

More than anything in the world, Laima wanted to grow up to be like Mrs. Hipple. The sooner this happened, the better, she thought. Oh, how she wanted a world's treasure for herself!

She looked down at her neatly mended blouse, her skirt made from a dress that the "welfare people" had given her mother, and her brown shoes that constantly pinched her toes. There was no money in her life for world's treasures. Tevelis had been ill for a very long time now. She glanced at her desk and, in dismay, she realized she had forgotten her homework! She missed the entire discussion on silkworms as she remembered that she had also forgotten her lunch ticket. They are at home in my library book, she thought, suddenly reminded of the fact that she was supposed to stop off at the library after school. There were no nickels in Mamyte's pocketbook for overdue library books. She would have to miss her lunch and run home to get the book, even if her feet did hurt and

she had skipped breakfast and was feeling hungry already.

Things did not get any better as the morning wore on. She didn't raise her hand to answer a single question. She was reprimanded by the "recess lady" when she stopped the line to tie her shoe after tripping over the worn laces. She was in tears by the time she reached home during the lunch break.

"Laimute", said her grandmother, meeting her at the door, "Whatever are you doing at home now? Why are you crying and what is the matter? Come in, little one, come to your Grandmama and she will help you".

Where's Mamyte, Grandmama?" sobbed the little girl.

"Your mother had to go to the doctor with Tevelis", said the anxious woman hugging the shaking child, "Can't I help you? You must be hungry. Here, have an ausiuke. I just finished baking them as a surprise for the family. I know I shouldn't have used the



eggs but I only used the yolks and we will have kugelis for dinner and I can use up the whites then. Now,

tell me what is wrong?"

"Well, I forgot my library book and it's due today. My lunch ticket was in it and so was my homework. Grandmama, my shoe hurts awful bad and guess what? Mrs. Hipple showed us another treasure today. It was a blouse made of silk but I don't know how to say that in Lithuanian. It is very soft, almost like our curtains, only not lacey", said Laima all in one big spurt as she gobbled up the little cake in two bites and begged for more with her eyes.

"You may have more", said Grandmama knowingly. "And listen, is it not your 'burzday'

today?"

Of course, it was! Laima had completely forgotten about her birthday. But birthdays were not very big at her house. There would be another blouse made by Mamyte or a sweater knitted by her grandmother and maybe a carved wooden doll from Tevelis waiting for her at dinner table

tonight.

"Look what Grandmama has for you. It is what you call a "treezure" I think. It is my pin and you may wear it to school if you like. It was given to me by my grandmama many years ago and perhaps it is time I passed it on to you. Now, does that make things better? As for your shoes, maybe you had better wear your gym shoes this afternoon. I know they have a hole in them but it is not raining and not even very cold today so you will be fine, yes?"

Laima watched as the old lady pinned the little yellow bar on her blouse. It was just an old pin that Grandmama had always worn. It was like all of the other jewelry in Grandmama's stocking drawer. Well, maybe it wasn't jade from China but it was something! She would show it to Mrs. Hipple the very first thing.

She quickly changed her shoes and ran the twelve blocks back to school with the library book clutched under her arm, munching on the crumpled ausiukes she squeezed in her hand.

"Laima Gaizunas, you are late", scolded Mrs. Hipple as the little girl missed the tardy bell by one minute. "And I didn't see you in the lunchroom either. Where have you been?"

"Mrs. Hipple, I am sorry to be late. I had to go home because I forgot my library book and it had my lunch ticket in it. Today is my birthday and look what my grandmother gave me. This pin. See?"

"Why that is very pretty, Laima. Let me see it closer. It almost looks like amber. Did your grandmother

buy it for you?"

"No, she got it from her grandmother in Lithuania and it is amber, I guess, because the priest at our church always teases my grandma and calls her his 'amber queen' but everybody knows she is not a queen but just an old lady. She is even older than Mamyte. Grandmama calls this pin 'gintaras' in Lithuanian".


