

IN PRISE OF

The attitude of children toward their fathers passes, as a general rule, through three phases.

In early childhood, Dad is a symbol of strength, wisdom and security. He is friend and protector, hero and model. He knows the answers to all questions; he is not afraid of the dark; he is the generous supplier of all good things, such as nickels for candy and ice cream. When Dad is around, we feel safe and secure; we know that everything is all right.

This is a glorious time for a father. The little sons and daughters know no more compelling joy than to sit on his lap while he tells them the stories he loved when he was their age. They are content just to be near him, and fall asleep more contentedly when they are clinging to his hand. When he comes home from work, they run happily to meet him, and gurgle excitedly as he swings them high in his strong arms.

For a brief period, he is not only father and provider, but high priest of the family hearth, genius beyond compare, beneficent dispenser of lollipops and wisdom, guardian angel and defender against enemies, almanac, entertainer and repository of the world's choicest knowledge.

TOO GOOD TO LAST

But soon the picture changes. Teenage sons and daughters discover that Dad is not the allover genius that they had supposed. They have new idols, and in comparison Dad cuts a rather sorry figure.

Of course, he is useful for some things, like writing checks or loaning the car for the evening. But he is old-fashioned! Positively Victorian! All he knows about is business and history and classical music and other dull things like that. He tells the same old long-winded jokes over and over and keeps talking about how things were when he was young. Why its practically impossible to get on the same wave length with him.



They make a belated admission that Dad was one of the really grand people who influenced their lives, one of the really powerful forces that helped shape their maturity.

They begin to realize how hard their father worked for them, how unselfishly he shared the fruit of his toil, how little he asked for himself. Looking back, they marvel at the tolerance with which father treated their bad manners, their selfishness, their disregard for the peace and comfort of the family, their greed for privileges, their duty of family responsibility.

For many children this final period of truth and understanding comes too late. Often Dad has gone to his Eternal Reward by the time a true sense of values has balanced his children's appreciation of him.

A word of thanks, a hug of affection, a grateful prayer is a small return for a father's lifetime of love and loyalty. It is all they desire.


DAD COMES BACK

The first Father's Day in the U.S. was observed in Spokane,



Washington, in 1910, at the urging of Mrs. John Dodd who wanted to give recognition to her father, William Smart, for his devotion in raising six motherless children. However, the day wasn't celebrated across the country until it was declared a national holiday in 1916 by President Woodrow Wilson, himself the father of three daughters.

C-102 DETROIT, MICH.

In October of 1964, Council 102, Detroit, Michigan and on November 7, 1964, the Mid-Central District proposed Honorary Membership for Ann Mae Uznis. The delegates at the 1972 National Convention approved the Honorary Membership Committee's Resolution to confer this honor upon Ann, for her 39 years of devoted activities with and for the Knights of Lithuania at all levels.

Ann joined the K of L, Council 102, in September of 1934, received the Third Degree in 1952 and the

Fourth Degree in August of 1959.

In the Supreme Council, she served as Financial Secretary, Secretary of a Convention Presidium and in at least 25 years of National Conventions, Ann served on the various Convention Committees, such as Resolutions, Greetings, Mandates, etc., representing her Council or District as a Delegate.

In the Mid-Central District, she held the offices of Recording Secretary and Trustee for several terms. Young people always liked and admired Ann perhaps because she liked them, enjoyed working with them at Junior rallys and the Camp Dainava activities. She helped re-activate Council 43 in Grand Rapids and Council 79 in Detroit. Her other District activities range from Co-Chairman of a District convention to committee member of the various religious and cultural events; from being a Delegate to the District Conventions 20 times or more, to being a participant in the Sports Tournaments 20 times or more.

Ann's activities in the Council include being Vice President, 2 terms; Recording Secretary, 4 terms; Trustee, many terms; and serving as chairman or committee member on various Committees as Juniors, Ritual, Cultural, Lithuanian Affairs or Sports. She has served as Mistress of Ceremonies, Chairman or Committee member for such functions as banquets, St. Casimer Day commemorations, plays, dances, picnics, outings, and card parties. For the over 25 years Ann was active, would be impossible to enumerate each of these by event and date.

She has enrolled at least 50 new members in the K of L and always tried to be an exemplary member herself, thereby arousing interest, activity and loyalty to the K of L in those members she enrolled and those she worked with.

Ann also contributed no small measure of time and effort to working for her parish, either as Chairman of the Forty Hours Devotion, as she did for 8 years, or as Chairman of a \$50 a plate Banquet or some benefit dinners. She sang with the local K of L choir for over 10 years, bowled with the league for over 10 years and always found time to be one of the willing helpers for those annual parish activities such as festivals, picnics, etc.

