

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
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THANK GOD FOR CHRISTMAS

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

KALĖDŲ EGLUTĖS KILMĖ

Kalėdų eglutė labai gražus kalėdinis paprotys. Jis yra taip plačiai įsigalėjęs, jog krikščioniškame pasaulyje Kalėdų negalima jau įsivaizduoti be eglučių. Jos puošia privačius butus, viešuosius pastatus bei gatves. Ypatingai čia Amerikoje prieš Kalėdas puošiamos jau net ir perdėtai. Kai kur jos jau sudaro daugiau kermošišką negu šventišką nuotaiką.

Eglutė suteikia Kalėdoms šventišką nuotaiką, o vaikams didelį džiaugsmą. Po papuošta eglute sukraunamos dovanos, kurios ypatingai vaikų yra labai laukiamos.

Krikščioniškas padavimas, sako, jog Kristui gyvenant žemėje kartą Jį užklupo kelyje lietus. Ieškodamas apsaugos nuo lietaus, Jis atsistojo po lapuočiu medžiu, bet šis praleido vandenį pro savo lapus. Jam pasitraukus po egle, pastaroji suglaudė savo spyglius ir tuo apsaugojo Kristų nuo sušlapimo. Kaipo atpildą už tai, Kristus leido spygliuočius žaliuoti visus metus.

Iš kur kilo šis kalėdinis paprotys? Vokiečiai laiko jį kilusiu Vokietijoje ir, atrodo, teisėtai.

Vokietijoje jau prieš daug šimtų metų buvo įsigalėjęs paprotys švenčių eisenose naudoti papuoštus medžius. Nuernbergo senuose metraščiuose jau 1580 m. minima, jog šv. Urbono šventėje, kuris buvo vynuogių augintojų ir vyninių savininkų globėjas, buvo ruošiama eisena ir nešamas medis, papuoštas spalvotais veidrodėliais.

Apie 1500-sius metus Oberrhein'e (viršutiniame Pareinyje) yra minima, jog Kalėdoms butai ten buvo puošiami eglių šakomis. Todėl vokiečiai ir galvoja, jog ir kalėdinė eglutė yra iš ten kilusi.

Kalėdinė eglutė, tur būt, pirmą kartą metraščiuose yra paminėta 1604-5 metais Elsasse. Gi vėliau jau randama 1737 metais Wittenberge, o 1780 - Berlyne ir t.t.

Iš Vokietijos eglutė pirmiausia nukeliavo į Švediją, gi vėliau Anglijos karaliaus Jurgio III-jo žmona vokietaitė ją įvedė ir Anglijoje.

Kada eglutė atkeliavo į Lietuvą, yra sunku pasakyti. Gal su protestantizmu, o gal mūsų studentai, studijavę Vokietijoje, šį paprotį parsivežė.

Į Ameriką ji atkeliavo su vokiečių emigrantais. Jau 1834 m. New Jersey du vokiečiai: mokytojas Fridrich Knorr ir gydytojas Konstantin Herin patys miške nusikirto po eglutę ir, gyventojų didžiausiam nustebimui, jomis papuošė Kalėdoms savo butus.

1840 m. Rochester, Ill. vokiečių kunigas vietiniame laikraštyje buvo pagirtas už gražią eglutę, puošusią bažnyčią Kalėdų metu.

Gi, Clevelande vokietis kunigas Henry C. Schwan tais metais už pastatymą bažnyčioje dviejų eglučių, papuolė į parapiečių nemalonę, kurie, tikėdami, jog ten yra pagoniškas paprotys, norėjo jį net iš parapijos išvyti.

Bet Amerikos istorijoje kalėdinės eglutės tėvu yra laikomas vokietis August Irmgard, kuris 1847 m. atvyko iš rytinės Vokietijos į Wooster, Ohio. Kalėdoms, norėdamas padaryti savo brolio vaikams džiaugsmą, pastatė bute eglutę ir ją papuošė popieriniais dalykėliais, taip pat padarydamas pas vietos kalvį iš žibančio metalo didelę žvaigždę. Vietinių gyventojų vaikai taip buvo sužavėti jo eglute, jog sekančiais metais beveik visi šios vietovės gyventojai Kalėdoms jau turėjo eglutę.

Pradžioje eglutė buvo be papuo-

šalų, tik daug vėliau ji buvo pradėta puošti žaislais ir žvakelėmis. Protestantų padavimuose yra sakoma, jog Martin Luther yra pirmasis, kuris papuošė kalėdinę eglutę žvakėmis. Esą, prieš Kalėdas jis matęs miške eglutes aptrauktas ledu, kurios taip gražiai atrodžiusios, jog jis savo bute bandęs kalėdinę eglutę papuošti, žibančią, kaip miške.