"If it is amber, then it is worth a little, dear. You certainly are young to be trusted with something as valuable as that. I have always wanted to own a piece of amber myself. Perhaps you will let

me visit with your family after school tonight? Meanwhile, why don't you walk slowly around the room and let each girl and boy take a close look at your amber pin while I look it up in my books. I think there is a chapter on amber in our book of fossils. Yes, here it is".

"The chapter is called 'C10H160'", read Mrs. Hipple. "If you take 10 atoms of Carbon, 16 atoms of Hydrogen and 1 atom of Oxygen and combine them into a molecule, what do you get? Fizz water? Coal? Gas for a dirigible? No, not at all. That is the general chemical formula for a beautiful gem called amber.

Scientists named the pure form of amber 'Succinite' from the Latin word 'sucus' meaning 'sap'. Amber is the life blood (sap) of giant pine trees that grew in the Baltic Sea area 60 million years ago! At that time the climate was warm and humid and perfect for a subtropical amber forest.

Why these mammoth pine trees produced excessive amounts of resin (sap) has not been determined but the resin fell to the ground of the forest and, in the earth movements of the ages, it was compressed and solidified.



Later, glaciers reformed the contours of the land and the Baltic Sea covered the area where the amber forest once grew at 55 degrees North latitude and 19 to 20 degrees East longitude.

Succinite is known as true amber and is of a yellow, honey-like color. It is the most abundant and comes in nodules, drops, grains, and stalactites. The largest lump found weighed 20 kilograms which is about 44 pounds. Succinite can also be found in many shades from pale yellow to dark brown and rare pieces of white amber with a yellow or honey tint exist. There are also reddish, bluish, and greenish tinted pieces. Amber ranges from clear and transparent to cloudy and opaque.

The specific gravity of amber is 1.05-1.095 and its hardness is 2.-2.5 on the Moh's Scale. With the use of friction, (rubbing amber on a wool shirt, for example) amber will become electrically charged. Amber will burn and the smoke gives off a fragrance of pines. Ancient people thought that amber had curative powers and it was worn on the chest area to ward off lung and bronchial diseases.

The Greeks called amber 'elektron' - an electric, shining

substance and they believed it had powers. Lithuanians mystical gathered and admired amber from pre-historic times. Amber artifacts found in Lithuania date back to the Corded Pottery Culture of the Proto-Balts. It was called 'The Gold of the North' and it was used for trading with merchants who travelled the Eastern European rivers. This is proved by numerous artifacts found in graves in Greece and Italy. Amber is washed up on the shores of the Baltic Sea especially during stormy weather. Fishermen net amber while wading close to shore. Since amber floats, it can be pried up from the seal floor and then gathered in nets.

Scientists can identify the flora and fauna of ancient times by studying the insects and bits of leaves and twigs that became imbedded in the sticky resin and were preserved. Amber which solidified from the sap of other types of coniferous trees besides pine trees, is known as stantienite, beckerite, glessite, and gedanite. Some of these are softer than succinite (true amber) and some are dark brown or black in color. They are younger than succinite and less valuable.

At the time that Lithuania was independent (1918-1939) the commercial amber industry flourished. After a setback during World War I, the industry expanded greatly, only to be almost destroyed during World War II. Lithuania produces about 90% of the world's amber output at this time.

The top 20% of the best amber is made into fine jewelry and artistic items. A product called 'amberoid' is made from fragments and amber dust which is pressed. This is used in making costume jewelry and inexpensive pieces. Chemical factories use up the impure pieces in the production of amber oil, amber acid, amber varnish and other products. Amber yields 3% to 8% succinic acid.


For thousands of years, amber has been considered a treasure by royalty as far away as Egypt and it is still considered to be so in our sophisticated times by gem collectors all over the world".

