



CELEBRATION THE LITURGICAL WAY

When Governor William Bradford of Plymouth County instituted the first Thanksgiving Day in 1621, there were no Catholics in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, which was, as we know, a Protestant colony. So, Gov. Bradford could not include a celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of Thanksgiving in his proclamation setting aside that first American day of thanks to God.

As we commemorate the 356th anniversary of the first Thanksgiving Day and the 36th anniversary of this holiday as a perpetual national holiday, we are more fortunate: we Catholic Americans have the Mass. Not only can we join our fellow citizens of other religious beliefs in civil and religious ceremonies, but we can, also, as Catholics participate in the Mass to thank Almighty God for his favors to our country over the centuries since the first settlers arrived.

We have been taught that the Holy Sacrifice embraces a fourfold prayer: praise, thanksgiving, atonement for sin and petition. Every Mass accomplishes these four purposes. On Thanksgiving Day we emphasize the second purpose — gratitude to God for his favors to our country and to ourselves.

In the renewed liturgy of the Church there is found in the Sacramentary (or Missal, as it used to be called) a Mass "for Thanksgiving Day" proper to the United States. This Mass is a beautiful blend of gratitude and patriotism and prayerful concern for all our fellow citizens of this land of our

birth. Let us see what riches this Mass contains.

The entrance antiphon sets the theme for the celebration inviting us to "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good; his love is everlasting". We accept this invitation and after the Penitential Rite, we find ourselves joining in the "Glory to God in the highest..." joyfully proclaiming or singing "Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, WE GIVE YOU THANKS, we praise you for your glory".

Strangely, in the opening prayer of the Mass there are no words of thanks, but there is praise, hope and petition: "O God, You have fulfilled our founding fathers' faith in Your Divine Providence by making and keeping us a land rich in the abundance of Your creation. Freedom, justice and universal brotherhood are for us a precious heritage, but for countless men, in our midst and all over the world, they are still only a dream. May we be faithful to share this heritage with the living and transmit it to a people still unborn".

This is truly an American prayer to be said earnestly by American Catholics for America's needs: for faith in Divine Providence, for recognition that "freedom, justice and universal brotherhood" are our "precious heritage" and for a stronger resolve to share that heritage with the whole world.

The first reading in the words of Isaiah: "The favors of the Lord I will receive" not only urges us to be open to God's gifts (which is easy), but also, to review them one by one, favor by favor to arouse a

deep gratitude, so that in the Responsorial Psalm we could lovingly repeat again and again: "I will give thanks to your name, because of your kindness and truth".

As we approach the reading of the Gospel, the Alleluia response alerts us to the truth that our heritage is Christ given: "May the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ be praised: God, who has bestowed on us every spiritual blessing in the heavens". In other words, we are now thanking God not only for material blessings, but for spiritual blessings, as well.

The Gospel parable of the rich man who had no place to store his great wealth cautions us on this day when we recall all God's gifts to us "to avoid greed in all its



forms" and shows the folly of growing rich for ourselves alone, instead of growing rich in the sight of God by sharing his gifts with others who are less fortunate.

We notice in the special Preface of the day how the Church links together the Chosen People of Israel whose destiny it was to be freed from bondage through Jesus Christ, and "...our fathers who came to this land, as if out of the desert, into a place of promise and hope". The Preface then continues: "It happens to us still, in our time, as you lead all men through your Church to the blessed vision of peace".

Whether America, as a whole, knows it or not, whether it heeds God's leadership through the Church or not, the fact is that God through His Providence does lead all men to a "new freedom in his Spirit". And for this we and all Americans ought to be thankful.

The Mass continues to the mysterious moment of consecration, the unbloody, sacramental renewal of Christ's sacrifice of his life and love on the Cross for the salvation of all men. This is the moment that the Sacrifice becomes Thanksgiving. Since Jesus Christ was given to us by God the Father, and since Jesus Christ has given Himself to us, He is ours to give back to the Father. We offer Him to God as a sacrificial thanksoffering for all God's blessings to America.

