AUGUST 24-27, 1972 CLEVELAND, OHIO COUNCIL 25, Hosts

STATE OF THE ORGANIZATION REPORT

The 59th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania State of the Organization report was compiled from the annual reports of the Supreme Council Officers and Committee Chairmen.

SPIRITUAL ADVISER

The Knights of Lithuania is most grateful to its Spiritual Adviser Rev. Albert J. Contons of Brighton, Mass. for his continued counsel and wise guidance throughout the year. His report to the convention appears elsewhere in this issue. Rev. Contons continues in his post of President of the Lithuanian Priests' League, and as such has aided the organization much in encouraging much-needed support from the clergy. tivities during the year. His full report appears elsewhere in this issue. The Knights of Lithuania, is appreciative to Dr. Stukas for the many hours and concentrated efforts he so generously extended for the good of the K of L.

FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT

Juniors' Vice-President Dr. Peter Bizankauskas attended the Supreme Council meeting in Boston. He has been very active in promoting Junior activities in the New England area, and has made numerous recommendations to increase national K of L Junior activity. Through Dr. Bizankauskas' efforts, a Lithuanian school was established as a part of the Brockton Public School's evening division. He recommended that K of L-ers attempt to do the same elsewhere. He also has been investigating the possibility of a Junior Convention or Camp, at Neringa, Kennebunkport, or elsewhere.

PRÉSIDENT

Dr. Jack J. Stukas, National President, presided at the Supreme Council meetings held in Boston and Cleveland, led the K of L Excursion to South America, and directed other national K of L ac-

Contact has been made with the Ateitininkai, the Bendruomene, and several NE Lithuanian parishes to assist with K of L Junior activity.

SECOND VICE-PRESIDENT

Membership Vice-President Albert Ozalis was appointed in January, to complete the unexpired term of the late Vincent Ed. Pavis. Mr. Ozalis attended all the Supreme Council meetings and submitted membership articles to VYTIS regularly. He conducted the membership drive begun by Mr. Pavis. The results appear under "Official Highlights" in this issue. Of the 41 councils, 24 had gains, 10 had losses and 7 stayed the same. A net gain of 94 members was realized.

THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT

Seniors Vice-President Longinas Svelnis attended all Supreme Council meetings. He reactivated C-18, Cambridge, Mass. and is attempting to reactivate C-27, Norwood. He has kept abreast of Senior activity throughout the country by mail.

RECORDING SECRETARY

During her year as Recording Secretary, Susan Boroskas notified all officers, committee members and Honorary Members of Supreme Council meetings, attended all Supreme Council Meetings and kept the minutes of those meetings. She also compiled and mailed the official list of officers and committee chairmen, and the list of council presidents and secretaries.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY

Irene Ozalis, National Financial Secretary, reported a gain of 165 members and aloss of 71, for a net gain of 94 members. As of August, 1972, there were 1712 members. There are 550 members in the NE District, 481 in Mid-Central, 387 in NY-NJ, and 251 in Ill.-Ind., plus 43 members in Los Angeles, and a total of 41 councils. Mrs. Ozalis attended all Supreme Council Meetings, and kept the membership records efficiently.

TREASURER

ILLINOIS-INDIANA DISTRICT

President Algerd Brazis and Secretary Irene Sankus reported that the IID has 6 councils. The K of L Choir, under the direction of Faustas Strolia and his assistant Audrone Simonaityte continues to flourish, and the Chicago Juniors, directed by Frank Zapolis, Cecilia Matul and Helen Pius continues to grow and recently performed at the International Dance Festival.

The District sponsored a ''Memories of Lithuania'' Dinner, a St. Casimir's Day commemoration (hosts - C-36), a K of L picnic and a Golf Day, held in conjunction with the Lithuanian Chamber of Commerce.

NEW YORK - NEW JERSEY DISTRICT

In the absence of President Larry Janonis, District Treasurer Loretta Stukas reported that the NY-NJ District has 11 councils. Four District Conventions were held during the year ... in Great Neck (hosts, C-109), New York (hosts, C-12) Philadelphia (hosts, C-3) in conjunction with the District St. Casimir's Day Commemoration, and Newark (C-29, hosts). Each meeting featured panel discussions and/or special cultural activities. At the June meeting, after a referendum of all councils in the district, it was decided to change the District name, to the MID-ATLANTIC DISTRICT, effective after the District's annual meeting in September. This will allow Philadelphia council and other future councils in Pennsylvania and elsewhere on the Eastern Seaboard to be included in the name.