Laima was stunned by all of this. She did not understand many of the words but she knew that the whole class was looking at her and, in embarrassment, she walked up and down the aisles dazed and trembling. She fumbled for her seat as Mrs. Hipple laid the book down. The rest of the afternoon session passed as a dream.

After school, Mrs. Hipple took Laima by the hand and led her to the shiny, white car that the teacher drove every day. Riding in the car was a great treat. Laima dashed in and out of the library while Mrs. Hipple stopped and waited. Then she received an ice cream cone as a birthday present!

What a wonderful day, thought Laima, as she snuggled up to the elegant woman. Just wait until Mamyte and Tevelis and Grandmama see us. What will they think?

Mrs. Hipple remarked, "This must be the cleanest home in town", as she entered the home of the humble Lithuanians. She patiently explained to them why she had made this visit. She had brought the precious amber home



safely that Laima had worn to school. Furthermore, she had always wanted to own a piece of amber and offered to pay \$100 for the pin!

It took a few moments of fasttalking to convince the amazed Lithuanians that the export of amber had been stopped by the Soviets and that it was worth money - yes - good American dollars!

Mamyte and Grandmama scurried around the house and brought back brooches, earrings, bracelets, necklaces, statuettes, rings, rosaries, and wood carvings with inlaid amber that seemed to be everywhere in this little home.

"After all", said Tevelis in his broken English, "In Lithuania", everybody has some amber. It is our national jewel. But you could not buy a bed with this little pile, maybe a couple of chairs, but not anything big".

Then Grandmama said that the pin now belonged to Laima and therefore, she could not sell it but if Mrs. Hipple would like to pick out something else, she would consider it. Mrs. Hipple gave Grandmama a check for \$75 for a pair of large, intricately carved earrings and told them she would like to have a few more pieces of amber if they ever needed the money and could part with the amber. She also said she had friends who would like to see the "collection".

Mrs. Hipple seemed only slightly shaken when Tevelis kissed her hand and Mamyte kissed her on the cheek. Grandmama's eyes filled with tears as she accepted the check. She had never held a check in her hand before. She had an instant vision of new shoes for Laimute, medicine for Tevelis, and all of the eggs she wanted to use whenever she felt the urge to bake some goodies. Grandmama quickly wrapped some ausiukes in waxed paper for Mrs. Hipple.

As Laima prepared for bed that evening, she gently removed the amber pin from her blouse and held it up to the lamp. Dear Grandmama was right, she thought. Grandmama had always said that Gintaras was made of the sun. It was the sun that had warmed the earth, grown the pine trees, and melted the glaciers that had brought this precious pin into her hands. Laima could not believe all that had happened on her birthday. Hadn't the doctor told Tevelis that he could go back to work next week? How Mamyte had laughed at the dinner table! The sad look on

POPIEŽIAUS PAULIAUS VI LAIŠKAS VINCENTUI BRIZGIUI

Garbingam Broliui Vincentui Brizgiui Tituliariniam Bosanos vyskupui

Tavo Kunigystės 50 metų sukakties diena, kuri jau artėja, kurią minėsi birželio 5 dieną, bus tikrai džiaugsmo diena ir tau, Garbingas Broli, ir lietuviams, kurių reikalams savo veiklą skiri jau per daugelį metų. Tą dieną prisiminsi ir minėsi ne kokį nors vieną ar kitą gyvenimo nuotykį, kokis jis bebūtų, bet tavo pašventimą kunigystėn, už ką negali būti didesnės nei prasmingesnės nei kilnesnės žmogui garbės. Visokios pagarbos teikiamos kitų žmonių yra tik paviršutinės, gi Dievo dovanos paliečia vidini žmogu.

