STATE OF THE ORGANIZATION REPORT

The 55th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania "State of the Organization" report was compiled from the reports of the national president, the various Supreme Council officers and chairmen.

SPIRITUAL ADVISOR

The K of L is truly grateful to our Spiritual Advisor, the Reverend Victor Krisciunevicius of Detroit, for his wise counsel and guidance throughout this past year. His report to the convention appears in this issue.

PRESIDENT

Our National President, Alexander Wesey-Vasiliauskas, reported that the past year was a very busy one not only for himself but also for all of the Supreme Council members. Five S.C. meetings wherein routine business of the organization was handled and discussed. Despite the hardship of travel, all of the meetings were well represented and productive on new ideas and plans for the future. The first meeting was held at the close of the National Convention in Dayton. At this meeting, Father Krisciunevicius was asked to remain as the Spiritual Advisor and the Priests' League granted this request. Other meetings were held in Cleveland on Oct. 21,1967 with thirteen S.C. officers attending; in Chicago on Jan. 13, 1968 with fifteen officers attending; and in Philadelphia on Mar. 23, 1968 with eight officers attending. Each meeting attracted a large number of guests. The final meeting for this term was held just prior to the convention.

With respect to his fellow officers, Mr. Wesey stated that each one devoted much time and effort to the betterment of the Knights of Lithuania. They not only donated their valuable time to attend distant meetings but also donated their traveling expenses. Perhaps in the future traveling expenses would be allowed the officers. An organization can function properly only when all of the officers are able to meet together to exchange their views at the same time.

FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT

Stanley Vaitkus, our First Vice-President in charge of Junior Knights, devoted his efforts in their behalf. Extensive correspondence in addition to "Vytis" article and the preparing of Junior Guide books took much time. Successful rallies were held in NED and NY-NJD areas. The K of L Week at Camp Dainava in Michigan was also successful. Two fund raising campaigns were planned. During the year, one new council was organized. C103 of Providence, R.I., thereby making a total of eight councils. The others are: C17 So. Boston; C26 Worcester; C29 Newark; C52 Elizabeth; C96 Dayton; C133 Los Angeles and the Chicago Juniors. Although Junior groups were known to exist in other areas, no official notification was received.

The Junior Essay Contest winner was Joan Adamaitis of C116 So. Worcester. More details and the winning essay will appear in a future issue.

SECOND VICE-PRESIDENT

Our Membership Vice-President, Leon Pauksta, conducted an excellent membership drive. 137 new members were enrolled, twenty-four councils gained new members and fifteen councils attained net increases in membership. One new council, C134 of Cincinnati, Ohio, was organized. His articles in the "Vytis" were very informative and were always read with great enthusiasm. A more complete Membership Drive report appears in this issue.

THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT

Longinas Svelnis, our National Vice-President in charge of Senior activities, discharged his duties with much interest. The Senior councils continue to flourish and an attempt is being made to organize a council in New Britain, Conn. A special Seniors session was held during the convention. More information appears elsewhere in this issue and a complete report will appear in a future issue.

RECORDING SECRETARY

The secretary, Mary Kober, did an excellent job in handling the correspondence of the National President and assisting him whenever possible. Copies of the S.C. meeting notices and minutes were prepared and mailed to all officers. She also prepared a list of Council officers, S.C. executive board and committees and mimeographed the majority of reports for the National Convention.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY

Helen Zimmer, our National Financial Secretary, again handled her most difficult job in excellent fashion. Her report showed that although we gained 118 total members overall, we suffered a loss of 103 delinquent members, making our over-all gain only 15 for a total of 1,703 members. Other membership figures appear elsewhere in this issue. The following are the largest councils: C79 Detroit, 213 members; C112 Chicago, 169; C26 Worcester, 113; C7 Waterbury, 105 and C29 Newark, 102. There are a total of 43 councils including 8 Senior councils, two councils dropped for non-payment of dues.

TREASURER

Our Treasurer, Stella Sankal, discharged her duties with efficiency and cooperation with all parties concerned. The records of the finances of our organization are in good shape and the funds wisely invested. Her records were completed and were made available to the National Trustees.

TRUSTEES

Larry Janonis and Eleanore Laurin, our National Trustees, audited the Treasurer's records and found the national treasury and accounts in order.

LEGAL ADVISOR

Mr. Konstant Savickus was most helpful in resolving several routine matters for the National President during the past year.

NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT

The NED, reported President Albert Jaritis, consisted of thirteen councils; eleven regular and two se-

nior councils plus two Junior councils. In the above total are two inactive councils, C18 Cambridge and C27 Norwood. During the coming year, plans will be made to revive these two councils to their former strength and activity. Two District conventions were held, the fall convention, with C116 So. Worcester as hosts and the spring one with C103 Seniors Providence, hosts. C116 and C17 So. Boston were the hosts for the Junior Rallies. Miss Irene Adamaitis and John Olevitz are to be commended for their work in the Junior field. Under the direction of Longinas Svelnis, the Seniors continue to flourish. Various activities were held to keep the councils together. District Roll-Offs were hosted by Worcester, So. Worcester, So. Boston, Brockton and Cambridge. The various councils held dances, concerts and other activities. Councils celebrated St. Casimir's Feast Day, helped celebrate Lithuanian Independence Day and the District's contribution to the celebration was the Cultural Picnic which was held at Maironis Park.

