



# Vasario 16 dienos proga

Lietuvių tauta džiaugėsi, kai 1913 metais įsisteigė Lietuvos Vyčių organizacija Amerikos kontinente. Tuolygiai Lietuvos Vyčiai džiaugėsi, kai 1918 m. Vasario 16 d. sostinėje Vilniuje Lietuvos Taryba paskelbė Nepriklausomybės aktą. Lietuvos Vyčiai nepriklausomybės atstatymo darbą visakeriopai rėmė: verbavo čia Amerikoje savanorius vyrusį Lietuvos kariuomenę ir juos vežė į Lietuva, rinko aukas, platino bonus ir teikė paskolas. Nepriklausomybės kovas vedusiam kariuomenės vadui gen. S. Žukauskui vyčiai net aukso kardą dovanojo. Nepriklausomybės metu vyčiai užmezgė tamprius ryšius su Lietuva kultūriniame ir organizaciniame darbe. Keitėsi instruktoriais, sportininkais ir chorais. Prof. K. Pakštas, vyčių organizatorius, buvo pasiųstas į Lietuvą užmegzti ryšių su ateitininkų ir pavasarininkų organizacijomis. Pavasarininkų organizacija iš Lietuvos į JAV atsiunte prof. Ereta instruk-

tuoti vyčius. Prof. Ereto būvimas vyčių eilėse buvo labai produktingas ir našus, nes vyčių kuopos, sporto komandos, chorai progresavo. Už tai prof. Eretas vyčių vadovybės buvo pagerbtas ir jam buvo suteiktas garbės vyčio vardas. Pereitas metais tas veiklusis žmogus atšventė 70 metų gimimo sukaktį. Tad ji sveikiname ir linkime ilgiausių metų. Tačiau prieš 25 metus Lietuvą, tą žydinčią šalį, smurtu užgrobė rusai ir ją laiko okupavę žiauriausiose sąlygose.

Dėl tos tragedijos lietuvių tauta pergyveno didžiausį smūgį, retai kas gali įzivaizduoti. Žinoma, tuo pačiu ir JAV Lietuvos Vyčiai to smūgio tapo stipriai sukrėsti, ir draug su išeivijoje esančiais vadavimo veiksniais veda atkaklią kovą su okupantu ir deda pastangas, kad vėl atgauti laisvę ir ne-

priklausomybę Lietuvai. Užtat vyčiai draug su savais tautiečiais kas met ruošia 1918 m. Vasario 16 d. prisiminimus: pamaldas už žuvusius, nukankintus tautiečius, ir gedulingas akademijas - susikaupimus.

Lietuva dabar rusiško bolne tik pavergta, bet ševizmo tiesiog naikinama ir kultūriniai ir fiziniai. Už tautos himną -areštas, už Vasario 16 prisiminimą kalėjimas, o už tautinių jausmų pareiškimą demonstracijose ar šiaip kur nors - Sibiras, Lietuva niekada dar nebuvo išgyvenusi tokios, kaip dabar, nepelnytos kančios, rūpintojėlių ir kryžių žemė niekada dar nebuvo taip slėgiama ir kryžiuojama, kaip dabar. Kryžiai dabar tašomi ir drožiami ne iš uosio, klevo ir ąžuolo, bet iš gyvos žudomos tautos.

Minėdami ir švęsdami Vasario 16 d. 52 m. sukaktį išklausykime lietuviškos pareigos balso ir savo darbais, savo ryštu tieskime kelią į naują Lietuvos prisikėlimą.

# FIFTY SECOND OF INDEPENDENCE RESTORED

''Today we are confronted with a tremendous phenomenon: the birth or rebirth of nations all over the world.''

Andre Malrau, 1918

February 16th marks the fifty-second anniversary since the restoration of Lithuania's independence. The Lithuanian state, resurrected in 1918, fell victim to Soviet imperialism in 1940. Thus the post-World War II period, the era of self-determination for many areas of the world, finds Lithuania under Russian rule that displays many aspects of classical colonialism

Whenever they are called on to justify their continued occupation and exploitation of the Baltic States, The Russian leaders and propagandists assert that the Lithuanians, Latvians and Estonians have relinquished their independence voluntarily an explanation that is patently false and has no historical foundation. The Kremlin also claims that the Soviet system has benefited the Baltic peoples economically and has allowed to retain basic national rights and freedoms.

