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HE SISEN SHRIST CONQUEROR OF DOUBT

The title above may sound strange at first glance.


We have been accustomed at Easter time to think of the Risen Lord as conqueror of sin and as victor over death: by His death and resurrection Jesus Christ, Son of God, ransomed us from sin and reconciled us with the Father; by His resurrection from the tomb Christ showed that rising from the dead to a new life is a reality. It was so for Him; it is meant, also, for us, His followers.

For your spiritual enrichment this Easter I am proposing that we think of our Savior as Conqueror of Doubt.

My reason for choosing this theme comes from the fact that we, Catholics, are now living in a period of ever growing doubts about ourselves, our Church and even about Christ, Himself. We are perplexed by many statements and teachings of some modern Christian writers, both Catholic and Protestant, who are outrightly proposing or more often, indirectly hinting, for instance, that abortion is not murder, that active euthanasia is "death with dignity", that Jesus Christ is not ever present in the Eucharist, that Mary, His Mother, was not a virgin before, during and after the birth of her Son, that the age-old, traditional teaching of the Church that the proper use of sex is restricted to those who are married, is outmoded. Many other items could be added to this list. The frightening conclusion is this: We ARE living in a time of rising doubts concerning some of the most basic truths of our Faith.

What is the antidote to these poisonous doubts that surround us?

The answer is obvious: Faith in Christ, the Conqueror of Doubt. A simple, sincere, firm belief in the Lord - Jesus - who-rose-from-the-



dead is the remedy for each and every doubt that can arise within us. If we believe in the Resurrection: "On the third day He rose again in fulfillment of the Scriptures", as we proclaim at every Sunday Mass we attend, we accept Christ as Destroyer of Doubts concerning His revelation and teachings.

Lest a misunderstanding arise, let me point out that merely accepting the historical fact that Christ arose from the dead on the third day after His Crucifixion is not the same as BELIEVING in the Resurrection of the Lord. Accepting historical facts is not the Faith I am talking about.

When we believe in the Resurrection, we are not accepting historical facts, rather, we are accepting a mystery revealed by God, solely on the Word of God, only because "God says so". This is the basis of our Faith: God... speaking, instructing, commanding, encouraging those who accept Him, at His Word.

What gives certainty to our faith is the truth that God is All - wise, All - knowing, who is not deceived in Himself and cannot deceive those to whom He reveals Himself. If we truly believe in such a Person, we cannot be overcome by doubts. Doubts may arise, but we will not be swayed by them. There is no stronger motive for accepting the difficult and mysterious, Godgiven truths, than "God said so" or "Christ said so", therefore, I believe.

Returning now to our main theme, to Christ the Conqueror of Doubt, we see that the Resurrection was surrounded not only with historical certitudes, but more importantly, with divine certitudes. The miracle of His Resurrection makes Christ BELIEV-ABLE in everything He taught and said. After all, He was the Son of God.

The example of Thomas the Doubter shows us one victory over doubt. The Apostle who would not believe that the Master was alive after His execution on Calvary, even though other Disciples had seen Him, quickly lost all his doubts, when he touched the hands and the wounded side of the Lord. All Thomas could say was "My Lord and my God" and he was no longer a "doubter".

Our method of dispelling doubts that may arise concerning our Holy Catholic Faith should be the same: an act of Faith in Christ as Lord and God. Only after doing this, it will be easier to resist the enticing ideas of those who are trying to weaken our Faith by leading us to doubt the Words of Christ, or the teachings of His Church.

At all times we must be alert and not allow ourselves to follow the so called "experts", whose books and writings are not in agreement with the teachings of the Holy Father and the Bishops in union with him. We must keep in mind that no priest, no bishop, no theologian, speaking on his own, has the right to teach in the name of Christ. This right and privilege was granted by Christ first to Peter and the Apostles and then to their successors, the Popes and Bishops in union with him.

If ever we slip into a doubting mood (and it is easy to slip these days), we will be wise, if we look only to the Holy Father for sure guidance out of our doubts. Why? Because Christ, Conqueror of Doubt, promised that the gates of Hell shall not prevail against His Church - which means that the Holy Father, Supreme Teacher of the Church, will never lead the faithful astray.

I hope that these new insights into the mystery of the Resurrection of Christ will strengthen your faith as you generously dedicate yourselves to service "Dievui ir Tevynei". May your faith in Christ, Victorious over sin, death and doubt be stronger than ever this Easter.

