

REV. JOHN C. JUTT...



Father John C, Jutt, one of the most eminent Lithuanian priests of our time, needs no introduction to our readers; the influence of his devotion to God and Country is known not in this country alone, but world over. There is much to chronicle in his daily life, but Father has permitted only the briefest biographical sketch, preferring instead to make known more about the Lithuanian Affairs Committee. its purpose, its accomplishments in the past, and its hopes for the future.

Father Jutt was born in Westfield, Mass. and educated in public schools there. Upon graduation from high school in 1932, he entered St. Charles Preparatory Seminary in Catonsville, Mary-

Church in Worcester, Mass. where he served for fifteen years. In 1955, he was given his second parish assignment, that of curate at St. Casimir's Church in Worcester, where he remained until 1961. He was given his first pastorate on July 31, 1961 when he was sent to St. Francis Church in Athol, Mass. Under Father's leadership there, badly needed church renovations were planned and completed, a new rectory constructed, and land purchased to provide parking facilities for parish use. Four years later, on June 4, 1965, Father was appointed pastor of St. Casimir's Church in Worcester, where he but a few years earlier had served as curate, and his work once more was apparent and crystal clear. Many years had passed without material improvements to the parish: Complete renovation of the church was necessary, the old rectory would have to be replaced, and the school and convent cried for repairs as well. The first dream has since become a reality; restoration of the church was completed in 1969 and the formal Diamond Jubilee celebration of the parish was held in the magnificently renovated St. Casimir's on Oct. 19, 1969.

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Thus far, our readers have been acquainted with Father's loyalty to and ambitions for the parishes in which he has served. It should be made clear, however, that this loyalty extends to his diocese and to his Lithuanian background. Father first became interested in the Knights of Lithuania organization during his high school days in Westfield where he was one of those who revived Council 30 there in 1930. His interest has remained steadfast throughout the years, regardless of where he was stationed. Heretofore, Father Jutt was subject to the Diocese of Springfield. However, in 1950 this Diocese was split and the Diocese of Worcester wasformed. His diocesan accomplishments are great, and here we mention but a few. In October, 1950, Father was appointed to the Worcester Diocesan Matrimonial Tribunal where he served as Actuary and Defender of the Bond. In 1957, he was appointed a Synodal Judge on the Matrimonial Court and he serves in these capacities even today.

During this time, Bishop John Wright (now Cardinal) wished to establish organization for the youth of the Worcester Diocese. which was to be called the Catholic Youth Council (CYC). Because of Father's reputation in his work with the Knights of Lithuania, Bishop Wright invited him to join him in pioneering this new organization, and he became one of five who made original plans. Father gave his committee access to the Knights of Lithuania constitution which was most instrumental in the formulation of the CYC constitution. It was recommended that the CYC cover five areas of the Diocese, and Father was given charge of one of these areas. After hiw work in this field had been completed. he was presented in 1957 the CYC's "For God and Youth" award.

It would be well to add here that while Father's hobbies are several in number, one of his more favored hobbies is travel. His travel companions are his priest twin-brothers (Father Anthony and Julius) and to view Father's slides and listen to his travelogue lectures on these world travels is indeed a treat. In spite of the many involvements, it is not uncommon to see high school or college students approach Father for assistance in their classical studies and never are they turned away. They've only to ask. Presently, he is president of the Lithuanian Priests League, an organization of Lithuanian priests in this country. After reading the above, you are most certain to agree that Father's intense and diverse activities have led to the flow of action in anything with which he has been associated.

land. In 1934, he began his studies at the House of Philosophy and Grand Seminary in Montreal where he completed two years of Philosophy and four of Theology. He was ordained a priest on May 18, 1940 in St. Michael's Cathedral in Springfield, Mass. by the late Bishop Thomas M. O'Leary. His first Mass was celebrated in his home parish of St. Casimir's in Westfield. Soon following ordination, Father Jutt was appointed curate at Our Lady of Vilna

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... And The Knights Of Lithuania

- Lithuanian Affairs Committee . . .

