kaip apušės lapai" prieš Vytautą. Jis taip pat teigia, kad, jei žygis būtų ilgiau tęsėsis, lenkai būtų grįžę namo be karaliaus leidimo.

Vytautas paskolino Jogailai 20.000 grašių pasamdyti algininkus karius paremti savo mobilizuotą bajoriją. Jis net paskyrė kunigaikščio Kaributo pulką Jogailai. Vytautas surinko savo pajėgas iš lietuviškų bei rusiškų vaivadijų.

Gegužės mėn. įvyko milžiniškos medžioklės, it varžytinės, Gardino ir Volkoviškių miškuose. Medžioklių tikslas buvo pristatyti kariuomenei daug žvėrienos. Birželio pabaigoje Vytauto kariuomenė išžygiavo iš Vilniaus ir Gardino sutikti lenkus sąjungininkus.

Žygis Prūsijon

Vytautas Didysis išjojo į kovą pasiruošęs grumtis su tų laikų geriausia kariuomene. Jis buvo studijavęs strategiją ir karybą prie savo tėvo Kęstučio, dėdės Algirdo ir prie kelių vokiečių maršalų; tad jis turėjo beveik penkiasdešimt metų kariško patyrimo. Taip pat Vytautas praleido daug metų nugalėdamas totorius stepuose. Tos kovos su totoriais suteikė Vytautui totorių karybos supratimą. Tuo karybos supratimu Vytautas viršijo kryžiuočius, nes vokiečiams totorių taktika buvo keista ir nesuprantama. Vytauto kariuomenėje buvo gabaus karvedžio Saladino vadovaujamas 4000 totorių junginys. Be to, Vytautui teko dukart apsigyventi Marienburge ir dalyvauti jungtiniuose žygiuose su vokiečių daliniais. Šis patyrimas padėjo Vytautui suprasti kryžiuočių organizaciją, taktiką bei karybą.

Žygis buvo daromas taip slaptai, kad ordinas nesugebėjo sukliudyti abiem sąjungininkų kariuomenėms susijungti. Idant paslėpti savo tikrą strategiją ir sumaišyti ordino orientavimą, visa eilė mažų puolimų įvyko palei Prūsijos sienas. Gilesni įsiveržimai iš Žemaitijos krypties ir, kiek vėliau, iš Mozūrijos, buvo praversti sukliudyti kryžiuočius. Vėlyvesniai įvykiai parodė, kad ši strategija buvo tiksli ir logiška, nes leido sąjungininkams sutraukti jėgų persvarą kovos paskyrimo vietoje. Kryžiuočiai laukė užpuolimų skyrium iš Lenkijos ir iš Lietuvos. Todėl vienas dideles savo jėgas jie paliko saugoti pilių nuo Lietuvos, o kitas paliko Pamary saugoti nuo lenkų.

Nuovargus žygis nuo Vyslos pakrančių iki nustatytos kovos vietos buvo vykdytas su nuostabiu greitumu ir slaptumu, pagal Vytauto iš anksto nustatytus planus. Žygiuotė ėjo trumpiausiu keliu į kryžiuočių sostinę Marienburgą. Vytautas buvo tikras, kad kai žygio kryptis bus atspėta, tai vokiečiai jam užstos kelią — sekantieji įvykiai pateisino jo galvosena...

Iki paskutinio momento ordinas negalėjo sužinoti ką sąjungininkai buvo suplanavę, iš kurios krypties įvyks svarbus puolimas. Sužinoję, kad sąjungininkai žygiuoja Marienburgo link, kryžiuočiai skubiai sutraukė daug kariuomenės ir pasiruošė kautynėms.

Vytauto genijus vėl pasireiškė kovos vietos pasirinkimu. Kai jis pastebėjo vokiečių koncentravimą Gilgenberge, paruoštose pozicijose, jis čia išvengė kautynių, nuimdamas nakčia stovyklą ir žygiuodamas aplink ežeryną ir balas, Tanenbergo link, iš kur kelias į Alenštei-

ną ir Marienburgą buvo atdaras. Sekančią dieną (liepos 14 d.) kryžiuočių kariuomenė, sužinojus, kad Vytauto ir Jogailos kariuomenė jau ties Griunvaldu, buvo priversta skubiai žygiuoti užkirsti sąjungininkams kelią. Ordino kariuomenė atvyko į mūšio lauką liepos 15 d. Ji buvo išvargusi; audra ir didelis lietus paskutinę naktį jai nedavė net gerai pailsėti. Tuo tarpu sąjungininkai buvo mažiau keliavę ir nakvojo miške, kuris apsaugojo juos nuo audros.

Mūšis ties Griunvaldu (Žalgiriu)

Ordinas buvo pasikvietęs daugybę svečių ir samdytos kariuomenės iš Vakarų Europos. Taip pat buvo daug lenkų (sileziečių bei pamarėnų) kryžiuočių pusėje. Beveik tiek daug lenkų ėjo su kryžiuočiais, kiek buvo po Jogailos vėliava. Iš viso kryžiuočiai atsivedė prie Tanenbergo apie 15.000 karių (5000 raitininkų ir 10.000 pėstininkų). Jie buvo žymiai geriau apsišarvavę ir apsiginklavę, negu sąjungininkai. Kryžiuočiai buvo išsirikiavę dviejomis eilėmis. Kryžiuočiams vadovavo pats ordino magistras Ulrichas vos Jungingen.

