



Gavénios metu penktadienių vakarais žmonės pas vieną kurį kaimo ūkininką susirinkę giedodavo kalnus (kryžiaus kelius). Rinkdavosi į juos jauni ir seni. Giedodami stengdavosi kiek galima garsiau šaukti, kad net giedančiųjų veidai paraudonuodavo. Jeigu kartais nuo didelio balso užgesdavo troboje lempa, pasigirti būdavo galima, kad geri giedoriai buvo. Baigus giedoti, susirinkusieji būdavo pavaišinami neluptom bulvėm, silkėm ir kava su pyragu. Namo eidami susitardavo, pas kurį ūkininką sekantį penktadienio vakarą susirinkti.

Zemaičių koplytėlės

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Didįjį Šeštadienį šventindavo bažnyčioje ugnį ir vandenį. Jau anksti rytmetį vykdavo žmonės į bažnyčią, važiuoti ar pėsti, su savim nešdamiesi išdžiovintas medžio kempines ar storos virvės galus švęstai ugnelei ir kibirus švęstam vandeniui parsinešti. Nenuėjusieji į bažnyčią švęstos ugnelės ateidavo prašyti pas kaimyną. Pasiimdavo rusenančią anglį ir nešdavosi į savo namus. Naktį iš šeštadienio į sekmadienį bažnyčioje giedodavo kalnus, dūdų orkestrui pritariant. Saulei tekant

būdavo Prisikėlimo iškilmės. Apie

bažnyčią eidavo procesija. Proce-

sijos centras būdavo keturių vyrų nešamas baldakimas ir po juo kunigas su Švenčiausiu Sakramentu. Baldakimą lydėdavo degančios žvakės, bažnytinių vėliavų miškas. įvairūs altorėliai. Priekyje baldakimo eidavo mažos mergaitės, berdamos ant tako žiedelius, tuo pareikšdamos pagarbą prisikėlusiam Kristui. Choras giedodavo "aleliuja", dūdų orkestras pakartodavo jo aidą, o būgnų dundėjimas bei varpų skambėjimas suliedavo viską į vieną gaudesį, girdimą net už keliolikos kilometrų (1 kilometras apie 5/8 mylios).

Varpams ir būgnams pranešus apie prisikėlusį Kristų, likusieji namuose eidavo krapyti su švęstu vandeniu savo sodybos. Krapydavo visus kampelius, gyvulius ir laukus. Iš krapytojo lūpų sklisdavo giesmės žodžiai: "Per Tavo šventą Prisikėlimą..."


Gavėnioje pasninkas būdavo stiprus - nė nepalyginsime su čionykščiu. Bet jau Didžiojo Šeštadienio popietę atgavėdavo: mėsos didžiausias bliūdas atsirasdavo ant stalo. Kai kurie ir susirgdavo per daug užvalgę.

Velykom dažydavo margučius. Su jais per Velykas kuldavosi. Kieno būdavo stipresnis, tas laimėdavo savo draugo sudužusįjį margutį. Taip pat lentą ar kokią skardą padėdavo nuožulniai ir nuo jos leisdavo margučiams riedėti. Jeigu riedėdamas užkliūdavo kitą, tai užkliudytasis atitekdavo riedinčio margučio savininkui.

Pasitaikydavo ir apgavikų, kurie eidavo kultis su netikrais margučiais - mediniais ar sakų prileistais.

Gražus tai būdavo laikas. Pavasario saulė tirpydavo sniegą, darydama iš jo upelius kieme, laukuose ir pievose. Nuo stogų žežėdavo vanduo. Visais pašaliais katėdavo vištos. Išsiskleisdavo pirmieji karklų pumpurai, ir jais būdavo papuošiamas Velykų stalas. Mažais žiedeliais pražysdavo sniegienos ir be garso sakydavo "Ir mes norime būti gražios Kristaus Prisikėlimo šventei".

Taip būdavo per Velykas Žemaitijoje, ir panašiai būdavo visoje mūsų šventojoje tėvynėje Lietuvoje.