Taip įvyko, Garbingas Broli, ir su tavim. Dievo šaukiamas atsakei panašiai kaip Abraomas, Samuelis, Povilas (Gen. 22. 1: Krl. 3, 5; Ap. Drb. 9, 6) ir per kunigyste Dievas papuošė tave tokia garbe, kad pakeistas į antrą Kristų ir paskirtas šventai tarnybai, tapai ir tarpininku tarpe Dievo ir žmonių, ir šventa Dievui auka, ir Dievo Sūnaus kunigystės dalininku. Prie to dar Bažnyčios vardu ir įgaliojimu skelbei ir skelbi neišsakomą Dievo žodį, žadindamas amžinas viltis; atleidinėjai nuodėmes, kurias atleides žmogus atsinaujina; pašvesdavai Eucharistijos sakramenta tikinčiųjų tvirtybei ir dažnai, atnaujindamas savo brolių tikėjima, juos sustiprindavai keliaujančius i nemirtingą tėvynę.

Kai per vyskupystę buvo pridėta nauja malonė kunigystės sakramentui, buvo padauginti ir tavos kunigystės vaisiai.

Kadangi Kristaus žodžiai: "Jeigu kviečio grūdas neapmirs, jis pasiliks vienas, o jei apmirs, jis duos gausių vaisių" (Jon. 12, 24), dėl to ir tau teko vienaip ar kitaip apmirti pačiuose brangiausiuose dalykuose: netenkant tėvynės, savo tikinčiųjų, Kauno Bažnyčios, kur buvai paskirtas pagelbininko pareigoms;

dabar tačiau vaisingai darbuojiesi tarpe išblaškytų lietuvių. Jiems netrūksta tavo patriotizmo, išminties, patarimu, paramos ir pagalbos nelaimėse: išsipildo šv. Augustino žodžiai: "Visada turi iš ko duoti tas, kurio širdis pilna meilės" (Psl. 23, Enr. II, 13). Šių dalykų prisiminimas, Garbingasis Broli, taip malonių sielai, teikia ne mažai paguodos. Mes gi panaudodami šią iškilmingą progą, už viską tave ir sveikiname ir užtarnautai dėkojame ir tėviška širdimi skatiname, kiek tai įmanoma, siekti aukščiau, kartu linkėdami, kad nepasigailėtum nė atsidėjimo nė darbo, kad pažadinus jaunų naujų kunigų, išsklaidytų lietuvių tarnybai ir gerui. Pats matai, kaip tai yra reikalinga ir naudinga.

Kad Dievas suteiktų tau daug malonių, mielai teikiame Apaštališką palaiminimą ir tau, Garbingas Broli, ir visai lietuvių visuomenei, visiems tavo mylimiesiems, visiems dalyvaujanties tavo šventėje.



The largest obtainable gold coin in the world, valued at over \$100,000 is one dated 1621 with the head of King Sigismund III of the Polish - Lithuanian Commonwealth of 1587-1602 on the obtuse side and the crowned arms of Lithuania and Poland on the reverse. The coin described above appeared in an advertisement in the NEW YORK TIMES of June 7, 1977 by the Rome - Manse Emporium 1065 Bloomfield Avenue, Clifton, New Jersey 07012. The custodians describe the coin as being nearly one-half inch thick, weighing eleven Troy ounces and 5412 grains and originally from the collection of Count Reventlow, a cousin of King Christian X of Denmark.

When not on display, the coin, which is held in a special bank vault, can be seen by appointment.

Mr. Vaitkus is also the current President of the Waterbury Lietuvių Bendruomenė.

Alan Arkin, Shirley Knight, Richard Jordan and Donald Pleasance will appear in "The Defection of Simas Kudirka" which deals with Kudirka's attempt to defect to the United States by leaping from his ship to an American Coast Guard Vessel. The made for Television movie will appear on CBS in the Fall.

GIEDRE KAUKAITE, a leading lyric soprano of Lithuania's Vilnius Opera, recently made her United States debut at the Carnegie Recital Hall in New York. Peter G. Davis had this to say after her performance: "With an ample sized voice of considerable force and range as well as exceptional physical attractiveness, Miss Kaukaite no doubt creates a striking presence on the operatic stage. Her renditions of familiar arias by Handel, Verdi, Gounod and Puccini displayed a solid idiomatic grasp of stylistic essentials and a quick response to dramatic situations".