Sąjungininkų kariuomenė buvo išrikiuota trimis eilėmis: lietuviai buvo dešinėje ir vidurio daly, atdarame lauke, o lenkai kairėje ir vidurio daly, apsaugoti pelkėmis ir pridengti mišku. 2100 čekų, vengrų, sileziečių bei valachų samdinių sudarė lenkų atsargą. Lenkų kariuomenės organizacija panaši į kryžiuočių, žodžiu, kaip Vakarų kariuomenė. Tačiau ji buvo menkliau apsiginklavusi ir nebeturėjo tokio patyrimo, kokį turėjo priešas.

Lietuviai turbūt buvo prasčiausia apsiginklavę. Bajorų ginklai buvo panašūs į visos Europos karių ginklus. Pagrindinis raitininko ginklas buvo kardas, galvai ir krūtinei pridengti geležiniai šarvai. Arkliai buvo balnojami tokiais pat balnais ir taip pat žabojami, kaip ir Vakaruose. Bet kadangi visus metalinius daiktus lietuviams tekdavo pirktis ar grobtis iš užsienio, tai ne visi jų turėdavo. Todėl kai į karą išėjo vyrai, o ne vien turtingesnieji bajorai, tuomet jų dalies apsiginklavimas buvo daug prastesnis: paprasti ūkininkai, negalėdami įsigyti visų brangiųjų ginklų, išėjo kovoti ir su paprastomis medžio buožėmis, su mediniais iešmais geležiniais smaigaliais, su kirviais ir kilpinėmis. Gal lietuviams pritrūko naujų geležinių ginklų, tačiau jiems nepritrūko drąsos bei ryžto laimėti.

Lietuvių ir lenkų kariuomenėje galėjo būti apie 23.000 karių su 9000 kavalerijos. Bet dauguma karių nebuvo patyrę ir menklai apginkluoti, tad ordinas tikėjosi lengvai laimėti.

Lenkų kariuomenę mūšiui rikiavo narsus Zindramas iš Maskovičių, o lietuvių kariuomenę — pats Vytautas. Jogaila specialios Kaributo pulko sargybos saugomas išklaušė net kelias mišias paeiliui ir dalyvavo lenkų pašventinimo ir riterius ceremonijoj. Lenkų riteriai iškilmingai sugiedojo "Bogorodica". Visų viršininku buvo laikomas maldingas Jogaila, ir jis, kaip katalikiškos šalies karalius, turėjo duoti ženklą mūšiui pradėti. Vytautas buvo sudarytosios karo tarybos pirmininkas, todėl jisai buvo ir tikrasis mūšio vadas.

Mūšio laimėjimo nuopelnas, be abejo, pirmučiausia priklausė Vytautui, nes jis, keisdamas pavargstančius arklius, su keliais palydovais skrajojo tarp kariuomenės eilių, duodamas paskutinius įsakymus. Vytautas pridengė silpnesnę lenkų sparną, miške. Dešinės sparnas nebuvo pridengtas, jis buvo išsirikiavęs erdviame lauke. Tas

parodo, kad Vytautas numatė sudaryti sąlygą, su kuria jis galėtų įvykdyti totorių t u l u g h m a manevrą — kitaip sakant, greitai apriesti priešo pašoni. Mūšio eiga parodė, kad Vytautas sekė gerai nustatytą planą. Vytauto mūšio planas reikalavo, apsaugotą kairės sparną, tankaus vidurio ir sąlygos dešinės sparne įvykdyti greitą manevrą.

Anksti ryto dar buvo migla karo lauke. Kryžuočiai su patrankomis šaudė į sąjungininkų pusę, norėdami pabauginti priešą. (Lietuviai irgi turėjo patrankų. Vienas šaltinis mini, kad Vytautas atagbeno į Prūsus 60 patrankų). Kai rūkas išsiskirstė, mūšis tuojuo neprasidėjo, nes maldingas Jogaila norėjo išklaudyti visą eilę mišių ir dalyvauti lenkų riterių pakėlimo apeigose. Ordino kariai nekantravo, tačiau nedrįso pulti, nes būtų tekę kautis miške. Jie norėjo, kad pirmieji pultų sąjungininkai. Magistras von Jungingenas nusiuntė Vytautui ir Jogailai du plikus kardus, vieną kruviną, antrą švarų. Kryžiuočių siuntiniai, atgabėję kardus į Vytauto stovyklą, davė juos Jogailai ir sakė:

— Skirk karaliau, kuri nori, o su juomi karą ar taiką, tai mes juodu tau atsiunčiame. Gal stokoja tau ir Vytautui ginklo?

Karalius Jogaila, nors ir tuo ižeistas, atsakė: "Labai gerai, priešas duoda mums peilį, kuriuomi mes jį paskersim!" Išvykus siuntiniams, Jogaila ilgai delisė. Rūpestingas Jogaila, klaupęs ties altoriu, širdingai ėmė melstis. Tuo tarpu stropus Vytautas nueina pas jį ir sako: "Brolau, diena yra karo, ne maldos!" Pagaliau, 3 val. vak., Vytauto raginamas, Jogaila sėdo ant arklio ir, išjojęs ant kalvos stebėti mūšio, davė ženklą jį pradėti.

