

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
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THE MANY MYSTERIES OF CHRISTMAS

In every Mass after the most sacred moment when the bread and wine have been changed into the Precious Body and Blood of Christ, the celebrant invites the worshippers to proclaim "the mystery of faith" to which they respond CHRIST HAS DIED. CHRIST IS RISEN. CHRIST WILL COME AGAIN. But this is not the only mystery of our faith. There are many others. Christmas is one of them.

THE WORD

The word itself CHRISTMAS (and even KALEDOS in Lithuanian) presents us with a kind of mystery, since it says nothing specifically about the birth of Christ that it is supposed to signify. Check your dictionary: CHRISTMAS - (Middle English Christemasse, Old English Christes Maesse) literally, Christ's Mass. Christ's Mass is not Christ's Birth.

Or take the Lithuanian word KALĖDOS. Consultation of the 1972 edition of the "Present Day Dictionary of the Lithuanian Language" reveals that Kalėdos comes from the word "kalėda" - "a gift bestowed upon servants of the church around Christmas time; a year end bonus given servants".

It is puzzling, therefore, not to find any reference to the birth of Christ in the word designating the birthday of the Lord.

THE FACT

The fact of the birth of Jesus to Mary, a virgin from Nazareth, is a major mystery of our Catholic faith: first, because this child was BORN OF A VIRGIN, which had never happened before in the entire history of the human race; second, because Mary's Son was "the only Son of God, eternally

begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, one in Being with the Father", as we confess in our Profession of Faith.

THE PURPOSE

The "why" of this unique birth is a deep mystery: why did God send his Son to become man, to suffer and die on a shameful cross? Theology enlightens us by teaching that the Incarnation of God's only Son took place to give glory to God by freeing all mankind from the grip of sin and teaching the way by which God and sinner can be reconciled. This answer points to a still deeper mystery, namely, that of God's love for us, his children.

CHRISTMAS AND CHRIST'S MASS

As we continue to probe the many mysteries of Christmas we come upon the question: what is the connection between the birth of Christ and Christ's Mass? Mass is the Eucharistic Sacrifice and refers to the death of Christ on the Cross, while Christmas refers to the birth of the Lord. This confusion of death and birth on Christmas Day is most mysterious.

We may say that the birth of Christ was the beginning of Christ's Sacrifice, His Mass. And we would be right. We must not limit Christ's Sacrifice only to the three hours on the Cross on Calvary. It is true to say that Christ's mankind redeeming action, his sacrifice, included his birth, his hidden life, his preaching and miracles, his loving and caring, his thirty three years on earth of praise, thanksgiving, atonement for sin (ours, not his) and prayer. So if we grasp this truth, we can better understand the rich meaning of Christmas. In a word there is a deep connection between the two words.

REMEMBRANCE OR PARTICIPATION?

Another question arises as we meditate: Is Christmas just a remembrance of the birth of Jesus,



or is it something more? To answer this question we must seek a clue in the Eucharistic Sacrifice. At the Last Supper, the first liturgy of the Mass, we recall that Christ commanded: "Do this in memory of me". He did not say "Remember this". He said "Do this". In other words, his command was to participate in and share in his action of the Mass. Similarly, the mystery of Christmas, of the Incarnation, is more than a remembrance of Christ's birth; it is a sharing in his life. At Bethlehem Christ began a new life: already possessing a divine life, he assumed a human life style. Christmas reminds us that it is God's Will that we, too, adopt a new life style: already possessing a human life, we are invited to adopt a divine life style by following the teachings of Christ and using the means, the sacraments, he gave us to share and grow in the divine life, and develop within ourselves the gifts of faith and hope and love through service to God and neighbor.

"CITIZENS OF HEAV'N ABOVE"

One last mystery of Christmas is suggested by the quotation above from the Christmas carol. If we think deeply, we can see a connection with ourselves, as Knights of Lithuania. Our motto DIEVUI IR TEVYNEI seems to divide what should be kept united. Our dedication FOR GOD is clear enough; our service FOR COUNTRY really includes two goals: to the land of our birth and to the land of our heritage, Lithuania. The mysterious point is this: TEVYI EI also includes a Christmas related truth, namely, that we are citizens of "Heav'n above", that Heaven is our true TEVYNE. It takes Christmas to remind us that Christ came down from Heaven, that he came to make us citizens of Heaven through Baptism, that he came to show us the way to our true country, the Kingdom of God. And by sharing with us his divine life, the God-Man makes it truly possible for us to live a life style that is human - divine.