MID-CENTRAL DISTRICT

Frank Gudelis, President, reported the following activities.

The Mid-Central District's 24th annual convention was held October 9, 1971 at Detroit, Michigan with Council 102 as host. The 25th convention will be held this coming October in Pittsburgh. The semiannual district board meeting was held May 20, 1972 at Detroit during the K. of L. Midwestern Bowling Tournament hosted by Council 139. A pilgrimage to Our Lady of Lourdes Shrine in Cleveland was held June 25, 1972, hosted by the Cleveland Seniors Council. Numerous other activities were sponsored by the nine councils comprising the district. During this past year death claimed three of the MCD district officers - Father Titas Narbutas, Spiritual Adviser, Vincent Ed. Pavis, President, and Joseph Sinkwitz, Sergeant-at-Arms.

NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT

District President Longinas Svelnis reported that the reactivated C-18 hosted the Spring Convention, Founder's Day Program and the Ceremonies at Mr. Norkunas' grave site. The NED held a ceremony at the site where Simas Kudirka was beaten after making his unsuccessful bid for freedom, on the anniversary of the event. Over 50 K of L-ers participated in the program at Martha's Vineyard and in the placing of the wreath afloat. NED and C-17 hosted the Supreme Council meeting, and sponsored a well-attended TV Mass and a reception afterward at the So. Boston Lithuanian Club.

No report was received from Wanda Pajeda, who was appointed to complete the unexpired term.of the late Mary Jankowski.

LITHUANIAN AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Chairman Anthony M. Miner reported that 3 bulletins, with a total of 421 copies were sent out. In addition, having received word of an emergency situation, a pending Senate vote regarding Sen. Fulbright's recommendation to cut \$46 million from the US Information Agency budget, which would have eliminated Lithuanian as one of the 25 language broadcast cut from the Voice of America, Radio Free Europe, and Radio Liberty, Mr. Miner sent out 35 telegrams to Council Presidents urging them to wire their senators asking them to vote for a restoration of the proposed cut to the budget. The pressure of the demands by various groups forced the Senate to vote for a restoration of the \$46 million.

Telegrams were also sent to the Bishops' Conference in Atlanta asking them to issue a strong statement condemning the religious persecution in Lithuania. Mention of these persecutions was made by Bishop Dougherty at the conference.

Several petitions asking President Nixon to work for Kudirka's release were circulated at various affairs and sent to the White House. In addition, Mr. Miner sent at least 150 letters to government officials, clergy, newspapers, etc., and participated in numerous other Lithuanian Affairs activities.

A total of 1618 letters were officially reported by 13 councils, although many others were written.

RITUAL COMMITTEE

Rita Pinkus, Chairman, stated that 9 councils reported on their ritual activity. 34 First, 18Second 3 Third and 5 Fourth Degrees were reported as given out during the year.



No report was submitted.

VYTIS

Editor Loretta Stukas, with her staff of Anthony Yuknis, Rita Ochs, Josephine Zukas, Mary Kober, Balys Byliaudas, Marilyn Kareiva and Irene Sankus published 10 issues - 8 monthly and 2 bi-monthly since the last Convention. Printing is done by Vi Vi Press and mailing by Harper & Co., both of Chicago. \$687.00 was realized, net, from the VYTIS Christmas Greetings. Reader response has been very favorable,

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Public Relations Chairman Helen Kulber reported extensively on her numerous activities in advertising the K of L and relating the situation in Lithuania, its occupation and suppression by Soviet Russia, and its history to the non-Lithuanian public, and also commented on various outstanding or unusual PR-activities of other K of L-ers.

Mrs. Kulber is currently attempting to set up a Lithuanian Christmas display at the Hallmark Gallery in New York, and has corresponded with the New York Historical Society and the Landmarks Preservation Commission about installing a plaque to honor the first teacher in New York, Dr. Alexander Carolus Cursius-Curtius, a Lithuanian. She had opportunity to meet with numerous celebrities - clergy, actors, public officials - and always used the opportunities to speak of Lithuania's plight.