The following represents a resume of notes taken during an interview with Father Jutt, founder and originator of the Lithuanian Affairs Committee:

The 25th anniversary of the birth of the Lithuanian Affairs Committee prompts the question of what exactly brought about its inception. Back in 1940, there was much in the daily newspapers which criticized Lithuanians and Lithuania itself. During the World War, there was question whether the Baltic States should go to Russia. Some argued that since the Baltic States were under Russian control in 1795, it was fitting that they now be returned to Russia. Father's vast knowledge of Lithuanian History, or Baltic History, if you will, would not permit him to be silent, and when a Professor Greene of Harvard University declared that the Baltic countries did rightfully belong to Russia, Father wrote to the professor and ended up by stating, "I would prefer to see you as a professor of English

rather than of History because on the subject of the Baltic States, you know very little". During the time of World War II, Father was on a War Bond committee and he urged his fellow committee members to write to Professor Greene. He realized the traditional person-to-person theory was giving way in many instances to a people-to-person or a peopleto-people relationship, and thus the reason for instituting such a committee was quite clear. In 1945 at a District Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, Father brought forth his idea of having committee which would be а conscious of the remarks of the press. He urged the District to have an official Lithuanian Affairs Committee and thus it was incepted in 1945.

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In 1946, the council which was to host the National Convention found they would be unable to do so and Council 116 was asked to take over. Father Constantine Vasys, then pastor of Our Lady of Vilna Church in Worcester, convinced Council 116 to accept. The council agreed; Father Vasys' offer to use the parish hall for sessions was accepted. It was at this National Convention in Worcester that Father Jutt proposed the idea of a national committee on Lithuanian Affairs.

Since the idea was Father's, it was natural that he would be requested to take upon himself the task of establishing this committee. Father asked each District of the Knights of Lithuania to form such a committee, and each council as well. He recognized that individually, members of the Knights of Lithuania could put an offender of Lithuanianism through his paces; collectively, the K, of L. could be even tougher. The purpose of this committee was to inform the public as to the true status of Lithuania, particularly to our government, and to dispel any fallacies that non-Lithuanians may have had about Lithuania or our people and to

work for the restoration of Lithuania's independence. To do this, it would be necessary to educate the committees themselves to be better prepared. They would have to develop answers and arguments to an array of questions and errors in the different areas concerning Lithuanianism. Thus came about Father's idea of publishing bulletin which would be sent to members of the committee, advising them to whom to write, subject matter, etc. There was no reason to waste time in long embellishments because these letters are to be written to busy people who are interested only in pertinent facts. This is accomplished by the bulletin.

In 1944, when the idea of such a committee was first conceived, the K. of L. was looked upon as a non-accomplishing Lithuanian organization, a purely socialoriented group. But because of the work done and results accomplished, the organization was elevated in prestige in the eyes of the Lithuanian community. Objectors to the K, of L. now quieted down and took notice. The work done by this committee was work not done by any other organization and Lithuanians the world over were amazed.

Father Jutt himself has authored many articles, including pamphlets, and has urged other members of the committee to do likewise, and all the while letters




The first K of L "Friend of Lithuania" Medal, awarded in 1955 to the Hon. Charles J. Kersten.

were being written. During the 25 years of the existence of this Committee (from 1946 to 1971), 400,000 letters have been written by this committee and interested individuals. This committee has been instrumental in removing radio programs detrimental to our cause from the airwaves. It has spread the Lithuanian written word. Books on Lithuanian History and grammars have been sent to libraries all over the country. The work of this committee has caused even the passing of bills by our government. Senators have been visited and requested to use the influence of their office to get public opinion to favor our cause. Lithuanian Affairs stretches out to visits with editors of major newspapers and magazines. All this was done with the one idea in mind: to elevate the Lithuanian name and to arouse people with concern for Lithuania's freedom.

The Lithuanian Affairs Committee presents Gold Medal awards to non-Lithuanians who have done a great deal for Lithuania's cause. The purpose of this award is to encourage non-Lithuanians to continue working for the ultimate freedom for Lithuania. So far, the Gold Medal has been awarded to eleven recipients. The Committee has had drives on two occasions to pay for the expense of these medals, and added money to the National Treasury with the excess funds.