Prasidėjus mūšiui magistras didžiausias savo rinktinės jėgas, sunkiai šarvuotą kavaleriją, metė prieš lietuvius. Po valandos karšto mūšio lietuviai su totoriais pasitraukė. Jie tyčia pasitraukė, norėdami privilioti kryžiuočius gilyn į savo eiles, kad galėtų vėliau paspausti iš šono (tai buvo lietuviams gerai pažįstamas, totorių dažnai vartojamas, taktinis manevras). Tuo pasitraukimu nuo sąjungininkų vidurio ir kairiojo sparno buvo nutraukta daug priešų jėgų, kurios nespėjo laiku grįžti ir susitvarkyti.

Lietuviai įviliojo sunkiai šarvuotus riterius į pelkes. Tada lengvai šarvuoti raitininkai įvykdė Vytauto pašonio aprieto manevrą prieš mažiau judriųjų, sunkiai šarvuotų ir ginkluotų, kryžiuočių kavalerijos šoną.

Tuo tarpu, liko tik trakiškių pulkų vidurys ir kairiajam sparne išrikiuoti lenkai. Čia dar 3 valandas ėjo sunkios kovos. Kryžuočiai jau apsupo lankus. Vienam kryžieviui, Dipoldui, teko stačiai pulti į lenkų karalių. Tuo tarpu, Lesnickis, karaliaus raštininkas, norėdamas gelbėti, pagriebęs ieties kotą, taip smarkiai uždavė kryžieviui, kad jis nuo žirgo kežterėjo, kuri, prišokę kiti karaliaus tarnai, nukovė. Kryžuočiai, manydami, kad lietuviai išblaškyti, pradėjo giedoti pergalės giesmes. Jie jau buvo pasiruošę sumušti atkakliai besiginančius lenkus, bet tuo momentu Vytautas atvedė paskutinius savo rezervus. Mūšio įkaršty atsirado ir pasitraukę dešiniojo sparno lietuviai. Grįžę lietuviai užėjo kryžiuočiams iš šono. Jiems paspaudus, kryžiuočių tarpe kilo panika — jų eilės pakriko. Mūšio vietoje krito žemaičio ietim per gerklę pervertas patsai magistras Ulrichas von Jungingenas. Kartu su magistru Jungingenu žuvo maršalas Fridrichas Valenrodas, didysis komturas Konradas Lichtenšteinas ir 600 — beveik visi — žymieji

kryžiuočių riteriai. jų pulkų vėliavos — visos iki penkiasdešimt pirmos pateko į sąjungininkų rankas. Dalis kariuomenės dar bandė gintis, pasislėpus už gurguolių, tačiau ir ji buvo sumušta. Bėgančius per naktį vijosi mūsiškiai, daugybę jų pribaiddami apylinkės pelkėse ir raistuose. Tik maži kryžiuočių likučiai paspruko. Įvyko ordino katastrofa — baisi ir jiems netikėta.

Lenkų atkaklus pasipriešinimas kairiame sparne leido Vytautui puikiai praveisti savo aprieto manevrą. Žygio planas ir mūšio eiga buvo Vytauto didžiojo ir jo karvedžių nuopelnas. Abiejų sąjungininkų kariuomenių eilinių karių atkaklumas, ryžtas ir kariška dvasia irgi suvaidino svarbų vaidmenį mūšy. Bet ištikrųjų, nėra abejonės, kad didžiausias aukas atnešė Lietuvos kariuomenė. Šiame kritiškame mūšy suvaidino menkiausią vaidmenį karalius Jogaila, kuris savo charakteriu bei išsilavinimu netiko vadovauti tokiam karo žygiui.

Mūšio pasekmės

Ordinas buvo įsitikinęs mūšį laimėsias ir iš anksto buvo pasiruošęs laimėjimo puotai. Visa turtingoji jo stovykla atiteko sąjungininkams. Be vyno ir valgimų, stovykloje buvo rasta daugybė pančių belaisviams sukaustyti. Bet jie atiteko patiems vokiečiams.

Belaisvių vokiečių mūsiškiai priskaitė iki 3.000. Jų tarpe buvo Vytauto asmeniškasis priešas Markvardas Salcbachas, kuris už savo išlumą sumokėjo galva. Buvęs žemaičių valdytojas Mykolas Kiuchenmeisteris buvo paleistas ir vėliau iškilo, tapęs ordino magistras.

Blaivininkas Jogaila, matydamas, kad kariai bema-

tant išgrobsto kryžuočių atsargas, liepė kryžuočių paruoštas pergales puotai vyno statines sudaužyti, kad kariai nepasigertų, kad drausmė nenukentėtų. Išsiliejęs vynas maišėsi su kritusių karių krauju — ne be reikalo pasakota, kad po šio mūšio kraujo upeliai tekėjo.

Tą pačią dieną po mūšio nei lietuviai nei lenkai toli nesivijo kryžuočių, nes reikėjo pailsėti. Kautynėms pasibaigus, Vytautas su Jogaila liepė tuoj pat prieš saulei nusileidus surinkti lavonus ir pagarbiamai, su maldomis, palaidoti. Paskutinė pagarba buvo atiduota ir kryžuočių magistrui. Jo lavonas buvo nuplautas ežere, įvyniotas į švrią lavondengtę ir pusiau apdengtas nusiųstas į Marienburgą. Jo atmintį ir šiandien ženklina kuklus akmens paminklas (Jungingenstein), stovįs seniau jo garbei pastatytos koplyčios vietoje.