How much more efficacious would the Pilgrims' public thanksgiving have been, if Governor Bradford could have had Holy Mass celebrated in his colony. As it was, all he could do was offer human praise and thanks to the Almighty. Today, Catholics and other Christians who have the Mass can thank God in both a human and a divine way through the Mass, through Christ's sacrifice of thanksgiving in which they participate.

participate. One final thought about "Thanksgiving Day the Liturgical Way" is suggested by the final prayer of the Mass, which mentions a "thanksgiving meal". The prayer begins: "Thinking back on your boundless generosity as we share this thanksgiving meal, O Lord..." Here "thanksgiving meal" means the Bread of Life, the Body and Blood of Christ, the Eucharist. These words bring to mind the Pilgrims' Harvest Feast of Thanksgiving. In comparing their thanksgiving meal with our "thanksgiving meal" we cannot help but be more thankful than ever: their food was fruits of the earth, ours is "the bread come down from heaven". This prayer has a very appealing ending: "Let us share with generous hearts and open hands the fruits of the earth which you have given into our keeping, as we hope to share the fruits of eternal life".

Notice, if you will, the parallel:

"fruits of the earth" — "fruits of eternal life". The connection is easily seen. Thanksgiving Day is a reminder of Thanksgiving Eternity and the Thanksgiving Day meal should be a reminder of the Eternal Thanksgiving Banquet we hope to enjoy with God. Only when we see Thanksgiving Day in the light of faith, will we appreciate how Catholic in spirit was the original Pilgrim Day of Thanks, even though they did not have, as we do, a liturgical way of saying "Thank You, Lord" in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Mūsų tautos istoriniai faktai rodo, koki mūsų kunigaikščių herojiški veiksmai atlikti. Kęstutis, Vytautas ir kiti herojiškai skynė pergales, priešų supami. Po dvejų šimtų metų vėl kilo laisvės liepsna, Donelaitis, 1863 sukilimas, vysk. M. Valančius, 1905 metų spaudos atgavimas, Aušra, Varpas, Vilniaus žinios, pagaliau savanoriai ir partizanai, sukilėliai prieš pavergėjus. Įstorija skaudi, kovinga, aplaistyta gyvybių aukomis, kentėjimais ir kovomis už laisvę.

Tarp kūjo ir priekalo kenčia mūsų Lietuva. Mes matome, kaip okupantas ją smaugia ir trypia kruvinu padu. Jei Kalantos ir kitų herojiškas susideginimas pajudino okupantą ir Lietuvą, tai rodo, jog laisvės troškimas savam kraštui labai gyvas. Tai pasireiškia buvusių karžygių dvasia, narsiųjų savanorių ir karių bei partizanų šešėliai. Jei mūsų kraštą pasidalino žiaurusis Stalinas su žiauriuoju Hitleriu, tai kagi maža mūsų kariuomenė galėjo daryti. Kai kas dar kaltina Lietuvos kariuomenę, kad ji nė šūvio nepaleido į sovietinį okupantą. Juk ir galingos valstybės, negaudamos ginkluotos paramos iš užsienio, griūva. Baisi tragedija ištiko Vengrija, Čekoslovakija. Dabar Vietnamas, nežinia kas nutiks su Portugalija ir Ispanija.

Dabartinis kovų avangardas yra Lietuvoje ir čia, išeivijoj. Simas Kudirka laisvės simboliu tapo. Lietuvoje kankinama Sadūnaitė už "Kronikos" platinimą. Kuo mes galim padėti? Remdami Alta,