NEW YORK-NEW JERSEY DISTRICT

The District President, Larry Janonis, reported that there are eleven councils with a membership of approx. 300. The Newark group remains the largest. Some of the smaller councils found it difficult continuing their activities, however, they produced some of the most active leaders in the District. The four District convention meetings were, held in Elizabeth, New York, Newark and Paterson. Our publication is a source of contact between members and Josephine Zukas and her assistants are to be congratulated. Our annual St. Casimir's Day was held in Newark and although we were unable to sponsor an affair of our own, we joined the Lithuanian-American Council of New Jersey in a day of prayer for the Church on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary. Following High Mass, celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Vincentas Brizgys, the Golden Jubilee Banquet was held in Newark. Many Newark council members worked on the committee and the banquet M-C was Dr. Jack Stukas. The biggest loss was the bowling League which kept councils closer together. C41 Brooklyn celebrated its 10th Anniversary and they are to be commended for their work in the Lithuanian Affairs field. The activity of the

New York Seniors, under Tony Mazeika, Sr., Peter Wytenus and Helen Kulber, is a big plus in the Lithuanian community.

MID-CENTRAL DISTRICT

During the past year, the Mid-Central District experience a period of varied progress in several worthy endeavors reported the District President, Vincent Ed. Pavis. All councils worked to promote Junior groups with the main project, K of L Camp Dainava Week. \$100.00 was contributed to the Camp and all councils were urged to do likewise. As St. Casimir day and the 50th Anniversary commemoration dates were in close proximity, some localities observed the dates jointly. Rites were held by Dayton and Cincinnati; the three Detroit councils; and in Youngstown, the two Cleveland groups, Pittsburgh and Youngstown. In traditional manner, the annual Pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation was held in Cary, Ohio with Stanley Vaitkus as chairman. The Mid-West Bowling Tournament was hosted by C79 Detroit. At the present time, the District consists of nine councils with an approximate membership of 480. The largest council is C79. Periodically the "Knight-O-Gram" is issued informing the membership of all activities and thus it acts to coordinate the work of the District.

ILLINOIS-INDIANA DISTRICT

Under the leadership of District President John

G. Evans, the District completed another most successful year and continued keeping the K of L name before the Lithuanians and non-Lithuanians. The Juniors and Seniors continued to flourish under the guidance of Helen Pius and Alek Budris, respectively. Vladas Paliulionis, winner of the District's Membership Drive, was presented with the John G. Evans award, a wrist watch. In addition to the many regular council activities, the following affairs were sponsored: Building and Garden workers' Testimonial Dinner sponsored by the Seniors; Special Building Fund Drive; New Year's Eve celebration; "Memories of Lithuania" Banquet commemorating the 50th Anniversary with the then Lt. Gov. Samuel Shapiro as guest speaker; St. Casimir's Day, ritual presentations; Bowling tournament and socials; 4th of July picnics; Golf tournament and many other events. The choir, with Faustas Strolia, as director continues to keep the K of L name in the public eye. Anthony Rudis was presented the with the District's K of L Man of the Year award at the ''M of L'' Banquet. The members continue to attend most Lithuanian activities and in recognition, John G. Evans was selected to represent them in the Supreme Council of ALTA (American Lithuanian Taryba Alliance). This is an honor that we haven't had in many years.

CALIFORNIA

No report was received.

"VYTIS"

The staff consists of Irene Sankus, Editor; Theresa Strolia, Council News Editor; Gerry Mack and Marilyn Kareiva, staff assistants; Loretta Stukas, Eleanore Laurin, Frank Gudelis, Leonard Valiukas and Susan Broroskas, District representatives. Ten issues were published since the last convention, eight monthly and two bi-monthly. A special feature, "Tautinis Menas" by Vladas Vijeikis, was compiled for this anniversary year. Through the efforts of the editor expenses in publishing the VYTIS were reduced by contributions and the Christmas campaign. Total contributions for the year were \$950.51 and completely covered the cost of the December '67 and March '68 issues. The March issue was sponsored by Mr. Kazys Sipaila of C-29 Newark. The total cost per page was reduced to \$12.44/page, thereby making more funds available to the Supreme Council for its many undertakings.

LITHUANIAN AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Father John C. Jutt, Honorary Chairman, presented an oral report and it appears in this issue. Charles Grigaitis, chairman, handled all of his duties as required and his report is included with Father Jutt's report. Through this committee, we are able to promote the name of Lithuania and the K of L organization to the non-Lithuanian population. It is very important for us to publicize suppressed Lithuania and the restoration of Lithuania's independence, with the hope that some day we may visit Lithuania just as we are able to visit other countries in Europe today.

LITHUANIAN CULTURAL COMMITTEE

Marcella Andrikis performed an excellent job as chairman of this committee. She represented the K of L at the following events: III U.S.A. and Canada Lithuanian Cultural Congress in Chicago; RUTA ensemble's Concert in Worcester; SANDARA concert in Chicago; Co-chairmaned the Greater Waterbury Area Ecumenial Concert of Sacred Music. She also initiated the Junior Essay Contest to mark the 50th Anniversary, sent several articles to "Vytis", submitted a suggested cultural calendar to the councils and communicated with the districts regarding cultural activity.

RITUAL COMMITTEE

The committee, Edward Daniels, Rita Pinkus and Joseph Boley, thru July, 1968, a total of twenty-three first degrees were installed, fourteen second degrees, four third degrees and nine fourth degrees. The committee is constantly reviewing the point system and there have been a few minor changes suggested.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The acting secretary, Eleanore Laurin, reported that this committee was prepared to elevate seven members to the Honorary Membership at the convention. Due to the passing of Jack Jatis, this committee had temporarily nominated Miss Laurin to serve Jack's unexpired term and the delegates elected her as a permanent member of the committee.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

This committee should be foremost in our activity. They could and should be they eyes, the ears, and the tongue of our organization. All Districts are being publicized and the committee members are doing a fine job. District representatives were: Juozas Sadauskas, MCD, Frank Vaskas, NY-NJD, Vincent Samaska, IID, Albert Jaritis, NED, and Adele Petras, Calif.