The claim of economic benefits is best answered by Soviet own procedures and statistics, which indicate that the Lithuanian people have no say about what they produce and that their toil and achievements are channelled mainly to the strengthening of the Russian power. Their living standard was still to catch up in many ways with that of independent Lithuania.

The absence of basic attributes of sovereignty and self-determination is plainly seen in the Russian control of the basic spheres of national life in Lithuania: politics, economy, education, culture, etc. More than that, Lithuania, as well as Latvia and Estonia, is exposed to methodic Russification. The influx of Russians into Lithuania continues, and they remain entrenched in many leading positions. Russian culture is being forcibly imposed upon less than willing Lithuanians. The educational institutions of Lithuania, despite courageous resistance by Lithuanian scholars, intellectuals and teachers, are still permeated by obligatory Russianism. Lithuanian history and geography are almost absent from the curriculum, which echo with Russian chauvinism and pan-Slavism.

The fifty-second anniversary of Lithuania's independence coincides with another important date the thirty-first anniversary of the signing of the Stalin-Hitler pact whereby the two dictators divided East-Central Europe between themselves and thus Anniversary

sealed the fate of the Baltic States. The continued occupation of Lithuania by the Soviet Union is thus a direct outcome of the crime of 1939 and of Soviet-Nazi collaboration. And this fact hardly adds to the legitimacy of the Soviet claims in the Baltic area.

Some people in the West have tended to write off the Baltic states perennially lost to their Eastern predator. These are usually individuals who take a very static view of history or who are unduly hypnotized by the Soviet power of a giant with clay feet. The past events in Czechoslovakia have again demonstrated how vulnerable the Soviet giant is and that its rule in East-Central Europe can be maintained by bayonet only. The ideas of freedom, national sovereignty, and social justice have had a triumphant resurgence in Czechoslovakia - they will triumph in other countries as well.

The subjugated peoples of East-Central Europe, including the Lithuanians, are confident that they will emerge victorious in their battle against Soviet oppression. "You may destroy people by force but not their ideas," the Czechoslovak writers emphasized in their Resolution adopted on October 31, 1968. "In this century, we in Bohemia have three times witnessed the collapse of monolithic systems, but truth emerged again."

The Lithuanian people have also witnessed the collapse of the tsarist system, the demise of the Third Reich. They believe that they will see the end of the Soviet Empire, the "prison of Nations." Their patriotism, courage and perseverence are the best guarantees that their expectations will not be in vain.

"At the beginning, the Russians were cool and reserved. Stalin immediately declared his interest in the Baltic States. He inquired whether Germany was still interested in the port cities of Liepaja and Ventspilis and quite bluntly declared that negotiations would make no sense unless Germany would show readiness to compromise on the question. Ribbentrop asked for a delay so that he could get in touch with Hitler in Obersalzburg. Several minutes later, he was in touch with Hitler who left the telephone for a moment to take a look at the map. He instantly said that he agreed to cede the Eastern Baltic seaboard to Russia... This concession immediately broke the ice and it took a single, although rather long, session to agree on all questions. The Pact of August 23 and the Secret Protocol were both signed in the early morning hours of August 24th."



### WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

As we celebrate Washington's birthday this February, it is fitting to recall some of the high points in the heritage our first President left to his countrymen.

George Washington was commander of the forces that fought and won the American Revolutionary War. When the thirteen colonies rebelled against the English motherland, Washington was asked by the Continental Congress to take command. With courage and genius, and assisted by volunteers from many nations - including Lafayette from France, von Steuben from Germany, Pulaski and Kosciusko from Poland - he led the colonies to independence and statehood, achieving victory with an army that was often out of supplies and on the verge of starvation.

Once independence was won, Washington presided over the convention, held in Philadelphia, that framed the Constitution of the United States - a new and unique Constitution that guaranteed freedom and democratic government on a scale unknown in any large area of the world in the 18th century. Washington's influence and prestige were important factors in its formulation and adoption. After it went into effect on March 4, 1789 Washington was the unanimous choice as the new country's first President. Washington had rejected any suggestion that he become king and he refused to continue as president for more than two terms, believing that rotation in office was more likely to ensure good government and uphold the rights and freedoms which the Constitution promises. He served as president from 1789 to 1797.