Balfa, Vlika, jau padedame. S. Kudirka sako: nuvažiavę į Lietuvą nebūkit bailiai, kaip avinėliai, o skleiskite laisvės minti, jauskitės kaip čia Amerikoje, kalbėkit ką norite. Juk okupantas dreba. Rašykim protestus, skelbkime Lietuvos nelaisvę kiekvienoj vietoj, visam laisvam pasauliui, kiekviena proga. Išmeskim raudonas bacilas iš savų organizacijų ir Amerikos. Kovokime su vietos komunistų rėmėjais, kurie net Enciklopedijose, televizijoj, mokslo knygose pataikauja rusiškam imperializmui. Auklėkime vaikus iš mažens būti kovotojais. Saugokim visas tradicijas ir lietuvybę Juk matome, kad mūsų jaunuoliai, įsijungę į laisvų tautų karines jėgas, gyvena Lietuvos laisvės mintimis. Tai rodo vos prieš keliolika dienų žuvęs aviacijos lakūnas Paulauskas. Velionis pelnė daug garbės ženklų kovose prieš komunizma. Jis ir frontuose skraidė su trispalve. Tai ryškus Lietuvos laisvės kovos būdas! Buvo ir daugiau tokių.

etting a goal at the beginning of a project, or race, if you will, provides a point toward which to work, to strive, and a kind of built in gauge with which to measure our program.

We find ourselves now at the start of such an effort. Another membership drive is beginning.

This year, I've decided to set some numerical goals toward which we can work. Let's call these objectives. Sometime near the end of the year, I'll report to you on how close to these objectives we've come.

- Objective 1. By the 1978 National Convention, a total membership exceeding 2500 members. Based on trends in recent years, this is realistic.
- Objective 2. One new or revived Council in every District.
- Objective 3. An increase in the number of priest members in our councils, or at-large.
- Objective 4. A net increase, as reported at the National Convention, for all councils.

The 1978 National Membership Drive Rules remain the same as last year, and are reiterated below.

AWARD CATEGORIES .

First Category — Councils with 1-49 members Second Category — Councils with 50-99 members Third Category — Councils with over 100 members

An Award will be presented to the first council in each category to achieve 100% paid up membership, the deadline being March 31, 1978.

The council in each of the three categories having the greatest percentage of increase over its 1977 total membership will also receive an award.

Individual members will be eligible for awards for enrolling new members. The three highest totals achieved will be the winners. 10 points are earned for each new K of L'er enrolled, and 5 points for each rejoined member. Deadline for these awards is also June 30.

You can see that there's not much time. So let's get started! Make this year's campaign part of your K of L participation, for you, your council, and the National organization.

No, this is not a tale of some infectious virus that invaded our Nation's Capitol, but of the continuance of a tradition. In 1976, the Mid Atlantic District, at one of its quarterly conventions, voted to institute an Annual District Pilgrimage. Its first destination was the Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia, Pa., in 1976.

This year, MAD's Second Annual Excursion was to Washington, D.C. Chairwoman for the day was Honorary Member and District Cultural Chairwoman, Helen T. Shields.

Although the day brought a humid weight accompanied by the occasional shower so typical of the charge of seasons, and the chartered bus experienced technical difficulties, K of L spirit proved infectious and carried the day.

The fifty K of Lers who participated included a large number of young people, many of whom were K of L Juniors. Councils 3, 12, 41, 67, 110, 110 Jrs. and 142 were represented.

Upon arrival in the District, we were greeted by C-142 President Eva Migonis, who had made arrangements on the Washington end.

The first stop was the Franciscan Monastery, Mount St. Sepulchre Memorial Church of the Holy Land. The ornate Byzantine structure was con-

structed in 1899 and contains reproductions of many sacred shrines of the Holy Land. These include one of Mount Calvary, with a realistic Crucifixion scene, the tomb of Christ, Mount Tabor and the Transfiguration, and the Grottos of both the Annunciation in Nazareth and the Nativity in Bethlehem. The ground plan is built on the lines of the Five-fold Cross of the Holy Land.

Beneath the Church proper lies a small replica of the labrynthine Roman Catacombs.

The purpose of the Monastery and the Franciscans who reside there is to train Missionaries for the Holy Land and to preserve and maintain the Shrines there through scholarly work and financial assistance.