KALĖDŲ PRASMĖ

"Suledėjusiomis lūpomis, ašarotomis akimis, nevilties iškankinti puolame prie Tavo prakartėlės, Šventasis Kūdikėli!"

NUO KALENDŲ IKI KALĖDŲ

Kalėdų vardas yra kilęs iš romėnų "Kalendae". Kalendos reiškė pirmąją mėnesio dieną, kada viešam susirinkime kunigai skelbdavo ("calare" — skelbti, šaukti) įsimintinas mėnesio dienas. Ypačiai buvo svarbios sausio kalendos, kuriomis prasidėdavo naujieji metai ir kada buvo skelbiamos svarbesniosios metų datos. Iš čia ir "kalendoriaus" pavadinimas.

Kristaus gimimas maždaug sutapo su naujųjų metų kalendomis. Kalėdoms ir visam mūsų kalendoriui jis davė naują, krikščionišką prasmę.

KUKLIOJI KALĖDU DIDYBĖ

Dievžmogio gimimas yra didžiausias mūsų istorijos įvykis. Jį supa kuklumo didybė, taip visada būdinga Dievui ir Jo darbams.

Visagalis beribių pasaulių Tvėrėjas gimė mažas, bejėgis kūdikis. Tas, kurio yra visi žemės gelmių turtai, kurio yra žvaigždės ir planetos, gimė šaltoj urvinėj oloj. Kristus paniekimo visa, ką pasaulis brangina: prabangą ir patogumus, garbes ir karalystes, dėl kurių vyksta peštynės, karai ir revoliucijos.

Kalėdos mums neša Kristų, kuris nuo Betlėjaus iki Golgotos kelia šviesųjį dvasios primatą prieš tamsią medžiagos naktį. Medžiagoje smygstantiems Rytams ir Vakarams meta Kristus dar niekada negirdėtą liudijimą:

 Palaiminti vargdieniai, bejėgiai, bevardžiai!

— Dalingi, kurie alksta ir trokšta ir verkia!

- Palaiminti nuolankūs, taikingi, gailestingi!

Taip, pavydėtini, nes jiems pri-

klauso ateitis: "Nes jie paveldės žemę" ir "jų yra dangaus karalystė"!

Kalėdos mums padeda suprasti Dievą, kuris iš nieko sutvėrė pasaulį ir neša jį savo apvaizdos delne, bet su tokiu betlėjišku kuklumu, lyg kad Jo visai nebūtų, arba lyg kad Jis neturėtų balso istorijos parlamentuose. Ir todėl pasaulis gyvena ir tvarkosi "be Dievo"; be Jo vardo savo konstitucijose ir savo himnuose, nors tas Dievas judina kiekvieną atomą ir žvaigždes ir nerimu sargdina žmogaus širdį.

KALEDŲ VILTIS

Rytų ir Vakarų viltys šiandien dar yra tos pačios, kaip kitados nelaimingojo "tūkstantmečio reicho" kūrėjo: nauji ir vis baisesni ginklai. Su susirūpinimu visur sekamos ginklavimosi lenktynės, ir kiekvienas naujas ginklas atrodo kaip žingsnis į saugesnį rytojų.

Rytai ir Vakarai nežino kaip džiaugtis, kai ginklavimosi svarstyklės nusvyra jų naudai. Bet koks nusiminimas ir sąmyšis, kai priešui pavyksta išrasti mirštamesnį sprogmenį ir toliau nušauti juo užtaisytą sviedinį!

Kalėdos teprimena mums dvasios ir Dievo pirmumą. Juo mažiau mes galime pasitikėti savim ir kitais, juo daugiau galime ir turime kliautis Dievu. Juk Dievas daug geriau už mus supranta laisvės kainą, nes Jis yra beribė laisvė ir visiška nepriklausomybė.

Kristus gimė mums, kad mes galėtume tapti Dievo vaikais. Jis nenori būti vergų Viešpats, bet laisvų, laimingų vaikų Tėvas. Kaip motina labiau myli ir akių nenuleidžia nuo sergančio kūdikio, taip Dievas stebi mūsų pažeminimą, persekiojimą, skriaudžiamą tautą.