Kada tikrai pirmoji kalėdinė eglutė pasirodė, šiandien nieks negali pasakyti. Ji ėjo iš Vokietijos į kitas tautas - vienur sparčiau, kitur lėčiau. Kai kur sutikdama bažnyčių pasipriešinimą, tvirtinant, jog tai yra pagonybės ženklas. Bet šiandien ji yra Kalėdų dalelė, kuri daug kam vis dar atneša tyrą džiaugsmą

ir šventišką nuotaiką.

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



THATNIGHT INBETHLEHEM

They had hitched the big brown horse to their wagon and had merrily jiggled and joggled the two kilometers to the small wooden church. It was much too cold to travel the long distance to the big church in Panevėžys.


The Mass had begun at 10:00 o'clock and had lasted an hour and a half. While the priest had quietly intoned the lengthy Latin prayers, the choir had sung every Christmas carol they knew. Zabelle especially liked the "Gul' Šiandieną". It was a little tiresome in the cold church with no seats but time seemed to pass quickly with so many things to be seen and the singing of the beloved hymns to be heard. There were fir and pine boughs everywhere. The aromatic smell of the freshly cut branches

filled every corner. Mamytė had told her that the spirit of the trees had been brought indoors so that he could adore the little Jesus.

Zabelle had looked up at the little Jesus "floating" in his manger high in the corner next to the altar. Each year the woodcarvers made a new scene and this year's Bethlehem set seemed to be the prettiest she had ever seen. Jesus, Mary, and Joseph were dressed in the palest of blues and there were four cows and six sheep. In her ten year old mind, she marveled at the way they had

been placed on the narrow boards "halfway to heaven" in the west corner so that the first sunbeams from the east window would shine on them. She wondered if the spirit of the sun was adoring Him too. His little hands were bare, she thought, and He certainly could use the warm sunshine.

She had watched the flicker of the eight big candles on the altar almost continuously. She would ask Mamyte about them during the time when everyone went outside between Mass and the sermons. It was obvious that the spirit of the



fire in the red, oil lamp hanging over the altar did not flicker. What

was different about the candles?

Well, now she knew. It was the spirit of the bees in the wax. After telling the story of the bees, Mamyte left to go home to cook the Christmas feast and Bronius was told to see that the children behaved during the rest of the Christmas rites.

During the long sermons, Zabelle found her mind wandering back to three days ago when this same priest had entered their home to bless the Christmas food. Every year he had come silently into the house with his sacristan behind him and had gone through the ritual of praying the Latin prayers and sprinkling holy water over the Kūčios (Christmas Eve) food: silkes (herring), žuvis (fish),

Plotkeles (Christmas Wafers), sližikai (Christmas Eve biscuits), etc. as well as Christmas day foods: kumpis (ham), dešros (sausages), žąsinas (goose), duona (bread), and spanguolinė (cranberry wine). This time a new food had been added, corn from America, and the priest raised his eyebrows as he gave the corn an extra dose of the holy water. Actually, they didn't intend to eat this corn this year. It was for planting. They would give a few kernels to each of their neighborns as a Christmas gift and plant the rest themselves in the Spring. Bronis had told everyone how easily the corn grew, how the pigs loved it, and how quickly they would grow fat from eating it.

After the sermons were over, they all trudged back outdoors to exercise their cramped legs and

soothe their aching knees. At this time, Bronis solemnly handed out a few kernels of the corn to each of the men in the parish. There was much laughter when Bronis insisted that people could eat the corn, too. One would have to be very hungry indeed to eat pig food!


During the singing of the Vespers, everyone stood up and then knelt down during Benediction. With four layers of woolens and the heavy fur shoes catching the hems of her skirts, Zabelle found it difficult getting up and down. She looked up and saw that Tevelis had returned now after taking Mamyte home. It was after 2:00 o'clock and there were many sore bones by this time. Zabelle knew that Tevelis had a bad leg that still bothered him. A few weeks ago, during the picking of cranberries, he had slipped into a bog hole and had made a large gash over his shin bone that did not want to heal even though he had put the best brandy made of honey as a medicine on it.

The spirit of the bees must be very powerful, thought Zabelle. It was used for so many things. When anyone became ill, it was the honey brandy that made them go to sleep and feel much better the next day. The spirit of the bees must be God's angels, she thought! Yes. That was it!

On Christmas Day, when the candles were lit, they all went back to heaven to be with their little Jesus! No wonder they dzipped so gayly. They were freed from their long summer of working on earth for the people and were allowed to go home to spend Christmas Day where they belonged.

Zabelle tightly squeezed her big brother's hand as he helped her into the creaky wagon for the short, but happy, journey home. Bronius was her favorite brother and he also had come home for this day. Everyone was on the way home today, even the bees.

THE STORY OF CHRISTMAS IN BICENTENNIAL AMERICA

THE BEGINNING — On December 25, 1492, the history of Christmas started in the New World, when Columbus' ship, the Santa Maria, was abandoned off the coast of Haiti.