K of L Pilgrims were expertly guided through the monastery by one of the official guides.

The second visit on the itinerary was the Lithuanian Legation on Washington's "Embassy Row". It

was hard to escape the feeling that we were setting foot in politically "free Lithuania". Its ornate facade yields to two floors of furnishings from another era; rugs and tapestries from Lithuania, amber displays and wood carvings.

We were greeted by our hosts, Charge D'Affairs Dr. and Mrs. Bačkis, who could not have been more gracious in opening their home to a large group of visitors. Council 142 members tendered a cordial

reception in the Legation Dining Hall.

Our hosts were especially taken with our young people, with whom they eagerly conversed. The informal reception proved an opportune time for New Yorkers and Jerseyites to meet with members of the Washington Council.

The climax of the day came with a special Lithuanian Mass for the K of L at the Chapel of Our Lady of Siluva in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Con-

ception.

The National Shrine itself is a strikingly beautiful Romanesque ediface on a hilltop, with an obelisk-like bell tower, an enormous enameled dome and a

magnificent arched facade.

Upon completion of the National Shrine, many ethnic groups donated chapels and altars in honor of Our Lady. At the initiation of Rev. Joseph Karalius of Shenandoah, Pa., a national fund-raising effort was launched to construct a Lithuanian Shrine commemorating Our Lady's first recorded appearance in Europe, at Siluva in 1651.

At the cost of \$325,000 and through the collaboration of three great Lithuanian artists, V. K. Jonynas, A. Elskus and V. Kasuba, the Chapel was erected and dedicated with much pomp and ceremony on September 4, 1966.

The altar itself uses the Wayside Shrine motif. Above the altar is a figure of Our Lady holding the Christ Child, surrounded by an aura of gold and blue. On the marble framing this scene are the words, "Mary, Console the Children of a Land Sprinkled with Blood and Tears", a quote from the famous Siberian prayer book, MARY SAVE US. The left and right walls are covered with colorful mosaics depicting St. Casimir, the RŪPINTOJĖLIS (Pensive Christ), Lithuanian Churches, Wayside Shrines and the Baptism of Mindaugas.

The ceiling is devoted to mosaic representations of the four famous Madonnas of Lithuania: Trakai, Pažaislis, Aušros Vartai, and Žemaičių Kalvarija.

It was in this imposing setting that the Rev. Tomas Ziuraitis, OFM, Council 142 Spiritual Advisor, was celebrant at a K of L Mass.

Rarely had those walls heard "Marija, Marija"

sung with such urgency and devotion.

Before embarking on our return trip, our group enjoyed a sumptuous farewell dinner at a nearby restaurant, whose owner, it turned out, was half Lithuanian.

Souvenirs, courtesy of the National Lithuanian Affairs Committee Chairman, Rev. Casimir Pugevicius, were recordings and booklets of the Siluva Chapel Dedication.

Thanks to Helen Shields and Eva Migonis and their committees for the arrangements and smooth run-


ning schedule. Another memorable day!



RITUAL NEWSLETTER

TO ALL RITUAL CHAIRPERSONS, COUNCIL AND DISTRICT INCLUSIVE:

Your Supreme Council Ritual Committee for the next fiscal year will be striving toward continued improvement in the Ritual System, to make the Ritual a more meaningful part of the Knights. We hope to raise the prestige of this part of the organization.

As a start, we encourage all Ritual Chairpersons to submit all applications using the proper forms. Copies of the various forms for all degrees were sent to all councils last year. If you did not receive any such material or if the material did not get to the proper persons, please contact us. All forms and instructions will be sent upon request. Be sure to keep copies of all submissions in your council/district files.

We encourage all councils to use their council seals when submitting degree applications. The original copy of the application is an official document. Ritual Chairpersons are to use individual forms when applying for the various degrees. This makes the job more efficient for the Supreme Council Ritual Committee. When filing applications for married women, please show their maiden names. List any previous council an applicant had belonged to. This saves time in checking the candidates previous records.