Lithuanians in a wreath-laying ceremony at the LIN-COLN MEMORIAL in Washington, D.C. (Photo - V. Mazelis)




Aware of the importance of setting precedents, he maintained a dignity and even a formality in the office of President that has in large measure continued to the present day. How was an American President to be addressed? Your ''majesty'' was suggested, also your ''excellency.'' To George Washington, the words ''Mr. President' seemed the proper title for the head of a democratic republic. It is still that today.

Retiring in 1797 to his estate in Mount Vernon, Washington devoted much time to his first love, running the family plantation, cultivating his lands, growing new crops. He corresponded with men around the world who had special experience in crops and husbandry. Persons from all over the world who came to the united States visited the great General, and he received them as befitted a former President of the world's first major republic.

Washington died on December 14,1799,171 years ago. Four days later he was buried in the family vault at Mount Vernon, mourned throughout the nation. Towns were named for him and later the great Washington Monument was built in the national capital. But his greatest monument is the nation he did so much to found and to whose heritage he made so outstanding a contribution. It is no wonder that George Washington is called the "Father of his country."

# ŠARVUOTAS RAITELIS ANT BALTO ŽIRGO niai element

Tai bus Vytis Lietuvos valstybės ženklas. Jau vieną kartą apie Vytį, kaipo Vytį, rašiau. Atrodo, kad antrą kartą, kuris yra taip dažnai matomas ir visiems gerai žinomas nereikėtų. Kadangi kiekvienos valstybės ženklas turi ką nors savotiško, skirtingo, tai tuos skirtumus būtinai reikalinga iš-

ryškinti.

Mat, vienos valstybės pasirenka didingus, puikius ženklus, pav. liūtą, arą, o kitos - kuklius, malonius, pav. Kryžių, šventąjį, angela ir t.t. Tačiau Lietuvos valstybės ženklas "Vytis" yra visai skirtingos rūšies. Lietuvos Vytis šarvais apkaustytas raitelis, ant balto žirgo sėdintis, kalaviju užsimojęs ir smarkiais šuoliais lekiantis. Tai puikus ir reto grožio ženklas. Jame jungiasi vienos ir kitos rūšies ypatybės: didingumas, kilnumas ir kuklumas. Užtat, Lietuvos Vytis nepaprastas, ne vienalytis bet sudetingas. Pagrindiniai elementai jame: žmogus ir

žirgas.

Žmogus, vaizduojamas Lietuvos Vytyje, iškelia jo vertętarpkitų valstybių ženklų. Nes žmogus yra valdytojas gamtos jėgų bei pasaulio daiktų. Atseit, jis yra pasaulio viešpats.

Antras Lietuvos Vyčio elementas yra žirgas. Žirgas senovės lietuviams buvo didžiausias ir ištikimiausias draugas, su kuriuo nei karo, nei taikos metu lietuvis nesiskirdavo. Žirgas ne vien lietuvių, bet ir visų žmonių mylimas

ir branginamas gyvulys.

Augalotas, raumeningas lietuvis, apsišavavęs joja ant balto žirgo, rankoje stipriai suspaudęs, laiko kardą. Jam, atrodo, nėra baisus nei liūtas, nei aras, nei kiti priešai, nes žmogus, būdamas žemės valdovu, jei ne savo fizine jėga, tai proto pagelba turi valdyti kitus už save žemesnius tvarinius. Atseit, Lietuvos Vytyje atsispindi ne vien fizinė, bet ir dvasinė jėga. Daugelio kity valstybių ženkluose to nesurandame ne trupinelio. Lietuvos Vytyje yra išlaikyta pusiausvyra tarp dvasios ir kūno. Tas mus moko, kad atgavę nepriklausomybę, laisvai gyvendami, išlaikysime pusiausvyrą taip pat tarp dvasios ir kūno. Ir kad, rūpindamiesi kūno sveikata ir medžiaginėmis gėrybėmis, nenustelbtume ir nepamirštume dvasios. Tik būdami sveiki, stiprūs kunu ir galingi dvasia galėsime atsispirti prieš galingesnius priešus.