KAZYS ŠIPAILA VYTIS BENEFACTOR

Ten years ago, the Knights of Lithuania enjoyed a "windfall" when, to celebrate his own Golden Jubilee Birthday, KAZYS SIPAILA of C-29, Newark, N.J., sponsored an entire issue of the VYTIS. Now, as he prepares to celebrate his 60th birthday on March 27, 1978, Kazys has chosen the same form of celebration, by again sponsoring an issue of VYTIS, namely this one.

Kazys Sipaila was born in the county of Šakiai, the village of Matuliai, Lithuania, on March 27, 1918, at the dawn of Lithuanian Independence. He was forced to flee to Germany when the Soviets occupied his Homeland. Mother's Day, 1950, Kazys arrived in the USA, settled in New Jersey, and immediately, became active in various aspects of New Jersey's Lithuanian life. He joined the Knights of Lithuania, Newark's Council 29, in 1953, and has been active in Council and District affairs and a regular supporter of National activities ever since. In 1963, C-29 elected Kazys its president, and he has held that office ever since. His service was acknowledged by the National the Knights of Lithuania. He was the financial sponsor of "AWAK-ENING LITHUANIA", a book by Dr. Jack Stukas, and thus again assisted in advertising Lithuania's

organization when he was awarded the 4th Degree during the K of L National Convention in Chicago in 1964.

As Council President, the quiet, soft-spoken Kazys proved that actions, not words, make for effective leadership. Through a policy of "gentle persuasion" he has managed to accomplish much during his term of office. Under his leadership, the council has grown to well over 100 members, and this year reorganized its Junior Council as well. Kazys led the council in numerous successful commemorations, dinner-dances, concerts, testimonials. In 1975, he himself was feted by C-29 at a testimonial in his honor.

Serving also as an active member of the Holy Trinity Parish Council, Kazys has convinced the rest of his K of L Council members that support of the church should be tops on a K of L council's list of activities. He served on the committee which erected a Lithuanian Cross on the grounds of Holy Trinity in Newark, and encouraged the K of L to provide several other improvements for the Church. Thanks to Kazys, the K of L has continued to be in the forefront of planning and support of most major parish functions.

Kazys Sipaila's contributions to Lithuanianism extend well beyond



history and current plight. Kazys serves on the New Jersey Lithuanian American Council and is an officer in the St. George Lithuanian Citizens' Club of Newark. He is also active in Bendruomenė, the Lithuanian American Community Assoc.

Privately, Kazys Sipaila lives comfortably in his own home in Hillside, New Jersey, and works as a Die Caster at Springfield Die Casting Co. of New Jersey. In his spare time, he enjoys reading and keeping up with Lithuanian and American News. He also dabbles in a favorite hobby - weaving Lithuanian patterns into ties, juostos, and Lithuanian costume material. He has also begun teaching some of his council members the art of making juostos. Perhaps someday, Kazys will provide a demonstration at a National Convention.

When Kazys left his beloved Lithuania, he vowed to remain true to assisting in her quest for freedom. He has certainly kept his word! Happy Birthday, Kazys and AD MULTOS ANNOS.









VELYKOS

PRISIKĖLIMO ŠVENČIŲ PAPROČIAI

Seniau džiaugsmingai ruošdavosi lietuvis Prisikėlimo šventei - Velykoms. Jau Didįjį Ketvirtadienį apvalydavo savo mylimus žirgus, kad šie visus metus sveiki ir gražūs būtų; vandeniu perpildavo ir kitus gyvulius. Paskutines Didžiosios Savaitės dienas visi triūsdavo apie savo namus.

Didžiojo Šeštadienio rytą kas tik galėdavo išeidavo į bažnytėlę šventosios ugnelės ir pašventinto vandens parsinešti. Šventąją ugnelę įžiebdavo savo namų židinyje, su ja dar apeidavo savo laukus, pašlakstydami šventu vandeniu ėžias, Dievulio palaimos savo laukams ir derliui melsdami.

Suaugusieji Didžiojo Šeštadienio vakarą išeidavo į bažnyčią ir ten pasilikdavo per visą naktį melsdamiesi ir giedodami giesmes. Daug

kur ta nakti bažnyčiose buvo rengiami Kristaus Kančios vaidinimai. Taip pat visose Lietuvos bažnyčiose prie eglėse paskendusio Kristaus karsto klūpodavo jaunos mergaitės ir vyrai - karsto sargai, apsirengę senosios Lietuvos karius primenančiais drabužiais. Paskutiniais laisvės metais buvo įprasta, jog Kristaus Karsta saugodavo kariai arba šauliai.