Dievas sutvėrė mus laisvus ir gerbia mūsų laisvę iki visiško, dieviško nuoseklumo. Jis nesikiša, kolei mes pagalbos ieškome visur kitur, tik ne Jame. Kolei mes savo viltį dedame tik į mūsų pačių ir mūsų draugų ginklus, tolei Dievas laukia.

Kalėdos skelbia taiką ir ramybę geros valios žmonėms.

Rūpinkimės, kad Kristus gimtų ir viešpatautų mūsų širdyse ir kad visa mūsų tauta vis labiau artėtų į Jį savo kančios ir kryžiaus keliu.

Kalėdų Kristus yra mūsų didžioji viltis, į kurią suduš visos priešų gudrybės ir įmantriausieji ginklai. Būkime tikri, jeigu Dievas norės, niekuomet iš tų ginklų nebus iššauta. Rytoj tie ginklai gali nukrypti prieš juos pačius ir niekais paversti visą jų galijotišką didybę.

Magdalena rubbed her eyes with stubby fingers that had grown crooked after 81 years of tedious work. The tears that rolled down her cheeks were not from weeping. She did not weep easily. It was merely eye-watering of the aged that plagued her everyday life. She picked at the wispy strands of white hair that crept out of her woolen scarf.

How very cold it is, she thought.

She sat huddled on a built-in corner bench next to her hearth. For warmth, she was fully dressed in her heaviest woolens. Although it was mid-afternoon, she had already had to light a candle to keep from stumbling into things. The windows of her cottage were completely covered with snow and frost. It gave the interior a sense of constant twilight. She missed looking out at her little garden and

watching the flutter of the few winter birds that lived there.

It was the day of Kūčios and, in Lithuania, this day - the day before Christmas - was family day.

Magdalena had no family.

Many years ago, she had had two sons. One had gone off to the wars and had been killed at the age of 17. The other had been deported to Siberia thirty years ago and had seemingly vanished. Stasys, her husband, had died in January. This would be her first Christmas alone.

She had never had much. She had never asked for much. On this day she still had six chickens, one rooster, and one cow.

Some of her neighbors brought their animals into their homes when the weather became too severe but Magdalena did not. She was quite strong for her age. She did not mind the frequent trips to the animal shed where the chickens lived happily with the cow. It gave her something to do.

Occasionally, during the winter months, a neighbor would drop by and leave her some flour and perhaps some fish. In exchange for her weavings, she was able to provide herself with oil for her lamp and a few other necessities. These she bartered from the peddler who visited her once a month.

Every Friday morning, the village priest brought communion to her and then he stayed for a bowl of soup. She looked forward to these visits with great anticipation because he brought the news of the village with him. He also told

Oh, how very cold it is, she repeated to herself. Perhaps it would be best to get between her feather covers and forget all about Kūčios.

On her fingers, she counted the foods she would eat to be sure there were twelve. She still had a few bottles of currant wine that Stasys had made about five years ago. She wondered if she should indulge in a little glass of wine with her supper. I must be very careful, she thought. The wine may put me to sleep for too long. If the fire goes out, the cottage can get dangerously cold.

She stared at the fire and watched the orange and blue flames. The wood had been a little damp from lying in the snow so it crackled more than usual. Each crackle produced little, curly puffs of black smoke that would then rise quickly up the chimney.

When she was a little girl, her old grandmother had told her that, when a person died, their soul found its way to heaven by rising up the chimney with the smoke. In those days there had been plenty of family. Her old grandmother had died in the arms of Magdalena's mother. She had never been lonely. Now they are all gone. All gone up the chimney with the smoke, thought Magdalena. If I should die right now, my soul would go to heaven very quickly. The cold air outside draws the



smoke up the chimney faster than a wet herring slipping through the fingers.

The little curls of smoke reminded her of a cousin that lived many miles away. Too far away for visits for Kūčios. Her cousin, Paulina, had dark curly hair - little ringlets - that covered her head like a halo. She had been born to Magdalena's youngest aunt when Magdalena was 15. On a windy day, little puffs of curly hair would rise from Paulina's head and stand up in the air.

At this very moment a noise startled her out of her remembrances. That must be someone knocking! But who would come on such a cold day!