Ann Mae Uznis gave of herself to our K of L for so many years and the K of L was the beneficiary of every such unselfish effort, For this, it is a good thing we do - it is fitting that the K of L show its thanks by conferring upon Ann the Honorary Membership at this National Convention.

PASKUTINIS SUDIE DAIL. JONUI SUBACIUI

š.m. balandžio 18 d., po ilgesnės ligos, iškeliavo pas Prabočius, negrįžtamai, dail. Jonas Subačius.

Dail. J. Subačių tenka laikyti vienu žymiausiu bažnytinio - tautinio meno dekoravimo kūrėju.

Dailininkas gimė 1904.I.12 Brooklyne. Meno mokėsi bent keliose Meno mokyklose, Vašingtone, National School of Art, New Yorke, Art Student League ir Italijoj, Romos Reggia Academia di Belle Arti. Taip, kad meno darbui buvo pilnai pasiruošęs ir

toje srityje dirbo iki pat mirties.

Dail. J. Subačiaus mėgiamiausias darbas buvo bažnyčių puošimas ir jų dekoravimas ir, čia jis buvo nepamainomas, ypač jungime tautiškojo ir bažnytinio meno. Jo sukurti bažnyčių altoriai, liaudies motyvų ornamentais - sekė gražią ir didingą mūsų tautos pasaką ir įžengęs į jo išpuoštą bažnyčią, matydavai gražiąją mūsų Tėvynę, su pakelių kryžiais, smutkeliais.

Aušros Vartų, Šiluvos, Marijos paveikslai buvo jo mėgiama tematika bažnyčių altoriams. Paskutinysis jo darbas Apreiškimo parapijos Brooklyne - Aušros Vartų Marijos paveikslas - tautiškų oranmentų rėmuose.

Du didžiuliai paveikslai tautiška tematika: "Mindaugo karūnacija" ir "Vasario 16 Signatoriai" -Maspheto parapijos salėje.

Daug įvairių iliustracijų, knygu, plokštelių, viršelių ir, vis tautiškais motyvais - yra labai daug sukūres.

O kiek kūrinių, paveikslų, škicų liko dailininko atelje?

Visa tai tautai ir mums ilgai kalbės gyva menininko kalba ir jo vardas jau yra įamžintas jo darbais mūsų tautos meno istorijoje.

Jonas Subačius mylėjo meną ir juo stengėsi savo jausmus, meilę reikšti Dievui, ypač Mar i ir Tėvynei. Jo darbai pilnai pateisina, kada tai pasakytus Dr. Vinco Kudirkos žodžius: "Gyvenk taip, kad nesupelytum ir neliktum be likusio ženklo, kad žmogumi buvai".

Taip, Jonas buvo žmogus, žmogus vertas lietuvio menininko vardo. Jis buvo gimęs Dėdės Samo žemėje, bet mylėjo daugiau savo tėvų kraštą, negu daugelis mūsų, kurie esame gimę, augę, mokslus ėję savo tėvynėje... Mes Tėvynei daugiau esame skolingi, negu mes galvojame. Tėvynė davė mums visą, o mes, ją palikome sunkiausioje jos valandoje. Ir mums tenka raudonuoti prieš tuos, kurie, kaip Jonas Subačius, jos nemates - duoda daugiau...

Kaipo žmogus, Jonas buvo be jokių "pretenzijų, ambicijos, bet žinojo savo vertę ir buvo toks, koks turėjo būti: malonus žmogus, puikus patriotas ir geras dailininkas. Dailininkas toks, kokio ilgai New Yorko lietuvių visuomenėje bus pasigendama.

Liūdniausias vaizdas buvo atsilankius i Jono laidotuves pasakyti paskutinį sudiev. Liūdniausia ne dėl to, kad jis iškeliavo pas Prabočius - čia yra būtinybė neišvengiama jokiam tvariniui pasauly. Liūdniausia, kad pasakyti paskutinį Jonui Subačiui sudiev, atvyko tik vienintelis jaunas menininkas Petras Saudanavičius iš gero pusšimčio dailininkų New Yorke, neskaitant keletą artimųjų ir menininko bičiulių.

Nežinau kuo tai galima paskaityti: "nežinojimu", apsileidimu, ignoravimu, ar dar kuo nors? Deja, kaip ten bebūtų, bet visai tai nesiderinama su dai-

lininko profesija, garbe ir etika.

Gali žmogus patikti, ar ne, mėgti jį, ar ne. Bet paskutinį sudiev reikia pasakyti net ir savo didžiausiam priešui. O, be to, "priešas" Jonas Subačius niekam nebuvo ir nemanau, kad jis "priešu" turėjo? Nesu girdėjęs, kad jis apie ka nors būtų bent neigiamai atsiliepes.

