## **OF JUNE**

## Philip Skabeikis

AUTHOR'S NOTE: The month of June remains one of the saddest in annals of Lithuania's long history. The article that follows is presented as a tribute to the thousands of men, women and children of Lithuania who were herded like cattle from their beds, into railroad box cars for shipment to a frozen wasteland, never to see their homeland again, on the mid-June nights of 1941.

\*\*\*

WORLD NEW WEBSTER'S DICTIONARY defines DEPOR-TATION as "the removal of an undesirable alien from the country". In looking at the same word in a more significant light, the ENCY-CLOPEDIA LITUANICA defines it as "a system of punishment involving the removal of criminals to a penal settlement outside their own country... expulsion of an alien considered inimical to the public welfare... mass deportation is the removal of social groups or entire nationalities to compulsory settlement and forced labor camps outside their own country".

Deportations, along with press bans and literary censorship, remained favorites in the Soviet/ Tsarist arsenal of weapons to use against peoples unwilling to bow to subjugation. At every crisis in Lithuania's history we find some evidence of "deportation" being employed to restore order.

During the reign of Russia's Peter the Great (1689-1725) deportation to forced labor camps of Siberia served as a deterrent to both petty criminals and would be political discontents. During the second partition of Lithuania and Poland of 1793 and the Insurrections of 1831 and 1863, Lithuanians saw some chance of reestablishing self-government and throwing off the stiffling foreign influences. All resistance proved futile in the face of terrific odds, and over one million Lithuanians met with deportation.

Tsarist authorities went so far as to deport the entire populations of some villages and then completely obliterate all trace of their existence.

While the Lithuanian republic revelled in its new found freedom from 1918-1940, the Soviet Union was escalating the use of deportation to deal with dissedents within its own borders. A special body came into existence in July 1934 as part of the People's Commissariat of the Interior, the NKVD. This body was entrusted with "issuing orders regarding administrative deportation, exile, and imprisonment in correctional and labor camps..." The NKVD later came to



wield complete control of the vast network of labor camps and means to populate them... deportation. As the last few breaths of freedom left Lithuania, the NKVD already had a master plan on the books.

June 15, 1940 the Russian armed entrance into Lithuania, marked her forcible incorporation into the Soviet Union. Weeks later, deportation orders were released by the NKVD for certain Lithuanian Government Officials. In August, vast inventories of souls were committed to paper in preparation for the "purging of Lithuania". The accounting included "all those persons who by reason of their social or political past, national chauvinistic opinions, religious convictions, moral and political inconstancy, are opposed to the socialist order and thus might be used by the intelligence services of foreign countries and by the counter revolutionary centers for anti-soviet purposes". These included priests, students, teachers, officers of political or national organizations, the press, influential businessmen and professionals and persons known to have refused to join or been expelled from the Lithuanian Communist Party.

The Secret Security Organization the NKGB also became involved for "the purge".

The mass arrests started on June 14-15, 1941. Under cover of darkness and between the hours of 1 AM - 4 AM, Soviet agents and the military roused the victims from their beds. One-half hour to pack some belongings was all the time the terrified people had to

contemplate their fate. All age and career groups were represented. The plan went smoothly and Lithuania met the dawn in terror.

Bidding farewell to their homes, families, many separated from each other, were transportated to railway stations and loaded like animals into the windowless freight cars. Although there was barely room for twenty bodies, the cars were packed with 50-60 persons. No food nor water was provided. Hundreds did not survive the long journey into the depths of Russia.

These first Deportations in 1941 must remain before the conscience of the world as the first premeditated crime against the Lithuanian nation by the Soviets. This Act has gone down in history as the Terrible June Days.