One of the pleasant results of this work was that it incited among our young people an awareness of their heritage and of things Lithuanian. Once they became acquainted with the work, they began to study Lithuanian History and the Lithuanian language and their spirits were raised. Father, in all this, has always encouraged students interested in Lithuanianism to consider him for any assistance he could offer.

However, there is a sorrowful note. The sad fact remains that all our councils have not responded to the desires of the Convention to maintain active committees. which has been diminishing such that at the present time, only nine councils have active committees. We are grateful for the non-K. of L. individuals who are located in areas where there are no councils, or near councils where there is no committee. Our records show that in 1969, 2018 letters were written by non-Lithuanians, while in 1970, 1412 letters were written. Their interest is gratifying. Had all our councils responded as some did, our work of the past 25 years could have been easily tripled. Even with the odds against the Committee, and lack of cooperation among our councils, it is remarkable that the committee has done as well as it has. It must be noted that while our councils have not fully responded, each year dedicated chairmen on the national level have fulfilled purposes of the committee. Father points out that during the past six years, no money for expenses of any kind has been charged to the K, or L. treasury. By expenses, Father mentions specifically the cost of stencils, ink, paper, postage, telegrams, greetings to the Holy Father, greetings to Presidents, among others, has been absorbed

Father Jutt was invited to say the opening prayer in the House of Representatives on February 16 and it was at this time that he Majority requested Leader McCormick to present him with the American Flag which flew over the House of Representatives that day. Mr. McCormick so obliged Father, and Father in turn presented it to the Knights of Lithuania for posterity. It may be recalled that this was the same year that Bishop Vincent Brizgys offered the opening prayer in the Senate.

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While a milestone has been reached, with many accomplishments realized, this is only the beginning. This committee will always be necessary. There are so many who know little or nothing about Lithuania. Errors will be made. We must be ever ready to combat this. While we can content ourselves with past results over the years, it should remain an incentive to continue this work even on a larger scale because Lithuania still remains an enslaved nation. We must continue our work until her independence has been realized, and even after that we must be ever prepared to defend the Lithuanian nation and people against error and misconceptions. At a moment's notice we must be prepared to answer for Lithuania,

Father is quick to comment, however, that let no one think it is the most important committee, this committee on Lithuanian Affairs, yet we think it is one of the most important. The spiritual program is most important because we are a Catholic organization and we must stress this Catholicity within us and through this spiritual program we can become better Americans and better Lithuanians. In this overall picture, it helps us to become better Lithuanians because we realize we have something concrete to do and this concrete thing we can do is to write letters for Lithuania's cause, to keep the Lithuanian name ever present in the eyes of the world, and to demand that Lithuania, as well as the other enslaved nations, be granted her freedom.

The aims of the Lithuanian Affairs Committee are indeed awesome and if ever you've been part of the Committee in a sincere way, you may agree that it's a little like being on trial. You may have succeeded in convincing a few of the jurors, but the story of success lies in convincing them all. Sounds formidable? Perhaps, but in unity there is strength and we can and we will continue to do all that is possible to convince the world that Lithuania deserves to be free.

We sincerely hope our discourse has aroused in our readers a desire to join us in our great task and ambition. And now, we return to our work for Lithuania by beginning another era with Lithuanian Affairs.





The following is a talk presented on the occasion of the radio anniversary, by Jurgis Juodis, a close friend of Dr. Stukas.

30 METŲ TĖVYNĖS TARNYBOJE

Jurgis Juodis

30 Years in Lithuania's Service

Nieko nėra kilnesnio kaip 30 metų radijo tarnyba savo tėvynei. Tai graži gėlių puokštė iš Lietuvos laukų, kurią surinko prof. dr. Jokūbas Stukas ir padėjo ant Tėvynės aukuro.

Kaip tik tuo laiku, kada mūsų tėvynėje pradėjo siausti rusiškas okupantas, kraštą atkirtęs geležine uždanga nuo laisvojo pasaulio, 16 metų jaunuolis Jokūbas Stukas, nors ir gimęs Dėdės Samo žemėje ir nematęs savo tėvynės, savanoriškai pradėjo radijo tarnybą savo kraštui. Tai buvo lygiai prieš 30 metų - 1941 m. Tą kilnią tarnybą tebetęsia ir šiandien.