AN EASTER LONG AGO

Long ago, on the afternoon of Holy Saturday, or "Didžioji Subata" as the day before Easter is known among the Lithuanian people, I remember trudging with cheerful importance with other children, over zigzaging brick sidewalks, cobbled streets and trolley tracks, careful not to be surprised into tripping and scattering the contents of our Easter baskets. We were now old enough to go to church — unaccompanied by adults — to obtain the holy water and bring the cuttings of food that our mothers had secreted in the baskets for the Easter blessing.

Although it was early when we entered the church, many devout of all ages were praying near the side altar where two men, typifying the ancient Roman soldiers, equipped with helmets, swords and shields, guarded the Tomb or Our Lord. Nearby, also keeping vigil, were as many women, girls and boys on their knees. The lace - . covered altar, surrounded by palms and flowers held more flowers and candles shone brightly in their tall candleholders of gleaming brass. It was the most beautiful altar our young eyes had ever seen. A huge crucifix that normally hung on the wall near the vestibule, now reposed at the base of the altar and a long line of kneeling people crept slowly along upon the velvet cushion, each one in turn kissed the crossed feet of the Corpus and dropped pennies into a wooden box close by. We sat in a pew a short distance from the main altar, readied our baskets to be opened quickly and waited for the priest. When he appeared to bestow his blessing, there arose into view baskets and boxes cf all sizes, shapes and colors; and the appetizing aroma of sausages, hams, eggs and freshly baked Easter breads rose too. In Lithuania, we knew that it was



customary for every family to prepare two baskets of food: A small one to be blessed for the family's Easter breakfast, and a large one containing bread, meat, rye or wheat, to be distributed among the poor who waited near the church on Holy Saturday. But, here in the United States, the custom had not been introduced, because there were no unfortunates waiting near the door.

After the blessing, white covers folded over the contents,, we joined others in the vestibule crowding each other to fill our bottles with the holy water consecrated by the priest that morning. This holy water we learned had many purposes: . It was used in the sick room; sprinkled about the house during electrical storms for protection; poured into wall fonts that hung on the frames of the kitchen doors so that members of the family would dip two fingers into it and bless themselves before they went out. Sips of holy water were taken by some before Easter breakfast as a surety against illness and disease during the current year.

Our pleasant duties fulfilled, the. long walk home seemed shorter. Perhaps it was the remembrance that dozens of brown eggs would be nestling among the simmering onicn skins in the iron pot on the rear lid of the stove, waiting for us to remove them; the white eggs that were to be designed by someone older and colored by us, and the expected visits of the "lelauninkai" young men singers who went from household to household greeting the family with: "Little father, little mother, shall we gladden your humble home? Which of these two songs shall we sing -'Christ Our Lord rose from the dead' or "The joyful day has now begun to shine'?"

This was always exciting, for if the first song was requested then

the singers received three eggs. But if the second tune was sung, then they were the recipients of four eggs, because the hymn had sixteen verses. Still more 'eggs were lavished upon the singers if they were accompanied by an accordion or violin. We hoped for songs and instruments, while our parents' hopes leaned towards a pair of singers only, so that their Easter egg supply would not be exhausted. Brown eggs were given to the singers since they wanted to eat, not to save them. "Margučiai" de-



corated eggs designed with beeswax were never offered to the singers.

We were too young, of course, to design eggs with beeswax. That art required a mature, steady color imagination and hand: sense was helpful especially if the eggs were to enjoy many colors. Great care was necessary in applying the beeswax, and should mistakes be made in designing they could not be corrected nor eradicated. Considering the time and patience involved in designing, grown-ups began their egg-art weeks or days in advance. In Lithuania, mother had shown us how to rub the surface of brightcolored eggs on sharp, clean sand.

dark of Easter morning by a whispered "Kelkis, jau Velykos!" and the instruction to creep out from under the cozy feather tick. A sleepy recollection of a white hamburg lace dress, white veil, satin hair ribbon, new button shoes, long stockings and the "crimped" hair that had yet to be unbraided, scrambled us out of the cold room into the warm kitchen where a wood fire crackled, and a basin of hot water waited on the edge of the black iron sove.