Kaukaite's Lithuanian selections included 13th Century Folk Songs and works by Zigaitis, Bajoras and Brundzaite. Her accompanist was Albinas Marius Prizgintas of New York.

Three young Lithuanians can now be found on the roster of the Australian Opera in Sydney. They are, ballerinas ALDONA STUCYTE and BABINSKAITE and vocal soloist PAULIUS RUTENIS.

The QUEENS LEDGER of May 19, 1977 reported that DR. ROBERT J. WICKS, son of Mae Wicks of Maspeth, New York was selected as "Doctor of Psychology Graduate of 1977" at Hahnemann Medical College in Philadelphia. He was also selected as an "Outstanding Young Man of America for 1977" in recognition of outstanding professional achievement, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Wicks has accepted a full time faculty appointment as an Assistant Professor at Bryn Mawr College.

In the May 25, 1977 issue of the New York DAILY NEWS, the popular column, "Only Human" featured a story of Gene Manfrini, a blind piano tuner and his partner, a rebuilder of grand pianos, eighty year old Lithuanian CANON KUCHINSKY. The article described Kuchinsky as having "left Lithuania in 1939 ahead of the Nazis. He holds a law degree, but now rebuilds grand pianos with the affection a father lavishes on a favored child".

The partners' clientel include Irving Berlin, Andre Kostelanetz, Cy Coleman and Peter Nero.

In the May 27, 1977 issue of THE EVENING BULLETIN in Philadelphia, the feature "Focus" presented a look at Lithuanian sculptor, PETRAS VASKYS. Mr. Vaskys, who was trained at the Kaunas Art Academy, has built his reputation on some 108 wax figure sculptures which he created for Philadelphia's American Wax Museum, first opened in 1963. His latest creation is a wax figure of Jimmy Carter, which will join the myriad other figures from America's near and distant past. Another notable achievement was his Death Mask for the body of Bishop John Neumann. Mr. Vaskys is currently a full time professor at the Philadelphia College of Art and concentrating in his favorite medium, ceramics.

EDVARDAS J. KUBAITIS is the author of the STORY OF WILLOW SPRINGS, published in conjunction with the Bicentennial in that Illinois town. Mr. Kubaitis is a former editor of VYTIS and the religious publications of the Marianhill Fathers.



ALBINAS ELSKUS —

STAINED GLASS ART

To disregard a local Lithuanian is to sin. However, to overlook an accomplished visiting Lithuanian would be akin to a mortal sin.

Mount Holyoke College in So. Hadley, Mass. was the setting. Here at the John and Norah Warbeke Gallery of the Art building, the exhibit of stained glass and India ink drawings of artist Albinas Elskus were on view. Students of this institution had the privilege to study these arts under the expertise of Mr. Elskus during their Winter Session.

Bright sunlight splashed through the glass wall of the gallery, which featured a resplendent circular stained glass rose. The sun's rays enhanced the soft glow of colors graduating from pale to deep pink one usually associates with a beautiful prize rose.

In his magnificent portrait of the "Blue Madonna", the artist demonstrates the technique of placing sections of the blue stained glass directing the eye of the viewer towards the beauty of the subject's face.

Apples - blushing apples, that Mr. Elskus granted unending life to on glass were beautiful. Some whole, others halved or quartered, all were unique. In the past it has been said that to paint an apple well is to signify that one can paint an excellent portrait. Similarities in shading indentations of the stem at the top and the bud at the bottom of the apple are as important as shading the hollow of the eyes and nose of a person.

Revelations of Mr. Elskus's accomplishments were startling. Most interesting was the fact that one of his earlier works can be viewed right here in our own city of Holyoke, Mass. at the Providence Hospital Chapel. Those portions of the window depicting the Blessed Virgin have been reproduced by Yankee Magazine in a previous Christmas issue.