Praėjusiais metais šventėme 30 Laisvės Kovos metų sukaktį. Šiais metais švenčiame "Lietuvos Atsiminimų" radijo 30 metų jubiliejų. Ši graži "Lietuvos Atsiminimų" 30 metų sukaktis rodo Jokūbo Stuko nepaprastą pasišventimą, energiją ir meilę tam lietuviškam darbui. Nelengva našta, kilniai ir garbingai išnešta per 30 metų. Mūsų poetas sako: "Gražu už Tėvynę pavargti, kentėti".



Mes, išeiviai, palikome tėvynę, sunkiausioje valandoje, kai buvome jai reikalingiausi. Šiandieniniai mūsų darbai yra tik grąžinama skola tėvynei.

Jokūbas Stukas niekuo nėra skolingas tėvynei, jis tik kaip geras sūnus aukojasi jai. Darius -Girėnas savo istorinį žygį aukojo jaunajai Lietuvai, o mums paliko testamentą. Kaip tą testamentą vykdyti, geriausiai galėtų pasakyti Stukas. Taip yra pasauly, taip yra gyvenime, taip yra ir mūsų tarpe, kad mes dažnai nukrypstame į vieną ar kitą kraštutinumą: per daug mylime tėvynę ir pamirštame Dievą ir atvirkščiai. To negalima taikyti Jokūbui, nes yra aukso vidurio žmogus: kas Dievo - atiduoda Dievui, kas Tėvynės - Tėvynei.

Ar mes Jokūbą gerai suprantame - nežinau. Bet jis mus supranta tikrai. Jo radijo laidose, kiekvienas mes randame tai kas patinka. Jo radijo programomis patenkinti senosios kartos lietuviai, patenkinti ir naujieji ateiviai. Žodžiu, visi - seni ir jauni.

Per 30 metų nei vieną kartą Jokūbas nėra pamiršęs priminti tai, kas Tėvynei ir mums yra brangiausia. Jo vedama radijo valanda tarnauja tėvynės garbei - mūsų gerovei. Mūsų tautos gražios tradicijos, papročiai, šventės pasiekia mūsų ausis su palydinčia skambia lietuviška daina ir muzika.

Jokūbas, kaip tas pilkas, kareivėlis – lietuviškoj dainoj: "Lietus lyja, darganoja, ar giedri dienelė, visad linksmas, skamba jo dainelė".

Per 30 metų "Lietuvos Atsiminimų" valandai nebuvo nei poilsio, nei atostogų. Kiekvieną šeštadienį, Jokūbas su lietuvišku žodžiu, daina ir muzika, radijo bangomis lankė ir lanko mūsų namus ir dar dėkoja, kad "įsileidžiame į savo namus".

Be to, rašytojas, beletristas, kultūrininkas ir visuomenininkas. Lietuviško žodžio ir dainos gerbėjas. Populiarus tiek lietuvių, tiek amerikiečių tarpe.

Jokūbas Stukas yra N.J. Lietuvių Tarybos narys, vienas iš Balfo direktorių, Lietuvos Vyčių Centro valdybos p-kas ir Garbės narys. Vyčių stipendijų ir Fondo p-kas. 1964 metų Pasaulinės Parodos Lietuvių Dienos Komiteto p-kas. Sunku būtų ir išskaičiuoti profesoriaus kultūrinė ir visuomeninė veikla ir darbai tėvynei. Profesorių galėčiau pavadinti ''Spiritus Movens'' lietuviškuose tautinės kultūros dirvonuose.