Laimėję sąjungininkai, ilgai nedelsdami, žygiavo per Prūsų žemę link Marienburgo. Kelio buvo 80 mylių. Visas kraštas buvo panikos pagautas: pilis po pilies be pasipriešinimo pasiduodavo, vadai bėgo, riteriai slapstėsi. Laukta visiško ordino sunaikinimo. Paėmę Alenšteiną, Osterodę, Chrisburgą, pasiuntę savo karius į pasidavusius Karaliaučių, Torunę, Graudencą, Dancigą ir kitur, Vytautas su Jogaila liepos 23 d. atsідūrė ties Marienburgo mūrais. Bet jau čia kryžiuočiai buvo spėję išitvirtinti. Energingas Henrikas von Plauenas sutraukė 5000 kariuomenės, suorganizavo gynybą. Marienburgas nepasidavė, o mūsų kariuomenė buvo išvargusi, paplito joje dezinterija, maisto pritrūko. Artėjo ruduo. Iš Livonijos atžygiavo kryžuočių iššauktas tos šakos magistras, kuris turėjo su Vytautu prieš šį karą sudarytą

atskirą taikos sutartį. Prasidėjo derybos. Vytautas su Jogaila nutarė atitraukti savo jėgas nuo kryžuočių sostinės ir patys išvyko į savo namus.

Vytautas, nuskubėjęs nuo Marienburgo į Trakus ir į Gardiną, įsakinėjo kariuomenei ruoštis naujam žygiui; jis planavo vaduoti visą Prūsiją, kurioje, kaip jis pats per žygį galėjo įsitikinti, gyventojų tarpe nebuvo mirės laisvės troškimas. Tuo tarpu susidarė tokios aplinkybės, kad reikėjo eiti prie derybų stalo, nes Vokietijos imperatorius ir popiežius po Žalgirio mūšio smarkiai grasino karu Lietuvai ir Lenkijai. Imperatorius pasiuntė kariuomenę prie Lenkijos pasienio.

1411 m. vasario 1 d. Torunėje buvo pasirašyta taikos sutartis. Abi pusės pasižadėjo pasikeisti belaisviais; už gražinimą kryžuočiams jų miestų, pastarieji pasižadėjo sumokėti aniems laikams daug pinigų, 100.000 čekų kapų grašių; Zemaitija atiduodama Vytautui iki jo gyvos galvos, o lenkų ir kryžiuočių ginčytina nedidelė Dobžinės žemė — Lenkijai. Kaip žinome, tik po kito karo, per Melno sutartį 1422 metais Vytautas atgavo, be jokių sąlygų, Žemaičius, bet reikalaujamos jo tėvonijos, Prūsų žemės su Karaliaučium iki Ossos upės kryžiuočiai neatidavė.

Bet Žalgirio mūšio pati svarbiausioji pasekmė buvo vokiečių veržimosi į rytus (Drang nach Osten) sustabdymas. Po mūšio kryžuočių ordinas niekad neatsigavo. Pagaliau jis tapo Lenkijos pavaldiniu. Tik 1915 metais, antrojo Tanenbergo mūšio metu (t. y. po 505 metų) vokiečiai tegalėjo iš naujo veržtis į Rytus. Dėkui Vytautui, kad Rytų Europa nebuvo suvokietinta.

KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA JUBILEE YEAR

COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT

A meeting of the Jubilee Committee was held at the Barbizon-Plaza Hotel in New York City Saturday, May 21, 1960. Attending the meeting were: Joseph Boley, Larry Janonis, Joseph Sakevich, Loretta Kassel. Other members of the committee, who were unable to be present are: Rev. Albert Contons, Anthony Mazeika, Helen Shields, Jack Stukas.

Those attending decided to present the following recommendations regards Jubilee Year activities and plans to the 47th National Convention to be held in Worcester, Mass.

1. Permanent Jubilee Year Committee:

A permanent Jubilee Year Committee should be chosen by the Convention. This committee would exist until the end of the Jubilee Year, and would direct all preparations for and activities during the Jubilee Convention. In addition, this committee would direct and encourage councils and districts to properly commemorate the Jubilee Year in general. It would seek what help it needs from the Supreme Council and from members of various areas.

It should be noted that the present committee was selected by the current Supreme Council, and as such is temporary, unless reappointed by the next Council. A permanent committee would not be subject to this disadvantage, as it would be approved by the Convention and thus not need reappointment with each new Council.

2. Jubilee Year:

As 1963 is the year of the Jubilee Convention, the entire calendar year of 1963 should be designated as the "Knights of Lithuania Golden Jubilee Year." Each council and district should be urged to sponsor an activity or a series of activities sometime during the year to appropriately commemorate the Jubilee, and should see that these activities and the Jubilee and K. of L. in general be given vast publicity among the general public in its area.

3. K. of L. History:

A K. of L. History should be published in time for the Jubilee Year Convention. The extent of the project must depend on the amount of moral and financial support it receives.