Po pusiaunakčio, kai visur pasidarydavo nuostabiai tylu, staiga pradėdavo mušti būgnus. Tai buvo šio nepaprasto ryto pirmieji ženklai, jog dar namuose likę suaugusieji ir vaikai skubėtų į didžiąją šventę. Tie būgnai gausdavo ir gausdavo vis garsiau ir dažniau. Su pirmaisiais ryto saulės spinduliais nuo būgnų trenksmo susiūbuodavo net visas oras. Jiems pritardavo

nuostabiu gaudimu varpai, lydimi sutartinos giesmės ir iškilmingos procesijos. Tuo metu visam pasauliui Lietuvos bažnytėlės skelbė didįjį pasaulio stebuklą - mirusio Kristaus Prisikėlimą. "Linksma diena mums prašvito" - skambėjo būgnų ir varpų džiaugsmingame gausme ir sklisdavo laisvais pavasario laukais ir miškais.

Po pamaldų visais keliais ir takeliais pasipildavo į namus linksmi žmonės, vienas kitą lenkdami ir Prisikėlimo džiaugsmu dalindamiesi. Net susipykę kaimynai šį rytą iššokdavo iš savo ratų ir vienas kitam palinkėdavo džiaugsmo, pamiršdami buvusius susikirtimus ir nesusipratimus.

Namuose visa šeima susėsdavo prie švenčių stalo ir vienas kitam linkėdami džiaugsmo ir laimės dauždavo margučius. U margučiai buvo tikrai nuostabiai margi. Moterys ir vaikai, senimas ir jaunimas, visą savaitę juos dažė ir margino, kad tik nauju raštu pralenktų savo kaimynus ir saviškius. Ir dabar šiais raštuotais margučiais džiaugėsi visi prie stalo ir pievelėje juos ritinėdami ir mušdami.

Jaunimas per Velykas taip pat nerimdavo: supildavo vienas kita vandeniu, nes šios dienos vanduc kiekvienam sveikata ir laimę nešė. Taip pat jaunimas, o kartais ir senieji, supuoklėmis supdavosi.

Antrąją Velykų dieną lankydavo savo kaimynus sveikindami Velykų giesme ir lalavimais. Vakare jaunimas linksmindavosi. Ir kaip gi nesilinksmint - Velykos - Kristaus Prisikėlimo ir Pavasario šventė - koks nuostabus supuolimas - gamta prisikelia naujam gyvenimui. Tikimės - ateis nuostabi diena ir Lietuvai - ji prisikels numesdama rust jungą.

SIMAS KUDIRKA, whose leap to freedom, subsequent return to the Soviet Union and imprisonment captured the concern of Lithuanian Americans and others, prompting a massive effort to insure his return, has once again been placed in the eye of the Ameri an public. A special two hour broadcast, entitled 'The Defection of Simas Kudirka" was aired on CBS on January 23, 1978. The film, starring Alan Arkin as Kudirka, and Shirley Knight as his wife, was described by Kudirka as "Beautiful". Prior to the broadca t, a feature interview with Kudirka appeared in TV GUIDE. In the inverview, Kudirka reviewed the events which led up to his attempted defection, return, and ultimate arrival in the United States. A related story in the January 15 edition of the NEW YORK DAILY NEWS featured an interview with Alan Arkin who described his role as Kudirka as one which "put me through a wringer emotionally".

ANTON A. KALINSKE, Vice President of Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc., has been selected by the Water Pollution Control Federation's Board of Control to receive the Thomas R. Camp Medal for 1977. 

Lithuanian tenor MISHA RAITZIN was heard nationally on January 21 during the Texaco sponsored radio broadcast of the Metropolitan Opera's new production of Wagner's TANNHAUSER. Mr. Raitzen sang the role of Walther.

The Public Broadcasting System recently aired a TV special profile on the life and work of sculptor JACQUES LIPSCHITZ (1891 - 1973) showing him at work in his studio and reminiscing about his career, including his Lithuanian roots. Born to a Jewish family in Druskininkai, he began his education in Vilnius, later attending the Ecole des Beaux Arts and the Academie Junian in Paris. While studying, he joined the ESPRIT NOUVEAU group and was associated with the cubists. In 1924, he began to create transparents, using the lost wax technique, which gained him a reputation throughout the art world. He came to the United States during World War II. His work is exhibited in the Museum of Modern Art in New York City; the Barnes Foundation in Philadelphia, and other museums of note.