Profesoriaus kultūrinė veikla ir darbai neapsiriboja lietuvių tarpe. Profesorius yra įsteigęs ir vedas kultūrinę radijo valandą anglų kalba transiliuojama iš Seton Hall Universiteto Radijo Stoties pirmadieniais. Būdamas Tarptautinės Prekybos Vadovų S-gos Pirmininku, keletą kartų apkeliavo pasaulį, ruošdamas prekybos vadovų konferencijas, kuriose visuomet rasdavo progą priminti svetimtaučiams mūsų tėvynės kančias ir žiaurią padėtį. Vienos konferencijos metu, profesoriui teko pirmą kartą pamatyti savo tėvų kraštą - Lietuvą. Deja, ne tokią, kokią jis pažino iš savo tėvų pasakojimų, bet žiauriai priešo suniekintą ir iškankintą. Jokūbas, grįžęs iš tėvų krašto, parvežė tėvynės vaizdus filmose, kurias matė Amerikos ir Kanados lietuviai.

Tikriausiai, profesorių buvo sužavėjęs paveikslo turinys - "Lietuvos Prisikėlimas". Tas prisikėlimas, apie kurį svajodamas Čiurlionis sukūrė nemirštantį kūrinį "Vytį Preliudą". Tas prisikėlimas, kuriuo šventai tikėjo Dr. Basanavičius, Tumas Vaižgantas ir šimtai mūsų pilkųjų didvyrių. Tam pačiam prisikėlimui Jokūbas Stukas ištikimai yra ištarnavęs 30 metų.

Jokūbo Stuko svajonė apie Lietuvos prisikėlimą realizuota drobėje. Paveikslas puošia jo salioną ir kiekvieną dieną skatina jį naujiems žygiams – už Tėvynės Laisvę.

Man yra garbė pasveikinti Jokūbą Lietuvos karo aviatorių vardu "Lietuvos Atsiminimų" 30 metų jubiliejaus proga.

Šio garbingo jubiliejaus proga Jokūbui linkiu nepavargti ir neužsnūsti ant 30 metų veiklos laurų, bet su nauja energija, užsidegimu ir tėvynės meile – Dievui laiminant – sulaukti 60 metų "Lietuvos Atsiminimų" jubiliejaus.

PRESERVING A HERITAGE. THE BALZEKAS LITHUANIAN MUSEUM

Another important phase of Lithuanian Affairs is the preservation of the history and culture of Lithuania, which was not left behind by the men and women who immigrated from their native land to the United States.

On June 22, 1966, the Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture opened on Chicago's South side, and capsuled under one roof was eight centuries of culture, which was preserved throughout Lithuania's history of struggle against oppression.


The Museum was the culmination of the life-long dream of Stanley Balzekas, Jr., K of L member of C-112 whose desire was to preserve for posterity the wealth of material pertaining to Lithuania. Mr. Balzekas assembled and organized this historic material and the result was the founding of not only a cultural museum of significant stature, but also of a library whose literature constitutes a reference and research source to perpetuate scholarship in Lithuanian history.

Three years of planning and thousands of dollars have gone into the establishment of this showcase of culture, which emphazises the achievements of Lithuania's greatest era - the 12th through 16th centuries. Mr. Balzekas credits Dr. Petras Dauzvardis, the Lithuanian Consul General in



Chicago, and Mrs. Josephine Dauzvardis and others with providing the guidance in the planning of the museum.

Museum guests enter through two ornate doors, acquired from the old federal building. Between the two doors, a framed faceted slab of glass window, one inch thick, graces the building. Stained glass windows on the second level reveal coats of arms of the various ruling Lithuanian families down through the centuries. At the rear of the building, guests can stroll through a "Lithuanian garden" where a way-side cross has been erected.

Displayed in one compre-

hensive collection are objects which comprise the very fiber of our proud heritage. Among the outstanding exhibits are a midsixteenth century suit of armour, silver bar money from about 1219 marked for Mindaugas, Grand Duke and First King of Lithuania, the first diamond-shaped stamp, issued by Lithuania in 1922, in addition to every stamp and coin minted in Lithuania since the 12th century when historical records first appeared. Other

unusual exhibits include the largest amber collection in the world dating from circa 3500 B.C., armour from the Tartar and teutonic battles, wood-carvings, household costumes, clothing, utensils, early maps and library material of all descriptions. These collections document the historical development of Lithuania as one of the major currents in the flow of Europeon history and its influence in America.