Prevelant among his major works are the stained glass in the Church of the Epiphany, St. Catherine of Sienna in New York, the elongated 75 ft. window in the St. John the Evangelist Church at Lake Mahopac and others, including churches in New England and several foreign countries.

Currently he is designing a window for St. Michael's Church in Bayonne, New Jersey.

During this interview Joan Laframboise and I occasionally found our glances drifting to the 15th century tapestries that hung on the walls of the lobby. This, naturally, led to the ethnological question regarding architecture.

Is there any difference between Lithuanian styling and that of other countries in Europe? Not really. Earlier rulers, having an eye to the future of Lithuania imported architects from Italy, we were informed. In return, Lithuanian students were sent to Italy and other countries to study classical structure, so that no significant difference evolved. The architecture of country homes held diversity in that each building stood apart from others. Here in America we have the connecting rambling farmhouses.

Unusual features characteristic




An early work of A. Elskus-stained glass at the Providence Hospital Chapel in Holyoke, Mass.

of Lithuanian country homes are the doorways decorated with such carvings as the heads of two horses or, perhaps, tulips. Another example is the individuality of the three tiered roofs of Jewish Synagogues seen only in Lithuania.

Regarding his educational background, Mr. Elskus disclosed that he received his early art training at the Institute of Decorative Arts in Kaunas, Lithuania and later studied architecture in Darmstadt, Germany. Since coming to the United States in 1949, he has progressed in his career to the point of being part owner of the Durham Studios in New York. In addition to pursuing his career, the artist endeavors to expose students to the intricacies of this art by serving on the staff of Fordham University.

Having served as president of the Lithuanian Artists league of New York he continues to hold membership in this organization.

Would you like a magic potion to ward off witches and evil spirits? Do you need a cure for a headache or the plague? How about a panacea against old age? Or an antidote for the poison of mushrooms and toadstools? Try rue.

Ruta Graveolens, an aromatic herb commonly known as rue, is the national flower of Lithuania. An almost-evergreen perennial, it grows to a height of three feet. In late summer, the bushy dark green plant is covered with small blossoms containing tiny bright yellow petals surrounding an emerald center.

Rue is native to central Europe but can now be found all over the world. For centuries, it has been the custom for Lithuanians to carry rue seeds with them when migrating.

Rue has an ancient history and is mentioned in the Bible, in the works of Shakespeare, and in other literature. To be "rue-like" means to have "oil" instead of water in the body and to be invincible. Hippocrates recommended it. In Pliny's day, it was prescribed for eighty-four ailments.

In recent interview with Albert Wallis of C-96 Dayton, who specializes in growing rue, we learned that English judges kept rue on their benches to protect them from the "gaol fever" of the prisoners. Baltic housewives mothproofed their closets with it. Sprigs of rue were hung in the kitchen to repel flies and bugs. The

"RUTA GRAVEOLENS"

Romans ate the leaves to improve their eyesight. They also claimed it gave them second sight.

Called "ruta" by the Lithuanians, it symbolizes virginity. Countless folk songs tell of maidens caring for their rue, weaving wreaths of rue, and putting aside their rue - by getting married or losing their virginity. Symbolically, brides wear a wreath of rue and take it off during the wedding ceremony - never to wear a rue wreath again.

When Christianity came to Lithuania, brushes of rue were used to sprinkle holy water on the penitents at the beginning of Mass. Hence, it was known as the "Herb of Grace" and the "Herb of Repentance".

It was thought that rue leaves could refresh the mouth, cure hysterical spasms, relieve pain and help with bee stings and spider bites.

In ancient times, it was used in salads, fish sauces, omelets, and to flavor beer. Although a taste for rue can be acquired, its bitterness is unpleasant to most people.

Because a rue plant could live for a hundred years - more or less - it became a symbol of patience and endurance for the peace loving Lithuanians who were oppressed, tortured, and subjugated by their enemies for many years.