Mr. Ignas Sakalas of Chicago is currently working on collecting data for the history. As such a project is not the job for one person alone, it is recommended that a permanent History Committee be chosen also. This committee should comprise at least one person from each District. This person should be someone possessing adequate time and interest to devote to the project, and would be responsible for collecting and

assembling information, pictures, etc. from the councils in his or her area, to be used in the history. These District representatives would also aid in compiling the History, and in making decisions as to its extent, language, etc.

It is further recommended that the following schedule be followed by the History Committee:

Aug. 1960 — Aug. 1961 — Collect and sort all needed material.

Aug. 1961 — Aug. 1962 — Compile the History, i. e. assemble, write, edit.

Aug. 1962 — Aug. 1963 — Prepare final printed copy.

An all-out campaign should be conducted to collect funds for the history's publication, particularly from K. of L. and non - K. of L. businessmen and philanthropists.

4. Jubilee Year Convention:

Because of the importance to the Knights of Lithuania of the Jubilee Year National Convention, it is recommended that the Supreme Council, rather than any individual council, act as hosts for that Convention, that all of that Convention's activity be under complete control of the Supreme Council, and that the Supreme Council aid the Jubilee Committee in selecting the convention site, deciding what type of activity be held during Convention week, and choosing people from the Convention City to chairman the various activities.

The Supreme Council would also sponsor an extensive Convention Program Book, and in fact get the profit from the book. It is suggested that an arrangement be made whereby councils or districts derive a percentage of the profits realized from the ads they obtain. Also, individual councils of the host city could sponsor certain of the activities, and keep the profits from these activities.

It is further urged that more activity of a cultural nature be promoted during the Jubilee Convention. The activity can, perhaps, begin early in the week, and include concerts, exhibits, parades, Lithuanian song and dance feats, open to the general public and highly advertised, especially to attract the non K. of L. Lithuanian people and to bring the name of the Knights of Lithuania into the public eye.

The convention site should be carefully chosen, and should possess the following characteristics:

- a. Adequate facilities to accommodate the various suggested cultural activities;
- b. Enough appeal to attract a large K. of L. attendance at the Convention;
- c. A council or councils in the area active enough to take on the burden of the increased activity of this special Convention;

d. A large enough local Lithuanian population to make the planned activities worthwhile and to obtain the needed publicity.

The 1963 Convention site should be selected not later than August of 1961, and should be approved by the 1961 Convention.

5. VYTIS:

Each District of the K. of L. should be asked to sponsor one issue of the VYTIS during the 1963 Jubilee Year. These issues could be used to publicize the District's Jubilee activities and introduce the other member of the K. of L. to the various district and council activities and leaders. In sponsoring the issue, the District could solicit local ads for the VYTIS to help defray the cost of publishing the issue.

6. Miscellaneous Suggestions:

A general effort should be made by all members to improve and streamline the organization in preparation for the Jubilee Year. In particular:

- Membership should be greatly increased, in fact doubled if possible by then.
- The Constitution revisions should be completed and published well in advance of 1963.
- More and wider publicity should be sought for the many K. of L. projects — on the council, district, and national levels.

It was decided that the above recommendation be presented to the 1960 Convention, with appropriate

summaries of the reasoning behind the recommendations, and that delegates be asked to approve these suggestions, so that the Jubilee Committee can have something to start work with.

ON COMPLACENCY

Summer has passed. The anticipation with which summer was met is a feeling now forgotten. The excitements, the delights, and the disappointments of the passing season have dwindled into fragments of memory — no longer the pressing, vital issues that exhilarated or depressed our day. The new season has begun, bringing with it a glorious array of color that sends thousands of beauty-loving spectators to the unblemished, undisturbed havens where nature is at her best.

But, neither do the beautifully-colored leaves remain on the trees permanently; when the next season announces its arrival, they, too, graciously bow out — leaving an uncluttered scene for winter to bluster into. And thus, the cycle of the year goes on uninterruptedly — waiting for no one, catering to no one. New calendars are printed, old ones discarded; and life goes on.

But, what happens to us? Do we change, or do we remain complacently the same as we were three summers before? Perhaps our hair-do is different, and a dress size has vanished — perhaps we have lowered our voice to a more sophisticated tone. Or have we just become a little older in years, but remain the same in attitudes and ambitions?

We are complacent; but we have not earned our complacency. Others have; they have died to earn it. And still we have a smug complacency—deep set, too.

America is complacent. America is complacent because it is the greatest, wealthiest, most civilized nation in the world and believes

that the dollar is validly analagous to the Rock upon which Peter built His Church, and that not even the gates of Hell will prevail against it. All this even while three are significant overtones to the words "Holy Russia" and "peaceful co-existence".

America will answer one question concerning which it has been overly hesitant.

Whither?

Students are complacent because Christ has said He will be with us all days even to the consummation of the world, and the students figure themselves part of the "us." This is the philosophical bulwark for their complacency. The materialistic and, because it is experiential the realistic bulwark for their complacency is concerned with the social column, the football team, the best party, and the most sophisticated dress.

As for America, our country, we can only urge the Holy Ghost to give the leader a lantern.

And the young adults of the country — already through with student days? Complacency?

We do not now need soldiers with guns as much as we need soldiers with pens. We do not need bourgeois security, a new car at the alumni reunion and the label "success" as much as we need young Catholic writers, lecturers, professors at secular universities, a Catholic Mil-lay, a Catholic Wolfe, a Catholic Hutchins, a Catholic Einstein.

