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



## THE WHISPER OF A GENTLE BREEZE

Once upon a time a young girl lived in a tiny king-dom beside the Baltic Sea. One morning mother sent her on an errand. She meets a knight riding his white horse. He is known throughout the realm as the kindliest and friendliest knight. Everybody loves him. He stops to talk to the girl who is carrying a basket of food.

"My name is Kestutis", he greets her. As they converse he notices the maiden's loveliness, her natural grace, her fine traits of character. Finally he asks, "Are you a maiden of earth or do you live in the sky?"

"My name is Birute and I am on an errand for my mother", she politely answers.

As Birute is about to continue on her way Kestutis delays her and asks for her hand in marriage promising: "If you give me your hand in marriage not a master will I be but a most loving husband".

"Not only my hand in marriage will I gladly give thee, but also my heart", the maiden joyfully exclaims enchanted by the chivalrous knight and overwhelmed by his sudden proposal.

"Also my heart". Of course the girl meant that her husband would be the center of her life. She would be faithful to him, loyal and sincerely loving.

When? Where? under what circumstances Sister Verna, Sister Virginia, did you meet Christ? What did He say to you that you became enamored of Him and followed Him into professed religious life?

In Biblical times God made His presence felt in many ways, as for instance in the form of a blazing fire, a soft gentle cloud, booming thunder. Perhaps God spoke to our Jubilarians like the "whisper of a gentle breeze", we read about in the first Book of Kings.

How did our Lord attract all of you sisters to follow Him, especially when He didn't offer you anything but a crown of thorns and a cross? How did He charm you and inflame your heart with such love that you ran after Him asking for the ring, the crown, the cross; in turn surrendering your whole heart to Him by your fervent profession of religious vows. What dazzling ideals, what youthful aspirations bewitched you into following Christ Crucified?

From time to time, in prayer, it is good to reach back and recall the incident, or series of incidents, that swept you off your feet into religious life.

Professed religious who make the Supreme Good the center of their lives are sometimes considered

living useless, even foolish lives. Jesus didn't think so. He did not condemn Martha for not sitting down beside Mary nor did He praise Mary's lack of solicitude for hard-working Martha. Our divine Lord merely pointed out that things of God are more important than things of man

Religious life lived sincerely by continual practice of virtue, humbly striving for perfection is, in our Lord's mind, neither foolish nor useless. People who say such things do not understand the purpose nor see the value of religious life. If religious life is useless and foolish then our Blessed Lord's life reached the apex of absurdity. St. Luke tells us: "Jesus would always go off to some place where He could be alone and pray". (Lk. 5:16).

In his letter to the Philippians St. Paul boldly proclaims himself a fool for Christ: "For His sake I have forfeited everything — so that Christ may be my



wealth". (Phil. 3:8-14).

Martha worked. That particular day Jesus may have brought some of His friends along which may have made Martha extremely busy. Work is a blessing. We should thank God we are able to work for Him.

A complete change of heart overtook the agnostic Malcolm Muggeridge who was grasping for dear life and in a dramatic moment of utter despair was about to let go, when suddenly the thought occurred that perhaps his life could be useful and even necessary for the well-being of others. Later, this Erglish author wrote a book entitled "SOMETHING BFAUTIFUL FOR GOD", the life of Mother There of Calcutta.

You Sisters are constantly doing these things. Therefore you are always meeting Christ because He identifies with the weak, the sick, the poor; "in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me". (Matt. 25:40).

What more noble work can a religious Sister do than to teach a child about God: what God is like, what God has done for the child, what God wants of the child and why. "Of all his powers, man possesses none nobler than his ability to recognize that there is a Being higher than hiw own, and to bind himself to the honor of this higher Being, God", wrote the brilliant and humble theologian, Romano Guardini.

It is a great good fortune for young people to find masters whose life is a continual lesson, and who are admired more for their personal conduct than for their instruction. We professed religious should be eager to please God each day by doing our round of duty generously while at the same time seeking perfection. Our profession is different from that of a doctor, or scientist, or lawyer. Our profession is to seek holiness. In his letter to the Philippians St. Paul complains: "Everyone is busy seeking his own interests rather than those of Jesus".

On the day of her vows the religious professes to give God her undivided love. "Not only my hand will give Thee, but also my heart". "If you accept my proposal not a master will I be, but a most loving husband". What a wonderfully satisfying experience to love someone sincerely and to know that you are loved in return with a deep love that knows no measure. Such is Christ's love for you, his beloved.

