National President ROBERT S. S. BORIS

The following resume could have well been captioned "Lithuanian Catholic Education - Its Results," for unfolding: everything that goes to make up our subject's life, you will notice the influence of both home and school, Catholic and Lithuanian.

William Charles In Street World

This reference is to fellow Knight Robert Boris; who was born in Detroit on April 30, 1930 into St. Anthony's parish, where under the scholarly guidance of the late Father Ignatius Boreisis and the saintly Sisters of St. Francis, a great character was molded with the assistance of his parents. Incidentally, his mother was born in Grand Rapids, in SS. Peter and Paul parish, as was Bishop Charles Salatka. (The council of the parish, C-139, was recently reactivated through Bob's efforts). There, too, we find the same order of Franciscan nuns.

His entire education was under Catholic auspices - from grammar school to Holy Redeemer High and eventually the College of Commerce and Finance at the famous Jesuit University of Detroit (where he was secretary of the Student Council). These were instrumental in getting him where he is now, assistant treasurer and officer at the United States Cold Storage Corporation in Detroit.

On the K of L side of his life, we find that Bob Boris first joined the Knights at St. Anthony's Parish (Council 102) in 1948 and before long became quite active in its meetings, activities, and conventions. He served on the board of C-102 in many capacities, including president, and re-



cently was responsible for the initiation of a Junior Council 102. The Mid-Central District has also welcomed Bob's assistance and guidance in its various committees and projects.

Only four years after joining the K of L, Bob became Supreme Council Second Vice-President, in charge of membership. He was chairman of the 46th National Convention in Detroit in 1959, then, in recognition of his leadership ability and his many labors on behalf of the organization, he was elected National President of the K of L in 1960, re-elected in 1961 and again in 1962.

His K of L activities indicate a man of boundless energy. We might even say that he has more irons in the fire than Vulcan, or shall we say Perkunas! His presence as president at the last national convention, with its many problems, was enough to test the mettle of the strongest man, especially since major policy changes in the U.S. Cold Storage Corporation

also required that at least his thoughts be back in Detroit! Evidently he survived the ordeal.

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DOAVITIE HATTOS are much much more

Regardless which part of his life we attempt to portray, we inevitably find it entwined with a burning zeal for the K of L. His work in organizing or reactivating councils in Detroit and elsewhere, assisting the formation of junior councils, representing the K of L at local and national Lithuanian functions and observances, not to mention his other commitments - high school class instructor for the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, earlier work with the DP Resettlement Committee, choir work, editor of an earlier "Vyčių Kardas," establishing camping for the K of L Juniors, a church usher, Father Stahievicius' great helper at St. Anthony's upon the death of their beloved former pastor Fr. Boreisis, etc. etc. It is not amazing that he was awarded the 4th Degree. a few years ago, for "ignorance is not bliss" with Bob in discerning the hierarchy of values.

The Boris home, with the remarkable hospitality of Bob and his parents, has been the haven for many visiting Lithuanians, lay and clerical. In spite of his limited time, Bob is still able to relax with his hobbies - good books and classical recordings.

This is your life, Bob-devotion to the K of L, to Lithuania, to the Lithuanians and to Archibishop Dearden's admonition to the conventioners at Detroit, "Preserve the Catholic Lithuanian traditions, for they are good for the family and the Faith."


"Pity Me, Pity Me, O You My Friends..."

THE GREEN OAK, Selected Lithuanian Poetry. Edited by Algirdas Landsbergis and Clark Mills. Published, April 1962, by VOYAGES PRESS, 35 W. 75th St., New York 23, N.Y.

Present day and earlier century poetry and song in English translation, is beautifully presented in GREEN OAK. THE Edited by Algirdas Landsbergis and Clark Mills, this extensive collection provides American Lithuanians with an opportunity to become better acquainted with such prominent Lithuanian poets as Maironis, B. Brazdžionis, A. Skema, A. Mickiewicz, and others. At the same time, non-Lithuanian poetry lovers will delight in the "unexpected freshness" of the book's contents, as the Lithuanian poems and folk songs are simple, direct, and intimately bound to the land and the forces of nature.

GREEN OAK opens with an int-

roduction by the editors, giving an insight into the background and development of a poetic tradition hitherto unknown to the English speaking peoples. A section of the book is devoted to the "dainos" or folk songs, of which Robert Payne has said:

"The 'dainos' of Lithuania have a beauty and pure primitive splendor above anything I know in western literature. They seem to have been written at the morning of the world, and the dew is stll on them. The people. . . sang artlessly, as though singing were as easy as breathing, but how much art there is in their artlessness! This is where song begins."