Raitelis leidžia drąsiai žirgą, nis jis gerai žino savo kelią. Žino,

kad skrieja teisingumo ir teisėtumo keliu, be apgaulės ir klastos, ką mėgsta neretai grobuoniški arai ar galingieji liūtai. Užtat Lietuvos Vytis skatina kiekvieną žmogų visuomet eiti teisingumo ir teisėtumo keliu į didžius laimėjimus ir nesusitepti jokiu negarbingu darbu. Lietuvos Vyčio žirgas baltas. Klausimas kyla, kodėl? Juk lietuvių mėgiamas ir dainose gražiai apdainuotas ne baltas, bet juodberis žirgelis. Cia jau glūdi kita priežastis. Mat, pasak senovės lietuvius, karžygių vėlestik balti žirgai nešdavo į dausas. Atseit, tarp šio ir pomirtinio gyvenimo tarpininkai buvo baltieji žirgai. Čia ir vėl iškyla Lietuvos Vytyje religinė mintis: jeigu tikėsime šiame gyvenime Aukščiausį Kūrėją ir laikysimės dorovės dėsnių, tai mes lyg tuo baltu žirgu nuskrisime į Jo sukurtą laimės Viešpatiją.

Bendrai paėmus, Lietuvos Vytis nepaprastai prasmingas ir gilus. Jame yra įkūnytos kilnios idėjos. Tuo lietuviai gali drąsiai didžiuotis prieš kultūringąjį pasaulį, nes jis charakterizuoja Lietuvių tautos idealus. Vytis skatina prie naujų žygių ir drąsina atkakliai kovoti užtautines, religines ir dva-

sines vertybes.

Mes lietuviai brangindami ir ugdydami tas vertybes galime iš-kilti kultūroje ir atkovoti prarastą nepriklausomybę. Tebūna tad Lietuvos Vytis lyg tas senovės šaulys, kurs išjudintų visos tautos sūnus ir dukras į darbą ir pasiaukojimąkovoje su okupantu - Sovietų Rusija.

NEW YEAR'S DAY MESSAGE - by Hon. Joseph Kajeckas, Charge d'Affaires of LITHUANIA, Jan. 1, 1970.

Dear Fellow Nationals:

We are entering into the year 1970 with a feeling of deepfelt gratitude to the Government of the United States, and to governments of other countries, for the nonrecognition of the forcible incorporation of Lithuania into the Soviet Union and for the continuing support of the Lithuanian people's rights to national self-determination. A statement to that effect is contained in a letter of the Secretary of State of the United States of America addressed to me February 11, 1969, and in his letters to the Representative of Estonia and the Representative of Latvia dated February 11th and November 11th, respectively, on the occasions of our national independence holidays. Canada likewise defined its policy in similar vein when the Canadian Prime Minister's Office in a letter dated September 16, 1969, addressed to the board of the Lithuanian Canadian Community it stated that Lithuania's cause "deserves support" and that Canada had never revoked its de jure recognition of the independent Republic of Lithuania.

Lithuanians living in the West fully realize that Lithuania's road to freedom is lined with heavy obstacles. That road may be long but it is honorable, grand and noble. We may feel proud that individual and collective efforts of Lithuanians are directed toward that road to Lithuania's freedom and independence. Most recently this was shown by solemn and majestic commemorations throughout the world, whereever there are Lithuanians, paying respects to the former President of Lithuania, Aleksandras Stulginskis, who died in Kaunas on September 22, 1969. This spontaneous honoring of the Lithuanian statesman, signatory of the Act of February 16th, Siberian martyr, fighter for Lithuania, demonstrates the ardent support for Lithuania and a determination to work in behalf of her freedom and independence.

I send my deepfelt sincerest greetings to myfellow nationals in the Homeland for the new year 1970. I wish that the next year be better and happier. Let us firmly believe in the brighter future for Lithuania for which all of free Lithuanians are striving.

## CAPTIVE NATIONS WEEKS - LONDON, STOCKHOLM, BUENOS AIRES

LITHUANIANS PARTICIPATE IN MASS EVENTS

The first Captive Nations Week in Great Britain was marked in London on November 9-16, 1969. It is planned to transform the Week into an annual

event, as in the United States.