The almost indestructible rue is a plus in any garden. Pest-free, its ferny leaves can be used in bouquets and as greenery. Cuttings will last for many months if kept in water. It is a hardy plant and will grow in poor soil. It will thrive in sunshine or in shade. It is not a weed and will not spread easily.

The fragrance of rue does not come from a nectary. It comes from special cells holding the oils that produce the perfume. These cells lie just beneath the surface of the leaf and are covered with a fine layer that is pierced in the center by a narrow slit. As the rue growsthe cells get bigger and the slit opens wider and forces the oils onto the outside of the leaf.

To propagate rue, the blossoms must be gathered and dried in the autumn. The tiny black seeds they contain can then be planted in the garden the following spring. Each seed will grow into a bush that will last for a lifetime.

Once the bush has been established, it is better to prune it to six inches from the ground in November so that strong, new shoots will grow the following summer.

Rue seedlings are traditionally sold at fairs, festivals, and other ethnic events by Lithuanians. Lithuanian-Americans propagate rue to remind them of their heritage and culture. It is the symbol of the sufferings of their ancestors and relatives.





Respectfully, our tribute began with Mass at St. Casimir's Church with Fr. A. Jurgelaitis, O.P., Supreme Council Spiritual Advisor and a faculty member of Providence College, R.I., as celebrant and homilist.

"Šv. Kazimierai, melskis už mus", invoked the attending Knights bringing closer a warmer attachment to our patron saint. Following Benediction, the assemblage convened to St. Casimir's Hall for a cultural performance by the Ratelis Folk Dancers directed by Mrs. Antonina Bulota.

The program began with the Blezdingėlė, the oldest Lith. folk dance from the lowlands of žemaitija. In this, the maidens interpreted the flight of the swallows. Employing white handkerchiefs, the girls gracefully and artistically imitated the small birds in various formations, swooping, fluttering in a cluster and in one stance recalling our childhood, one could visualize birds "going to a wedding".

Joined by their fellow partners, the second dance was the Šustas, a Lithuanian square dance, and this was followed by the Aušrelė, a romantic waltz derived from an old Lithuanian song. Southeastern Lithuania was represented by the gayety expressed in a square dance titled Žekelis.

In the last dance, Audėjėlė, the weavers dance, the girls depict the art of weaving cloth for a beautiful shirt. The simulation of shuttles moving back and forth was lithely reproduced and the pattern of the material took form. In the last moments of the dance, the fellows rejoined the girls to unfold in the finale a beautiful eight pointed star. Throughout each dance the creative and interpretive talents of the group was perceptive, appealing and rewarding.

Guest speakers included Fr. Jurgelaitis who eulogized the virtues of faith, hope and charity practiced by St. Casimir.

Boston was the main speaker, covering "Lithuanians in America", the title and subject of his recently published book. 

A Baltic Human Rights Rally (BHRR) will be held on September 24, 1977, at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. It is hoped that the event will be attended by several thousand Lithuanian, Latvian and Estonian Americans from various parts of the USA.

There two reasons for this rally...

First, to call attention to the fact that human rights are being systematically violated in the Baltic States and that the USSR has made mockery of the Helsinki accords. Not coincidentally, this rally will take place at the same time as the Belgrade Conference, which will review the implementation of the Helsinki agreements;

Second, to vigorously reaffirm the Baltic States' inalienable right to self-determination, which has been denied them by the Soviet Russian regime.

Three key ingredients are needed for the success of the rally... people, money and press. All are equally important. Your help is needed in supplying

any or all of these.

The Knights of Lithuania is officially registered as a "grass roots organization" of the rally, and its representatives have been involved in the planning stages. Hopefully, you are also already involved with it. If not, now is the time to make the commitment. Your parish and/or local council should be urged to initiate a trip to the rally, by bus, train, or whatever. Your local press should be alerted to the

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plans for such an event, and that you, a local person, are participating.