Carillon Park



## **LORETTA STUKAS**

## CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY MEMBERSHIP

Only rarely does the Knights of Lithuania experience the impact of a member as vital and dedicated as Loretta Kassel Stulias, candidate for Honorary Membership. As Loretta Kassel, she devoted her many talents to Council 36, the Illinois-Indiana District and the Supreme Council from 1952 to 1964. In 1964, as Loretta Stukas, she transferred her membership and creative energies to C-29 Newark, and the then New York-New Jersey District (Now the Mid-Atlantic District).

After joining the organization in 1952, it was but six short years before Loretta Kassel made her first commitment to the National level. Elected as National Recording Secretary in 1958, she held that post until 1961. From 1961 to 1964, Loretta served the K of L Scholarship Committee as its Secretary. During this first K of L period of her life, she also served on the National Constitution Committee from 1959-1961 and on the Golden Jubilee Committee from 1959 to 1963.

One of the most important aspects of National participation is involvement in the annual National Convention. As part of her continuing commitment to the growth of the K of L, Loretta served as a member of the Convention Greetings Committee in 1957, as Convention Secretary in 1958, as part of the Convention Host Committee in 1956 and 1964, as her council delegate for five years, and as a Supreme Council delegate for three years.

Apart from her outstanding service to the National Organization during these years, Loretta is probably most closely associated with the responsibility which



brought her monthly into the hands and homes of each member. It was in 1961, along with her other duties, that Loretta Kassel was appointed VYTIS editor for the first time. The job of Editor, involving the complex skills of layout; copy editing, writing and management, was carried out skillfully, bringing the work, policies and growth of the organization into the lives of each individual member. In 1963, Loretta resigned her position as Editor-in-Chief and assumed the position of Associate Editor for one year, up until the time of her marriage and move to New Jersey.

In addition to her National duties during her Chicago years, Loretta also found herself an active member of the Illinois-Indiana Disctrict. As District Membership Vice-president in 1963 and 1964, she helped to reorganize Councils 13 and 14. In addition Loretta served on countless committees including the Registration Committee for the

1956 National Convention and as committee member for many District Picnics as well as for several Mid-West Bowling Tournaments. Loretta was also active as a member of the District Juniors Committee, and as Ill.-Ind. VYTIS Correspondent.

Loretta has always welcomed responsibility as part of her on-going commitment to the K of L, and as a result, she served as chairman for varied District such as "Lithuania" activities 1960", the "Memories of Lithuania" Banquet in 1961 and 1964, and as Cultural Chairman for the 1964 National Convention. As part of her regard for the importance of Lithuanian Culture, Loretta also helped re-organize the Illinois-Indiana District Choir and participated as an active member for four years. Part of this participation included the chairmanship of the District Choir record in 1962.

A major activity of the Illinois-Indiana District has been its bowling socials, several of which were chaired by Loretta. During this time, she remained an active member of the District bowling league. In addition, Loretta Kassel served her District as K of L Building Trustee for one year.

Loretta's Chicago years also reflect a deep devotion to the activities of Council 36, which she helped to reorganize. As a council member, she was Recording Secretary for four years, Financial Secretary for three years and Chairman of both the Lithuanian Affairs and Lithuanian Cultural Committees. It was as a member of Council 36 that Loretta received her Fourth Degree in 1962, at the 49th National Convention in Newark.

Loretta's varied talents also contributed to her successful chairmanship of a variety of dance committees, the Parish Memorial Committee, and St. Casimir's Day activities. She was also active as the C-36 VYTIS correspondent, and as a part of the council's Lithuanian classes committee.

An impressive enough record for any K of L member, Loretta was just about to begin her second K of L lifetime as Loretta Stukas.

Since she transferred her membership to C-29, Newark, Loretta has remained active in Council, District and National activities.

From 1964 to 1970, Loretta Stukas was an active member of the VYTIS staff. In 1970, she was once again called upon to resume her editorship of VYTIS, a position she has retained to the present time.

In helping to expand the horizon of the organization, Loretta Stukas helped to organize and attend K of L excursions to Itali in 1970, South America in 1972, and Europe in 1974.

