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OUR PATRON, ŠVENTAS KAZIMIERAS

St. Casimir, the patron Saint of Lithuania, became prominent at a time when Lithuania was primarily a nation of neophytes. It was Pope Urban VIII, in 1636, who appointed him the principal heavenly patron of all Lithuanians. On June 11, 1948, Pope Pius XII stated in a brief decree, "We confirm, appoint and proclaim St. Casimir, as the special heavenly patron of all Lithuanian youth".

St. Casimir was born on Oct. 3, 1458 in the city of Crakow, scarcely seventy years after Lithuania's conversion to Christianity. One of the few who resisted Christianity for a time was Casimir's grandfather Jogaila. Jogaila had two sons, Wladyslaw and Casimir, our subject's father. Casimir senior, succeeded Jogaila as Grand Duke

and governed Lithuania and Poland between 1440-1492. He married Princess Elizabeth, daughter of Albrecht II, Emperor and King of Germany, and therefore a descendent of the Hapsburgs. It is from this royal lineage that St. Casimir descended.

Casimir's formal training began when he was nine. He and his brothers were taught by two court officials. Instruction included reading and writing of the Polish language, then the language of the court, German, Latin, public speaking, physical education and the importance of prayer and virtuous living. The most influential teacher of the royal children was Canon John Dlugosz, a famed Polish Bishop and scholar. Of Casimir he said, "He is an excellent

youth of rare talents and remarkable knowledge".

There is no evidence as to when he learned Lithuanian. Either his father or his long stays in Lithuania are undoubtedly responsible for his mastery of that tongue. Visiting political and church dignitaries were greatly taken with the youth when he would appear before them and deliver discourses in a number of languages and on various topics.

When Casimir was 13, he was given command of an army 12,000 men strong, sent to seize the Hungarian throne. By that time the boy had become a tool of his parents. His mother's Hapsburg blood kept her sons heirs to the German throne. The failure and futility of his Hungarian campaign destroyed forever any expectations toward earthly thrones that the prince may have had.

Prince Casimir went back to his studies and received more training in the rules of chivalry, the art of rhetoric, debating and literary appreciation. His adolescent years brought with them a deeper love of prayer and stronger leanings toward the religious aspects of the court.

The King viewed these developments with alarm and hurriedly began instruction in court proceedings and judicial regulations, for Casimir was the heir to the throne, since his older brother had won the throne of Bohemia in 1471.

Frequent visits to Casimir's ancestral homeland, Lithuania began in 1474. Easter was spent in the capital, Vilnius, and numerous hunting trips took place in the surrounding forests. In 1476, the King and two of his sons spent Christmas there.

Casimir's religious side brought him to a fresh awareness of the situation in recently-baptized Lithuania. Many of the areas of the country were comprised of Ruthenians, worshippers of the Orthodox faith. His attempts to segregate these groups created great agitation, which was probably the cause for an attempted assasination of the King and the two princes in 1481. It was discovered in time, but Prince Casimir was deeply shaken when hearing of it.

When the King wanted to tend the affairs of the Grand Duchy of Lithuania more thoroughly, he sent Casimir back to Poland to rule in his stead. While there Casimir instituted many reforms which cured ills that had gradually corrupted the Polish government. He personally aided in helping the poor and the sick. Although gaining great praise and respect, Casimir did not find the fulfillment he needed in court life. He drew closer to God. Self-inflicted penances and fasts became the order of the day. He spent entire days meditating in the chapel. He often wore a penitential hairshirt beneath his princely garments. Sometimes he declined his bed, preferring to sleep on the floor, with his arms outstretched in the form of the cross.

In 1483, Casimir's health began a noticeable decline, many saying it was the result of his harsh treatment of himself. His illness developed quickly and on the morning of Mar. 4, 1484, the 25 year old prince died in the arms of his mother. He was buried in the Vilnius Cathedral, where a chapel was erected in his honor.

His canonization took place in 1521 by Pope Leo X. March 4 was established as his feast day. Devotion to St. Casimir spread to many parts of Europe. Today, there are at least twenty Lithuanian and thirty-four Polish Parishes in the United States dedicated to St. Casimir. Several organizations have also chosen him as their patron saint, including our own K of L.

For many, St. Casimir is still the one to whom they can accord their trust, hopes and aspirations.