She struggled out of her bench and plodded to the door. She could see nothing through the thick frost on the pane. She unlatched the heavy chains and opened the door a few inches. A small black dog sat shivering on the porch. The large, dark eyes peered into the warmth of the cottage.

"You are most welcome to come into my home", said Magdalena. She bowed and waved her arm with a flourish as if she were greeting the Bishop himself. The little dog crept inside.

Magdalena had not had any company since Friday, four days ago. She talked to the dog as if it were a person.

"Let me light my lamp", she said. "How happy I am that you came to visit me. Here is an old woolen petticoat that you can lie on by the fire".

The dog seemed to understand every word. Magdalena put out a bowl of water and a finger's length of sausage. The dog ate and drank quietly.

Magdalena settled herself on her bench by the hearth and studied the dog. It was evident the dog was well-cared for and a female.

"Where did you come from, little lady?" she asked. "You do not belong to anyone in our village or Father would have told me about you".

lena as if she were listening to her conversation. She scratched at the back of her head lazily with a furry paw. Then she gave her head a good shake. Little ringlets of curls stood around her face like a halo.

How strange, thought Magdalena. She had been thinking of another female with curly ringlets just a little while ago.

"You remind me of my cousin, Paulina", she said out loud.

At this remark, the dog gave out a little yip.

"Is your name Paulina?" asked Magdalena in surprise.

Again, the dog yipped.

Magdalena felt her heart begin to beat more rapidly. Her hands began to shake. She felt frightened. She had been thinking of her old grandmother and her ancient tales of the Lithuanian people. One of these claimed that, when a person died, their soul went into the body of something else. Perhaps a tree or a bird or a dog!

Could it really be possible? Had Paulina died and become this dog? Had she come to visit her on Kū-čios because she was the only relative she had?

Oh no! This was wrong! She must not think of such foolish, pagan things. She decided to sing some hymns to get the wicked notions out of her head.

At the sound of the soft singing, the little dog stretched out and closed her eyes contentedly.

As she sang, Magdalena remembered a time long ago when she had sung to a tiny cousin. During visits to her aunt's home, her mother had said, "Let Magdalena hold Paulina. Her lovely singing will put her to sleep quickly and then we can talk undisturbed". Paulina had been small but she had large, beautiful eyes. The dog had large, beautiful eyes also.

Surely, the little dog was lost. She had probably been shunned by the other villagers because they

had dogs of their own.

The floor was very cold. Would it be wrong to set another chair up to the table for the dog? Her eyes began to water again. Had she become so lonesome she would consider eating Kūčios with a dog sitting at the table?

I must be going mad, she thought. Perhaps I had better go out and milk the cow and feed the chickens and bed them all down for the night. The cold air will bring me back to my senses.

The little dog trotted with her to the animal shed.

At sight of the dog, the cow stood motionless. The chickens squawked up to the rafters. The big rooster raised his wings and slowly paced around the little dog.

"Good girl, Paulina", said Magdalena unconsciously. The little dog sat down and watched quietly. The big rooster backed off and began pecking at the grains Magdalena threw on the dirt floor. The chickens followed his example. As if by request, the cow gave an extra pail of milk.

On the way back to the house, Magdalena stopped and breathed deeply. The air was crisp and bright. The sun was already sinking behind the trees. Magdalena was very hungry. As was the custom, she had fasted all day - this day before Christmas. Kūčios, the ancient ritual feast, could begin as soon as the evening star, Vakarinė, appeared in the eastern sky.

Magdalena searched the sky in vain. It was still too early. She turned at the sound of sleigh bells at her gate. A large man stepped out of the sleigh and rushed toward her with long legs swinging burriedly.

The little dog raced toward the man.

"Come back here, Paulina", shouted Magdalena.

The little dog stopped between the two of them and wagged her tail.



The man looked at Magdalena in amazement.

"Good evening, Senele", said the man softly. He removed his cap and revealed a mass of white hair. "I am a traveler on the road to Vilnius. My little dog escaped this morning from the Inn. I have been searching everywhere for her. I hope she has not caused you any trouble".

"Ah, but it is Kūčios", he said.
"It has been many years since I celebrated the Christmas days in their proper manner".

Magdalena looked closely at the man. Under his heavy coat, a thin body had been hidden. He did not look like a Soviet trooper. Should she take the chance?

