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
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

BRAZILIAN TFP FUND

Because the Knights of Lithuania did not collect the required \$5000.00 for the Brazilian TFP project to collect 1,000,000 signatures on behalf of persecuted Lithuanian Catholics, the project was not undertaken. Of a total of \$1200 collected, \$600.00 had been sent to TFP in Brazil and the balance was to be sent when the project was completed. Dr. Jack Stukas, K of L Coordinator of the Fund Drive, announced that since the TFP cancelled plans for the project, they would be asked to return the \$600.00 sent them, and this money and the remaining money would be given to the Lithuanian Affairs Committee Fund.

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COMMENTS ABOUT... HON. JOHN W. MC CORMACK, "FRIEND OF LITHUANIA"



SPEAKER JOHN W MC-CORMACK, Recipient of the Rev. John C. Jutt "FRIEND OF LITHUANIA" Award for 1973 presented by Anthony Miner, Immediate Past National Chairman, Lithuanian Affairs Committee...

We are honored to have with us today a truly dedicated public servant who has given unselfishly of himself, working for what is our motto, "For God and Country".

In the long and fruitful career of Speaker John W. McCormack we have come to recognize the most sterling of his qualities, his great personal integrity.

As a young man, John W. McCormack chose to study law and was admitted to the Massachusetts Bar in 1913. Shortly thereafter, he became a member of the Massachusetts Constitutional Convention and then, in 1920, a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives. Three years later, he was called to serve in the Massachusetts State Senate where his obvious ability immediately marked him as Leader of the Party in that assembly. In the year 1927, he was elected to the United States House of Representatives, and re-elected at every subsequent election until he retired in 1970. He was elected Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives in 1962 and served for the longest continuous period in history as Speaker of the House.

Throughout his long political career, Speaker John W. McCormack was and is a staunch friend of the people of Lithuania and of the Knights of Lithuania. Our advancement was one of his objectives which commanded his unswerving loyalty. On many occasions he proved to be helpful and an influential contact for people seeking to forward the interests of Lithuania.



Mr. McCormack has been a constant force in Congress, speaking out against the evils of Communism, and urging his countrymen to take steps to obtain peace by strength, not apathy. As the chief engineer of the "Captive Nations Bill", John McCormack made a major contribution toward the fight for freedom of Lithuania and all other nations suffering under Communist oppression. Because of this bill, which represents the basis of our national foreign policy, the United States has stood firm in not recognizing the illegal occupation by Russia of the Baltic States and other Captive Nations. Also because of the Captive Nations Bill, the President of the USA and many Governors and Mayors annually proclaim and

designate one week in July as "Captive Nations Week", encouraging US citizens to speak out in body against the suppression of human rights and freedoms in Communist dominated countries.

John W. McCormack has very deservedly been honored by many fraternal associations in our country and abroad, and were I to list them all, I would exceed my alloted time.

Today, in honoring ability of the highest order and devoted service, over nearly half a century, the Knights of Lithuania can be seen to stand in good company.

In offering a public token of gratitude for a constructive interest in Lithuanian Affairs, we are reflecting the wishes of our people.

As immediate past National Chairman of the Lithuanian Affairs Committee, I am pleased and proud in behalf of the Knights of Lithuania to present this award, the Rev. John C. Jutt "Friend of Lithuania" Gold Medal Award to former Speaker of the House, the Honorable JOHN W. MC COR-MACK.



When it was asked if Lithuanian was spoken in their homes, they all replied that their parents speak Lithuanian when they do not want the children to know what they are saying. At this point, we took time to learn a few Lithuanian words.


One of the highlights of this discussion was a question raised by one junior ... "What's the use of being a Lithuanian if you do not know what a Lithuanian is?" Here the Juniors expressed a great desire to learn about their Lithuanian heritage. They even offered a few suggestions. They would like to speak Lithuanian at their dinner

tables. Also, following the council meetings, 10 or 15 minutes should be dedicated to increasing the knowledge of the Lithuanian language or of Lithuania's history. This would include, for example, a film strip or the teaching of a few new Lithuanian words.