In addition to historical exhibits, the Museum features art exhibits by current Lithuanian artists. The outstanding quality of the showings has been recognized by some of the foremost critics in Chicago.

The many departments of the Museum recognize the importance of working with the civic, cultural and social committees of other organizations and the museum's policy is to bring forth exciting and stimulating exhibits in addition to working with knowledgable individuals who are experts in their respective fields to help others in their quest for further knowledge. Through this type of program, the Museum has gained status throughout the world. The Museum's Traveling exhibits have been requested by many throughgreater metropolitan out the Chicago area. These exhibits are specially geared to the interest of the particular group.

Another department of the Museum is the Women's Guild which was inauguarated by an active group of ladies interested in the cultural activities of the Museum and Chicago.


Many K of L members, such as Dr. Joseph Jerome, Frank Zapolis, Helen Pius, Vincent Samaska and others, are active members of the Museum. In addition, the lists of the supporting "Friends of the Museum" include the names of many K of L'ers throughout the country.

It is appropriate that the Museum is located in Chicago, one of the largest centers of Lithuanian population outside of Eastern Europe today. The Museum is intended for non-Lithuanians as well as for Lithuanian-Americans, indeed, for all those who are interested in history, art and literature.

On this Fifth Anniversary of the Museum an extensive building program has been enbarked upon in order to expand the facilities for the various programs. Individuals have the opportunity to help in this building program as each \$10.00 donation will purchase one brick with the donor's name permanently inscribed.

The Museum is located at 4012 South Archer Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. The hours are 1:00 P.M. to 4:30 P.M. daily, and the admission is Free.

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BIRZEUS LIETUNA TAUTINĖS KANČIOS MĖNUO

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Šį mėnesį sueina 30 metų nuo baisiosios 1941 metų birželio 14-tosios nakties. Tą naktį Lietuva išgyveno baisų okupanto smūgį, kokio ji nebuvo patyrusi per visą savo egzistencijos laikotarpį. Tik tą vieną naktį sovietai išvežė į Sibirą apie 40,000 nekaltų lietuvių lėtai mirčiai. Ir tai buvo tik pati pradžia. Vėliau, antrą kartą okupavę Lietuvą, jie išvežė šimtus tūkstančių gyventojų su tikslu fiziškai sunaikinti tautą.

Birželio 14-toji yra pirmosios masinės lietuvių deportacijos diena. Ją minime kaip vieną tragiškiausią dieną visoje mūsų tautos istorijoje. Tai tikrojo genocido diena. Kodėl okupantas taip žiauriai nuskriaudė mūsų šalį? - daug kas klausė tada. Ir po 30 metų mes klausiame: ar mūsų šalis buvo verta tokios kraštutinės bausmės? Čia kiekvienam yra aišku, kad ne lietuviai, kurie mylėjo savo kraštą, buvo nusikaltę, bet tie, kurie trėmė ir kankino vyrus, moteris ir vaikus. Jie yra didieji žmonijos nusikaltėliai. Birželio 14-toji yra kaltinamasis aktas Sovietų Rusijai ir įspėjimas laisvajam pasauliui.

Masiniu žmonių išvežimu iš savo krašto Sovietai pirmiausia siekė palaužti tautos pasipriešinimą okupantui ir kiekvieną individą padaryti aklu komunistų partijos vergu. Vadinasi, mirtis arba vergija. Kito kelio nėra.

Blogiausia buvo tai, kad Komunistinė Rusija masinėmis gyventojų deportacijomis smogė Lietuva netikėtai ir nelauktai. Tokiam smūgiui tauta nebuvo nei paruošta, nei pasiruošusi. Todėl savaime suprantama, kad ją tą dieną ištiko tokia panika, kokia ištinka keleivius skęstančiame laive. Juk kas įvyko tada, pralenkė visa, kas buvo iki šiol žinoma žmonijos istorijoje. Ir vis dėlto lietuvis ištvėrė nepalūžęs ir tokios baisios teroro priemonės spaudžiamas. Jis, kaip teisus, liko išdidus ir ištikimas savo tautos principams ir idealams. Kai lietuvės motinos stovėjo prie savo žuvusių sūnų - partizanų lavonų, išniekintų miestų aikštėse, neparodė jokio matomo jausmo ar širdgėlos. Tik neribotos tėvynės meilės ikveptos jos galėjo pakelti ta neišmatuojama motinišką skausmą.