Her ongoing concern for the effectiveness of National Conventions has also seen her continuing her participation as a member of the Convention Resolutions Committee for the last six years, as a member of the Mid-Atlantic District Host Committee in 1969 and 1975, as District Delegate for four years and as Council Delegate for five years.

In addition, Loretta has served as a member of the National AD HOC Committee for Membership in Pennsylvania, and as a result, assisted in the re-organization of C-74, Scranton, Pa. As part of this work, Loretta was also the motivating force behind the publication of the current Membership Brochure.

Loretta's adopted District has also been the beneficiary of her devotion to the K of L. She served as District Treasurer from 1969 to 1974, and acted as a member of the District By-Laws Committee. Loretta has also assisted in the work of the Mid-Atlantic District

Cultural Committee and served on the District Ritual Committee.

The geography of the District often requires bus trips to bring members together, and Loretta has organized trips to Amsterdam NY and Philadelphia, Pa. She was also part of the MAD Communion Breakfast Committee in 1973.

Two recent District sponsored National Conventions have felt the influence of Loretta's talent and hard work. In 1969, the National Convention saw Loretta Stukas as Press Secretary, Ad Book Chairman, Cultural Evening Chairman, and General Arrangements Committee member. In 1975, Loretta was a member of the Host Committee, Cultural Night Committee, Banquet Committee, Public Relations Committee, General Planning Committee and Ad Book Chairman.

As part of C-29, Loretta has been Assistant Lithuanian Affairs Chairman from 1971 to 1974, and has been Chairman or Committee member for numerous other activities. She worked as Ad book chairman for C-29's 50th Anniversary in 1965, worked in sponsoring the PERKŪNAS Choir Concert, and has been part of the Dinner-Dance Committee as well as other Reception Committees.

Apart from her active life in the K of L, Loretta is a well-known member of the Lithuanian-American Community both in Chicago and in the New York - New Jersey Metropolitan area. Loretta has worked on publicity committees for the Lithuanian Opera Company of Chicago, as well as for the Dainu and Šokių Šventė activities. Chicago years saw Loretta Kassel as an active member of the Alice Stephens Singers.

In New Jersey, Loretta resumed her musical activities as member and president of the "Rūta" Li huanian Ensemble, as a member of the "Žibuoklės" Women's se tet and as member and organize of the "Vilija" Quartet.

Loretta has also participate in numerous parish activities, ser 'es as English Editor of MUZII OS žINIOS and as an active committee member for "Memories of Lithuania" Radio activities.

Professionally, Loretta Stukas is a mathematician, employed as a computer programmer on the technical staff of Bell Laboratories. In her private life, she is the wife of Dr Jack Stukas, Seton Hall Professor and director of the "Memories of Lithuania" Radio Hour in New York.

Indeed, the K of L should count itself fortunate to have in its ranks such a dynamic and multifaceted member as Loretta Stukas. Few can equal her outstanding continuing record reflecting her two remarkable K of L lifetimes.

## **RITA PINKUS**

## **CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY MEMBERSHIP**

At the heart and soul of the Knights of Lithuania are members on every level who live its motto, "For God and Country". For these true sons and daughters of Lithuania, no job is too tedious, too difficult or too impossible to handle. Whether at the level of local council activity, or as part of a commitment made to a Supreme Council office, these special K of L'ers can be found devoting their time, energy and talents. Just such a member is Rita Pinkus; candidate for Honorary Membership.

After joining Council 26 in 1950, her ensuing years marked her rapid rise from First Degree in 1951 to Fourth Degree, awarded in 1960 at the 49th National Convention held in Worcester, Mass. From her days as a new member until the present, her personal K of L history records a deep and often simultaneous commitment to the Council, District and National levels.

Rita Pinkus has never avoided the hard work involved in a National office and its attendent responsibilities. In her twenty-six years of membership, she has served eight terms as National Financial Secretary, one term as Public Relations Chairman, and eight years as a member of the Supreme Ritual Committee, serving as its Chairman three times. Rita currently holds office as National Treasurer, a post she has held for three terms in the past.