"Old one, I am very puzzled", he said. "It did sound to me like you called my dog 'Paulina'. How could this be? How could you know the name of my dog? I have heard of the strange powers of the Senelės in Lithuania but this seems unbelievable".

"Kind sir, I am just as puzzled as you. It seemed to me you also called the dog 'Paulina'. It would ease my heart to know how she came by this name".

"That is a long tale, good grandmother", he answered. He gazed deeply into her light blue watery eyes. The strain of looking had started the tears rolling again.

"Let me begin by saying that I have just been released from a long sentence in the cold country. I would not harm even the tip of one of your fingers. My dear mother

and father are now dead. I am on the way to friends who will help me start again". He looked around the room carefully.

"On the train coming back to Lithuania, I sat with another returning prisoner. He was showing me a few photographs he had managed to save. One of them was of a lovely lady. The name 'Paulina' was still visible under the picture. At this moment the train stopped. As we got off, this little dog began following us. Somehow the dark curls reminded us of the lady in the picture. We laughingly named the dog 'Paulina'."

O holy Mother, thought Magdalena. The dog was not the soul of her cousin but had come by the name rightfully. If her cousin had died, she would have known it. Even though they lived far apart, they were very close to each other. But what about the picture? Who but her own son would be carrying a picture of her unique cousin

Paulina!

"We have traveled many days together. This little dog has been our passport to many good meals and beds by kind people like yourself. Some even gave us money. My companion developed a severe cold. He became feverish last night. I managed to get him to the Inn. At this moment, he is sleeping

from some medicine given to him by your kind village priest. He was most anxious to spend Christmas with his parents if they are still alive. He spent his time in a distant camp where no communication was allowed".



Your horse and sleigh are a blessing to me. After church, we will go to the Inn and take care of your companion. I am wellacquainted with the priest's medicine. Your friend will sleep heavily tonight. In a few days he will be much better. If I am right, his journey has ended". She bowed her head and rubbed

She bowed her head and rubbed her eyes with work-worn fingers. This time the tears were real.

"It is indeed a joyful, wondrous night", she cried.



For many years, it was the custom for Lithuanians, who thought very highly of their pets and domestic animals, to name them after saints or favorite relatives or friends. The thought was, "If you love your animal and name it after me, then you must love me also".

THE CHRONICLE LOOKS AT

Advent is the time when we prepare ourselves properly for the coming of Christmas, the feast of the birth of Our Lord. The word Advent means "coming" — the coming of the child Jesus in Bethlehem almost 2,000 years ago. But in a greater sense, the liturgy of the church refers to the Second Coming of the Lord at the end of the world, and even more personally, the Lord's coming into our hearts and lives by divine grace.

There are many lovely Advent and Christmas customs which are part of Lithuanian tradition. Many of these have been incorporated into our own observances of the holy seasons of Advent and Christmas. It is a sad truth, however, that believers in Lithuania are subject to harassment when they attempt to participate in the Liturgical calendar, or observe the customs of Christmas. Perhaps nothing can speak more eloquently of the situation in Lithuania today than these abstracts from the CHRONICLE OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LITHUANIA, which report some of the events surrounding the attempt to honor in public the joyous season of Christmas.

Near the end of Advent, the Church prays before the gospel:

Allelulia,
Come,
Key of David,
opening the gates of God's eternal kingdom:
free the prisoners of darkness.


In biblical days, as in the Lithuanian household of old, the person who kept the keys had authority. The antiphon asks Christ to come and unlock the doors for captive mankind, sitting in religious darkness, and in the shadow of death.

CHRONICLE No. 5, published in 1973, reports that in the Diocese of Panevėžys, Vice Chairman Stapulionis of the Regional Executive Committee of Pasvalys, visited Saločiai in December of 1972. The pastor of the church was not at home, so Stapulionis made himself "master" of the church and began removing announcements of the season of Advent from bulletin board.

Rev. Balaišis, the pastor, was later scolded for allegedly frightening the people by predicting that the world would end at the conclusion of this century. The stolen notice contained a statement that the Second Coming of Christ would occur at the end of time.

Stapulionis also ordered Father Balaišis to stop escorting funerals to the cemetery.





Dec. 24, Christmas Eve, is the traditional time for the celebration of KŪČIOS. It is a family observance, when members of the family travel great distances to be together in celebration, to share in the breaking of the PLOTKELE, or blessed wafer, and to remember the dead. The Christmas Eve meal in the past was traditionally followed by Midnight Mass.