The Captive Nations Week was sponsored by the British League for European Freedom, a private organization. The program was launched with an ecumenical religious service at St. Martin's-in-the-Field Church, Trafalgar Square. The main event was a special meeting of parliamentarians, newspapermen and political personalities in the British Parliament's Grand Committee Room, on November 12th, with Lord St. Oswald acting as the official host. The purpose of the meeting was explained as initiating the first Captive Nations Week in Great Britain and commemorating the 94 million victims of the Russian and Chinese communist tyrannies. The Week was concluded with a procession from Hyde Park to Whitehall, where a wreath was laid at the Cenotaph.

As part of the Captive Nations Week's activities, delegations of individual captive nations were re-

ceived by Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

BIGGEST CAPTIVE NATIONS DAY IN SWEDEN Some fifty Swedish and exile organizations collaborated in giving Sweden the biggest Captive Nations Day ever. It began with an open-air meeting in Stockholm's Sergel Square, attended by some 2000 people and with an impressive array of speakers, including representatives of Swedish youth organizations. From there, a torchlight procession marched to the Town Hall.

SWEDISH SPEAKERS SCORE "SOVIET COLONIAL-ISM"

The meeting at the Town Hall was opened by the

chairman of the "June Committee," PROF. BIRGER NERMAN, who stressed that Soviet colonialism, "the last and the most despicable in world history will be swept away." The former leader of the Liberal Party, PROF. BERTIL OHLIN, ironically commented about the fact that the indignation of certain groups in Sweden at oppression increased in proportion to the distance between Sweden and the country dictatorships in the immediate concerned. The vicinity of Sweden (i.e., Baltic States), he said, do not worry these (pro-Vietcong, hate U.S.) groups. The new chairman of the Swedish youth organization Democratic Alliance, MR. GUNNAR RAGNA, pledged his support to the Baltic cause.

DANISH STATESMAN ATTACKS STALIN-HITLER PACT

The main speaker at the meeting was MR. OKE BJORN KRAFT, former Danish Foreign Minister and the present chairman of the European Freedom Council. "The beginning of the tragedy of Poland and the Baltic States," he said, "was the division of East Europe as signed 30 years ago by the Hitler Reich and the Stalin regime. This was the most despicable agreement ever made in the civilized world."

The Captive Nations Day aroused considerable attention in the Scandinavian press.

BUENOS AIRES CAPTIVE NATIONS WEEK

The fourth Captive Nations Week in Argentina was commemorated on October 26-31. After a High Mass at the Cathedral of Buenos Aires on October 26th, a mass gathering took place at the Argentinian Liberty Monument. The Lithuanian contingent was especially numerous and included many youths. All these events were generously covered by the Argentinian press, TV, and radio.

Kompozitorius Juozas Strolia, dirbęs ilgą laiką mokytojo ir choro dirigento darbą, šalia to pasižymėjo ir kaipo dainų kūrėjas – kompozitorius.



RULES FOR THE 1969-70 MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

In order to give ALL Councils the opportunity to participate in the Membership Drive, the rules and

classifications have changed as follows:

SPECIAL AWARDS will be presented to councils in each of the following categories for being first to have their council dues 100% paid-up: 1st category-10 and under members; 2nd - 11-29 members; 3rd - 30-59 members; 4th - 60-99 members; and 5th - 100 and over members. These awards will be based on the national financial secretary's membership records as of August 1, 1969, which were presented at the convention.

Council awards for new members will be presented for the greatest percentage of per capita increase based on net increases as follows: Council with Over 50 members; Councils with 26-50 members; and Councils with 25 and under members.

Individual award credits for enrolling new members as follows: TEN points can be earned for each new or rejoin member enrolled from August until April 1, 1970; and FIVE points, thereafter until July 10, 1970.

#### MEMBERSHIP DUES

Our National Financial Secretary reminds us that membership dues will be due in January 1970. If a new member joins a Council, the dues are as follows:

\$100.00 Lifetime Member 5.00 if member joins from January - March

3.75 - April - June

2.50 - July - September

1.25 - October - December

2.50 - Additional family member (No ''Vytis'')

7.00 - Couple (First Year Only)
Dues should be collected for a FULL YEAR.
Member record sheets and applications for new or reinstated members are available without charge from the National Financial Secretary. Membership cards are available for social members at a cost of \$0.10 each.