Mary York, NY-NJ District PR Representative, reported on her extensive work in publicizing District events, in the American and Lithuanian press. She prepared and presented to NY-NJ District Council PR Chairmen, an outline of hints for effective publicity work. Juozas Sadauskas, MCD District PR Representative, worked diligently in keeping the Lithuanian press supplied with information about K of L activities nationally and in his district.

Excellent publicity work was also done by A. Skirius in California, V. Samaska of I-I D. and Albert Jaritis of NED.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Honorary Membership was presented to Longinas Svelnis at this National Convention, and Convention approval was obtained to present Honorary Membership to Anna Mae Uznis, C-102, Detroit, Michigan at the 60th National Convention.

The Committee reported that several other candidates are being reviewed for Honorary Membership, and if their accomplishments are found to warrant this honor, the Committee will present the resolutions to the National Convention Delegates for approval. Details for submitting a candidate for Honorary Membership were spelled out in the report. These details will be reported in the next issue of VYTIS.

SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Chairman Dr. Jack Stukas of Newark met with committee members Gerald Zager, Paul Kuzmickas and Irene Adomaitis during the convention to select the recipient of the 1972 award. The winner is introduced elsewhere in this issue. Mr. Zager presented a financial report of the Scholarship Fund for the past year.


LITHUANIAN CATHOLIC RELIGIOUS AID

At the annual convention of the Lithuanian Priests' League of America, Aug. 9-10, 1972 I presented a report on the Knights of Lithuania and its activities.



(Summaries of reports of other national officers and national committee chairmen are given separately, as has been done in previous years, and therefore are not herewith included).

In October, 1971, urged all K of L'ers and Lithuanian organizations to send letters and telegrams to Pres. Nixon, urging him to request Soviet leaders to free Simas Kudirka when he visited Moscow, and to permit Kudirka's family to emigrate to the U.S. A petition was drawn with hundreds of signatures, which were sent to the President in the name of the K of L in Nov., '71.

Corresponded with numerous

Cleveland (pre-convention meeting). Arranged agendas for the meetings and handled correspondence and action on matters discussed and passed.

Produced long-playing record in name of Supreme Council: "Dedication Ceremonies of the Lithuanian Martyrs Chapel in Rome". (I organized the K of L excursion of 73 in June-July, 1970). Recording has Papal Mass for the Lithuanian pilgrims, talks by Bishop Marcinkus, Cardinal Samore, Minister St. Lozoraitis and other highlights. NATIONAL PRESIDENT'S ACTIVITIES 1971 - 1972

On April 15-16, read a paper on role of the K of L in the dissemination of information concerning Lithuania, at the 2nd Baltic Information Conference of No. America, in Washington, D.C.

On April 28-30, represented K of L at the Amerikos Lietuvių Bendruomenės Tarybos meeting in Chicago, as a member of that Taryba. Promised them we would organizationally aid their various projects and programs.

Subsequently, the Supreme Council voted to allot \$5.00 for each Council (\$200.) as a token first donation from each Council, which in the future would voluntarily make such a contribution. Your President rebutted criticism from the American Lithuanian Council, which erroneously argued that we were "merging" our organization and destroying our individuality, by stating that we will similarly support the American Lithuanian Council. The K of L seeks to unify Lithuanians, not to disunite them, and we will continue to aid all worthy organizations and cooperate with them, in their work for Lithuanian culture and freedom. Participated with members of the Amerikos Lietuvių Bendruomenė (American Lith. Community) at their invitation, to represent the K of L, in delegations to Cardinal Krol in Phila, and Bishop Dougherty in N.J. to request their proclaiming an official Day of Prayer for Lithuania's persecuted in the name of the Bishop's Conference. This was successful and June 18, 1972 was declared a Day of Prayer for Lithuania throughout the U.S. A historic act, indeed...

senators and congressmen on various occasions, to write, speak or act in behalf of oppressed Lithuania.

Personally handled large volume of correspondence regarding K of L matters, and frequently wrote articles to the Lithuanian Press on K of L activities and projects. Personally paid postage.