The book is a collaborative effort of Lithuanian and American scholars, writers, and poets and includes twenty-three translators' work.

MAIRONIS - BARD OF LITHUANIA

ALGIRDAS BUDRECKIS

Maironis contributed to the Lithuanian cultural treasury with his great lyrical poems. With his exconveying social cellent poems, themes, he aroused love of fatherland, encouraged hope for a national resurrection and expressed a deep dissatisfaction with the tsarist oppression. Deep experiences and heartfelt lyricism also comprise the themes of Maironis' poetry. As a lyricist Maironis created artistic picturesqueness. Strong emotional force, romanticism and even classical simplicity and clarity are typical of his style. His compositions formed a whole school of poetic expression which had a great positive influence on the evolution of Lithuanian poetry. Therefore, it is fitting, on this the occasion of the 100th anniversary of Maironis' birth, to summarily comment on his life and literary works.

Jonas Mačiulis, who used the pen name of Maironis, was born on November 2, 1862 in Siluva township, county of Raseiniai. His parents were free peasants, possessing their own land. Lithuanian was the spoken language of the Mačiulis family, although the parents, in their relations with the estate owners, spoke Polish.

Having received primary education at home and having learned the Polish language, Jonas Mačiulis entered the Kaunas high school (gimnazija) in 1873. He began writing while in the sixth grade. The young poet's first poems were in Polish, later he destroyed these early attempts.

While at the high school, Maironis became acquainted with the works of the Polish poets - A. Mickevičius, J. Kraszewski, J. Slowacki; their works greatly influenced him with their romantic pathos, themes of bygone days.

Completing high school in 1883, Maironis went to study literature at Kiev University. "Literature, especially my people's," he wrote,

"attracted me to it since my first student days." At Kiev, Maironis became exposed to the works of A. Pushkin, N. Lermontov, N. Gogol and other great Russian and Ukrainian poets. The influence of classical Russian poetry is noticeable in Maironis' themes. The poet studied at Kiev for one year; here Maironis' patriotic fervor was strengthened. He wrote an article defending the rights of the Lithuanian Language to the influential Russian newspaper "Novoe Vremia" under the pseudonym of Liaudies Mokytojas (People's Teacher).

After studying literature at Kiev for only a year, Maironis, mindful of his parents' wishes and also influenced by his companion A. Vytartas (later editor of the Catholic "Sviesa''), entered the Kaunas Theological Seminary in 1884. At that time A. Baranauskas taught the Lithuanian language and literature at the seminary. Young Maironis was strongly influenced by Baranauskas' ''Anykščių Silelis'' and the latter's deep interest in the Lithuanian language. Maironis dedicated his first poem in Lithuanian, "Lietuva," to Baranauskas. Maironis also received a Lithuanian language backstrong ground from the famous linguist K. Jaunius, who also taught at the seminary.

Maironis quickly became an active participant in the Lithuanian national movement. He first wrote a poem for the newspaper "Aušra" in 1885, which was entitled "Lietuvos Vargas" under the pseudonym of Zvalionis. This poem, which expressed Maironis' typical motif - romantic enchantment with Lithuania's past - was later entitled "Miškas ir lietuvis" by the poet and finally entitled "Miškas ūžia" (The Forest Rustles).

While at the seminary Maironis became even more acquainted with Polish romantic literature. Strongly influenced by it, he began to study Lithuania's history in earnest, especially the works of M. Strijkowski, J. Kraszewski, T. Norbutas and S. Daukantas. The direct result of these studies was Maironis' first published book: "History of Lithuania" (Lietuvos istorija arba apsakymai apie Lietuvos praeiga, 1891). He used the pen name of Zanavykas. The third edition was enlarged to include a conspective of Lithuanian Although this work had literature. romantic tendencies, it was probably the most objective history by a Lithuanian during the 19th century. Maironis' ''Lietuvos istorija'' was used as a textbook in the schools of independent Lithuania.

Graduating from the Kaunas Theological Seminary in 1888, Maironis continued his studies in the St. Petersburg Theological Academy (1888-1892). During his study of theology, Maironis devoted little time to poetic composition. For the first time, he signed one of his poems ('Ne taip senoves teval gyveno'') of this period with the pen name ''Maironis'' (literally: Marjoram).