CANON FABIJONAS KEMESIS SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The scholarship award this year has been increased from \$600 to \$1,000. It will certainly not be an easy task for this committee to raise that amount each year. Inasmuch as this is a worthy and important project, every K of L member should strive to promote funds in some way or other. We were fortunate to be named the beneficiary of \$1,000 in the last will and testament of Mr. Simonas Goodas, an ex-K of L'er from Newark C29. Inheritance taxes amounted to \$150 and the net amount of \$850 was deposited in the Scholarship Fund. In appreciation for this large donation, President Wesey arranged to have a Mass held at the deceased's church and arranged an interview with Mrs. Goodas whereby a profile could be published in the "Vytis". In conthe Scholarship Committee, the junction with supreme council suggested that a memorial Fund be set up whereby family and friends of a deceased K of L member could make a donation to this Fund in lieu of flowers. The Committee will have appropriate cards printed for this occasion.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee made the necessary revisions to our Constitution and Bylaws. This revision was sent to the "Vytis" editor for publication in the August-September issue so that all members would have the opportunity to review the amendments before convention time. Many thanks are due Joseph Boley, Joseph Sakavich and Anthony Mazeika for their untiring efforts in this matter.

ARCHIVES

The K of L Building in Chicago has set aside a special room wherein all K of L material and records are kept. A few years ago this material was all catalogued and since that time very little additional material has been forwarded to the archives. The general membership should be advised that we have such a place set up and if there is any material they wish to donate, please contact any member on the executive Board for further details.

INCREASE OF DUES

The Supreme Council officers felt very strongly for the need of increasing dues. While there is a substantial amount in the Treasury, we cannot start spending it for the suggested needs since this amount cannot be raised by donations only. The resolution increasing the dues was passed and now, perhaps, partial traveling expenses could be reimbursed to officers, the "Vytis" could secure professional writers, and many other endeavors can be planned.

CAMP DAINAVA

Further Supreme Council activity included much discussion about Camp Dainava. At our Supreme Council meeting in Cleveland, it was made known that the Camp was having a drive for funds and since this camp is for our youth and a week is set aside as K of L Week, it was decided to contribute \$100 to the Fund. By doing so, the K of L received one vote for each \$100 donated. It was further suggested and approved that the K of L Supreme Council donate \$100 each year toward this Fund.

ACCEPTANCE OF NON-LITHUANIAN SPOUSES

This matter has been discussed at each Executive Board meeting and the members feel strong about accepting these people. However, due to constitutional changes, this poses a grave problem. Many years have gone by wherein this issue was discussed but with no success. If we cannot finalize the matter, perhaps we should close the matter forever. If we are to be a family organization we must accept spouses and children. We must adhere to the times. The motto, "God and Country", also includes family.

LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP

At one of the Supreme Council meetings, a motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to establish a Lifetime Membership upon payment of dues in amount of \$100. This was a constitutional change that was approved at the National Convention.

TARYBA

The K of L is a member of the Taryba and is entitled to three votes at their meetings. Since most of the meetings are held in the Chicago area, our K of L representatives were appointed from the area. They are John G. Evans, who was elected a member of the Supreme Council as vice-president, and Eleanore Laurin. The third member is elected as the occasion arises.

LITHUANIA'S 50th ANNIVERSARY COMMEMORATION

To give this Anniversary dues publicity by our members and our organization, we had many excellent ideas, however, they did not all materialize as well as anticipated. In addition to the special events sponsored by the Districts and Councils, the Supreme Council printed commemorative seals. The initial project was completed by Irene Sankus and Joseph Paulukonis. Mary Kober is handling the general distribution. The artist was Anthony Yuknis of Chicago and they were officially introduced at the Lithuanian Philatelic Exhibit held on Feb. 16-18, 1968 at the Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture in Chicago. All Districts, Councils and individual members are urged to continue purchasing and using the seals during this commemorative year. A most appropriate use would be on our Christmas greeting cards.

LITHUANIAN CULTURAL GUIDE

Father Stasys Raila, whom we all know as a staunch K of L supporter and former Spiritual Advisor to the Philadelphia Council, has written a book in Lithuanian entitled, "Lithuanian Cultural Guide". This book is being translated into English by Dr. and Mrs. Jack Stukas. Father Raila is presenting this book to the K of L organization with the hope that we have it published. At the present time the Supreme Council officers have not committed themselves as to the publication since there are many legal aspects to be finalized before the book can be published. However, it is hoped that the new executive board will pursue this matter to a satisfactory conclusion.

Knights of Lithuania 55th National Convention August 22, 23, 24, 25, 1968

SPIRITUAL ADVISOR'S REPORT

SESĖS IR BROLIAI VYČIAI,

Sveikinu Jus visus, suvažiavusius į savo 55-tąjį metinį Seimą. Žinau, Jūsų visų veidus puošia šypsena, o krūtinėj ... meile deganti širdis. Gaila, negaliu būti Jūsų tarpe ir matyti Jūsų spindinčias akis ir tas, meile degančias, širdis. Prieš metus spaudėm viens kitam rankas, o šiandien - tebūna leista tik rašytu

žodžiu į Jus prabilti.

Kai pažiūriu atgal į praėjusius metus, pasijuntu, jog mano troškimai yra mane apgavę. Tikrai nuoširdžiai norėjau eiti kartu su kitais Centro Valdybos nariais, bet gyvenimas stato savo reikalavimus, o žmonės - savo . . . Todėl ir darbai, kurie man priklausė, liko neatlikti ir svajonės, liko nerealizuotos. Tik vieno dalyko neužmiršau: Viešpatį, nužengusį ant Altoriaus nuolat prašiau Vyčiams palaimos ir meilės . . .