Fully awakened with hot cocoa, egg, bread and butter, we all met at our gate. The long trek to church promised to be interesting so early in the morning, but the darkness, shadows and silence in the streets made the church seem further than it had been the day before. To shorten the distance before us, we engaged in guessing what stores in the business section would have flickering gas lamps or bright electric bulbs to focus the housewife's attention on their stock in trade. The policemen making their lonely rounds greeted us with courteous "Happy Easters" and volunteered information that other Lithuanians a block ahead of us were also going to the early Mass.

Now and then a friendly kitten escorted us and then purred away, while a dog's unexpected bark always startled us into quickening our steps. Across the wide, now deserted square and past the horses' watering trough, we went into a narrow street where the smell of pickles and herrings still lingered. The racks of clothing had disappeared, and the chairs where the shoppers had rested their parcels to bargain with the storekeepers the day before — and where we planned to rest a spell — were also gone. When we reached the corner store with the cackling hens scratching away in the window, we braced ourselves with deep, deep breaths before the steep hill that forced us to mount up and up, and up...

then forced our way into the children-packed bellroom where worried leaders and partners greeted us with: "Do you kids live a long, long ways off? Couldn't you kids get here any sooner?" We were too busy breathing to answer their questions. Anyhow, we thought, this was no way to start an Easter Day.

The church was chocked with people. As the procession struggled through the crushing aisles, nothing was visible to us but clothes and feet. At last, after three revolutions around the church, we were ushered in through the gate of the Communion rail and instructed to remain there until the Mass was over, since the pews, originally reserved for the children, were filled with worshippers. What a thrill it was to be so close to the brilliant



altar and to see the pastor's every movement during the solemn service of Christ's Resurrection., and listen to the glorious Easter hymns and alleluia songs with orchestral accompaniment. We were a hardy group of little processioners, but seated on the floor, released from duties and discipline, small heads began to nod, droop, the sag against each other while the pastor's Easter sermon went on and on...

After Mass, as we streamed out

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This was generally the children's favorite method and it was an easier substitute for the laborious beeswax drawing that we tried to simulate but could never quite accomplish.

It was long past the lamplighter's appearance in the street on Holy Saturday when we finally fell asleep, to be awakened in the

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Almost out of breath, we crossed the trolley tracks on top of the hill and scurried down the steps into church, squeezed through the crowded aisles to reach the rear, through the church door and into the morninglight, we were hailed by the rattle of the trolley car as it clanged down the hill. People hummed and sang the beloved old Lithuanian Easter hymn, "Linksma diena nušvito..." Singing during Lent was never permitted so now friends greeted each other with joyous songs and wishes for "Linksmy Velyky." This time the trek home was short. We were so rapt in greetings and outlining the days activities stretching before us, and visualizing all the Easter foods that we reached our gate sooner than we expected.

With the help of mother's company, our table was quickly covered with food, and hungry early risers sat down to wait for the blessed food that had been placed before father. The ham, sausage, bread and eggs had been sliced into smaller portions. Each one blessed himself on receiving the platter, removed a portion of everything, sprinkled a few grains of blessed. salt on egg and bread, then passed the dish to the right. We suddenly remembered grandmother and our visit in Lithuania. It was only the previous Easter that grandmother had said; "Sprinkle salt on Easter bread, and there will always be bread on the family table."

During the afternoon, relatives, friends and neighbors came to compare and admire each other's egg designs, to exchange gift eggs, and to wish our household a Happy Easter Holy Day. The highlight of these visits were the egg mights "muštynės" when onion-dyed eggs competed for strenghs of shell. With a hard-shelled egg, the winner enjoyed a modest celebrities



reputation during the Easter holiday. His "drūtas kiaušinis" cracked all eggs it came in contact with, and which he appropriated as the winner.

Sometimes, though, after many victories, the egg and its owner were both under suspicion: The egg upon close inspection was found to have been filled with sugar or tar after it had been skillfully pierced at both ends, or it was exposed as a guinea hen's egg which had a harder shell and could earn a crafty owner many eggs to eat and the enviable winner's laurels. But woe befell all tricksters on Easter. (In mother's village, we had heard these sche-

mers were punished -- not too gently either - and sometimes driven from the village until swindled tempers simmered down.)