The Lithuanian artist-musician, Mikalojus Čiurlionis, described love as an open road to the sun paved with sharp diamonds. Jurgis Gliauda, a Lithuanian jurist and writer says: "In love can be heard the clank of chains, echoing along the very road paved with diamonds". Love, in a sense, is enslavement to the beloved. Yet, despite these heavy, painful, clanking chains, St. Paul with stirred emotion wrote to the Corinthians: "The love of Christ compels us to live

not for ourselves, but for Him, Who died and rose for us". (2 Cor. 5:4-15).

You, dear Sisters, have heard the story of the young lady artist and the old man artist, or something similar to it. "That is a beautiful painting of Jesus", said the lady artist, "you must love him dearly". "Yes, I do", answered the old man artist, "but when I love Him even more, I will paint Him far more beautifully".

We paint Jesus on the canvass of our soul when we practice charity. All other virtues grow when we practice charity. Every act of patience, humility, temperance, obedience, if done for the love of God, increases charity. Charity is a close supernatural friendship between God and me.

When Christ called us, in whatever way He did, to religious life, He gave us the opportunity to attempt to reach the sublimest peaks of human perfection. Therefore, the religious life is neither useless nor foolish, but a precious God-given opportunity to live life to the fullest in close communion with God. The beauty of the religious life is seen only to the degree to which we are willing to live it.

Sister Verna, Sister Virginia, on this gladsome day you are solemnly celebrating your respective anniversaries of religious profession and are being regaled for the years you worked and prayed in the shadow of Christ Crucified. CONGRATULATIONS! Today, all of you Sisters, in a certain sense, are also celebrating the number of years you have lived religious life. Congratulations to all of you!

A gentle whispering breeze---the felt presence of God---an ardent loving response---"not only my hand will I give Thee, but also my heart".

# THE VOICE OF AMERICA BROADCASTS ON SHORT WAVE RADIO



How many of you are familiar with the shortwave broadcasts of "Amerikos Balsas Lietuvoje".

The VOA has daily broadcasts to the occupied nations of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania in its Baltic Language Service. Undoubtedly, the Knights of Lithuania would primarily be interested in what is air-waved to Lithuania. No special knowledge of radio is required other than possibly the conversion of Universal Time or Greenwich Mean Time, turning the dial to the correct kHz in proper Meter Band.

If you do not own a communications receiver that has full coverage of all the shortwave bands, a moderately-priced portable radio that has these (Wavelengths) or Meter Bands namely—19M, 25M, 31M, or the 60M, will give you coverage of at least one of the broadcasts to Lithuania. The quality of the reception will vary with your ability to properly tune in the transmitter as well as atmospheric conditions at that time. The best reception is obtained during the winter months,

but this may vary with Solar Flares, and the magnetism from the Northern Lights. The East Coast area may find best reception in the 19 meter band, but this may vary with your location, so try them all.

The listening time on the East Coast for VOA broadcast to Lithuania is 1500-1530 and 1700-1730 (hours) GMT. The equivalent in Eastern Standard Time is 10:00 -10:30 a.m. and Noon - 12:30 p.m.The following frequencies are used (kHz) 15270, 11960, 9620 in the a.m. broadcasts and 15270, 11710, 9735, 9620, and 6160 at Noon. These broadcasts are beamed overseas to various relay stations for transmission broadcasts to Lithuania. The reception time in Lithuania would be 1800-1830 and 2000-2030 or 6:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. Those wishing an update on any changes in the program schedule should address their inquires to the —

International Communication Agency United States of America Washington, D.C. 20547

There is no fee for this information. Along with the latest program schedule, you will receive a booklet designating the location of the receiving station that relays the program to the Baltic Nations.

If you would prefer to hear the Lithuanian Language direct from Lithuania, there is RADIO VILNIUS on shortwave radio. If you understand only English, there are programs for you also. The flower diagram is a copy of a card sent from the radio station for those who ask for a QSL card after having sent to Radio Vilnius a report of what they head on their receiver, the time, and the quality of the reception. The report should be sent to —

This address should also be used for writing for dates, languages, and broadcast frequencies to North America from Radio Vilnius. If you are tired of the programming on the Boob-Tube, why not try to tune in something really unusual on that shortwave radio for a change.