When he began to teach at the St. Petersburg Theological Academy (1892-1894), Maironis' poetic talent burst forth in fruitful profusion. During this period, Maironis' famous collection of poems "Pavasario balsai" (first edition 1895) appeared. In 1895 Maironis, using the name St. Garnys, published the poem "Tarp skausmų į garbę", which after several years was completely rewritten by the poet and entitled "Jaunoji Lietuva" (1908). Living in Petersburg, Maironis also wrote the libretto for "Kame išganymas" (1896) and a poem in Polish "Znad Biruty" (From Birute's Mount, 1904).

Maironis cooperated with the young priests who published the newspapers "Žemaičių ir Lietuvos apžvalga," "Tėvynės Sargas." Later, when the Lithuanians began to organize political parties, Maironis, together with A. Jakštas, P. Bučys

Those who read Lithuanian with facility should need no introduction to the beauty of Maironis' work. But, that those not fortunate enough to enjoy and appreciate the works in their original language may "share the wealth", we present here a few selections of the poet's work, translated into English. The translations were taken from THE GREEN OAK, edited by A. Landsbergis and C. Mills, published by Voyage Press, and reviewed elsewhere in this issue.

and other priests formulated the program for the Christian Democratic Party (1907), although Maironis himself did not actively participate in this party's activities.

After the 1905 Revolution, Maironis expressed himself less and less as a lyrical poet. He continually expanded his collection of poetry "Pavasario balsai" with new poems. "Pavasario balsai" went through its fourth edition in 1913. The poem "Raseinių Magdė" was written in 1909. During the First World War, Maironis was in the countryside (in Krekenava, Upytė), where he experienced the harshness of the German occupation.

During the period of national independence, Maironis was the rector of the Kaunas Theological Seminary. Since 1922, he was a professor at the Lithuanian University, teaching among other things a course in world literature. During this period Maironis expanded and re-edited two publications of "Pavasario balsai" (1920, 1927), completed the poem "Mūsų vargai" (1920), created several ballads ("Jūratė ir Kastytis!". "Čičinskas"), three rhymed dramas ("Kęstučio mirtis", "Vytautas pas kryžiuočius," "Vytautas karalius," 1922-1930), a libretto for "Nelaimingos Dangutės vestuvės' (1927). There is evidence in Maironis' archives that he wanted to write another rhymed historical drama about Barbara Radvila, however this plan of the poet's was never realized.

Toward the end of his life, Maironis published a re-written and expanded Lithuanian History (Lietuvos Praeitis), also a "Short History of Universal Literature" (both works in 1926). At the same time he planned to edit a chrestomathy of translations of the world literary classics, however he found time to translate only 5 fragments of Hindu Rigveda hymns. His translation of the 11th century Hindu poet Bilhana's love song "Chaura-panchasika" is a masterpiece.

J. Mačiulis-Maironis died in Kaunas on June 28, 1932. Maironis

Septyniolika milijonų šio krašto jaunimo nuo 13 iki 18 metų amžiaus yra beveik tauta šioje tautoje. Tas jaunimas turi daugiau negu savo bendrus bruožus. Jis turi savo skonį, savo pomėgius, savo panšią išviršinę išvaizdą, savo veiksmus, reagavimus.

Ateities viltis

Apskritai kalbant, vietinį jaunimą galima būtų suskirstyti į tris stambias grupes. Pirmąją grupę sudaro rimtasis, dorasis, mąslusis jaunimas. Jis yra drausmingas, klauso savo tevų bei vyresniųjų, mėgsta mokytis ir domisi kultūra. Jis mēgsta naudingai ir džiugiai praleisti jaunystę, o veda tik subrendęs, gavęs atestatą ar diplomą, vadinasi, turėdamas kokią profesiją ar kvalifikaciją. Tai kandidatai į valstybinių, prekybinų, švietimo įstaigų ir kariuomenės kadrus; tai būsimieji laisvųjų profesijų žmonės, organizacijų vadovai, politikai, pramonės pirmūnai. Tai tauriųjų šeimų atžalos, Amerikos visuomenės žiedas, jos viltis. Tokio jaunimo yra daug, ir linkėtina, kad jo būtų dar daugiau; kad ir mūsų atžalynas pasektų jo pavyzdžiu.

Eilinis jaunimas

Antroje ir bene skaitlingiausioje grupėje figūruoja eilinis jaunimas. Jis mokslu nesidomi, galvoja paviršutiniškai, ateitimi rimtai nesirūpina. Jis greičiau yra dirginamas jausmų. Tai reklamos, kaip ir savo leng-

vapēdiškumo aukos. Neseniai tas jaunimas buvo ypatingai rēklus, šoko nerdamasis iš kailio, padūkimo apimtas draskė savo pamėgtųjų daininkų drabužius; rėkė ir alpo kokiam naujam kniaukliui atsiradus.