In closing, I found the Juniors extremely enthusiastic, but they are looking to the adults and parents for their help and encouragement. The 60th National Convention motto is "Renewal of the Founders' Spirit". The ideal way for the renewal of the spirit is through the junior members. They are the future of the K of L. Please extend to the Juniors your help in any way possible. They are ready. very willing, and most able to see the wonderful heritage they have be carried out in the Knights of Lithuania.



Malonu būti su jumis ir asmeniai jus pasveikinti dalyvaujant 60-me L.V. seime. Sąlygose ir laikuose, kuriuose L.V. tenka iki šiol veikti, tiek metų darbuotis, yra gerai išlaikytas egzaminas.

Likti ištikimu net pagrindiniams žmogaus gyvenimo principams reikalauja ištvermės. Ištvermė reikalauja pasiaukojimo, kuris ne visada yra lengvas ir malonus. O gi laisvai prisiimti obalsiai, įsipareigojimai to pasiaukojimo ir ištvermės reikalauja dar daugiau. L.V. uždaviniai, siekimai, obalsis, nors ir turi ryšio su mūsų prigimta (tautybe), kilme, yra jūsų prisiimti laisvai. Jiems ištikimybė ir gerais ir blogais, net ir beviltiškais laikais yra tikrai gražių ir ištikimų asmenybių puiki atestacija.

Viskam ištikimybė, ištvermė, pasiaukojimas reikalauja paramos, pagalbos. Tik žmogišku įsitikinimų, sentimentų čia nepakanka. Be aukštesnio pagrindo labai lengva susvyruoti, ypatingai laisvai prisiimtuose įsipareigojimuose, užsimojimuose.

Ką žmogus daro Dievo vardu, ar Jo vardu įsipareigoja, tai padeda žmogui nugalėti net patį save ir likti ištikimu pažadams, įsipareigojimams. Ir jūs L.V. savo ištikimybę savo kilmės tautai, jos kraštui; ištikimybė pačiam Dievui;

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ką pažadate Dievo vardu, tai darote rimtai, sąmoningai. Visokiose aplinkybėse liekate ištikimi tam obalsiui, už ką ir nėra gražesnio: Dievui ir Tėvynei.

Nekartosiu, kaip dabar gyvena lietuvis Lietuvoje ir kitur okupanto vergijoje. Jo ištikimybė Dievui ir Tėvynei dažnai pareikalauja net vergijos ir net gyvybės aukos. Jūsų veiklos gandas juos pasiekia, pasieks ir šio jūsų seimo gandas. Galite suprasti kiek paguodos tai atneš visai pavergtai tautai, kiek paskatinimo tam jaunimui būti ištikimais Dievui, savo tautai, tėvynei.

Savo seimą sujungėte šioje bažnyčioje su malda į Šv. Mariją už Lietuvą. Pasidalinkime keliomis mintimis ir apie tai. Paskutiniu laiku buvo galima išgirsti nepalankių išsitarimų Šv. Marijos garbinimui ir mūsų pamaldumui į Mariją. Kaip prieš du mėnesiu viena vieša iškilminga proga pareiškė Popiežius Paulius VI: atsirado asmenų, kurie dažnai apeliuodavo į Vatikano II susirinkimo nutarimus, skelbdami tokias mintis, kurios buvo visai priešingos tiems nutarimams. Viskas, kas buvo kieno pasakyta ar parašyta prieš Šv. Mariją ir Jos kultą, neturėjo ir neturi jokio pagrindo Vatikano II susirinkimo nutarimuose.



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COMMUNICATIONS...

"Communication Among Ourselves and With Others - How to get a Response from Members and Affiliation with other Lithuanian Groups", was presented by Leon Pauksta.

He approached the topic with the viewpoint that good communication requires good salesmanship, and we are all salesmen for the Knights of Lithuania but, the question is whether or not we are good salesmen.

Attempting to shore up the unrelenting spirit of K of L salesman must have, part of a tape recorded series on the "Dynamics of Personal Motivation", was presented. The series itself was originated by the Success Motivation Institute of Waco, Texas, considered a leading authority on personal motivation and motivation in business management. Questions and discussion followed.

JUNIORS ... A GUIDELINE FOR MOTIVATION

Any National organization must make provisions for the motivation of its youngest members, so that leadership and interested membership may be maintained in the future. Individual councils provide for the needs and interests of their own members, but there must be some stimulus which will encourage our active youngsters to look beyond the scope of the council, and into the area of District and National participation.