## PADAVIMAS APIE VILNIU IR NERL

#### POVILAS DIRKIS

Prieš šimtus metų Vilniaus apylinkė ūžė, šlamėjo, be galo ir be krašto žaliuojančiomis giriomis apaugusi. Anuomet dar Vilniaus miesto nė žymių nebuvo. Ten, tarp aukštų Panerio kalnų buvo supiltas piliakalnis, o ant jo dunksojo pilis. Toje pilyje gyveno milžinų karalius, galingiausias milžinas, vardu Vilnius ir jo žmona Neris.

Kartą milžinas Vilnius patyrė, kad jo šalį puldinėja plėšrūs kaimynai, žudo nekaltus gyventojus ir naikina jų turtą. Supykęs nusprendė nedorus priešus sudrausti. Vieną rytą Vilnius išėjo į pilies kiemą ir garsiai užtrimitavo tauro ragu. Tokiu būdu sušaukė visus Dainavos šalies bernužėlius, jaunus raitininkus į didžiają pili.

Surinkęs gausų būrį kariuomenės, milžinas Vilnius išėjo sudrausti piktų kaimynų, kurie puldinėjo kraštą. Milžino žmona liko namie saugoti pilies židinio ir pavaduoti savo vyra krašto valdymo reikalais.

Vilnius su savo vyrais ilgai kovėsi tolimuose kraštuose, daug žemių užkariavo, daug turto iš jų atėmė. Pasaulio gala priėjęs, grįžo namo, į savo tėvynę. Sugrįžęs į savo žemę, rado baisaus priešo pėdsakus. Kur tik pažiūri — viskas išnaikinta, sugriauta, sudeginta ir išplėšta. Likę tik lavonai, kraujo klanai ir pelenai.

Prieš įžengdamas į pilies rajoną, sutrimitavo Vilnius garsiuoju tauro ragu, bet į jo balsą niekas niekur

neatsiliepė. Tuomet Vilnius ijojo i pili ir pirmiausia teiravosi, kas atsitiko su jo žmona Nerimi. Vilnius su savo kariais surankiojo visus žuvusius, sudėjo pilies kalne ir garbingai palaidojo, supildamas ant ju dar aukštesnį kalną. Tas kalnas dabar Tauro arba Gedimino kalnu vadinamas. Neries ir Vilnios santakoje tebestovi ir šiandieninė pilis. Nuliūdo milžinas Vilnius, netekęs buvusios tvirtos pilies ir gražios bei klusnios žmonos Neries. Padėjes savo šarvus bei karda, atsisėdo netoli kalno ir griaudžiai verkė, verkė. Iš jo ašarų susidarė upė, kuri buvo pavadinta žuvusios žmonos Neries vardu. Toji vieta, kur milžinas verkė, dabar vadinama Verkiais.

innovated the mail order business. . . and in 1885, the first steel frame skyscraper, a mere ten stories high.

Our cloud-high mountains are man-made; soaring steel and concrete peaks like the 110 story Sears Tower — tallest building in the world. The John Hancock Center, its sleek black girders pointing toward the sky, is the largest residential office building on earth.

Chicago explodes with live entertainment. Everything from Shakespeare to avant-garde; from the latest laugh by Neil Simon to a Eugene O'Neill revival; from musical extravaganzas to improvisations can be enjoyed at theaters throughout the city (not to mention community and suburban playhouses).

Our pillared Opera House satisfies classical tastes with a 13-story stage and a seating capacity of 3,000.

Lilting arias by Verdi and Puccini give way to the best of Brahms, Beethoven, Bach and Mahler during an Orchestra Hall performance by the world famous Chicago Symphony. Popular and

classical music join hands each summer during the Ravinia Festival.

Frank Lloyd Wright, who likes Chicago so much he lived and worked here for years, once said the Auditorium Theater offered the best acoustics in the world. It still does — for visits by the Bolshoi Ballet, and the latest folk, classical, country and rock musical groups.

Chicago boulevards rival those of Rome and Paris — all 300 miles of them, as well as 430 parks and a virgin forest preserve that encircles the city for 65 miles.

The plush fashion salons of Europe are only a short walk away from the Radisson-Chicago Hotel via the spectacular Water Tower Place and the shops along the "magnificent mile" — Michigan Avenue, and "that great Street" — State Street, which first appeared on a town map in 1834 as a muddy track. Today, the street is lined with gigantic department stores, small specialty shops, a beautiful mall which will be completed in the very near future, and the legendary shopping paradise called Marshall Field and Company.