Siandien ir man, kaip tam Evangelijos užvaizdui, atėjo valanda duoti apyskaitą už tai, kad per visus metus prie mano pavardės "Vytyje dar buvo pažymėta "Spiritual Adviser". Tai ne didvyriški ar nuostabūs darbai, bet tik keletas datų, kada visų Vyčių vardu buvo reiškiami mano sveikinimai ar linkėjimai.

Dalyvaujant Centro Valdybos susirinkime Rugpiūčio 6 dieną 1967 m. Dayton, Ohio, pirmininko buvau igaliotas atstovauti Vyčių Organizaciją Ateitininkų Sendraugių suvažiavime. Todėl Rugpiūčio 13 dieną nuvykau į Dainavą, Manchester, Mich., kur buvo minima 40 metų sukaktis nuo Palangos reorganizacinės ateitininkų konferencijos.

Centro Valdybos susirinkime Spalio 21 dieną 1967 m. Cleveland, Ohio iškėliau reikalą daugiau rūpintis dvasiniais reikalais ir programomis Vyčių Seimo metu, daugiau prisitaikant prie žmonių Sv. Mišių atžvilgiu ir įvedant religinių paskaitų ar diskusijų suvažiavimo dienomis, pabrėždamas, kad ši programa būtų planuojama su Centro Dvasios Vado žinia. Deja, 55-tojo Seimo Rengėjai į tai neatkreipė dėmesio. Ir šias eilutes rašant, dar nebuvo gautas jois religinės programos planavimo ir atlikimo reikalu raštas. Rodos, "Lietuvos Vyčių Istatuose" (1950) 9 skyriuje, 4 paragrafe rašoma: "Seimo rengimo Komisijos planai turi būti patyirtinti Centro Valdybos ir SU DVASIOS VADO ZINIA". Be to, Centro Valdybos Pirmininkas p. Alex Vasiliauskas, savo laiške, rašytame kovo 15, 1968 tarp kitko man taip rašė: " ... kaslink ateinantį seimą. Ar Philadelphia susisiekė su Jumi kaslink religinių arbakitų Seimo svarbesnių reikalų? Mūsų Konstitucija sako, kad Dvasios Vadas turi žinoti apie Seimo įvykius". -Tol, kol Lietuvos Vyčiai savo Konstitucijoje turi Organizacijos tiksle įsirašę: "Lietuvos Vyčiai laikosi katalikų pasaulėžiūros bei doros dėsnių, pratina savo narius giliau pažinti ir uoliau praktikuoti katalikų tikėjimą ir tinkamomis priemonėmis saugoja jų dora", Centro Valdybos Dvasios Vado ignoravimas

nepateisinamas. Jei mano asmuo kai kam nepageidaujamas, tai dar nereiškia, kad galima nesiskaityti

su Dayton'e vykusio seimo nutarimu.

Negalėjau nepasidalinti "Vytyje" keliomis mintimis apie "Ramybę, kurios ilgisi kiekviena, o ypač vyčio širdis. Tai buvo, tarsi, mano linkėjimai Jums visiems ne tik Kalėdų švenčių proga, bet ir Jūsų laimingai kelionei per šią ašarų pakalnę. Žmogus gali visko turėti, bet jei jis neturės Kristaus atneštosios ramybės savo širdyje, jis jausis nieko neturįs.

Sausio 13 dieną 1968 m. Cikagoje Centro Valdybos posėdyje, kuriame dėl profesinių pareigų neteko dalyvauti, buvo vienbalsiai nutarta pasiųsti sveikinimą Vysk. Charles Salatkai jo paaukštinimo proga. Centro Valdybos Pirmininko p. Vasiliausko prašomas, passiunčiau Lietuvos Vyčių vardu sveikinimą, žengiant jam kaip Vyskupui Ordinarui į Marquette, Mich. sostą, kartu su nevystančių Maldų Vainiku, linkėdamas, kad Viešpaties malonė jį visada lydėtų sunkiame Ganytojo darbe. - Vysk. Charles Salatka atsakė, prašydamas perduoti padėką visiems Lietuvos Vyčiams.

Negaliu užmiršti Frank & Sophie Zager, veikliąją Detroito 79 Vyčių kuopos porą, kuri Vasario mėnesį minėjo savo 25-rių metų vedybinio gyvenimo sukaktuves. Iškilmingos vakarienės metu, perskaičiau iš Vatikano gautą Popiežiaus Palaiminimą ir sveikinau visos Centro Valdybos vardu šia iškilmin-

ga proga.

Kovo 10 dieną 1968 m. buvo minima šv. Kazimiero šventė. Tai ypatinga diena Detroito Vyčių gyvenime. Tą dieną pirmą kartą visos trys Detroito Vyčių kuopos kartu su ateitininkais ir skautais atšventė savo Globėjo šventę. Teko koncelebruoti Šv. Mišias kartu su kleb. kun. Kundrotu ir kleb. kun. Stanevičium ir pasakyti tai dienai jaunimui pritaikytą pamokslą. Tai buvo gera proga laimėti Vyčių Organiza-

cijai, jei ne narių, tai bent simpatikų.

Štai, girdėjotė keletą datų iš praėjusių metų. Nieko ypatingo, žiūrint kūno akimis. Dvasioje, gal būt, ieškota meilės ... nes tikrosios krikščionybės žymė yra ne kas kita, kaip meilė. Ir niekas ryškiai šiandien nekrinta akysna, kaip tas faktas, kad mums Vyčiams, kaip šių laikų krikščionims, dažnai trūksta evangeliškosios meilės. Jau kun. Walter Stanevičius, 1962 m. rugpiūčio 19 d., 49-to Vyčių Seimo Newark, N.J. metu savo pamoksle klausė: "Ar Jūsų meilė yra tokia didelė, kad ir kitų žmonių tarpe atrandate Kristaus paveikslą, nežiūrint, kad jie būtų kitos spalvos ar kalbos?"