Called and participated in Supreme Council meetings: Jan. 9, Council 1972 in Boston; June 11, 1972 in total Cleveland; also Aug. 24, 1972 in \$350.

K of L, and in appreciation, we should help Eurotone Records reccup its costs by larger distribution of this beautiful and memorable collector's item.

In March, 1972, represented K of L at the 30th anniversary celebration of Viltis Magazine, in Denver, Colo., in honor of Vyts Beliajus, noted Lithuanian-American folk dance authority. Supreme Council voted \$100. toward my total expenses which reached \$350.

Arranged another historic first: the official K of L Tour to 5 South American countries, from June 22 - July 7, 1972: Colombia, Argentina, Uruquay, Brazil and Venezuela. Organized K of L concerts, with our own artists: Prudencija Bičkienė, Louis Stukas, Vitalis Zukauskas, also Vyt. Puškorius, in the countries named. Affairs were highly successful. We gave Lith. records as gifts to our hosts in the name of the K of L. Recorded interviews with local Lith. dignitaries and hosts were aired on "Memories of Lithuania", New York, and will be made available to all Lithuanian programs throughout the country, on request. K of L Councils are possible in Buenos Aires and Sao Paulo, and efforts are being made in the regard.

In Sao Paulo, Brazil, your president, also Larry Svelnis, Irene Adomaitis, Louis Stukas, Loretta Stukas and Grace Vaškelis met with members of the TFP. Catholic Youth Organization in Brazil. who, as fellow - brother Catholics, wished to aid the Lithuanian Cause. They want to start a campaign to gather 500,000 to a million signatures, under a manifesto to the United Nations, with copies to Western governments and the Holy See, protesting the illegal occupation of Lithuania and brutal religious persecution under the Soviets. In addition, there would be extensive press and radio coverage, parades, demonstrations, etc. TFP aould assume \$1500. of the estimated \$6500. cost. K of L officers and members in the excursion, promised to help in raising the \$5000. needed in the U.S. \$150. was contributed by members of the group, and approx. \$300, has been raised by your President from listeners of "Memories of Lithuania". K of L Councils, Districts and the Supreme Council, should donate to this most worthy cause, which has been given extensive coverage in the Lith. Press as a K of L project. We should also solicit non K of L'ers to donate to this drive. Time is short, and this should be done as soon as possible.

The Supreme Council voted to urge all Councils to assist the publication of the Encyclopedia Lituanica, which sorely needs new subscribers and financial assistance. Each Council should subscribe to a set (and probably donate it to the local library), which will have 6 volumes at \$15.00 each. Two volumes have already been published. Orders should be sent to Mr. J. Kapocius, 395 W. Broadway, So. Boston, Mass. 02127. Our organization appeared in the Lithuanian version, and Loretta Stukas, Vytis Editor, is preparing a story on the K of L for the current English version.

Cooperated with the Lithuanian Affairs Committee Chairman in writing letters and telegrams to congressmen and senators, asking for the reinstatement of the full budget for Voice of America programs. Had the budget been cut, as Sen. Fulbright and his Committee wanted, programs to Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia would have been dropped.

I requested, as desired by the Supreme Council, that the American Lithuanian Community organization desist in using "Lietuviškų Reikalų Komisijos" as the designation of similar committees within that organization. They agreed to change their committees to - "Talkos Lietuvai Sekcijos", and the matter was closed.



Brizgys promised to assist in getting special recognition from the Holy See for the K of L on this occasion. It has been a pleasure and source of personal gratification to have been of service to the K of L the past four years as National President. I wish your new President God's choicest blessings and I will do what I can to assist him or her and all other officers in the future.

Broliai kunigai, mieli Vyčiai, Brangūs lietuviai:

Kristus evangelijoj klausia Petrą, ir jis klausia mus, "Kuo jūs mane laikote?"

Prieš metus kun. Zdebskis Lietuvoje buvo apkaltintas, kad mokė vaikus katekizmą. Štai Romas Kalanta, kiti, susidegino protestui už religinę ir politinę laisvę; tūkstančiai jaunuolių Kauno gatvėse reikalauja nepriklausomybės Lietuvai; Vilniuje studentai žiūrėdami krepšinio rungtynes nušvilpia sovietų žaidėjus ir atsisako stoti sovietų himno metu. Amerikoje lietuviškas jaunimas organizuoja ir skaitlingai dalyvauja demonstracijose už Kudirką ir Lietuvos laisvę. Tikrai, "mirties galybė nenugalės Kristaus Bažnyčios".