OUR'NEXT CONVENTION-DETROIT



A NEW CULTURAL CENTER FOR NEW YORK LITHUANIANS

For the New York Lithuanian community, Feb. 10, 1974 represented the culmination of some 10 years of hard work, and the realization of a dream of decades. A new Lithuanian Cultural Center - "Kultūros Židinys" - in Brooklyn, N.Y., was formally blessed and dedicated. The impressive structure, built under the auspices of the Lithuanian Franciscan Fathers, St. Casimir Priory, includes a large multi-purpose auditorium, a smaller hall, and numerous meeting rooms for the public, as well as comfortable monastery quarters, a chapel, and the printing facilities used for publication of DARBININKAS, GARSAS, and numerous other Lithuanian publications.

Most Reverend Francis J. Mugavero, Bishop of Brooklyn, officiated at the blessing and remained as a guest for the Mass and formal dedication that followed. Most Reverend Vincentas Brizgys, Bishop in Exile of Kaunas and Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago, was chief celebrant at the concelebrated Mass and delivered the sermon, while the Lithuanian Men's Chorus "Perkūnas", directed by Vytautas Strolia, and soloist Gina Čapkauskiene sang hymns during Mass. Hon. Anicetas Simutis, General Consul of Lithuania at New York and various officials of the Franciscan Fathers and the Lithuanian community extended greetings during the Dedication Ceremony. A most enjoyable concert, presented by tenor Kazys Yakutis of Worcester, Mass. and soprano Gina Čapkauskiene of Canada, accompanied by Saulius Cibas, closed the day's festivities on a musical note.

New York Lithuanians long felt the need for a "home of their own"... a cultural center where young and old could gather for religious, social and cultural events, but it took the Franciscans to make the dream a reality. A Franciscan Fathers building fund was started in 1964, at the suggestion of Rev. Peter Baniunas and with the permission of newly-elected provincial, Rev. Leonard Andriekus. Rev. Juvinalis Liauba sought out and arranged for the purchase of an attractive and ample piece of property on Highland Blvd. in Brooklyn, and overcame the legal hurdles standing in the way of proceeding with the project.

From then on, only needed finances stood between the dream and the reality. Rev. Paulius Baltakis, Rev. Baniunas, Rev. Gailiusis, and other members of

the order, aided by many lay people, pursued their cause with vigor, ambition and much personal sacrifice, ringing doorbells, writing letters, advertising via press and radio and planning and supervising numerous social activities. Ten years later, thanks to the devoted efforts of the Franciscans and the generosity of the local Lithuanian people, New York Lithuanians have their "ŽIDINYS"!

IT'S A FACT

When rhesus monkeys were put on an "average American diet" they were practically poisoned. So related Dr. Robert Wissler, University of Chicago professor of pathology, to the American Heart Association. Though the monkey dieters ate more than others, they made poor weight gains, showed bad blood vessels, and died before the two years research program was fulfilled.

Russian scientists reported, in 1970, that coloring agent Red #2 was cancer-inducing and caused birth defects in laboratory animals. This coloring agent is used in the USA in candy, ice cream, soft drinks, jams, breakfast cereals, hot dogs, etc.

In the USA the Delaney Clause is the consumer's guardian against carcinogens (cancer inducing agents in foods). It prohibits the Federal Drug Administration from permitting food processors to add carcinogenic chemicals to foods.

Forget about ordering your hard liquor in plastic throw away bottles. The U.S. Treasury Department's Bureau of Alcohol has banned the use of polyvinyl chloride containers after tests showed that liquor leeched out toxic agents.


You may be healthier if you cook your foods in enamel pots and pans. Tests, in Sant Agostino Hospital in Modena, Italy, proved that enamelware sheds more bacteria when washed. Out of the 1973 meeting of The American Academy of Allergy came the resolution urging the FDA to require warning labels on all medications containing aspirin. It is blamed for bad asthmatic attacks to people that are sensitive to aspirin.

The restricted saccharin sweetener had produced bladder cancer in three out of 48 rats tests by the FDA laboratories. It may soon join cyclamates on the banned list.

Fumaric acid which is used in fruit juice drinks was blamed to have degerative effects on teeth by University of Indiana researchers. The acid is found in soft drinks, gelatin desserts, puddings and pie fillings.

The purple dye meat stamp used by Government meat inspectors has been banned by the FDA. Japanese lab tests proved it to be a cancer causing agent. This coloring agent (also known as Violet #2) was found in soft drinks, candy, ice cream, snack foods and drugs. About 30% of it was used to mark meat.

About 60% of heart attacks occur to persons who do not have high cholesterol in their blood. This fact was reported at the California Medical Association convention. High blood pressure and heredity are the high risk factors.