Chicago residents will tell you its No. One in sports. It has it all — both spectators and participant sports. From "A" for Archery to "Y" for Yachting, the visitor will find the participant sport of his choice in nearby locales. And if it is your bag to sit and watch, Chicago is also the place; with thorough-bred racing and the trotters, White Soxs and Cubs baseball, Bears football, Blackhawk hockey, Sting soccer, Bulls basketball, and our newest entry in the pro fields, the Hustle (womens basketball), in addition to college sports.

In a few hours you can take a whirlwind tour of Asia, Europe, Africa and South America — by restaurant, Chicago-style. You have over 5,000 choices including the Lithuanian restaurants — Palanga, Neringa, Tulpė, Healthy Foods, Diamnond Head, Sharko's West and Jerry Sharko's (the last three are owned by K of L members).

When it comes to great works of art, it seems Chicago has so many they're starting to spill into our streets. The Chagall mosaic, 3,000 square feet of lively colors, was created especially for us by the French master. Picasso's gift to Chicago, a 50-feet steel sculpture, stands in Daley Plaza. Calder's "Flamingo", a 50-ton stabile, adds to our outdoor gallery.

Priceless masterpieces are kept indoors., too!


The Art Institute of Chicago's Impressionist collection is only a portion of the vast treasure that includes works by everyone from Van Gogh and Rembrandt to Goya and DaVinci. Modern masters can be enjoyed at the Museum of Contemporary Art.

You can walk right up to a dinosaur in the lobby of the Field Museum of Natural History. Turn around and you'll see a pair of huge African elephants. Crowding the museum's long halls are displays featuring everything from Tibetan religious costumes to Egyptian mummies and wild boars.

The 75 display halls at the Museum of Science and Industry brim with a collection of curious and sophisticated gadgetry, including a working coal mine, a captured German U-boat, and a new exhibit, "The MONEY Center", where you can actually see the various banking functions.

The natural setting of an African plain isn't too far removed from the Chicago landscape when you stroll through the Lincoln Park or Brookfield Zoos.






A Lenten Supper of fish preceded our

On the sixteenth day of February in 1918, Lithuanian intellectuals, representing all the people, unanimously proclaimed Lithuania's independence. Their action was endorsed by all nations. The date is reverently commemorated annually by every Lithuanian colony throughout the world.

In New York a high Mass was celebrated by Fr. George Gurinskas at Our Lady of Vilnius Church. Our members were well represented at this very special service.

There was a short but impressive program at the parish hall following Mass. It was directed by Helen Shields, who most certainly merited the standing ovation from all of us at the festivities conclusion. At the microphone Helen told us that the movement for independence was greatly aided by determined efforts of many groups of Lithuanians in the United States.

Bringing matters up to date, Mary York spoke about the total lack of human rights pertaining to children in Lithuania. Officials there discourage church attendance, ridicule those who do not heed their threats, and downgrade everything of a religious nature. Most of the subject matter was documented in Catholic church chronicals.

Barbara Yurkus wrote an interesting essay on the joys of being a Lithuanian, a member of a warm and friendly race of people. The excellent piece by the talented youngster was recited by her mother Helen.

Supreme Council Pres. Philip Skabeikis reminded us that in connection with the independence celebration, American bishops announced a special day of prayer throughout the United States for the oppressed people in Lithuania.

As a closing note about Lithuania, it is most interesting to learn that culture and higher education have been making great strides there. The medical profession is a case in point. Based on total population, proportionately, there are more doctors in Lithuania that there are in England or Sweden. This isn't speculation. My source is James S. Gregory's excellent book "Russian land, Soviet people" (page 501). Mr. Gregory, author and lecturer, is a professor at Furzedown College in London, England.

The Mass at Our Lady of Vilnius Church on St. Casimir's Day was impressive and meaningful. Celebrant was pastor emeritus George Gurinskas, and in reverent attendance were not only our K of L members but also the ladies of the Rosary Society and our loyal Portuguese parishioners. Thus the only saint with a Lithuanian background was honored here as he was in so many churches throughout the world. At the conclusion of the Mass, with organist Michael Cibas providing the accompaniment, we sang the Vyčių hymn.

The Communion breakfast was held at the parish hall that was named in honor of our pastor. As usual, the culinary expertise of the kitchen people drew favorable comment from the hungry diners, and the caterers did their job with military precision.