Mieli Vyčiai, lietuviai, esame pergyvenę tamsią naktį. Vyčių veikla buvo tyla, visuomenės beveik nepastebėta. Lietuva yra kankinių tauta. Nors mūsų tikėjimas, mūsų veikla reikalauja daug pasišventimo, būkime ištikimi Bažnyčiai, kuri yra Kristus mūsų tarpe, ir Sv. Tėvui, kurs yra Petras, Bažnyčios uola. Gyvenkime viltyje, kad nauja aušra prasideda, kad laisvė prašvinta, kad "Mirties galybe nenugales Kristaus Bažnyčios", nenugalės mūsų ir mūsų brolių Lietuvoje.

Didelė akcija bus vedama ir Rio de Janeiro mieste. Per tą dviejų savaičių laikotarpį, TFP Sąjunga siųs specialius pranešimus į spaudą. Sąjunga turi spaudos agentūras 45-kiuose Brazilijos miestuose. Sąjungos vadas, prof. Plinio Correa de Olivera yra žurnalistas, kurio straipsnius spausdina įtakingieji Brazilų laikraščiai. Per tas dvi savaites ji skirs straipsnius Lietuvai. 

... ON JUNIORS

"Togetherness" and "Lithuanian Unity" were the overriding themes of the JUNIORS PANEL, as speakers Egle Giedraityte and Rymantas Aukstorius, coordinator Sue Boroskas, guest Stasys Barzdukas of Bendruomene, and convention delegates discussed the question of how to encourage greater youth participation in the K of L.

It was suggested that the K of L join forces, at least occasionally, with other youth groups, in organizing Lithuanian classes, giving dances, planning socials, etc. Participating in other groups' activities can provide variety, new contacts and ideas, and will show our youngsters that Lithuanianism can be an "in-thing".

Above all, adult leadership is essential to all youth cultural activity, and special pains should be taken to train Junior counselors.

The work of the Lithuanian Student Association of North America was also described, and Knights of Lithuania were invited to participate in its conferences.

Another important suggestion was that special efforts be made to reach and attract that element of Lithuanian youth not currently associated with any Lithuanian activity. This can only be done by personal contact or by constantly seeking publicity for K of L projects in the American Press.

For those councils who do not... and cannot... have Junior councils, for problems in travel, etc., it was suggested that the regular council plan several activities during the year that would encourage young people to attend, and thus become exposed to the K of L and its activity.

... KULTURINIAMS REIKALAMS

Surengti dailės parodų. Tai gali apsimokėti ir finansiniai papildant kuopos kasą - gaunant nuošimtį nuo parduoto paveikslo. Nemažai yra dailininkų kurie gali reprezentuoti lietuvio vardą svetimtaučių tarpe.

Pasikviesti kalbėtojų, kurie yra atskirų sričių specialistai ir taip praturtinti savo žinias ar net surengti diskusijas kultūriniais klausimais.

Suruošti solisto ar instrumentalisto koncerta, ne tik kokios nors šventės proga, bet grynai pabendravimo ir veiklos pagyvinimo tikslais.

Dramos ratelių organizavimas ir vaidinimai, ar tai vienveiksmiai ar ištisi, duotų daug naudos ne tik vyčių kuopoms, bet ir vietos visuomenei. Tai atgaivintų kolonijų ir pačių kuopų apsnūdimą ir kuopa turėtų progos nuvykti pas kitas kuopas ir parodyti savo meninius sugebėjimus.

Svetimtaučiams parengti folkloro parodas 16 vasario ar kokiom kitom progom. Galima parodyti gintaro išdirbinius, tautinius audinius, juostas, medžio drožinius, etc.

Distriktų konvencijų metu padaryti didesnį parengimą, kad ir visuomenė galėtų atvykti.

Ateiti talkon Balzeko muziejui, muzikologijos ir pasaulio lietuvių archyvams, o ypač dabar leidžiami Encyclopedia Lituanica. Lietuvos Vyčių kuopos būtinai turėtų užsiprenumeruoti ir padovanoti vietos bibliotekai ar net kokiam įtakingam asmeniui įteikti. Encyklopedija reikalinga vyčių talkos.