60TH ANNIVERSARY REVIEW AND PREVIEW

Due to unforeseen circumstances, the time allotted for the special Anniversary Panels was greatly shortened. Because of this, it was only possible to present the "Review" part of the program, with just a very. brief glimpse at the "Preview".

Short reviews of the past were given by former Presidents, the first of which was Prof. Alexander J. Aleksis who served as Supreme Council President 1918-1919 and 1923-1924. He is also the composer of the K of L hymn which has been sung by K of L'ers since 1916. Prof. Aleksis gave a synopsis of some of the accomplishments and problems of the K of L members in the very early years of the organization. One of the highlights mentioned was the 10th National Convention which was held in the State Capitol of Springfield, Ill. Limosines were provided for transportation, meals and accommodations were provided without charge, for the delegates and guests who attended. Prof. Aleksis related that the K of L hymn was his first composition and because of it, he went on to compose numerous other compositions. He related how the 2nd National Convention held in Brockton, Mass. was the one that served the foundation of the organization - that the delegates left that convention inspired and dedicated to promote the Knights of Lithuania organization. Between the 2nd and 3rd Convention, councils sprung up like mushrooms in various Lithuanian communities and the Knights of Lithuania were on their way. In his closing remarks, he expressed the hope that the delegates of this 60th Convention would also return to their councils full of inspiration and desire to make the Knights of Lithuania a stronger, bigger and better organization.

Illness prevented the participation of Mr. Anthony Mazeika at this session, as he was under doctor's care and had to leave Saturday immediately after the Luncheon. However, the moderator briefly reviewed some of the highlights of Mr. Mazeika's tenure as President of the Knights of Lithuania during the years of 1934-1938 and 1940-1941. One of the highlights was the offer of Dr. Leimonas, the President of the Pavasarininkai and Mr. Joseph Laucka to come to the U.S. and tour the Lithuanian colonies with an exhibit of Lithuanian arts, crafts, weavings and movies. The purpose of this tour was solely to promote the Knights of Lithuania organization. A total of 52 Lithuanian communities were visited during a period of almost 6 months. Upon completion of the tour, they attended the 1936 National Convention, presented a report, turned over a balance of some \$300.00 from the tour (which was conducted

without any cost to the organization) and finally donated to the Knights of Lithuania all the exhibit material that they had brought from Lithuania. Due to lack of storage facilities to keep these treasures, the Knights of Lithuania divided them in thirds and donated them to the Marian Fathers in Marianapolis, Conn., the Sisters of St. Casimir in Chicago, Ill. and the Sisters of St. Francis in Pittsburgh, Penna.

The second highlight was in 1938, when 50 K of L'ers participated in an excursion to Lithuania for a period of 2 months. They were warmly (to say the least) received by the people of Lithuania from the moment the train reached Lithuania's border and throughout the entire trip, which took them to every town and village of Lithuania.

Mr. Joseph Boley who was President of the Knights of Lithuania from 1946 to 1949 was presented. During his administration, the K of L flag was "born" and christened and numerous constitutional and ritual streamlinings effected. Mr. Boley stressed the importance of Supreme Council Officers executing their duties and striving to promote activity on District and Council level. The next person introduced was Mr. Alexander Wesey, who has served three separate terms as President for a total of 8 years. Of the 26 persons who have held the office of President during the 60 years

of Knights of Lithuania Organization's existence, Mr. Wesey, whose terms of office were 1949-1952, 1954-1956 and 1965-1968, has the distinction of having served the longest time in the office of President. Mr. Wesey, in the interest of conserving time, did not bring out any of the highlights during the times that he served as President, but only expressed the pleasure and privilege at being able to serve the organization and donated \$100.00 to the Supreme Council.

The person who was at the helm of the Knights of Lithuania organization from 1960-1963, Mr. Robert Boris was presented to the delegates. It was during his term of office that, due to the depleting condition of the K of L finances, the move was made to change the Vytis from the letterpress to the offset format, thereby not only stopping the depletion of K of L funds, but enabling them to grow modestly. As a result, today, enabling funds - modest as they are are available for other most important K of L projects. Mr. Boris, in the few minutes he had to speak, chose not to speak of the past, but rather of the present and the future, expressing the desire that the K of L'ers would not be content to rejoice in the accomplishments of the past, but would concern themselves with the problems that face us today and will become greater as we go on into the future, unless we make the effort now to draw in younger people into the organization.