#### RITUAL PANEL AND REPORT

The committee reported that only 4 councils/districts submitted applications to the national committee upon the presentation of degrees. The records indicate that Council 3 Philadelphia presented 3 - 1st Degrees and 1 - 3rd Degree; Council 26 Worcester, 4 - 1st, 4 - 2nd and 3 - 3rd; Council 41 Brooklyn, 1 - 3rd; and the Illinois-Indiana District, 4 - 3rd. From verbal reports, it appeared that many more degrees were conferred. It is the duty of each District Ritual Chairman to contact all of their councils regarding the presentation and reporting of degree presentations. If necessary, the district chairman should submit the completed applications for the councils. Applications for 3rd and 4th degrees on are

based on the records of our national ritual committee and can be rejected if no record appears of a 1st or

2nd degree.

The convention panel, after considerable discussion, agreed that all members who received their 3rd Degree prior to 1963 can use the old point system up to that date. From 1963 on, the points accumulated by a member should be based on the new point system and then added to the degree points received prior to 1963. This, of course, applies to the 4th Degree only.

All members applying for the 3rd Degree must

now use the new point system.

one can share and exchange ideas.

5. Support all routh Camps. Especially Camp Dainava, Manchester, Michigan and Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, Vermont Camp. Lower camping age from 8 to 7 years.

6. Continue Junior Rallies in each district.

All members of the panel agreed to go back to their councils and start energetic programs, promoting and advertising Knights of Lithuania JUNIORS.



# PAMIRŠTOJI MŪSU, KARTA

Kaip gaila, o kartais net ir liūdna darosi, kad mūsų senoji karta visai pamiršta, tiek gyvajame žodyje, tiek ir lietuviškoje spaudoje. Nežiūrint to, kad didelė dalis ją skaito, remia savo aukomis, bet kad nors kiek plačiau ir nuolačiau prisimintų mūsų spaudoje bent didžiujų jos praeities darbus ir pasiaukojimą dėl savo tautos ir lietuvybės labo ir bent kartkartėmis jų vaizdeliais papuoštų savo laikraščius, o ne tik vėlesnės kartos, kad ir visai mažai žinomų veikėjų, o juo profesionalų ir savo jaunimo, tai kimšte prikimšta raštais ir įvairiais paveikslais. Bet kada vėlesnioji karta sėdėjo anoje pusėje didžiojo vandenyno, tai tie patys didžiūnai šaukėsi pagalbos, kaip maistu, taip apsirengimu, o labiausiai, kad jiems būtų suteikta galimybė kokiu nors būdu pasiekti Dėdės Samo - Amerikos žemelę. O kas tuos didžiuosius ir iškiliuosius savo vienkraujus tautiečius išgelbėjo iš to skurdo ir prapulties, jei nepamirštoji senoji karta?

Beja, netik nėra glaudžių santykių tarpe senosios ir naujosios kartos, bet dar mažesni santykiai glūdi tarpe čia gimusios ir augusios kartos, o tas labai atsiliepia į visą mūsų išeiviją, ypatingai šiais laikais, kada mūsų visų tėvynė Lietuva šaukiasi visų pagalbos, bet didžiuma mūsų išeivijos to negirdi ir gal nenori girdėti, o tas labai kenkia ne tik lietuviškam veikimui, bet ir mūsų spaudai, kurią mūsų senoji išeivija vis daugiau pameta ją skaitę, nes jai nūdieniniai raštai bei žinelės - korespondencijos iš kitų koloniją nėra tokios, kokias jie mylėtų ir norėtų pasiskaityti, išėmus L. Vyčių Veikla skyrių, o kiti raštai, išėmus pirmus puslapius, daugiausiai pasilieka neskaityti ir taip pradingsta, nesjų norai neturi patraukimo į juos. Mums reikia daugiau Pakalniškių, Faustų Strolių, Dirkių ir daugiau tokių,

kurie yra abiejų kartų mylimos ir gerbiamos asme-

nybės.