Before this Easter Day came to a close, father was suspected. It was incredible the number of eggs he ate as a winner's right. The havoc he caused among eggs with a beautifully designed egg too. Naturally, we complained. We wondered why he consistently refused to permit anyone to admire, exclaim over, and to hold his egg more closely. We suspected a guinea hen's egg and decided to confirm our suspicious quietly...


Then woe did fall upon father. When at last we traced the egg to its hiding place, we found it to be - a wooden egg. And father, because of his deceit, found himself eggless and under a cloud for the remainder of a Happy Easter Day. For it is said -

WHAT THE CARDINAL SAID AT DETROIT

No doubt the accompanying photo of the destruction of a beautiful church, Lithuanian no less, first caught your eye. What a shame! It was romanesque in style, with a huge altar, a high domed ceiling and patterned after a similar Lithuanian church in Chicago. Here was born Detroit's council 79 back in 1916 through the efforts of the renowned organist and staunch K of L'er Alexander Alexis.

Our parish, then called St. George's, had great plans. The size of the church will tell you as much. We had more clubs than you can shake a stick at. Does that sound familiar? We had senior and junior K of L choirs, no less. Just a quarter of a century later the bubble burst; the dream was over. The children grew up, the depression came, the neighborhood changed, freeways were born.

Oh we're not licked yet. We've just completed our third church; very modern, with a huge auditoriumgym combination, rectory, meeting rooms, cafeteria etc. and a lot of enthusiasm. A third Lithuanian church would have been out of the question. I know, because I was the building chairman for four years. Our Cardinal Dearden initially opposed it. I repeat, it would have been out of the question except for the influx of the DP's from other parishes. We had the money and they had the plans! They really jumped on the band wagon. Once again we have great plans. But can we foist Lithuanianism on our youngsters for any more than one or two additional generations? Where does that leave K of L future membership? I took a survey of our members attending meetings - the same people, the same faces! Believe it or not, the average age was 58, and no junior council exists. Sure, we're the largest council in America. We have some 157 dues paying members but only ten percent attend the meetings. We have a problem and no doubt other councils are in similar fix.

How many of you remember Detroit's last convention in 1959 when two councils sponsored it, C-102 of St. Anthony's and C-79 of Divine Providence? Divine Providence has just moved to the suburbs while St. Anthony's has closed its school, eliminating potential candidates. Membership has suffered in both councils, something that in one way or another ties in with the plight of seminaries and convents - lack of vocations. The absence of parochial schools eliminates the religious atmosphere wherein vocations are nurtured. What future does this portend to the Knights of Lithuania? If we've had rough going while we had a potential source of future members, what a bleak

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future awaits us on the horizon. Because of mixed neighborhoods or freeways, centers of Lithuanianism have been wiped out in many major cities, fostering a rush to the suburbs to non-Lithuanian parishes.

This poses the greatest threat yet to our organization. In earlier years memberships were more or less automatic, gotten right in the parish, but now we are fortunate if one half of our council members are members of a Lithuanian parish.

With the influx of the immigrants we thought we could draw on them to carry our torch, but this was not to be had. They have their Ateitininkai, from the cradle to the grave, not to mention the Bendruomene. They have the right idea to carry on Lithuanianism. Their enthusiasm puts one to shame; they stick together but few find their way into the Knights of Lithuania.

Unless we solve our membership problem among the youth or the immigrants, unless this convention has on its agenda ways and means of solving this threat, I fear the hand-writing on the wall.

At our last convention Detroit's Cardinal John F. Dearden said, very much a propos, "Preserve your Catholic Lithuanian traditions, for they are good for the family and the church".



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

Loretta Kassel described the Lithuanian participation planned for the NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR, of 1964 and 1965. A Lithuanian cross to be erected on the Fair grounds was being financed in part by the K of L... a gigantic Lithuanian song and dance festival was planned and would be attended by the K of L Choir of Chicago, the K of L Junior Dance Group of Newark, and other K of L-ers, and numerous K of L-ers were on the planning committee, headed by Dr. Jack J. Stukas...