Dabar jis jau kiek rimtesnis. Jis "džaizinimą" jau lyg ir atmeta, ir šokių tempą lėtina. Tiesa, jis dirbti nevengia, kad savo reikalams turėtų atliekamo pinigo ir būtų mažiau priklausomas nuo tėvų. Jis turi savo žargoną, savo madas, sueigų vietas, tik labai nemėgsta priežiūros. Visa bėda kol jauniklis gauna važiavimo licenziją ir įskimba į automobilį. Po to jis jaučiasi pakankamai savarankus vykti kur tik jam patinka ir daryti pasimatymus.

Surimtėjimo priežastis pasirodo esanti to jaunimo palinkimas į skubų ir "ištikimą" poravimąsi. Šito siekiama savotišku būdu. Pradedant net nuo 13 m. amžiaus, porelė griežtai reikalauja viens antro ištikimybės. Nei jam, nei jai nevalia flirtuoti ar šokti su pašaliniais. Jei katras neatsiliepia telefonu, turi pasiaiškinti, kur tuo metu buvęs. Ištikimybei užantspauduoti, simpatijai nuperkamas koks blizgutis.

Geresniu atveju, po to jau seka vedybos, dažnokai be tevų pritarimo. Padidėja šeima, pradeda slėgti pragyvenimo rūpesčiai. Pasigirsta vienas antro kaltinimai, prasideda nesusipratimai, kartais įtarimai, nebenuslepiamas nusivylimas, ir galiausiai prieinama prie išsiskyrimo, nes vesdamiesi, girdi, gerai nesupra-

tę viens antro. Pasitaiko ir kantrių, sugyvenančių porelių, bet jų maža.

Ko galima tikėtis iš to jaunimo ateityje? Žemės jis nepajudins. Dalis jo surimtės, ištvers, gyvens padoriai. Dalis liks viskam abejinga, išskyrus savo pilvą ir stikliukėlį. Dalis palūš dvasia ir arba dabar, arba vėliau pasineš pragaištingu keliu. Trumpai kalbant, nei pažangios tautos lūkesčių visiškai pateisins, nei suteiks jai pasididžiavimo.

Blogiausia dalis

Trečiajai grupei lieka kriminalinis jaunimas ir chuliganai. Visa tai
išrieda iš po girtuoklių tėvų, iš pakrikusių, išiskyrusių, apsiskandalijusių šeimų. Ši jaunų piktadarių grupė sudaro, kaip sakoma, tris procentus viso jaunimo. Tai krašto nelaimė, tai grėsmė Amerikos visuomenei, tai tos visuomenės gėda.

Svarstoma ir galvojama kaip sutramdyti tuos išsigimėlius. Kaltinama televizija, kriminalinė bei pornografinė literatūra; priekaištaujama religinėms organizacijoms, mokyklai ir valdžiai. Nors valdžia ir išlaiko specialius pataisos namus tiems nelaimingiems padarams, bet ir esamuose kalėjimuose jauni prasikaltėliai nebesutelpa.

Matyti, jog kova sunki, o laisvėmis apsvaigę veiksniai girežtesnių priemonių vis dar nesiryžta griebtis.

Lithuanian Kitchen...

- 8 large Idaho potatoes
- 1 large can evaporated milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 pound bacon
- 1/2 pound butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt, or more to taste.
- 1. Pare and hand grate potatoes. Put through sieve or cheesecloth, pressing dry. Put potatoes in a large bowl, setting aside the juice. Add milk to potatoes. Beat each egg until fluffy and stir into potato mixture, one at a time.
- 2. Cut bacon into chips and fry until crisp. Set aside. Melt butter slowly and fry onion in butter until

transparent and slightly brown. Set aside to cool.

3. Pour off top part of reserved potato juice and add the starchy portion remaining to the potato mixture. Mix in bacon and drippings, onion and butter and salt.

4. Pour mixture into greased oblong cake pans or bread pans three-fourths full. Bake in 350-degree oven for about 1 hour or until crust is golden brown and bakes away from sides of pan.

Our warmest and sincerest congratulations to the two new Honorary Members: THE MOST REVEREND CHARLES A. SALATKA, Auxiliary Bishop of Grand Rapids, and FRANK VASKAS.