The Church reminds us that this is a day of joyful anticipation, and that Advent will soon be fulfilled. In the opening prayer for the Mass of Christmas Eve,

we pray:

Come Lord Jesus do not delay;

give new courage to people who trust in your love.

By your coming, raise us to the joy of your kingdom.

A report from Varena in CHRONICLE No. 15, written in 1975, told of a situation which occurred in the second high school before Christmas in 1974. A teacher at the school, Mrs. Jankauskienė, told the students, "Don't you dare take part in the solemn meal on Christmas Eve (KŪČIOS). We will find out. Anyone who dares to eat the blessed wafer (PLOT-KELE) will have his conduct mark lowered".

At the parents' meeting, Mrs. Jotautienė, also a teacher, spoke: "Don't you dare celebrate KŪČIOS with your children. They don't benefit from it, because they do not understand anything about it anyway".

The people of Varena ask: "Is it a crime to observe religious traditions, when the Constitution (Note: the Soviet Constitution) guarantees freedom of conscience?"

The Church celebrates the feast of the Holy Innocents on December 28, recalling the martyrdom of the infants in the Bethlehem area at the time of the birth of Christ, as an attempt by King Herod the Great to remove a threat to his throne.


A common thread running through the CHRONI-CLE reveals so often that children are the targets of the campaign against God by atheist teachers and officials.

On the feast of the Holy Innocents, we pray over the gifts:

Lord,
you give us your life even before we
understand.
Receive the offerings we bring in love

Receive the offerings we bring in love, And free us from sin.

Another report from the CHRONICLE, No. 15, tells of how the boarding girls of Šilalė High School decorated their room on Dec. 23, 1974. A teacher, Mrs. Auškalnienė, tore everything down, called the girls dreamers, and for a punishment, forbade them to attend the carnival of the New Year tree. The crime — a room decorated for Christmas!



From CHRONICLE No. 22, dated Apr. 18, 1976, comes a similar report of harassment. On Christmas Day, a regular school day in Lithuania, some girls of Class 10 brought a Christmas tree to school, decorated it, and wrote "Merry Christmas!" on the blackboard. The result was threats, rebukes, and mockery over a period of days.

The parents of the pupils consider this a violation

of the Helsinki Final Act.

The opening prayer from the Mass for the fifth day in the octave of Christmas reminds us of the meaning of the newly-born Child to the world and for ourselves. We pray:

> All powerful and unseen God, the coming of your light into our world has made the darkness vanish. Teach us to proclaim the birth of your Son Jesus Christ.

Even the simplest form of spreading the Good News of Christ at Christmas is denied in Lithuania. CHRONICLE 23 reports that just before Christmas, in 1975, Montvila, a news dealer, was discharged for selling a few photo-copied Christmas cards.

The first reading for the Mass on December 31, the last day of the calendar year, is taken from the first letter of John:

Children, it is the final hour; just as you heard that the Antichrist was coming, so now many such antichrists have appeared.

It was from our ranks that they took our leave not that they really belonged to us;
for if they had belonged to us,
they would have stayed with us.
It only served to show that none of them was
ours.


But you have the anointing that comes from the Holy One, so that all knowledge is yours.

My reason for having written you is not that you do not know the truth but that you do, and that no lie has anything in common with the truth.

During this holy season, let us pray that the truth of Christ will remain in the hearts of the people of Lithuania. Let us pray that the warning of St. John against false teachers will be kept alive in the spirits of the brave children of Lithuania, their parents and their priests. Let us pray that the words of Isaiah the prophet will be true for all men:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light;

On those who lived in the shadow of death, light has shone.



A recent issue of CURRENT HISTORY, a world affairs monthly, featured an article entitled "The British National Health Service in International Perspective" by JOSEPH G. SIMANIS. Mr. Simanis, an economist with the Office of Research and Statistics of the Social Security Administration, is the Lithuanian Affairs Chairman for Washington DC's Council 142. He has authored and co-authored a number of studies on Comparative Health programs here and abroad. He specializes in international health comparisons and social welfare in the Communist countries. He served with the State Department as an economist in diplomatic posts and at the office of the President's Special Representative for Trade Negotiations.