Sesės ir broliai Vyčiai! Užbaigiant, leiskite ir man Jūsų paklausti: "Ar Jūsų, kaip Vyčių, tikėjimas užima svarbų veiksnį Jūsų gyvenime, Jūsų namuose, Jūsų darbe? Ar Jūs rodote pavyzdį, kad galėtų kiti

Jus sekti?".

Brangūs Vyčiai, aukite meilėje. Norėčiau su šv. Povilu sakyti: "Aš meldžiu, kad Jūsų meilė labiau ir labiau gausėtų..." Lai Dievo, artimo ir Tėvynės meilė visada liepsnoja Jūsų širdyse!

REZOLIUCIJOS / RESOLUTIONS

The 55th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania at the Bellevue Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia (August 22-25) unanimously passed a resolution of sincere greeting to you, Mr. President, and of whole-hearted support of our Government's Viet Nam policies. The Convention notes with regret and strongly condemns the recent action of the Soviet in Czechoslovakia. It indicates their deceit and the fallacy of their frequent statements on world peace and friendly coexistence. It further indicates the importance of executing H. Con Res. 416 recently passed by Congress and calling for freedom for the Baltic States. The Convention, therefore, urges you, Sir, to bring up the Baltic States question in the United Nations without any further délay.

(Sent by telegram to President Johnson)

The National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, assembled at Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia, Pa., August 22-25, 1968, unanimously passed a resolution condemning the unjust invasion of Czechoslovakia by Soviet Russia and the unnecessary arrest of responsible Czech authorities. As members of a nation, Lithuania, which has felt the horror and tyranny of Soviet invasion with all its evil consequences, we, the delegates and their guests, express our sincere concern over the present Czech invasion and wish the people of Czechoslovakia strength and endurance in their present difficult hour. The resolution further calls for the immediate withdrawal of Soviet troops from Czech territory and the return of responsible Czech authorities to Prague without further violence and any reprisals.

Upon serious consideration of the purposes of Captive Nations Week, the proclamation of which must be presented by act of Congress, Senate Resolution 374, each year to the President of the United States and noticing that the proclamation each year is being played down by our President out of fear of offending the Soviet Government, the National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, assembled at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia, Pa., August 22-25, 1968 unanimously passed a resolution calling for the return of the original purposes of proclaiming the third week of July as Captive Nations Week, i.e., letting the world know that there are Nations unjustly held captive by the Soviet Union and calling for the support of Senate Resolution No. 374 sponsored by The Honorable Thomas J. Dodd, U.S. Senator from Connecticut and demanding a sincere and more meaningful observance of Captive Nations Week without any fear of offending the Soviets. Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to President Johnson, to the Majority and Minority Leaders of the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives and to the press.

Article III. # 1. Delete the following, "A lawfully constituted council consists of at least seven members including the officers.

Article IX. #8. Delete.

#15. Delete.

Article XII. Correct numbers as follows: No. 4 to 5, 5 to 6 and 6 to 7.

Article XVI. #2. To read: The organization's liquid assets... are kept under the organization's name in federally insured banking institutions.

In addition to the constitutional changes recommended by the committee, the following amendments to the Constitution and ByLaws were accepted by resolutions of the delegates:

Article VI. Add #11: "A member shall be known as a Lifetime Member upon dues payments of \$100.

A Special certificate is to be presented to him for this payment.

Article VIII. #6. Add new sentence: "---. He is also to receive, without charge, a copy of the organization bylaws".

Article IX. #8 amended to read: "Council delegates participating in the Convention have but one vote for its first five (5) members, and one vote thereafter for every ten fully-paid members in the Supreme Council as of the end of the fiscal year. Each delegate has but one vote".

Article XIV. #1 amended as follows: ''An active Council shall consists of at least five (5) members, including an elected President and Secretary, holding at least four (4) meetings a year; thereby having one vote at the annual convention''.

Šios kuopos gali džiaugtis, kad jos stengiasi išpildyti tą, ką mūsų organizacija reikalauja, t.y. tautiniai veikti Lietuvos nepriklausomybės atgavimui ir lietuvių vardo kėlimui ypač svetimtaučių. tarpe. Jas mes sveikiname ir statom jas kaipo pavyzdį toms kuopoms, kurios tautiniai snaudžia nes neįstengia veikančias komisijas savo veikloje turėti. Lai seimo dalyviai, sugrįžę atgal į savo kuopas, supranta šį svarbų reikalą ir įtikina savo kuopos narius išrinkti gyvas veikiančias Lietuvių Reikalų komisijas.

Komisijos pirmininkas, užbaigęs savo antruosius metus, praneša, kad metų bėgyje jis parašė 245 laiškus ir gavo apie 68 atsakymų. Jam, Karoliui Grigaičiui, nuoširdžiai dėkojame už parašytus laiškus. Man, kaipo garbės pirmininkui, teko per paskutinius

metus parašyti 657 laiškus bei atvirukus.

Nuo 1953 metų mes bandėme pagerbti tuos narius, kurie bent 100 laiškų per metus parašė. Tokių nariu mes turime nemažai, bet gaila, kad daugelis iš jų neištėsėjo taip kasmet padaryti. Tačiau sekantieji per paskutinius metus parašė bent 100 laiškų:

Šiuos narius mes nuoširdžiai sveikiname už gražų darbą padarytą ir už gražų pavyzdį visiems kitiems Vyčiams duotą. Be to reikia ypatingai pasveikinti Eleną V. Kulber iš New Yorko Senjorių grupės, kuri daug biuletenių ir laiškų bei atviručių yra pasiuntusi įvairiems asmenims Lietuvos klausimu. Jųjų buvo arti 2000. Jos gražus pavyzdys sektinas visų Lietuvių, ypač vyčių.