Juniors National Vice-President Bernice Kavadaras reported on her visits to various Lithuanian

Cultural enthusiasts were treated to descriptions of the "Mosaics by Valeska" and of St. George's Day customs... NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT


AT THE CATHEDRAL OF THE PINES

The New England District of the Knights of Lithuania for the second year will hold memorial services for the Freedom Fighters and Martyrs of Lithuania at the Cathedral of the Pines in Rindge, New Hampshire, on May 26 at 5:00 P.M.

Last year the N.E.D., in conjunction with Dr. Peter Bizinkauskas and family, dedicated an amber stone with appropriate plaque at the Cathedral. An impressive group of Lithuanians and their friends attended, but due to inclement weather, the full ceremony could not be achieved. The officers of the affair felt that another service would result in an event that would dramatize to the public the plight of Lithuanians under the Soviet yoke.

Just a few words about this unusual and lovely Memorial set in the rolling hills of southwestern New Hampshire. The site formerly called Interlakes is circled by three lakes with majestic Mt. Monadnock in the background.





Cathedral of the Pines – Building on right holds the Amber Stone – Building on left is the Womans Tower.

The founders were Dr. & Mrs. Douglas Sloane who originally purchased this farm for their children as a summer home. One of their sons, Lieutenant Sloane, an aviator, was killed in action over Germany during World War II. They changed their original plan, and made an outdoor shrine for their son and for all the war dead.

The first Mass was said in August 1945, but the original dedication did not take place until July 4, 1946.

Cathedral of the Pines is an international shrine. The Congress of the United States unanimously voted recognition of the Altar of the Nations as a memorial for all the American war dead. Governors Women who sacrificed their lives in the wars of our country. However, the national and state authorities have no jurisdiction nor has any church, except at times of their services.

The Cathedral of the Pines Trust is administered by a Board of Trustees consisting of outstanding lay people of different faiths and origins, and is for the benefit of all people in accordance with the Laws and the Commandments: "Thou shall love the Lord thy God and thy neighbor as thy self" and our Pledge of Allegiance "One nation, under God, Indivisible".

It is the hope of N.E.D. President Albert Jaritis that each council in the district will send representatives to this service so that this event can project a show of solidarity and strength for our cause.

Minėdami Vasario 16-tąją, įsijauskime į jos reikšmę, ir į dabartinę skaudžią Lietuvos būklę. Išeikime į platesnę veiklą ir kovą prieš Lietuvos okupantą. Visur ir visuomet priminkime ir reikalaukim, kad Lietuva būtų vėl laisva. Turėkime viltį - Lietuva vėl bus laisva.





achievements of Prince Demetrius Augustine Gallitzin. Soil from Lithuania was used to plant a tree in his memory at this state park. Joseph Kajeckas, Charge D'Affaires of Lithuania attended the tree planting ceremony, and spoke on the occassion. A study of this man and his achievements should be undertaken by some Lithuanian historian or biographer or even a writer for periodicals. There is much material about him in Loretto which is the home of St. Francis College and the Sacred Heart Province of the Franciscan T.O.R. Loretto is also the birth place of Charles Schwab, a great name in the Steel Industry.

of the Prince. Nearby is his rustic chapel on a hill side containing some of his relics. Among the relics is his coat of arms with the "Vytis".

Prince Gallitzin was a saintly priest of Lithuanian heritage who became the Apostle of the Alleghenies with a 1000 square mile parish in Western Pennsylvania. He was the first U.S. educated priest ordained in this country. He was ordained in Baltimore by Bishop Carroll a brother of one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

There is a town named after the Prince. In the early summer of 1965 the Prince Gallitzin State Park of 6000 acres was dedicated to the memory and We will gladly assist any one or party in starting a study of this great man and his non-selfish contribution to the greatness of this country.



Kiekvienas, gindamas tikėjimą, nugali pragaro slibiną, melą ir klaidas. Ir tu, Vyti, turi būti toks tvirtas, kad nepasiduotum piktos dvasios gundytojams.



We received very good publicity on our Communion-Breakfast in both the Advocate and the Jersey City Journal.