Since the President of the Knights of Lithuania from 1968-1972, Dr. Jack Stukas had to return to New York for his weekly Lithuanian Radio Program, the moderator briefly mentioned two of the highlights of his tenure. They were the K of L trips to Europe and South America. During the trip to Europe, K of L'ers participated in the blessing of the chapel at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome that was dedicated to the Lithuanian Martyrs. In South America, K of L'ers met with the local Lithuanians of five countries and presented concerts in 5 South American countries.

In closing, the moderator, Helen Shields, who served as President from 1963-65, expressed the hope that those present would re-dedicate themselves to work for God and Country by "Renewing. the Founders' Spirit" and go forth from the Conven-

tion seeking to fill our ranks with young Catholic American Lithuanians who will ensure the future of the Knights of Lithuania organization.

Numerous regrets were expressed that the time did not permit this part of the program to continue in order to expand on some of the thoughts and ideas presented ever so briefly in regard to our "future". Perhaps thought should be given to presenting "The Preview" part more in detail at our 61st National Convention.

RESOLUTIONS

WHEREAS, the United States, by its participation in the European Security and Cooperation Conference in Helsinki is attempting to help resolve the problems of Eastern Europe, and

WHEREAS, the military occupation and annexation by the Soviet Union of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia has never been recognized by the United States, and

WHEREAS, the basic human rights of these peoples continue to be violated,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania, convening for its 60th National Convention at Stonehill College, North Easton, Mass., August 16-19, 1973, strongly protest this betrayal of human freedoms by the Soviet Union, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Knights of Lithuania urge President Nixon and members of the Senate and House of Representatives to insist that any European Security agreement recognize the right of self-determination of the peoples of Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia, and their right to freedom of worship, press and speech. These basic human freedoms must not be sacrificed for the sake of trade agreements.

WHEREAS, nine representatives of Lithuanian, Latvian and Estonian organizations in the Free World went to Helsinki to inform delegates to the European Security and Cooperation Conference (July 3-7, 1973) and members of the news media covering the conference about the violation of basic human rights in the Soviet-occupied Baltic States, and ment of the right of freedom of expression of the Baltic representatives, several of whom are American citizens.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania express their thanks to Secretary of State William Rogers, for his prompt intervention on behalf of those arrested.

WHEREAS, the Hallmark "Map of the World", published in 1973, does not indicate the borders, cities, rivers, or even the outline of the three Baltic Nations - Latvia, Lithuania, and Estonia,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 60th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania, meeting August 16-19, 1973 at Stonehill College, North Easton, Mass., voice an unanimous protest to the Hallmark Company for this omission, and urge the Hallmark mapmakers to correct and reissue the map.

RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania, meeting August 16-19, 1973 at Stonehill College, North Easton, Mass., for its 60th National Convention, does endorse the aims and work of CONCERNED CITI-ZENS FOR GOD AND COUNTRY, and particularly the observance of GOD DAY at St. John's University, New York, N.Y., on September 15, 1973.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania commend DRAUGAS on the article "Lietuvon Vyčių Veiklai", appearing in the August 4, 1973 issue of DRAUGAS, dealing with the history of the K of L, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that permission be secured from DRAUGAS to reprint this article in VYTIS as soon as possible after permission is secured.

WHEREAS, these same delegates were arrested, under pressure from the Soviet delegation, because of the exercise of their right of freedom of speech,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania, meeting for their 60th National Convention August 16-19, 1973, at Stonehill College, North Easton, Mass., unanimously voice their protest to the Finnish Consulate in Washington, D.C., against this infringeWHEREAS, the Knights of Lithuania sponsored and raised funds for the Lithuanian Wayside Shrine at the New York World's Fair 1964-65, BE IT RE-SOLVED, that the name of the Knights of Lithuania be included on the official stationery of the Lithuanian-American Wayside Shrine Committee.



BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania make a monetary donation of \$100.00 to the Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture in Chicago, and so become a Lifetime Member of the Museum.

BE IT RESOLVED that, upon the recommendation of the Honorary Membership Committee, Alexander (Vasiliauskas) Wesey, of C-109 Great Neck, L.I., N.Y., be conferred Honorary Membership of the Knights of Lithuania at the 61st National Convention in 1974.

BE IT RESOLVED, that a Conventionship Fund be established to assist Junior members of the Knight of Lithuania in attending National Conventions. This fund would consist of a \$200.00 per district allocation to be distributed as four \$50.00 stipends within a district.

Application would be made by individual Juniors, based on their activity during the K of L year. Recommendations accompanying these applications should come from the Junior Counselor, parent, Regular Counselor, and the Spiritual Adviser. Applications would be distributed by, and reviewed by the District 1st Vice-Presidents. All final decisions are reportable to the National 1st Vice President in charge of Juniors.

BE IT RESOLVED, that a study committee be set up to study the advisability of a Junior institution together with its own ritual and its own national officers who would function under the direction and guidance of the Supreme Council First-President. This study committee would consist of past Supreme Council First Vice-Presidents and others interested in serving on this committee. The Supreme Council would select this committee at its first meeting.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that, in order to carry out this task, the sum of no more than \$500 be appropriated to the committee so that it may define and carry out its task in developing a plan for Junior development that will be completed by May 1, 1974, be published in the June 1974 VYTIS, and be ready for follow-up action by the delegates to the 61st National Convention. WHEREAS the Northeastern region of the State of Pennsylvania is historically the "cradle of Lithuanian-Americanism" and still remains heavily populated with Lithuanians,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Knights of Lithuania appoint an Ad Hoc Committee to research and subsequently report on the possibilities of organizing the area for the Knights of Lithuania.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that organization funds be made available to the committee to finance repeated trips to this area for collection of such research data, and that the National Membership Vice-President be appointed chairman of this Ad Hoc Committee.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Supreme Council Recording Secretary submit the Supreme Council Meeting minutes for publication in VYTIS in time for the nearest VYTIS deadline after the meeting.

WHEREAS, due to the increasing number of various Ad Hoc committees that are formed at the National Convention to carry out specific tasks, and

WHEREAS neither the constitution nor the by-laws specify Supreme Council responsibility to follow up these Ad Hoc committees, BE IT RESOLVED that the Supreme Council trustees be given the task to follow up and report at each Supreme Council meeting on the progress of all Ad Hoc committees' assigned tasks at the National Convention of the year in which the Trustees are elected.

WHEREAS, Associate Members contribute their time and interest to the Knights of Lithuania, and

Social Sidelights



60TH CONVENTION CULTURAL NIGHT

Much of the language was older than what one might use today, but a brief glossary of words in the program cleared up





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any questions. The actors were all from the MAD; Rimas Vebeliunas (C-110), Birute and Vytas Radzivanas (C-41) and Helen Matthews (C-12).

This reappearence of Lithuanian drama on the national level is both overdue and most welcome. Hopefully it will be nutured and permitted to grow on all levels. The entire evening was dedicated to Dr. Jack J. Stukas who spearheaded the formation of the K of L Cultural Committee in 1955. Dr. Stukas was presented with an attractive plaque in appreciation of his tireless efforts past and present on behalf of Lithuanian Culture. -

A VISIT FROM THE "PILGRIM VIRGIN"

Truly one of the outstanding highlights of the 60th National Convention was the special "visitor" at the Convention's Closing Mass. - The famous "Pilgrim Virgin" was brought to St. Casimir's of Brockton that Sunday, and was carried to the Church during the Knights of Lithuania procession Mass. The following explanation, by St. Casimir's pastor, Rev. Peter Shakelis, appeared in that day's Parish Bulletin, and is repeated here, in hopes of providing a better understanding of the visit, and thus increasing our devotion to Our Lady of Fatima.

On the 50th Anniversary of Our Lady's appearance at Fatima, Portugal, May 13, 1967, Pope Paul VI, personally blessed a Pilgrim Virgin Statue for the United States. It was his desire that this statue be kept in the U.S. and move about in pilgrimage from diocese to diocese.