This outstanding record of continuing National service did not prevent her from engaging in activities outside the scope of her office. In 1966, Rita Pinkus was awarded a Commendation for long and devoted service in the cause of



Lithuania's fight for freedom at the 53rd National Convention in Worcester. Previously, Rita had been recognized for her contributions to the work of Lithuanian Affairs Committee by being awarded membership in the Hundred Letter Club in 1959.

While serving as a National Officer, Rita somehow found opportunities to actively participate in the affairs of the New England District, again proving she is a woman of many talents. Rita has served the NED as its Lithuanian Affairs Ghairman, Sports Co-chairman, and is currently Membership Vice President for the District. As part of her commitment to membership in her District, Rita participated in the reorganization of the Lawrence, Massachusetts council.

A major part of our organization's effectiveness is brought about in fostering cooperation and communication between District and National levels. In upholding this commitment, Rita has served as District Delegate to National Conventions in Pittsburgh, Pa., Los Angeles, Calif. and Chicago, Ill. In addition, Rita has served as Registration Chairman for the NED-sponsored 58th National Convention in Kennebunkport, Maine in 1971.

To show her support of Districtwide activities, Rita has worked as an integral part of the NED Cultural Picnic for the last four years. She served as Picnic Treasurer in 1973.

The truest test of any member's dedication, however is the commitment made to the working unit of the K of L, the council. While many members have been content to let their National and District activities supersede their contact with their local councils, Rita Pinkus has contributed her apparently limitless time and energy to Council 26 - Worcester.

Since joining the council in 1950, Rita served as its Treasurer from 1953 to 1961, resuming that office again from 1967 to 1970. During this time, she also served a term as Council 1st Vice-president in 1967. Again reflecting her national service, Rita has served as a member of her council Ritual Committee from 1955-1959, and as Financial Secretary in 1971 and from 1974 to the present date. In addition to this extraordinary record, Rita also participated as a member of the C-26 Lithuanian Affairs Committee from 1959 to 1974 serving as its Chairman in 1966. Recognizing the importance of culture, Rita has been Chairman of the Drama Library.

Significantly, a characteristic of her multilevel commitment can again be seen by reviewing the council records. For more than fifteen years, Rita has served as Council delegate to NED Conventions. When Worcester accepted the National Convention in 1960 and again in 1966, Rita Pinkus again evidenced the support. As Treasurer and Banquet Co-Chairman in 1960, and as Co-Chairman of Registration in 1966, Rita showed her commitment to cooperation between Council and National levels.

On a different note, Rita has been involved in many of the religious and social activities which are the lifeblood of any council. From 1952 to the present, Rita has been active on committees for Communion breakfasts, St. Ca-

simir's Day celebrations and Mother's Day Masses. Rita has been part of innumerable committees for picnics, testimonials, clam bakes, Christmas parties and whist parties. During this period of activity, Rita also found time to serve as Junior Counselor.

Beyond her K of L activities, Rita has also found time to devote to her parish, St. Casimir's, as a member and president of the Mothers' Guild, as a Girl Scout leader, as a member of the Sisters' Auxiliary and as a choir member for more than twenty years. Amazingly, Rita has also found the

opportunity to work for the Lithuanian Charitable Society, Inc., and the Lithuanian War Veterans Auxiliary.

Indeed, one would be hard pressed to find an aspect of the Knights of Lithuania which has not felt the influence of the many talents of Rita Pinkus. By conferring upon her the status of Honorary Member of the Knights of Lithuania, we are but seconding the honor she has given all of us by her devotioned and continued loyalty to God and Country.

### CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were approved by the Supreme Council to be presented to the National Convention. Please discuss them in your council and send your delegates to the convention prepared to vote on them according to your council's will.