The Fourth Annual Scandinavian-American Festival sponsored by the Scandinavian-American Community of the New Jersey-New York metropolitan area took place this past September at the Garden State Arts Center in New Jersey attracting an audience of some 6000 persons. To all Ritual Chairpersons, Councils and Districts Inclusive:

To the newer councils we would like to encourage you to start now, if you haven't already, to keep records of your member's activities. Don't fall into the trap some of the older councils have... lost minute books, lost committee records, etc. Keeping records saves time in filing for the various degrees, also, a member's work is not lost by forgetfulness.

When listing meeting attendance under the Point System, show the dates of meetings attended.

When filing applications for degrees to be presented for a special occasion, please, mail the applications in plenty of time for the papers to be processed. When filing for a Fourth Degree Candidate the council Ritual Chairperson must send the application into the Supreme Ritual Committee by JULY 15TH. This deadline enables the Supreme Ritual Committee to process the application, notify the council Ritual Chairperson in time for the National Convention. This deadline also gives the Supreme Ritual Committee time to order medals and close out the books for their Convention Report. YOUR cooperation in meeting the deadlines is most important. You can avoid having your council member upset with you if they are turned down because you submitted his or her application too late to be processed.

Keep copies of all your applications. The Supreme Ritual Committee keeps all applications mailed them for their files. None are returned unless you send duplications and request the applications to be returned.

If you have any suggestions about the Point System, please, let us know NOW. We will be working on the Point System for presentation at the National Convention in Syracuse. Ideas must be

mailed NOW in order to give the Supreme Ritual Committee time to work out your opinions.

Please keep our committee's goal in mind — that is, upgrading the Ritual process of the Knights of Lithuania.



At its meeting on October 22, 1977, the Supreme Council approved the following schedule and procedure for the selection of a candidate for the 1978 FATHER JOHN C. JUTT FRIEND OF LITHUANIA AWARD. The schedule has been prepared to allow for greater input from all levels of membership, and to provide the Supreme Council with concise information to aid the decision making process. Copies of this information will be forwarded to all Councils, and will appear in the Lithuanian Affairs Bulletin.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR NOMINATION

The Award may be made to any individual not of Lithuanian ancestry, such as an elected official, writer, member of the clergy or religious life, etc., who has performed outstanding service for the cause of Lithuania.

Primary consideration will be given to actions taken during the calendar year of 1977. Secondary consideration will be given to earlier actions and over-all record. Nominations will be made to the National Lithuanian Affairs Committee for submission to the Supreme Council by any Council, District or individual member. Final decisions on the nomination will be made by the Supreme Council.

- February 1 Cut off dates for nomination to the District.
- March 1 Cut off date for nominations to the Supreme Council.
- June 1 Final decision by Supreme Council to be announced.

KALĖDOS AMERIKOJE

Kalėdos pirmą kartą Naujame Pasaulyje buvo atšvęstos 1492 m., gruodžio 24 d., kai Kristupas Kolumbas su dviem laivais, Santa Marija ir Nina, pasiekė rytinį Ispaniolos salos krantą, dabar vadinamą Haiti. Pačiame Amerikos žemyne Kalėdos pirmą kartą buvo atšvęstos 1604 m., kai prancūzų jūrininkai atplaukė į St. Croix, dabartinėje Maine valstybėje. Vokiečiai pirmąsias Kalėdas Amerikoje, atrodo, šventė 1741 m., kai moravų kolonija vadovaujant grafui Mikalojui von Zinzendorf pasiekė dabartinio Bethlehem, Pennsylvanijoje apylinkes. Lietuviai pirmąsias Kalėdas Amerkoje šventė tada, kai jie čia atvyko, o jie čia pradėjo atvykti apie 1795 m. Bostono gyventojai, atrodo, pirmieji švęsdami Kalėdas pradėjo statyti languose uždegtas žvakes ir giedoti kalėdines giesmes gatvėse. Daugelyje pietinių valstybių šaudymo paprotys (fireworks) yra įvestas prancūzų, italų ir ispanų. Kalėdų eglutė yra vokiečių kilmės, Kalėdų Senelis, "Santa Claus", atėjęs iš Niederlandų — Belgijos ir Olandijos, kur jis vadinamas šv. Mikalojum. Kalėdiniai atvirukai šįame krašte pirmą kartą išspausdinti Londono firmos 1870 m.