The visit of the Pilgrim Statue of Our Lady of Fatima is an indication that Mary wants us to pray for the conversion of Russia and freedom for Lithuania. Our Lady of Fatima appeared to three children in Fatima, Portugal, May 13, 1917. She asked them to return for several months to that spot on the 13th of each month. She announced to Lucia, who asked her who she was, that she was the mother of God and that

she would return on October 13. She asked them to return with others to witness a miracle. At that time she caused the sun to whirl, a great wonder which nearly 100,000 people witnessed. And she asked for certain promises relative to peace and the corrections of sins:

1. Pray the Rosary daily; 2. Wear the Brown Scapular; 3. Correct your way of life; 4. If requests are heard, Russia will be converted and there will be peace!!

Many people would like but are unable to make the pilgrimage to Our Lady at Her Shrine at Fatima. Since 1917, people of every nation and every walk of life have gone to Fatima to honor Mary, the Mother of God, to thank Her for graces received and to pray for favors of body and soul. Thus the idea unfolded "to bring Fatima to the people".

Representatives of the four districts were privileged to carry the Statue of the Pilgrim Virgin into church during the procession before the official Convention Mass at St. Casimir's, Tiny Carolyn Adamaitis proudly carried the banner of the Blue Army of Our Lady, while the equally proud Junior flower bearers were Michael Coach and Eleanor Grasha, and the Bizinkauskas youngsters, Veronica, Maryte and Paul.

Before Mass, a representative of the Blue Army explained the promises of Our Lady of Fatima and urged greater devotion to her. The Fourth Degree, Order of St. Casimir, was conferred on four members by Rev. Contons. Mass was celebrated by Bishop Brizgys, Rev. Contons and Rev. Shakelis, while the two Bishops "shared" the homily... Bishop Brizgys speaking in Lithuanian and Bishop Maguire in English.

After Mass and a quick "coffee and...", compliments of Father Shakelis, the official Convention Photo was snapped, and everyone hurried back to the college... to pack, complete bits of unfinished business, and go on to the Closing Banquet.





A VISIT FROM THE "PILGRIM VIRGIN"

Truly one of the outstanding highlights of the 60th National Convention was the special "visitor" at the Convention's Closing Mass. - The famous "Pilgrim Virgin" was brought to St. Casimir's of Brockton that Sunday, and was carried to the Church during the Knights of Lithuania procession Mass. The following explanation, by St. Casimir's pastor, Rev. Peter Shakelis, appeared in that day's Parish Bulletin, and is repeated here, in hopes of providing a better understanding of the visit, and thus increasing our devotion to Our Lady of Fatima.

On the 50th Anniversary of Our Lady's appearance at Fatima, Portugal, May 13, 1967, Pope Paul VI, personally blessed a Pilgrim Virgin Statue for the United States. It was his desire that this statue be kept in the U.S. and move about in pilgrimage from diocese to diocese.

The visit of the Pilgrim Statue of Our Lady of Fatima is an indication that Mary wants us to pray for the conversion of Russia and freedom for Lithuania.



she would return on October 13. She asked them to return with others to witness a miracle. At that time she caused the sun to whirl, a great wonder which nearly 100,000 people witnessed. And she asked for certain promises relative to peace and the corrections of sins:

1. Pray the Rosary daily; 2. Wear the Brown Scapular; 3. Correct your way of life; 4. If requests are heard, Russia will be converted and there will be peace!!

Many people would like but are unable to make the pilgrimage to Our Lady at Her Shrine at Fatima. Since 1917, people of every nation and every walk of life have gone to Fatima to honor Mary, the Mother of God, to thank Her for graces received and to pray for favors of body and soul. Thus the idea unfolded "to bring Fatima to the people".

Representatives of the four districts were privileged to carry the Statue of the Pilgrim Virgin into church during the procession before the official Convention Mass at St. Casimir's, Tiny Carolyn Adamaitis proudly carried the banner of the Blue Army of Our Lady, while the equally proud Junior flower bearers were Michael Coach and Eleanor Grasha, and the Bizinkauskas youngsters, Veronica, Maryte and Paul.

Before Mass, a representative of the Blue Army explained the promises of Our Lady of Fatima and urged greater devotion to her. 