1. WHEREAS the needs and activities of Junior Councils in different Districts vary greatly in their scope,

BE IT RESOLVED that the age limit to which a Junior member of the Knights of Lithuania may remain a member of a Junior Council be extended to eighteen years of age. The option to join or transfer membership to a regular council at the age of sixteen will continue to be reserved to the judgement of the individual Junior. This resolution would effectively change the constitution in Article V, section 3.a. to read "...not yet reached 18 years of age".

- 2. BE IT RESOLVED that the spouse of a subscribing member remain exempt from dues, except in the following instances:
- 1. The spouse of an Honorary Member will be considered as a non-subscribing member and pay half dues.
- 2. The spouse of a Lifetime Member will also be considered a non-subscribing member and pay half dues.

Other family members living in the household will continue to be considered non-subscribing members and pay half dues.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Knights of Lithuania Constitution, Article VI be amended to

reflect this clarification, and that references to "husband" and "wife" in VI 3. and VI 4. be changed to "subscribing member - spouse" and "spouse", resp.

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



## STASIO PILKOS ATMINIMUI...

1976 m. vasario mėn. 5 d. Central Community ligoninėj, Čikagoje, mirė Stasys PILKA, Lietuvos Valstybinio Dramos Teatro veteranas - aktorius, režisierius, teatrologas.

Stasys Pilka gimė 1898 m. gegužės 8 d. Petrapily - Rusijoj. Tenai, baigęs šv. Kotrynos gimnaziją sidabro medaliu ir išlaikęs konkursinius egzaminus, buvo priimtas į Imperatorišką Karo Medicinos Akademiją. Bet medicinos nebaigė, o istojo i Akademinių teatrų dramos mokyklą, J. Jurjevo klasę. Būdamas dramos mokykloj dalyvavo vaidinimuose ir su keliais kitais mokiniais įsteigė "studijinių pastatymų teatrą", pasikviesdami vadovauti režisierių N. V. Petrovą. Po kelių gerų spektaklių visa ši jaunų aktorių grupė buvo priglausta Valstybinio Didžiojo Dramos Teatro. Be to, St. Pilka buvo priimtas aktorium į Mažąjį Dramos teatra, bet dėl susidėjusių aplinkybių jam ten dirbti neteko.

1920 metais Meno kūrėjų draugija, Kaune, pakvietė Pilką atvykti Lietuvon į organizuojamą dramos teatrą. Atvyko 1921 m. ir pradėjo savo teatrinę karjerą lietuviškam teatre: vaidindamas, režisuodamas ar organizuodamas spektaklius.

1926 m. atvyko Amerikon. Bostone, Clevelande, Brooklyne ir Čikagoje organizavo vaidintojų grupes, režisavo veikalus, vienu metu dalyvavo Dzimdzi-Drimdzi trupėje. Jis Amerikoje pakėlė to meto vaidintojų meninį, teatrinį supratimą ir paskatino tolimesniems darbams. Pilka per 3 metus surežisavo apie 15 veikalų.

1929 m. grįžo Lietuvon į Valstybinį Dramos Teatrą ir jame pasiliko iki pasitraukimo Vokietijon 1944 metais.

Valstybiniam Dramos Teatre ne tiktai vaidino, bet ir režisavo keliolika veikalų. Nesitenkino tik tiesioginėm pareigom, bet dirbo teatrinį darbą plačiau. Nemažai laiko pašventė jaunimui. Režisavo Komercinėj mokykloj, Aušros gimnazijoj, Kaišiadorių gimnazijoj, Kauno Liaudies ir Šiaulių teatruose.

St. Pilka buvo Dramos Teatro muziejaus steigėjas, vienas iš Ukmergės miesto teatro steigėjų, Valst. Teatro dramos studijos lektorius ir rašė spaudoje teatro klausimais.

Vokietijoje pradėjo lietuvių poetų kūrinių rečitalius ir aplankė nemaža DP stovyklų. Surežisavo Hanau stovyklos vaidintojams "Princesė Turandot".