Until further notice we will be using the Point System published in the Jan. 1977 edition of the Vytis.

When awarding points to members, weigh the time element of any project. Don't hesitate to give less credit then suggested. In some cases you may feel a project does not warrent the full credit listed in the Point System. Also, on a yearly position, if the position has not been fulfilled actively then the member does not 'automatically' receive points. Points must be earned. Please discuss the following in your council/district and let us know your wishes:

One item at the National Convention Ritual Panel Discussion that was left with divided opinions was the following:

Some felt giving ½ point per year for membership unfair as so many members are just names 'in the book'. Some felt ¼ point per year for membership was fair for the members as some could not be active

because of working conditions, living out-of-town, etc. As to ½ point per meeting attendance - some felt this was way out - others felt this was good. THE CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA

Rev. C. Pugevičius

The name, CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA sounds like an ancient document, or a church magazine. It is neither.

The CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA is an underground newsletter smuggled out of Lithuania, documenting in detail the denial of human rights and religious freedom in Soviet-occupied Lithuania.

Painstakingly produced in carbon copies on secret typewriters by individuals risking imprisonment or worse for their actions, The CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA is secretly passed from one person to another, until it is smuggled out to the free world.

Here it is translated and abstracted for the press of the world. The original Lithuanian-language version is broadcast back into Lithuania via Radio Liberty, Radio Vatican, and Voice of America, to be heard by thousands who listen secretly to these broadcasts in Lithuania.

The CHRONICLE is also published in free-world Lithuanian-language papers and in bound form in Lithuanian. It is also published in English in individual pamphlets, and in German, Italian, French and Spanish.

The CHRONICLE began to appear March 19, 1972. To date, twenty-seven issues have reached the freeworld — the latest just about two months ago.

Chronicle No. 1 dated March 19, 1972, carried a brief report of the trial of Father Juozas Zdebskis, who in 1971, was arrested for teaching catechism to children, and sentenced to a year in prison.

The same issue of the Chronicle carries a petition to the Soviet government signed by about 350 parishioners of Prienai, in behalf of Father Zdebskis. This is followed by another petition, this one signed by 2010 parishioners. Another petition, signed by 1190 people of Santaika.

These were some of the first known petitions signed by significant numbers of people in Soviet Lithuania. Needless to say, they evoked more vengeance than cooperation from the Soviet authorities. To this day, the Communists are trying to track down those responsible.

Father Zdebskis, 2nd. complains that the Communist authorities interfere with applications to the sole-surviving Roman Catholic seminary in the U.S.S.R. — located in Kaunas.

He also complains of the lack of prayer books and other religious literature.

The first CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA goes on to describe in some detail the trial of Father Zdebskis.


The priest bases his defense on the demands made of him as a priest by the Gospel of Christ, and by the Law of the Church, and also on the freedom of conscience supposedly guaranteed by the Soviet Constitution.

He further points out the hypocrisy of the Soviet authorities demonstrated in the difference between their words and their actions with regard to religious freedom.

Father Zdebskis says that the priest in Lithuania today has to choose between being on the one hand, a quiet co-worker with the atheists, trying to play both sides of the fence; and, on the other hand, of daring to do one's priestly duty in spite of the cost. Needless to say, he opts for the latter course — and he pays the price: one year in labor camp.

The first issue of the Chronicle also reports the trial in November, 1971, that Father Prosperas Bubnys — on similar charges, and with identical results.

The same issue of the Chronicle reports that on October 4, 1971, Father Algimantas Keina, pastor of Valkininkai, was fined fifty rubles for allowing youngsters to serve Mass.



Structures such as these must now serve as churches in Lithuania.

The first issue of the Chronicle further reports that Father Antanas Šeškevičius, of the Diocese of Kaišiadoriai, after completing a sentence of one year of strict regime labor camp for teaching children catechism, suffered continued harassment for his "crime".