Biuletenius galime paruošti tik tada, kada yra iškarpų, straipsnių, kurie liečia Lietuvos klausimą. Jas visas reikia perskaityti ir paskui nuspręsti, kaip atsakyti. Biuleteniuose nurodyta, kaip atsakyti ir kur laišką pasiųsti. Taip pasidaro aišku, kodėl tų iškarpų, straipsnių ir žinių reikia. Be jų komisija nieko negalėtų padaryti. Šie nariai daugiausia iškarpų prisiuntė; Pranas Vaškas iš Newark, N.J., Al Jaritis iš South Bostono, Genovaitė Gobytė iš Amsterdam, N.Y., Cecilija Kincie iš Čikagos, Juozapina Žukienė iš Great Neck, L.I., ir Juozas Janulaitis iš Philadelphijos.

Siems ir visiems kitiems, kurie, kad ir mažiau iškarpų prisiuntė, tariame nuoširdų lietuvišką ačiū. Be jų pagalbos rezultatai būtų nebuvę tokie, kuriuos turėjome. Lai jųjų darbštumas bei pavyzdingas veikimas būna skatinimas visiems kitiems panašiai veikti. Kiekvienas narys kurs mato laikraščiuose ar žurnaluose ką nors apie Lietuvą turėtų iškirpti ir mums prisųsti. Mūsų šilta padėka eis tiems, kurie

taip padarys.

Komisijos svarbiausias veikimas yra apie Vasario 16-tą dieną, kada Lietuva apvaikščioja savo nepriklausomybės šventę. Šiais metais komisijos darbas tą laiką buvo didžiausias iš visų praėjusių metų. Niekad tokių rezultatų neturėjome, kaipšiais metais. Daug laiškų buvo parašyta skatinant valdžios ir kitus ponus prisiminti Lietuvos dieną savo kalbose ir raštuose. Daug asmenų aplankyta tam, kad jie pritartų prie tos minties, kad Lietuva atgautų kuo greičiausiai savo nepriklausomybę. Po apvaikščiojimo teko nemažai padėkos laiškų parašyti. Pagal mūsų gautas žinias, rezultatai buvo toki:

 1 - 16 gubernatorių ir 27 burmistrai paskelbė Vasario 16-tą dieną kaipo Lietuvos Respublikos Dieną savo valstijoms ir miestams.

- 2 111 kongresmanų ir 23 senatoriai kalbas pasakė Kongrese ir tos kalbos tilpo CON-GRESSIONAL RECORD.
- 3 4 televizijos stotys ir 9 radijo stotys surengė įvairias programas Lietuvos šventę paminėti. Viena TV Stotis Bostone parodė programą, kuri tikrai visus žiūrovus sužavėjo.

4 - 101 laikraštis skelbė dienos minėjimus savo lapuose, o 4 net puikius editorialus apie Lie-

tuvą turėjo.

 5 - Lietuvos Nepriklausomybės šventės proga Lietuvos trispalvė vėliava plevėsavo miesto rotušėje 10 miestų:

Čia gražus laimėjimas mūsų komisijos, ypač tų, kurie pastangas tam reikalui dėjo.

Šiais metais man gaila sakyti, kad daug ko negalėjome padaryti kas link Pavergtųjų Tautų Savaitės apvaikščiojimo. Čikagoje Vyčiai prisidėjo prie apvaikščiojimo, bet kur kitur labai mažai. Priežastis tame, kad Suvienytų Valstijų Prezidentas, nenorėdamas Sovietus užgauti, labai silpną proklamaciją paskelbė ir toji proklamacija bevik jokios reklamos negavo. Man teko sužinoti, kad proklamacija buvo paskelbta tik iš lietuviškų laikraščių. Tik vėliau sužinojau, kad apie desetkas gubernatorių ir burmistrų paskelbė tą savaitę formaliai savo valstijoms ir miestams. Be to, Prezidento proklamacija buvo taip silpna, kad Senatorius Dodd pasiūlė Senatui Rezoliuciją No. 374, reikalaujant, kad Prezidentas ir visas mūsų kraštas apvaikščiotų tą savaitę su didesniu stropumu ir be baimės, kad Sovietai bus užgauti. Jis pats pareiškė viešai, kad jis negali suprasti, kodėl mes bijome sovietus užgauti. Gubernatoriams, burmistrams ir Senatoriui padėkos laiškus pasiuntėme ir kitus laiškus parašėme raginant Senatorius paremti Senatoriaus Dodd rezoliuciją.

Kur tik galėjome, prisidėjome prie apvaikščiojimo Lietuvos Tragiškų Dienų sukakties. Be to visomis jėgomis paramos suteikėme tai Komisijai, kuri rūpinasi, kad Prezidentas įvykdytų Kongreso primtą rezoliuciją No. 416, reikalaujant, kad jis iškeltų Pabaltijos Kraštų klausimą Jungtinėse Tautose. Kongresas priėmė tą rezoliuciją prieš du metus, bet dar kol kas ji neįvykdyta. Mums kaipo Vyčiams reikėtų daug daugiau dėmesio atkreipti į tą rezoliuciją, nes ji labai svarbi ir būtina. Šiuo mes pasižadame be perstojimo remti neįkainuojamą darbą, kurį dirba toji komisija, vadovaujama mūsų vyčio Leonardo Valiuko. Kiekviena kuopa ir kiekvienas

narys - narė turėtų taip daryti ateityje.