Mūsų lietuviškos spaudos leidėjai, turėtų artimiau patirinėti, ar tikrai čia pareikštos mintys atatinka teisybei, nes kitaip gali būt kiek pavėluota. Iš daugumos mūsų senosios kartos, lietuviškos spaudos skaitytojų, yra noras, kad mūsų spaudos leidėjai susirastų iš senosios kartos ar čia gimusiųjų plunksnos mylėtojų, kurie savo rašteliais pagyvintų mūsų senąją kartą daugiau pamiltų savą spaudą, kaip kitados jie ją mylėjo skaityti, nes kitap mūsų senoji karta tols ir tols nuo lietuviškos spaudos. prenumeravimo. Mums yra žinotina, kad ne tik vėlesnėje kartoje yra didokas skaičius plunksnos mylėtojų, baigusių aukštus mokslus, daktarų, inžinierių ir kitų, bet ir iš čia gimusių ir augusių mūsų tautiečių yra nemažesnis skaičius aukštus mokslus baigusių ir jų tarpe ne vieną rastume, kuris ne tik anglų kalbą gerai vartoja, bet lietuvių kalbą ir rašybą, o jų tarpe randasi Marijona Rudienė, kuri tikrai savo lietuviškais raštais plačiai ir puoselėjančiai galėtų papuošti lietuviškų laikraščių la-

Mes gal kiek čia tolokai nuėjome su nekuriomis pastabomis bet ir mums patiems L. Vyčiams reikia dar didesnes pastabas daryti, nes mūsų - L. Vy-

čių org. vardas vis giliau ir giliau skęsta tylos vandenyne ir jeigu mes vyčiai nepagyvėsime plunksnoje ir kituose visuomeniškuose darbuose, tai lietuviška visuomenė pamanys, kad L. Vyčiai baigia savo dienas. Mums reikia daugiau solistų Algirdų Brazių, Vincų-Stasių Pavių, iš kurių vienas - Algirdas Brazis tapo vyriausiu vadovu Illinois-Indiana valstijų vyčių apygardos ąžuolu - pirmininku. Vincas ir Stasė Paviai yra vidurinių valstijų vyčių apygardos vyriausieji pirmūnai, kurie nepailstančiai triusiasi ir rūpinasi šios apygardos darbais. Būtų gražu ir saulėta, kad ir kitos mūsų organizacijos garsenybės pasektų gražiabalsį solistą Algerdą Brazį, kuris vytiška dvasia dar vis neužgesta vytiška meile, nes jo vardas vis daugiau ir daugiau praskamba mūsų lietuviškoje visuomenėje ir spaudoje, o ypatingai, kaip mums jau yra žinoma, kad kitais metais -1970 m., rugpiūčio mėn., Chicagoje, įvyks vyčių visuotinas 57-tas seimas, kuris, galima laukti ir tikėtis, kad bus vienas iš parinktųjų vyčių seimų, kuriame galėsime išgirsti Chicagos L. Vyčių chorą, garbingo vyčio Fausto Strolios vadovaujamą ir be abejo buvusį Metropolitan operos solistą Algirdą Brazį. Congratulations to C-100 Amsterdam, and Cleveland Seniors, the first councils to attain 100% paid up status. Both councils are in the same category of under 50 members, so it's a happy tie. But, they are still aggressively competing for new members. Each had 40 members at convention time last year. Now, C-100 has 44 and the Cleveland Seniors have 42 members.

Fortunately, one of the larger councils is making a showing. C-79 Detroit, has 103 of last year's 195 members paid up. After them, however, it's hardly worth the effort to attempt further listings. Worse yet, these figures indicate that the majority of K of L'ers have not paid their dues.

This year is already into February. The next convention is less than six months away - the K of L year is even now halfway toward the finish line. Yet, most of the councils do not have one paid up member. Not only are these unpaid dues overdue, but any time your council had for picking up new members is half gone.

If you have not paid this year's dues, there is not much time left for doing so. You are already overdue - delinquent - and your credit rating sure isn't improving. After, next month, March, you will be eligible for suspension. According to Article VI, Paragraph 10, of the Knights of Lithuania Constitution: "A member whose dues are unpaid for three months is suspended." As this is the February issue of "Vytis" we are already well into the second month of the year. Non-payers have only a single month remaining before they are subject to suspension.

Do you realize you are partly on the way to becoming a K of L dropout if you have not paid this year's dues yet? Paragraph 10 of the Constitution further declares that "After six months (delinquency) he is discharged from the organization."

Do you appreciate the fact that you have received this "Vytis" issue because of the courtesy of its staff. Paragraph 10 asserts furthermore that,

""Vytis' is sent only to fully-paid members." But, suspensions, dismissals, or loss of your 'Vytis' subscription need not bother you - if you just pay your dues.