We also need a few more notches in our belts, a broken heart or two, soleless shoes, soul-full bodies, and less aversion for poverty. All of these imitative of Christ, no less.

What about response to the Dia-

logue Mass effort? (Aren't there always plenty of seats for the parish-ioners?)

What about the lassitude in Religion or Theology classes? (May not live discussion offset a dull text?)

What about the refusal of blood to an anemic Sodality? (Don't we need two-fisted lecturers badly enough?)

What about the mite boxes? (Give the pennies to the mission; they are fighting a just battle.)

What about weekly Communion? (How can we defend America if we cannot defend ourselves?)

And what about the great vice, ego? (Do we have to tell everybody what we are, and where we're from. Wouldn't it be better if we could let them know by our womanliness, rather than by a lot of sniveling externals?)

What about our brothers and sisters in Christ? (Are we Manicheans? Was heaven made for "our kind" alone? Turn your class ring around and remember there's a greater Alma Mater called humanity).

What about the "Vy-tis?" (If you don't like it, there is one way to remedy it — write for it.)

What about lots more; but mainly what about doing something toward that Catholic Statesman, that Catholic poet, that Catholic novelist, that Catholic scientists, that Catholic philosopher?

These are our unanswered questions. That is why we may not be complacent. In whatever complacency we find ourselves, we will, nonetheless, be restless until we have sought answers.

Negaliu apsaityti savo džiaugsmą ir tokį Tavo gerumą, kurį parodei taip gausiai mane apdovanojama. Tokių gražių dovanėlių savo gyvenime nesu turėjusi. Džiaugsmo ašaros riedėjo skruostais, kai skaičiau Tavo man taip mielą laišką, kad prisiminei mane, vargo našlaitę.

Tose žūtbutinėse partizanų kovose žuvo ir okupantų buvo žiauriai išniekinti mano tėvelis ir mamytė. Paliko mane vienišą šešerių metų. Buvo baugu ir labai liūdna, šaukiau ir visa drebėjau iš susijaudinimo. Pradžioje ramino mane ir globojo kaimynai, vėliau atvažiavo dėdė iš Vilniaus ir paėmė mane savo globon. Jo dėka aš baigiau pradžios, vidurinę ir muzikos mokyklą, o dabar lankau Vilniaus konservatoriją. Mokausi skambinti fortepijonu. Jau dvylika metų mokausi muzikos, kuri man labai patinka, ir mokslas sekasi gerai. Dažnai lankau koncertus, kurių Vilniuje būna daug. Koncertuoja čia ir pianistai ir smuikininkai ir simfoniniai orkestrai ir daugelis kitų menininkų. Vilniuje kocertai vyksta Valstybinėje filharmonijoje arba konservatorijos salėje. Be to, Vilniuje yra trys teatrai — Akademini Operos ir Baletos teatras, Valstybinis akademini dramos teatras ir Rusų dramos teatras.

Operos ir baletos teatre statomi žymiųjų pasaulio kompozitorių dalykai — Čaikovskio baletai ir operos, Gounod Faustas, Bizet — Karmen, Verdi — Traviata, Puccini — Madam Buterflay ir kt. Greta šių yra nemažai lietuviškų operų ir baletų. Tai Klovos operos: Pilėnai, Vaiva (pagal V. Krėvės apysaką), Račiūno opera Marytė, Pakalnio Sužadėtinė, Dvariono Dalia (pagal B. Sruogos Apyaušrio dalią). Lietuvių sukurtieji baletai: Juzeliūno — Ant marių kranto, Indros Audronė ir kt. Dramos teatras irgi stato gražių ir įdomių spektaklių.

Vilniaus gyventojai labai noriai ir gausiai lanko visų rūšių teatrus, nes tai užsimiršimas ir atsigavimas sunkiam bolševikinės priespaudos gyvenime.

Thanks again, to the support of the New York-New Jersey District and cooperation of the Spiritual Advisers and Junior Counselors of the District, the SECOND JUNIOR KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA RALLY was held Sunday, April 24, 1960 at St. Casimir's Hall, Philadelphia, Penna. 100 Juniors attended the Rally. Basically, the program was similar to the previous Rally, with several innovations, one of them being a Lithuanian Easter Egg Decoration Contest. Three winners were presented with plaques. The Junior Knights of Bayonne, N. J. extended an invitation to hold the Third Junior Knights of Lithuania Rally in Bayonne, N. J.

I take this opportunity to thank each and everyone who helped to make the Rally a success. Special thanks to the N. Y. - N. J. District and its councils that supplied financial aid, Seniors and Juniors of Council 3, and Frank Vaskas for the public relations work and his kind donation.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude to Stanley Vaitkus, President of the Mid-Central District for his sincere cooperation in his efforts to sponsor a Rally for the Mid-Central Junior Knights. Unfortunately, the

Rally did not take place, due to lack of response from councils requesting approval of the selected date.

Am happy to report that the New England District is planning a K. of L. Youth Seminar October 2nd in Providence, R. I. under the leadership of the 4 Spiritual Advisers of the New England District Junior Councils.

Congratulations to Councils 79 and 102 of Detroit, Michigan who embarked on a new venture that we hope will be a new era for the Knights of Lithuania. Under their guidance, they sponsored a K. of L. Youth Camp at Dainava, in Manchester, Michigan the week of August 14 to 20, 1960. We hope that they will plan to hold another camp week next year, and greater cooperation will be received from K. of L. members everywhere.