Last March, Americans of Lithuanian descent throughout the United States were thrilled and honored by the elevation to the Episcopacy of CHARLES A. SALATKA, first American-Lithuanian Bishop. In August the Knights of Lithuania were especially privileged to have the new Bishop elevated to Honorary Membership

The Most Reverend Charles Salatka was born in Grand Rapids in 1918, and received his elementary education at the SS. Peter and Paul school, under the direction of the Lithuanian Sisters of St. Francis. The influence of the Sisters, as well as that of his immigrant parents, did much to instill in the Bishop a love for Lithuania and her culture. He was ordained in 1945. After several years' study in Rome, Bishop Salatka returned to his native state and diocese, to serve as Diocesan Secretary, Vice-Chancellor, and then Papal Chamberlain. Since his elevation to the episcopacy, Bishop Salatka has been Auxiliary Bishop of Grand Rapids.

While his association with the Knights of Lithuania is most recent, Bishop Salatka's interest in the goals of the organization is unquestionably sincere. His warm expression of gratitude during the Convention Banquet, in both Lithuanian and English, touched the heart of every listener, and the thoughts and advise offered to his fellow Knights provided inspiration for all members.

Bishop Salatka has proven himself an outstanding member of the Church's hierarchy and a credit to his fellow Americans of Lithuanian descent. The Knights of Lithuania is indeed proud to now have him a most deserving Honorary Member of the organization.



HONORARY MEMBERSHIP in the Knights of Lithuania was presented to FRANK VASKAS (C-29 Newark, New Jersey) for his dedication to the organization.

Frank, who is a native of Newark, has been a member of the K of L since 1936 when he helped reactivate Council 29. By his numerous articles which appear regularly in the Lithuanian press, and his frequent trips to K of L cities, he is well-known to many of our members.

In Council 29, he has held offices such as Financial Secretary and Trustee; served on the Council publication, "The Key"; was manager of the Softball Team; was and still is the Council VYTIS correspondent.

For the NY-NJ District, in addition to holding various offices and participating on many committees, he has for the past 10 years served as the Public Relations Chairman. In tribute for his efforts in this field, he was, in 1960, made Honorary Public Relations Chairman for the District.

On the Supreme Council level, Frank has served as a National Trustee and for three years, as the Lithuanian Affairs Chairman. He has a most distinguished record in Lithuanian Affairs work and is currently writing over 200 letters each year for the committee.

The K of L is not Frank's only interest, as he also actively belongs to such organizations as the New Jersey Lithuanian Council the United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America (Newark Chapter); and numerous other groups.

The Vaskas-Vaskevicius family tree is well-known for its Lithuanianism. At one time or another, all members of the family belonged to the Newark Council. Frank, by his never-ending dedication well deserves Honorary Membership in the Knights of Lithuania.

LITHUANIA - LAND OF HEROES

The case of Lithuania carries with it a great human story of heroic people. LITHUANIA LAND OF HEROES, prepared and edited by Leonard Valiukas gives an insight into this story, with a description of her background, culture, and her fight for freedom.

The book contains a brief but interesting presentation of Lithuania, her people, and her language. It also shows how Lithuania was occupied and incorporated against her will into the Soviet Union, and describes the heroic fight of the Lithuanian nation against the Kremlin invaders. The second half of the book gives a pictorial view of the Republic of Lithuania as it was during the years of independence, 1918 to 1940.

Leonard Valiukas, who prepared and edited this book, lived more than one year under the Kremlin regime. He is a graduate of the University of Southern California (Los Angeles, Calif.) and holds B.A. and M.A. degrees in Political Science from this institution of higher education. He has been a student of Soviet relations for more than two decades.

With this book, Mr. Valiukas, also an active member of K of L Council 133 in Los Angeles, provides at least one effective weapon to oppose the war of propaganda and lies being waged throughout the world by the advocates of Communism.

Another talk by one of the officers or some other member from one's own or neighboring council could discuss the basic principles upon which our organization rests. This informational talk would be beneficial to all of us and especially to our newer members, who very often are deprived of an explanation of the ideals and purposes of the organization.

Include in the program a soloist, if available, and, with the aid of song sheets and a leader or accompanist, some community singing. Top everything off with a serving of coffee and you will have begun the Jubilee not only in a fitting and dignified manner, but you will have strengthened the council.

The preparation for this meeting cannot be haphazard. Everything must be done in genuine Kof L spirit and style, for our guests will judge us in the smallest details, beginning with the invitations and ending with our conversation among ourselves and with our guests. Aim to make this program as Lithuanian as possible, if only to demonstrate that we believe in what our organization professes to stand for. Such a meeting will lay the proper foundation for other Jubilee activities to follow.