In Virginia in the year 1613 a record by an expedition of Captain John Smith reads:

The extreame winde, rayne, frost and snow caused us to keepe Christmas among the salvages where we were never more merry, nor fed on more plenty of good Oysters, Fish, Flesh, Wilde fowl and good bread, nor never had better fires in England.

Settlers in Virginia brought many customs from England, the burning of the Yule log, ringing bells, lavish dining, dancing, games and Christmas carols. Churches and homes were decorated colorfully, and parties and balls were memorable.

The Pilgrim Fathers arrived in Plymouth some 7 years later, bringing with them their strong distaste for Christmas. Thanksgiving day, with its feasting and neighborly celebrations with friendly Indians, was more like Christmas.

In 1659, the General Court of Massachusetts enacted the law by which "anyone who is found observing, by abstinence from labor, feasting, or any other way, any such days as Christmas day, shall pay for every such offense 5 shillings." However, the Puritans did not have their way for long and the anti-Christmas law was repealed in 1681.

HAPPIER CHRISTMASES — The chief winter celebration of the jolly Dutch in New Amsterdam was on December 6, St. Nicholas' Day. Significantly enough, it was a figurehead of this very saint that graced their ship, the Goede Vrouw, that brought them to America in 1630.

On St. Nicholas feast day the Dutch carried his statue down the street, with children joining in . . . the promise of presents bright in their eyes.

Gradually, however, the increasing number of English in this area brought about the adaptation of many of the old customs; with the arrival of the first German dissenters in 1700, we find a tremendous increase in the observance of Christmas. It is with the Germans that the universal customs of Kriss Kringle or Santa Claus, and the Christmas tree originate.

The rapid growth of our country brought about less religious antagonism. The intermingling of people of different religious and national backgrounds also helped.

One of the more important historical events that took place on Christmas was the crossing of the Delaware by George Washington and his troops, in 1776, when they defeated the Hessians at Trenton, New Jersey. The Americans routed the redcoats who were sleeping off the effects of the holiday!

Sunday Schools, which had their beginning in the first half of the nineteenth century, helped to promote the acceptance of many folk customs, most importantly, Santa Claus and the use of the Christmas tree. Charles Dickens, in his beautiful classics, did much to popularize this colorful holiday,

but it was some time before Christmas came to be celebrated as we know it now.

THE HOLIDAY ON THE MOVING FRONTIER —

The advancing of the frontier westward took with it this welcome holiday. Turkey shoots, which provided fowl for the table, were very popular. Festivities' were often wild and noisy.

Traditional Christmases were celebrated in the west, and in 1846, a German visitor to Texas writes about seeing a richly decorated and illuminated Christmas tree, in a territory held by Indians a short time before.

Firecrackers and the shooting of guns were a part of the southern Christmas that traveled as far north as southwest Pennsylvania. National groups who settled outside the thirteen colonies carried with them the old customs of their former homes. In New Orleans, the wanderings of the Three Kings was symbolized by the French reveillons, gifts were for New Year's day.

In the southwest, Christmas celebrations were greatly influenced by the Spanish. Los Pastores, an old miracle play, with the eternal struggle of Good and

Evil as its theme, was staged and has been revived on and off, through more recent years.

Christmas was recognized legally, first in Alabama in 1836, and by 1890 all states and territories acknowl-edged it as well. Christmas is the only annual religious holiday to receive this secular and official sanction.

ENTER SANTA CLAUS— In America, Santa Claus is . known by three names—St. Nicholas, Kriss Kringle, and Santa Claus. St. Nicholas first appeared in the first half of the fourth century in Asia Minor, as Bishop of Myra. Many miracles are attributed to him and there are many legends that attest to his generosity. He was the protector of sailors aboard Dutch ships, as well as the patron saint of young people. The first Dutch church built in New York City was named for him.

Sinterklaas, as he was known to the Dutch, eventually became Santa Claus ...his original red and white vestments became our modern red and white Santa costume.

The Germans and Swiss who settled in Pennsylvania in the eighteenth century

believed in the Christ child, who brought gifts to children on Christmas eve. English speaking settlers in neighboring areas trans-formed Christkindl into Kriss Kringle.

POEMS AND PICTURES Clement Clarke Moore is credited with creating the current Santa Claus image and story in his poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas." The poem, originally written for his children in 1822, has been published an endless number of times and is one of the most popular American poems.


The fat, rosy-cheeked Santa we recognize today evolved from a series of cartoons by Thomas Nast, nineteenth century artist. His series of Christmas drawings showed too, how Santa spends his spare time through the year.

AMERICA TODAY -Americans today celebrate the Christmas holiday in many colorful ways. The tradition of this beautiful season is strong in America . . north, south, east, west. Its warmth, which unites one and all in peace and brotherhood, has been and will be a unifying force for all time.


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C-96 - DAYTON, OHIO