Recommendations:

1. That each District establish a Committee for the express purpose of strengthening, organizing and coordinating the Junior K. of L. activities of their District Juniors. Each committee to maintain a close relationship to the Supreme Board through the 1st Vice President.
2. That Council Officers exert their effort to find a person or persons who would be willing to serve as Junior Counselors. Lack of such people is one of the main reasons why Junior Councils do not exist in many areas.
3. Senior Councils request periodic reports from their Junior Counselor on activities of their Junior Councils.
4. Some system be set up, whereby all Junior members would be registered in the Supreme Council.

In conclusion, I would like to say that it was a great privilege and honor to serve as National Vice President in charge of Juniors for a second term, and wish to thank my fellow Supreme Council Officers, Spiritual Advisers, the K. of L. Public Relations Committee and each and everyone who by their advice, encouragement, or work, aided me to perform my duties for the betterment of the Junior Knights of Lithuania. SENATOR THOMAS J. DODD'S ADDRESS

"This country should make liberation of the Captive Nations 'a cardinal goal of our diplomacy'."

Senator Dodd addressed his remarks to delegates to the 47th annual convention of the Knights of Lithuania which awarded him a special medal for his efforts to restore the freedom of Lithuania.

"I do not underestimate the difficulty of persuading the Kremlin to liberate its satellite empire," he pointed out. "But, after Hungary, I find it easy to conceive of a situation where a combination of division within the Kremlin, unrest in the satellites and hard bargaining on the part of the West will induce the Soviets... in their own interest... to grant freedom to the unyielding, troublesome captive peoples of Europe.

"Liberation is not a pipe dream. It is the only conceivable way in which we can recapture the political offensive. And, as every school boy knows, a side which defends itself when attacked but never takes the offensive, is bound to lose."

Senator Dodd said that this country can encourage the liberation movement by raising the issue of the Captive Nations at every diplomatic conference and at every UN session.

"Let us spread the facts about Soviet imperialism on the record at every available opportunity," he declared. "Let us continue to demand that the Soviets respect all their obligations."

Senator Dodd praised the Lithuanians for their continued fight for freedom.

"No people in the world has fought more heroically for freedom, or suffered more cruelly under tyranny, or clung more tenaciously to their national identity, their cultural and spiritual heritage, their faith in the ultimate triumph of freedom."

Ji yra šešiolikametė ir jau bebai-
gianti augštesniąją mokyklą. Jos mo-
kytojai, draugės ir kaimynai laiko
ją malonia ir nuoširdžia mergaite.
Žmonės ją mėgsta, ir ji yra pagei-
daujama jaunimo susibūrimuose.
Niekas blogo žodžio apie ją nepasa-
ko — visi pagirdami apie ją atsilie-
pia.

— O, kad aš turėčiau šitokią duk-
relę! — neviena iš kaimynių pagal-
voja.

Tokia ji kitiems atrodo. Gi namie
su saviškiais ji esti visai kitokia.
Svetimiesiems ji saldžiai šypsosi ir
saulute šviečia, o saviesiems būna
nuolat susiraukusi pikčiurna: nepa-
slaugi, šiurkštaus žodžio, visada ne-
patenkinta, daug reikalaujanti, prie-
kabi ir nemandagi...

Prieš kelerius metus jis baigė
siektuosius mokslus ir dabar sėk-
mingai dirba vienoje istaigoje. Jo
viršininkai ir bendradarbiai juo
džiaugiasi: jis yra geras darbinin-
kas, tvarkingai elgiasi, meilus ir
moka pagerbti kitą žmogų.

Kad šitoks jis būtų ir savo šeimo-
je! Deja, čia jis visai kitoks pasiro-
do: jis — nuolatinis šeimos nuotai-
kos gadintojas, nekartą piktu žo-
džiu ir aštriu elgesiu skausmą ir liū-
desį namiškiuose sukeliąs. Jo buvi-
mas namie yra lyg sunkus akmuo,
šeiminę laimę slegiąs. Jis ir pats ne-
sijaučia laimingas dėl šitokio spyg-
liuotojo elgesio su saviškiais: juk
kas kitų, tegu ir savo namiškių, lai-
mę ardo, ir pats negali jos turėti.

Ir šis yra ne kokia nors išimtis —
tokių būna ir daugiau.

Jis — šeimos tėvas: turi rūpestin-
gą žmoną ir trejetą vaikučių. Ir jis
viešajame gyvenime atrodo švelnus
bei sugyvenamas žmogus.

Ne toks jis yra saviškiais namie:
žmona neišgirsta iš jo gero žodžio,
ir savo vaikučių jis nepradžiugina
tėvišku gerumu. Jis jaučiasi savo
pareigas šeimai atliekas, jai pragy-
venimą parūpindamas. Betgi šeimos
laimei nepakanka vien duonos: jai
reikia ir tėvo tėviškumo, jo tėviško-
sios širdies. Šeima jaučia tėvą ne
tik iš jo į namus atnešamojo pini-
go, kiek iš jo rūpestingojo ir mei-
liojo tėviškumo. Tėvas šeimai yra
ne vien pragyvenimo parūpintojas:
jis yra jai daug daugiau.