Jonas Subačius mylėjo tėvynę, mylėjo visus ir kaip tas "Laisvės kovų savanoris - tarnavo dėl Tėvynės ir neužtarnavo nei lentos ar grabo". Tiesa, Jonas "lenta" užtarnavo, bet respekto dėl jo darbų -

jokio.

Visa tai nėra jau taip svarbu: kas dirbo Tėvynei, dirbs ir toliau, bet panašus elgesys "užmuša" ir parodo gyvenimą tokį "bevertį", o žmones "tuščius".

Tebūna Tau, Jonai, lengva Dėdės Samo žemė, nors tu sava, jautria menininko siela, labai mylėjai ir dirbai jai - savo tėvų žemei - Lietuvai. J.J.

LIETUVOS VALSTYBINIS ŽENKLAS - VYTIS

Vytis - kaip Lietuvos valstybės ženklas yra mūmyse nuo XV amžiaus. Jo užuomazga laikoma Kęstučio pinigėliuose iškaltas raitelis, kurį tauta įsivaizdavo kaip patį kunigaikštį - valdovą. Šitokia figūra Lietuvoje buvo populiari nuo neatmenamų laikų.


Gal tokį ženklą lietuviai ir turėjo dar anksčiau prieš Kęstutį, tik jis nemetaliniuose daiktuose negalėjo išlikti.

Vytautas tokį pat ženklą pakartojo savo Lucke mušdintose monetose. Apie tą patį laiką raiti savo antspaudose pasirodo kunigaikščiai: Vytautas, Jogaila, Kaributas, Švitrigaila. Tuo keliu raitelis Lietuvoje palaipsniui pasidarė valdovo simboliu, o valdovo simbolis brendo aukščiausiu Lietuvos Didžiosios Kunigaikštijos išskiriamuoju ženklu.

Vytis ilgokai pasivaržė dėl pirmosios vietos su "Stiebų Vartais" - Gedimino Stulpais, kuris tuo laiku buvo laikomas Lietuvos herbu ir Vytauto kariuomenės vėliavose Žalgirio kovos metu jis plėvesavo, todėl svetimųjų ilgokai buvo laikomas kaip valstybės ženklas. Tas varžybas raitelio naudai nusvėrė Vytautas iš Vilniaus sosto pakartojęs raitelį jau kaip, valstybės išskiriamąjį ženklą, savo vilniškėse monetose, visai D. Kunigaikštijai.

VYTIES ATVAIZDAS

Vytis pradžioje buvo tik paprastas, nedailiai ir netiksliai vaizduotas raitojo valdovo paveikslas. Jojo jis į dešinę pusę. Laikui bėgant arklio ir raitelio figūros priderintos prie realybės. Jogailos laikais raiteliui ant kairiojo peties užkabintas skydas su dvigubu kryžiumi. Kunigaikščio Kazimiero laikais prie šalmo buvo prikabinėtos plunksnos, kaspinai. Žygimanto Augusto laikais žirgas buvo pertiestas ilga, karpytais galais iki žemės nutįsusia gūnia. Raitelio ir dugno spalvos taip pat ne sykį

pagal individualinį skonį kaitaliojosi. Tačiau iš istorinių laikų išlikęs vyties atvaizdas iki mūsų laikų turi tam tikras nusistovėjusias formas:

1. Pagrinde šarvuotas raitelis su skydu ant kairiojo peties, jojo baltu žirgu smūgiui iškėlęs kalavija;

2. Fiziologiška išraiška - žirgas sparčiame vijimosi bėgime, o pats jojėjas lyg siekiąs ką tuoj pasivijęs kirsti (iš to ir Vyties vardas);

3. Visas ženklas - baltas Vytis raudoname dugne.

NEPRIKLAUSOMYBĖS LAIKAIS

Nepriklausomybės kūrimosi pradžioje mūsų vyriausybė perėmė didžiųjų kunigaikščių ženklą kaip mūsų valstybės herbą. Standartinio vieno ženklo nebuvo. Plačiausiai vartojamas ir žinomas dail. A. Žmuidzinavičiaus nupieštas Vytis. Jo išskirtinė žymė - žirgas apdengtas gūnia, kurios trys ilgesni galai nusitęsia žemiau žirgo kojų. Toks buvo vartojamas įstaigų antspaudose, bet be skydo. Vėliau pradėta vartoti vytį apskritime pagal 1925 m. skulpt. J. Zikaro padarytą modeli monetose. Šis žirgas buvo be gūnios. Atsirado du valstybės ženklo variantai. Vyriausybė ryžosi suvienodinti valstybės ženklą ir tam tikslui paskyrė specialią komisiją. Komisija patiekė projektą, kuris 1939 m. vyriausybės buvo patvirtintas.