Vitamin C dificiency is suspected in high cholesterol cases. A lack of this vitamin, not serious enough to cause scurvy, disturbs the conversion of cholesterol into bile acids in lab animals.

If you drink more than five cups of coffee per day you double your chances of getting a heart attack. The Lancet, British Medical Journal, stated that the strong stimulation through the nervous system results in the rapid beating of the heart and extra systoles even in healthy persons.

The Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness warns against the indiscriminate use of aerosol spray cans. The hair sprays, deodorants and cake cream toppings are propelled by Freon (flourine) gas. The spray gas, when inhaled, can depress the heart and can cause death in extreme cases. This fact is seconded by the Chicago Tribune's science editor.

If the K of L's hold their next national convention in a Hilton hotel they might be healthier. When the American College of Cardiology held its meeting and dined in Chicago's Conrad Hilton last year, the conventioneers became appalled at the rich foods they were served at their meetings. The majority believed that rich foods were a factor in causing hardening of the arteries. The Hilton agreed to offer low cholesterol and low calorie dinners. Eliminated are all meat fats, egg yolks, butter and pan drippings in baking and cooking. All meat will be trimmed off fat before cooking. Cut out are cold cuts. Chicken is to be cooked without skin. Skim milk will be used and fruit dishes will be the dessert.

It was a year ago that the Federal Trade Commission cited two sugar trade associations with false advertising in magazines and were ordered to run disclaimer advertisements. The FTC found objectionable their claims that

sugar aids dieter to lose weight, that candy or soft drinks reduce your appetite.

Earlier, Ralph Nader and his investigators accused the FDA of aiding the food industry in putting a chemical feast on American dinner tables. America can get along fine without the more than 3,000 additives commonly used. The report stated that additives increase the profits of the industry.


Sara Petkus and Eloise Berczelly, Spiritual Advisor - Rev. W. Katarskis.

FOR A "WINDOW TO THE WORLD" -



"TRY SWL OR DX'ING"

Travel to all corners of the world, travel with the speed of sound, faster than the astronauts in a space capsule as they circle the world in outer space. It is all possible thru the medium of short wave radio.

SWL and DX'ing are abbreviations for the name of a fascinating hobby - Short Wave Listening and Long Distance Listening.

How many of you still have an old tube type radio in the attic or in the cellar with a short wave band? For something exciting and different, try attaching an antenna and ground wire, then explore the S.W. band. It is possible that you may have a late model transistor radio with the International S.W. bands, or one that covers the entire AM Broadcast band, your local radio stations plus all or portions of the Aircraft, Marine, Amateur, and foreign country broadcasts.

More and more S.W. transmitters are being erected every year. Many of those now in operation have plans to increase their power for greater coverage. Chances are what you may hear on the S.W. receiver will never be heard on any of the local radio stations, or even be seen or heard on the TV set.

Even inexpensive radios under fifty dollars can give you a start, and with favorable conditions it is possible to hear broadcasts from South Africa, or Australia once you find where to tune and the proper time. To become a participant in this hobby you will find there is no age limit, sex type, or regards as to your political or religious beliefs.

From somewhere on the Short Wave dial you may hear emergency or disaster calls as the events take place, aviation and marine weather reports, time check signals, amateurs discussing radio construction, or just talk like that over the back yard fence, possibly a couple housewives swapping recipes, one in New Foundland, the other in some European country. And if you would like literature, picture postcards, stamps, maps, program schedules, etc., just write to the station broadcasting a language you understand, and quite often you will find interesting material is obtainable for only the cost of an International Reply Coupon or two, obtainable at your post office. If you will send a fairly good description, word for word, of what you heard of a broadcast covering some 15 minute length or more, you will receive a QSL card from most any country, provided you included the date, time in GMT, and your evaluation of how well you could hear the transmission.

For information on broadcasts in Lithuanian from transmitters in Tangiers, Morocco, write to Voice of America, Washington, D.C. You may be able to hear Lithuanian from Vatican Radio, in Vatican City, from Trans World Radio, Monte Carlo, Monaco, or directly from Vilnius, Lithuania. Many of the S.W. transmitters sending programs to Lithuania are low power and beam their signals and therefore cannot be heard in the States. (U.S.).

If you find time, drop a few words of thanks to

V.O.A., Vatican Radio, Trans World Radio, and other stations carrying the Lithuanian broadcasts. I'm sure they would be glad to hear that their efforts are appreciated, for not many of us know how many radios are tuned in to their broadcasts from behind the Iron Curtain.