The same issue of the Chronicle further reports that on December 31, 1971, Father Petras Orlickas, pastor of Margininkai, was fined fifty rubles for play-

ing basket-ball with some youngsters.

This report is followed by a report of the petition, dated some time in 1971, and signed by 134 people of the Diocese of Panevėžys, requesting that the Communist authorities allow the return of their bishop, Julijus Steponavičius, who has been prevented by the atheists since 1961 from carrying out his duties, because he refused to cooperate with the Communists against the dictates of his conscience.

The same CHRONICLE reports the sentencing, Jan. 13, 1972, of an old lady, Kleopa Bičučaitė, to one year imprisonment for teaching religion to children.

On Dec. 28, 1971, Father Petras Lygnugaris, of Akmenė, was fined fifty rubles for visiting a seri-

ously ill patient in the hospital.


A kind of brief summary of the complaints of religious believers against the Soviet authorities in Lithuania is provided in this first issue of the CHRONICLE in a petition, dated Christmas Eve, 1971, and signed by forty-three priests of the Archdiocese of Vilnius:

"1. That the seminary in Kaunas be allowed to operate without interference, and to accept all candi-

dates considered suitable by the Church.

"2. To implement in a practical fashion the freedom of the press guaranteed by the Constitution of the U.S.S.R.; i.e., the right to publish prayer books, catechisms, hymnals, the Sacred Scriptures and other religious books, which are lacking, and which such freedom requires.

"3. To allow Bishops Julijonas Steponavičius and

Vincentas Sladkevičius to resume their episcopal duties, and to allow all priests living in our land (among them the Ukrainians) freely and openly to function as priests.

"4. To rescind, as incompatible with the International Convention of Nov. 15, 1961, and with the Constitution of the Soviet Union, the text explaining Paragraph 143 of the Criminal Code of the Lithuanian Soviet Socialist Republic: "On the Organizing of Activities in Connection With the Religious Education of Minors, in Contravention of Rules Determined by the Law", which are abused by the People's Courts of our country.

"5. To abrogate all the various secret instructions, unknown to us, dealing with religious activities.

"6. To review the cases of persons sentenced for their religious beliefs, and to acquit them.

"We request that the matters set forth in this petition be decided in Moscow, since earlier petitions by the faithful, forwarded from Moscow to Vilnius, were never really considered, but caused new unpleasantness for the faithful".

"These complaints of ours are supported by many painful facts, of which, if necessary, we can submit

more".


In over five years, nothing much has changed with regard to the infringements upon religious freedom

in Soviet-occupied Lithuania.

The average visitor to Lithuania may not sense the struggle which is raging beneath the facade of apparent freedom and prosperity exhibited to the tourist or visiting relative. Even such a knowledgeable leader as the Superior General of the Jesuit Fathers came back from a visit to the Soviet Union telling the press that he thought that pressure by the atheists on religion in the Soviet Union is easing.

How far such a judgment is from the truth will be demonstrated from the CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA in further

articles of this series.

The American tradition Thanksgiving brings to mind a variety of images: pumpkins and squash, a table groaning with specialty dishes and crowned with a roasted turkey, a hint of frost in the air, and department store parades ending with the arrival of a premature Santa Claus. But perhaps the strongest identification of the holiday is with the presence of family. The picture of the American family at the holiday table has become synonymous with the idea of Thanksgiving.

At this family time of year, it would be appropriate to consider the nature of the Lithuanian family as it has existed through the years.

Much has been said by present day sociologists about the nature of the family. For the most part, in the United States, and in Lithuania today, the "family" is a nuclear family, made up of a married couple and their children. In Lithuania, this simple family unit is referred to as SEIMA. However, the family structure familiar to our parents and grandparents was quite different. Prior to World War II, it was common to find families which included grandparents, parents, and their children, along with uncles and aunts, who lived and worked together as close-knit units in Lithuanian villages.

Even earlier in Lithuanian history, other people, such as the family servants and close friends, lived with, and were treated as part of an extended family with This type of extended family is known as ŠEIMYNA.