Famed father and son team, violinist IZIDORIUS VASYLIUNAS and pianist DR. VYTENIS VASY-LIUNAS have concluded their annual concert tour, including an appearance at New York's Carnegie Recital Hall on January 7, 1978. The program was reviewed by THE NEW YORK TIMES. The concert included works by Beethoven, Brahms and Banaitis. The latter's Sonata in Dm (1934) was particularly well received.

Lithuania's most prestigious musical ensemble, the Vilnius Philharmonic String Orchestra, and its conductor SAULIUS SONDECKIS, recently concluded a tour of Western Europe and Austria. The concert tour included some 24 performances, all meeting with public and critical acclaim. The repertoire included works by M. K. Čiurlionis and F. Bajoras, as well as compositions from the standard classical repertory.

The address, concerned with Soviet Colonialism and the Baltic States, sparked an interesting exchange of information between members and guests.

WALTER (GATES) GRIGAITIS, arranger, composer and pianist, died last November in Philadelphia. Noted for his work-with many rock and roll stars, he wrote several songs, and acted as arranger for Chubby Checker, Bobby Vinton, The Supremes, Freddie Cannon, Gene Pitney and others in association with Swan Records. His father, the late Walter K. Grigaitis, Sr., was a former conductor with the Philadelphia Opera Company and the Pennsylvania Grand Opera Company.


From a distance Saulė noticed


Modern facilities and runways able to accommodate the world's largest aircraft have resulted in steady growth of both passenger and freight activity at the Syracuse Hancock International Airport.

The three major passenger carriers serving Syracuse are American, Eastern, and Allegheny Airlines. Two other airlines, Braniff and North Central have applied for routes out of Syracuse. Hancock is the busiest airport between New York City and Buffalo and is also the home of the regional headquarters of the North American Air Defense Command.

Both the Penn Central and Erie Lackawanna Railroads operate freight-marshaling yards in Syracuse. In the golden days of railroading, the East Syracuse yard was one of the largest in the East.



For those of you who like to travel by train, Amtrak provides a number of passenger trains daily on its east-west route.

The Greyhound Bus Company provides service in all directions from Syracuse. Those of you from larger councils, or in councils near each other, you can reserve a bus and come to the convention in a group. The cost is very minimal if you fill the bus, even if you stay three or four days. Also, it's a lot of fun traveling with your own people. Check with your local bus company and you'll be surprised as to the low cost.



If you are a boating enthusiast, you may come to the convention by boat. The Port of Syracuse is connected by excellent waterways, including the Barge Canal, to Lake Erie through Buffalo, the St. Lawrence Seaway and Atlantic Ocean through the Port of Oswego, and the Hudson River and New York City through Albany.

There, my dear friends, you have all the modes of transportation to and from Syracuse. Start planning now so that by August you'll have all of your problems worked out. We really want to see as many of you as possible.


Wednesday - Golf Tournament for both sexes and for the funloving and the serious. Trophies in three catagories will be awarded at the Awards Banquet in the evening.



EASTER EGGS — LITHUANIAN STYLE





A FEW FACTS ABOUT ST. CASIMIR,

He was born on Oct. 3, 1458; the grandson of Jogaila. He began his formal instructions when he was nine. Included were languages, public speaking, physical education and the importance of prayer.

When Casimir was 13, he was given an army of 12,000 men to command. After an unsuccessful campaign, he went back to his studies. He learned the

rules of chivalry and literary appreciation.

During this time a deeper love of prayer and religion grew in him. The King, his father, was alarmed since Casimir was heir to the throne. As he grew older Casimir instituted many reforms and personally aided in helping the poor and the sick. He grew closer to God and began fasting and doing penance. He spent entire days meditating in the chapel.


In 1483, Casimir began to lose his good health. Many were saying it was due to his harsh treatment of himself. His illness developed quickly and he died

on the morning of March 4, 1484.







Across the sea, by ship they came to be a free people, and own their own claim.


They came to America, to see days that are bright

Refreshments were served by Fran DiBart, Mildred Whelly, Mildred Botaitis and Ann Radzevich.