Kai reikia lietuvis virsta į plieną, kad nebūtų lengvai sunaikintas. Be to jis tiki šiais mirštančio partizano žodžiais:

Dievas neapleidžia smilgos palaužtos Ir benamio paukščio, ištikto audros. Neapleis Jis ir mūsų tėvynės mielos – Čia Marijos žemė, vaikai mes jos!..

Dear Editor,

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I read Ed Pavis' article in the December issue of the Vytis in which he was concerned about the future of the Knights of Lithuania. I too am equally concerned.

I haven't been active in the K of L in recent years - my wife

I am concerned about this problem but I'm not greatly alarmed because I know it can be corrected. The secret is having people become interested enough to become involved.

Last Nov. 14 and 15 we had a Festival of Nations in Syracuse with thirty-two nations participating. I was the general chairman of the Lithuanian exhibit. Each country had a booth and there was continuous entertainment each day. There were song and dance groups both young and old from the various countries. It was a wonderful sight to see the young people dressed in their native costume and performing on stage with great enthusiasm. They became involved because they wanted to become involved. Right then and there I decided this was the answer to the floundering K of L.

I propose we get our children involved through various Lithuanian-oriented activities such as; 1. singing either solo or group; 2. dancing either solo or group; 3. arts and crafts, especially associated with the Wayside Cross and our colorful Lithuanian costumes; 4. theatre, with simple one-act plays or poetry reading as a start.

Each parish has some adults who are versed on one or more activity and who would be glad to pass it down to the next generation. The instructor doesn't have to be an expert - just as long as he knows enough to get the kids started. You must get the ball rolling.

Once this program is on firm ground on the Council level, we could begin friendly competition between Councils. If the interest is sufficient, we could carry it further to the district and national levels. Have the district competition in late spring and the national competition at the National Convention. Without young replacements no organization can continue very long. We must get our young people interested and involved in Lithuania and Lithuanian activities if we want to continue in the Knights of Lithuania.



I would also like to air a few gripes which have bothered me for some time. Why does each National Convention have to be held in the biggest and most expensive hotel in the city? Why does the program include so much chasing around that a person doesn't even have enough time to visit with the other guests? Why can't the costs be cut so a National Convention is a possibility for as many people as possible?

The Lithuanian people are an easy-going, peasant-type people. They are content with the simple things of life. However, too many of our members have been caught up in this phony materialistic world and they make fools of themselves. They get a few extra bucks in their pocket and they want to compete with the rich.

Each K of L doing becomes more expensive. Each committee tries to outrich the other. The young single people and the young married couples on a tight budget are automatically excluded because they just can't afford it. And these are the very people we so desperately need in the organization.

Let's get away from the rich hotels and the country clubs and the big parties and come back to the parish. All of our activities can be held in one or more of the parish buildings. The parish church is the core of each Council and it stands to reason that our greatest strength lies at the core.

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REV. J. PRAGULBICKAS CELEBRATES 40TH ANNIVERSARY

On May 16, 1971, parishioners of Sts. Peter and Paul Lithuanian Church, Elizabeth, N.J., honored their beloved vicar, REV. JOSEPH PRAGULBICKAS, on the occasion of his 40th Anniversary of his priesthood.


Born April 8, 1903 in Lithuania Father Joseph studied at the Zemaiciu Priest Seminary (later renamed Metropolitan Seminary). He was ordained May 30, 1931. by Archbishop J. Skvireckas and served as a vicar from 1935 to 1939, then became pastor until 1944 in the city of Barakiai, Lithuania. Fleeing the Russians, Father Pragulbickas traveled to Germany and in 1951 arrived in the USA. He served as an assistant at Our Lady of Vilna Church in New York City and at St. Michael Lithuanian Church in Bayonne, N.J. In 1953,