The officials of one country said they would shoot down any satellites planned for sending TV pictures to people under their rule. But, they have yet to find a way to shoot down radio waves. Some jamming has been tried from time to time, but it has not proven

completely foolproof.

Give yourself a break, and the TV a rest some evening Try scanning one of the Short Wave bands. If you should hear a language quite unfamiliar to you, don't despair, as many stations broadcast in several languages. If you have the patience to listen long enough, you may find that a portion of the days programming will include some English. You may even find radio courses in various languages to assist you in understanding the peoples of other countries. Don't be surprised to hear a Rock band, or learn that many young people in a distant land dress much like those in your city or home town. Many stations have give-away contests with valuable prizes to the winners. Only by listening to these stations will one hear the contest rules and the prizes to be awarded. Many have found S.W. listening an education in itself. Others have made friends or pen pals, from foreign countries by way of DX, or SWL radio clubs. Many of these clubs answer questions about this radio hobby on week-end programs. You may even request a favorite tune to be played by a transmitter in Germany or Quito, Ecuador, or one even more distant. If you plan to travel to a distant land, why not hear what is in store for you by radio, or send to the radio station for literature. Once you arrive there, listen to news of home on your S.W. radio. It is all possible by S.W. radio.

Any one of the many local radio stores that sell S.W. radios is a great place to obtain books on this hobby. Try your magazine and book stores for radio and communications handbooks published yearly for

the latest on this subject.

And the next time someone asks why you didn't come, or answer when you were called, you may be able to honestly say you had, Sweden, Portugal, Mozambique, Japan, Brazil, France, Mexico,

Switzerland, or Trinidad in your ear.

I have two radios capable of receiving Short Wave transmissions. One is a small General Electric battery powered portable, about the size of a school book. The antenna fully extended is about 24" in length. The only power that can be used on this set are four tiny penlight batteries. Reception from Australia is just like that from one of the local stations. It is an amazing receiver. The other is a Radio Shack Realistic DX-120, a more sophisticated set. This radio uses A.C. electric power and is capable of receiving almost the complete AM wave spectrum. Only some of the amateur bands are not receivable. A ground connection plus an outside antenna are required for the operation of this receiver.

So, all I can say is "Try it, you may like it".



OFICIAL NEWS

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL MEETING, JANUARY 12, 1974

The Knights of Lithuania Supreme Council met on Saturday, Jan. 12, 1974, at 1:50 p.m. in the Clubrooms of St. Casimir's Church, 4th & Wharton Streets, Philadelphia. The meeting was opened with a prayer by Fr. Pituris, pastor of the Church. Father also welcomed the Supreme Council to Philadelphia and offered best wishes for the success of the meeting. Walter Svekla, Secretary of host C-3, welcomed the Supreme Council and guests on behalf of C-3. The minutes of the Oct. 20, 1973, meeting were read by the Secretary.

In the absence of the President, First Vice-President Marian Skabeikis conducted the meeting. She relayed the following report from President Boroskas:

The President, in the name of the national organization, regrets the passing of our members John Kilkus and Albert Kassel of Chicago, C-36 and extends sympathy to Genevieve Gobis on the passing of her mother, John Stoskus, on the loss of his sister, and to the family and parishioners of Fr. Totoraitis, assistant at Holy Trinity Parish and Spiritual Advisor of C-29, Newark.

President Boroskas received correspondence from the Taryba asking the K of L to cooperate with them in their Lithuanian Affairs program, as well as to encourage members of the K of L to become actively involved in commemorating the anniversary of Lithuania's independence on February 16. She received no reply from the Priests' League regarding her inquiry on the status of Lithuanian liturgy in Pennsylvania.

First Vice-President Marian C. Skabeikis reported that mailins have been made to District Vice-Presidents in charge of Juniors of forms for the Conventionship program. An article on this topic will appear in the February "Vytis". Dues for Juniors are due in January. This is very important for it may affect the eligibility of a council member for a Conventionship award. To date, only C-110 Maspeth has registered a Junior Council.

Second Vice-President Albert Ozalis reported that the Membership Drive is in full swing. A rough draft of the Membership Brochure has been completed and estimates on cost of printing are being sought. Also, a re-organizational packet was mailed to C-103 Providence and a Charter was mailed to President Boroskas for presentation to C-103.

Third Vice-President Longinas Svelnis voiced the need for leadership programs so that officers could more effectively carry out their duties.