The close-knit nature of the family in Lithuania can be seen by observing some past customs. Grandparents were invited to live with one of their children, who were expected to show their elders respect and devotion. Orphaned children were taken in by relatives who raised them as their own. If a family suffered a personal misfor-. tune, such as a poor harvest, or a fire, relatives would come to their aid. These close relationships were even extended to hired help of many years. Even if a servant went to work at another place and lost the job, the family would welcome the unemployed servant into their home until a new job was found.

As the Lithuanians came to America, the first generation of emigrants still held strongly to the extended family pattern. With trends toward urbanization and industrialization, this began to decline as people tried to adjust to conditions of social mobility and employment. Thus families began

to drift apart, and, as a result, some of the richness and beauty of the traditional Lithuanian family has been lost.

And so, full circle to Thanksgiving, a family holiday. As we prepare our feast for the last Thursday in November, it might be well to stop and think... about an elderly grandparent, aunt or uncle who might be too ill to travel, a family friend with no relatives of his own, a student unable to go home for the holiday, a couple with a new baby who just don't have the resources this year... about the greater family around us.

By broadening our private family holiday, we can experience the riches and blessings of thanksgiving. Sharing the day with an elderly Lithuanian might bring us closer to our own special roots. of Lithuania's greatest strengths is the love that binds its families together. Reaching out can prove to be an enriching experience which will last far beyond the left-over turkey.


MUZIKUI NIKODEMUI KULIUI 80 METU

Šeštadienį šeimininkas naujai atvažiavusį nusivedė į karčiamą supažindinti su draugais. Jie jį nugirdė ir sergantį parvedė į namus. Sekmadienio rytą Ona nusivedė į bažnyčią, o po pamaldų į svetainę, kur buvo blaivybės draugijos susirinkimas ir čia jį įrašė į draugiją, kad daugiau nebegertų.

Scrantonas gražus anglies kasyklų miestas. Daug lietuvių dirbo kasyklose. Graži Šv. Juozapo bažnyčia. Parapijoje veikė keletas draugijų ir puikus choras. Varg. buvo Antanas Sodeika. Jo gražus balsas žavėjo visus. Kasyklų inžinierius Nececkas parūpino Nikodemui darbą kasyklose; pilti anglis i vagonus. Darbas buvo sunkus ir baisus, nes matė kaip užmušė šalia dirbantį. Išsigandęs Nikodemas išvažiavo į Grand Rapids, Mich., pas savo pusbroli Vinca Yusa, tikėdamas čia gauti lengvesnį darbą. Gavo dirbti sunkų darbą "Kataliko" medžio pramonėje. laikrašty pastebėjo skelbimą: -Chicagoje yra Beethoven Conservatory of Music. Jos vedėjai yra Prof. A. Aleksis ir Prof. A. Pocius. Nikodemas atvažiavo į Chicagą. Susirado darbą restorane badavėju ir istojo i Beethoveno vardo konservatoriją. Anglų kalbos mokytis įsirašė į Heaven School. Moky lose mokslas sekėsi neblogai. Vėliau pateko i Englewood High School.

1922 m. Nikodemas, dar nebaigęs mokyklos, gavo vargonininko vietą Šv. Baltramiejaus parapijoje, Waukegan, Ill., pas kleboną kun. J. Klorį. Šioje parapijoje Nikodemas

darbavosi su choru ir su vyčiais 4 metus, nepertraukdamas muzikos pamokų Chicagoje. Čia išmokino chorą giedoti naujas Mišias, lotynų ir lietuvių kalbomis giesmes. Pastatė Miko Petrausko operetę "Adomas ir Jieva" ir operą "Girių Karalius". Atstovavo vietinei L. Vyčių kuopai seime Springfield, Ill. Ten darbavosi komp. A. Aleksis, kuris parašė daug muzikos kūrinių, solo dainų ir operetę "Mes Grįšim į Tėvynę". Šią gražią operetę suvai-

dino per seimą. Delegatams operetė labai patiko ir pakvietė ją į Chicagą su visa artistų ir choro

grupe.