Brangūs vyčiai - vytės, šis raportas parodo, kad Lietuvių Reikalų Komisija nuolat veikia ir dirba Lietuvos ir visų Lietuvių naudai. Sis tautinis veikimas kelia Vyčių gerą vardą ne tik lietuvių, bet ir svetimtaučių tarpe. Jis naudingas, nes duoda pasauliui žinoti, kad yra toks kraštas, kaip Lietuva, kuri šiandien kenčia po Sovietų letena todėl, kad laisvasis pasaulis mažai jos ir jos vargų paiso ir kurios žmonės trokšta laisvės ir nori gyventi kaipo laisva tauta tarpe laisvų ir nepriklausomų pasaulyje tautų. Prašau visų pagalvoti, jei tokius rezultatus gavome su 130 narių, kokie rezultatai būtų, jei kiekvienas vytis, kiekviena vytė užsiimtų šios komisijos darbu. Gaila, kad yra nemažai lietuvių, kurie mano, kad laiškų rašymas nieko gero arba mažai gero atneša Lietuvos bylai. Jie visi apsirinka, nes televizijos programoje THE SMOTHERS BROTHERS, komentuodamas apie protesto laiškus žmonių pasiųstus prieš kai kuriuos pasakymus programoje, DICK SMO-THERS "Around here 150 letters is a sako: catastrophe.'' Jei jis būdamas vietoje, kur jis tikrai žino, taip kaip gali būti mūsų tarpe tokių, kurie kitaip mano. Rašymas laiškų labai svarbus dalykas, daug svarbesnis negu kai kurie iš mūsų mano.

Sis komisijos veikimas daug gero daro, nes atkreipia pasaulio dėmesį į Lietuvos dabartinę sunkią padėtį ir sovietams ir jų progapandai didelį smūgį duoda. Šioji veikla neleidžia laisvojo pasaulio užmiršti, kad yra kraštas, kurs vadinasi Lietuva ir kuri neteisingai kenčia po žiauriais sovietais. Skai-

tykime ką kiti kalba ir rašo:

NEW YORK DAILY NEWS (July 15, 1968) editoriale raso: "Captive Nations week is the reminder of a national shame. We stood by as the fond and complacent ally of Soviet Russia while the Kremlin demons dragged many of these nations, unwilling but powerless, into the dark and silent empire of Communism. You would think that our officials would shout denunciations of this crime

in every world forum at every opportunity. But what do they do ... they simper over every gesture, no matter how meaningless, of Soviet 'good will'. The Captive nations once basked in the supposed warmth of such friendship. Too late they learned the real nature of Communism. We would do well to remember that we are marked for the same rate if we are ever so foolish as to let our guard down."

THE TIDINGS, Los Angeles (March 1, 1968) rašo: "Lithuania does not celebrate its independence anniversary joyfully. But it does celebrate it with hope. For Communist pressure has not succeeded in destroying Lithuania's religious faith and love of freedom. There is a strength of the freedom spirit contained in a commitment to justice, an allegiance to principle, a dependence on God's grace. As long as Lithuania retains that, and the free world supports it, there is hope."

Savo kolumne BOSTON RECORD AMERICAN, Henry J. Taylor priminė (June 19, 1968): "In the Nazi horrors of Eichmannism, genocide horrified the world. The United Nations dramatically approved an international convention condemning it and containing penalties for it. Indisputably the Kremlin is practicing genocide. And if the voice of even the smallest new African and Asian country is given respectful attention, how can we and the UN ignore the ancient voices of the raped Baltic and other states crying out for at least the unmasking of the performances of the Soviet Union."

Mano malonūs ir brangūs, Vyčiai - Vytės, visas pasaulis žino, kad Lietuva kaip kentėjo per 28 metus taip dabar kenčia. Kodėl? Todėl, kad laisvasis pasaulis leidžia žiauriai tautai kaip Rusijai neteisėtai užimti tą kraštą, kurs turi pilną teisę laisvai gyventi. Jos žmonės kenčia. Kodėl? Todėl, kad jie katalikai ir Lietuviai. Nežiūrint to, ką kiti sako ar sakys, mums pridera eiti į darbą ir pastangas dėti kad tas kraštas kurs daugeliui iš mūsų davė tėvus, atgautų tą savo nepriklausomybę kuo greičiausiai. Mums pridera todėl rašyti laiškus ginančius Lietuvos tikrą bylą. Partizanams Lietuvoje Liepos 20, 1951 Lietuvos požeminis laikraštis PARTIZANAS davė tokį patarima:

"If American soldiers struggling in Korea

have enough patience to be in trenches and bear repeated enemy assaults, if they die there fighting not for their own, but for another people's freedom, then let there be not a single one of us who dares lose his patience."

Mes irgi ta pati galime rašyti. Jei Amerika kariauja Vietname padėti tiems žmonėms, kodėl mes negalime išsižadėti savęs rašydami laiškus už Lietuvos laisvę? Kodėl mes kaipo Lietuviai negalime ginti mūsų brolius ir seseris Lietuvoje per darbą, kuri mes galime geriausiai padaryti t.y. per laiškų rašymą? Kodėl mes kaipo katalikai negalime meilės parodyti tam kraštui, kurs davė mums viską kas tik

lietuviška mumyse per laiškų rašymą?