Financial Secretary Irene Ozalis reported that she has sent in dues to the Treasurer and that we have 40 councils in 5 Districts.

No report was received from the Treasurer.

Trustee Mary Kober reported that she had reviewed the K of L manual and that she had written to various chairmen asking them to update the section concerning their area. She also wrote to Fr. Contons asking him to review the Religious Program contained in the manual.

As it is the duty of the Trustees to audit the books of the K of L the following motion was passed at this meeting:

"All real and financial property of the Knights of Lithuania should be made available for inspection, at any time, by prior request of the Trustees".

Dr. Stukas' Lithuanian Affairs Committee report indicated that the first of two five month summaries of articles and items received will be ready in February with the second due in June. Dr. Stukas has asked Mr. Fred Hirst, Chairman for the New England District to serve as Assistant Chairman of the committee. Dr. Stukas also suggested the selection of a tripartite leadership for this committee as the necessary work is too great for one person.

Dr. Stukas' report initiated some discussion as to roles of District Chairmen on this committee and on other standing committees in the Knights of Lithuania. It is the District Chairman's responsibility to co-ordinate activities in his District. It is then the responsibility of the national chairman to follow up on the work of the District chairman. The Supreme Council requests that the President write to each District President and remind them of the importance of having a District Chairman for all national standing committees.

Cultural Chairman Philip Skabeikis reported that Kent State University would microfilm our records at cost. However, the material must be edited first. The Supreme Council requests that the President write letters to Mrs. Adele Gabalas and to Mr. Gediminas Janula of the Archives Committee requesting that they provide an inventory of materials at the archives for the National Convention. A copy of this letter should also be sent to Leon Pauksta, Illinois - Indiana District President.

The January Cultural Bulletin was also mailed to District Cultural Chairmen.

Scholarship Chairman Anthony Miner reported receipt of various forms from Dr. Stukas and a Treasury report from Anthony Mazeika. Forms will be mailed to councils shortly to provide time for this year's applicants to file their applications.

Ritual Committee members Rita Pinkus and Lillian Sasnauskas reported their committee is at work and an article will appear in "Vytis".

Public Relations Chairwoman Helen Kulber reported that she has sent articles and photos to "Vytis", "Darbininkas", and to Mr. & Mrs. Radziva-

nas. She is continuing with her work in promoting the Knights of Lithuania at every opportunity. Mrs. Skabeikis thanked Helen for her untiring efforts.

"Vytis" editor Loretta Stukas reported that the Christmas ad campaign was most successful. All councils are encouraged to participate in this annual opportunity to greet fellow Knights. Council Correspondents have been very cooperative in keeping their council news within the two page limit set at the last meeting. As yet, there have been no Lithuanian Language lessons available for publication. Even though there will be a price increase, the editor recommends that we continue having "Vytis" printed by Vi Vi Printing Co. Sincere thanks go to the entire staff and also to Phil and Marian Skabeikis, John Stoskus, Helen Kulber and others who provided material for publication.

The report from John Stoskus, co-ordinator for Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid will appear in "Vytis".

Longinas Svelnis reported that the New England District Convention will be on April 28, in South Boston, sponsored by C-17 Srs.

Marian Skabeikis, on behalf of the Mid-Atlantic District, reported that the next quarterly meeting of the District will be on January 20, hosted by C-90, Harrison-Kearney. District membership includes thirteen councils and 464 members. The Annual Easter Ad Campaign will be starting shortly to provide funds for maintenance of the District Bulletin. The District is also sponsoring a K of L information mailing campaign under the direction of membership vice-president Phil Skabeikis.

Mid-Central District President Peter Luiza reported that District elections were postponed until the next convention which will be held in Dayton, May 18-20. The prospects are not too hopeful concerning Junior activities in the District. Only Dayton has a Junior council. The major work of the District has been to find a location and sponsor for the 61st

The major agenda item at the next Supreme Council meeting will be subject matter for the Convention sessions. It is also very important to plan activities for Juniors. Publicity and firm dates should be made available immediately.

A motion was made by Longinas Svelnis and seconded by Helen Kulber that a half-page ad be placed in the program book for the opening of the Franciscan Fathers Cultural Center. The motion passed and the \$40. will be sent to Loretta Stukas

who will place the ad.

A motion was made by Al Ozalis and seconded by Mary Kober that the President arrange for the next Supreme Council meeting to take place in Detroit sometime in April.





bit green with envy.