REZOLIUCIJOS RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were all approved by the delegates to the 59th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, convening in Cleveland, Ohio August 24-27, 1972.

RESOLVED, that this Convention urge councils and members to extend support for the American Lithuanian Community (Amerikos Lietuvių Bendruomenė) for its numerous activities, as song and dance festivals, Youth Congresses, etc., and request all councils to actively support and participate in the work of this organization on both the national and local levels.

RESOLVED also, that the Convention similarly urge councils and members to continue to extend support for the American Lithuanian Council (ALTAS) and other organizations working for Lithuanian freedom. A sum of \$200.00, allotted to each, the American Lithuanian Community and the American Lithuanian Council, is approved as a token of our support for their efforts on behalf of Lithuanian culture and freedom, without the intention of obligating individual councils in any way.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the above resolution be published in the Lithuanian press which had carried previous news items on this subject.

WHEREAS the American Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation is the national federation of all Lithuanian Catholic lay organizations, Lithuanian parishes and Lithuanian religious orders, and

WHEREAS there is a need for district units of the American Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation to coordinate the mutual interests of the Lithuanian catholic organizations within these smaller geographical areas as well as to provide more effective liason between these local organizations and the national federa-tion,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Knights of Lithuania through their local councils and/or district organizations take the initiative to organize district units of the American Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation in those areas of this country where such units do not presently exist.

RESOLVED, that all councils be strongly urged to make contributions and collect donations to support the ''Family, Tradition and Property'' Organization (A Catholic Youth Organization) of Sao Paulo, Brazil, in their drive for one million signatures in behalf of persecuted Lithuanian Catholics. The signatures will be presented to the United Nations with copies sent to Western Governments and the Holy See, asking that action be taken on the 17,000 religiously oppressed Lithuanians' petition to the U.N.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a committee be formed to coordinate this drive for immediate action.

RESOLVED, that a letter of thanks be sent to President Nixon, for his kind greetings to the 59th National Convention, and also to thank the U.S. Government, through him, for continuing the Voice of America broad-casts to Lithuania for the past 21 years and urge him not to allow them to cease.

RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania 59th National Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 24-27, 1972, express their concern and encouragement to the Brazinskas's who successfully escaped the Communist regime in Eastern Europe, and who are currently on trial in Turkey.

RESOLVED, that in response to request for donations, the Supreme Council be allowed to make donations up to \$50.00 in keeping with the general policy of the Knights of Lithuania organization.

RECOMMENDATION:

In view of the fact that corporate identity is of utmost importance in the communications media, it is SUGGESTED that only the standard "Vytis" Coat of Arms and/or a reproduction of the entire old coin on which the stylized Vytis appears be used by the Knights of Lithuania on all printed matter and in all publications. It is further recommended that we actively campaign to have individuals and other organizations do likewise.

BE IT RESOLVED that a revolving fund of \$1000 be established for use in the development of youth activities under the direction of the National First Vice President, with specific expenditures subject to approval by the Supreme Council.

RESOLVED, that a letter be sent to the Reverends Julius and Anthony Jutt thanking them for the generous donation of \$1000.00 from the estate of Rev. John C. Jutt, to the Knights of Lithuania, and informing them of the initiation of the Rev. John C. Jutt Lithuanian Affairs Fund with this donation.

RESOLVED, that the National Lithuanian Affairs Committee be headed by a National Chairman and two Co-Chairmen from the same area, to make the committee more effective and to simplify its chairman's load.

RESOLVED, that the members of the 59th National Convention extend heartfelt-appreciation and thanks to Council 25 of Cleveland, Ohio for their outstanding preparations for the Convention.

RESOLVED, that the delegates of the 59th National Convention, convening in Cleveland, Ohio August 24-27, 1972, extend their appreciation for the untiring efforts of the Presidium members, and members of the Convention committees.

RESOLVED, that the delegates attending the 59th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, extend heartfelt appreciation to the outgoing officers of the Supreme Council for their untiring efforts in performing their duties during the past year.



MYSTERY NIGHT



plete bits of unfinished business and then attend the Closing Banquet.