Are you aware that delinquent members are making it that much more difficult for membership to increase. For every delinquent member, your council must enroll a new one just to stay even with last year's membership. Instead of expanding with those new members, your council is barely keeping up its old pace - simply because you have not paid your dues.

There are too many delinquent members. Too many have failed to pay dues within the reasonable time allowed. Too many of our own members are impeding progress. If you have not paid this year's dues yet, you are one of them.

Help your council help the K of L. Pay your own dues, then assist by going after those late payers. Once your council achieves that 100% paid up mark, then you can go all out after those new members. In that way you and your council can help the K of L grow. And, you as well as your council might become eligible for one of the dues payment or membership awards to be presented at the coming convention. Rules for the 1969-1970 drives are posted elsewhere in the "Vytis."

Have you paid this year's dues yet? IF not, why not?

# IS SENDRAUGIU GYVENIMO

VYČIAI, SUSIRŪPINKIME!

Prieš keliolika metų buvęs Centro Pirmininkas ir žurnalo "Vytis" redaktorius K.S. Jonaitis-Zilvitis yra rašytojas ir žymus Amerikos lietuvių poetas. Jo eilėraščiai kupini gilaus jausmo ir tyros tevynės meilės. Savo įgimtu talentu jis yra papuošęs ne vieną Amerikos lietuvių laikraštį. Ypatingai daug jo eilėraščių yra tilpę mūsų žurnale, "Vytis" - 1922 ir 1923 m. leidiniuose. Juos vyčių jaunimas įvairiuose kultūriniuose parengimuose gražiai ir noriai deklamuodavo. Pagaliau nėra reikalo čia man girti Zilvičio eilėraščius, nes kiekvienas, kuris skaitė ar skaito gerai žino, kokią kultūrinę reikšmę jie turi, kiek juose grožio, žavumo bei patrijotiškumo.

Ligi šiol arba bėgyje savo gyvenimo poetas Zilvitis yra parašęs daugiau 300 eilėraščių ir dramatinių veikaliukų. Visi jie yra tilpę įvairiuose Amerikos laikraščiuose ir yra išblaškyti. Negana to poetas Zilvitis dar turi nemažai naujai parašytų ir dar spaudos neišvydusių. Prieš metus laiko poetas Žilvitis surinko trečdalį eilėraščių iš žurnalo "Vytis" ir išleido atskiru leidiniu. Bet tai lašas jūroje. Daugelis tų eilėraščių yra seniau patekę į spaudą, kurie dabar jau pamiršti. Surinkus juos visus pasidarytų didelė ir graži eilėraščių knyga, kuri papuoštų ir praturtintų ne vieną mūsų biblioteką ir būtų didelis indėlis įdė-

Poetas K.S. Jonaitis-Žilvitis yra dabar pensininkas ir beveik invalidas. Pats šio darbo nebepajėgia dirbti. Jam reikalinga pagalba ir fizinė ir finansinė. Šiame darbe geriausiai galėtų pasitarnauti vyčiai, sudarydami komisiją, kuri pasirūpintų tuo darbu.



## Relationship Of A Council With Its Juniors

In order to have a successful Junior Council, it is necessary that the Regular Council maintain a close relationship with its Junior Council. It is not enough that a Council find someone to be the Juniors' Counsellors and leave everything regarding Juniors to

that one or few persons.

There should be monthly reports presented to the members as to how the Junior Council is thriving. Regular members should be willing to assist the Junior Counsellor promote activities for the Juniors. There should be one or two affairs during the year, to which the Juniors are invited. At these affairs, the older members should take the initiative and make the Juniors feel they are really welcome, not being tolerated. These affairs should be the ocassion for regular members to get acquainted with the Juniors. They should not be left to stay in their own little group during the whole affair. Intermingling of some sort must be introduced, so that when they transfer to the regular council, they will not be complete strangers with the older members.

Council Officers should pay an occasional visit to Junior meetings, to check how they are doing, to give a word or two of encouragement, to ask if there is something that they could do to help them in any way. This will serve as a means of letting the Juniors know that the whole Council is interested in them,

and not just their counselor and Advisors.

A formal ceremony should be held to transfer Juniors to the regular council. This may be done at the Council's St. Casimir's Day Communion Breakfast or some similar impressive affair.