Šeimos laimei klestėti reikia ne
vien materialinio tėvo, bet kartu ir
dvasinio, ir šio pastarojo daug la-
biau už pirmąjį.

O ši yra vaikų motina ir žmona.
Kaimynų, pažįstamųjų ir draugių ji
yra laikoma įsikūnijusiu švelnumu.
Ir tikrai: ji, lyg kokia suokiančioji
lakštingala, sugeba sužavėti pažis-
tamąjį ir svetimąjį; visoje apylinkė-
je ji yra išgarsėjusi ir puošniomis
puotomis. Taigi visi laiko ją malonia
ir meilia moteriške.

Tačiau ne tokia ji esti saviesiems:
jiems ji yra nuolat surūgusi ir lyg
koks dyglys. Retai kada jos vaikai
išgirsta iš jos koki meilesnį žodelį,
ir ji jaučiasi patenkinta, kai jie nes-
ti namie. Ji labai nuobodžiauja, bū-

dama viena su namiškiais ir tuojau
pralinksmėja, kai kas nors atsilan-
ko. Betgi ypač dagi ir aštri ji būna
savo vyrui: jam atitenka ne tik pik-
ti jos žvilgsniai, bet ir visoks panie-
kinimas, net ižeidinėjimas. O geras
bei rūpestingas jis yra kaip tėvas ir
vyras.

Kad nors iš dalies ji būtų tokia
saviškiais, kokia ji esti svetimie-
siems!

Kur šitokia žmona ir motina vai-
ruoja šeimos gyvenimą, ten šeima
negali būti mažuoju rojaus kampe-
liu šioje žemėje.

Motinos ir žmonos gerumas ma-
tuojamasis ne tuo, kiek ji kitiems
šypsosi, bet tuo, kiek ji savo šeimai
esti atsidavusi.

Ir taip neretai pasitaiko, kad ku-
ris nors šeimos narys savo šiurkš-
čiu, gal net ir žiauriu, elgesiu ap-
kartina saviškių gyvenimą. Jei jis
tinkamai ir maloniai elgtųsi, šeimi-
nė laimė galėtų žydėti, nors mate-
rialinės sąlygos čia ir būtų sunkios.
Bet tas jo spygliuotasis ir savimy-
liškasis elgimasis su saviškiais na-
mus dažnai paverčia kapinėmis...

Šeiminio židinio jaukumas parei-
na nuo darnaus ir pasiaukojančio
visų šeimos narių sugyvenimo. Šei-
ma yra pirmoji ir pagrindinė vieta,
kur visi jos nariai turėtų vienas ki-
tą palaikyti, stiprinti ir gaiviu ryž-
tu nuteikti gyvenimo kovai nepails-
tamai ir garbingai kovoti.

Menkos vertės yra toks šeimos
narys, kuris kitiems angelu šypsosi,
o saviesiems esti lyg plėšrus vilkas.

Jei šeimoje tarp jos narių nėra
darnos, užuojautos, paslaugos, savi-
tarpinio supratimo, pasiaukojimo
dvasios ir šeiminio jautrumo, tokia
šeima dažniausiai kada nors ištinka
šeiminę tragediją.

With my election last August, I have performed my duties as well as circumstances permitted. My position was handicapped throughout the year because the previous Secretary did not turn over all the records to me. Therefore, my report at this time is incomplete.

During the year, notices were sent to 386 delinquent members. Payments were made by 180 which leaves 206 in default, to date. Each Council Financial Secretary was notified of these delinquent members. Four members died during the year.

As of August 14, 1960, we have a total of 5 Districts, namely: New England, New York-New Jersey, Mid-Central, Illinois - Indiana and California; 39 active regular councils, 4 Senior Councils, 10 Junior Councils, 84 priests, 263 families, and 25 members in the Armed Forces. 

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

LORETTA I. KASSELL

Five regular Supreme Council meetings were held during the period of August, 1959 — August, 1960. All members of the Supreme Council and committees were notified by me of the details of these meetings several weeks before each meeting and were sent copies of the minutes after the meetings. Because the locations of these meetings were geographically inconvenient for me, I was able to attend only two of them. A temporary secretary took and assembled the minutes of the other three meetings and left only their distribution to me.

In connection with with a special, Supreme Council - type meeting of Midwest Leaders held in Chicago in February, I sent invitations to all district officers and council presidents of the Midwest as well as to all Supreme Council and National Committee members, and submitted a report of this meeting afterwards to the regular Supreme Council meeting held in New York in May.

In addition, I sent out invitations to the National

Convention in Worcester to all the Lithuanian Consuls in the U. S., as well as to various other Lithuanian dignitaries and to Honorary Members and Past Presidents of the K. of L.

A special letter was sent to all District and Council presidents requesting complete lists of the names and addresses of their respective spiritual advisers, officers and committee heads. Only 25 councils and two districts responded. The names and addresses of the various committee chairmen, etc. of those districts and councils were compiled and sent to the National Chairmen of the respective committees.

A variety of other correspondence dealing with various phases of national and local K. of L. business and activity was carried out as needed during the year.

As a member of the Supreme Council, I also participated in the work of the Jubilee Year and the Constitution Committees.

All correspondence, reports, minutes, pertaining to K. of L. business and my office have been filed and will be turned over to my replacement or to the K. of L. National Archives after completion of my tenure of office.