Šiame projekte išlaikyta istorinė vyčio forma, paliktos tos pačios spalvos, tik padaryta nauja skydo forma ir įvestos kai kurios detalės. Šis naujas patobulintas vytis buvo naudojamas įstaigose, pasuose ir t.t.


STILIZUOTAS VYTIS

Šalia oficialaus mūsų vyties imta naudoti stilizuotą vytį. Oficialiai toks vyties pavaizdavimas nėra mūsų valstybės herbas, o tik galima skaityti, kaip jo simbolis. Toks ženklas daugiau paplitęs už Lietuvos ribų - išeivijoj. Jį matome ant automobiliu langu, atlapose nešiojamą, juo puošiama ir kai kurių kongresų ar suvažiavimų patalpos. Kai kurie stilizuoti arkliukai yra labai neaiškūs ir nežinančiam sunku suprasti ką jie vaizduoja. Neprikl. Lietuvos laikais tokiais stilizuotais vyčiais buvo papuoštos Valstybės Teatro leidiniai bei programos. Daugiau jis nebuvo vartojamas. Stilizuotas vytis nėra tikras valstybės ženklas ir jį reikėtų vengti vartoti ypatingose iškilmėse arba svetimtaučių tarpe, šiems - aiškumo dėliai. Nepriklausomos Lietuvos vyriausybės tokia vytis oficialiai niekad nebuvo vartojamas.



REV. CONTONS CELEBRATES ANNIVERSARY

On May 13, 1973, REV. ALBERT CONTONS, National Spiritual Adviser of the Knights of Lithuania, celebrated the 25th Anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. The event was commemorated with a Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Peter's Church, South Boston, and a Banquet at the Lithuanian Citizens Club, So. Boston. The Supreme Council extends sincerest best wishes to Father on this important anniversary.


About Father Contons...

Born on May 11, 1924, in South Boston, Father Contons (Kontautas) attended local schools and was graduated from Boston Latin School in 1941.

That same year, he entered the college department of St. John's Seminary, continuing with studies in philosophy and theology until his ordination on May 6, 1948, by Richard Cardinal Cushing in Holy Cross Cathedral, Boston.

His first assignment was as assistant pastor in St. Peter's Lithuanian parish, South Boston. In 1953, he was appointed instructor at St. Sebastian's School, Newton, where he teaches French and religion. Since 1962, he has also been serving as chaplain of the Cenacle Convent, Brighton.

Father Contons continued advanced studies at Boston College from 1950 to 1953, receiving the



M.A. degree in economics. At Laval University, Quebec, he studied during the summers of 1962-1964 and received the Diploma Elem. de Français. He has also studied in France at the Institut Touraine, Tours, and at the University of Grenoble during the summers of 1967 and 1971.

Since ordination, Father Contons has been active in Lithuanian affairs. He has served as national spiritual advisor of the Knights of Lithuania from 1952 to 1961 and from 1968 to the present.

In 1960 he organized and led the Knights of Lithuania Pilgrimage to the Eucharistic Congress in Munich, Germany. And since 1953 he has served as spiritual advisor to the Lithuanian Blue Army Movement, which promotes devotion to Our Lady of Fatima.

Cardinal Cushing, in 1960, appointed Father Contons president of the Auxiliary of the Sisters of Jesus Crucified. During his term of office (1960-1967) he helped the Sisters in raising funds for construction of their new Mother-house chapel and St. Joseph's Manor Nursing Home, both in Brockton. He is at present a member of the Sisters' Lay Advisory Board.

Since 1971, Father has served as president of the Lithuanian Roman Catholic Priests' League of America. And, since 1970, he has been a member of the Boston Priests' Senate, and a member of its Advisory Board since 1972.

He has been a frequent contributor to various publications, including Vytis (The Knight), Soul, The Boston Pilot, Darbininkas (The Worker), and Lituanus. He has also written the English text for the "History of St. Peter's Parish", South Boston; compiled the "Knights of Lithuania Leadership Manual"; authored a booklet on the life of St. Casimir.


Father Contons' mother passed away in 1952. His father presently resides on L Street, South Boston. He has two brothers, Stephen, of Laconia, N.H., and John, of Acton. His sister, Mrs. Ruth Slanina, lives in Bristol, Conn.




LITHUANIAN LORE LADY HONORED

To John's sister and her family, the Supreme Council and the VYTIS Staff extend a most heartfelt sympathy.





Dear Editor,






program.