Nikodemas davė pianino pamokas namuose. Mokinių skaičiui padidėjus, įsteigė Waukegan School of Music. Piano klasei vadovavo N. Kulys ir komp. A. Pocius, smuiko klasei — M. Petrosevičius ir M. Bragg; dainavimo — Justas Kudirka, grįžęs iš Lietuvos, kur dainavo operoje. Su mokiniais rengdavo koncertus sykį per metus. Mokykla išsilaikė 8 metus.

1925 metais kun. A. Baltutis pakvietė Nikodemą į Chicagą vargonininku Šv. Mykolo parapijoje. Čia jam buvo geresnės sąlygos darbuotis. 1927 baigė Beethoveno Conservatory of Music, įsigydamas mokytojo laipsnį – diplomą. Šv. Mykolo parapijoje Nikodemas dirbo vargonininku 42 m. Turėjo 3 chorus: vaikų, High School berniuku ir didiji mišru chorą. Rengė koncertus. Du kartus bažnyčieje išpildė DuBois kantatą "Septyni Kristaus žodžiai". Su choru pastatė keleta operečių. Labai patiko operetė "Ekskursija į Lietuvą".

Per 8 metus Nikodemas daug dirbo Varg. sąjungoje, eidamas sekretoriaus pareigas. Kai įsisteigė "Muzikos Žinių" žurnalas, jis tvarkė jo leidimą rūpindamasis finansais ir redakcija. MŽ bendradarbiavo komp. A. Aleksis, komp. A. Pocius ir prof. J. Žilevičius. N. Kulys spausdino dainas chorams ir gautas pajamas skyrė "Muzikos Žinioms" leisti.

1936 metais Nikodemas vedė Petronelę Vaišnoraitę. Užaugino ir išmokslino du sūnus: Juozą ir

Vinca.

šv. Mykolo parapija pradėjo mažėti. N. Kulys, neapleisdamas vargonininko pareigų, gavo naktinį darbą pašte. Taip dirbo 25 metus iki, sulaukęs 70 metų išėjo į pensiją. Nikodemas pasiliko tik vargonininko pareigose. Po kelių metų bažnyčia užsidarė.

Kartą varg. N. Kulį iš Waukegan, Ill., pakyietė kun. S. Jonelis pagroti 40 valandų mišparus Šv. Baltramiejaus bažnyčioje. N. Kulys tai atliko su choru gerai. Klebonui ir kitiems kunigams, kurių buvo procesijoje 25, patiko. Po savaitės N. Kulys gavo pakvietimą užimti vargonininko vietą. Taip Nikodemas grižo i ta pačią para-

piją, kurioje pradėjo vargonininko darbą 1922 metais. Čia dabar rado naują mūro bažnyčią ir chorą su gražiais balsais. Čia N. Kulys sulietuvino keletą Mišių iš lotynų kalbos. Good Shepherds Mišias paruošė lietuviškai ir angliškai. Išmokė chorą giedoti naujas Mišias "Taikos Karalienės garbei", parašytas kun. G. Šukio. Su choru surengė religinį koncertą, pasikvietęs Racine par. chorą. Du kartus važiavo su choru į Chicagą giedoti Šv. Mykolo bažnyčioje, minint kun.

A. Valančiaus jubiliejų. Vasario 16-tąją choras dainavo Waukegane ir Racine, Wis. Kenoshoje, Wisconsino Lietuvių Dienoje, choras giedojo koncertines Mišias lotyniškai. Chicagoj choras dainavo Dainų Šventėje. Taigi jis išdirbo Šv. Baltramiejaus parapijoje, Waukegan, Ill., 8 metus, o Chicagoje, Šv. Mykolo parapijoje 42 metus, arba iš viso 50 metų. Dabar N. Kulys, sulaukęs 80 metų, vėl gyvena Chicagoje.