Siais metais Liepos 7-tą dieną mirė Worcesteryje Steponas Bugnaitis, kurs daugeliui vyčių gal nežinomas, bet seniems vyčiams jo vardas šį tą reiškia. 1909 metais atvykęs į Ameriką apsigyveno Lewiston, Maine kur kaipo jaunas katalikas vyrukas suorganizavo grupę jaunuolių rašyti laiškus ir straipsnius, kad galėtų atkirsti ir atsakyti taip vadinamus "Šliupininkus", kurie tuo laiku skelbė viską kas tik bedievišką, nekatalikiška ir priešbažnytinė. Jų tikslas buvo apginti Katalikų Bažnyčią ir apsaugoti tikėjimą visų Lietuvių prieš tuos , kurie neigė Kristų ir visą tą kas lietė žmogaus sielą. Iš tos darbuotės kylo mintis sutverti Lietuvos Vyčius. Pastebėkite, kad Lietuvos Vyčių idėja kylo nuo rašymo laiškų ir straipsnių. Per visą gyvenimą Steponas Bugnaitis mylėjo Vyčius ir jam buvo didelis džiaugsmas matyti, kad vyčiai kovoja už Lietuvą ir už katalikybe ir lietuvybe. Šiandien mes visi galime sekti jo pavyzdžiu stengdamiesi įsijungti į Lietuvių Reikalų Komisijos darbą. Tad, mano brangūs vyčiaivytės, nesnauskime, bet dirbkime tautinį darbą. Duokime gerą pavyzdį mūsų lietuviškam jaunimui rašydami laiškus, gindami Lietuvos teisę į nepriklausomybę, keldami lietuvišką vardą per kiekvieną mūsų veiksmą. Mūsų visų bendros pastangos padarys mus geresniais lietuviais ir daug padės Lietuvai Dievo laiku atgauti savo nepriklausomybę. Dieve, taip duok.



PANELS DISCUSS MODERNIZATION OF K OF L AND K OF L JUNIORS

M odernization of methods for attracting and keeping new members, young and old, seemed to permeate the two major panel discussions conducted during the convention sessions. The first panel, held Friday afternoon, was entitled "Ideas for the K of L Future" and was conducted by Rev. Albert J. Contons of Boston, Mass. The panel concentrated on what to do to make K of L meetings and activities more interesting and timely - and to attract more regular members. After a short talk by Father Contons, the delegates were split into sub-groups of 10 or less and instructed to discuss the points brought up by Father Contons. After a short discussion period, the chairman of each group presented a summary of his or her group's "brainstorming" session. Numerous excellent ideas were presented for improving the organization's activities, many of which will be discussed at length in future issues of VYTIS. Also, a copy of Fr. Conton's talk will appear in a later issue.

On Saturday, Rev. Brother Antanas Saulaitis, S.J., cleric, discussed "Youth and Junior K of L'ers". His talk featured concrete and unique ideas for bringing new life and hope into the K of L Juniors' activity. Brother Saulaitis, who has worked with Lithuanian children in various parts of North and South America, made numerous interesting suggestions for making Lithuanianism a living part of the Lithuanian young people's lives. The use of tools and ideas on the young people's level, to capture their interest and keep it, was emphasized. A lively discussion by the delegates followed the talk. Brother Saulaitis' talk in its entirety will also be published in a future issue of VYTIS.

SPECIAL AWARD

During the convention's Closing Banquet, Anthony J. Mazeika, on behalf of the New York Seniors, presented a special award to JUOZAS SADAUSKAS of the Cleveland Seniors, the oldest living Senior K of L'er. (Other members may be older, but are not members of Senior Councils.) Mr. Sadauskas, who writes constantly for the various Lithuanian publications under the pen name of "Senelis", was so honored in recognition of his untiring work for the Knights of Lithuania in the field of Public Relations.

The award was in the form of a commemorative medal honoring immigration to the United States. On one side of the medal is a picture of the Statue of Liberty; on the other, a view of Ellis Island, where until some 10 years ago, immigrants to the U.S. used to disembark to go through preliminaries of being received into the USA. The idea for the award was conceived by Helen Kulber of the NY Seniors, and was carried out by the Council.

INDEPENDENCE HALL COMMEMORATION

The Liberty Bell, symbol of the United States' Independence, provided the background of the convention's special Commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Republic of Lithuania, After Mass and Brunch on Sunday, delegates and guests gathered at Independence Hall, in the courtyard behind the Liberty Bell, led by a color guard bearing the American, Lithuanian and numerous K of L flags. Many passers-by also paused to observe the proceedings... and also devoutly bowed their heads with K of L-ers, as Rev. John Juttled a prayer for Lithuania and Lithuanians. He asked that Independence be returned to Lithuania, and that Lithuanians - and people of other captive nations - maintain their courage to withstand and outlast the yoke of Communism.

A brief talk in both Lithuanian and English, was delivered by Dr. Jack J. Stukas, reminding the listeners of the purpose of this commemoration. Since the proceedings were recorded by the Voice of America Staff for transmission to Lithuania, Dr. Stukas addressed his Lithuanian remarks specifically to those who would listen to the VOA broadcast in Lithuania, assuring them that we join them in spirit, in their relentless fight for freedom from Communist oppression.

Several traditional folk songs were played on the native ''Kanklės' by two young Lithuanian girls, dressed in native costume. Following a reading of a Freedom Proclamation by Dennis Mazeika, a wreath was placed beside the Liberty Bell by Stella Willworth, dressed in Lithuanian costume, and Rev. Jutt and Dr. Stukas. Joseph Yanulaitis served as Master of Ceremonies for the occasion. Singing of the the American and Lithuanian national anthems and the hymn Marija, Marija closed the impressive commemoration.

RADIO COVERAGE AT CONVENTION

Representatives of the Voice of America were present at the Sunday events of the Convention, so that a report of convention highlights could be broadcast to Lithuania itself.

Recorded was the Sunday Mass and sermon, the Installation and Fourth Degree Ceremonies, and the Commemoration at the Liberty Bell. Also, interviews were conducted with retiring president Alexander Wesey, and Lithuanian Affairs Honorary Chairman Rev. John C. Jutt. These recordings were edited and made into several programs, which have already been transmitted to Lithuania on several separate occasions.

Further radio coverage was given to the convention by Mr. Henry Savickas of the 'Bendruomene's Balsas' radio program in Philadelphia.