Amerikon antru kart atvyko 1948 m. ir apsigyveno Čikagoje. Čia suorganizavo Lietuvių Teatrą, pastatė keletą veikalų, režisavo vaikams spektaklį, lankė lietuvių kolonijas su literatūriniais rečitaliais, rinko teatrinę medžiagą Teatro Almanachui, plačiai bendradarbiavo spaudoje, rašydamas spektaklių kritikas, apie teatrą ar teatro žmones. Pasirašinėdavo St. Meringis ar St. Aukštaitis.

Per savo šakotą ir įvairią teatrinio gyvenimo karjerą yra suvaidinęs per 200 vaidmenų, surežisavęs apie 50 veikalų ir atlikęs apie 60 rečitalių, neminint daugybės įdomių ir vertingų straipsnių mūsų periodikoje Lietuvoj ir už jos ribų. Poezija jam nebuvo svetima patsai yra rašęs ir vertęs iš svetimų kalbų eilėraščius.

St. Pilkos asmenyje lietuvių visuomenė nustojo didelio teatralokultūrininko.

## CELEBRATE BALZEKAS MUSEUM 10TH ANNIVERSARY AT RITZ CARLTON

Ethnic flavor was added to a Bicentennial celebration when Chicago's Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture held its annual awards banquet at the Ritz Carlton Hotel.

The banquet, which honored Daniel M. MacMaster, President of the Museum of Science and Industry, as the museum's "American of the Year", combined a salute to the Bicentennial with a pre-birthday party for the museum itself.

The museum has been helping visitors understand Lithuanian literature, history, language, fine and folk art, music, costumes and customs ever since June, 1966. This year attendance is expected to reach 300,000.

The honoree has been director of the Science Museum since 1951 and president since 1968. The museum award was presented to MacMaster by Josephine J. Dauzvardis, Consul General of Lithuania. In introducing him, Stanley Balzekas Jr., museum founder, spoke of the "valuable assistance, advice and help" MacMaster gave in the early days of organization.

"When we started planning the museum, ethnic activities were talked about but not much was really accomplished", said Balzekas. "However, there were a number of far-sighted Chicago leaders who were willing to help. Among them were Daniel MacMaster, Mrs. Dauzvardis, Clement Silvestro (Chicago Historical Society), Commisioner George Dunne (President Cook County Board), Ralph Newman (President of Chicago Public Library Board), and Frank Zapolis (Director of the Knights of Lithuania Dance Group).

"Since then, many people... have worked continuously to give Chicago one of the best ethnic museums in the country".

Today, said Balzekas, the museum has 24 departments with extensive collections of amber and armor, a library, archives, workshops and traveling exhibits. It offers classes in everything from needle-point to Easter Egg decoration, has a constantly changing schedule of art exhibits, educational and cultural programs, and social events such as picnics, dinner dances and receptions.

It has an active women's guild, headed by Margi Mankus, which visits other museums and works with other ethnic groups.

Photos in the banquet's scuvenir program book depicted the wide variety of assignments handled by

the museum's many volunteers. The program's handsome blue and silver cover, designed by Ed Mankus, was a photo art reproduction of one of a series of postage stamps issued during the final days of Lithuania's independence. It showed a Liberty Bell, similar to the Famed American bell, which Lithuanian Americans had presented to their fatherland.

In a wire to Balzekas, read during the banquet program, Mayor Daley called the Balzekas Museum "one of the great cultural assets of Chicago".

"It is most appropriate that on the occasion of the museum's tenth anniversary its friends are honoring." Daniel MacMaster who heads another great institution, the world-famous Museum of Science and Industry.

"I join with you in saluting Dan MacMaster. You and everyone who supports the Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture have my highest admiration and best wishes for the future".



Deserving C-112 m mbers received degrees at the commemo-



Speedy recovery wishes are sent




city.

Paul Stoskus spent a few of his spring vacation days in N.Y.C. Our




## **JUNIOR** NEWS
